Parade at 9:30 a.m.
Followed by Program
In Holland Cemetery

Plans have been completed for Holland's annual Memorial Day ceremonies Saturday at Pilgrim Home Cemetery immediately following the Memorial Day parade.

George Lumsden will preside at ceremonies which open with a march to Monument Square led by the American Legion Band. Linda David of Holland High School will read Gov. Williams' proclamation and the Rev. Raymond Van Heukelom of First Reformed Church will give the invocation.

U. S. District Attorney Wendell A. Miles of Holland will deliver the Memorial Day oration and Ronald Beyer of Hope College will read Lincoln's Gettysburg Address. Boy Scouts will decorate graves in Monument Square and Camp Fire Girls will give the choral reading, "In Flanders Field." Members of the National Guard will fire a military salute honoring the war dead.

The Memorial Day parade will start at 9:30 a.m., lining up at 12th St. and Central Ave. and proceeding east on 12th St. south on Columbia Ave. and east on 16th St. to the cemetery.

Major William Sikkel is serving as marshal with Lt. Col. Martin Japenga, Major J. J. Riemersma, Major Robert Kouw and Major Russell Kemper as assistant marshals.

4 Public School Teachers Are Retiring This Year

It is farewell for four teachers in the Holland Public School system who have devoted a lifetime of service to boys and girls in this community. A total of 146 years of continuous service is represented by these four individuals.

The record runs from 32 years to 39 years and a few years outside of Holland. Three of the retirements come from Holland's secondary schools and one from the elementary schools.

The three from Holland High School are Miss Hannah Parkyn of 212 West 12th St., Theodore Carter of 67 West 19th St. and Miss Lavina Cappon of 228 West Ninth St. From the elementary system is Miss Jeanette Veltman of 136 West 18th St.

Miss Cappon has served 36 years with the Holland Public School system, as head of the homemaking department. She is a graduate of Michigan State Normal College with a Bachelor of Science Degree and possesses a life certificate for teaching in the state of Michigan.

Miss Parkyn was instrumental in recent years in planning and remodeling the foods laboratory of the E. E. Fell Junior High School.

Miss Cappon is known to hundreds of Holland girls for the work in cooperation with the directors of the Dutch Dance in the development of their costumes.

She has always insisted that the costumes be authentic and resemble carefully those used in the various provinces of the Netherlands.

Theodore Carter has taught 32 years in the Holland Public School system, coming here in 1927. Carter is a graduate of the Central State Teachers College where he received a Bachelor of Arts Degree and also possesses the life certificate for teaching in Michigan. Carter is a business teacher at Holland High School and his particular field is bookkeeping.

Hundreds of Carter's students are today active in Holland's business and civic affairs. Many Holland offices are staffed by people who had their first experience in the business world under Carter's leadership.

Miss Hannah Parkyn, also of Holland High School, is a graduate of Hillsdale College where she received her Bachelor of Arts Degree and her life certificate for teaching in Michigan. She also holds the Master of Arts Degree and has given 39 years of teaching service to this community.

Miss Parkyn has served for a number of years as head of the mathematics department at Holland High School. Her leadership there has provided the Holland Public School system with a superior mathematics program. She is known to hundreds of Holland High School graduates and seldom does she miss remembering the names of any of them.

Two years ago at the retirement of J. J. Riemersma as principal of Holland High School, Miss Parkyn was called upon to give the tribute to Mr. Riemersma.

The only elementary school teacher retiring this year is Miss Jeanette Veltman who devoted 39 years of teaching in this community.

She came to Holland in 1920. She is a graduate of Western State Teachers College where she received her Bachelor of Arts Degree and has a life time Michigan teaching certificate. Before Holland she taught in New Era, East Saugatuck and in Vriesland. Miss Veltman is presently teaching in Washington Elementary School.

She is particularly noted for her active work with the local Red Cross chapter.

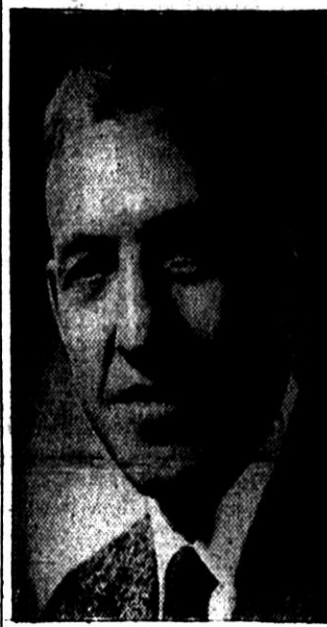

Home-Made Bomb Blast Injures 2 Holland Boys

Work Begins To Construct Boat Launches

Work was scheduled to begin this afternoon on two 25-foot gravel-crushed rock boat launching areas on each side of the present launching ramp at the public fishing site on the northwest side of Lake Macatawa.

