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## Seminary Alumni Plan Annual Meet

The Alumni Association of Western Theological Seminary will meet in annual session at a luncheon in Jack's Garden Room on Wednesday noon.

The Rev. Albert Mansen, pastor of the Jamestown Reformed Church, will preside at the meeting which is expected to draw about 125 persons from the ranks of the Western Seminary Alumni Association.

## Saugatuck Rental Bike Case Heard

SAUGATUCK — Motor bike rentals are likely to be a part of the Saugatuck-Douglas resort scene this summer, but the villages are making every effort to keep the situation under reasonable control.

Representatives of the LMC Corp. of Detroit which opened a rent-a-cycle enterprise in Douglas spent several hours in Allegan Circuit Court Wednesday attempting to obtain a restraining order to prevent Saugatuck village from blocking their attempts to operate such a business this summer.

Saugatuck officials, who had passed a restrictive ordinance a few weeks ago, had entered a cross claim. Douglas which had passed a similar ordinance three days after Saugatuck asked to be a party in the case, so it remained for Judge Raymond L. Smith to sort out the claims and counter-claims.

The result was a two-sided order which will allow LMC to operate provided it comply with two changes in the regulatory provisions of the ordinance. One change sets the insurance limits at \$10,000/\$20,000 which is the same required for public liability for auto operators, and the second change requires a \$1,000 surety bond.

All other provisions of the village licensing ordinance are to be followed.

The order is in the form of a temporary restraining order. No date has been set for a hearing on whether the order shall be made permanent.

The ordinances passed by Saugatuck and Douglas councils required the rental agency to pay annual license fees, carry liability insurance and provide surety bond. LMC company officials contended that the requirements, particularly the license fees involved, were excessive, unreasonable and prohibitive.

The ordinance had required public liability insurance of not less than \$100,000 and property damage not less than \$25,000, plus a corporate surety bond of \$10,000.

The ordinance also calls for a license fee of \$50 plus \$10 for each unit of equipment. The licensing fee was ruled "not excessive."

In general, the festival was more successful than could be expected with three of the four days cold and rainy. Despite the weather, the Tulip Time office has received many letters expressing pleasure with the programs offered. There were relatively few gripes.

A new aim next year will be more Dutch costumes since scrubbing chairmen had more volunteers than available costumes. Tulip Time owns 225 costumes, and some new arrangement will be considered. In years past, local service clubs sparked the costume drive and each club had its own design.

It was noted that float participation was better this year than in some years past, and that the edict of "no counter marching" in parades must be emphasized again next year.

Mayor Nelson Bosman who also is president of Tulip Time was particularly pleased with the participating in sidewalk scrubbing this year. The appearance of former Gov. G. Mennen Williams who called square dances at the Friday square dance kickoff sparked interest among the spectators. There was considerable interest in the visit of Gov. Romney and his international guests.

Willard Wichers read a letter for Mrs. Barbara Ambellas from leaders of the Fine Arts Festival of Birmingham, Ala., praising the Holland High klompen dancers who appeared at the festival.

Tulip Time Manager William H. Vande Water presented klompen dance charms to seniors at Holland High School this morning in connection with their years of klompen dancing and will make similar presentations to West Ottawa seniors June 11.

## Extinguish Fire In Sawdust Boxes



## Fire Claims 37-Year-Old Robert Radke

DUNNINGVILLE — Robert Radke, 37, died as a fire swept through his trailer home located at 127th Ave. and M-40 early this morning.

Radke's body was found in bed in the trailer. Dr. H. J. Himmerson of Hamilton pronounced him dead at the scene. Radke died of suffocation. He apparently was asleep when the fire broke out.

Hamilton fireman said the blaze started in a corner of the trailer where a wooden addition had been added on. The cause has not been determined.

The structure was engulfed in flames when Hamilton firemen were called about 1:30 a.m. George Boeriger of Hamilton noticed the fire as he was driving a truck on M-40, and phoned in the alarm.

The structure about eight by 30 feet was razed in the blaze. Hamilton firemen fought the fire for about three hours.

Radke had been employed by the Whitney Burial Vault Company of Allegan for the past 12 years.

He is survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Otto Radke of Allegan, two brothers, Harry and Emil, both of Allegan; three sisters, Mrs. Ervin Honeysette of Otsego, Mrs. Harley Cook of Allegan and Mrs. David Kolhoff of Kalamazoo; several aunts, uncles, nieces and nephews.

