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Walkways Under Study By Council

A recommendation of the Traffic and Safety Commission calling for gravel walkways in the vicinity of Apple Avenue School, Lakeview School and Montello Park School, at a cost of \$12,527.41 was presented to City Council Wednesday night and then referred to the city manager for study and report.

The plan calls for graveled walks on one side of the street in the vicinity of the schools as a safety measure for children walking to and from school.

Listed are Lincoln Ave., 16th to 24th Sts.; 24th St., Lincoln to approximately 700 feet east of Apple Ave.; 32nd St., Myrtle Ave. to Graafschap Rd.; Lugers Rd., 25th St. to 32nd St.; Graafschap Rd., 21st to 29th Sts.

City Engineer Harold Derks explained that the work on gravel based walks would be necessary in case further improvement were indicated. He estimated total cost of cement walks at \$41,000 and blacktop walks at \$25,000.

Two public hearings were held, neither bringing opposition. Council adopted a resolution to vacate the east 113 feet of an alley lying east of Lincoln Ave. between 14th and 15th Ets. The other resolution called for construction of a sanitary sewer in 40th St. and Brooks Ave.

Under unfinished business, Council took action to abandon construction of a water main in 40th St. from Ottawa Ave. to Graafschap Rd. since the Board of Public Works has since recommended an alternate route which Council adopted.

A petition requesting that property from 9 East 10th St. to College Ave. on the north side of the street be rezoned to C-2 central commercial was referred to the Planning Commission.

An application from John Turic, 244 Lincoln Ave., for a license to collect rubbish was approved.

A notice from the Michigan Municipal League advised Council that the annual meeting of the league will be held Sept. 7 to 9 in Detroit.

A letter from Miss Jayne Grotenhuis, 15 East 35th St., asking that Windmill Island not be operated on Sunday was referred to the Windmill committee.

A letter from Sligh-Lowry Furniture Co. commending the fire department for its prompt and effective action regarding a fire in its plant May 9 was referred to the fire department.

Council scheduled a hearing July 6 on a petition from Donnelly Mirrors Inc. to vacate a portion of Second St. between River and Pine Aves.

A letter from Architects Kammeraal and Stroop explained work involved in changing a false window in the Little Netherlands building on Windmill Island, stating that the change order for \$195 included items other than changing the window.

Council approved an agreement with Jeffrey Walters, 528 West 32nd St. to operate a food concession in the new building at the Maplewood softball facility for city-sponsored games, in which the city will receive 5 percent of gross receipts for the 1966 season.

Council received for study a city manager's report submitting a 90-day option on the wholesale grocery property at 55 West Eighth St. for \$25,000, dating from May 10. The study is in connection with parking and space utilization analysis.

Accepted with thanks was the gift of three goats valued at \$100 for Windmill Island from Mr. and Mrs. James Van Den Berg, route 3, Zeeland.

Claims against the city filed by Michigan Bell Telephone Co. of Grand Rapids and Rosemary Mitchell, 266½ East 11th St., were referred to the insurance carrier and the city attorney.

Council approved a bid of Ver Hage of Holland, Inc., of \$2,090 for a 1966 four-door Plymouth to replace a cruiser that was demolished. The bid which was not the low bid was regarded as being the best bid for the city on the basis of a 50,000 mile warranty versus a 25,000 mile warranty of another make.

Councilman Bertal Slaght at the close of the meeting took issue with City Manager Herb Holt on authorizing moving the city auditor to the conference room area on the third floor instead of the Little Netherlands office (later interpreted as Netherlands Information Bureau) on the same floor.

Holt replied that the NIS had occupied quarters in City Hall for many years and on such matters of policy and administration he felt he would be acting improperly if he arbitrarily removed the agency from the building. He pointed to the space utilization study in which he anticipates no great change in the next two years, and felt the future of the Netherlands Museum, the NIS and any changes would be carefully studied before changes are made. Mayor Nelson Bosman is a member of

the Museum Board of Governors.

