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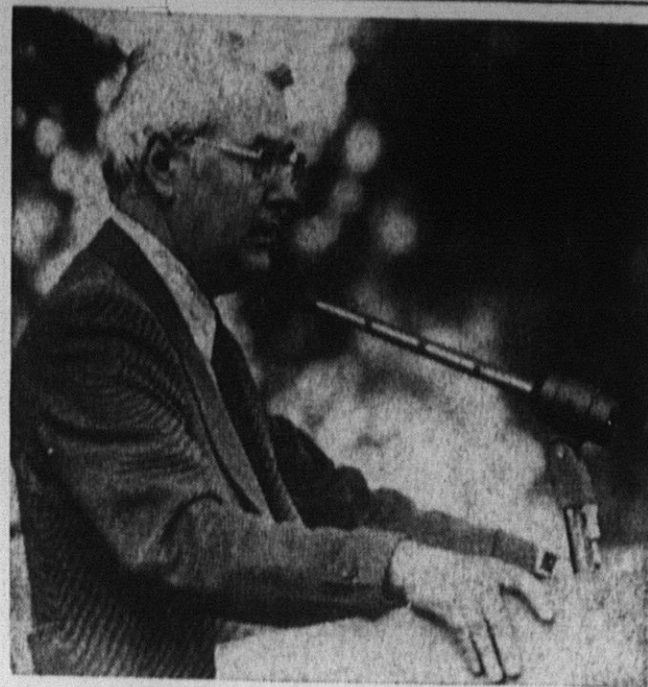


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JUDGE STOPPELS SPEAKS AT CEMETERY

Tribute Is Paid To Early Days

Kent County Probate Judge A. Dale Stoppels memorialized not only the war dead in his Memorial Day oration in Pilgrim Home cemetery Monday morning but he paid tribute to school teachers, parents, grandparents, Sunday school teachers and many others for lessons learned in early years which have benefitted the people through life.

A former Holland resident, Judge Stoppels said he is always happy to return here, but one can never really go back... the house he lived in has been torn down for a church parking lot... the school has been replaced by a new modern structure...

He pointed to the constitution which says that all men are created equal and they are endowed by their creator with cer-

tain inalienable rights—something guaranteed 200 years ago, yet today political espionage and questionable things by people in high places have cast a pall on respect for government, and it is no wonder that youth has become cynical.

Yet, he expressed strong convictions that America can cope with its problems, that the war dead did not die in vain, and the best way to honor the war dead is to believe in government, to believe it will work, "that we will make it work and our republic will continue to live."

The cemetery program followed a parade under overcast skies, but no rain. Ben Cuperus was honorary marshal of the parade which featured close to a dozen bands, patriotic orders, National Guardsmen and other units. William Sikkel was marshal.

Juvenile Arrested In Fire Start

The State Fire Marshal's Office, the Holland Fire Department and the Holland Police Department issued a joint statement today in reference to the Mass Furniture Store fire and the fire at Reliable Cycle Shop which happened on Jan. 25 and is still under investigation.

A young, male juvenile from the Holland area has been apprehended and has admitted to setting the fire to some trash at Reliable Cycle. The juvenile has been referred to Ottawa County Probate Court.

Officials stated that there is a slight possibility that the fire behind Reliable Cycle, which was reported first, and the fire inside the Mass Furniture building could be connected. However, investigators are still seeking a male juvenile, 13 to 16 years of age, 5'7" to 5'10", thin build and bushy hair, wearing a dark jacket and plaid pants. This subject was observed leaving the 10th St. entrance door, which leads to the office area above the area of the paint store, at 6:05 p.m. just prior to the fire.

Officials ask for the assistance of any person who may have observed this subject in the area of the Mass Building to please contact the Holland Police Department.

Three Injured In Auto Crash

Three persons were injured and required hospital treatment in a three-car collision Friday at 4:55 p.m. at James St. and US-31.

