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## Vander Ven Addresses City Council

Charles Vander Ven, 307 College Ave., made an impassioned plea to City Council Wednesday night on behalf of Bruno Lundgren, 576 Crescent Dr., on a "matter of principle" regarding interest charged him for a sewer hookup.

The sewer line in Crescent had been laid in 1953, five years before the west side of Crescent was annexed to the city. Under an alternate procedure adopted in 1963, such residents were expected to pay sewer costs as assessed (\$140 in Lundgren's case) but if not paid immediately would be charged an additional 5 per cent a year for 10 years.

Although the alternate procedure was given plenty of publicity, Vander Ven contends Lundgren never was notified officially by the city and therefore should not be charged the interest.

The incident arose over orders given recently to all persons living in the city to connect to city sewer within three years of construction.

Vander Ven admitted that the charge admittedly is a bargain in view of today's high costs which now set the service at \$1,200 per benefit.

But he felt that the statute of limitations would be in Lundgren's favor. Deputy Attorney Jack Marquis said such limitations are recognized in cases like this.

Mayor Lou Hallacy expressed sympathy and concern over persons faced with the extra expense of connecting to city sewers, but he said many people have faced the same problem and have complied with the orders. He considered the costs "a good buy" on today's market.

No further action was taken.

## Zeeland Hears From Citizens

ZEELAND — City Council moved to a Civil Defense emergency operating center Tuesday night for its meeting because of the tornado warning and heard from a group of citizens who questioned city projects.

Chester Nykerk submitted a list of questions concerning relocation of the police department to the municipal center building and the questions were referred to the public relations committee.

Glenn Bouwens objected to the council's intention to include the industrial park area in the D-1 industrial district under a new zoning ordinance, making the designation more restrictive.

Ivan Jekel questioned the flood act and whether Zeeland was a flood plain area and Bernard Kuipers asked why he was unable to obtain an electrical license in the city.

Council accepted the low bid of West Shore Construction Co. of \$15,938 for the installation of bituminous surfacing on Riley St. and approved the sale of the old street sweeper to Equipment Locators Co. for \$450.

## Heat Wave Hits Holland

After waiting patiently (or impatiently) for spring to arrive and for the tulips to bloom for the 1975 festival, Holland residents were thrown into a summer weather situation over the weekend that brought a maximum of 91 degrees Monday.

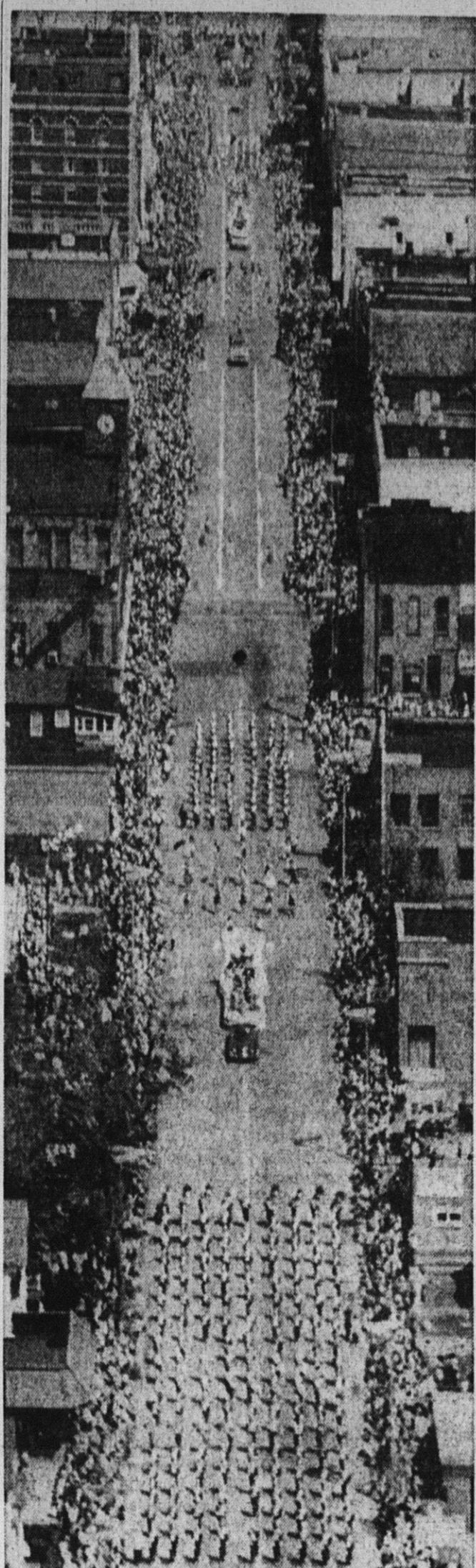
Another hot day hit Tuesday with an 80-degree reading at 11 a.m. compared with a 79-degree reading at the same time Monday.

Sunday's maximum was 82 and on Saturday the mercury rose to 76, providing the finest weather for the band parade in many years.

The 91-degree reading around Tulip Time is not a record. In 1962 the four-day festival had 90 or better readings three days of the four. The fourth day had a maximum of 89. That was the year, some 70 band marchers were treated in Holland Hospital for heat exhaustion.

## Tulip Time Big Success; Attracts Record Crowds

Another successful Tulip Time festival came to an end Saturday evening with everything dealing in superlatives.

Holland's 46th annual festival had the largest crowds, the most ideal weather and the finest cooperation on all fronts. Tulips which had been slow in blooming burst into bloom as the festival advanced, particularly on a sunny Saturday when the mercury rose to 72, and even more so on a warmer Sunday with a maximum of 82.

