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## Pfc. M. Hoffman Killed in Action

A Holland soldier was killed last Wednesday while fighting in Vietnam.

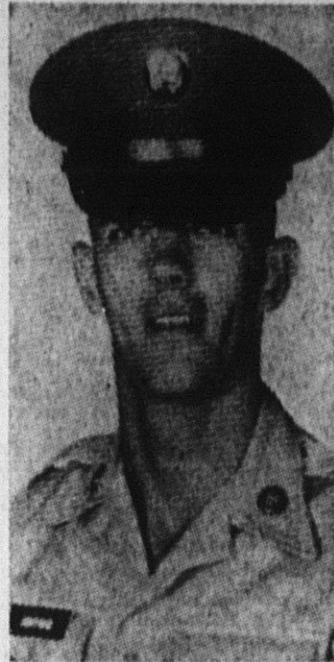
He is Pfc. Melvin E. Hoffman, 23, who made his home with Dick Bos at 457 West 23rd St. It was reported Hoffman was killed by sniper fire in Co. B, 5th Battalion, 7th Cavalry of the First Cavalry Division.

Holland's Mayor Nelson Bosman has ordered all flags in the city be flown at half-mast until the funeral.

Inducted into the Army on Aug. 31, 1966, Hoffman had been in Vietnam for the past three months. It was reported he celebrated his 23rd birthday anniversary on May 23, the day before he was killed.

Hoffman was born in Holland and had been employed at Scott's Inc.

## 2 Fatally Injured in Car Crash

BENTHEIM — A father and his daughter were fatally injured in a two-car head-on crash at 5:52 p.m. Saturday on 36th St. 7 mile south of 136th Ave. in Heath township about two miles south of Bentheim.

One driver, Alejandro (Alex) Hernandez, 35, route 1, Hamilton, was dead on arrival at Zeeland Community Hospital.

About an hour later, his 10-year-old daughter, Diane, died in the hospital.

Driver of the other car, Richard Gates, 16, Diamond Springs, was admitted to Holland Hospital overnight for observation. He had received multiple abrasions and was released Sunday.

Two others in the Hernandez car were injured. Salvador Canto, 53, route 1, Hamilton, who had received lacerations was released Sunday night from Zeeland Community Hospital. Alex Hernandez Jr., seven-year-old son of the driver, was admitted with head injuries. His condition was described as good today.

Allegan sheriff's officers said the Hernandez car was headed north on 36th St. and the Gates car south. They are continuing the investigation.

Hernandez, who was employed at the De Kleine Packing Co. of Bentheim, is survived by his wife, Lidia; a son, Alex Jr. at home; his mother, Mrs. Maria Hernandez of Lavilla, Tex.; four sisters, Mrs. Olivia Hernandez, Mrs. Orlalia Gonzalez and Lidia Hernandez, all of Lavilla, Tex., and Mrs. Guadalupe Salazar of Elsa, Tex., and a brother, Daniel Hernandez of Lavilla, Tex.

Diana is survived by her mother and brother; her grandparents, Mrs. Maria Hernandez of Lavilla, Tex., and Mr. and Mrs. Pumas Garza of Diamond Springs.

## Cyclist Critically Hurt in Crash

GRAND HAVEN — Gary Stevens, 15-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Harold Stevens, of 16220 Comstock St., Grand Haven, is in critical condition in Hackley Hospital in Muskegon with injuries received when his bicycle ran into a truck on 16th Ave. near Brucker in Grand Haven township at 5:05 p.m. Wednesday.

The youth received a skull fracture and internal injuries in the accident.

The truck driver, Donald Lee Van Oordt, 37, of 14480 160th Ave., Grand Haven, told state police the oncoming bike rider suddenly crossed the centerline and came toward the truck. Van Oordt pulled the truck onto the right shoulder and was nearly stopped when the bike hit the left front of the truck.

State police are investigating. The truck driver was not charged.

## Awarded Silver Star

First Lt. William E. Kail, Holland High School mayor 1957-58, was awarded the Silver Star March 31 for gallantry in action while serving in Vietnam. A copy of the citation was sent to Holland High School by Kail's sister, Mrs. Michael Barnes of Detroit.

The son of Mr. and Mrs. Melvin Kail, formerly of Holland, First Lt. Kail also has received a Bronze Star, the South Vietnamese Cross of Gallantry and another Silver Star.

He was awarded the Silver Star for his actions while serving as a platoon leader during an engagement with a hostile force in Vietnam in December. His citation states that he personally led his platoon against the enemy force, destroying three hostile machine gun emplacements while sustaining a minimum of casualties among his own unit. Reportedly, he repeatedly exposed himself to hostile fire while leading the platoon.

First Lt. Kail, a 1958 graduate of Holland High School, spent three years in the Army following graduation, then attended Michigan State University, graduating with honors. He has been in South Vietnam for almost a year.

## Saugatuck Has 'Quiet' Holiday

SAUGATUCK — Saugatuck authorities reported that the Memorial Day weekend was "quieter than in past years" although large throngs of young persons visited the resort village again this year.

Ervin Kasten, Saugatuck township justice of the peace, said 12 youths pleaded guilty to minor in possession of alcoholic beverages and were fined \$100 and costs and sentenced to two days in jail. A total of 51 persons, who were arrested over the weekend, posted bonds, and will return for trial this week, Kasten said. Most of the persons were picked up on liquor violations.

Saugatuck police and police auxiliary and Michigan State police patrolled the village. The downtown area of the village was closed to auto traffic when the crowds were at their peaks.

## Capacity Crowds Fill State Park

Holland State Park was filled to capacity by 11 a.m. Tuesday, Memorial Day, and, according to State Park Manager Donald Ike, some 340 cars were turned away between 11 a.m. and around 2:30 p.m. that day.

Attendance for the holiday was 11,540 persons with 1,284 annual motor vehicle permits issued and 475 daily permits issued.

Camp sites were filled to capacity by Saturday when 55 campers were turned away. Attendance for the four-day, holiday weekend was over 35,000. The yearly attendance to date, Ike reported, is 180,318 higher than the last year's total for the same date, 170,722.

Many new campers are making the scene Ike observed, adding, this is the first year camp sites were filled to capacity and campers were turned away so early in the season. Ike said camps are generally filled around June 15 when school dismisses.

De Vries covered the distance in 9:57, nine seconds faster than he had ever run it before.

West Ottawa's 880-yard relay team of Emilio Nieto, Joe Nieto, Bill Henson and Jim Harper finished tenth.

Dave Timmer set a West Ottawa record of 2:03.1 in the half mile, but did not place. Joe Nieto of West Ottawa also set a school record in the quarter mile with a time of 51.9 seconds, but did not place.

