
The body is at the Ringold funeral home in Spring Lake.

Hope Senior Wins Fulbright Award To Study at Vienna

A Hope college senior, Ezra Gearhart, will attend the University of Vienna next year on a Fulbright scholarship, it was announced today by Prof. Laura A. Boyd, head of the German department.

Miss Boyd said this is the first Fulbright scholarship ever offered a Hope undergraduate student.

Gearhart will sail in August and begin his studies in German literature at Vienna in September.

Gearhart received his high school training at the Preparatory school in Houghton, N. Y., where his father was a minister. His parents, the Rev. and Mrs. William Gearhart, now live in Holland.

He is married to German-born Margaret Greiner, who recently returned from a visit with her family in Germany. They have two children, Georgia, 4, and Michelle, 20 months. Mrs. Gearhart and children will remain here while he studies in Vienna.

While studying at Hope, Gearhart maintained jobs as night watchman at Holland Racine Shoe Co. and Holland Furnace Co. Last week he was given faculty honors at Hope for his campus activities and straight A scholastic record. He will be graduated with his class next Monday with a bachelor's degree, summa cum laude.

During World War II, Gearhart spent 4 1/2 years in the Army, 2 1/2 with U. S. counter intelligence corps in Germany.

At Hope, he has been a member of two national honorary fraternities, Delta Phi Alpha, German society, and Phi Alpha Theta, history fraternity. He plans to make teaching his life work.

Hope Will Award Honorary Degrees At Commencement

Two Hope college alumni will receive honorary degrees at the 87th commencement convocation in Memorial chapel next Monday at 10 a.m.

Dr. Chris A. De Young, class of 1920, professor of school administration at Illinois State Normal university at Normal, will be given the honorary degree of doctor of literature, and the Rev. Bernard M. Luben, class of 1926, executive secretary of the Board of Foreign Missions, Reformed church in America, will receive an honorary doctor of divinity degree.

Dr. De Young, author, lecturer, text film producer, world traveler and educator, received his early education in Zeeland public schools, received his A. B. degree from Hope, his master's from Columbia in 1929 and doctorate from Northwestern university in 1932. After graduation from Hope, he spent four years in Madanapalle, India, representing the local college as principal of Hope high school there. He was superintendent of schools in Hudsonville and Zeeland from 1924 to 1930, was in the School of Education staff at Northwestern from 1930 to 1934 and has been associated with Normal since that time.

During 1950 and 1951, while on leave of absence from Normal, Dr. De Young was Fulbright professor at University of Delhi, India, and advisor to the Central Ministry of Education for the Indian government. He also was coordinator for panels on public education and teacher education for the American Council on Education and the National Education association. In that capacity he worked with Pentagon and State department officials in promoting exchange of teachers between the U. S. and foreign countries.

He is a member of many state, national and international educational associations. His wife is the former Marian Van Drezer, also a Hope graduate.

Rev. Luben, native of Jasonville, Ind., received his high school education in Coopersville and was graduated from Hope and Western Theological seminary. He was commissioned missionary to Japan by the Reformed church and while on furlough in 1937 studied at University of Chicago where he received a master's degree in education. In Japan, he was on the faculty of Meiji college, Christian school for Japanese young men.

He returned to this country in 1940 and served the Board of Foreign Missions as field representative until receiving his present appointment. His wife is the former Edith B. Emekson, daughter of missionaries in Japan. They have two children, Robert 3 and Elaine 9.

Council Okays General Plans for New Wildwood Subdivision in City

Two appointments to city boards made by Mayor Harry Harrington were approved by Common Council Wednesday night. The mayor appointed William Brouwer as a member of the Hospital board for a five-year term, and named Mrs. O. S. Cross to the Library board for a period of five years. Both have served on the boards for several years.

Council adopted a resolution approving general plans for the Wildwood subdivision replatting and set July 16 as a date for public hearing for objections to vacating certain streets within the area and establishing new streets in the plat. Council also instructed City Attorney O. S. Cross to draft an ordinance to re-zone the area from either class B or industrial to class A residential property with the provision that proper utility easements be reserved.