Admitted to Holland Hospital with a fractured collar bone and listed in "good" condition today was George Anacker, 78, of Bettendorf, Iowa, driver of one car. His wife, Helen, 75, was treated in the hospital for bumps and bruises and was released.

Also treated in the hospital and released was William Bridges, 17, of 5833 128th Ave., driver of a second car.

Ottawa County deputies said Bridges was southbound on US-31 and struck the Anacker car eastbound on James and which allegedly failed to yield to traffic. The Bridges car then struck a car waiting in the median of US-31 and operated by George Unger, 69, of Grand Haven. He was not reported injured.

Mares Trial To Begin June 5

GRAND HAVEN — The trial of Jose Daniel Mares, 18, of Holland, charged in connection with the Oct. 30 beating death of Jesse (Tex) Smith, 80, of Holland is scheduled to begin June 5 in Ottawa Circuit Court.

Mares and another Holland youth, Domingo Ramirez, 20, were arrested following an investigation into the death of Smith whose body was found in a drainage ditch along the south side of Ottogan St. east of Holland in Allegan County.

Ramirez was sentenced to prison Dec. 27 to 18 months to 10 years on his guilty plea of larceny from a person.

Detectives said they believed the alleged beating of Smith occurred in Zeeland township of Ottawa County and that Smith's body was dumped into the ditch on the Allegan County side of Ottogan St.

A reported confession received by Ottawa County deputies last November by Mares cannot be used in the trial, Judge Wendell A. Miles has ruled.

In an opinion filed in Circuit Court, Judge Miles said that "the defendant will be considered to have been unable to consent to interrogation without an adult representative present who could have reasoned with Mares and acquainted him with the consequences of a confession."

Public Defender Joseph Legatz contended that Mares was not capable of understanding his rights at the time of interrogation "because of his mental condition." Mares has been in the county jail since Nov. 1.

State mental health authorities have declared Mares capable of standing trial. Three days, June 5-7, have been set aside for the trial.

Local Employment At Record High

Industrial employment in Holland in May reached an all-time high of 10,153 persons, according to the Holland Chamber of Commerce which makes regular monthly studies of local employment.

The employment represented an 8.96 per cent increase over the employment figures of last May and a 9.74 per cent increase over April, 1972.

The Chamber said a rise in industrial employment is expected to continue as Area III of the South Side Industrial Park is developed by HEDCOR.

Youngster 'Fair' After Hit by Car

ZEELAND—Jonathan Herbert Berens, 22-month-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Herbert Berens, 1044 64th Ave., injured Saturday at 5:18 p.m. when struck by a car, was listed in "fair" condition Tuesday in Butterworth Hospital in Grand Rapids with head injuries, a skull fracture and body lacerations.

Ottawa County deputies said the youngster apparently darted into the path of a car driven by Ben Diekema, 52, of 147th Ave., Zeeland, which was southbound on 64th Ave., north of Adams St. and skidded 133 feet before coming to a stop.

The youngster was taken first to Zeeland Community Hospital and then transferred to Grand Rapids.

A total of 347 seniors are scheduled to receive diplomas.

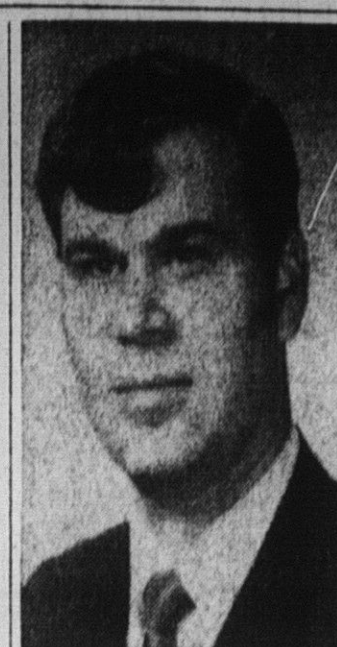
Rowan, a graduate of the 1940 class of Holland High School, graduated from Michigan State University in 1947 with a degree in business administration and accounting after attending Hope College for two years.