## Arraign Driver After High Speed 50-Mile Chase

James Otis Pfeiffer, 23, Byron Center, waived examination in Municipal Court Monday on charges of fleeing arrest.

He also pleaded guilty to reckless driving. Pfeiffer was bound over to Ottawa County Circuit Court for appearance June 12 on the fleeing arrest charge and will return to Municipal Court June 8 for sentencing on the reckless driving charge.

Pfeiffer was arrested by Holland Patrolman Randall Blauwkamp after a 50-mile three-county chase at speeds over 100 miles per hour Sunday morning.

Blauwkamp spotted Pfeiffer's speeding car headed east on M-21 near Waverly Rd. at 4:04 a.m. Sunday. Blauwkamp gave chase, and did not overtake Pfeiffer until Pfeiffer's car spun out of control on a gravel road near Freeport in Ionia County 50 miles east of Holland. Cruisers from Ottawa, Kent and Ionia Counties joined in the chase. Holland police said the approximately 50 miles was covered in about 36 minutes.

Blauwkamp said Pfeiffer traveled on Byron Center Rd. and from there went to 84th St. Pfeiffer reportedly ran several stop signs and drove much of the distance without his headlights on.

## Boy, 5, Revived By Holland Man

Five-year old John H. Lewis of Gary, Ind., was revived by mouth-to-mouth resuscitation administered by a Holland man after the boy fell from a boat into the Black River near Van Bragt Park at 3:45 p.m. Saturday, according to Holland police.

The boy, along with two other small children and an adult were riding in a boat operated by the boy's grandfather, Cleaster Lewis of Gary, Ind. The boat became swamped with water and capsized. The five persons in the craft made it to shore safely, but the little boy was unconscious.

James Rotman of 323 East 11th St., who was passing by the area, administered mouth-to-mouth resuscitation.

Rotman revived the child. The boy was taken to Holland Hospital where he was released after examination.

## J. Orville Yager, 73, Of Spring Lake Dies

GRAND HAVEN — Requiem high mass was celebrated Monday for J. Orville Yager, 73, of 527 East Savidge, Spring Lake, who died Friday in University of Michigan Hospital in Ann Arbor. Rites were held in St. Jean's Catholic Church in Muskegon. He was a member of St. Mary's Catholic Church of Spring Lake and a member of the Dan M. Kennedy Council, Knights of Columbus, Muskegon.

He was a veteran of World War I; serving with the U.S. Army overseas. He was employed by the Texaco Co. and also owned and operated Beverly Inn on Grand Haven Road and Lakeshore Dr., Muskegon, for many years.

Surviving are the wife; two sons, Orville of Chicago and Robert of Spring Lake; two daughters, Mrs. Jack Tighe of Spring Lake whose husband formerly was manager of the Detroit Tigers, and Mrs. Kenneth Bristow of Jackson, and 12 grandchildren.

## Two Persons Are Killed In Crash

Three Others Hurt; Two-Car Mishap Occurs North of Holland

Two persons were killed and three others injured in a three-car crash early Saturday on Lakewood Blvd., a quarter-mile west of 120th Ave.

Ottawa County prosecutor James W. Bussard Saturday authorized a warrant for manslaughter against Blas Junior Duron, 18, of 24 Analline Ave., driver of one of the cars involved in the crash. Duron was arraigned on the manslaughter charge later Saturday.

Killed in the crash were Melvin A. Keller, Jr., 18, of Cleveland, Ohio, driver of the second car involved in the collision, and a passenger in the Keller auto, 18-year-old Pamela Zeef of 2530 Leonard Rd., N. W., Grand Rapids.

Keller, a student at Calvin College in Grand Rapids, was pronounced dead on arrival at Holland Hospital. Medical examiner Dr. William Westrate, Jr., said death was due to a skull fracture.

Miss Zeef died at 7:07 a.m. Saturday at St. Mary's Hospital in Grand Rapids. She had been transferred to St. Mary's from Holland Hospital where she was taken after the crash. Doctors at Holland Hospital said she suffered head injuries.

The crash occurred at 12:04 a.m. at the US-31 overpass on Lakewood Blvd.

Admitted to Holland Hospital were the three occupants of the third car involved in the collision. Driver of the car, Maxine Mulder, 39, of 442 West Maerose Ave., was listed in good condition at the hospital with lacerations, contusions and possible chest injuries.

Also in the Mulder auto were Mrs. Mulder's mother, Mrs. Grace Vander Yacht, 65, of 131 Phillips St., Michigan Center, Mich., and Mrs. Mulder's son, Leonard Mulder, 15.

Mrs. Vander Yacht was listed in fair condition, suffering fractures of both legs and lacerations. Mrs. Mulder's son was reported in good condition with forehead and multiple contusions and abrasions.

Neither Duron nor a passenger in his car, Mario Duron, 24, of Grand Rapids, was injured.

Ottawa County deputies said Duron's car headed east on Lakewood Blvd., struck the rear of the Keller auto, also headed east on Lakewood Blvd., and forced it across the center line into the path of the westbound Mulder auto. The Mulder and Keller autos collided head-on, deputies said.

Both Keller and Miss Zeef were thrown from their auto. Deputies said Keller was lying about 20 feet and Miss Zeef about 30 feet from the car when officers arrived at the scene.

Mrs. Mulder and Mrs. Vander Yacht were both pinned in the wreckage of their auto, deputies said. Officers had to pry the two women from the wreckage.

Deputies said the Duron car skidded 112 feet before striking the Keller auto and continued for another 143 feet beyond the point of impact.

"The use of intoxicating liquor and excessive speed indicates willful and wanton conduct, characterizing this as manslaughter," Bussard said in authorizing the warrant for Duron.

The warrant for Duron was to be issued out of Grand Haven Municipal Court and arraignment on the manslaughter charge was scheduled for later today.

Mario Duron was charged with being drunk and disorderly. And sentenced to 30 days in the county jail.

The deaths of Keller and Miss Zeef were the sixth and seventh traffic fatalities in Ottawa County this year. Last year the county had recorded 11 traffic deaths by this same date.

## Board of Appeals Okays Requests

The Board of Appeals approved three applications, one of them conditionally, at a meeting Wednesday night in City Hall.

Given full approval were an application of Gulf Oil Corp. to erect a sign at a new service station at 32nd St. and the bypass higher than permitted use, and an application of 7-Up Bottling Co. of Western Michigan to place a sign on property at 777 Brooks Ave. in which both height and setback were in question.

Given conditional approval was an application of August Overway to divide property at 824 Pine Ave. into two lots and construct a single family dwelling on one lot. The condition is that the sideyard requirement must be met.