The new subdivision covers property from between 27th and 28th Sts. south to 32nd St., running between Ottawa and Van Raalte Aves. Council's action was in keeping with a recommendation of the planning commission. The layout provides for curving roads and several more highly desirable residential features.

Later in the evening Ald. Laverne Rudolph of the second ward started off a series of questions by asking whether the proposed winding roads in the Wildwood plat would present complications to utilities and was informed no such problems are contemplated there, either in sewers or power lines.

Rudolph also inquired about oil roads and was informed recent rains have cancelled many scheduled trips of the oil trucks. After introducing such issues as the city taking initiative in paving streets, questioning painting of lines on Eighth St. and trunklines, a bad hole on 10th St. between Washington and Maple, and payment of paving assessments, Rudolph was informed by Mayor Harrington that all such information was available at any time from city officers.

Lightning Hits Home in Holland

Mr. and Mrs. Fred VerSchure and their two children who live at 657 West 22nd St., had a close call when lightning struck their home at the height of the storm at 2 a.m. Tuesday morning.

VerSchure had gone to sleep in his son's room and the small daughter went to sleep with the mother after the children became scared during the storm. The room in which VerSchure and seven-year-old Eddie Lee were sleeping, was struck by lightning a short time later.

The bolt ripped through the siding and knocked a big chunk of plaster out of the wall of the room just above the window. It flashed out of the house just below the window casing.

VerSchure said today it loosened the entire window casing and tore a big hole in the wall. It also hurled a big piece of plaster across the room. However, no one was injured. There was no fire.

The lightning also knocked out the transformer on VerSchure's gas furnace.

The weatherman reported a total .89 inches of rain fell during the night.

Conifer Pruning Demonstration Set

Grand Haven (Special)—Ottawa county conifer tree growers are invited to a shearing or pruning demonstration June 12 at the McCarthy farm, located a half-mile south of Pigeon Creek school. The school is east of Camp Blodgett on the lake road.

The demonstration begins at 7 p.m. Paul Slabaugh will do the pruning work and Prof. Walter Morofsky will discuss diseases and insects.

"Pruning of Christmas tree stock can well add thousands of good trees for growers," L. R. Arnold, Ottawa county agricultural agent said. "In a planting of Scotch pine only 20 to 25 per cent make good Christmas trees. Through pruning this percentage can be raised to 80 to 90 per cent. This means many dollars to future growers of Christmas trees."

Southeast Ottawa Dairy Herd Tests Reveal Increases

County Agent Credits Grass Pasture Partly For Production Hike

Grand Haven (Special)—The April report of the Southeast Ottawa county testing association shows further increases in average production due partly to grass pasture, according to L. R. Arnold, Ottawa county agriculture agent.

Twenty-six herds with 309 cows were on official test. Eight herds on owner sampler test also were listed—86 cows in all. The official test shows average production of 958 pounds of milk and 38.6 pounds of fat.

"This association is off to a fine start and if nothing happens, will break the 1951 record of 401 pounds fat per cow," Arnold said.

Hubert Heyboer, Zeeland, owned a cow that produced 2,100 pounds of milk, 77.7 pounds of fat during April. High herd honors went to Lewis Van Klompenberg, Zeeland, with a record 1,342 pounds milk per cow and 52 pounds of fat.

Firemen also assisted Mrs. Thomas Rosendahl from her second-floor apartment to safety. The flames were confined to the first floor of the two family house. The fire started in the living room of the Kammerling apartment.

Chief Klomprens estimated damage of \$800 to \$1,000 to the building itself and \$200 to \$300 to furnishings. Kammerling has been a patient at Holland hospital for the last few days.

Firemen also were called on a still alarm at 11:45 p.m. Wednesday to put out fire in some burning waste deposit at the old sugar beet factory at the foot of West 14th St. City police had been active at the scene several times throughout the evening with fire extinguishers, and finally called in the fire department.

Holland, Grand Haven Parks Top Attendance

Lansing—Grand Haven and Holland state parks were running one-two in total number of visitors so far this year, according to total attendance through June 1 reported by the state conservation department today.