Councilman Eugene Vande Vusse asked about unauthorized signs put up without permission on poles and trees and Holt replied that city employees constantly are removing them.

Mayor Bosman presided at the meeting which lasted 50 minutes. All Councilmen were present. The Rev. John Walchenbach, associate pastor of Hope Reformed Church, gave the invocation.

Msgr. Le Roux Dies at 56 In Hospital

GRAND RAPIDS — The Rt. Rev. Msgr. Arthur J. Le Roux, 56, former pastor of St. Francis de Sales Church, Holland, died Thursday at Ferguson-Drost-Ferguson Hospital following a two-year illness.

A native of Alpena, Msgr. Le Roux served parishes in Muskegon, Holland, Ludington and Spring Lake before becoming pastor at St. Stephen's here in 1961.

Msgr. Le Roux established one of the first parochial school boards in the Western Michigan diocese to include lay persons.

Currently foundations and corporations are being contacted for donations to the Project and several of these have already pledged support to the Saugatuck Project.

PROBE is headed by Dr. J. Clayton Lafferty of Detroit, and Byron Antcliff, Superintendent of Saugatuck Public Schools is general coordinator.

Miss Joyce Morrison, instructor of music at Hope College, will be one of the educators assisting with the project this summer.

He was elevated to monsignor with the title of domestic prelate by Pope Pius XII in 1954.

Msgr. Le Roux became pastor at St. Francis in 1957 upon the death of Msgr. John Westdorp. He added much to the progressive history of the church during his four years at St. Francis.

He established the parish budget plan, relocated the parish offices from the rectory into the newly constructed school and employed a full time secretary.

He was born in Fennville, son of the late Mr. and Mrs. James Alden Barron, and was associated with Michigan Fruit Canners since 1934. He attended Ferris Institute and Michigan State University.

He served as a member of the Board of Education and City Council for several years.

Surviving are the wife, Lois; a daughter, Jacqueline of Cambridge, Mass.; two sons, James who is attending Albion College and William at home; a sister, Mrs. Lloyd Wark of South Haven, and a brother, Allan E. Barron of Wyandotte.

Funeral services will be held at 2 p.m. Saturday from Chapel funeral home with the Rev. Howard McDonald of Fennville Methodist Church officiating. Burial will be in Fennville cemetery.

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Saugatuck Schools Set PROBE Test

SAUGATUCK — During the month of August this year, Saugatuck Public Schools will attempt to re-evaluate the involved process of teaching from the child's viewpoint as well as that of the teacher.

Called PROBE (Planned Revision of Basic Education), the project will make a direct appeal to the student who is in need scholastically as well as culturally, and to the instructor who is interested in experimenting with new ideas in teaching.

Working from 8-11:30 a.m., each day Aug. 2-26, pupils hopefully will have a chance to discover themselves as individuals while working under the guidance of some of Michigan's most distinguished educators in an informal atmosphere. Afternoons will provide optional opportunities for additional work in an area of the students' interest. Group meetings will be offered in science, mathematics, literature, fine arts, history and other areas during the morning hours at the Douglas Elementary School with bus transportation provided each student free of charge.

The Project is conceived on a tri-level basis: (1) School children working with distinguished educators, (2) School children working with their own faculty as well as faculty from immediate vicinities, and (3) School faculty working with distinguished educators.

