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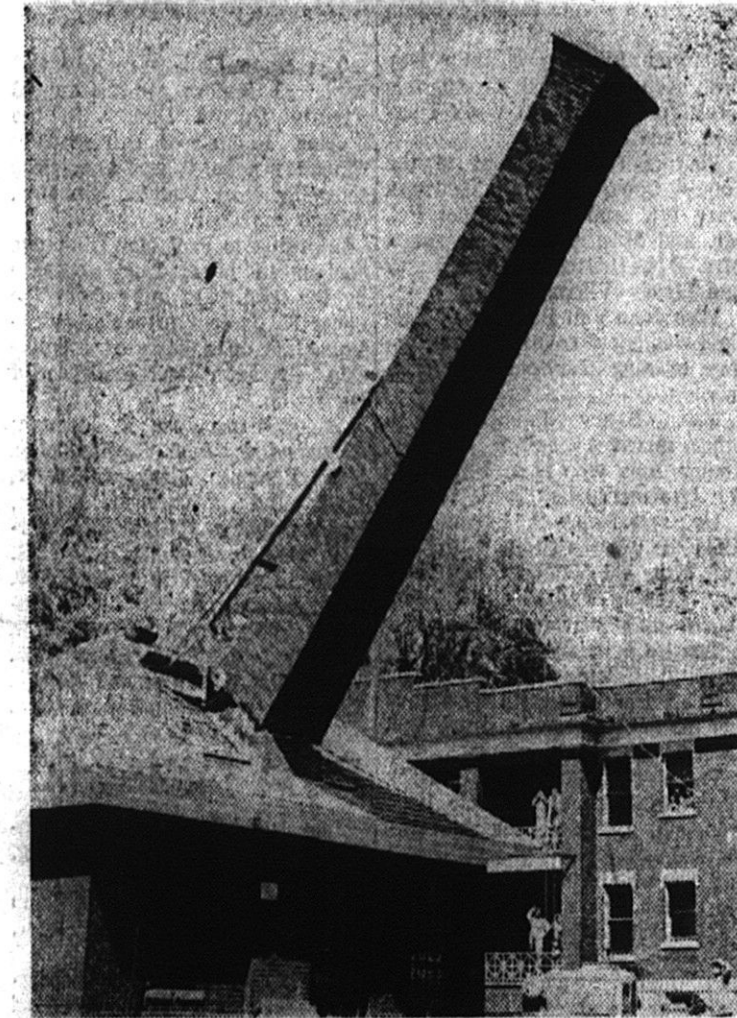
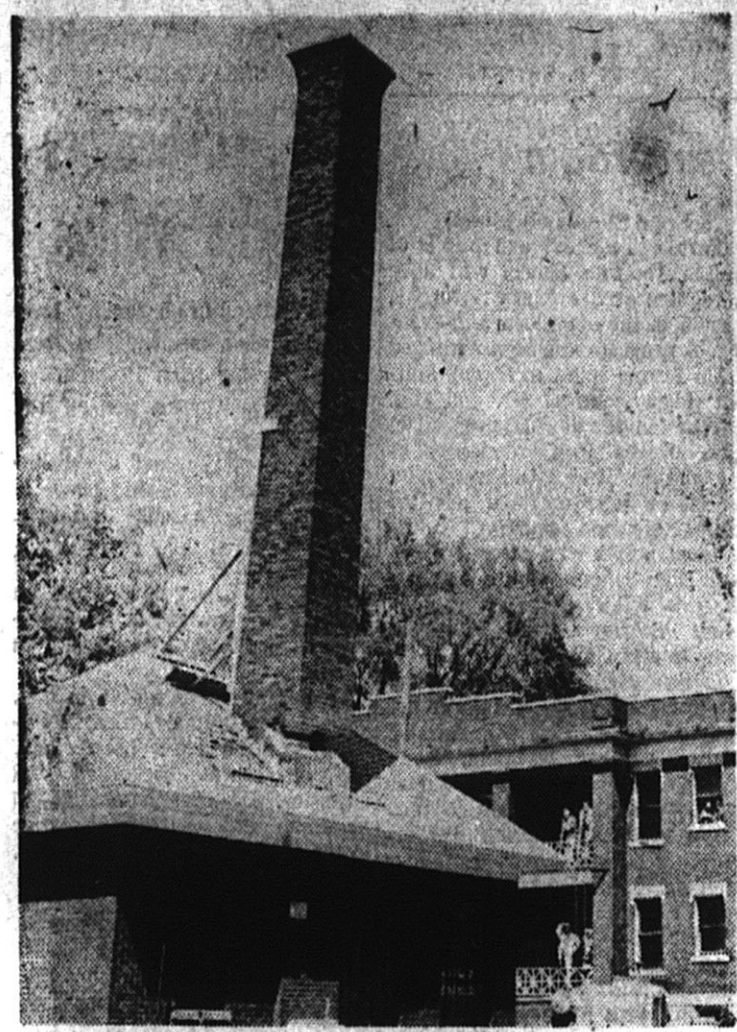
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COUNCIL OKAYS PIPELINE TO LAKE

Lawyer Reveals Telephone Call Some Time Ago

New York Industrialist 'Just Laughed at Me,' Doctor Tells Hoffman

ALLEGAN, Mich. (UP) — Dr. Kenneth B. Small, 31, said Wednesday he warned a New York millionaire he shot and killed last Saturday to stay away from his wife but the millionaire just laughed at him.

Small's lawyer, Leo Hoffman, said Small, in recounting events leading up to the fatal shooting in a villa overlooking Lake Michigan said he had called Jules Lack, 45, a New York industrialist, in New York sometime before the shooting.

Small said he "demanded" that Lack "stay away from" his wife, but said Lack "just laughed at me over the phone."

