The West Ottawa Board of Education is seeking an increase in school operating millage for the first time in four years.

At a special meeting Thursday, the board adopted a request for 22 mills for operating funds, a 3.1 mill increase over the current levy of 18.9 which remained constant since 1970.

The millage levy request will appear on the June 10 school election ballot.

In a statement the board said it was determined that "22 mills is the minimum necessary to operate the schools" recognizing the inflationary demands of the times.

School district voters will elect board members on the June 10 ballot in addition to deciding on the millage request.

Terms of board members Bill Lalley and Jack Daniels expire and Lalley is seeking re-election to a four year term. Daniels is not.

Other candidates for the two vacancies include Dr. El Coats, John Getz and Mrs. Rodney Schroeder.

Planning Board
Opposes Disposal
In Marshlands

The Holland Planning Commission has taken a position opposing disposal of Lake Macatawa dredgings in the marshlands of Black River but favoring use of Windmill Island and former landfill sites.

The Commission noted at its meeting Wednesday that long-range plans for Windmill Island include expansion of the facility into portions of the Island now flooded. Additional fill would allow implementation of the plans.

The former landfill is in need of nutritive top soil which would support groundcover and landscaping.

The Corps of Engineers is studying potential sites for disposal of dredgings from the channel in Lake Macatawa.

In other business, the Planning Commission approved applications from John Hoogstra to rezone a lot near the Maplewood Arcade from single family to duplex residential and from Ottawa Savings and Loan Assn. to rezone property on Tenth St. from residential to commercial for future expansion. Hearings were held on both requests.

ZEELAND — Members of the Lions Club are collecting used glasses and jewelry to aid them in projects at home and in foreign mission fields.

Lenses from the old glasses are used to provide new glasses in the mission fields through mission hospitals while the jewelry will be converted into money through the sale of the metal.

Larry Van Haisma, chairman of the Lions project, said as many as 600 pair of glasses were collected three years ago when the glasses were used in an African mission.

The lenses are inspected and their strength determined before being sent to the missions. Money from the sale of the jewelry is used to provide glasses for persons in the Zeeland area unable to afford the cost of glasses.

GRAND HAVEN — Ottawa County Commissioners, still wrestling with solid waste disposal, rejected a recommendation of the Solid Waste Disposal committee and voted to continue a collection site at the West Olive Township landfill indefinitely.

In a special meeting Thursday morning, commissioners voted 6 to 5 not to accept a report from the committee recommending no collection sites until "events within the county are changed or altered drastically in the future."

Instead commissioner William Kieft, Jr., of Grand Haven offered a motion to keep the Olive Township site open for collection of refuse using the so called "green box" to be emptied by a private refuse hauler.

The collection site would be operated until the Solid Waste Committee and commissioners come up with an alternate proposal.

Kieft's motion was adopted on a 6 to 5 vote with Commissioners J. Nyhof Poel, Kieft, Eunice Bareham, Donald Stoltz, James Dressel and William Winstrom voting in favor.

Commissioners voted in April to close the Olive landfill by June 1 but to continue solid waste services for the north-west region of the county.

The Solid Waste Committee, following a meeting earlier this week, recommended against use of the "green boxes" at this time because of the high costs involved.

Users of the Olive township "green box" will be charged the full costs of the service. Commissioners said no county funds would be used to haul the refuse away.

In other action commissioners purchased a building in Grand Haven for \$123,000 to provide additional office space for the Social Services and Mental Health departments and purchased 70 acres of land in Hudsonville and Georgetown township for future expansion of services in the Hudsonville area.

The cost of the Hudsonville land was \$1,500 an acre. Also purchased were 57 acres of land near 96th Ave., and M-45 at \$750 an acre for future county uses.

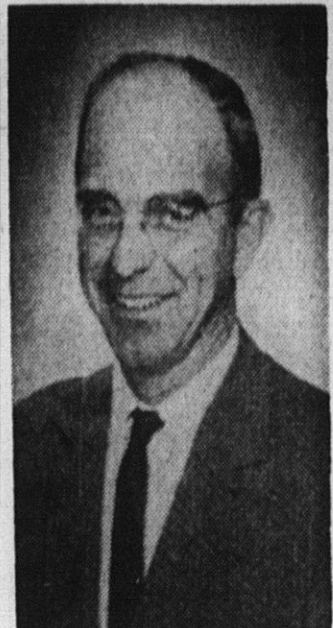

The body was reported found floating at about noon by fishermen on the lake in Leighton Township near the Kent County line.