Grand Haven led with 239,000 visitors followed closely by Holland with 230,000 visitors. Dodge No. 4 had 137,000, Island Lake 136,000, Rochester-Utica 125,000, Bay City 122,000, Ludington 110,000 and Muskegon 100,000.

Total for all state parks was nearly 100,000 more than during the same period last year. An estimated 1,966,000 persons visited the 37 parks and recreation areas compared with 1,875,000 through June 1 last year.


Petitions also are being circulated for E. V. Hartman, president of the board, whose three-year term expires this year.

Weather in May Slightly Warmer, Statistics Reveal

An average temperature of 57.3 degree was registered for May, according to Charles A. Stoketee of Hope college, who compiles local weather statistics for the U. S. government.

The average temperature was .6 degree above normal. Average temperature was 60.1 in 1951, 59.2 in 1950, 60.2 in 1949 and 54.2 in 1948.

Maximum was 84, compared with 87 in 1951, 88 in 1950, 86 in 1949 and 77 in 1948. Minimum was 37 compared with 33 in 1951, 31 in 1950, 30 in 1949 and 32 in 1948. Average minimum was 46.4 compared with 47.9 in 1951, 46.8 in 1950, 47.8 in 1949 and 43 in 1948. Average maximum was 68.1 compared with 72.3 in 1951, 71.6 in 1950, 72.5 in 1949 and 65.5 in 1948.

Precipitation measured 3.93 inches for May which is .51 inch above normal for the month. Rainfall was 2.54 in 1951, .65 in 1950, .87 in 1949 and 4.35 in 1948. Rain fell on 15 days this year, eight in 1951, seven in 1950, 10 in 1949 and 15 in 1948.

Greatest amount of rainfall in 24 hours was .86 inch, compared with .75 in 1951, .31 in 1950, .23 in 1949 and 1.77 in 1948.


Young Onken was taken to Douglas hospital where the fracture was reduced. X-rays were to be taken today.

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

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RUTLEDGE MYTH

As if there aren't enough things
to worry about in the world of to-
day, historical scholars have now
begun to weary their brains about
the truth or untruth of the Ann
Rutledge story. Ann Rutledge, as
every sentimental school girl
knows, was the young frontier la-
dies with whom the youthful Ab-
raham Lincoln is supposed to have
been in love. She died—as a result
of a commonplace disease—and
young Abe is supposed to have bur-
ied her in his grave.

Later he married, of course, and
raised a family in the orthodox
way, but the sentimentalists have
never been able to persuade them-
selves that he loved his wife. Lin-
coln himself gave some color to
the theory of his carrying around a
broken heart when he left his
girl, Mary Todd, waiting at the
church so that the wedding had to
be postponed. But he did marry
her at last, and his reluctance ap-
pears to have been merely a case
of cold feet.

The poets have made the most
of it. Even some of the very great-
est have embodied the Ann Rut-
ledge myth in their verse, among
them so great a writer as Edgar
Lee Masters. But now a letter has
been discovered that throws serious
doubt on the legend. The letter, it
is true, was written by Mrs. Lin-
coln, in 1867, two years after her
husband's death, and it was natu-
rally to her interest to discredit the
story of Lincoln's earlier love af-
fair. But coupled with some other
evidence that is not based on sen-
timentality, it strengthens the
supposition that the Ann Rutledge
affair was merely a very ordinary
case of cold love.

The myth of the fracture of Lin-
coln's heart as a result of that
early love affair almost certainly
was strengthened by the fact that
as a practicing lawyer Lincoln was
away from home on the judicial
circuit so much of the time that
the gossip about his unhappiness in
his domestic life gained a firm
hold. Add to that the fact that Mrs.
Lincoln was considerable of a do-
mestic shrew, and it is easy to see
why the Ann Rutledge legend grew
and grew.

But if those who are now trying
to discredit the myth think they
have a chance to catch up with
the truth they will find that they
don't know human nature. The pub-
lic dots on such sentimental sto-
ries of a great man's heart being
buried in the grave with an early
love. People love such stories so
much that they will almost certain-
ly never give this one up. Like
many other stories that aren't so,
it has come to stay.