## Definition of Noise Hard To Resolve

What is noise?

City Manager Herb Holt believes one's tolerance of noise is in inverse proportion to one's age, creating a conflict of values between young and old.

He made this observation in a report on motorcycle noise to City Council Wednesday night. He couldn't resolve the issue, and the study is continuing.

He reported on a conference with the municipal judge, chief of police and the city attorney, and found that the question is complex and not easily solved because of a number of factors.

He noted it is difficult to explain to youth why their noises are offensive to more mature people. Prevailing attitudes of permissiveness no longer require youth to yield graciously to the whims of their elders, and the volume of use of all motor vehicles including motorcycles is constantly increasing.

Two elements of the problem are unnecessary and excessive noise. A noise may be excessive but necessary, or unnecessary but not excessive. Necessity is more easily determined than excess.

To clarify this issue, Holt said the police department and Municipal Court will conduct a study over the next several weeks to determine the scope of the problem and whether or not it is feasible to develop an objective standard that will have some acceptance among all segments of the community as to what is and what is not excessive.

This could lead to an ordinance change that would state that any unnecessary noise above a certain level is a violation. It could work something like the blood alcohol test law which declares that there is a rebuttable presumption that anyone with .15 per cent or more alcohol in the blood is under the influence of same.

The municipal judge also considers the location of the violation in relation to population density a factor. In this connection, the judge is developing a system to graduate the severity of the penalty in relation to density so that those convicted of creating an unnecessary and excessive noise while operating a motor vehicle in the downtown area will pay double the usual fine.

Council asked City Attorney Gordon Cunningham whether noise prosecutions had resulted in fines in court. Cunningham said several cases had been successfully prosecuted, but he was of the opinion that many border-line cases had not resulted in charges because of the lack of definition.

