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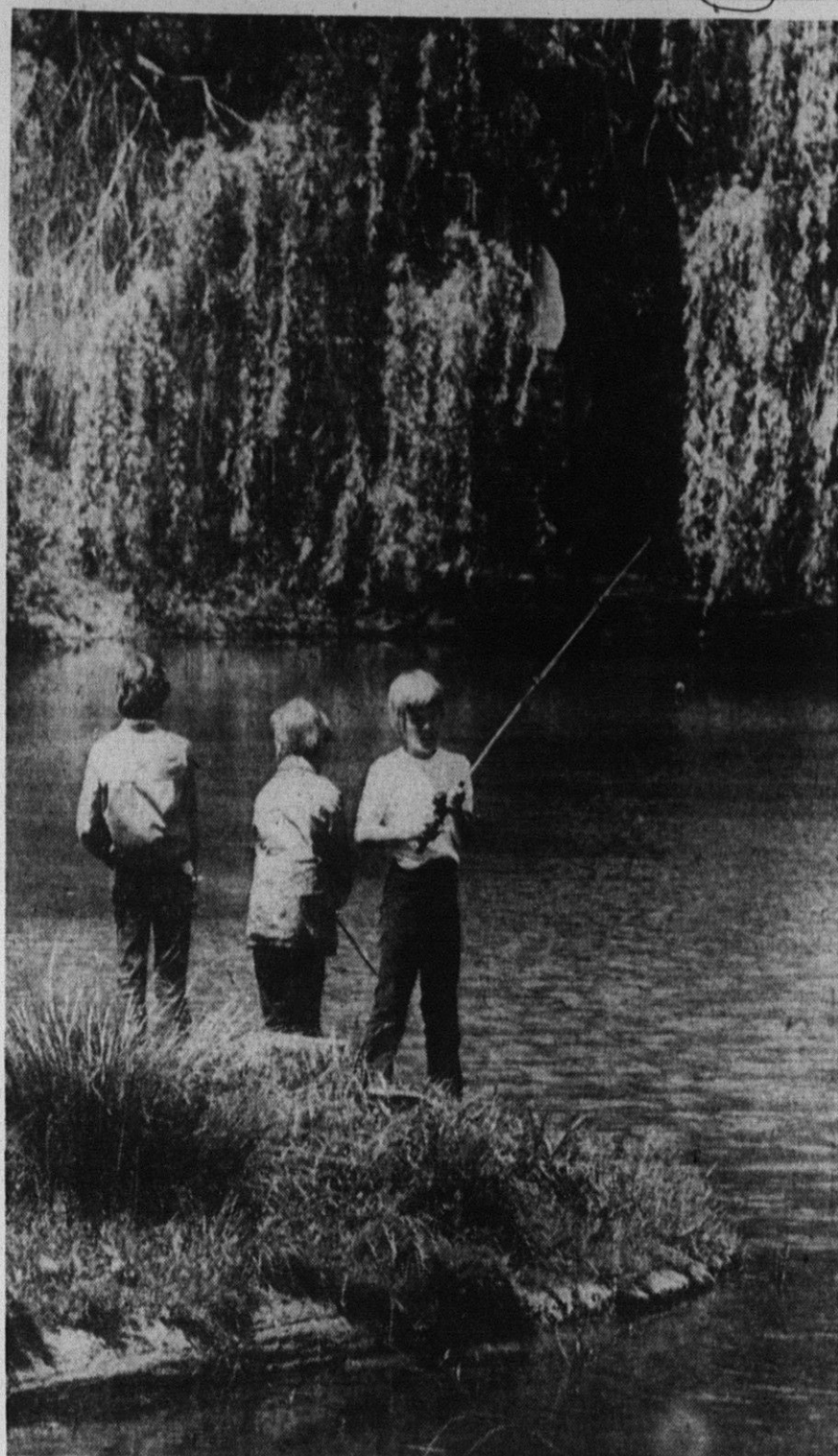

Hope College Professor Named Fellow

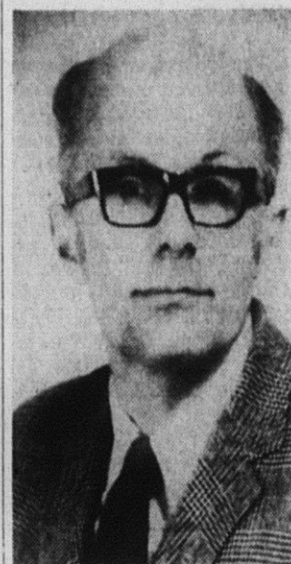
Hope College history professor Dr. David Clark has been named one of 12 fellows of the National Humanities Institute at the University of Chicago during the 1977-78 academic year to develop new courses in humanities.