The go-ahead was received this morning in a telephone conversation from F. A. Westerman of Lansing, fisheries supervisor for the conservation department, to Ranford (Bill) Wenzel of the Tulip City Rod and Gun Club and representing the Holland sportsmen.

Westerman said a letter would be coming shortly verifying the action. Westerman conferred with Ralph S. Marks of Lansing, regional fisheries supervisor, today concerning Marks' conference with about a dozen Holland sportsmen Wednesday night at the site.

Marks looked over the area in question and suggested crushed-rock be used for the launching area. A privately-owned dredge, presently working in the area, will dredge about two feet of water about 75 or 100 feet out from the shore to make launching easier.

As for the existing ramp, Marks said a conservation department work crew will be in the area about a month to repair the ramp.

The funds for the gravel-crushed rock and the dredging will be obtained through private solicitation by the Tulip City Rod and Gun Club, Holland Fish and Game club and the local citizens committee. Wenzel said that any donations may be sent to either club. Several donations have already been received.

Plans call for the area to be completed and ready for use by Friday night so that fishermen may use them over the Memorial Day Weekend.

The local group held a meeting at the ramp last week and wrote Gerald Eddy, conservation director, requesting the Wednesday meeting and explaining their plan of the proposed launching areas and the private solicitation of funds.

Local Persons Said 'Taken' By Salesman

Holland Police Chief Jacob Van Hoff today repeated his warning to local residents to deal only with reputable local businessmen after a number of area residents were apparently bilked by a "magazine salesman."

Chief Van Hoff said one housewife paid \$9.50 for magazines which never arrived, while another paid \$2.50 for a subscription renewal and later was told her subscription had expired.

On checking, Holland police found the checks had not been sent to the publishing companies, but had been cashed, one in a local tavern and one at Muskegon.

Chief Van Hoff wrote to Muskegon, and found that the suspect, Laverne L. Lobdel, 22, of Muskegon, is presently being held in Muskegon County Jail on a charge of forgery. Muskegon Police Chief Fred Castenholz said Lobdel has a record of bad check charges.

Officers said Lobdel appeared at the homes on crutches and said that he was working his way through school selling magazines. It is believed many other local residents were "taken" by the phony salesman, and Chief Van Hoff asks that these persons contact Holland police.

Detectives will confer with Ottawa County Prosecutor James W. Bussard on possible charges to be placed against Lobdel.

Chief Van Hoff requests Holland area residents to contact the police or the Chamber of Commerce if they have any doubts about transient salesmen.

R. Doyen, 13, Loses Part Of Left Hand

Jarvis Ter Haar Jr.
'Fairly Good'; Two
Others Also Injured

Two Holland boys Friday were seriously injured and two little children nearby escaped serious injury when a home-made bomb they were experimenting with suddenly exploded.

Robert Doyen, 13, son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Doyen of 94 West 32nd St., was reported in fair condition at Holland Hospital following partial amputation of three fingers of his left hand. He also suffered severe lacerations of his right hand and arm.

Jarvis Ter Haar Jr., 14, of 99 West 32nd St., was listed in fairly good condition at the hospital with severe lacerations of the forehead, right cheek, neck, thighs and legs.

Six-year-old twins David and Diane Ter Haar, also children of Mr. and Mrs. Jarvis Ter Haar, were examined at the hospital and discharged after treatment for minor injuries.

Holland police said the boys had been playing with explosives for some time in a shack behind the Doyen's home. Doyen said he recently took a quantity of carbide away from his son.

This morning, police said, the boys poured the powder from four or five 12-gauge shotgun shells into a four-inch length of half-inch pipe. Then, officers said, the boys sealed the pipe at each end with metal caps and drilled a hole through one end for a wick.

The hole was too large, the boys told officers, and they attempted to seal it by dripping hot wax down the hole from a candle. The bomb exploded.

A neighbor heard a "loud explosion," saw the bloody children running from the shack and called an ambulance. Another neighbor rushed the Ter Haar boy to the hospital in a car before the ambulance arrived.