Crowds were greater than ever for Band Day and visitors parked as far away as 21st St., 13 blocks from the parade route.

Nelson Bosman, Tulip Time board president, and Dwight Ferris, festival manager, joined today in expressing sincere appreciation to all the people who

helped make the festival a great success. This thanks ranged all the way from the park department responsible for fine plantings, the street department which made a magnificent cleanup early Sunday morning, and all the festival participants from parade marchers, to klompen dancers, police and all the others participating on many fronts.

Everybody agreed that all attendance records were broken but differed on numbers. The consensus was that if Tulip Time annually attracts a half million visitors, there were more in 1975.

The festival climax was the Saturday afternoon parade of bands with its 62 bands, 41 floats and many other attractions,

To the thousands of people watching Saturday's big parade of bands, everything looked normal as the trim Zeeland High School Band marched down the parade route. But the band almost didn't make it.

After their field performance at Riverview Park, the band posed for a picture taken by a Columbus, Ohio, photo firm which, contrary to Tulip Time officials' suggestion, had assembled its own four-riser bleacher at the southeast corner of the field. The bleacher collapsed in the middle and band members, instruments and everything else fell into one big pile. The pileup was not witnessed by the record crowd because other bands were massed in front for inspection.

Fortunately, no one was seriously hurt. There was lots of activity in the first aid tent. One member was taken to Holland Hospital with a suspected concussion but he was released before the end of the parade.

There was some instrument damage (to be assessed today) and Director Dan Ritsema sent to Zeeland for some other instruments (we don't know how anybody got through the traffic) and the band marched on, third spot in the second division. All band members were back in school today.

Contrary to all expectations, the tulip plantings on the downtown mall survived Saturday's record crowds in fine shape. So did the fancy new trash baskets. And the double row of plank seats proved to be an inspired innovation. All in all, the beautification project enhanced Tulip Time, particularly, the dancing every night at 8 p.m. by alumni groups.

Windmill Island Manager Jaap de Blecourt, besides taking care of record crowds at Holland's main Tulip Time attraction, also tries to look after nesting ducks in the midst of all the island traffic.

One mama mallard duck made her nest underneath one of the big millstones just outside the windmill. Since the millstone rests on railroad ties the nest had an entrance, an exit and a skylight. To protect the nesting duck, Jaap put a board on one side and a cover on top, and the exit faced the canal.

Would you believe, none of the thousands of visitors removed the top board, and the four-day festival went by without anybody but the island employees aware of the duck.

And Jaap says that mallard duck has a surprise when her brood is hatched. One time when she was away from her nest he eased in two white duck eggs with a stick. Mama duck did not reject them.

Another duck chose a more precarious nesting place, near the double gates north of the Sixth St. entrance. Traffic nearly drove her wild, but she was still around there this morning.

Yet another duck set up her nursery near a tree in the middle of the island grove. Jaap put a fence around her nest. Her ducklings have hatched.

Saturday was the biggest day in the history of Windmill Island with 17,002 visas sold at the gate and another 2,000 admitted on advance sales. Island tulips, usually a bit in advance because of more sunshine than in the city, were at their peak of beauty. Ninety buses at one time or another were parked on the island lot. Others were in

the Baker Museum lot and used the shuttle buses. A big Memorial Day weekend is anticipated.

Robert Stroh was a busy man as parade chairman for Saturday's band parade. All kinds of minor crises came up as expected. He wore a "beeper" and there were a few interruptions while attending a luncheon for Al Kaline.

The first problem was easy. An antique car had heated up. That was easy. He just eliminated it from the parade.

The "beeper" was not free from bugs. One message, meant for a local doctor, told Roger to report to the emergency room immediately.

Roger told the laughing crowd, "My next appearance will be in surgery!"

## Seminary Alumni Hold Annual Meet

The Alumni Association of Western Seminary held its annual meeting on Monday, a banquet in the seminary commons. About 180 persons met to renew their fellowship as graduates of Western Seminary. The Rev. John Nieuwsma, pastor of the First Reformed Church of Hamilton, president of the association, presided at the meeting. Seven ministers who have completed a half-century of service were inducted into the Fifty-Year Circle of Western Seminary graduates five of whom were present. Each was given Fifty-Year Circle gold lapel pin.

About 20 persons representing the graduating class of 1930 were present to celebrate the 45th anniversary of their commencement from Western Seminary. Convened by the Rev. William Buitendorp of Gaitersburg, Md., the greetings were given by Dr. Louis H. Benes, former editor of The Church Herald, the denominational publication of the Reformed Church in America.

Members of the graduating class of 1975 with their wives were recognized at the dinner. President Nieuwsma also read brief greetings from a number of alumni who were not able to attend the annual meeting. At a business meeting held in Mulder Chapel following the annual banquet, the necrology was read by the Rev. Nelson Van Raalte, necrology secretary.

The Rev. Roger Vander Kolk, pastor of the Haven Reformed Church in Hamilton, read the minutes of the previous meeting and gave a treasurer's report, with a description of the project by the Alumni Association on behalf of Western Seminary for the 1975-76 year. The project involves a new alumni lecture fund to enable the seminary to host distinguished lecturers who might not otherwise be made available.

In an election of new officers the Rev. Arnold Punt, pastor of Faith Reformed Church of Zeeland, was elected secretary-treasurer for a two-year term. Other officers named were the Rev. Cornelius A. In superlative weather with a maximum of 82 degree, the Holland officials spent a half hour in a radio interview; visited a school gym which had been turned into an art center and community theatre; toured the Harbor Tower Apartments for senior citizens, an 18-story high-rise for 176 apartments (waiting list of 300); visited the wastewater treatment plant; the new Mead Paper Co., a \$150,000,000 expansion in the county. The local delegation made the flight to Escanaba in an hour and 10 minutes, a distinct difference from the Escanaba group's trip to Holland last Friday which took 9 1/2 hours.