Funeral services will be held at 2 p.m. Saturday from the Gordon Funeral Residence in Allegan with the Rev. Ronald Horn officiating. Burial will be in Rose cemetery.



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## STORIES THAT WILL MAKE HISTORY

Some stories receive short  
shift even in the news, though  
they may tell us more about  
the world than we are willing  
to accept. Both of the stories in-  
volve communists, but on op-  
posite sides.

The one story out of Europe,  
and coming by way of Radio  
Free Europe, tells us that at  
least a quarter of a million  
Poles are still being held in  
forced labor in Russia, more  
than twenty years after the end  
of World War II. It is even  
more ironic to read this story,  
since Poland is now in the Rus-  
sian orbit. Both the Polish gov-  
ernment and the Russian gov-  
ernment are reported to be  
hesitant in accepting responsi-  
bility that might bring about an  
investigation. The implications  
of the story ought not to be lost.  
Communism, even among its  
friends, hasn't changed its  
stripes completely.

Out of Indonesia comes the  
story of the systematic killing  
of thousands of communists in  
what is an attempt to stamp out  
the party. After the attempted  
coup by Indonesian communists,  
the counter revolution was or-  
ganized by the army. Figures of  
dead run high.

Once again the implications  
of this campaign should not be  
lost. The figures tell of the anti-  
communist hatred, but they also  
should put us on guard for the  
time when the fortunes change.  
Hatred always begets hatred.

It is doubtful that many peo-  
ple are aware of what has taken  
place in Indonesia or what has  
happened to the Polish prison-  
ers of war. But in both instan-  
ces the time will come when  
the backwash of both of these  
situations will make its mark on  
history. We may find ourselves  
wondering what took place. A  
couple of stories that haven't  
received much attention will  
give us the answer. And at the  
same time we might learn that  
extreme cruelty is still a part  
of everyday life.

## Sunday School Lesson

Sunday, May 29  
The Fall of Samaria  
II Kings 17:9-18  
By C. P. Dame

Sometimes a man falls mor-  
ally and his friends grieve. Na-  
tions too fall and this is most  
tragic because it speaks of  
failure. This lesson tells about  
the fall of Samaria, or in other  
words, the fall of Israel as a  
nation.

I. A nation can deteriorate.  
Jeroboam I came to the throne  
in 922 B. C. His nation came  
to an end in 722 B. C. It  
lasted only 200 years. He be-  
gan its downward course, by  
corrupting its religion when he  
established two places of wor-  
ship, one in the north, in  
Dan, the other in the south in  
Bethel.

In both places he set a golden  
calf and called upon the peo-  
ple to worship there. These  
bulls represented Jehovah, the  
God of Israel. Later on Ahab  
introduced Baal worship and  
thus Israel's God was dis-  
placed.

Finally Assyria captured the  
nation and the best people  
were exiled and the poor who  
remained eventually intermar-  
ried with the people whom the  
Assyrian king brought in. Their  
descendants became the Samari-  
tans of the New Testa-  
ment.

There are two aspects to  
the fall of Samaria, the politi-  
cal and the spiritual. The real  
cause of the fall was its moral  
and spiritual decline. "And  
the children of Israel did se-  
cretly those things that were  
not right against the Lord their  
God, and they built them high  
places in all their cities,  
from the tower of the watch-  
men to the fenced city."

The people became idolaters  
and they imitated the "heathen  
whom the Lord carried away  
before them." Instead of de-  
stroying these heathen they  
conformed to them.

II. God's warnings are often  
unheeded. "Yet the Lord testif-  
ied against Israel and against  
Judah." How? God sent prophe-  
ts to whom he called upon the  
people to repent. When a  
call comes we can do one of  
two things—we can respond or  
reject. The people paid no at-  
tention to the warning words  
of the prophets. Instead of  
worshipping the true God, they  
"followed vanity and became  
vain and went after the hea-  
then that were round about  
them."

These idolaters worshipped  
Baal, the god of fertility, and  
the hosts of heaven and "they  
caused their sons and daugh-  
ters to pass through the fire"  
—offered their children to Mol-  
och!

Their conduct made God  
angry. Yes, God is angry with  
sin. This world is governed by  
a moral law. "Whoever a  
man soweth, that shall he also  
reap." God did not forsake Is-  
rael — the nation forsook Him.  
God used Assyria to punish His  
people who had transgressed  
His law. God is merciful and  
just.