More than 100 faculty were nominated from colleges in the United States and the fellows are to meet together regularly in seminars with scholars who will serve as consultants.

In designing new courses, Dr. Clark will draw upon his experiences in both Europe and Japan. At the end of one year at the institute, each fellow is expected to apply for a demonstration grant to fund new courses or programs at the fellow's college.

Professor Joan Mueller of Hope's English faculty was a fellow during the 1975-76 year in the institute at Yale University.

Another award received by Dr. Clark is a research grant from the Newberry Library, a

privately endowed research library in Chicago and he will be researching a Renaissance collection in the library. He is editing a treatise for a series of Italian Reformation writings sponsored by the Newberry Library.

BPW Approves Planning Study, Purchase of Items

The Board of Public Works Monday adopted resolutions for an area wide waste treatment planning study and final documents for an electrostatic precipitator at the power plant.

The waste treatment planning resolution is similar to one approved earlier but deletes Zeeland township and Zeeland city from the planning area. The resolution was referred to city council for approval.

Williams and Works engineers of Grand Rapids would conduct the planning study for the area at a local cost of about \$98,000 with townships sharing the cost the federal government reimbursing 80 per cent of the cost.

Documents for purchase of structural steel and breeching and fly ash removal equipment for the electrostatic precipitator at the power plant were approved and referred to council.

The bids were from De Moines Steel Co. at \$117,565 for the steel work and United Conveyor, \$15,034, for equipment.

The BPW approved creation of three new job titles for existing employees. The new titles were chief coal handler, waste service supervisor and materials coordinator.

Jail Term Handed Holland Area Man

GRAND HAVEN — John De Vries, 48, of O-2758 112th Ave., Holland, was placed on probation for two years and given a 90-day jail term to be reviewed after 45 days for a charge of violation of the criminal sexual conduct laws. He must pay \$300 in costs.

De Vries appeared in Ottawa Circuit Court Monday.

Gary Meyer, 22, of 434½ Westington, Holland, charged with breaking and entering, and Jerry Myers, 28, of Robinson township, charged with grand larceny, pleaded innocent.

Richard Rodriguez, 33, of 815 East Eighth St., Holland, sentenced to six months in jail last March, had his jail term reviewed and will be released Friday.

Vernon Rogers, 19, of 186½ East 11th St., Holland, sentenced January 26 to eight months in jail, had his term reviewed and was to be released Tuesday.

For Documentary on Bicentennial

Include Holland In Dutch Film

Several scenes of Holland, Mich., as well as interviews, are being filmed here for a Dutch documentary in connection with the U.S. celebration of the nation's Bicentennial.

A film team of Evangelische Omroep of Hilversum has been spending several days in Holland and will be returning in early September for more film. The film is a series of four documentaries based largely on the Dutch impact on American culture over a long period even before the American Revolution.

The team in Holland the last few days included Ger de Ridder, producer; John W. Muller, director and cameraman, and the latter's sister, Ank C. Muller, sound assistant. Other members of the Dutch team were working elsewhere.

A film session Wednesday afternoon at Windmill Island had Willard C. Wichers of the Netherlands Consulate here relating the similarities of this community with the motherland, its lakes, its flatlands, and some fine old Dutch traditions which have reflected on church life and education.

Wichers said beyond the facade of wooden shoes and tulips, the Holland community reflects the heritage of the Dutch, has a deep compassion and a desire to help others. "All these are a part of the legacy of the Dutch pioneers, resulting in a great pride in Dutch heritage."

Producer de Ridder said footage was taken of local lakes and forests in association with

the privations of the pioneers. He has interviewed Dr. Elton Bruins on local history and visited the Pillar Church with Hero Bratt as guide, dealt with Dr. Van Raalte's "Anchor of Hope" and the founding of Hope College, and later Calvin College in Grand Rapids.

Since Hope has completed its spring term, the film team photographed commencement exercises at Calvin concentrating on a single graduate, Johanna Halbermehl, a native Dutch girl who received a degree in sociology. She was brought to Holland for additional filming, including applying for a position, which tied in with the many Dutch names on downtown signs.

Also in the film will be scenes in New York, Albany and Pella, Iowa. The documentary will be released in Hilversum in October or November. Negotiations are in progress for local release.

State Park Expecting Busy Year

Another record year is expected at Holland State Park this summer and with fewer park personnel.

Park manager Dana Houseworth said the state park was ready for the summer visitors and seasonal park employees have been hired but a cut in state funds has eliminated two park rangers and one beach guard.