Because this is an educational experiment evaluative techniques will be employed to discover the degree of effectiveness warranted by the instruction offered. Teachers will have opportunity for open discussion with each other as well as with students with the hope that a positive result from such evaluation will encourage incorporation of successful technique into the regular school program, or the continuation of such thought lines into future summer sessions. 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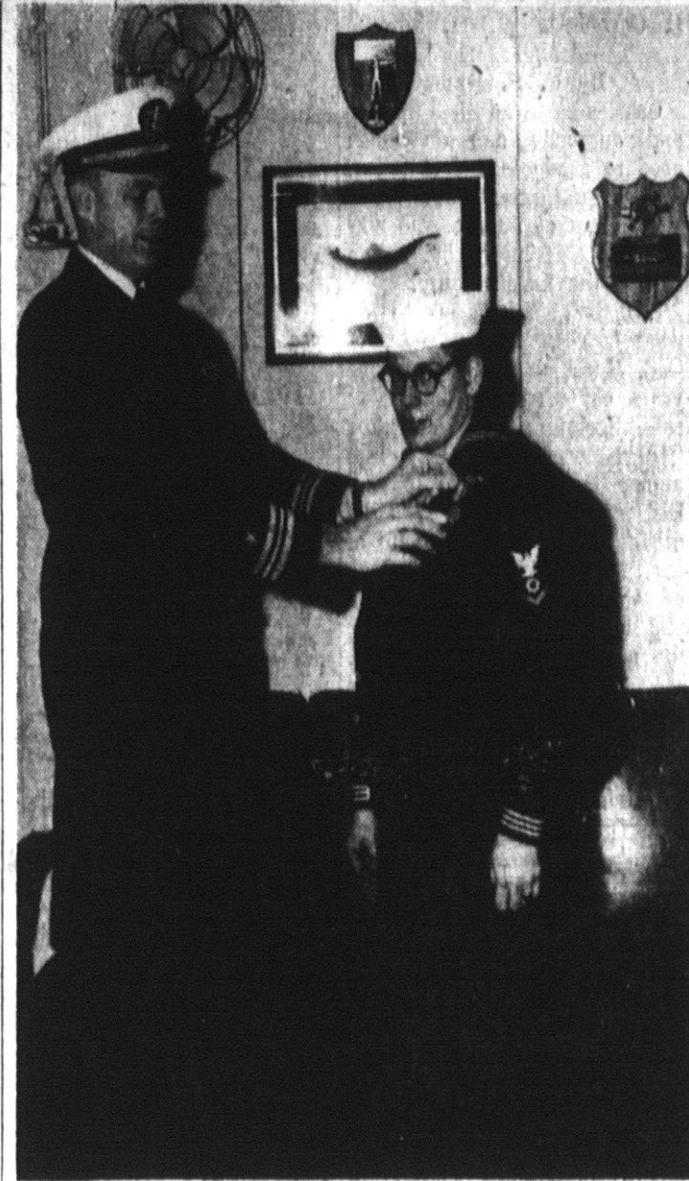

Sunday School Lesson

Sunday, June 5
Reformation Under Hezekiah
II Chronicles 29:1-11, 35b-36;
Isaiah 30:15

One man who has power and authority can do much good to a people and a nation. This lesson tells about Hezekiah, King of Judah, who was a great blessing to his nation and to the Lord's cause.

I. It is always good to do what is right in the sight of God. Hezekiah was twenty-five years old when he began to rule. Scripture says of him: "There was none like him among the kings of Judah." His name means, "God is might." This was the motto of his life. Hezekiah was the son of Ahaz, Judah's worst king and the father of Manasseh, the nation's next worst king. Most likely Hezekiah got his inspiration to serve God from his mother, Abijah.

The young king did what was right "according to all that David his father had done." We know that David sinned grievously but it is also a fact that it was his aim to glorify God. It is fine indeed when a young man chooses to follow the example of a God-fearing man.

II. Consecrated spiritual leaders are a blessing. The king realized that godliness is important. On the first month of the first reign he "opened the doors of the Lord, and repaired them." His father had closed the doors. The spiritual leaders had failed. The king told them to sanctify themselves. Evidently they had neglected their duties. The words, "and carry forth the filthiness out of the holy place" show carelessness. Worship was neglected. The king saw what ailed the nation—godlessness, and therefore he charged the religious leaders to act. "My sons, be not now negligent: for the Lord had chosen you to stand before Him, to serve Him, and that ye should stand minister unto Him, and burn incense." Spiritual workers need to be stirred up occasionally.