As a member of the local National Guard unit, he was mobilized with that unit in late 1940, and was discharged from active duty before World War II was declared, but reentered the service in 1942. He was later commissioned and eventually rejoined the 32nd division in the South Pacific. He was recalled during the Korean War, serving as an Army captain in several capacities.

After graduating from MSU, he joined the firm of Touche Ross and Co., and except for military service was employed by that firm until 1955 when he joined Fruehauf. He has served successively as controller, vice president, executive vice president and president of that firm.

Rowan is a member of the American Association of Certified Public Accountants, the Detroit Chamber of Commerce and the National Defense Transportation Association. He is a member and past president of the Oakland Hills Country Club in Birmingham, the Detroit Athletic Club and the Sky Club of New York. 3 Injured In Auto, Train Crash

Three members of a Wyoming family suffered serious injuries Sunday at 6:15 p.m. when their 1972 model car struck a freight train at the crossing on 141st Ave. a quarter mile east of 56th St. in Fillmore township south of Holland.

Admitted to Blodgett Memorial Hospital in Grand Rapids with head and chest injuries was Mrs. Shirley De Graff, 36, driver of the car. Her condition Tuesday was listed as "critical".

Admitted to Holland Hospital was James De Graff, 43, with internal injuries, fractured ribs, fractured pelvis and lacerations and abrasions, and the couple's daughter, Terrie, 12, with a fractured right foot. De Graff was in "serious" condition and Terrie in "good" condition today.

Allegan County deputies said the car was eastbound on 141st Ave. and apparently failed to see the freight train approaching from the north. The car struck the first engine in the side near the fuel tank. Deputies said the crossing had no signals but was marked by cross arms.

Social Security Opens Full Service Office

Christian Schools Report on Drive

A community fund drive for Holland Christian Schools reports 75 per cent attainment with one division reporting 119 per cent of its goal. The community goal was \$100,000 and the funds are being obtained to liquidate the debt of the Christian school system.

William Clay, chairman of a meeting Friday at which division chairmen reported on the Good Thing fund drive, said it was "encouraging to see such a spontaneous community response to the needs of this institution."

Bond Issue Calls For \$6.5 Million

Swimming Pools Are
Separate Proposal;
Two Sites Acquired

Holland school district voters will face a proposition to build two new junior high schools at the annual election June 11.

Proposal I would borrow \$6,500,000 for building, furnishing and equipping the two buildings.

Proposal II would borrow \$750,000 for two new swimming pools at each school site.

School sites of approximately 30 acres each have been acquired on 24th St., one to be known as Junior High West on 24th St. at Plasman, and the other to be known as Junior High East on 24th St. at Apple Ave.

The tax rate for the new schools and swimming pools will be approximately 3 mills per year, or a half-mill more than the total school tax levied last year. The issue would extend over 30 years. The 1973 summer school tax will be reduced by 2.5 mills as a result of April's millage election.

If passed, the junior high millage would not be levied until the summer of 1974.

Plans call for two identical buildings to accommodate an initial student enrollment of 700 each. Future additions of six classrooms could increase each building to a capacity of 900 students.

Plans, as developed by Kammeraad, Stroop and Vander Leek, call for separate specialized areas such as physical education, music, unified arts and the academic pods.

The academic pods are designed with flexibility in order to meet changes in educational demands, by the use of movable walls. Academic pods are (Continued on page 8.)

Plans arranged around the Instructional Materials Center which will provide numerous resources as well as rooms for conferences and special education facilities.

Plans also call for a typing room and language labs; a flexible science pod allowing four individual science rooms; a unified arts area with modern facilities for home economics, drafting, art, wood and metal shops; adequate general offices and guidance offices; band and choral rooms, and a cafeteria with dining facilities for 350 students as well as facilities for drama, musical programs, etc.