Hoffman said the telephone call was made when Small, who said he had moved out of the family home on his wife's orders, was called to the house because of the illness of one of the children.

Small said he tried to locate his wife but couldn't. He said he learned Lack had been registered in a Detroit hotel at the time. He then called Lack in New York and made the demand that he "stay away" from his wife, Edith, 30.

Hoffman said Small recounted that his wife asked for a divorce, after returning from a vacation in Florida. Small said Lack had "smooth-talked" his wife with "big talk" about not "wanting his wife to soil her hands on housework."

Small, a handsome Detroit dentist, stalked into a palatial summer cottage near South Haven last Saturday and killed Lack, while Mrs. Small and other weekend guests at the home watched.

Hoffman took off for Washington, Wednesday to attend congressional hearings pertaining to Lake Michigan beach erosion while his client awaited examination in Allegan Municipal Court on first degree murder charge.

Prosecutor Dwight Cheever arrived home from a weekend fishing trip Monday afternoon after being delayed in his small plane flight ever since Sunday by bad weather at various points along the way.

However, Cheever was in contact with state police and authorized a warrant. Small was arraigned Monday just before noon and demanded examination. Examination was set for June 8, but was postponed by mutual consent after Hoffman said he would be out of town on that date.

Cheever immediately huddled with state police officers, including Sgt. John Davis of the South Haven post and Detective Walter Menzies of Paw Paw, and they went over photographs taken at the scene, sketches and were continuing their meetings Wednesday afternoon.

Small, 31, stalked angrily into the home of Mrs. Vivian Gates and killed Lack, with a German Luger pistol. Lack was a business associate of former OPA administrator Leon Henderson.

The young dentist's attractive wife, Edith, 31, sent word through an attorney that she would stand by her husband and wanted to help him in any way she could. She witnessed the shooting with other guests spending the holiday weekend at the \$40,000 home.

Mrs. Small returned to Detroit with the dentist's brother, Dr. Robert Small, her mother and brother Sunday. She was hiding out from newsmen in Detroit. Her attorney, Harry Klein, said she was determined to help her husband.

"Anything you can do I want done for him," Klein quoted her as saying. "And I'll do anything that I can do."

Klein, a personal friend of the couple for more than five years, filed a divorce suit for Mrs. Small in April, but the petition has been withdrawn.

Contending that his wife had faked him for Lack, Small accused the millionaire New Yorker of breaking up his home.

At least two of the five persons who witnessed the shooting probably will take the stand during the preliminary examination, Cheever said.

In Detroit, Klein said he and other neighbors had no inkling of trouble between the two until after Mrs. Small returned from Florida. He said there she met Lack. He said he filed the divorce papers

Detroit Dentist Might Be Tried This Summer

ALLEGAN (Special) — Dr. Kenneth B. Small, 31, probably will be tried this summer for the murder of a rival for his wife's affection it was learned today.

Earlier, it was thought Dr. Small would have to spend the summer in Allegan County Jail here and would not be tried until the fall term of Circuit Court.

But Circuit Judge Raymond L. Smith of Holland, who will sit on the bench during the handsome Detroit dentist's trial, said he can hold over the present Allegan County Circuit Court jury and try the case this summer.

Leo W. Hoffman, Small's attorney, said earlier this week that the present jury expired on June 14 and that a new jury would have to be impaneled if Small were to be tried this summer. He said that was unlikely and that the trial probably wouldn't be held until fall.

"Leo was under the erroneous impression when he talked to me that the present jury went out of existence on June 14 and that the only way Dr. Small could be tried this summer would be for me to impanel a special jury," Judge Smith said.

The Holland jurist, whose circuit includes both Allegan and Ottawa Counties, said he believed his calendar would permit trial of Dr. Small sometime after July 1.

Dr. Small, who is charged with murdering Jules Lack, 48, millionaire New York industrialist who allegedly tried to steal the affections of Small's attractive wife, demanded examination when arraigned in Municipal Court Tuesday.

Court officials here believed the earliest date Dr. Small's trial could be started would be sometime during the second week of July.

Meanwhile, there were reports that Dr. Small's wife, Edith, 30, will visit her husband in his jail cell here in a day or two but no one could confirm them.

Mrs. Small, who has not seen her husband since he stalked into a luxurious summer home on Lake Michigan near Douglas last Saturday and killed Lack with a German Luger pistol, is in seclusion in Detroit. She has said through her attorney that she wants to help her husband in any way she can and that she will stand by him.

Dr. Small is expected to use the "unwritten law"—the right to defend his home and marriage—as his defense. Five persons, including Dr. Small's wife, witnessed the sensational shooting.

Dr. Small's mother and father visited him at the Allegan jail Wednesday.

Dr. Small's first "special request" was granted Tuesday when he asked for and was given a Bible. Before his arraignment he had asked to talk with a member of the local Masonic Lodge and an officer of the lodge did visit him in his cell for more than a half-hour. However, he seemed overwhelmed and a little surprised by offers of books, magazines and other "comforts" made by Allegan townspeople.

"Only at her insistence and to pacify her," he said he later consulted with the two and they went to see a marriage counselor. She dropped the divorce proceedings.

Allegan jail personnel said Small eats regularly but is "depressed."

The brothers are awaiting trial in Circuit Court at Grand Haven on breaking and entering charges. They are accused of entering Van's Supermarket in Holland.

Uramkin Enters Race for Sheriff

ALLEGAN (Special)—Michael J. Uramkin, of Trowbridge township, will again seek the Republican nomination as sheriff in the Allegan county primary.

Uramkin, who has twice sought the nomination before, will oppose Walter Runkel, present sheriff who was appointed after the resignation of Louis A. Johnson.

A veteran of four years service in the Air Force during World War II, Uramkin had 83 combat missions in the CBI theater and was awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross, Air Medal and four battle stars.