Mayor Hallacy was the speaker at a joint service club luncheon at noon, and the Holland group was honored in the evening at the House of Lundington.

The women were guests of the Escanaba Women's Club at breakfast and lunch.

Mayor Hallacy cut the ribbon at the dedication of the new public safety facility housing police and fire departments. The men also attended a special council meeting to adopt an unemployment compensation ordinance.

## Fire Burns 60 Acres of Brush In Allegan Forest

ALLEGAN — Fire burned more than 60 acres of trees, grass and brush in the Allegan State Game area north of Pullman Monday evening and one fireman was overcome by smoke.

The cause of the fire was not determined but Allegan deputies said there was no reason to suspect arson.

Fire departments from Lee, Casco and Fennville joined department of Natural Resources units from Allegan and Yankee Springs.

The fire call was received at 4:30 p.m. Monday and burned over the 60 acres in the Casco-Clyde township area north of Pullman. No buildings were damaged although residences were in the area.

A DNR fireman from Allegan, Lynn Morrie, was overcome by smoke and was treated in the South Haven hospital and released.

## Members Reappointed To Boards

With Council concurrence, Mayor Lou Hallacy reappointed Margaret De Pree to the Library Board and Simon Sybema to the Hospital Board, both for five-year terms, at a regular meeting of City Council Wednesday night.

A Council appointment reappointed Mike Gorno to the Tulip Time board of directors for a three-year term.

In other business, Council approved a highway maintenance contract with the State Highway Department for 1975-76, and adopted a new resolution correcting property descriptions in connection with condemnations matters for the 40th St. outlet project. The new resolution rescinds previous action which listed incorrect descriptions.

An allocation of \$500 was approved for maintaining boating controls on Lake Macatawa in cooperation with Holland and Park townships. It was pointed out that additional costs have been incurred with the addition of three no-wake signs in the area of Central Park, Kollen Park and the River Ave. bridge.

A further amendment was approved for certain provisions in the bond resolution for Heinz Co. on \$2,735,000 industrial development revenue bonds. The amendment concerns the Manufacturers National Bank of Detroit which has agreed that the obsolescence option of purchase should be included in the documents.

By a 5-4 vote, Council granted another 30 days in the Dial-A-Ride program providing a special shuttle to the Comprehensive Employment and Training Act (CETA) offices at US-31 and James St. Since action was approved April 16, the service has not been used but CETA requested another 30 days before final decision is made.

Council was informed that E. H. Phillips who requested a change in the sign ordinance to permit a new free standing sign at 177 College Ave. has altered his plan to conform with the existing ordinance. The message was accepted as information.

In reply to a letter from Holland Fish and Game Club regarding a chain link fence in the vicinity of Van Raalte Ave. north of Kollen Park Dr., a city manager report revealed that the fence had been erected by an adjacent property owner to the east following a survey of property and upon receipt of an attorney's opinion on ownership of filled land.

It was indicated that when land is filled in between the original and existing shoreline of a body of water, property lines are extended perpendicular to the thread of the stream or the centerline of the body of water adjacent thereto. Since property west of Van Raalte Ave. has been reclaimed, the city attorney advised that the west line of the street should parallel the east line. The city manager will contact the property owner on the adjustment. The report was accepted as information.

An application of George Kotman for a rubbish collector's license was approved.

Received for first reading was a proposed street cut ordinance as suggested by the Engineering and Street Cut Policies committee and staff.

A letter from Mr. and Mrs. Irvin Bos commended Council on its stand against abortion on demand.

Petitions for closing portions of alleys between 14th and 15th Sts. running east of Lincoln Ave., and between 21st and 22nd Sts., running 160 feet East of Washington Ave., were tabled until the next meeting, mainly because requests called for closings and Council procedure deals with vacating.

The resignation of James Stills as a member of the Police Community Relations Unit was accepted with regret. Stills is moving to Chicago.

A request of Len Fazio and John Smith, two Hope College students, to paint house numbers on city curbs for a fee of \$1 each was referred to the city manager for study.

Council confirmed a certification from Councilman Vande Poel for purchases by the recreation department from Superior Sport Store for \$250.

Claims against the city from Guy Veenstra, Jacob Bierema, Robert De Boer, Fred Teitma and Ruth Mersman were referred to the insurance carrier and city attorney.

Wednesday night's meeting lasted less than one hour. Mayor Hallacy presided and all Councilmen were present. The invocation was given by City Clerk D. W. Schipper.

## Tulip Time Sidelights

After 46 years, planning for Tulip Time festivals has developed into a fine science and hundreds of "bugs" have been resolved through the years.

But when the long awaited day dawns, little situations develop that do not fit into past categories.

Even so, the people looking after Lt. Gov. Damman and his wife knew how to solve one problem. They were all set to run to the dime store less than two blocks away for extra socks for those wooden shoes.

Sentinel Photographer Mark Copier was beat. He had to get some Tulip Time pictures on the 4 p.m. bus to UPI in Chicago Wednesday, and there was no way to get through the heavy traffic with a car.

He started on foot. Near the hotel he said to a youngster with a bicycle, "I'll give you a buck if I can use your bicycle to get to the bus station." The youth agreed, and Mark returned the bike about five minutes later.