The gymnasium provides a floor area large enough for two teaching stations as well as a regulation 50 by 84 foot basketball court. A third teaching station is a balcony area over the locker rooms.

The swimming pool is Olympic size, 45 by 75 feet, with a separate 32 by 24 foot diving well, and seating capacity for 500 spectators.

Each school site consists of approximately 30 acres. All services such as water, sewer and gas are available at each location. Adequate land area is available for parking, athletic fields and for future building expansion.

Supt. Donald L. Ihrman pointed out that junior high students have been housed in six separate buildings covering two city blocks, posing serious problems in health, safety and control.

The decision of the Board of Education to seek voter approval for two new junior high schools stems from the board's belief that schools are a social as well as an educational institution. The optimum size of junior high schools ranges from 600 to 800 students, and E.E. Fell Junior High School presently enrolls 1,205 students.

In 1969 the University of Michigan recommended that Holland construct two new junior high schools, based on its survey and analysis of educational needs in this community. The Citizens Advisory Committee appointed in 1970 also supported the decision for two schools.

Should the proposition pass in the June election, long range plans fall for taking bids in March, 1974, and completion of the two schools in September, 1975.

Ottawa Cited for Helping Welfare Clients Get Jobs

GRAND HAVEN — With Ottawa county ranking 83rd among Michigan's 83 counties in low percentages receiving welfare, this county will receive a national achievement award in Dallas in mid-July for helping welfare clients become self-supporting.

William Winstrom, chairman of the Ottawa County Board of Commissioners, has been in-

formed that the county achievement award will be presented by the National Association of Counties which will attract some 3,000 county officials to Dallas.

The award recognizes the county's strong commitment to providing effective social services. In progress for the past two years, the Ottawa program emphasizes the full range of client needs.

"You can't expect an ADC mother to support her family when she has no job skills, no transportation to work and no one to care for her pre-school children," says Larry Hilldore, Ottawa Social Services director.

"Ottawa county has tried to move away from the idea of the social services department as a dispensary for welfare checks. We're emphasizing job training, veterans' services and even legal aid when necessary."

Hilldore cites strong support from the Board of Commissioners as an important factor in his department's success. The caseload was reduced over six per cent during a six-month period last year.

Etching Program To Prevent Crime

A program designed to determine crime through the use of identification numbers etched on personal property will be conducted in Holland through the cooperation of the police department, Holland Exchange Club and the Holland Independent Insurance Agents.

Called "Operation Identification," items of value are engraved with the owner's driver's license number with electric engraving tools that will be available to the public at no cost.

Driver's licenses are easily traceable to the owner.

Holland police chief Charles Lindstrom said most stolen items are not kept by the burg-

lars but are sold for cash. Criminal purchasers do not want identifiable items. Should police agencies come in contact with subjects with questionable items ownership can be traced and the subjects held for possession of stolen goods. Lindstrom said the return of missing items is almost guaranteed.

Items that could be marked include appliances, bicycles, guns, television and radios, sporting goods, musical instruments, tools and photographic equipment.

Under the program, electric engraving tools will be made available to the public for two

days at a time and may be obtained at the Holland Police department.

A sticker which reads "All items of value on these premises have been marked for ready identification by law enforcement agencies" is given the citizen for application to the most likely points of entry to his home.

Lindstrom said use of the engravers and proper marking of the premises will effectively reduce the opportunity for crime to happen.

"Operation Identification" in Holland is to begin officially June 1.

The program is national and had its beginning in 1963 in Monterey Park, Calif. Lindstrom said almost all participating agencies and communities have experienced a marked reduction in burglaries and loss of valuable personal items.

I-196, Engineer's Topic At Luncheon in Zeeland

ZEELAND — Hubert Koster, district construction engineer of the Michigan State Highway Department, addressed the executive luncheon Thursday noon in Van Raalte's in Zeeland, sponsored by the Zeeland Chamber of Commerce. This is the fourth annual luncheon sponsored by the Chamber and approximately 100 business and professional people attended. This event is part of the Michigan Week program in Zeeland.