Three years ago he helped organize the Allegan Civil Air Patrol squadron and served as its commander until his recent promotion to flight operations officer for Group Nine which includes squadrons throughout southwestern Michigan.

He is 41, married and the father of two children, Barbara 17, a freshman at Western Michigan College and Michael, Jr., 7. He owns and operates a large Trowbridge township farm.

He is a member of the county Farm Bureau, the Trowbridge Grange, American Legion, the Veterans of Foreign Wars and The Blessed Sacrament Church, Allegan.

Route Undecided, But Cost Estimate Near \$3 Million

No Additional Taxes Will Be Needed; Take From 2 to 3 Years

City Council Wednesday night set up machinery which eventually is expected to provide a new and adequate supply of good water not only for Holland city but for the community at large. In short — a pipeline to Lake Michigan.

After months of study and surveys, the Board of Public Works has come to the conclusion that a pipeline into Lake Michigan is the only answer for an adequate water supply for Holland. Plans call for a 36-inch pipeline to the lake and a filtration plant near the shore. No estimates of costs were mentioned Wednesday night but the figure of \$3,000,000 has on occasion been mentioned for such a project.

James H. Klomparsen, chairman of the Board of Public Works, said the new project is expected to provide 20,000,000 gallons per day, compared with the present 7,000,000-gallon capacity for a grand total of 27,000,000 gallons, or more than enough to meet the needs of the entire community.

Plans call for a 42-inch intake pipeline extending into Lake Michigan about a half mile to a point where the water is about 45 feet deep. The transmission line from the filtration plant to the city will be 36 inches in diameter with a capacity of 20,000,000 gallons daily.

The board has not decided on the route. Several routes are now under consideration and a decision will be made in the near future. The entire project will take two or three years.

Klomparsen explained that plans call for financing the huge project with revenue bonds which would be self-liquidating, involving no increase in taxes. He spoke in terms of a tremendous investment rather than a huge expense, and said not only would the city benefit, but it would help the growth of greater Holland.

He asked the people of Holland to bear with the Board of Public Works just a little longer in the water problems "and it won't be long before we have all the water we want and good, soft water too."

Specifically, Council approved a BPW recommendation to authorize Black and Veatch, consulting engineers of Kansas City, Mo., to proceed with plans and specifications for the proposed water improvement in order that bids can be received at the earliest date possible. Reduction in engineering fees from 5.5 percent to 4.75 percent was accepted, said decrease due to the increased volume of work now under consideration.

Black and Veatch previously had carried on extensive surveys in ground borings in and around Holland, but shore borings did not reveal the desirable gravel formations which would provide ideal wells along shore. Consequently, the pipeline into the lake for surface water was recommended.

Council further approved a BPW recommendation to retain the law firm of Berry, Stevens and Moorman of Detroit as bond attorneys for the city water supply project and that said firm be authorized to proceed with the preparation of a revenue bond ordinance as soon as information is forthcoming from the rate survey presently conducted by Black and Veatch.

Council also approved retaining the services of the Municipal Advisory Council of Detroit to prepare and distribute the prospectus in connection with the revenue bond issue.

In view of extra legal work in connection with the water project, Council approved payment of legal fees to the city attorney at the rate of \$10 per hour for time spent by him in connection with said project, such fees to be charged to the cost of the project.

George Rendleman, superintendent of the Board of Public Works, thanked Council for its cooperation and said the board was anxious to get the big project under way.

When Klomparsen asked the people's patience for bearing with Holland's current supply for a time, Mayor Harry Harrington gave a tip to get rid of the gaseous odors in the water. He said, "water is to be used for drinking, it would add greatly if it is drawn in advance and kept for a time in the refrigerator. Klomparsen and Rendleman agreed."

In other business, Mayor Harrington reappointed Klomparsen to a five-year term on the Board of Public Works, an appointment which was approved by Council. Klomparsen has served 10 years on the BPW.

Black Bear Reported

Two Are Drowned In Spring Lake as Boat Overtakes

11-Year-Old Boy and Man Rescued; Both Bodies Recovered

GRAND HAVEN (Special) — Two persons were drowned and two others saved when a 14-foot boat overturned on Spring Lake at 2 p.m. Monday after the occupants had had some trouble with a 22 horsepower outboard motor.

Victims were Melvin Kenter, 42, of Fruitport, and Glenn Murray Hancock, 36, of Wyoming Park. Rescued were Kenter's 11-year-old son, Cecil, and Marvin McManamey, 30, route 1, Spring Lake.

Hancock's body was recovered Monday at 3:30 p.m. and Kenter's body was recovered about 9:30 a.m. today. Participating in dragging operations were about 16 persons from the state police post, the sheriff's department and the Coast Guard.

McManamey was rescued by Martin De Boer, 65, of Strawberry Point, Spring Lake and his son, Paul, of Grand Rapids, who were fishing nearby. Names of persons rescuing the 11-year-old boy were not learned immediately.

Assisting in the investigation were Sgt. Milton Swingle of the state police, Sheriff Jerry Vanderbeek, William Fox, engineer of first class of the Coast Guard, and Coroner Joseph E. Kammeraad.

Hancock's body was recovered by Trooper William Chandler of the state police and Supervisor William Stone of Fruitport. Kenter's body was recovered by Seaman Edgar A. Culbertson of the Coast Guard.

The 11-year-old boy who was rescued told police the boat was overturned. After the men had cleaned the carburetor and replaced the motor, the motor was off balance and the boat turned over. Another version was that one person had stood up.