The king restored the Temple and worship. He even brought in pieces of the brazen serpent that Moses had made. Through couriers the king invited all Israel and Judah to come to Jerusalem to celebrate the Passover. Not all came for these messengers "were laughed to scorn and mocked." However the Passover was celebrated in a magnificent manner. The king was the leader who was responsible for the success.

III. Godliness brings joy and it did in this instance. "And Hezekiah rejoiced and all the people, that God had prepared the people: for the thing was done suddenly." A real revival of religion leads to joy.

Isaiah was a great preacher and a great statesman. Hezekiah with several other kings had revolted against Assyria. The king had sent a delegation to Egypt to make an alliance. The prophet urged the king to trust God. The Assyrian king came and conquered many cities. Some time later the Assyrian king returned and tried to capture Jerusalem but God sent an angel who smote 180,000 soldiers and the Assyrian king returned home a defeated monarch. The prophet's counsel to trust God is still good.

A warmly responsive audience enjoyed a rare treat last night when the Slovenian Octet presented a concert of vocal ensemble music that would be hard to surpass.

Considered by the Slovenian people to be their best vocal ensemble, the group has gained world renown for its magnificent depth and range of voice quality, for its warmth and richness of expression, and for its broad sweep of lively pictures of folklore, the gay dance, the mournful dirge, and the transcendent feeling it so artistically expresses in sacred song. Thursday night's audience gave the octet a standing ovation.

Outstanding in performance were the Russian Orthodox song, "Now Thou Dost Dismiss Thy Servant," in which Dragisa Ognjanovic sang the bass solo while the seven other members hummed, and the very impressive Yugoslav Orthodox "You Alone Are Holy."

The Slovenian folksong "When the Swallows Are Leaving" was most artistically executed, displaying the beautiful tenor solo by Rudolf Franci. The Negro spiritual "You Better Mind" captured sincerely the flavor of the true American folk song, and the encore, "The Wedding of the Frogs" by Vinko Voslopišec was charming.

The group appeared, after the intermission, in native costume, gay with red velvet, blue velvet jerkins with white full-sleeved blouses, boots and breeches.

This is the group's second visit to the United States, a trip made in honor of a most significant jubilee—the 15th anniversary of the founding of the Slovenian Octet of Ljubljana, Yugoslavia. Saturday the octet will sing in Milwaukee, then in Chicago, and finally Cleveland, Ohio, before returning to Yugoslavia.

dent of Elmira College, N. Y., and chairman of the board of directors of the Council on Student Travel, will give the commencement address on the topic "Horizons Unlimited."

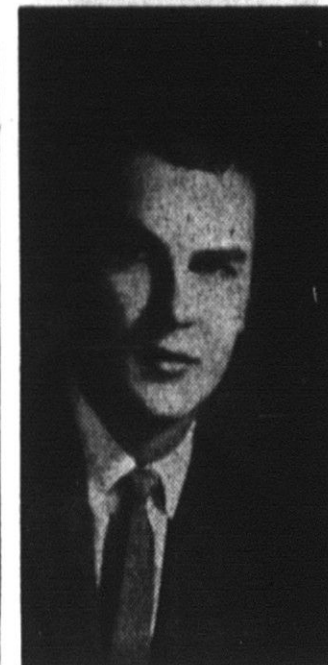

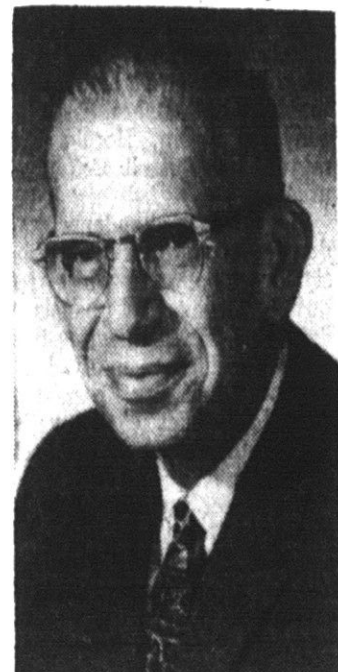
The degree of doctor of science will be conferred on Dr. Everett T. Welmers and the doctor of law degree will be