In 1975 a record 1,226,448 persons visited Holland State Park, making it the most popular in the state park system.

The 2,150 feet of Lake Michigan beach area will be watched by two beach guards this year but other arrangements were expected to be made to assure bathing safety.

The beach campground toilet facilities have been remodeled and new showers and lavatories have been installed.

The 500 picnic tables have been scattered in the 142 acres of the park. The picnic areas include 20 stoves for day use.

The park has 342 campsites in the Lake Michigan and Lake Macatawa areas and day use parking for 800 cars.

Houseworth said a dvance reservations for campsites were running ahead of last year and already filled were June 10-25 and Fourth of July weekend.

Camp fees this year run \$4 per night which includes electric hookups. Reservations, made 15 days in advance, are \$4 per night with a minimum of four nights plus \$2 for the reservation fee.

Entry permits are \$5 for the annual auto tag and \$1 daily. The senior citizen annual auto permit is \$1.

Houseworth said the park was expected to be filled with campers during the graduation period and the Memorial Day weekend and Conservation Department officers were expected to assist park personnel in patrolling the park.

He added that two recent changes in park policy was helping keep rowdiness to a minimum. They were the ban on alcohol in the park and the visitor ban in the Lake Macatawa campground area.

A park guard at the Lake Macatawa campground gate checks persons against those registered and anyone in the fenced park area not registered is subject to trespassing charges, Houseworth said.

Two Juvenile Boys Are Apprehended

Two juvenile boys believed involved in at least three larcenies or break-ins in the Holland area were apprehended at 2:30 a.m. Monday by Ottawa County deputies in the parking lot of Meijer's Thrifty Acres.

Grysen to Seek Another Term As Ottawa Sheriff

GRAND HAVEN — Ottawa County Sheriff Bernard Grysen, first elected in 1958 when 26 as the state's youngest sheriff, has announced his candidacy for reelection.

Grysen is seeking the nomination on the Republican ticket. He is president-elect of the Michigan Sheriff's Association and has been a director for three years. He is a member of Gov. Milliken's three-man committee dealing with departmental relations of sheriffs and Michigan State Police and is a member of the law enforcement committee of the State Crime Commission. Grysen is married and the father of four children and lives in Grand Haven township.

To Control Bike Problems on Sidewalks

Police Begin Bike Patrol Downtown

Holland police have launched a five-point program to better control bicycle problems in the downtown business district. The program was announced by police chief Charles Lindstrom.

Educational programs emphasizing voluntary compliance have been arranged in the schools and police working with local service clubs hosting bicycle rodeos and safety demonstrations.

Reserve police officers will be assigned to work the downtown area on Monday and Friday nights through Labor Day.

A two-week concentrated effort will be made in the downtown area by reassignment of personnel from June 13 to 26, concentrating on bicycle riding and bicycle theft problems.

During other highs use bicy-

cle periods, such as on Saturdays, patrol personnel will be parking their vehicles and walking for short periods in the downtown area.

Patrol personnel have been instructed to pay attention to bicycle violations and related hazards in all areas of the city. Lindstrom said most of the downtown area is posted for no bicycle riding on the sidewalk and added that increased attention has been made necessary by the increased complaints from pedestrians and as a mandate from city council.

Stricter enforcement will mean a written citation for both adults and youngsters. Juveniles will have their citations mailed home to parents. Repeated violations could result in confiscation of the bicycle.

13 Cars of 80-Car Train

Freight Cars Derail At New Richmond

NEW RICHMOND — Thirteen cars of an 80-car Chessie System freight train southbound from Grand Rapids derailed near 58th St. and 132nd Ave. Monday at 1:50 p.m., tearing up an estimated 300 feet of track and blocking the Chicago mainline. No injuries were reported.

Chessie System officials in Cleveland said four cars overturned and the others remained upright. Only five of the derailed cars contained cargo which was auto parts. There were no tank cars involved.

Crews had the cars replaced on the tracks by 7:10 a.m. Tuesday and traffic was expected to be restored on the mainline by Tuesday noon, officials said.

The cause of the derailment was under investigation. Officials said the derailed cars were toward the rear of the train.

Holland Bank Buys Tax Fund Bonds

GRAND HAVEN — Ottawa County sold \$1,850,000 in tax anticipation notes to Peoples State Bank of Holland at a bid of 4½ per cent interest for the county's delinquent tax revolving fund.

The funds represent the total of delinquent real property taxes outstanding for 1975 and local units, including schools, cities, townships and the county, will be paid from the fund for taxes they have not yet collected.