The Holland Chamber of Commerce moved into its enlarged quarters in the Warm Friend Motor Inn earlier this week, and the first thing visitors note are the distinctive windmill chandeliers, long a trademark of the Dutch Grille.

The Chamber entrance is now on Eighth St. instead of the hotel lobby. Tulip Time visitors use it as an information center. Boss Man Ross Giles says there will be an open house for the public later. Coffee too!

Holland is jam full of buses these days, most of them tour groups. To Bud Borr of the police department goes the pleasant job of finding parking space for them. A job like that can be rewarded only in heaven, some believe.

The largest tour group this year arrived today — a fleet of 16 buses carrying some 700 persons from St. Louis, Mo. Presley Tours have been coming to Holland for Tulip Time for many years, each year a larger number. Already, the agency is scheduling 18 buses next year.

A few weeks ago, Presley brought a busload of their own people to serve as guides in Holland.

Advance planning is the key to avoiding problems.

The women in charge of housing and meals for the festival processed more applications than ever before. More than 13,000 meals were arranged for, mostly through local churches, and housing was found for all comers except some who did not care for guest homes.

Mattie Buursma and Harriet Kruitthoff, handling housing and meals, closed shop at 10:30 p.m. Saturday. But they couldn't refuse one latecomer, a chap who arrived late for the festival after spending a year in the Netherlands. He had arrived by bus and had no transportation.

Luckily, they found him a place in the home of Mrs. Bert Kruiswyk (who can speak Dutch) on East Eighth St. two doors away from the bus depot.

Crowds at the band review (and everywhere else) were at an alltime record this year. Gene Heeter and Everett Kissinger, former review chairmen when they were band directors at Holland High were thrilled with the review, the ideal weather and the crowds.

## Contracts For Twelve Are Signed

Salaries for 12 administrators were read into the minutes of the West Ottawa Board of Education meeting Monday night before contracts for the 1975 - '76 school year were signed.

A sparse audience greeted the board which spent the session dealing primarily with school policies and regulations, the foremost of which was a reconsideration of school regulations which go into effect when a tornado watch is issued.

The review of tornado regulations was prompted by an April alert in which the decision was made to keep students in school and a reevaluation of policies by surrounding school districts.

Board members discussed numerous issues related to the problem and were informed that usually a minimum of two hours was necessary to transport all students of the district back to their homes.

The board was also informed that Glenn Timmer, Ottawa County Civil Defense director, had inspected all schools in the district and had identified the safest areas within the structures.

Board President Ed Haltenhoff noted that parents may pick up their children at any time during a tornado watch.

In other action the board informed the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints that the board was not prepared to lease the Robart School property at the present time.

Business manager Gordon Scheerhorn was instructed to examine the feasibility of selling or leasing little used school property as part of a plan for constructing central storage.

Asst. Superintendent Peter Roon reported on the progress of the June 9 school election and indicated that absentee ballots would be available soon. Board President noted that he had received a minimum of comment of the board's action of reducing the millage one mill.

Mrs. Myrtle Forsten, speaking for a group of concerned citizens, said that her group wished a "set of guidelines (such as those presented to the schools of Charleston, West Virginia) for purchasing textbooks; a formal policy for handling censorship on any materials used in the school district (including classroom curricula as well as library materials, visuals such as filmstrips, etc., as well as books."

Mrs. Forsten added that the group seeks to determine "whether any of the objectionable materials used elsewhere in the nation are being used in our own school district, and if so, to work toward their removal."

During the meeting the board accepted as first reading a policy on supplemental instructional materials which will be systematically selected by the administration and staff and which will assure that an alternate program be provided should any parent find the material objectionable. Haltenhoff reiterated that the policy must be approved at a second reading before it becomes formal policy. He also stated that the alternate materials will be provided on all levels.

## Tulip Time Echoes

The Corvino family of New Jersey has good reason to remember Holland, Mich. and Tulip Time 1975.

Here to pick up a daughter at Hope College, Mrs. Corvino was admitted to Holland Hospital and gave birth to a daughter on the opening day of Tulip Time Wednesday May 14. That was the day the Sentinel ran a headline "Welcome Vleemdelingen, Welcome Stranger" which Mrs. Corvino thought most appropriate.

"What certainly could have been a terrible situation has turned out to be a pleasant, memorable and beautiful experience only through the kindness and consideration extended by the good people of Holland and the wonderful care I received at Holland Hospital. . . . Your people can be proud to have physicians like Drs. Weeldreyer and Boersma practicing here. We have learned a lesson in goodness and hope to spread it to others. Holland is definitely a nice place to visit—it must be great living here!"

The baby has been named Colleen Hope (after Hope College) and she progressed so well she is flying home today.

"Her family will see that she always remembers her first home," Mrs. Corvino said. "We know many prayers were said for us—the displaced persons from New Jersey—we will always remember you in ours."

Those three Holland High boys who joined the klompen dancers this year had a whale of a time in their new role, but it wasn't the first time boys have donned Dutch costumes for such a dance.

Dale Fris, local merchant, remembers when he and 15 others attending a Boy Scout Jamboree in 1937 in Washington, D. C., packed costumes and did that celebrated dance. Seymour Padnos and Jim Brooks were in the group too.

Dale doesn't remember much attention over the incident, but a similar group at Valley Forge, Pa., some 10 years later, were discovered by early television and became the most sought-after celebrities of the large encampment. Leaders finally halted the tv demonstrations to allow the boys to have a few camping experiences.