Koster, who is in charge of highway construction in seven counties including Ottawa, began his talk by pointing out that I-196, presently under construction, has seven contracts for construction. It cost \$32,500,000, is 24½ miles long and cost \$1.5 million per mile to build. He referred to I-196 as it is being built from Jenison to south of Holland.

Koster pointed out that rain in the late summer of 1972 and the spring of 1973 has caused a delay in the completion of the road. "Contractors are behind", said Mr. Koster. "While the highway was originally scheduled to be open to traffic

in 1973, it will now be open to traffic by Labor Day of 1974". Koster observed. He mentioned that paving could be done in Ottawa County in 1973 but not the portion in Allegan County. "Further", continued Koster, "no part of the highway will be open until all of the highway is completed".

In the question and answer period Koster stated that the department contractors were successful in crossing the swamp by excavating and fill. The new process proved successful while old methods could not solve the problem.

Koster pointed out that Zeeland will be served by two fine interchanges—one on Byron Rd. just east of Zeeland and the other on Adams, just south of Zeeland.

Mayor Frank Hoogland made a few remarks about the city's tax structure—less millage for this year.

James Burns, executive luncheon chairman, introduced the speaker and served as master of ceremonies. Simon Koning, president, gave the invocation. Burns and Evelyn Van Dorp were co-chairmen of the Zeeland Chamber's luncheon.

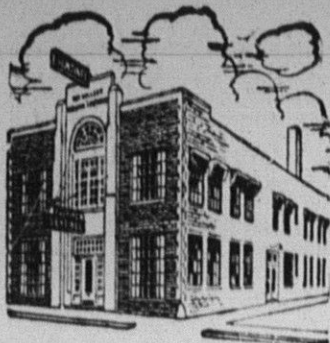

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SLOWING UP MAY HAVE REWARD

That old saw that every cloud has a silver lining might come into its own with the shortage of gasoline. We are getting a good deal of advertising that tells us that we can save one gallon in ten by cutting our speed, or that a cut to 50 miles per hour will save 11 per cent in gas, or that slow starts will be much easier on gasoline consumption.

It is always possible that some of this advertising may catch on and the results could be healthy. It might be interesting to watch the statistics on accidents, deaths, injuries and property damage during the months ahead. Has the shortage of fuel with the resulting cut in speed made any difference in any of these categories? We ought to have no difficulty picking up such information since much of this could automatically flow from insurance companies who may be affected by any change. Or the police department should have some information about what is happening.

Should this kind of voluntary restraint show a marked decrease in casualty figures for humans and machines, we could say that we have picked up a blessing in disguise. It is even possible that further good things are in store for those who slow down. One might find that the time element isn't that great, that the tension in personal life has decreased, that a bit of meditation has crept into our lives, and that the beauties of nature that were always there are being noticed. Keep these matters in mind. We might not want to go back to the fast pace.

God created man and lovingly gave him a law to live by so that he may live a full and orderly life. We are living in a lawless age and so it is timely to study the laws which God gave to us. During this quarter we will, in a series of 13 lessons, study the Ten Commandments from the standpoint of the New Testament and seek to apply them to our age.

I. God gave us the moral law. God had led the Hebrews out of Egypt and freed them from their slavery. The group of ex-slaves were slightly organized. Three months after leaving Egypt the freed people came to Mt. Sinai. This was the very place God had called Moses to lead the people. There the Lord gave the people the Ten Commandments found in Exodus 20 and Deuteronomy 5.

Before receiving the commandments, God told the people to make preparation. God reminded the people that He had delivered them from bondage and that He wanted to make a covenant with them. He would be their God and they should worship Him only, serve Him and keep His laws. A covenant implies an agreement between two parties, each one assuming an obligation and keeping it. The covenant was established and the laws were given.