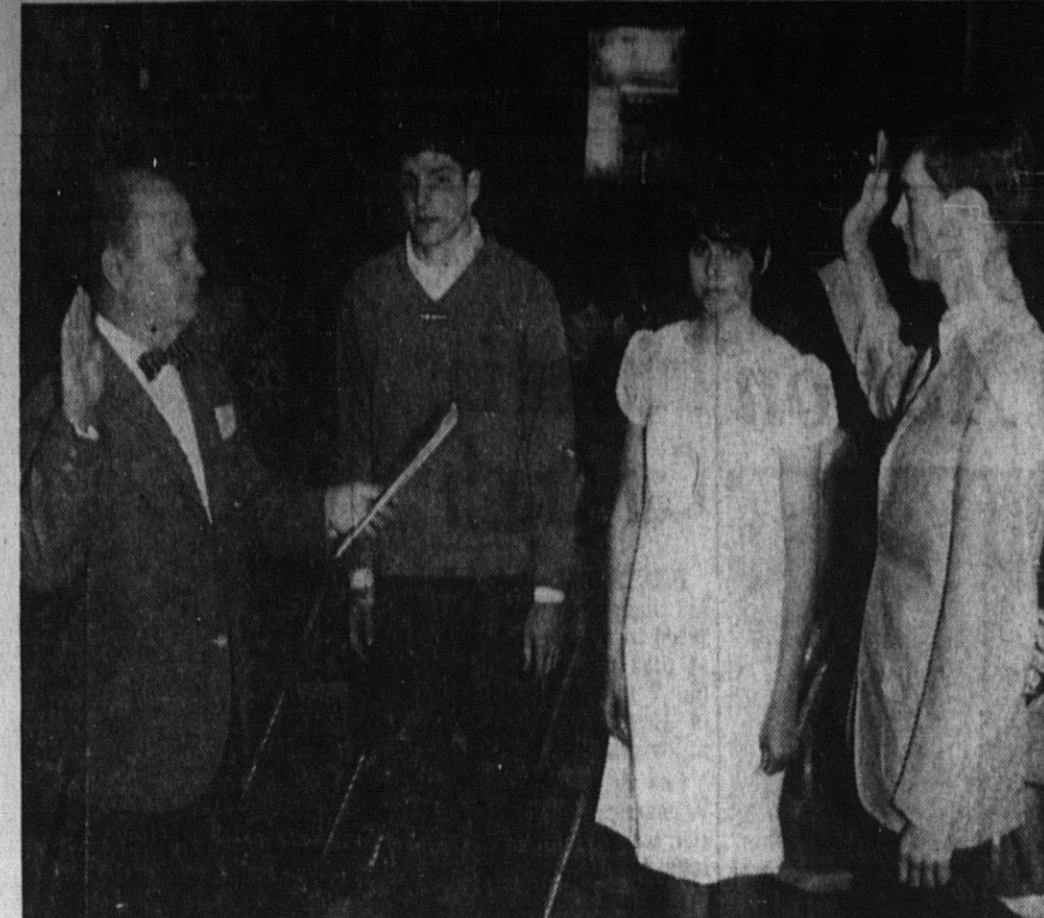

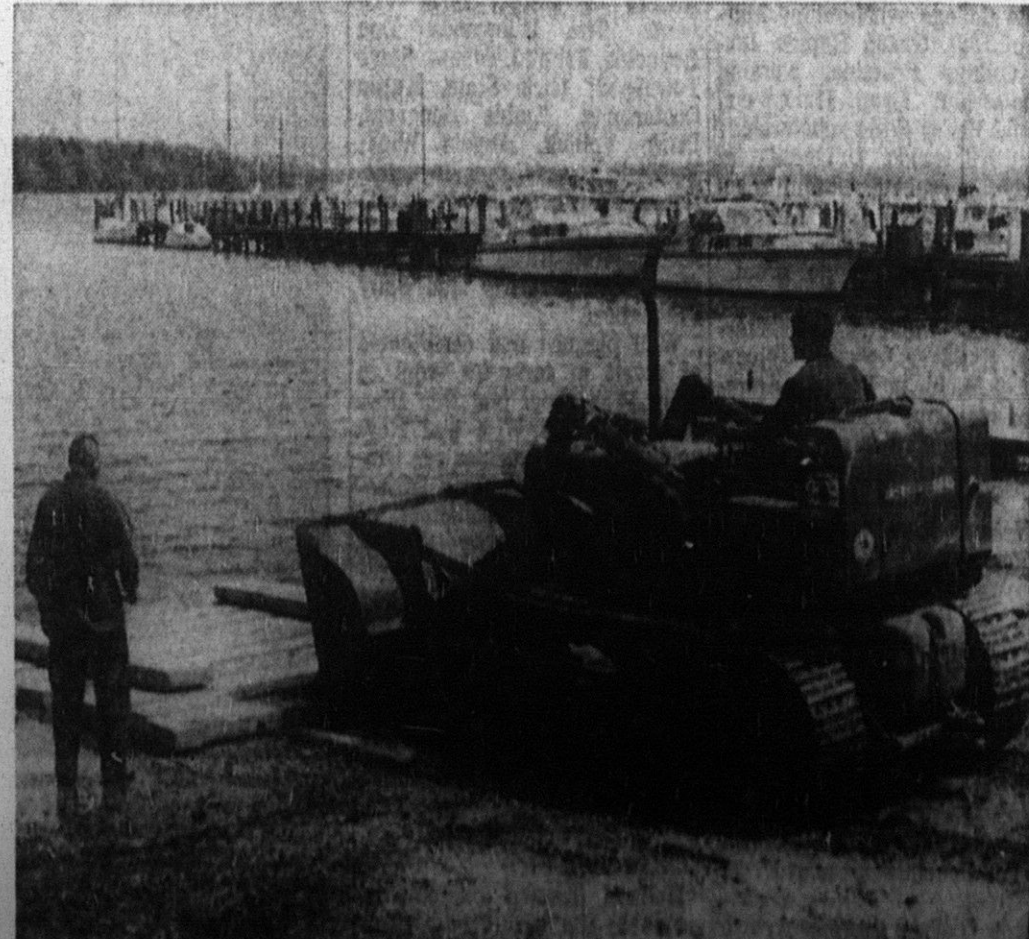

## Hillegonds Is Presented Hinga Award

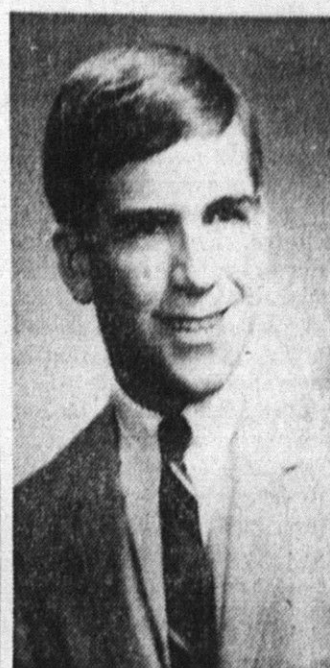
Paul Hillegonds was named the winner of the Milton L. Hinga Memorial Award at the Holland High honors convocation Wednesday.

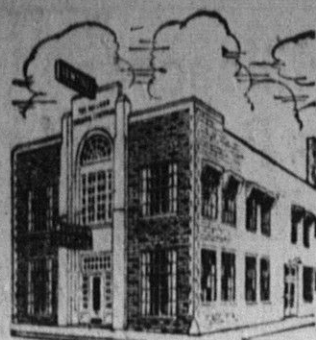

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#### MEMORIAL DAY, 1967

"It is fitting that there should  
be, in the life of nations just as  
in the life of men, hours of re-  
flection and meditation." So An-  
drew Morize began his Memorial  
Day address in the Harvard  
University Chapel on May 30,  
1925. We agree. And yet, with  
talk in the air of World War  
III being in its initial phases,  
with the announcement of the  
largest week's casualty list so  
far in the Vietnam war, and on  
the eve of the crisis in the  
Middle East, just what ought to  
be the nature of our reflections?

In our lifetime, we've heard  
Memorial Day addresses which  
were nothing more than blatant  
appeals to chauvinism and the  
arousal of the military spirit  
and others which were appeals  
to sheer pacifism as if Hitler's  
hordes could have been re-  
strained merely by a pious  
wish. Those in the former group  
need to be reminded of Gen.  
William Tecumseh Sherman's  
statements that "War is hell,"  
and "It is only those who have  
not heard a shot—that cry a-  
loud for more blood." And those  
in the latter group should real-  
ize that many have honest  
reservations and doubts about  
the truth of Benjamin Frank-  
lin's remark upon which they  
often rely: "In my opinion there  
never was a good war nor a  
bad peace."

This much most people would  
agree on: 1—it is fitting that  
we pay homage to our war  
dead, and 2—that the best way  
to do so is to do all we can,  
individually and collectively,  
to make such sacrifices unneces-  
sary in the future. This has  
been a constant yearning  
throughout our national history.  
In its early days, Thomas Jef-  
ferson voiced the plaintive plea  
of many of his countrymen  
when he said: "Will nations  
never devise a more rational  
empire of the differences be-  
tween men than force?" Later,  
in our fratricidal war, in the  
Gettysburg address Lincoln  
said: "It is for us, the living  
... to be dedicated here to  
the unfinished work which they  
fought here have thus far so  
nonably advanced." And more  
recently, our martyred young  
President John F. Kennedy  
challenged us with these words:  
"Mankind must put an end to  
war, or war will put an end to  
mankind."

Thus, admit all our pre-  
occupation with holiday trips,  
baseball games and auto races,  
let each of us in his own way  
not fail to engage in medita-  
tion and reflection upon the real  
meaning of this day!

## Sunday School Lesson

Sunday, June 4  
The Conversion of Saul  
Acts 9:1-31  
By C. P. Dame

Among some people the word  
"conversion" is out of date.  
However, Bible believing people  
stress the importance of con-  
version and like to hear about  
them.

This lesson tells the story of  
a remarkable conversion.

I. Now conversions are not all  
alike. Some are sudden, some  
are gradual. Paul's conversion  
was sudden. A mob killed  
Stephen, and Saul consented to  
his death. After Stephen's death  
Saul led the persecution which  
scattered Christians. Some  
went as far as Damascus  
which was about 100 miles from  
Jerusalem. Saul got letters  
from the religious leaders to  
arrest believers in Damascus.  
When he got near the city the  
Lord arrested him. Three  
times the dramatic conversion  
is recorded in Acts (9:3-9;  
22:4-11; 26:9-19). The Lord  
spoke directly to him and he  
replied and got orders which he  
obeyed. Saul came to Damas-  
cus, a converted rabbi, ready  
to serve.

God sent Ananias to see the  
convert who received his sight  
and the gift of the Holy Spirit  
and was baptized. After a short  
stay in Damascus Paul went  
to Arabia (Galatians 1:15-24)  
where he remained about three  
years and then went back to  
Damascus where he preached  
Jesus Christ boldly. Once he  
used his powers to persecute  
Christ, now he preached Him.

II. The gospel meets opposi-  
tion. Paul had a fine education  
plus a conversion experience  
and this accounts for his suc-  
cessful preaching ministry.  
When the Jews who opposed  
Paul could not out-argue him  
they plotted to kill him. The  
disciples heard of the plot and  
so they "took him by night,  
and let him down by the wall  
foes "watched the gates day  
and night to kill him" they  
were outwitted and Paul came  
to Jerusalem. Alt through his  
life Paul faced opposition as he  
preached the gospel. Let us  
not forget that the gospel is  
still opposed. Its enemies are  
not asleep.