Some Hope College chaps probably were the first men to imitate the dance in Holland, Mich. Back in the early 1930s when klompen dancing was done in the post office block by about 24 dancers to the tune of "Where Has My Little Dog Gone," four students in a fraternity house at 10th and Central did some sweeping steps on the flat roof of the porch. They got a big hand.

That home, later Red Cross headquarters, was torn down for a parking lot for Ottawa Savings and Loan.

One sign of the growth of Tulip Time each year is reflected

in the reservations for meals for bus groups. The housing office in Civic Center arranged for more than 13,000 meals, most of them served in local churches.

With ideal weather, the band review at Riverview Park Sunday had larger crowds than ever, and visiting bands presented a bang up spectacle. Band Review Chairman Henry VanderLinde said outstanding performances were given by the Columbia Central Band of Brooklyn, here for its 30th review; the Charlotte Oriole Band (a longtime favorite here) in its 35th appearance, and the Owasco High School Band in its 26th performance.

All performing bands received plaques with their ratings, determined by the review judges, Eugene Heeter, Everett Kissinger and David McCoy. Heeter and Kissinger are old hands at band reviews, Heeter originating them for several years. McCoy of Olivet College is a newcomer by comparison.

We learn from Dutch friends that a Dutch company, Petit & Fritsen, is casting a new Liberty Bell for the United States, an exact replica of the original bell but twice as big and without the crack. The Freedom Bell will be part of the American Freedom Train in its bicentennial travels across the country. The Freedom Train will be in Grand Rapids July 10.

The bell was commissioned by the American Legion which is donating the bell to the Freedom Train on behalf of America's children. It is twice the diameter of the original but eight times as heavy. It took 20 tons of molten metal (80 per cent pure copper and 20 per cent black tin) to make the 7½-foot-tall bell. It is tuned exactly one octave lower.

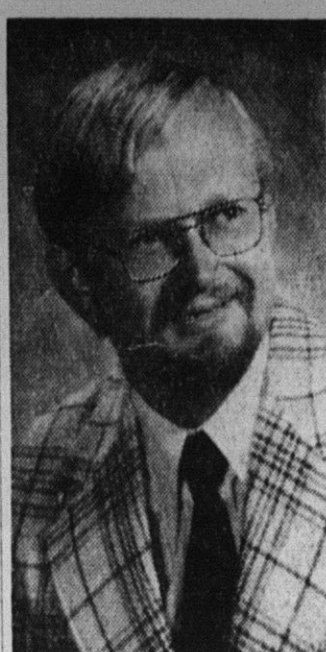

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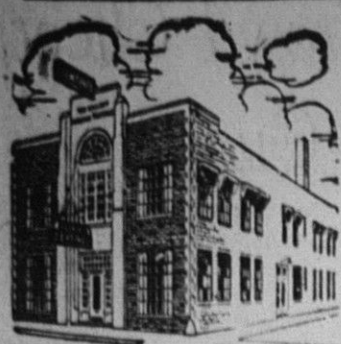


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## CORPS. WATER CONTROL PLAN

The Army Corps of Engineers' initiative to expand its jurisdiction over coastland and inland waters should be considered with great care before any action is taken. There is a serious question whether such sweeping powers as those requested by the Corps should be granted to any single agency.

This is especially true of the strongest of four alternative proposals submitted for public comment. Under this proposal, the Corps of Engineers would gain authority over every natural or artificial body of water anywhere in the nation. Although this has the Environmental Protection Agency's support, that does not entirely ease misgivings as to such a wide-ranging expansion of authority.

In its presentation of this plan the Corps makes specific reference to farmers on land "in the thousands of square miles protected by levees." As part of the regulation of dredge and fill operations, it says, farmers might be required to obtain a federal permit "before beginning plowing and leveling operations." This makes sense as a means of controlling activities which may have a significant impact on the general public interest. At the same time, it would be important to have a clear system of restraints on arbitrary action by the Corps. There is a question whether the proposed power of revocation by the EPA would suffice for this purpose.

Less sweeping alternatives also have been put forward for comment. They, too, should be weighed with care. More effective environmentally oriented controls over coastal and inland waters are needed, but Congress should proceed cautiously in expanding the Corps of Engineers' jurisdiction.

## Sunday School Lesson

Sunday, May 25  
Dangers of False Security  
Jeremiah 7:4-12; Micah 6:6-8  
By C. P. Dame

The search for security for this life is common but the concern for security for eternal life is too rare. This lesson tells about the dangers of false security. If there is a false security there must also be a true security. The person who puts his trust in God has security for time and eternity.

I. God hates inconsistency. The text is from two prophets, from Jeremiah and Micah. Jeremiah was a priest, and God called him to be a prophet with a message to Judah which was slipping fast to ruin. One day God called him to stand on the steps of the temple and preach to the worshippers going there. God told him to call upon the worshippers to amend their ways if they expected to stay in their land or else go into exile as the northern people had gone.

God knew what the worshippers were doing daily. The prophet, speaking for God and by His authority, told the people they were trusting in a lie. The idea that God would preserve His temple regardless of the people's doings got hold of people from the miraculous deliverance of Jerusalem in the days of Hezekiah and Isaiah. After that the people said, "The Temple of the Lord" and performed their ceremonies on the day of worship, but during the week they committed theft, swore falsely, committed adultery, burned incense to idols and worshipped them. Marked was the difference between profession and practice. Hypocrisy was rampant.

II. History speaks of judgment. This now generation easily forgets the past. Through Jeremiah God reminded His people about what happened to Shiloh where there once was a place for worship when Eli was a priest. The judgment of God fell upon it and it no longer functioned. What happened to Shiloh, may happen to Jerusalem if the people continue to disobey God.