The water is 30 to 40 feet deep where the boat overturned. A cabin cruiser nearby threw out a supply of cushions and the lad said one was in reach of his father. The tragedy occurred 002 feet offshore and the four swam for a time before help arrived. Kenter is survived by his wife, Donna, 40; a daughter, Phillis, 17, and the son, Cecil, 11. Hancock, a tool and die maker at Gillis's in Grand Rapids, is survived by his wife, and three daughters, Sandrine, 15, Coral, 13, and Muriel, 10; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Arthur Hancock of Grand Rapids; four brothers, Terrance and Howard of Grand Rapids, and Wayne and Dale with the U.S. Navy, and a sister, Mrs. Harry Bouwkamp of Grand Rapids. The Hancock family moved to Wyoming Park a year ago from Fruitport and had been living in a trailer camp.

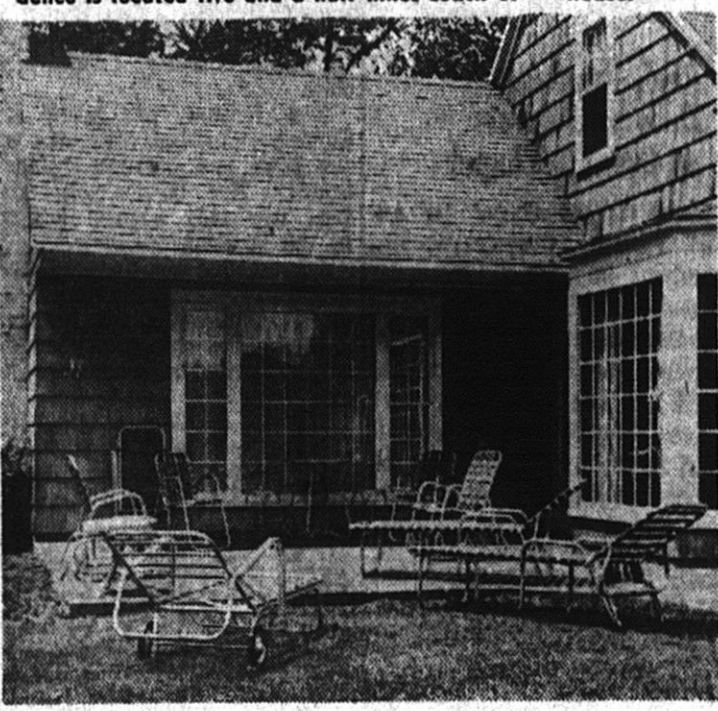
Dr. William Van Deventer will offer course No. 231B, Nature Study, at Fennville High School during the first three weeks of August. Three semester hours of credit will be earned.

The Chix entertain Gervis of Grandville next Tuesday night under the lights.

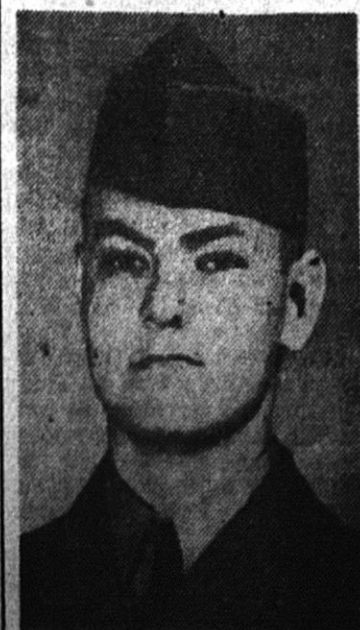
Mrs. H. Mouw Honored At Ladies' Aid Meeting

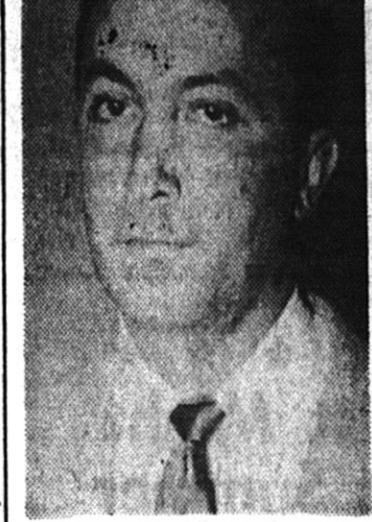

Detroit Dentist Demands Exam On Murder Count

ALLEGAN — A 31-year-old Detroit dentist languished in Allegan County jail Tuesday after arraignment in Municipal Court on a first-degree murder charge growing out of the shooting Saturday of a rival for his wife's affections.

He is Dr. Kenneth B. Small, who walked into a plush home on the shore of Lake Michigan, five and a half miles south of Douglas

Saturday afternoon and fired three bullets from a German luger pistol at Jules Lack, 48, of New York City.

Lack was killed instantly. Small was arraigned in Allegan Municipal Court Tuesday and demanded examination which was set for 10 a.m. June 8 before Judge Ervin L. Andrews.

Sheriff Walter Runkel said Small felt "pretty happy" Sunday and was given a radio in his cell so he could listen to the Detroit-Baltimore baseball game. "He hasn't asked to see his wife," Runkel said. "From what we understand, he's a very respectable gentleman and the highest type of person." His brother also is a dentist in Detroit.

Dr. Small was stripped of his natty sports clothes and given regular prison dungarees. He faces a long wait in jail while his attorney, Leo W. Hoffman of Allegan, son of Rep. Clarence Hoffman, maps his defense. Runkel said it was unlikely he would be tried before the fall term of Circuit Court. He will remain in jail until then because Michigan law prohibits bail on a first-degree murder charge.

Lack was president of the Majestic Air Conditioning Corp. of New York. The body was shipped from Chappell Funeral Home in Fennville to New York Saturday night. Lack had been divorced a year and a half.

Small stalked his victim for 10 hours after closing his office for the week-end in Detroit Friday.

His wife met Lack while she and her three children were vacationing in Florida last winter. Small told officers she had told him she fell in love with Lack and wanted a divorce.