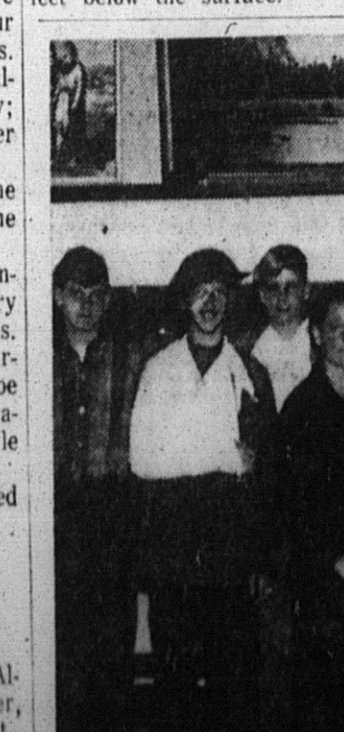
III. The brotherly in our  
churches are an asset. Paul  
faced a problem in Jerusalem.  
He longed for fellowship and  
tried to "join himself to the  
disciples; but they were all  
afraid of him, and believed  
not that he was a "disciple."  
We can't blame these disciples  
much for their attitude because  
Paul had a reputation. One  
man was on the job, Barna-  
bas, who introduced Paul to  
the apostles. He told them  
about his conversion and his  
bold preaching in Damascus  
and they accepted him. In  
Jerusalem the new convert  
preached so effectively that the  
Jews, when they felt defeated  
in debate, plotted to kill him.  
The disciples brought Paul to  
the port of Caesarea and there  
he took ship for Tarsus.

The last verse of the lesson  
text says that the churches  
had rest and "were edified;  
and walking in the fear of  
the Lord, and in the comfort  
of the Holy Ghost, were multi-  
plied." The early church grew.  
New converts "were added  
daily" and the believers were  
"established in the faith." The  
church had much opposition  
and yet there was growth.  
Why do many churches fail to  
grow today? What is the trou-  
ble? Perhaps a fresh study of  
Christians and their beliefs  
might help. More men of the  
type of Ananias and Barnabas,  
members who have the brother-  
ly, concerned spirit are needed!  
Why not try to be one?