III. God makes demands. Micah portrays a person asking the question: "Where with shall I come before the Lord?" The answer comes—not with burnt offerings but with obedience. Note the three demands of God—do, that is, practice, justice in life's relationships, love mercy, the word kindness is in one version, and then walk humbly with God. Learn from Him how to practice justice and kindness daily. The words of a hymn fit here: "On Christ the solid Rock I stand, all other ground is sinking sand," such as relying upon family tradition, or standing, church membership, the golden rule or trust in self.

Other team leaders were Muskegon Heights, 29; Coopersville 23½; West Ottawa 22; Big Rapids 21; Muskegon Catholic 19.

Christian once again was led by star performer Jon Houseward who won the 880 yard run, his specialty in the time of 1:57.9 and the 440 yard run in 51 seconds flat. He also ran a leg on the third place mile relay team along with Phil Vannette, Dave De Vries and Tim Kiekover.

Vannette, Christian's brilliant junior distance runner, shattered the Muskegon Orchard View regional record and his own school mark by running the mile in 4:23.6 to capture that event.

Ken Dozeman was also a big winner for the Maroons as he won the 220 yard dash in 23.3, took third in the 100 yard dash and placed fourth in the long jump. Christian also picked up points in the pole vault as Ken De Jong and Jim Busscher tied for fourth with leaps of 12'2".

West Ottawa will be sending seven to the state meet. They include Matt Johnson, Brian Shaw, Scott Tubergan and Jim Carson, who were second in the

880 relay, Vern Van Tatenhove, who was third in the high jump at 6'¾" which tied the school record, Sam Angell, second in shotput at 50'¾" and Tom Goodrow, second in 100-yard dash in 10:45.

Tubergan was fifth in long jump and third in low hurdles at 21.2. Johnson placed fifth in 220 in 24.2 and the Panthers 440-yard relay of Johnson, Shaw, Tubergan and Goodrow was fourth.

**Doesn't Miss Baseball**  
Al Kaline, Mr. Tiger and designated hitter for Sun-Glo pop, told this writer Saturday afternoon before the Tulip Time Festival finale that he doesn't miss baseball.

Kaline concluded his brilliant 22-year career as Tiger at the end of the 1974 season with 3,007 hits including a club record 399 home runs.

Tulip Time officials kept Kaline, his pretty wife, the former Madge Louise Hamilton and son Mike busy throughout his stay in Holland.

All of the Kalines, in particular Mrs. Kaline, paid high comments to the beautiful Tulip Time Festival and friendly people.

Mr. and Mrs. Kaline both said Tulip Time was just fantastic and that they would like to come back again to our fine city.

"Our championship season of 1968 has to rate as my biggest thrill in baseball," offered Kaline. "California's Nolan Ryan was probably the toughest pitcher for me to hit in my last few years of playing and ranks as one of the best pitchers ever."

With the colorful Oakland A's leading the way, the American League has dominated the World Series the last three years but haven't been as successful in the All-Star game.

"When I first came up the American League was definitely stronger than the National. However, the National has taken it to us in All-Star games the last 10-15 years but those things run in cycles," commented Kaline.

Kaline doesn't blame Catfish Hunter for signing with the Yankees although he did feel that "Hunter could have paid some loyalty to his teammates by staying with Oakland and renegotiating his contract."

The perennial No. 1 glove man among AL outfielders, Kaline said he doesn't prefer the fiery type of manager like Billy Martin over the easier type like present boss Ralph Houk.

"They all want to do the same thing and that is to win," Kaline continued. "Some just have different personalities."

Kaline called controversial Denny McLain a "fierce" com-

petitor and didn't mind McLain's unusual tactics as long as he produced on the field.

Of the 1975 Tigers, Kaline feels that the outfield of Danny Meyer, Ron LeFlore and Leon Roberts is going to be outstanding and will be around Detroit for many years. He compared that group to Willie Horton, Mickey Stanley, Jim Northrup and himself.

Kaline isn't interested in becoming a coach or manager and has seen the Bengals play in three games of 1975.

"I enjoy watching them play but I have no intentions of getting back into baseball in any full-time capacity," he insisted.

The 40-year-old Kaline, who looks much younger, is self-employed (sales) and is also an adviser for the Tigers.

Kaline played a round of golf Friday at the American Legion with pro Duane Vandenberg, Francis MacQuire and Jim Hallan. All four golfers recorded excellent scores with Vandenberg leading the way.

Said Mrs. Kaline, "It is nice that we as a family can participate in something besides baseball."

"No, Al never discussed his baseball problems with me at home. He kept all his baseball troubles at the park."

But we must add, that the former Tiger Superstar never really did have many problems, as he could throw the ball with the best, bat with the best, run with the best and field with the best.

A passenger in the car, James Garrison, 18, of Grand Haven, was admitted to the hospital with internal injuries and was listed in "serious" condition.