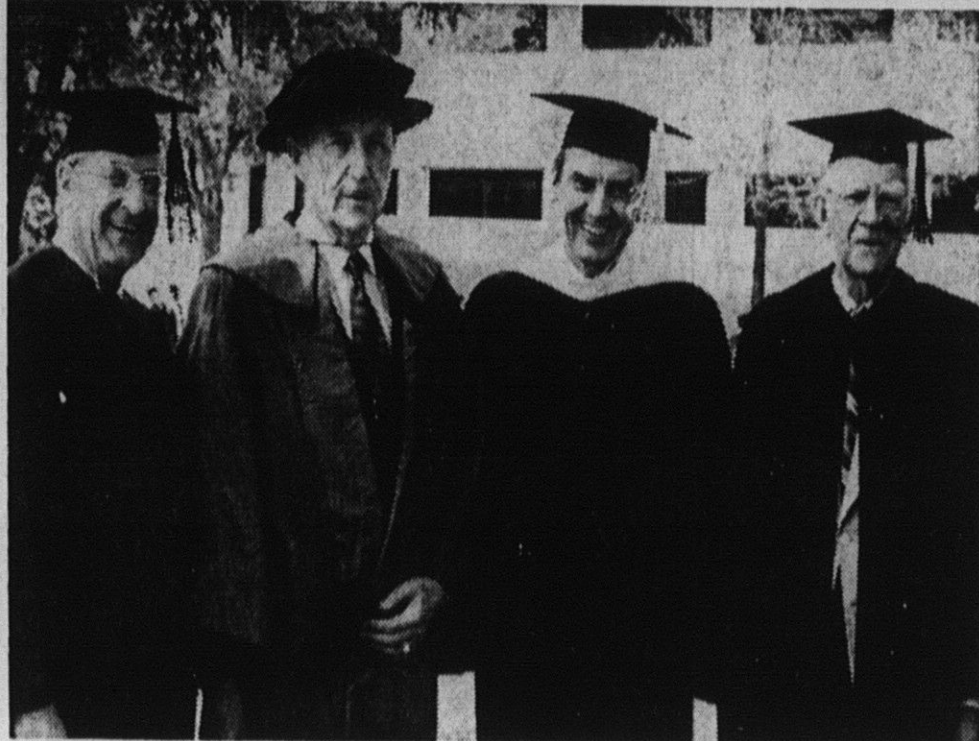

Enthusiastically Applauds Detente With Russia

Honorary Degree Given
NA TO Secretary at Hope

"All Europe favors detente with Russia, and I myself would bless the day NATO could pull out militarily from Europe, but the Russian military buildup continues and so long as mankind is not perfect, we need a balance. For the United States, NATO is important; for Europe, it is vital."

So said His Excellency Joseph M. A. H. Luns, Secretary General of NATO, who visited Holland Friday and received an honorary degree of Doctor of Humane Letters at a Hope College convocation.

Dr. Luns, who was the Netherlands' ranking diplomat for 19 years before being appointed NATO Secretary General in 1971, spoke of the present status and future of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization which celebrated its 25th anniversary in Brussels last month.

That NATO has succeeded admirably during the 25 years is shown in an integrated military command structure quite unique in peacetime. Not an inch of the territory of the 15-member nations has been lost in 25 years, and ideological adversaries have been induced to cut back their propaganda barrage and to negotiate with the West on steps designed to place mutual relations on a new and surer footing, Dr. Luns said.

But he said the most serious problem is one of complacency, that although there has been no open conflict in 25 years, the threat is there for all to see, posing a new strategic situation in which rough nuclear parity exists between the United States and the Soviet Union.

Citing the invasion of Czechoslovakia as a clear and striking demonstration, he said that although the Soviets talk in softer tones these days, they have a tremendous and constantly growing military capability at their command.

Often confronted with questions of huge sums the U.S. spends on NATO, Dr. Luns recalled that European allies provide 90 per cent of the ground forces, equipped in part with weapon systems purchased in the United States. He said cutting back could be dangerously infectious.

He also said that although European investment in the United States is nothing like as high as U.S. investment in Europe, it is rising steadily, and it is increasingly a two-way street.