Mrs. Small, an attractive blond, left home Thursday, he said, saying she was going to Chicago for the weekend.

However, Friday she made a call to her children from a Fennville station. Small traced the call and began his search for his wife. He finally found the home of Mrs. Vivian Gates, Chicago divorcee, and parked his car 100 yards down the narrow blacktop shore road.

As he approached, Lack and two Chicago men, Dennis Carroll and Richard McMahon, were playing cards in a sunroom. Mrs. Small and Mrs. Gates sat talking on a sofa nearby. McMahon's wife was upstairs. The McMahon's drove Lack and Mrs. Small to the home from Chicago, police said.

One of the men told Mrs. Gates, "we have a guest" as Dr. Small walked by a window. Mrs. Gates went to meet him at the door, but he brushed by her and went into the sunroom.

"Is either Edith Small or Jules Lack here?" he asked.

He spotted his wife and said, "I see she's here."

Someone in the room asked him, "Who are you?"

"I'm the husband of that sweet wife and mother of three children standing over there."

Turning to a man he said he recognized as Lack from his wife's previous description, he asked, "Are you Lack?"

"Yes," Lack replied. Small fired three shots, two of them hit Lack and he crumpled to the floor dead. One bullet pierced his heart.

Carroll lunged at Small and in a brief scuffle the dentist threatened to "get you next," Small

Cold Weather, Light Rain Mark Month of May

A light rainfall of 1.19 inches and a below-average temperature were the main characteristics of the weather in Holland during May, although the bright sunny weather which provided an ideal setting for Tulip Time and afterward failed to offset the cold, cloudy weather the first two weeks of the month.

According to Charles Steketee, official weather observer, the average temperature was 54.8 degrees or 1.9 degrees below normal for May. The precipitation of 1.1 inches was 2.23 inches below normal.

Maximum temperature was 86 degrees, compared with 89 in 1953, 83 in 1952, 87 in 1951 and 88 in 1950. Minimum was 31, compared with 36 in 1953, 37 in 1952, 33 in 1951 and 31 in 1950.

Average maximum temperature was 65.8, compared with 71.1 in 1953, 68.1 in 1952, 72.3 in 1951 and 71.6 in 1950. Average temperature was 43.7 in 1954, 48.4 in 1953, 46.4 in 1952, 47.9 in 1951 and 46.8 in 1950.

Precipitation totaled 1.19 inches, compared with 2.93 inches in 1953, 3.93 inches in 1952, 2.54 inches in 1951 and .85 inch in 1950.

Precipitation fell on 11 days, compared with 15 days in 1953, 15 days in 1952, eight days in 1951 and seven days in 1950. Largest amount of rain in a 24-hour period was .50 inch, compared with 1.08 inches in 1953, .88 inch in 1952, .75 inch in 1951 and .31 inch in 1950.

34 Years of Ice Making Ends in City of Holland

In the space of a few minutes Saturday an era spanning 34 years ended when the last ice to be manufactured in Holland was pulled from freezing compartments.

As the last 1,200 pounds of ice, in 300-pound cakes, was dumped out, it marked the end of ice making in the city at Superior Ice Co. which has been in operation since 1909.

John Van Wieren, who had owned the plant for the last eight years, said he had sold to the City Ice and Fuel Co. of Grand Rapids. The Grand Rapids company will continue to service ice to this area. Ice will be brought in by truck and stored in the present coolers.

Van Wieren was the former owner of the Lakeside Ice Co., for 24 years before it was destroyed by fire eight years ago. A blaze which badly damaged the Holland Color and Chemical Co.

Van Wieren said that many years ago he and his crew used to cut ice from Lake Macatawa, cover it with sawdust, and store it in large buildings.

When nature failed to provide thick ice on the lake artificial means were used. Then came the refrigerator and ice was no longer used by the majority of homes.

Ice still is needed only now it is largely crushed and cubed ice. Van Wieren said. The Superior Ice Co. is a stopping place for produce trucks from throughout the area and others hauling vegetables across country.

Van Wieren said the plant operated around the clock during the summer season filling the trucks with as much as two tons of crushed ice. The company hauled ice to Fennville, Pullman, Saugatuck, Zeeland and other nearby communities.

A complete change is in store for Van Wieren and his wife who had worked with him in the office for 32 years. The couple sold their home at 80 West 20th St., where they had lived for 23 years, and purchased one at 713 Ottawa Beach Rd.

After getting up at 4:30 in the morning for nearly 32 years Van Wieren said it was time for a rest. Starting later this month Van Wieren and his wife will head north for a 30-day fishing trip.

"After the wife and I get back will be time enough to think about what comes next," Van Wieren said.