Delinquent taxes collected by the county will be used to pay off the revolving fund.

Holland Man Demands Examination in Assault

Chrispell, 34, of Leisure Estates, demanded examination in District Court Monday to charges of felonious assault in connection with an alleged assault against Thomas Gribbs, 28, of Muskegon, at the home of Geradine Chrispell, 55 West 18th St. He was released on \$2,000 personal recognizance bond.

Police claim Chrispell struck Gribbs in the side of the face with the stock of a rifle during an argument Saturday morning.

A holiday weekend excursion to Canada is in prospect for 36 Klompen Dancers from Holland High School.

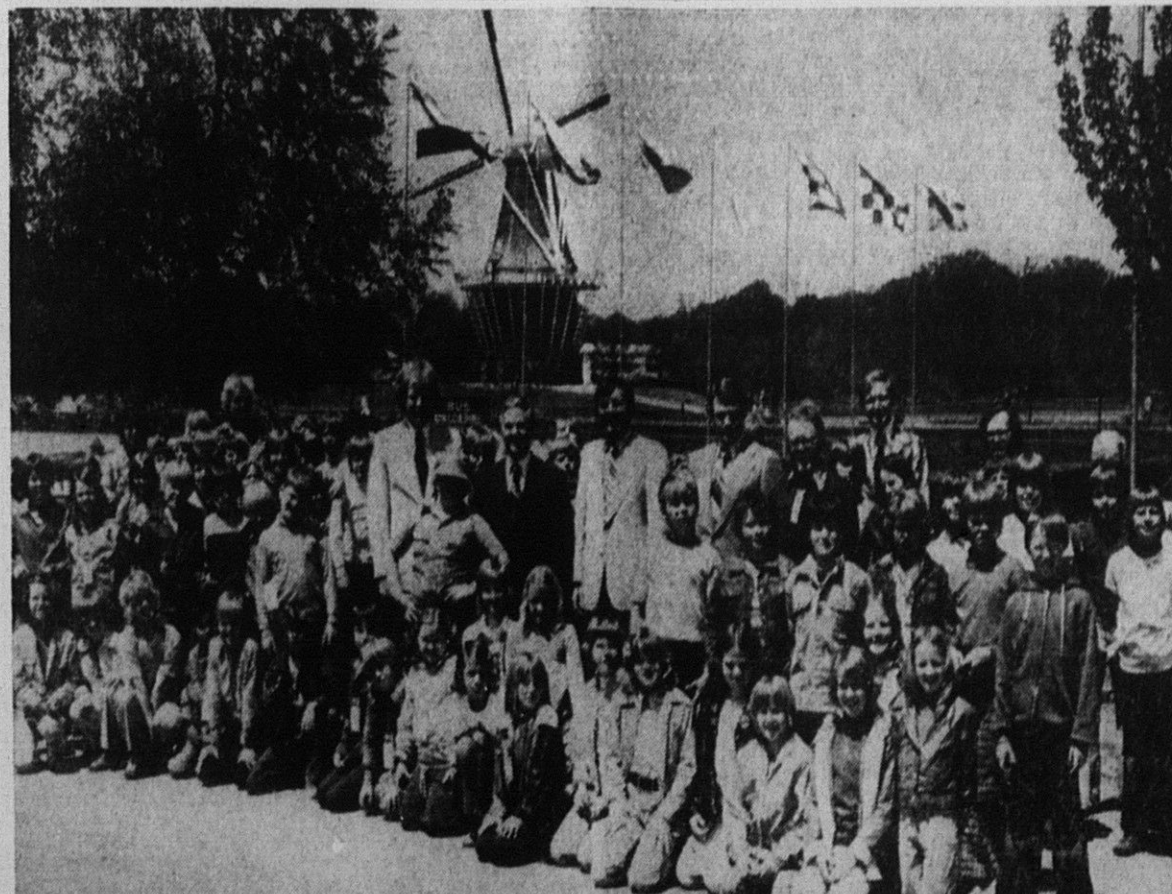

John Van Tatenhove has received a clipping from the May 17 Stars and Stripes from his daughter and son-in-law, Capt. and Mrs. Roy C. Aslanian in Germany, containing a picture of President Ford together with Mrs. Ford and Susan, and Congressman Vander Jagt, photographed at the Tulip Time parade in Holland May 15.

It was an Associated Press picture, the same shot that the Sentinel and many other newspapers used.

Mrs. Leo Loew, 61 Cherry St., en route home from Caracas where she visited a daughter, stopped in Washington, D.C., to visit another daughter, Glen Kleppe, wife of the U.S. Secretary of Commerce. She joined the Kleppes and the entire Ford cabinet in welcoming President Ford home from his visit to Holland, Mich., and other places in Michigan.