While pointing with justifiable pride to the past 25 years, Dr. Luns cautioned that no contemporary third for change, innovation and novelty should be allowed to lead NATO into unwise choices that could place the future of the alliance in risk.

Assisting in awarding the degree were Dr. Gordon J. Van Wylen, president of Hope College; Hugh De Pree, chairman of the Board of Trustees, and Dr. Morrette L. Rider, dean for academic affairs. Two anthems were sung by the Holland High School Concert Choir under Harvey Meyer. The Rev. William Hillegonds gave the invocation.

2 Changes

GRAND HAVEN — Only two changes in allocations from last year were made by the Ottawa County Tax Allocation Board in their 1974 deliberations. The board had been studying local school districts' budgets and the Intermediate school district budget.

The two changes involve an increase for Jamestown township from 2.5 to 3 mills and a decrease for Port Sheldon from 1.25 to 1.1 mills.

School districts in the county assigned 10.285 mills are Coopersville, Allendale, Grand Haven, Holland, Hudsonville, Jenison and Zeeland. The county is given 4.575 mills; Intermediate district, 13 mill; Spring Lake school district, 9.285 mills; West Ottawa school district, 8.445 mills.

Township allocations list 3 mills for Blendon, Chester, Jamestown, Polkton, Robinson and Wright. Townships allocated 1 mill were Crockery, Grand Haven, Spring Lake and Tallmadge. Others are Olive and Park, 1.85 mill; Port Sheldon, 1.1 mills, and Zeeland 1.5 mills. Holland township is a charter township.

Dr. Luns Talked to Nixon Thursday

Sidelights on Convocation

For his appearance at the special Hope College Convocation today, His Excellency Joseph Luns, general secretary of NATO, wore a crimson robe which he said was sent to him by the widow of Dean Acheson, former Secretary of State.

"I feel like a Cardinal in it," he said following a press conference before the convocation.

It was Dr. Luns 64th visit to the United States but his first to Holland, Mich. He was delighted to see tulips in bloom and was "astonished" at how much Dutch Holland retained.

"The best of Holland must have immigrated here," he said. "It reminds me of the National Geographic Magazine."

Before coming to Holland, Dr. Luns spent an hour with President Nixon Thursday in Washington.

"I found the President looking very well and completely relaxed, and he was extremely well informed on NATO matters, at no time referring to memos."

Watergate which has kept the United States in a dither for over a year is of little or no concern to NATO, Dr. Luns said. It seems to be quite lost in the complexity of realities facing 15 member nations faced with its own confrontations, little and big.

How NATO has survived 25 years is something of a miracle in itself. The unifying factor is its concern with Soviet militarism which involves a military machine far and above the defense of the USSR.

All NATO nations favor detente, and sometimes euphoria seems to set in. But so long as mankind is not perfect, the necessity of some balance remains. For the United States, NATO is important; for Europe, it is vital, Dr. Luns said.

Hope College is only the second U. S. college or university from which Dr. Luns has accepted an honorary degree. The other was Harvard.

The local citation for the degree of Doctor of Humane Letters reads:

... for distinguished service to your country for more than 30 years as a diplomat and Minister of Foreign Affairs of the Netherlands government,

... for the wisdom, vision and skill with which you are guiding the affairs of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization as you serve as Secretary-General of this strategic and vital alliance,

... for your many contributions to scholarship, international relations, and world peace, ... for your compassion, your concern for human values, and your interest in each per-

son whose life you have touched.

Dr. Luns had breakfast and participated in an informal question - and - answer session with 20 Hope students who are majoring in political science, economics, and business administration before the convocation this morning.

Dr. Luns admitted that the changing climate in Europe, politically and economically, has its effect on NATO but even though several governments are weakened (some are stronger) all are committed to NATO. In general NATO has assured 25 years of peace among the allies, and this together with the extension of the welfare state in many countries has proved to be an effective force in Europe.

As for inflation, he said the United States is experiencing a lower rate of inflation than most European countries.

While NATO faces confrontations at the rate of one a week (sometimes oftener) the military arm of SHAPE has complete military integration, except for France, and even France shares in navy maneuvers, Dr. Luns said.

It was eight years ago that General de Gaulle ousted NATO headquarters from Paris. Its home now is in Brussels, Belgium.

Herman Bos: Memorial Day Tradition Continues

What began 40 years ago as a required part of his employment, has continued through today on a volunteer basis.