Today some tell us that the moral law is not absolute and that love is supreme, and that moral law merely sets forth the experiences of the race and is good, but it is not of divine origin or has divine authority. In some churches it is taught that we are now under grace and do not need the decalogue. The Reformed view is that the law tells us about our sins, directs us to Christ and is a rule for Christian living.

II. The Law of God gives understanding. The second part of the lesson text is from Psalm 119 which is a love - song about God's law. He who loves God also loves His laws. The psalmist says that God's law gave him superior knowledge and guidance because it revealed to him God's will and kept him from "every false way" — and there are many of those. The Commandments merit study.

III. Christ kept the law for us. The third section of the lesson text is from the New Testament. Critics of Jesus said that He violated the law because they associated the "tradition of the elders" with the divine law. Jesus said that He did not come to destroy the law or the prophets but to fulfill them. This He did by meeting the demands of the Old Testament by living them out perfectly and giving them a deeper meaning and by fulfilling the messianic prophecies through His death on the cross.

She was a member of First Christian Reformed Church and the Priscilla Society. She was a nurse in Zeeland Community Hospital for many years until her retirement in September, 1972.

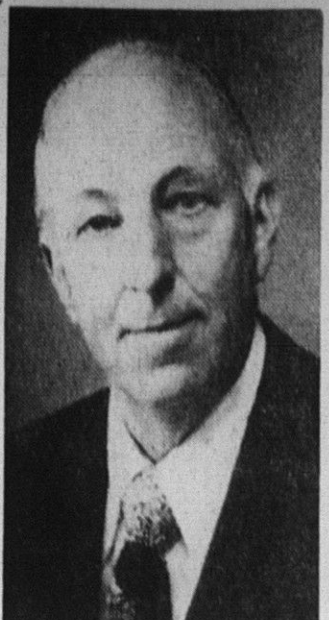

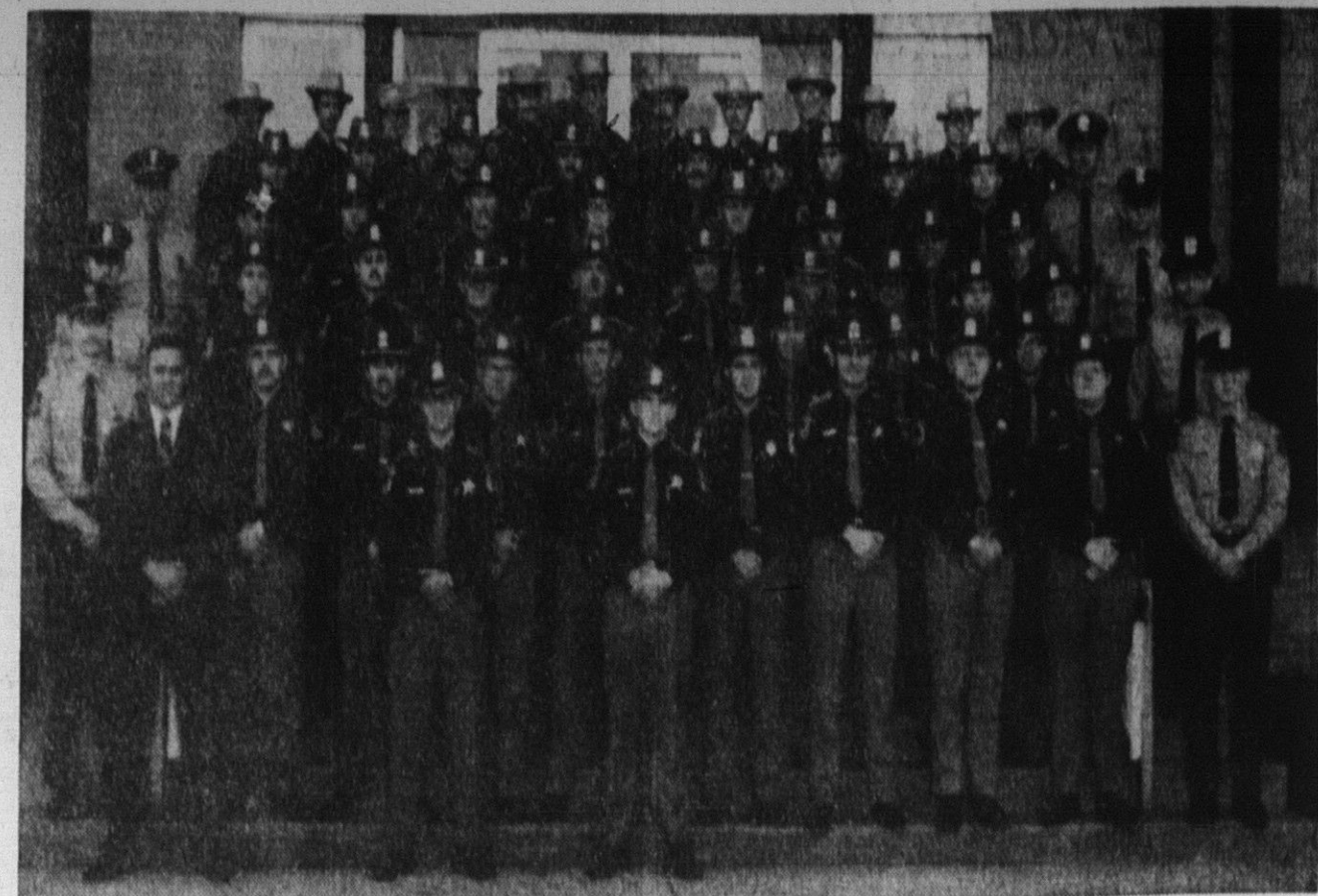

Personnel Director Gardner Wieringa said 21 teachers are not returning in the fall, 10 of whom retired and others for a variety of reasons including moving from the community. Eleven positions have been filled and Wieringa has put considerable effort seeking Latino teachers. Some teachers are returning from leave of absence.