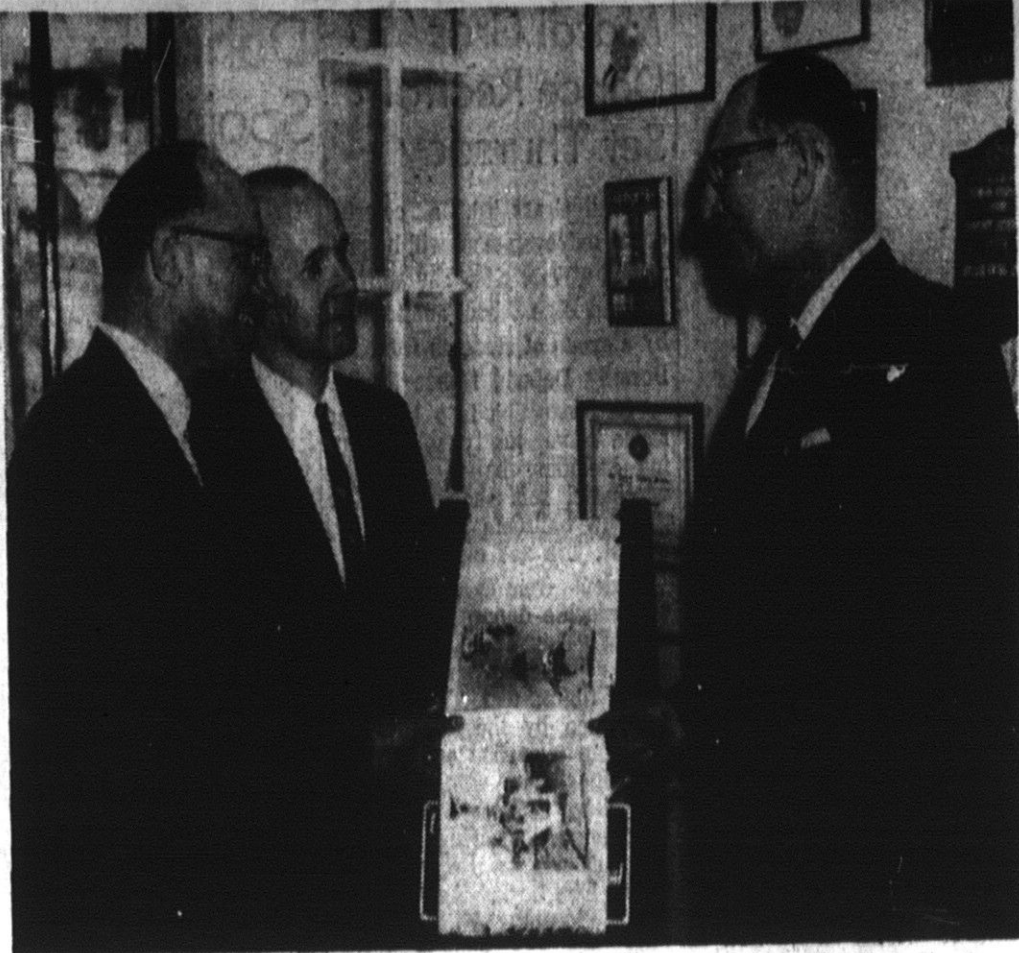

Foreign Immigration Officials Visit Holland

A pair of foreign visitors who were in Grand Rapids for a two-day session of the International Reformed Agency for Migration (IRAM) paid a visit to Holland Friday to see the tulips before returning to their foreign posts.

J. H. Hattingh, of Pretoria, South Africa, director of the Company for European Immigration, was a member delegate at the IRAM meetings Wednesday and Thursday, and N.H.H. Boessenkool, emigration attaché of the Netherlands, attached to the Royal Netherlands Embassy in Ottawa, Canada, was an observer at sessions of the IRAM which seeks to coordinate efforts of church-related agencies in world immigration programs.