The little shack was spattered heavily with blood. Officers found jagged pieces of "shrapnel" strewn about the interior. The shirt of little David Ter Haar was ripped where a fragment of metal had torn through, but missed his arm.

In the shack, police found a bottle of sulphur, a bottle containing gunpowder, several other bottles of potentially explosive materials, full, empty and cut shotgun shells and a quantity of .22 shells.

Holland police have issued a stern warning against children playing with any sort of explosive, with a reminder that it is against both state and city law. Residents are asked to promptly report any such activity observed in their neighborhoods.

Doyen said his son was to have graduated Friday from Maplewood School. Ter Haar attends the South Side Christian School.

Police Probe Two Mishaps

GRAND HAVEN (Special) — State police were called to two accidents in different parts of the county at 4:45 p.m. Sunday.

On US-31 just south of M-50, a car driven by Mrs. Charles Mieras, of 1314 Woodlawn, Grand Haven, went off the right shoulder and rolled over, resulting in injuries for two children. Richard Dale Mieras, 8, received abrasions on the shoulder and leg and Beverly Kay Mieras, 4, received a broken arm. Both were taken to Municipal Hospital for treatment. Mrs. Mieras was charged with violation of the basic speed law. The 1955 car was a complete loss.

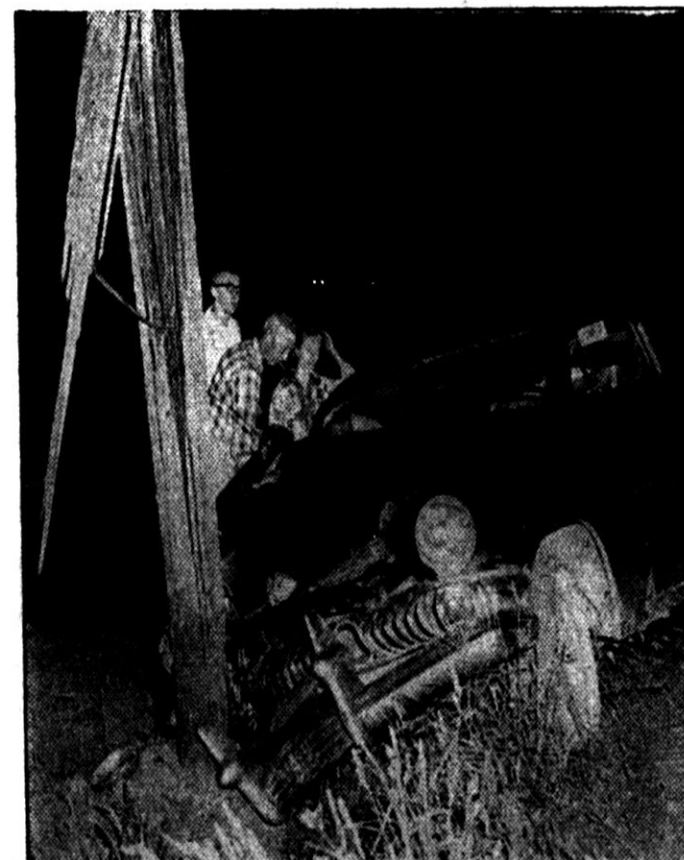

Charge Dismissed

GRAND HAVEN (Special) — Municipal Judge Jacob Ponstein at a preliminary examination Thursday afternoon dismissed a charge of felonious assault against Homer Lee Gaddis, 33, route 1, West Olive. Visiting Holland for a few days this week was Alfons B. Norbart, assistant trade commissioner for the Netherlands Trade Commission in Chicago, who is returning to the Netherlands this summer for a new assignment next fall in Nigeria, West Africa.

On his first visit to Holland, Mich., Norbart found the tulips in bloom, a welcome reminder of back home in the Netherlands.

During his four years in America, two in New York City and the last two years in Chicago, Norbart has seen an increase of foodstuffs imported from the Netherlands. The trade commission was organized in 1951 to encourage more imports. Yet, the United States today exports three times as much to the Netherlands as the Netherlands exports to America. Dutch food imports in America have increased to \$50,000,000 a year, mostly in ham, cheese, cocoa and chocolate products, poppy seeds for bakers, tiny onions for pickling, Dutch beer, cookies and biscuits, and Dutch herring.

The tulip industry sends bulbs valued at \$10 to \$15 million a year, and the industrial markets run more to small articles such as electric shaver components and certain hardware items. American export items to the Netherlands are usually such bulky items as coal, wheat and machinery, thus providing raw material for converting industries.

