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Memorial Ceremonies Set Here

Holland will celebrate Memorial Day in traditional manner this year with a religious service at 7 p.m. Sunday in Third Reformed Church, and a parade Monday at 9:30 a.m., followed by a program in Pilgrim Home Cemetery with Dr. Herman Redder of Central Reformed Church of Grand Rapids as speaker.

Plans for the events were made at a meeting of representatives of patriotic organizations Monday night in Civic Center with Dale Van Lents serving as chairman.

Plans were rejected for a change in parade route, and the regular route will continue starting from Central Ave. east on 12th St. to Columbia, south on Columbia to 16th and on 16th St. east to the cemetery.

Capt. Howard Goodyke will serve as marshal of the day and John Sas and Adrian De Kraker will serve as honorary marshals. In the parade will be the American Legion Band, all school bands, patriotic groups, veterans, Gold Star Mothers and fathers, Boy Scouts, Camp Fire Girls and Calvinist Cadets.

Zeeland's Joe Zylstra and Jeff Flaherty were defeated by Station and Miller in the semi-final round 8-6, 6-1.







Former Local Man Killed In Crash

FLINT — A grinding head-on collision of two semi-trailer trucks along M-78 in Shiawassee county west of here Thursday at 6 a.m. claimed the lives of the drivers, one of them a former Holland resident.

Killed in the collision were Alvin Kapenga, 57, formerly of Holland and Duane Hotchkiss, 27, of North Albion.

Kapenga was driving a truck for Gra-Bell Truck Lines of Holland which has an office in Charlotte. He was returning to Charlotte after making a delivery in the Flint area.

Authorities said Kapenga was westbound on the divided highway and a left front tire on the tractor was believed to have blown out, causing the rig to veer to the left across the median and into the eastbound lane where the head-on collision occurred.

Both drivers were killed instantly.

Hotchkiss, driving for St. Louis Freight Lines Inc., was carrying a cargo of asphalt shingles on his flat bed truck. The cab of one of the trucks was torn apart and debris was said scattered about a wide area of the highway.

Kapenga had been employed by Gra-Bell for eight years and previously had worked for other trucking firms in Holland. He was a member of the Christian Reformed Church of Charlotte.

Surviving are his wife, Gertrude; three daughters, Mrs. Charles A. (Audrey) Christensen of Charlotte, Mrs. Thomas (Marlene) St. John of Holt, and Sally Lynn Kapenga at home; one son, Larry J. of Hudsonville; one grandson; his father, Albert Kapenga of Holland; two brothers, James of Holland and Jarvis of Trenton.

Allegan Fair Is Extended For One Day

ALLEGAN — This year's Allegan County Fair will be one night longer and a couple of "big names" stronger.

Unveiling plans for the 120th consecutive fair at a recent meeting of community leaders and fair board members, President Weldon Rumery revealed that the gates would open officially at 4 p.m. Friday night, Sept. 8, instead of Saturday morning as in recent years. The fair will run through Saturday, Sept. 16.

Some of the name attractions signed for the 9-day exposition are Duke Ellington and his band; the Camel Drivers; the Oakridge Boys — nationally-known gospel singers; Hubert Castle's International Circus; Tommy Cash, brother of country singer Johnny Cash; the Wolverine Futurity harness races and state championship demolition derbies and pony hitch contests.

Nearly \$100,000 worth of new buildings are scheduled for completion in time for this year's fair, according to Rumery. Work already is underway on a 48,000 square foot combination stock barn and show arena and two new speed barns. Sometime this summer, the old Jewett School, located on Dumont Rd. five miles north of Allegan, will be moved to the fairgrounds where it will become a permanent exhibit operated by the Allegan County Historical Society.

The 9-day program will open with a demolition derby in front of a grandstand on Friday night. The first Saturday's program will include the Michigan State Championship heavy harness pony hitch contest, special children's day events, the annual Harvest Queen pageant and a rock concert featuring the Camel Drivers.

A group of Allegan area churches have joined together to bring "The Oak Ridge Boys" to the fair on Sunday for concerts at 3 and 7 p.m.

Monday's program includes the opening of a 6-day harness racing schedule, a draft horse hitch contest, a ladies' single hitch driving derby, and the Michigan State Demolition Derby Championships in the evening.

Hubert Castle will bring his International Circus back to Allegan for the 19th straight year on Tuesday and Wednesday, Wednesday will be "Ladies' Day" and "Senior Citizens' Day" with a full morning of special events on the program.

Thursday's features include the annual Mayors and Village Presidents' Day parades, the \$38,000 Wolverine Futurity Pace, and the country and western musical festival featuring Tommy Cash and "The Tom Cats."

Friday's program includes light weight horse pulling contests, the Wolverine Futurity Trot for an estimated purse of \$32,000, the Van Buren County Folk Dancers and the musical revue featuring Duke Ellington and his band.

Saturday, final day of the fair, will offer heavy weight team pulling contests in the morning, an afternoon or harness racing and another two shows featuring the Ellington band in the evening.