## Formsma Sets MIAA 2-Mile Mark

For the third time in its history, Hope College's track team won the MIAA championship and the Flying Dutchmen did it in brilliant fashion Saturday afternoon at the MIAA Field Day at Van Raalte Field.

Hope racked up a total of 66 points and bumped defending champion Albion, second place finishers with 57 points. It was strictly a two-team race.

During the regular season, Hope had defeated the Britons for the first time in a dual meet. The Flying Dutchmen finished the dual meet season unbeaten and the win in the league track meet climaxed an outstanding season.

The Flying Dutchmen won MIAA crowns in 1952 and 1953 but this championship was the first for Coach Gordon Brewer. And he received splendid performances from his team.

Doug Formsma, 21-year-old Zeeland junior, set an MIAA record in winning the two-mile. Formsma, who said he didn't feel he ran his best race, finished strong, more than 100 yards ahead of the second place runner.

His time of 9:47.0 broke the mark of 9:49.2 set in 1961 by Barry Koops of Calvin. Formsma is a transfer student from Grand Rapids JC.

Ray Cooper, Hope sophomore from West Paterson, N.J., took first in the 100 and 220-yard dashes in 9.9 and 22.2. He also ran anchor in the 440-yard relay to give Hope the win. Other relay team members were Cal Beltman, Capt. Bill Hultgren and Bob Thompson.

Steve Reynen, Hope sophomore from Hollandale, Minn., won the half mile in 1:57.9. A fine sprint pulled Reynen away from the field.

Two other MIAA marks were set. Ken Calhoun of Kalamazoo pole vaulted 13'4" to break a mark set last season by Dave Heth of Albion.

In the 120-yard high hurdles, freshman Dave Moss of Adrian was clocked in 14.9 in the preliminaries and broke the mark of 15.0 set in 1959 by Garth Richey of Albion. Moss' time in the finals was 15.

Picking up field event points for Hope were Floyd Brady with seconds in the long jump and high jump; Chris Buys, seconds in the shot put and pole vault; Doug Nichols, second in the javelin and fourth in the pole vault and Jerri Poortinga, fifth in the pole vault.

Scoring points in the running events were Formsma, second in the mile; Sid Disbrow, fifth in the 440; Jim Pierpont, second in intermediate hurdles and third in the high hurdles and Cal Osterhaven, fifth in the two mile.

Beltman, Holland freshman and competing in track for the first time, ran the 100-yard dash in 10.1 in the preliminaries to knock defending champion Mike Ash of Kalamazoo out of the finals. Beltman failed to place in the finals but ran the first leg on the winning quarter mile relay team.

Calvin's mile relay team tied the MIAA record set by Hope last year of 3:23.1. The team was composed of Stan Klop, Jay Eppinga, Sandy De Haan and Dave VerMerris.

Hultgren accepted the league trophy from MIAA Commissioner John Hoejke. Adrian finished third in the meet with 37 points while Calvin had 32; Olivet, 19; Alma, 15 and Kalamazoo, 14.

## Dutchmen Win Award For 6th Time

Hope College athletes won the MIAA all-sports trophy for the sixth time Saturday at the MIAA Field Day at Van Raalte Field.

It was the first time Hope had ever hosted the Field Day and the all-sports trophy was a fitting climax to the event. Hope is celebrating its Centennial Year and it was the 75th annual Field Day.

Hope won the all-sports trophy in 1964 and Albion won the event last year. Again this year, it was a battle between the Flying Dutchmen and Britons.

The Flying Dutchmen finished with 64 points while Albion was second with 55. Calvin finished third with 52 points while Kalamazoo had 39. Alma had 31, Adrian, 29 and Olivet, 26.

Hope finished first in track and baseball, second in basketball and tennis and tied for second in football, fourth in golf and tied for fourth in cross country.

The all-sports trophy is awarded to the MIAA school with the highest total of points for the seven MIAA sports. Points are awarded in order of finish in the various sports and on an equal basis for each sport. The trophy has been awarded 28 times since its inception in 1935 and the years during World War II were omitted.

Hope won the all-sports trophy for the first time in the 1936-37 year and then again in 1946-47. The Flying Dutchmen won the award in back-to-back years in 1952-53 and 1953-54 and in 1963-64.



## OEO Committee Continues Plans

An interim executive committee to serve until officers are elected was named at a meeting of the Ottawa County Community Action Program committee Thursday night in West Ottawa High School, in connection with developing a program under the Office of Economic Opportunity.