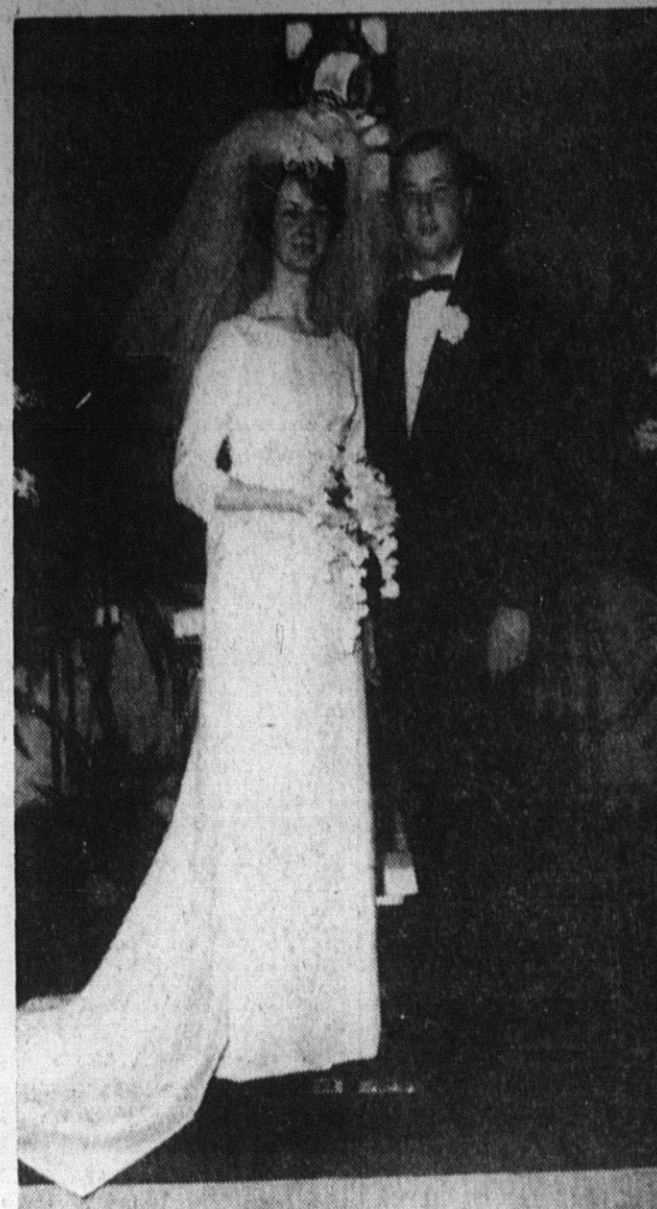

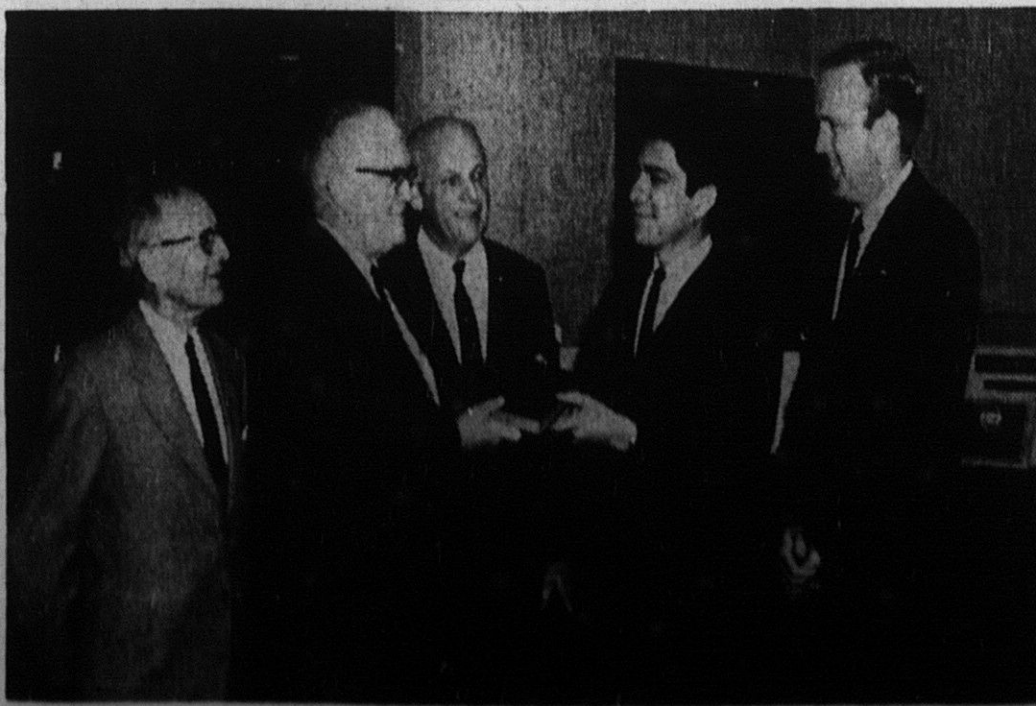

## Hospital Costs Explained At Auxiliary Luncheon

Hospital costs and their upward spiral were explained by Donald E. Walchenbach, president of the Michigan Hospital Association and director of Mc Laren Hospital of Flint, at the annual luncheon of the Holland Hospital Auxiliary Thursday noon in the Woman's Literary Club.

"Low hospital costs in the past were at the expense of an impersonal subsidy on the part of hospital employees," Walchenbach said in explaining today's costs. He submitted three typical cases, all of them involving surgery. One was acute appendicitis involving a five-day stay at a total of \$320.65; another 19 days for a diabetic with complications costing \$1,099.80, and the third a 19-day stay involving serious illness and intensive care for \$1,701.15.

He said the much-used comparison of hotel-motel services would remove \$8.80 from the day's cost and food would remove \$3.45, much of it dietary demanding services of professional dietitians. Nursing care around the clock costs \$21.12 and laboratory and x-ray \$23.50 for a day's total of \$56.94.

There are 2½ employees for every hospital patient, he explained, and a recommended 10 per cent increase in the Flint hospital plus some fringe benefits would boost annual salaries by \$720,000. "We must pay our people salaries commensurate with their neighbors to insure quality service," he emphasized.

He said implementation of the Medicare program alone last year called for four additional clerks in the office just to process forms, with no financial consideration from the government for the extra work.

"Unless formulas are revised by Congress, the ability to maintain our facilities will deteriorate," he said. "Now Congress is considering Comprehensive Health Planning and this new arrangement is a threat to the hospital volunteer setup. All things are relative and we must equate all these new changes with value received."

"We have tried everything to cut down costs," used computers, automated equipment, new buildings trying to save steps and many other things. But in the long run it takes people well paid people — to take care of hospital patients. Hospital costs are not going down, and when you think about the entire picture, you probably won't want them to," he concluded.

Mrs. Gerald Rocks, retiring president, introduced new officers: Mrs. John K. Winter, president; Mrs. S. W. Kuipers, vice president; Mrs. Carl Harrington, secretary, and Mrs. Glenn Mannes, treasurer.

Mrs. Richard Oudersluis represented the Hospital Board in expressing appreciation to the auxiliary for its continuing aid, both in gifts and in service. She also explained plans for color combinations in furnishings for the new hospital wing currently under construction.

Hospital Director Frederick S. Burd, in addition to thanking the auxiliary for its gifts and services, said the organization is invaluable in hospital public relations and aids immeasurably in clearing many situations in which information is mixed up. He said, hopefully, that a year hence the hospital addition would be completed and many areas would be occupied. He presented a past president's pin to Mrs. Rocks.

About 315 children in kindergarten through sixth grades contributed. Principal of Pine Creek is Mrs. June Reimink.

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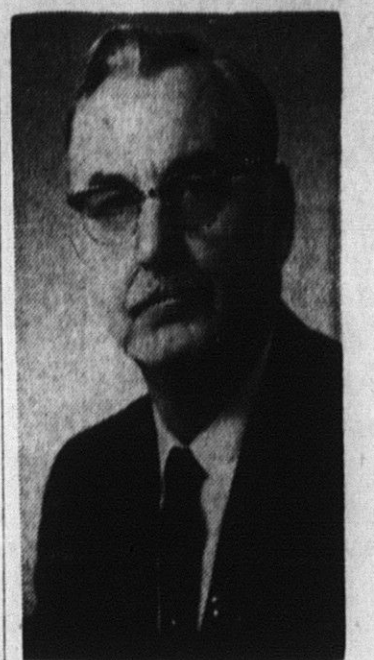

## Tribute Is Paid Honored Dead in Memorial Rites

Not only tribute for the war dead who paid the supreme sacrifice but a call for ideals to preserve peace marked an address by Henry Kleinheksel, business manager of Western Theological Seminary, at Memorial Day ceremonies Tuesday morning in Pilgrim Home cemetery.

Cemetery ceremonies followed a Memorial Day parade of 13 local bands, military units, floats and youth groups which lined up at Centennial Park. The line of march was stopped twice for C and O trains at the 16th St. crossing.

Ideal, sunny weather greeted paraders and the large crowds which lined the streets. The pleasant weather was in sharp contrast to rainy weather over most of the nation.

In speaking on "The American Dream," Kleinheksel said people gather on Memorial Day in obedience to the desire to hold green and fresh the memory of those who gave their lives so that freedom might be preserved and enlarged.

He recalled some blots on American history in which pioneers ruthlessly drove the Indians from the Atlantic to the Pacific... a situation in which Holland's Dutch forebears did not engage in since the last Indian settlement near the Heinz plant moved away.