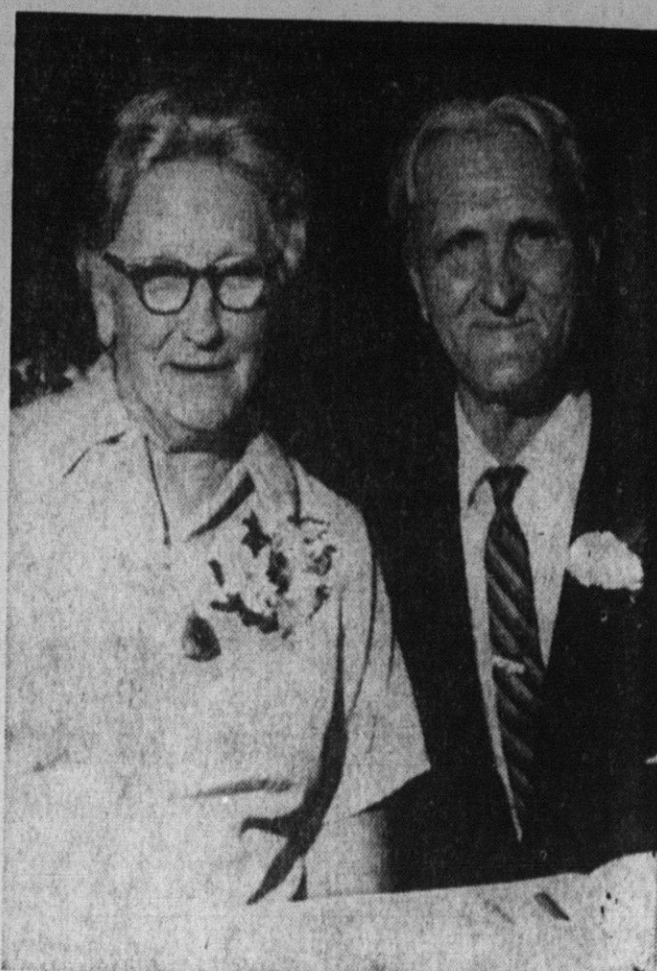

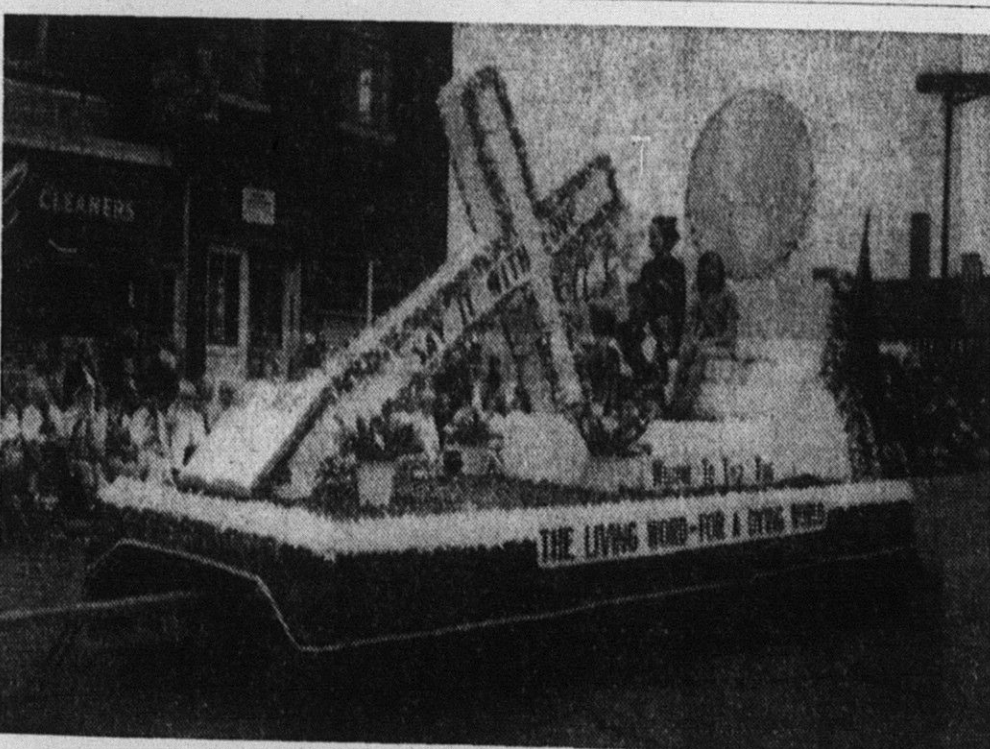