President Ford was the first incumbent President to visit Holland, but not the first Presidential candidate. Ruth Keppel did some research that revealed that James G. Blaine, Republican candidate for President, visited Holland and Grand Rapids in 1884.

Some 200 persons from Holland went to Grand Rapids by afternoon train to join 35,000 gathered in Campau Square for Blaine's visit. Local persons in the reception committee on the returning train were Mayor Beach, Dr. O. Yates and Prof. G. Kollen. The train arrived in Holland at 10 p.m. and 2,000 persons had gathered at the depot. Mayor I. Cappon and G. J. Diekema addressed the crowd.

Candidate Blaine introduced Gen. John C. Fremont, the Republican nominee for president in 1856 who lost to President Buchanan.

The weather was a bit cool for the "taking theatre to the out-of-doors," and some alternate arrangements for more comfortable indoor quarters were made. Mayor Harry Harrington presided and Harry Kramer read the list of war dead. Bruce van Voorst, student at Hope College, read Lincoln's Gettysburg Address and Birton Hiltson read Gov. G. Mennen Williams' Memorial Day proclamation. The Rev. John Hagans was chaplain.

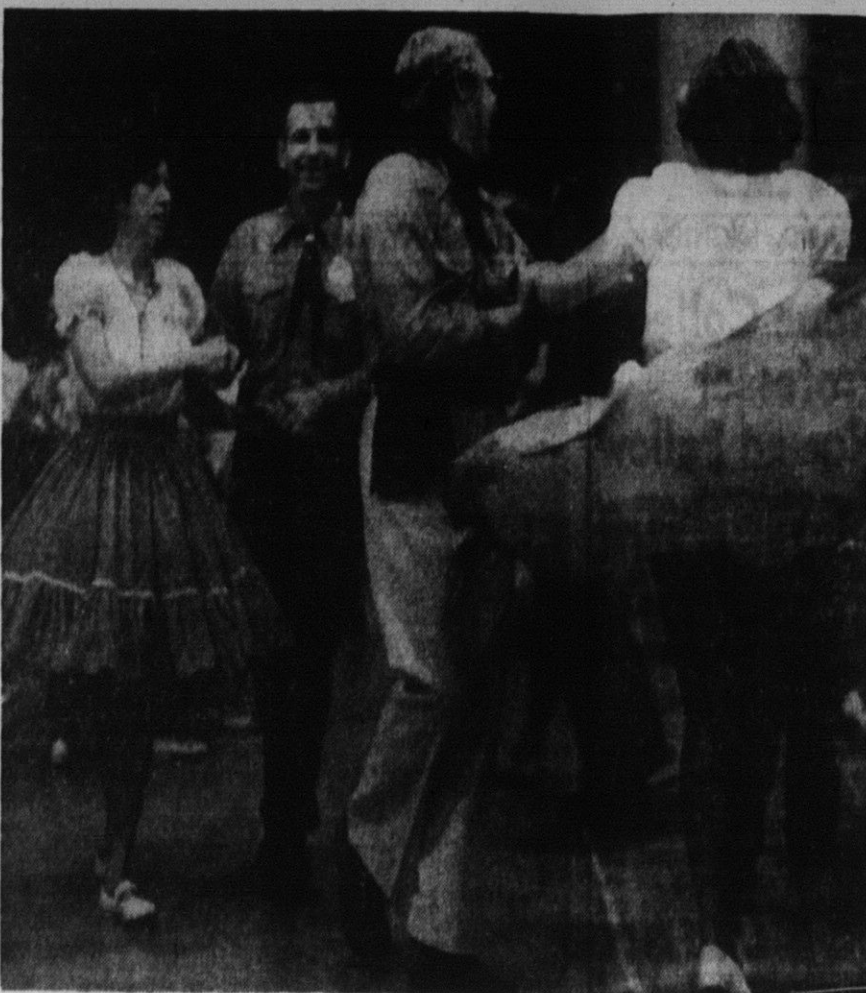
Before retiring from practice in Detroit several years ago he was chief of staff at Harper Hospital, Detroit.