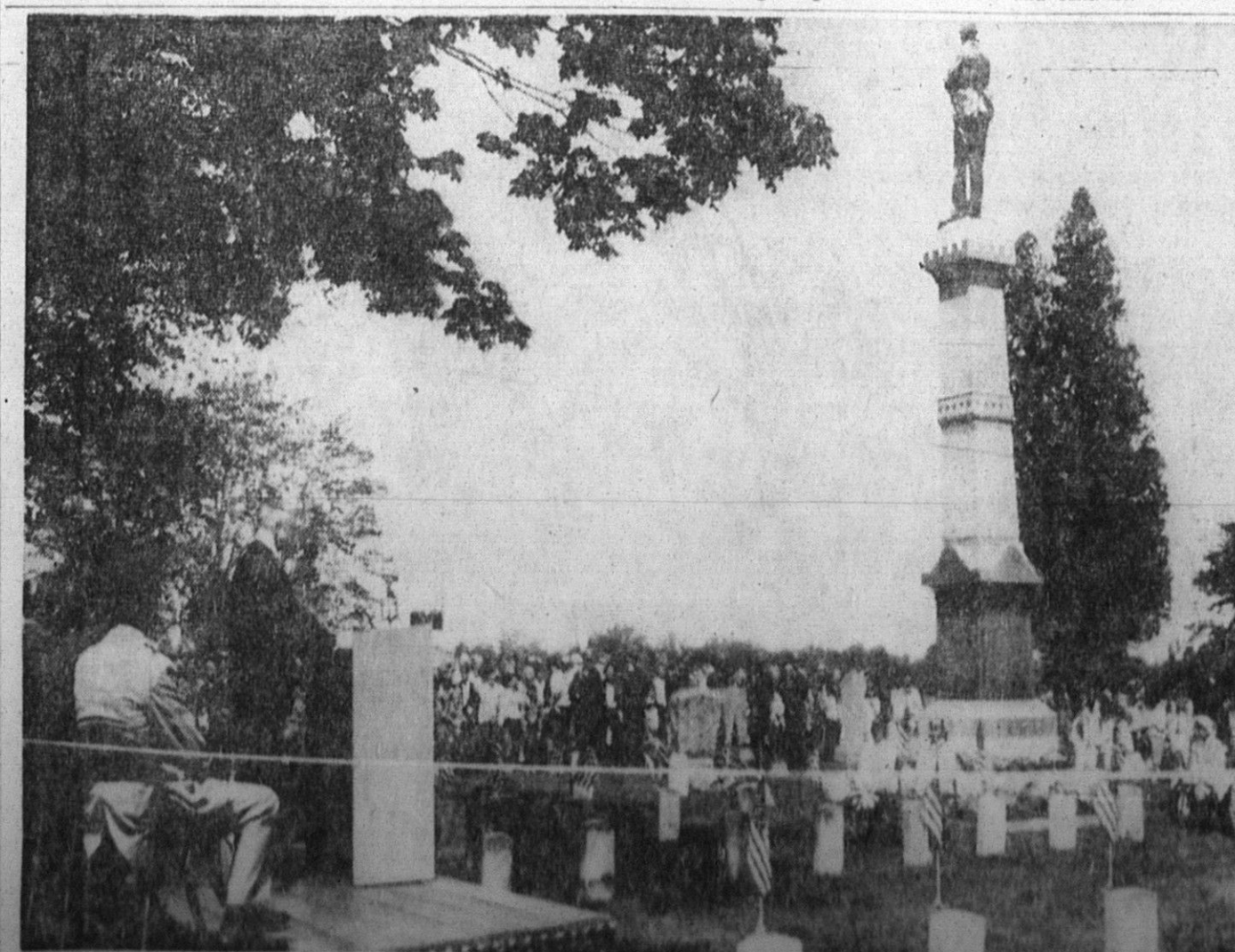
"Yet when the call came for the Civil War, this settlement answered the union call by sending 129 men to settle slavery and preserve the union. Today there is still strife in the south, and until all men understand that in denying equality to others they are defying not alone the Supreme Court but the Supreme Ruler of the Universe, there will be no justice and no certain peace."

marked grave that was found only by chance. They took a plunge into the blackness of human evil. They paid the price of daring to look at and question the lies about our moral selves.