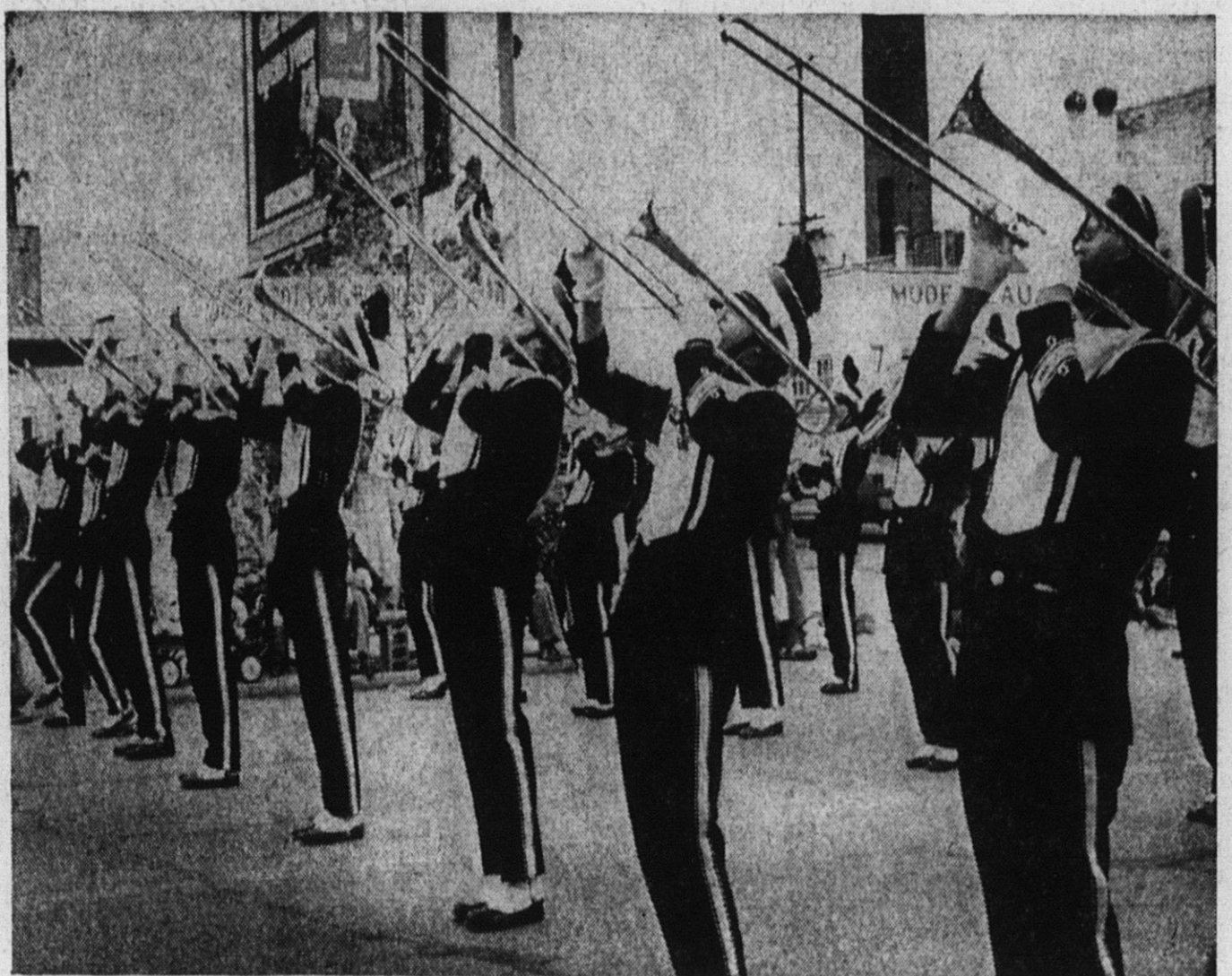

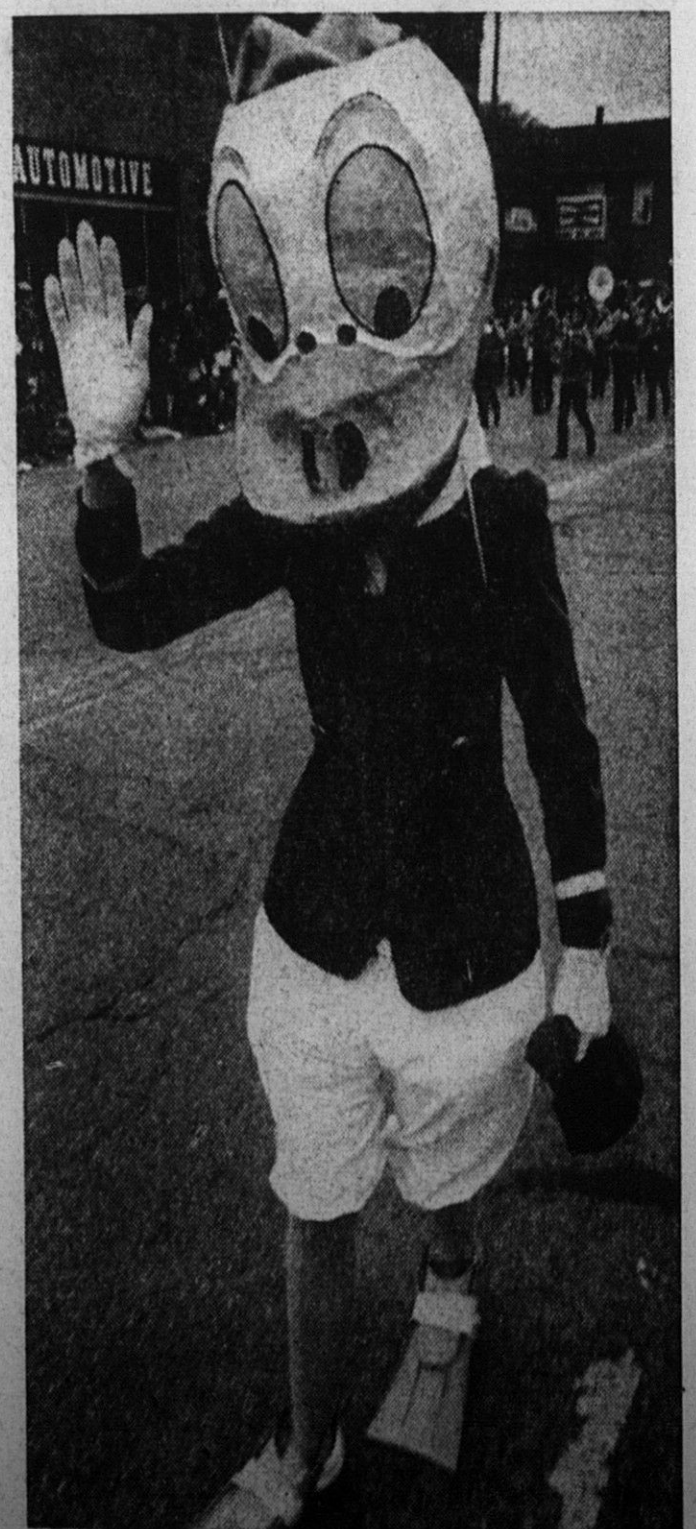