People all over the world will be watching and reading for the results of the conference.


There are many problems around the world today, we can only hope that this meeting will help solve some of the problems.

Lesson

Sunday, May 28
The Church's Need
for Renewal
Colossians 3:1-17
By C. P. Dame

The word "renewal" is popular and in times past the word "revival" was often used. Both words suggest the need of newness of life. In this materialistic age, the church desperately needs a spiritual awakening that will put new life in churches everywhere.

I. Converted people show they are Christians by the way they live. Paul did not begin the church in Colosse, but he was concerned about it even though he was in prison and had much to think about. The Christians had undergone a radical change in their lives and this change had to express itself in new interests. Paul told them to "seek those things which are above, where Christ sitteth on the right hand of God." This meant action. In addition, Paul commands them to set their affections on things which are above. This is not easy. We are of the earth, and therefore earthly. Christ is in the heaven above. If a person is dead to sin the worldly temptations will not appeal to him.

The Colossian Christians had been pagans and their lives had been marred by sex and greed. "Mortify therefore your members which are on the earth: fornication, uncleanness, inordinate affection, evil concupiscence and covetousness." These words tell of their need and speak to our modern sex-saturated and materialistic age. The sins of that age and our age arouse the wrath of God.

II. Christians live a new life. Note that Paul summons the Colossian Christians to put on the new nature, which is being renewed in knowledge, righteousness and holiness. The new life has its characteristics. It is marked by communication—it breaks down all barriers that cause separations and divisions. Christ unites people and those who belong to Christ radiate reconciliation.

III. Christian virtues adorn the new life. The virtues Paul mentions, "compassion, mercies, kindness, humbleness of mind, meekness, long-suffering," are much needed today. Christianity stands for all that makes people more Christ-like. People who are concerned about building a Christian brotherhood show concern for others and promote fellowship. And fellowship is not possible unless there are people who are forgiving and always show concern for each other.

Paul asserts that love "binds everything together in perfect harmony." When the word of Christ dwells in people "richly in all wisdom" then a renewal will take place in the Christian Church. "And whatsoever ye do in word or deed, do all in the name of the Lord Jesus." If we all would do that, what would happen?

The program was given by Mrs. F. Palechek who continued her series on the history of houses, the first part of which she gave at the last meeting.











With ideal weather marking the entire Tulip Time festival, just about everything went "right" this year. Tulips were at their peak, hordes of visitors appeared happy and townsfolk carried on in the fine spirit of the tradition. Judges were Arthur C. Hills of Grand Valley State College, Paul Egli of Greenville College, Illinois, a newcomer this year, and Ray Roth of Flint, former band director at E.E. Fell Junior High who initiated the now famous feature of local bandsmen marching in wooden shoes. Receiving first division ratings were Jenison, Cedar Springs, Columbia Central of Brooklyn, Linden, Charlotte, Corunna, East Kentwood, Owosso and John Glenn of Westland. Receiving second division ratings were Godfrey-Lee, Houghton, Zeeland, Hudsonville, Brandywine of Niles, Fenton.

Art Hills, formerly ran band reviews while he was director of the Holland High School band, has been judging field events many years. "There's nothing like constructive criticism to bring about improvements," he commented, "and those who get first division ratings really work to get them."

Each performing band received check sheets from each judge with plenty of comments. Each band receives a handsome plaque listing division ratings.

Henry P. Vander Linde who runs the band review along with riding herd on the Christian school bands is a remarkably relaxed fellow who takes all his Tulip Time responsibilities in stride.

Known for appearing several times in each parade, each time marching with another band, Henry cut down his trips this year to three times in the Wednesday parade and twice in the Thursday and Saturday parades. And for the first time used a bicycle.

If Henry's uniform looked a bit loose this year, it's because he has taken off a few pounds. And his tailor left for Europe!

It was a swan song for Robert L. Brouwer directing the Zeeland High School Band at the band review Saturday. Robert is taking over junior high and elementary bands next year and Dan Ritsema is taking over the high school band.

Incidentally, those metallic gold sequined outfits the Zeeland majorettes were wearing for the first time this year are cool rather than hot, we're told. And some knowledgeable per-

son pointed out it's good the sleeves are long. Otherwise, a sleeveless sequined outfit can cause some nasty rubs and scratches with all the movements a majorette goes through.

Columbia Central High School Band of Brooklyn, Robert Spencer director, paid it's 27th visit to tulip time this year. It brought a rubber duck, the hit of the show, appearing in a Saturday night bath sequence.

Brandywine High School Band of Niles was paying its first visit to the tulip Time band review this year. Its members wore wine colored tunics.

Jenison High School Band, only three years old, was happy with a first division rating on its first visit to the Tulip Time band review.

Charlotte's fine Oriole Band, visiting Tulip Time for the 32nd time, again winning its customary first division rating, is slated for a three-week tour of Europe this summer. Six concerts are scheduled, among them Innsbruck, Amsterdam, Florence and Rome as well as participating in the band festival at Coventry, England.