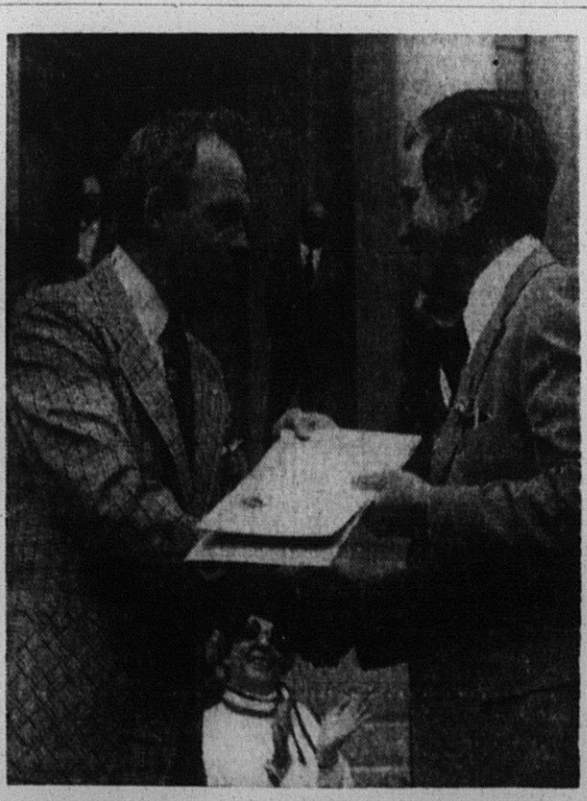

Holland Man Cited For Mail Orders

LANSING (UPI) — Attorney General Frank J. Kelley today filed suit against a Holland man alleging that he used misleading names for his mail order companies to imply a relationship with the U.S. government.

In addition to using such names as "U.S. Surplus Disposal," Kelley charged that Duane A. Vanderyacht advertised his goods as military surplus when in fact some were not.

Vanderyacht, according to Kelley, also listed items as wholesale yet sold them at retail prices and claimed a money back guarantee while seldom refunding money and often using checks that were returned to purchasers because he had insufficient funds to cover them.

"All 10 of his companies were essentially one operation," Kelley said. "He merely switched to another name when things got too hot for the previous assumed name."

"My office has received numerous complaints from consumers who ordered from Vanderyacht but never obtained the items paid for," he said. "Hopefully, every purchaser who suffered a loss in their dealings with these firms will be reimbursed."

Kelley said Vanderyacht used the following company names: Surplus Service; Nationwide Surplus Service; U.S. Service Disposal; American Land Disposal; American Land Distributors; B.L. Smith Imports; U.A.B. Car Puter; D & J Enterprises; Bonanza Surplus; Bargainhunters; and Bonanza Surplus Service.

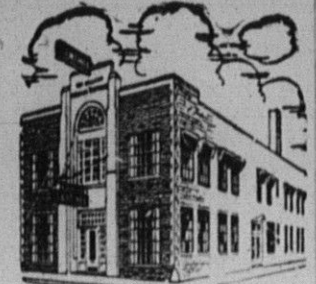

It's only because they're expecting an influx of all kinds of people to the Olympics to be held in Montreal. Remembering what has happened at some other Olympics, we can see why the Canadian government wants to be as careful as possible.

So, to avoid inconvenience to yourself and a possible unpleasantness for the border people, bring along the documents you will need. If you don't have them you'll just be sent home. This arrangement begins now and runs through August. Canadian travelers take note.

Lloyd V. Steggerda, 60, of 1055 Lincoln Ave., died Saturday at his home following an apparent heart attack.