Sunday School
Lesson

June 8, 1952
Persons and Property
Luke 12:16:1-12
By Henry Geerlings

In these days of socialistic and
communistic teaching we do well
to point out that the Bible no-
where forbids the possession of
private property. As a matter of
fact, God often blessed with earth-
ly possessions the individual who
was faithful to Him. Job was a
righteous man but he was very
rich. Abraham was also blessed
with many earthly possessions,
and there were others like him.
Even in Solomon, the Lord does
not condemn him for his wealth
but there were other things in
which he greatly displeased God.

We are all stewards. Properly
speaking there is no such thing as
true human ownership. All that
we hold we hold in trust. We have
inherited some things, it may be,
and earned some things by work
or by skill, but even these are not
ours in one sense; for whatever
we have comes from the cultiva-
tion, in ourselves or in others, of
the gifts of God. Our life is a
gift, our powers are gifts, our
capacities are gifts.

This truth is the most elementary
one, yet quickly forgotten. We
easily get into the habit of treat-
ing things as rights, as reflecting
lustre upon ourselves, that it is
good from time to time to bring
ourselves face to face with the
reality that we did not confer
these things on ourselves, that
God gave them to us; and further,
that we shall have to answer for
them, that sooner or later, as re-
gards all we have to use here—
time, money, mental gifts, social
gifts alike—there will be the same
demand.

We have thought of the sacred-
ness of life and of marriage, and
now we are to think of the sacred-
ness of property. This command-
ment forbids the taking of our
neighbor's money or property,
and the acquiring of it by false
dealing. We are enjoined to re-
spect the rights of private owner-
ship. Whatever method is used to
take anything from another with-
out an equivalent return is con-
demned by God.

The same thing is true of an
employer or of an employee if he
withholds what is rightly due the
other. There may be many cases
of the violation of this command-
ment which are not covered by
any law upon our statute books,
but we are not thereby innocent.
The law of God covers them and
that must be the guide of the
Christian. The manipulation of
power which results in the mass-
ing of great fortunes has not in-
frequently given rise to revolution
which has overthrown established
institutions and brought disaster.
The disregard of this law also
has led to the penalty in the Mosaic
legislation.

Property rights are to be re-
spected and protected. Without
honesty in our relations one with
the other, injustice and anarchy
would prevail. We are not to em-
ploy wrong methods to gain what
belongs to another. Fraud, decep-
tion, unfair dealing, an unjust
weight or balance are as sinful
as common theft. We are to pay
an adequate wage to our employee,
and do honest day's work for
our employer. All gambling and
games of chance are prohibited.
And we may rob God by
withholding that which is due
Him. No debt is more obligatory
than the one we owe our Lord.
There would be an extensive ex-
change of goods in this land if
each individual had that which leg-
ally belonged to him, and nothing
more or less.

If we have taken from any one
unjustly we ought to return it.
We call this conscience money. The
mother who evades a child's car
fare by saying that he is under
age when he is not, not only
breaks the two commandments,
lying and stealing, but she sows
the seeds of falsehood and dishon-
esty in her child's life. Cheating
in any form is stealing, and the
practice is very common today. It
obtains among young and old, and
it is not unusual to hear folks
make light of it. They think that
it is clever, and excuse themselves
on the ground that the other fel-
low would do it if he got the
chance.


We are under moral obligation
to respect every person's right to
his honestly acquired property.
Once we ignore the rights of prop-
erty we are in a state of anarchy
and nothing is safe. For prop-
erty is more than what a person
owns. It is himself, his skill, his
strength, his time, his labor.
There is a large amount of
stealing that is done under the
name of business. It is an attempt
to get something for nothing.
Companies are formed and stock
is sold which has no real value,
and hundreds of people are robbed
of their savings by unscrupulous
promoters. And these individuals,
while they may escape the judge-
ment of men, will yet have to give
an answer to God.

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Dairymen Are More Aware of Grass Importance

Ottawa County Agent Reveals Recent Results Of Feed Costs Studies

Grand Haven (Special)—Dairymen and livestock feeders of Ottawa county have become more and more aware of the importance of grass and hay in the farm program remarks L. R. Arnold, county agricultural agent.