Herman Bos, owner of Old News Printery, plunged into planning the Memorial Day activities while in the employ of Ben Mulder, then editor of The City News.

At the time, Mulder was secretary of the Memorial Day Committee, a position Bos has held for the last 25 years, and required his young high school reporter to handle the details and legwork of the Memorial Day activities.

Bos speaks with pride at never having missed a Memorial Day committee meeting or any of the Day's activities in 40 years.

He assesses the activities as "falling together on time," a modest statement considering he works an average of four weeks to put the pieces together.

After his stint with Mulder, Bos assisted William H. Vande Water who served as secretary of the committee for several years.

The secretary usually handles just about everything but getting the speaker for the program at the cemetery. That is the mayor's assignment.

One of the most important details is requesting the C and O line to hold trains during the parade. A train went through one year and the marchers scattered. "It could have been serious," Bos recalls.

During the Vietnam War years, the Holland City Police began requiring a parade permit, primarily to be able to control demonstrators who could then be forcibly removed from the parade.

In general, Bos highly commends Holland for their attendance during the parades and the cooperation of the general public, schools and various organizations with which he must work to coordinate the day's activities.

His responsibilities include notifying all patriotic groups of the meeting to determine the program, composing the program, sending programs to the schools, notifying the media of activities and arranging for the

use of the Civic Center in case of rain.

"We have never had to go to the Civic Center for the ceremonies and the parade has never been rained out," Bos recalls.

Bos sees that programs are placed on the parade route, marshaling area and at the cemetery.

Perhaps his most important responsibility is in maintaining and updating the local list of war dead which climbed to 1,114 during the last year.

Despite the fact that he has no assistant such as the young man Mulder had 40 years ago, Bos plans to continue as secretary for as long as he is able.

Members of the Holland-Zeeland Life Underwriters Association attended the Michigan Life Underwriters convention on the campus at Calvin College, Grand Rapids this week.