In separate action, the board approved the appointment of Nicholas B. Fridsma as director of special education for Holland and West Ottawa districts.

Board President James O. Lamb reported progress in teacher contract negotiations and was hopeful that agreement would be reached in another meeting or two.

A plan of operation for the E.E. Fell Junior High School summer workshop was presented by Dr. Philip Schoo and staff.

The board approved a modification in high school requirements for graduation covering three years of credits on the high school campus, leaving ninth graders in the junior high curriculum.

New requirements list 30 credits or 15 Carnegie Units listing two credits of U.S. history, one credit of government, two science, four English, two physical education, and a requirement to take a minimum of five subjects until such time as students can fully qualify for graduation in a given semester by taking fewer than five subjects.

Principal Fred Bertsch said transcripts will continue to include experience from the seventh grade.

The board approved a nine-week slide rule class be included in the high school curriculum to help students with mechanical skills, the class to be taught by Albert J. Osman.

The board also heartily endorsed establishment of a vocational skill center to serve the students of Ottawa and North Allegan counties and requested the Ottawa Area Intermediate School District Board of Education to schedule a second election in the near future.

Community Chorale Ends Its Season With Dinner

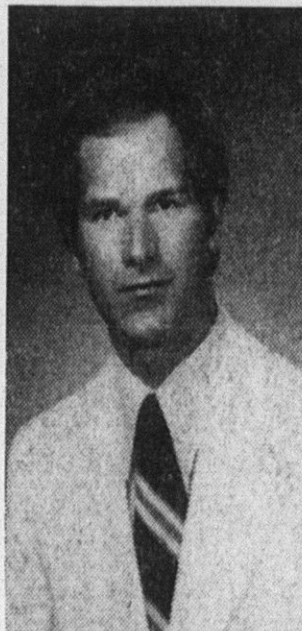

Gas Limits Felt By West Ottawa

Failure to meet gasoline needs may force cut backs in summer education programs at West Ottawa, including summer driver training.