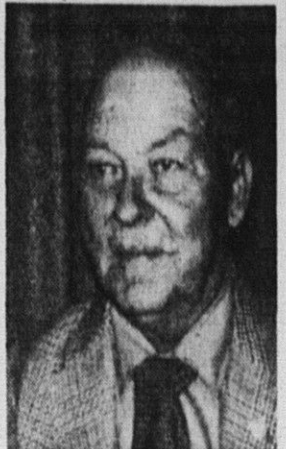

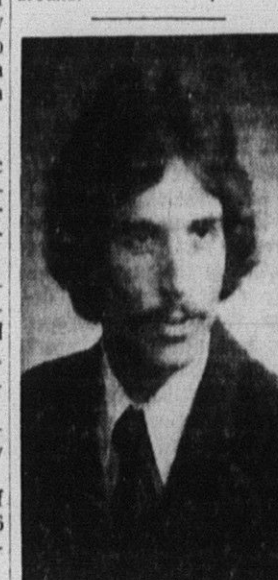

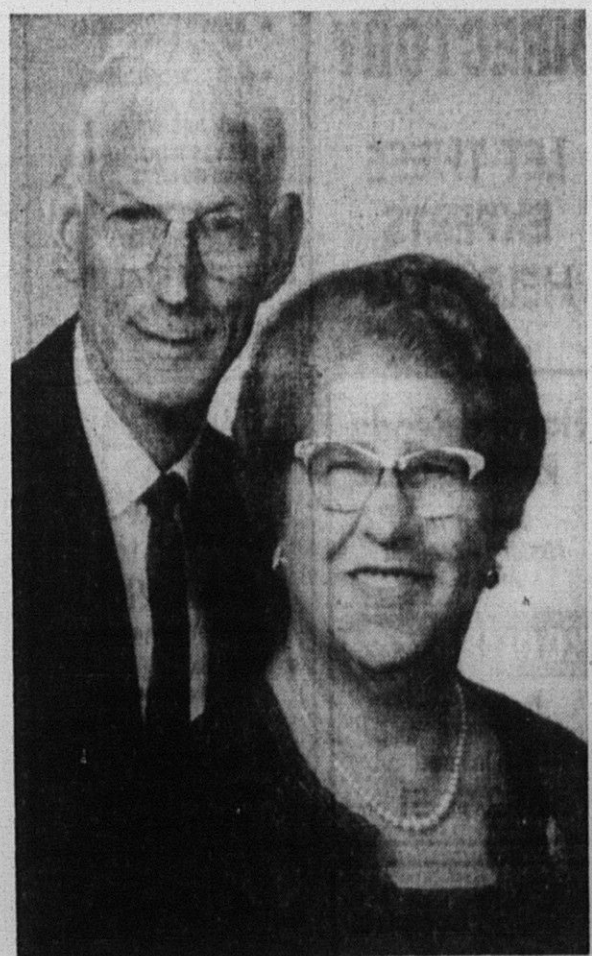

THE BIG DUTCHMAN SALUTES

ROOM TO LEARN

"Room To Learn," the theme of the Citizens Committee For A New Junior High School, are three important words for every voter in our community. For we must make room within ourselves to learn the facts surrounding this issue so that on June 14 the choices are clear and we can vote responsibly on the educational needs of our community.

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Exchangeites Hear Calvin President

At the Monday meeting of the Holland Exchange Club Dr. Anthony Diekema, president of Calvin College, explained the important milestone in all higher education in American society today and projected the possibilities for the future of both public and private colleges. He said it will be a period of transition marked by difficult and complex problems. Although there have been problems during the past two decades, in retrospect this period must be looked upon as the "Golden Era" in the history of American higher education. Most colleges have thrived as in no other time in history. Literally hundreds of new institutions were established during this period of prosperity.

But the events of the past several years have left little doubt that those golden years may be gone forever. The higher education "boom" is slowing down dramatically. Clearly, the outcome of a host of current economic, political and sociological forces appear to have at least distracted, if not alienated, the enormous public good-will which colleges and universities enjoyed during the last 20 years. The impact of these phenomena will be felt in church-related colleges as well as in secular institutions.

One of the forces impacting higher education is the "enrollment crisis." The inevitability of declining enrollments in colleges and universities, especially private colleges, has been widely accepted on the basis of demographic data. Predictions by experts vary all the way from a decline of 46 per cent to 20 per cent by 1990.

The phenomenon will be particularly acute in private colleges. The closing of 50 private and independent colleges in the past three years predicts the problems that lie ahead. Compounding the declining enrollments is the financial squeeze created by inflated cost coupled with decreased tuition-related income. We may anticipate situations whereby parents who would send their children to private colleges are unable to pay tuition. Already this is occurring both within our Christian community and in society in general. Between 1966 and 1971 the private "share" of first-time students attending American colleges dropped from 29 per cent to 21 per cent. Unless these current trends are altered dramatically, the existence of many additional private colleges will be seriously threatened.

Regarding funding Dr. Diekema stated, increasing efforts in the legislatures and political arenas to reduce tax support to higher education will be the mode. There will be a focus of attention on public funds which already go to private and church-related institutions and endeavors to rechannel them to public institutions. This already is surfacing in several states, and Dr. Diekema is confident that these issues will reach the Supreme Court for landmark decisions in the years immediately ahead. A negative decision toward these colleges could have a destructive impact upon the continued financial viability of Christian higher education in American society.

The loyal and unquestioned support of past decades for higher education was alienated to the point of serious and fundamental questions about their meaning and purpose. In the studies by the Carnegie Com-

mission on the future of higher education, it becomes readily apparent that there is considerable concern about higher education in the decade ahead. Likewise American higher education is deeply troubled about its future and is searching for a renewed and revitalized mission. Furthermore it is spiritually impoverished at a time when young and old are looking to intellectuals for answers to important moral and ethical questions.

As a result, all of American higher education will need to re-evaluate its relationship to its supporting constituents in the context of changing needs and conditions. It must regain confidences and build new bridges with supporting constituencies, legislatures and foundations.