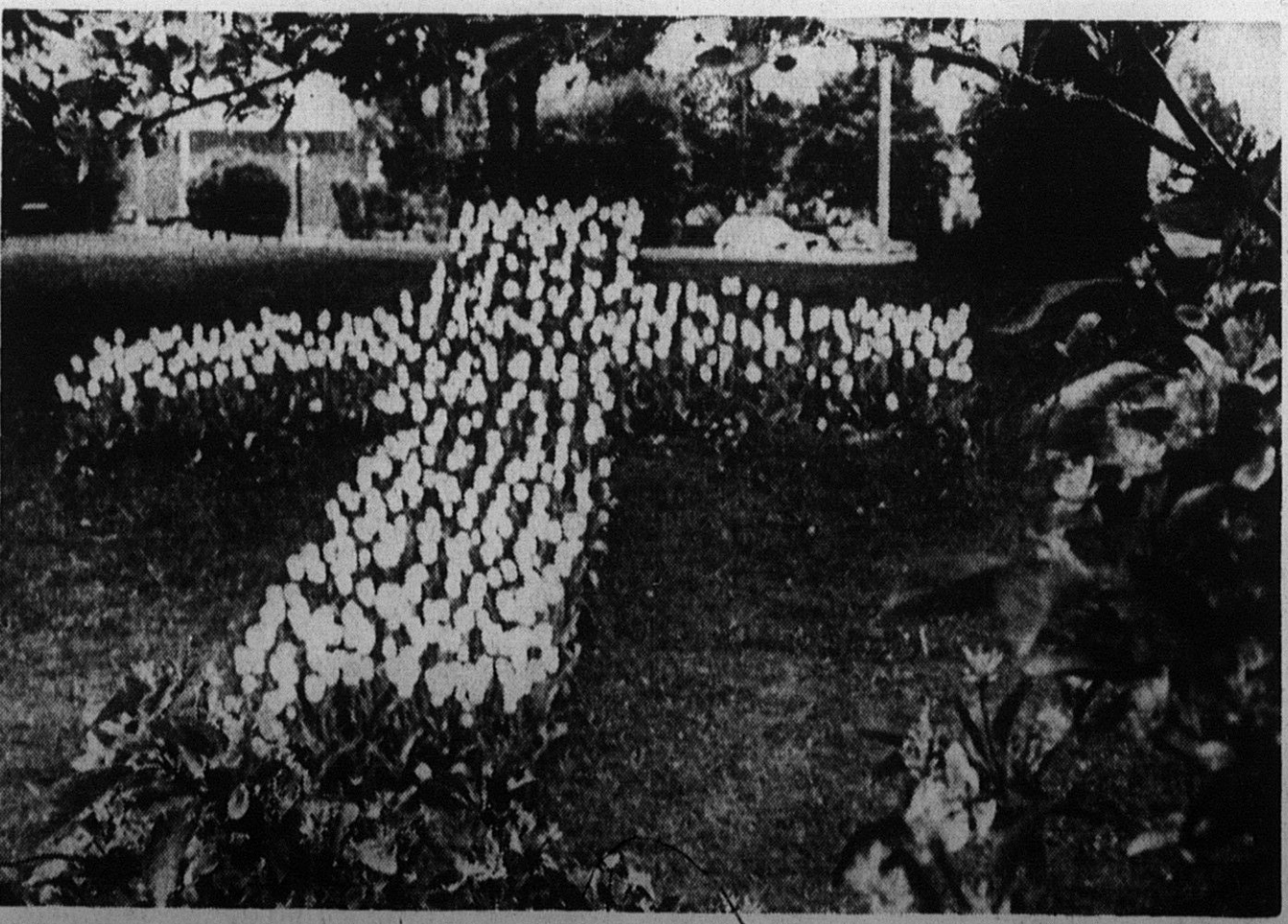

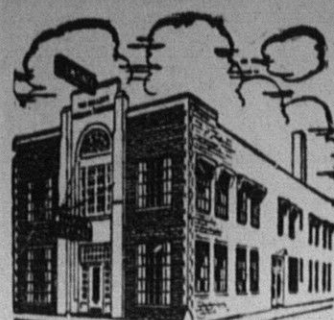

You can't beat the old law of supply and demand. A short time ago we lined up for gasoline, cut short our travel, and saw the price of gasoline almost double. There were, and still are, dire predictions about the oil reserves down to the point that we would be out of oil in a short time.

But the consumer, and we are one of them, had his own ideas, and he put them into practice. All over the world, people have been practicing their own oil conservation. Of course this doesn't mean that people quit driving. Instead, they cut down here and there, and in industry new ways were found to save on fuel. What has been the result? Oil is becoming a glut on the market. Europe has cut back, it isn't willing to pay the high prices asked by the oil producers, and Europe pays even more than we do.

While all this is going on, governments are busy looking for new sources of oil, and in time these too will be coming on the market. In addition other sources for energy are being explored.

It will be an interesting exercise in economics to watch the developments. What will happen when the competition gets tough? Will the price remain artificially high, or will the consumer be able to demand a cut? We have the notion the law of supply and demand, one of those laws we can't repeal, will take over.

Sunday School Lesson

Sunday, June 2
The Thessalonian Witness
I Thessalonians 1
By C. P. Dame

On the day of Pentecost we begin a new series of lessons from Paul's letters to the churches at Thessalonica, Ephesus, Philippi, Colosse — 13 in all. These lessons will tell us facts about the man Paul and about the churches in which he was deeply interested. Our study ought to help us to strengthen the churches of today. After reading about the church in the pagan city of Thessalonica we can't help but feel that American cities need churches like the Thessalonian church of the first century.

I. Some churches inspire gratitude. The church in Thessalonica did this as the words, "We give thanks in God for you all" reveal. Acts 17:1-10 record the founding of the church. The two letters Paul wrote to the church were written in Corinth during Paul's second missionary journey about 50 A. D. The letters are personal. Most scholars believe that they are the earliest books of the New Testament. Although Paul wrote the epistles he includes his two fellow workers, Silas and Timothy in the letters. The letters say much about the second coming of Jesus Christ. One preacher names this church, the "expectant church." It was looking for the return of Jesus.

Paul was thankful for the trinity of the graces in this church — for their work of faith and labor of love and patience of hope. It was evident by their conduct that God had begun the work of redemption in their hearts. God takes the initiative in salvation. God loves us and then we love Him.

II. Joy and affliction can go together — they did in Thessalonica and now also. Paul had brought the gospel to the Thessalonians not in word only, "but also in power and in the Holy Spirit and with full conviction" — the church had strong leadership and the members had imitated even though they were afflicted and kept rejoicing in the Holy Spirit. Consecrated Christians can have joy and affliction which comes from those who oppose the Christian faith. This church had a fine spirit.