Norbart explained that since World War II, the Netherlands has changed a great degree from an agricultural country to a highly industrialized one. This was done to accommodate a growing population in very limited space. The Netherlands is one of the most highly populated countries in the world.

The Dutch find their greatest export market in Europe, particularly West Germany. Exports to European countries amount to 60 per cent, compared with 5.6 per cent to the United States.

Opening of the St. Lawrence Seaway is of particular interest to the Netherlands Trade Commission since it provides a gateway directly to the heart of America. The commission is working on plans for the International Trade Fair in Chicago July 13 to 17 featuring the new ship Princess Irene which will be tied up at Navy Pier. It will serve as the hospitality center for business men exhibiting at the show.

The Princess Irene with a capacity of 8,600 tons is one of four new ships of the Orange line. Previously, the capacity of ships on this line were 2,600 tons.

It is expected Dutch ships will be making regular trips to such Great Lakes ports as Muskegon, Chicago, Milwaukee, Detroit, Cleveland and Toledo.

The trade commission created in 1951 has main headquarters in New York with branches in Chicago, New Orleans and Los Angeles.

Every so often people digging around in the ruins and sands of time over the world find information that leads to translation of ancient works. All of these records help with our education.

Right now with any number of people over the country cramming for their examinations that lead to graduation, masterpieces such as the "O life, O menander, which of you imitated the Other?" are asked.

Such a question by an ancient Greek shows the admiration for this playwright of the third century B. C. Until a few years ago his work was known only in fragments quoted by later writers. Early in this century the sands of Egypt gave up parts for four plays.

Menander's plays were mostly of love as seen in our everyday life: Boy meets girl, boy loses girl, boy gets girl. This familiar theme, far from being modern, runs all through Menander, and probably goes back still further. The plays are full of sententious wisdom, one line which appears in the First Epistle to the Corinthians, "Evil Communications corrupt good manners."

The presence of this quotation shows that Paul, like the other educated men of his day, had read Menander.

Two years ago another manuscript was found in Egypt, containing another play. This was published during 1958 and now has been translated into English by a Columbia University Professor Gilbert Highet. This translation is scheduled to appear in an early issue of a national magazine.

We keep on digging and finding more history about people all the time. Reams and reams are published every day about education. We have many problems. There is work for everyone. With everyone working we hope that some problems in education are solved.

Sunday School Lesson

Sunday, May 31
Elijah, God's Warrior
I Kings 19:9-18
By C. P. Dame

The prophet Elijah was a man who was suited for his work and his times. He was a reformer who came upon "the stage of Israel's history like a crash of thunder" and disappeared "from it in a whirlwind." He was a warrior who saw the enemy of his country and battled against it—Baalism.

I. God chooses His workers wisely. Between the events of last week's lesson and the event recorded in our lesson is a period of about fifty years. Jeroboam, the first king of the Northern Nation had introduced the worship of idols but he had not introduced a new religion—only a new mode of worship. Omri, an officer of the army became the founder of the fourth dynasty. He ruled twelve years and strengthened the nation.

His son, Ahab, married Jezebel, the daughter of Ethbaal, king of the Sidonians. Jezebel, a dominating person, introduced Baal worship in Israel. This religion threatened the ancestral faith of Israel, for it had behind it the prestige of the court. Ahab even built a temple to Baal in Samaria. Elijah saw the danger that faced the nation. There was a deliberate attempt made to replace the worship of Israel's God by a foreign religion which taught that Baal supplied the fruits and harvests upon which the nation depended. A crisis faced the nation and Elijah saw it.

Suddenly the prophet appeared upon the scene and pronounced judgment upon the nation. "As the Lord God of Israel liveth, before Whom I stand, there shall not be dew nor rain these years but according to my word," Elijah announced that God rules nature. After making this announcement Elijah disappeared for a time. He was miraculously fed at the brook Cherith until the brook dried up and then God told him to go to Zarephath where a widow ministered to him and then God told him to show himself to Ahab and tell him that rain would come. When the prophet told him to gather all Israel and the prophets of Baal at Mt. Carmel for a contest. There a dramatic contest took place between the prophets of Baal and Elijah. God answered Elijah with fire and the people acknowledged God. The prophets of Baal were slain at Elijah's command. A great victory had been won.