Serving on the interim committee will be Mrs. James Brooks, Donald Clelland, Ralph E. Richman, Peter Roon, Mrs. Margaret Murawski of Holland, Malcolm Ferguson of Spring Lake, Gordon Langereis of Alandale, Albert Russell and Gary Byker of Hudsonville and Louis Lehman of Grand Haven. Richman is chairman and Roon vice chairman.

The interim committee is authorized to incorporate the program as a non profit corporation, to prepare for consideration of the full committee an application for an OEO grant, to draft by-laws and nominate officers.

Gerry C. Bosworth, regional representative on Gov. Romney's staff for the Michigan OEO, said at least 13,000 people in Ottawa county (per family of four) are living on less than \$3,000 a year, a figure accepted by both state and federal governments as a minimum for escaping poverty designation in an area like Ottawa county.

Jennie Kaufman, superintendent of the Ottawa Intermediate School District, said a survey shows four per cent of the county's children aged 5 to 17 were in families having less than \$2,000 annual income. She said school teachers are among the few citizens acutely aware of the crippling effects of inadequate income on the child's future.

Wendell Ver Duin, director of the program in Kent county, said this county has 25 projects exclusive of Headstart programs. He cited coordination of effort in the 100 welfare agencies in Kent county and said efforts to help ACD mothers become self supporting were direct dividends of OEO action. The elimination of poverty is

nowhere in sight, but the increasing costs of welfare programs can be materially cut down by getting people out of their low income place, he said.

Peter Roon, assistant to West Ottawa Supt. Lloyd Van Raalte, reviewed difficulties in seeking OEO funds when there is no directing or planning office in the county. Van Raalte urged adoption of an OEO program for Ottawa county. "If local citizens do not accept the responsibility, or if we reject aid when it is offered, we are opening the door to direct federal administration," he said.

Forty-one of the 71 persons invited were present.

The Yamaha piano will be used for class and studio recitals. The second piano, purchased with the other anonymous gift, is expected to arrive sometime next week.



Rabinowitz textile firm of New York.

Temperatures hit a high of 78 Sunday, providing the area with the first warm weekend so far this year.

A survey of tulip lane revealed a share of tulips still in bud pointing to continued blooming for several days, barring extreme heat or storms.

Tulip gardens also are at their peak on Windmill Island which attracted 7,775 visitors during the weekend. Manager Jaap de Blecourt said only two beds are bloomed out, and a few beds are yet to bloom.

There were 2,935 visitors on Saturday and 4,840 on Sunday compared with a total 1,382 on Saturday and 1,448 Sunday, total 2,830, for the same weekend last year, a week following Tulip Time.

Police Chief Les Van Beveren had some special officers on duty for the weekend to assist with traffic. Although traffic was busy and the lines bumper to bumper for some periods, there were few problems and in general the traffic moved easily. Incoming traffic from M-21, US-31, and M-40 were particularly heavy Sunday afternoon.

Warm weather over the weekend provided about the first opportunity for swimming and sunning. Convertibles with tops down were the order of the day. The high Sunday was 78 and the low 53, compared with 69 and 57 a year ago.

Windmill Manager de Blecourt had three men directing traffic in the parking lot at Windmill Island during peak periods over the weekend.

Ottawa County Civil Defense Director Glen Timmer said the drill was "quite successful." The participants practiced dealing with two simulated disaster areas in Zeeland.

## Holland Marine Lieutenant Wounded in Viet Nam War

On the last mission April 29 south of the village of Chu Lai in northern South Viet Nam a 30-caliber bullet from a Viet Cong gun zipped through the open window on the side of Jansen's helicopter and severely fractured bones in his left shoulder. The wound may have ended Jansen's hopes of being a career pilot.

"The doctors that operated on the arm said I'd have between zero and 50 per cent use of it," he said. "The doctors at Great Lakes Naval Hospital near Chicago were more optimistic when they saw how well it was healing," he added.

Jansen hopes to work the arm back into shape through physical therapy. He will be home for about two or three months, and will work at various exercises for the arm. He will also make trips to Great Lakes Hospital for therapy.

Jansen, son of Mr. and Mrs. Benjamin Jansen was in Viet Nam seven months. He flew in the Qui Nhon area about half the time, and in the Chu Lai the other half. Both are in northern part of the tiny nation within 150 miles of the city of Da Nang.

Jansen earned the nickname "Magnet tail" as his chopper was hit 21 times in a three month period.

"I picked up a purple heart once a month," Jansen quipped. He was hospitalized in February and March with shrapnel wounds received from two of the hits.