III. A church has a reputation. Some churches are cold, others warm-hearted; some have a passion for souls, some are apathetic. The Thessalonian church set a pace to other churches—it sounded forth the word of the Lord far and wide and their faith in God was spoke of everywhere. The Thessalonians had been changed, they had turned from idols to serve the living and true God and at that time they were waiting for the return of the Lord but they did not sit with folded hands but kept on spreading the gospel. Churches like individuals have reputations—what is the reputation of your church?

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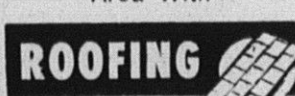

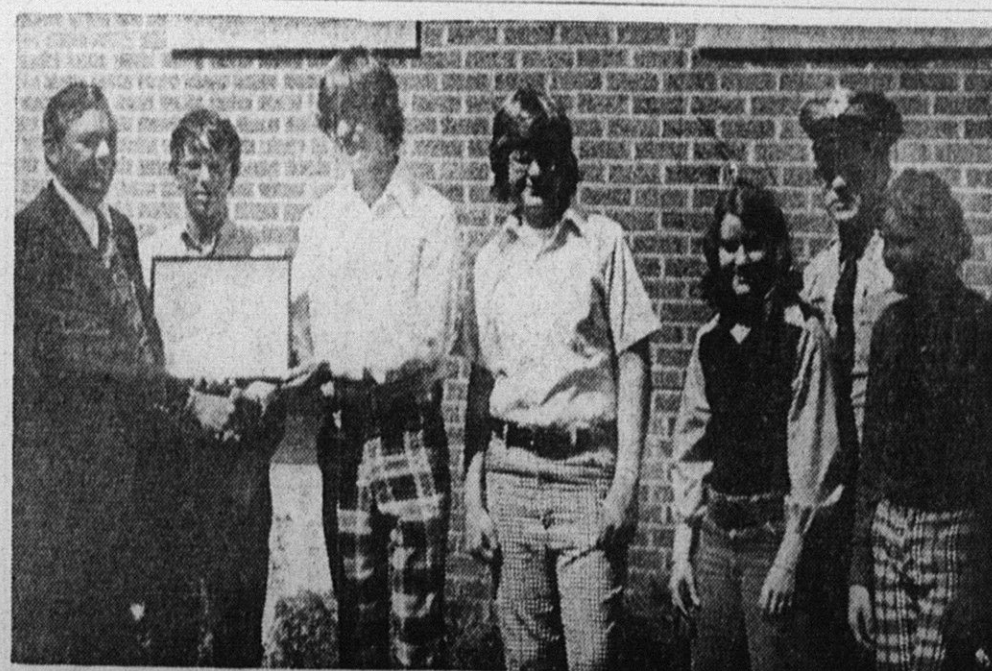

AAUW Closes Season In Two Cultures Talk

"Women View Two Cultures" was the program topic for the evening as members of the American Association of University Women gathered for their final meeting of the season last Thursday.

A film entitled "Mexican-American Heritage and Destiny" was shown in which the history, music, art, dance, professional and scientific accomplishments of Latino people were described. It was emphasized that the majority of Spanish speaking people in our country are native Americans, having been in our country several generations.

The term "chicano" was described as being used generally by younger Latinos and identified them as part of a forward movement among members of the Latino community to attain their full rights as American citizens while maintaining their own identity and culture.

A panel consisting of Helen Westra of the Human Relations Commission, Ellen Ramos discussing the Latino in the school, and Al Gonzales discussing the Latino in the community addressed itself to local concerns. The educational system was stressed as being a very important factor in the further growth and development of the members of the Latino community.

The Bilingual Center of the Holland Public Schools is assisting by providing classroom aides, home-school communication, cultural understanding, and aiding in community relations. The Bilingual Center office is located in Lincoln school.

The Human Relations Commission has printed a booklet describing tenant-landlord rights and responsibilities, written in Spanish and English, and is available to assist with problems and questions. The Commission is also working with employers in the community to increase the number of qualified Latinos working in their companies.

Prior to the evening's program Tony Dekker and Steve Stegman, Hope College students, described a new prospective program for emergency care in Holland. The program is similar to the one now operating successfully in Grand Rapids. A meeting is planned for early June and further information may be obtained from Mayor Hallacy's office.