II. God's workers become discouraged. A threat from Jezebel made the bold Elijah flee to the wilderness where he sat under a juniper tree, a beaten man. An angel offered him food and with new strength he journeyed to Mt. Horeb, also called Mt. Sinai. There God asked him, "What doest thou here, Elijah?" The prophet did not belong in a cave. Evidently Elijah had overstrained himself. God gave Elijah food, sleep, a vision and a new assignment. As Elijah stood facing the mountain the Lord passed by—but not in the great strong wind, nor in the earthquake, nor in the fire, but God revealed Himself in a still small voice. We often think that God speaks through the dramatic events of life but God often honors the small things.

After the vision the prophet got a new assignment—telling him to anoint Hazael king over Syria, Jehu king of Israel and to summon Elisha to be a prophet in his room. God also told him that there were still seven thousand people in Israel who had not worshipped Baal—he was not the only one left. Elijah went to work and was his old self again. Work is a great blessing. People who work for the Lord, live.

He asked parents not to tie up the school telephones. Each school should have an evacuation or precautionary program made out and a copy sent to the civil defense headquarters.

Arthur Hills reported that a musical program is available to all children, fourth grade and above, including adults. A complete summer musical program is also scheduled.

Mrs. Charles Van Duren spoke on the mental health of the county. She said that her department worked toward prevention of mental illness. Children are referred to the department through physicians, school or court and are never cases except with parents consent. She mentioned that films and speakers were available for PTAs.

Holland Man Returns After Seven Months in Haiti

La Gonave Island, a part of Haiti, located off its mainland, now has a hospital or a dispensary unit, thanks to Wesleyan Methodist Churches. The unit is the first of its kind built on the island which is occupied by between 40,000 and 50,000 persons.

Edwin Harrington of Holland and his wife and three children, Michael, 7, Tim, 4, and Bruce, 3, returned last week after spending seven months on the island to build the hospital. Returning with them were Mr. Harrington's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Russell Harrington, of route 1, Holland, who spent the month of April with them. The latter Mr. Harrington assisted in building the hospital and also a home for the doctor.

Edwin Harrington, who was sent out by the local Wesleyan Church as an occupational missionary, built the dispensary unit of the hospital with the aid of the natives. Also assisting were the two missionaries in the vicinity, the Revs. Levi Troyer and Ferdinand Wittenburg. The new dispensary includes two wings 80 feet long, containing 12 rooms.

The hospital physician is Dr. Norbert Anderson of Daggett, Mich., a graduate of the University of Michigan. Nurses are Miss Edna Taylor of Cincinnati and Miss Leora Strobe of South Dakota.

In connection with a request for information on Tulip Time several weeks ago, Catherine P. Neumeier of Wilmington, Del., asked if a Charles Vandervor or Charles Van Buren lived in this city. The local man was described as a veteran of World War II, had been injured in Italy and had been entertained in the Neumeier home, but the family had lost track. Mail Box Improvement Week Set

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Home-Made Bomb Found Near Maplewood Public School

The fused bomb, constructed of a six-inch piece of pipe packed solid with gunpowder and capped at both ends, was found by Mrs. Eugene Schrotenboer as she worked in the garden behind her home at 97 West 48th St.

Mrs. Schrotenboer said she discovered the bomb underneath a cinderblock which she was moving to a different spot in the garden. The bomb had been placed in a small hole under the block with only the fuse sticking above the packed earth.

Mrs. Schrotenboer didn't touch the bomb but waited for her husband to return home from work. He immediately pulled the fuse and poured out the powder.

Authorities today urged residents to immediately call Holland police if they have any knowledge where other bombs may have been planted.

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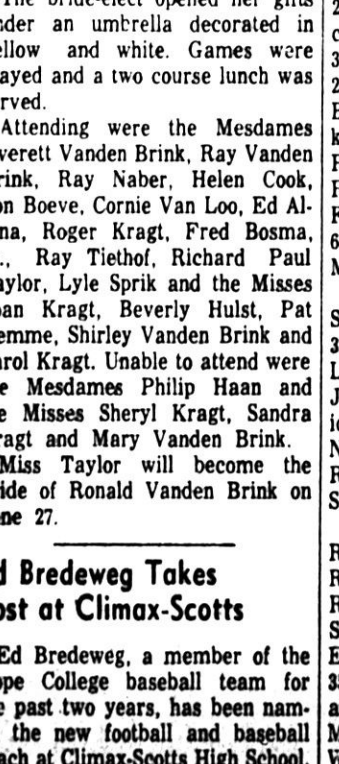