Recent studies reveal that the cost of feeding a hundred pounds of total digestible nutrients is 29 cents with alfalfa-brome pasture compared to 78 cents when corn and grain is fed. Alfalfa harvested as hay shows cost of 78 cents compared to \$1.38 for oats.

The dairy cow can secure nearly two-thirds of the necessary nutrients from forage crops. Why not pay great attention to this most important of farm crops?

Grassland farming does not mean that all or even the most of the acres are to be seeded to grass. Each acre should be put to its best use. However, grass is a natural feed for livestock. The farmer should regard it as the most important crop. Therefore, great attention to the kind of grass, the best of seed, proper fitting of the seed bed and heavy fertilization.

On lowland, Reed Canary grass if properly handled may well be used on many unprofitable acres. Annual fertilization is required. On highlands nothing beats alfalfa-brome. This also requires annual fertilization. Alfalfa takes much phosphorus and more of potash out of the soil than many realize. After the first cutting, an application of 200 pounds of 0-20-20 should be made.



Local Wholesaler Enters Guilty Plea In Federal Court

Grand Rapids — Two wholesalers, one from Holland and one from Greenville, pleaded guilty in federal court Tuesday to charges of selling potatoes over ceiling prices in Western Michigan.

Four retailers, meanwhile, acceded to permanent injunctions prohibiting them from purchasing or selling potatoes above ceiling prices.

Le Roy Olsen, Greenville, charged in five counts with selling scarce potatoes to retailers at above ceiling in Belding, Ionia and Lake Odessa, and Bartola (Watts) Spicuzza of Holland, pleaded guilty. Spicuzza was accused of selling on three counts and buying above ceiling on two other counts.

They were released for appearance June 16 when they will be sentenced by Federal Judge Raymond W. Starr.

The four retailers, who admitted buying potatoes at above ceiling prices and agreed to permanent injunctions are:

John De Ryke, Belding market operator; Frank Gazzella, Ionia market operator; Orv. B. Garling, Lake Odessa market operator and Le Roy Catt, Lee's Market, Lake Odessa.

Wilson D. Slowinski, Wilson's food market, Ionia, also was named in an information charging he purchased potatoes at above ceiling prices but was not expected in court until late today.

Under the law, it is against regulations to buy as well as sell over ceiling prices.



Rep. Potter Talks At Memorial Day Rites in Holland

"We must work and must pray with the same energy and same singleness of purpose as we did during World War II and must not compromise our principles if we are to retain freedom and liberty."

So said Hon. Charles E. Potter of Cheboygan, U. S. representative from the 11th district, at annual Memorial Day exercises Friday morning at Monument square in Pilgrim Home cemetery.

Speaking "off the cuff," the congressman told the hundreds assembled in the cemetery that when God moves out of the hearts of men, tyranny moves in. "I make sure that the sacrifice of all these men is not in vain, we must be realistic and work. Even in this country forces are at work to tear to shambles the work these heroes have built. We need the same type of courage at the conference tables these men have shown on the battlefield."

"We are here today to pay homage to those who gave the last full measure of devotion so that we might live in freedom and liberty. These men believed in a fundamental ideal and one of the main reasons for such sacrifice was that they didn't want their children to be a cog in a socialistic machine. They didn't want to hear their children say a generation hence, 'Our individual rights and freedom were lost by you!'"

"We meet one day a year to pay homage but it's a job for 365 days a year and the objective and principles should be uppermost in our minds morning, noon and night. The challenge is ours, and in my faith in America and the American people I know that challenge will be met."

Cemetery ceremonies followed a parade which started at 12th and Central, with J. J. Riemersma as marshal of the day, assisted by Major Martin Japina and Major William Sikkil. In the parade were six bands, veterans and patriotic groups, Boy Scouts and Camp Fire girls and city officials.

George Lumsden announced the program at the cemetery which included dirges and patriotic selections by the Legion band, the governor's proclamation by Richard Klann, "Gettysburg Address" by John Dethmers, Jr., decorating of graves by Scouts, choral readings by Camp Fire girls, firing of military salute by the National Guard and taps by band members.

Two former mayors of Holland, Henry Geerlings and William Brusse, were given special recognition at the brief exercises which lasted considerably less than an hour.