They are guests of Dr. Dick Van Halsema of Holland who was elected IRAM president Thursday. Dr. Van Halsema is minister of the Central Avenue Christian Reformed Church. Hattingh was elected vice chairman.

The two men expressed a desire to see tulips and other attractions in Holland and Dr. Van Halsema accommodated them. From the Van Halsema's Central Avenue parsonage, they could see tulips in Centennial

Park and by walking a block could visit Netherlands Museum and Little Netherlands.

World patterns of migration are constantly changing, the visitors said. In the early years of settlement in the United States, the "foreign emigrant" sought a particular place of similar culture. The Dutch people sought Dutch settlements, the Germans the German settlements, and so forth.

In the World War II period and the Cuban crisis, the pattern switched to a refugee movement with people seeking escape from their home countries. Since 1955, the pattern has been one largely of economic opportunity, and advanced countries in the world are now competing for immigrants with special skills and talents.

The IRAM is not an operational program, Dr. Van Halsema explained. It seeks to aid such agencies as Church World Services in establishing immigrants in new communities. Hattingh's visit to the IRAM sessions was his first to the United States. He left Saturday for Canada and plans to spend a week in the Netherlands before returning to the Republic of South Africa.

Chicago Firm Buys Local School Bonds

The Board of Education Thursday night sold \$1½ million in general obligation bonds to Halsey, Stuart and Co., Inc., of Chicago at an interest rate of 3.8198 per cent.

It was not low bid, since low bid entered by Northern Trust Co. of Chicago was disqualified because all interest rates did not conform to specifications which called for multiples of 1/8 or 1/20 or combinations thereof. Total amount involved between the two bids was less than \$4,000 over the 25-year period.

The Halsey, Stuart bid listed a cash premium of \$211.50 and a total interest over the years of \$714,499.75.

In all, there were nine bids. Others were entered by Clark, Dodge and Co. of New York, Harris Trust and Savings of Chicago, Continental, Ill., National Bank and Trust, Bank of the Commonwealth of Detroit, First Wisconsin National Bank of Milwaukee, Detroit Bank and Trust Co. and First National Bank of Chicago.

The bond sale will finance elementary school buildings calling for additions to Longfellow and Van Raalte schools and a new school at Maplewood to be financed by a \$1 million bond issue, and a \$500,000 outdoor swimming pool. The pool construction is slated next year.

Gleason, president of Man-Marketing Services in Chicago who addressed Holland Rotary Club Thursday noon, people in executive positions should examine their situations and their rate of progress almost continuously to make sure they are capitalizing to the maximum on their potentiality.

"The old adage about doing a good job and the boss will surely notice you and give you the promotion you deserve just isn't true," he said. "In fact, you may be doing your job so well that no one else could easily replace you — and you're stuck. Or you may block yourself from learning about the job higher up, and you're left with no place to go."

Gleason suggested the young executive keep his management informed of his plans and achievements through progress reports which will indicate his capacity for greater responsibilities at higher executive levels. "He should follow a definite program of advancement for himself — get the boss's job at least every five years."

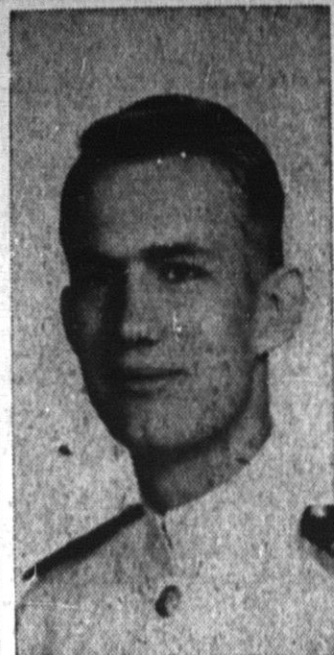