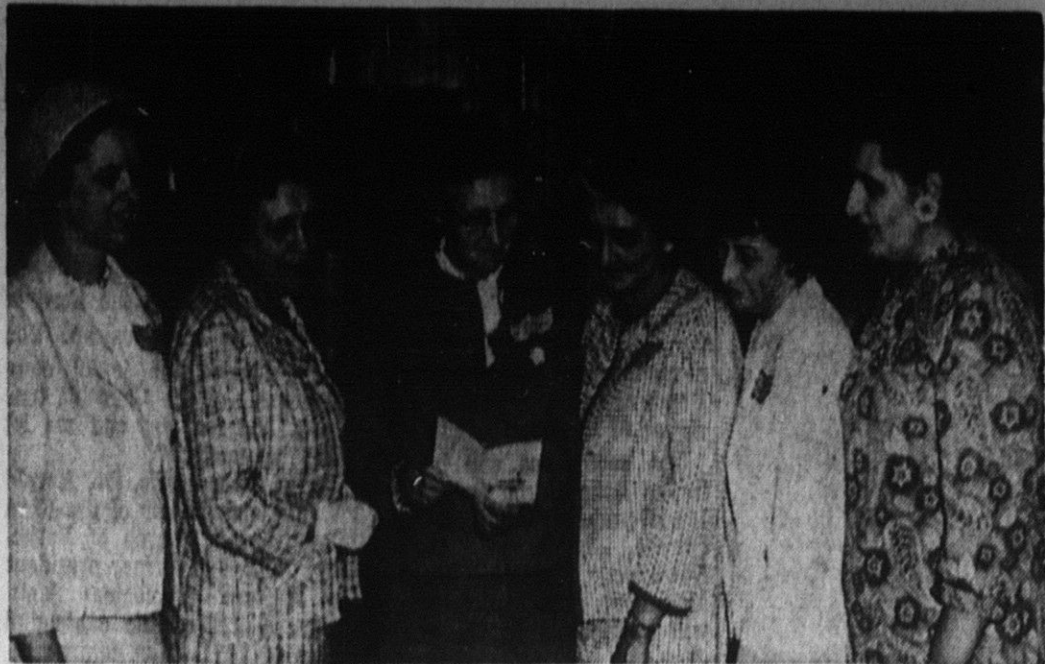

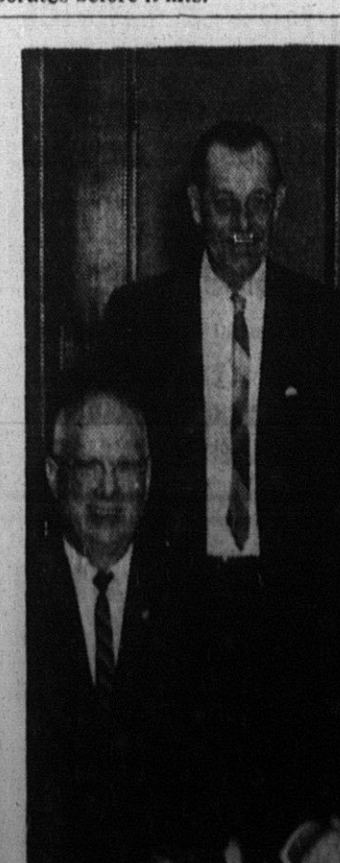

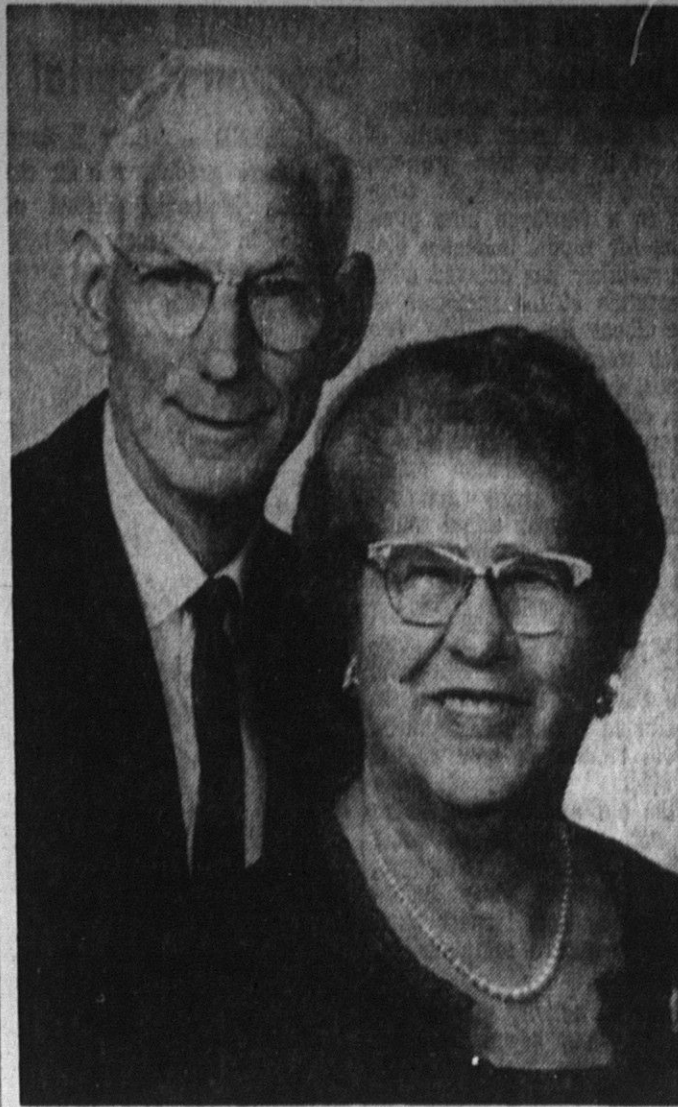

The organization meeting to form an Ottawa County Chapter of the Council for Exceptional Children was held Thursday at Jefferson School.

Purpose of this organization is to promote the welfare and education of exceptional children by coordinating the work of the various groups, agencies, and individuals, both public and private, who are engaged in or interested in the welfare of such children.

This chapter will be affiliated with the Michigan Federation of the Council for Exceptional Children, a department of the National Education Association. The group is to have at least four professional meetings each fiscal year at a time and place designated by the executive board.

Such a group met including members from Grand Haven, West Ottawa, Allendale, Zeeland, Coopersville, and Holland. The steering committee submitted the proposed constitution which was adopted.

Election of officers was held and the following were elected: President, Paul Trap, Junior High Type A teacher, Grand Haven Public Schools; president-elect, Ben E. Krill, teacher of the perceptually handicapped, Grand Haven Public Schools; secretary, Mrs. Ada Stall, County Type B program.

West Ottawa Public Schools; treasurer, Mrs. Ella Bloemberg, Primary Type A teacher, Holland Public Schools.

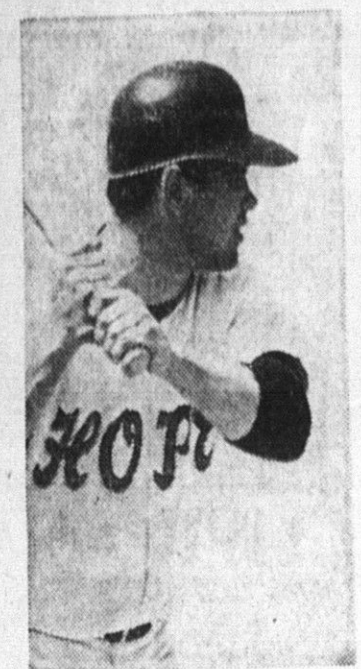
## Langeland Named MIAA Top Player

## Ottawa County Farm News

The latest Insect Report, of interest to pine tree growers, indicates that blacklight trapping in a Newwaygo pine plantation for moths indicates that cool weather has delayed adult emergence of the Eucosma or Pine Shoot Borer. While two males were caught early this month, no females have yet been collected. Apply DDT concurrently with, or shortly following peak population emergence (when males and females emerge in equal numbers). A more detailed report will be issued when this optimum control period arrives.

The report warns that complete hatch of the European Pine Sawfly has occurred in several mid-Michigan counties. Larval feeding is now at the "straw-like" appearance stage on the old needles. Egg hatch has not yet begun in some northern counties (Newaygo, Ottawa Counties, etc.) Before applying controls inspect plantations to ensure complete larval activity.

Nymphal activity of the Spider Mite has begun in some protected pine plantations. If mites have been a problem in the past, apply a spray to give control of active mites and eggs (for this information consult bulletins E-530 "Insects Affecting Woody Ornamental Shrubs and Trees" or E-533 "Christmas Tree Insect Control"). Either of these publications is available in our office.

Two revised bulletins have also arrived this week and may be obtained by calling the office in Holland, located on the corner of US-31 and James St., or our Grand Haven office, in the County Building. "Rates for Custom Work in Michigan" No. E-458 will assist you in determining a charge for custom services, and as flies present a constant household insect control problem the Home and Family Series has published a bulletin No. 566, entitled "House Flies and their Relatives." This explains the stages of the fly's life cycle, identifies the most common species and discusses the various control measures.

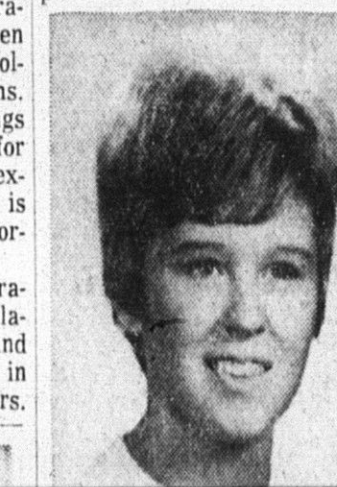

## Dr. H. Englund Keynotes Seminary Graduation

"The second century of the seminary may be very different from the first, but the Lord of the Church leads us on. You are promised the joyful companionship of the Church's true Lord, and for you and me let that be enough!"

With these words, Dr. Harold N. Englund, pastor of the First Presbyterian Church of Berkeley, Calif., and former president of Western Theological Seminary, addressed the centennial class of 1967 at the commencement service of the Western Theological Seminary in Dimment Chapel on Wednesday evening.