The school board has been notified that the 12,000 gallons received this month is the last available even though another 4,000 gallons is necessary to finish the school year, superintendent Lloyd Van Raalte said.

The district burns up about 600 gallons of gasoline daily in school buses and other school vehicles and he expressed concern about the availability of gasoline or funds to purchase gas for summer uses.

The district is paying about 12 cents a gallon on bulk purchases but would have to pay retail rates at gasoline service stations if the bulk supplies were not adequate to meet the needs of the district.

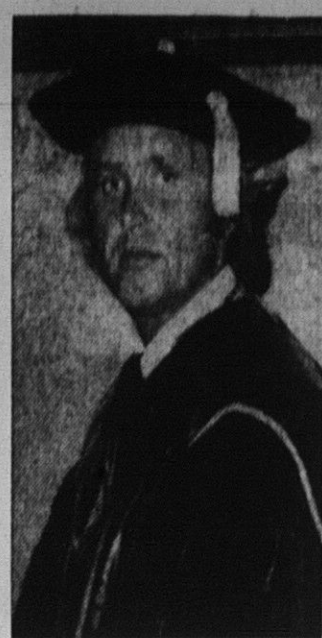
Van Raalte said the summer programs are scheduled and none have been cancelled.

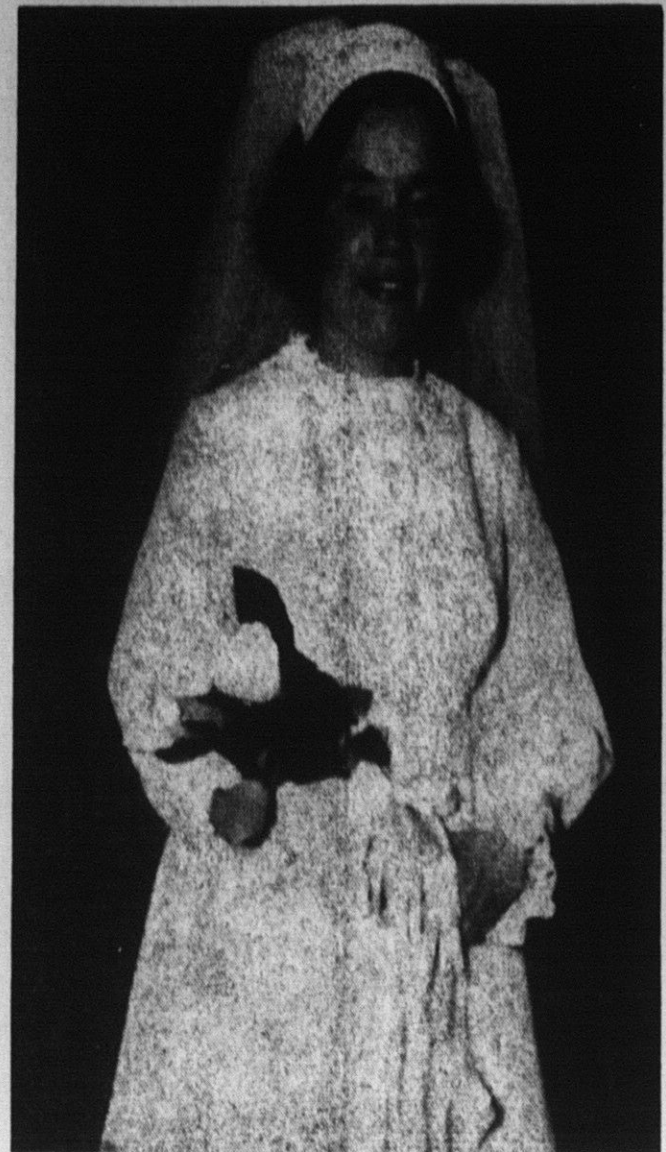