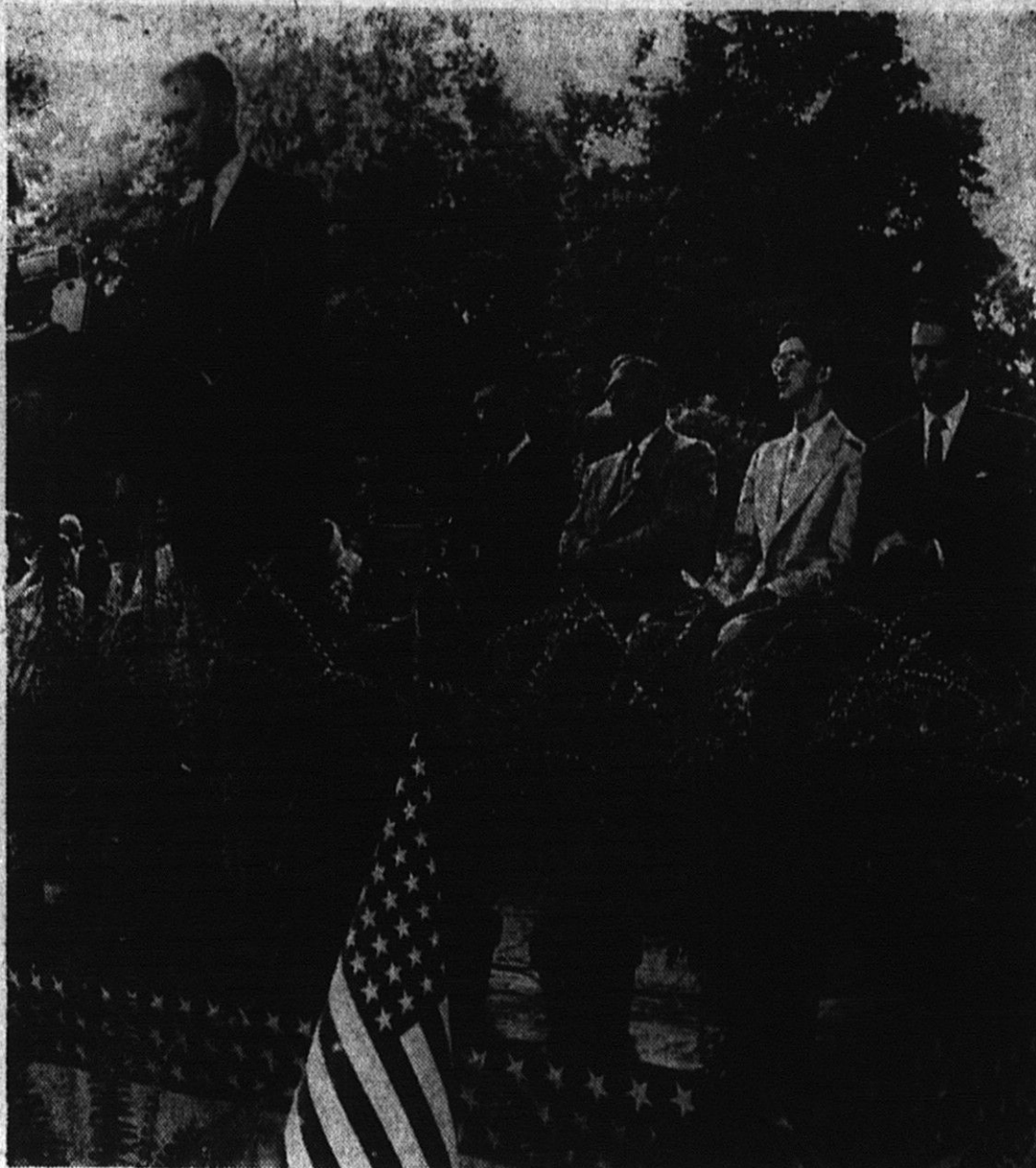

Let's Plant Beauty--Local Gardens Create Lovely Spring Panorama

On South Shore Dr., just beyond Graafschap Rd., are several homes with effective landscaping. Looking through the gateway of the John Mullers, 693, one sees a panorama of spring beauty made up of individual but well integrated garden pictures.

Japanese yew, brightened by red parrot tulips and white ageratum, flank the entrance. Shrub honeysuckle, lilacs, viburnum (Japanese snow ball), yellow leaved philadelphus (mock orange) form the background of the long borders leading to the home. An underplanting of dark purple iris accents a lilac. Pink dogwood heightens interest at another point.

Midway the border widens into a garden of rhododendrons and azaleas in coral and rose shades, with tulips in harmonizing colors. A Paul's scarlet hawthorn adds height here and red maples on adjoining property lend depth to this picture. Several crab apples are planted as specimen trees.

On the north side of the Muller home a naturalistic border sweeps down to the lake front in beautiful line. Here you will see too a magnificent spruce towering alone, symmetrical, with its branches healthy and strong from the ground to its tip. You are invited to park your car to visit this garden.

During Tulip Time many visitors stopped to take colored pictures of the sunken garden of the L. W. Lambs, 1025 South Shore Dr., where creeping pink phlox, pinkish lavender azaleas, and orchid tulips created an overall effect of pink shading into lavender. Especially beautiful tulip plantings were found too in the Jenison Park area at the home of the James Lugers, the George Smiths, and the J. W. Hobecks.

The rose pink Princess Elizabeth tulips, standing 31 inches tall against the foundation evergreens in front of the Kenneth Peirce home, 274 College Ave., drew the admiration of all who passed. At 28 East 25th St. yellow tulips bordering the curved entrance wall highlighted the home of Dick Nicholson, making an attractive picture. At 688 State St. Henry Mass made nice use of group

plantings of tulips in the border back of his home.

One of our horticulturists who grows tulips most successfully here without transplanting, plants the bulbs 12 to 15 inches deep in sandy soil. In the spring when growth begins she feeds them with bone meal. Now when she cuts off the flower heads she will feed them again so that the leaves can build up next year's bulb, and in the fall she gives them a third feeding of bone meal. Another gardener, who has heavier soil, plants only 8 to 10 inches deep, and has kept tulips blooming well for four years by similar frequent feeding. So remember to cut off the blossom before it forms seed and feed the plants.