What then, is the role of Christian higher education in the decade ahead? Dr. Diekema reminded the group that Christian colleges are especially well-equipped to provide stability and leadership in time of confusion and bewilderment over goals and objectives. They respond by faith to the unmistakable authority of Jesus Christ in all areas of life and human endeavor and place God at the center of all of life. This unchanging mission for Christian higher education provides it with a stability and foundation rarely matched in other colleges and universities.

Dr. Diekema is persuaded that Christian higher education will be confronted during the '80's with providing strategic leadership to a large American higher education community that is searching desperately for meaning and purpose.

The seemingly logical approach to the enrollment problem by stepping up student recruitment is grossly inadequate. Christian colleges should cooperate in mutual efforts at resolving the predicted decline in students. However they must reach out more broadly for those young people who are looking for meaning in a society which is seemingly unable to believe in anything.

Funding may well be one of the most difficult to overcome. Because of the potentially dire consequences of inaction, Dr. Diekema is persuaded that it is now time for Christian higher education to become politically active in the centers of political power.

For years Christian higher education has enjoyed the support of loyal constituencies, but this support cannot be taken for granted. New bridges must be built of mutual service and the extension of Christian higher educational opportunity to the constituency has exciting possibilities.

In summary, it is clear that the decade ahead will be a difficult one for all of higher education. However, it will be a time when Christian colleges of this country can have a particularly significant impact upon all higher education and our entire culture.

If Christian colleges decline in their impact on higher education and on individuals, much of American society will decline along with them.

Jail Program Reviewed

GRAND HAVEN — A rehabilitation service program for inmates of the Ottawa County jail, operating under a federal grant, has completed its first year and 16 inmates received their high school equivalency certificates.

James A. Split, director of the program, said 116 men and women were involved in school programs during the first year. In addition inmates received a variety of group counseling and individual counseling contacts.

Professional help from the community included personnel from the Grand Haven public schools, Grand Valley State College, Ottawa County Mental Health and Ottawa Alcoholic Rehabilitation, Inc.

In an attempt to assess the impact of the program on inmate recidivism all discharged inmates are contacted by mail 30 days, six months and one year after their return home.

Each inmate is interviewed after placement in jail and a determination is made as to program use.

During the first quarter of 1976 there were 4,883 jail days served by inmates sentenced and unsentenced to jail with average daily population ranging from a high of 62 to a low of 47 persons.

The average length of involvement in rehabilitation programs was 39 days for the unsentenced inmates to 32 days for sentenced inmates.

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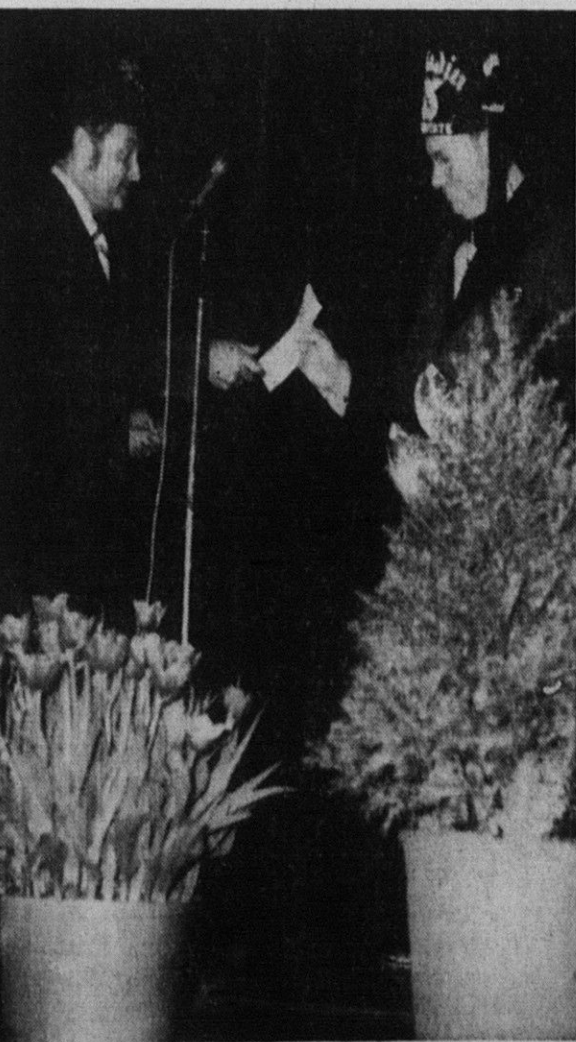