Miraculously, however, Jansen escaped death from the shots.

"If any of the three bullets had struck a quarter-inch closer I could have been killed," Jansen said.

In February, a bullet came through the bottom of the helicopter, and was stopped by the rudder pedal which prevented it from hitting his chest. In March a bullet came through the chopper door and struck a metal armor plate a quarter inch from its edge.

"If the bullet that hit my left shoulder had been a quarter of an inch either way I could have lost the arm, had a punctured lung or I might have bled to death," Jansen said.

The pilot said what he'd like to do most would be to return to Viet Nam as a jet pilot.

"You're a sitting duck in those helicopters," he said, "but in a jet you can hit back at the VC."

Jansen was trained at the Pensacola Naval Flight Training School in Pensacola, Fla., and can fly single-engine and multi-engine planes as well as helicopters.

Jansen is a 1960 graduate of Holland Christian High School, and a member of Prospect Park Christian Reformed Church. He entered the Marines in July, 1961.

After graduating from flight school he served in the Mediterranean and later flew a helicopter in the crisis in the Dominican Republic in the spring of 1964. With his Viet Nam experience he now has 1,000 hours of helicopter flying time.

He volunteered for service in Viet Nam.

"If I hadn't volunteered I'd have ended up there eventually, to fly jets," Jansen said, "but the real need is for helicopter he said smiling.

A lot of the pilots would like pilots.

The helicopters drop out assault forces, bring in supplies of food and ammunition and evacuate the wounded soldiers. The speed and mobility of the helicopter are vital factors in making up for the Viet Cong's

advantages in the guerrilla war. The Viet Cong realize the importance of the helicopters. "There's a high reward for getting a helicopter pilot," Jansen said.

The lack of many anti-aircraft guns and apparent poor aim with their weapons make the helicopters even more effective, Jansen said. He pointed out that although his chopper was hit 21 times, the VC shot many more rounds that did not find the target.

"We are definitely winning the military war," Jansen stressed. "The Viet Cong and North Vietnamese are taking a real pounding."

"Further, there's no limit to the courage shown by U.S. Marines," Jansen said. "They do real John Wayne stuff like charge machineguns and land helicopters in a nest of Viet Cong."

"The veterans say today's Marines are as good if not better than those in World War II," he said.

Jansen brought back the warped-looking bullet which wounded him as a memento. Another memento he sent back was an iron "punji" stick which the Viet Cong use to poison infantrymen or for blowing out tires of helicopters. The VC have also developed 10-foot long bamboo sticks to impale helicopters, Jansen said.

Although he would love to return as a pilot, Jansen realizes it may not be possible. "I'd sure hate to leave the Marines," he concludes, "but, if God wants me to do another job, I'll go and do it."

Jansen earned the nickname "Magnet tail" as his chopper was hit 21 times in a three month period.

"I picked up a purple heart once a month," Jansen quipped. He was hospitalized in February and March with shrapnel wounds received from two of the hits.

Miraculously, however, Jansen escaped death from the shots.

"If any of the three bullets had struck a quarter-inch closer I could have been killed," Jansen said.

In February, a bullet came through the bottom of the helicopter, and was stopped by the rudder pedal which prevented it from hitting his chest. In March a bullet came through the chopper door and struck a metal armor plate a quarter inch from its edge.

"If the bullet that hit my left shoulder had been a quarter of an inch either way I could have lost the arm, had a punctured lung or I might have bled to death," Jansen said.

The pilot said what he'd like to do most would be to return to Viet Nam as a jet pilot.

"You're a sitting duck in those helicopters," he said, "but in a jet you can hit back at the VC."

Jansen was trained at the Pensacola Naval Flight Training School in Pensacola, Fla., and can fly single-engine and multi-engine planes as well as helicopters.

Jansen is a 1960 graduate of Holland Christian High School, and a member of Prospect Park Christian Reformed Church. He entered the Marines in July, 1961.

After graduating from flight school he served in the Mediterranean and later flew a helicopter in the crisis in the Dominican Republic in the spring of 1964. With his Viet Nam experience he now has 1,000 hours of helicopter flying time.

He volunteered for service in Viet Nam.

"If I hadn't volunteered I'd have ended up there eventually, to fly jets," Jansen said, "but the real need is for helicopter he said smiling.

The helicopters drop out assault forces, bring in supplies of food and ammunition and evacuate the wounded soldiers. The speed and mobility of the helicopter are vital factors in making up for the Viet Cong's