Driver Escapes Injury When Truck Rolls Over

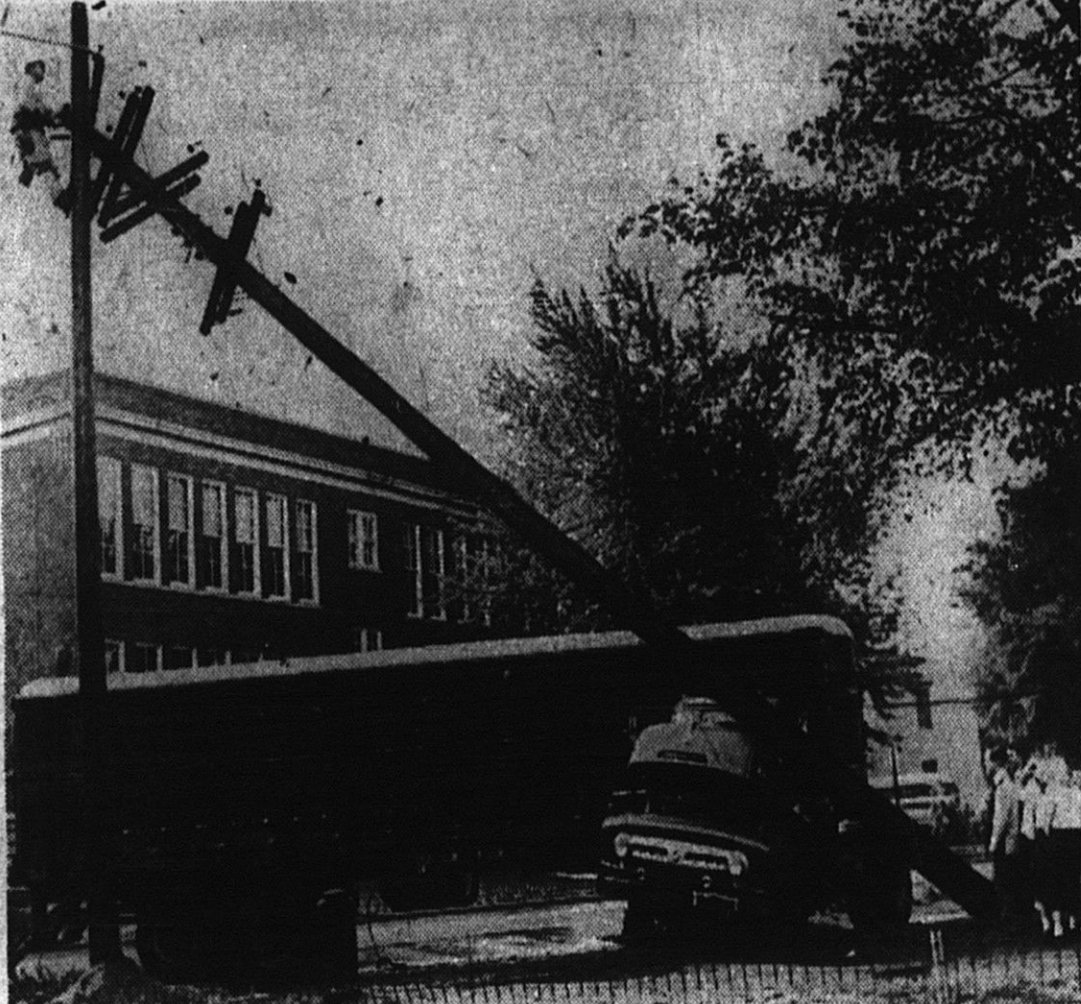

prominent spot. It was the third year that the Sentinel's editor-publisher headed the Tulip Time commission and he was as pleased as anybody at the overwhelming success of the Silver Anniversary festival.

While on their European travels, the Butlers may cross paths with Dr. William G. Winter and his family who also are touring Europe this season. The Winters and the Butlers live only about a half block apart, and there was considerable chitchat in the neighborhood about the two families and their trips.

It remained for one person to garble a couple of stories into a brand new version by saying, "I hear Dr. Bill has gone to Europe and he took his butler with him."

It's been two weeks since the festival ended, but there still are a few pretty tulips left, much to the surprise of a lot of people who say the blooming season was longer than ever before. The big windmill planting in Centennial Park still looks pretty good as do a few choice plantings in shady spots elsewhere. Most of the tulip lanes not only are done blooming but are pretty well advanced on the "drying" period.

After the tulip foliage turns yellow, it's time to cut down the plants, and then place those colorful annuals that the Council for Civic Beauty is promoting in an attempt to keep tulip lanes colorful all year. The new planting season is scheduled the first two or three weeks of June.

Tulip Time still gets some plugs. Mrs. Ann Ketchum and her daughter, Gloria Ann, of 165 East 5th St. sent in a Tulip Time special edition and other Tulip Time Sentinels to radio station WTJL in Milwaukee. On Wednesday, May 26, the station mentioned Tulip Time, also the Ketchums.

With the town jammed up for Tulip Time, it's always interesting to know how many of those visitors got their accommodations through the Tulip Time housing bureau. Actually, the bureau which operates in the Chamber of Commerce headquarters made advance reservations for about 3,700 visitors, and then arranged for an additional 1,000 visitors who came without reservations.

The bureau also arranged accommodations for 22 bus groups, and many other bus groups make ing. Most of these bus groups were snouq sjnuuuzuuu uuo jnuj housed in resort hotels in Saugatuck. There were 35 long distance

calls asking for reservations between May 4 and 14.

For each person accommodated through the housing bureau, a \$2 deposit was listed. After the festival closed, the bureau sent checks amounting to \$5,331.65 to local residents who cared for visitors and \$4,195.15 was sent to hotels, motels, and cabin courts in Holland and Saugatuck areas. This deposit payment represents only a fraction of the money spent on housing accommodations during the festival.

Tulip Time gets attention in England too. A 2/C Thomas McCarthy, stationed in England, mailed a clipping on Holland, Mich. Tulip Time which appeared in the Air Force Daily News. The clipping was sent to his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Leslie T. McCarthy, 481 College Ave. The United Press story gave a good play to the four-day festival emphasizing that the main attraction is the millions of multi-colored tulips.

One reader wrote the Ambassador about the flower show in the Armory and the delightful garden corner with its bleeding hearts and forget-me-nots, something that reminded the writer of her grandmother's garden.

She also mentioned the many helpful services of the garden club in encouraging better lawns, shrubs, etc., in residential yards, also the many helpful suggestions from the "Let's Plant Beauty" column.

Tulip Time also strikes as far south as Florida where the Swim Fin Club of the University of Florida staged a "Holland Holiday" April 23 and 24 at the University Pool. The Holland Chamber of Commerce lent several Dutch costumes and gave suggestions for the event.

80 Percent Favor Hospital Addition

Final reports on the telephone survey on a new addition for Holland Hospital revealed that 80.2 percent of the persons contacted favor such an addition.

Out of 1,376 persons listed, representing every fourth person on the poll lists for the Civic Center bond issue; 921 favored the proposition or 80.2 percent, 43 said "no" or 3.7 percent and 185 were undecided or 16.1 percent. A total of 227 could not be reached.

The new addition will cost an estimated \$1,100,000 and there is a possibility that up to 40 percent or \$440,000 could be provided through general funds under the Hill-Burton act. Park, Holland and Fillmore townships are considering a fund campaign to raise \$175,000, leaving about \$500,000 to be raised by bond issue in Holland city.

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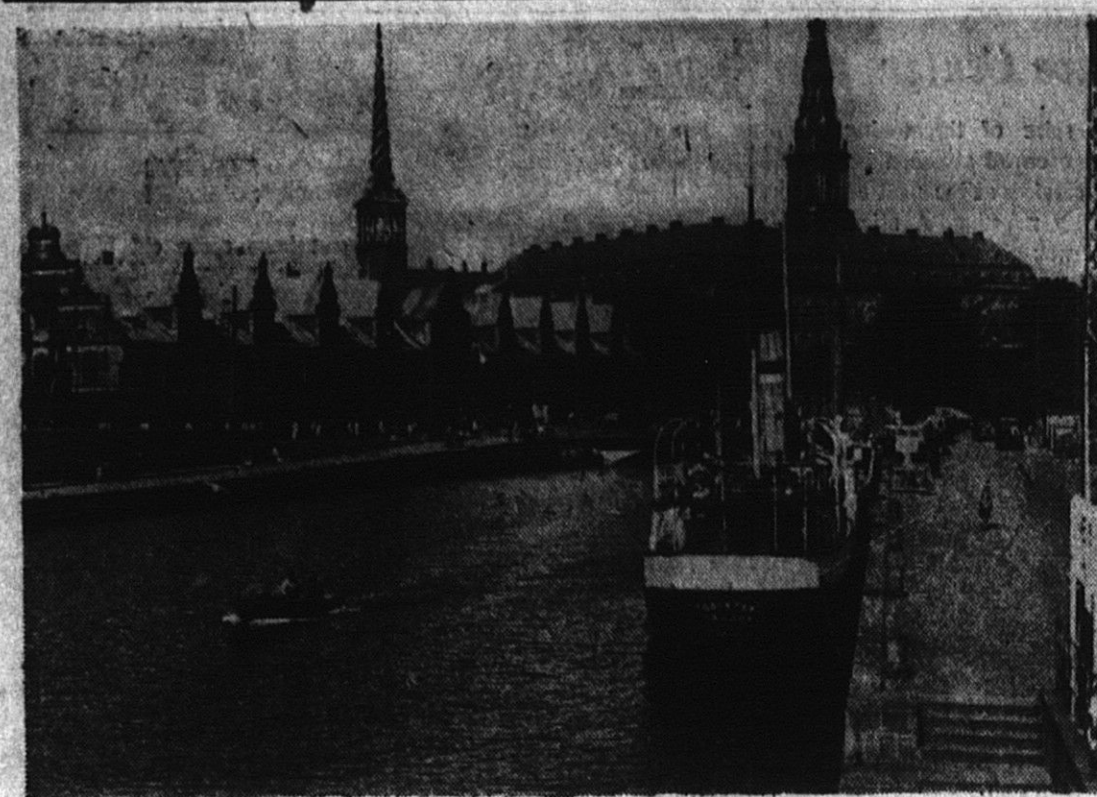

People Enjoy Outdoor Eating and Relaxation in Modern Copenhagen

COPENHAGEN, Denmark, Sunday, May 23—This is a large and beautiful metropolitan city with all the modern conveniences. There are all kinds of transportation such as bicycles, motor bicycles, automobiles, street cars, buses, subways, trains, boats and even horse drawn carriages.

We are staying at the Excelsior Hotel, one of many hotels in the city all of which are filled with tourists from many parts of the world.

There is a great abundance of all kinds of food with restaurants on almost every corner. Eating outside is popular, even though it is cold. Summers are so short that they make the most of them.

The New York Herald Tribune, Paris Edition and the English papers arrive here daily so that we have been able to keep up with the news. Every time we try to read any of the local papers we feel our lack of language education. Many people in European countries speak at least two other languages besides their own.

The rate of exchange is quite favorable, about seven kroner for one American dollar. We have been changing our currency into local money in small amounts.

This may not be the most economical way to make exchange but it works well for us as we do not want to have money left when we cross the border into another country.

Shops are filled with merchandise of all kinds and prices are quite reasonable. Most of the shops close at 5:30 on week days and at 2 on Saturday so that employees can have a long weekend. When the shops close many of them put vending machines outside so that people can continue to buy merchandise. You can get everything from oranges, bananas, nylon hose, candy bars, gum, Danish pastry, cigarettes, cigars, small novelties and toys in these machines.

Large department stores put merchandise on rugs in front of their glass shop doors. This we thought, was a good idea.

Last evening we were told by people in our hotel that we should attend the amusement park called Tivoli. This is one of the outstanding parks and there are many forms of entertainment to be enjoyed.

We left our hotel about 8 p.m. in the evening and walked about a half a block to the main street, then about three blocks down past the railroad station and arrived at
