Holland Woman Dies in Smashup

EAST SAUGATUCK (Special) — A rural Holland woman was fatally injured Tuesday at 5:15 p.m. in a two-car crash at the intersection of 60th St. and 136th Ave., near East Saugatuck.

Mrs. Dora Kotman, 52, of route 5, Holland, was pronounced dead on arrival at Holland Hospital. Medical Examiner Dr. Henry N. Smit of Hamilton said death was due to a fracture of the neck.

Allegan County Deputy Andy Vander Vliet, who today is continuing his investigation, said Mrs. Kotman was thrown from her car by the impact and lay in the road near the car.

The driver of the other car, Henry T. Anderson Jr., 43, of route 1, East Saugatuck, was not injured, Vander Vliet said.

Allegan County authorities Wednesday charged Anderson with negligent homicide. He was released on his own recognizance, and no date has been set for his arraignment.

According to Vander Vliet, Mrs. Kotman was driving east on 136th Ave. while Anderson was headed south on 60th St. when the two met in the middle of the intersection. Both were alone in their cars, according to Vander Vliet, and he said both cars, Mrs. Kotman's 1952 model and Anderson's 1953 model, were damaged in excess of their value.

Mrs. Kotman was born in Lake-ton Township and was a member of the East Saugatuck Christian Reformed Church, the Christian School Circle and the Willing Workers Ladies Aid Society.

Surviving are the husband, Harm; two daughters, Miss Gladys Kotman and Miss Darthea Kotman; one son, Robert; two sisters, Mrs. Gerrit Gruppen of Graafschap and Mrs. John Stadt of East Saugatuck.

Funeral services will be held Saturday at 2 p.m. at the East Saugatuck Christian Reformed Church with the Rev. Simon Vroon officiating. Burial will be in East Saugatuck Cemetery. Relatives are asked to meet in the church basement at 1:45 p.m.

Relatives and friends may meet the family at the Nibbelink-Notter Funeral Chapel Thursday and Friday from 2 to 4 and 7 to 9 p.m. Arrangements are by Clarence Mulder and Sons.

New Areas Will Sit In On Council

Three Ex-Officio Representatives Will Be Appointed

City Council Wednesday night unanimously authorized Mayor Robert Visscher to appoint three persons from the newly annexed areas to Holland city to attend all formal and informal meetings of City Council.

Specifically, Council granted permission to the mayor to send communications to the citizens committees in the Maplewood, Montello Park and Apple Ave. areas requesting three nominations from each area. The mayor will select one of the three in each case. The three areas were annexed to Holland in a special election Tuesday.

Mayor Visscher said the three representatives would have no vote in Council proceedings but they would be able to sit in and advise Council on decisions affecting the new areas as well as other city matters.

"Eventually we will have a study on charter revision with a view to changing ward boundaries, but that will take some time. In the interim we want these areas to feel they are a part of Holland city and advise us in what we hope will be an orderly transition in government affairs," the mayor said.

Before he broached the idea of representatives, he welcomed the new citizens and promised he and City Council will do everything in their power to make them feel they are a part of the city of Holland. "As soon as is humanly possible, we will extend such services as police and fire protection and building inspection, and as requests come in for such services as water and sewer, I am sure our Board of Public Works and our engineering department will do everything possible to expedite such services," the mayor said.

City Manager Herb Holt outlined plans for a study the next two weeks in which needs for the new areas will be considered until July 1, 1959. He said an analysis will be made of additional resources available to the city in sales tax and gas and weight tax, and he hopes services will be carried on for the first year without much additional cost. He also said a settlement with townships will be worked out, according to legal procedure.

Mayor Visscher said present city residents should get out of the habit of referring to the newly annexed areas as outlying areas, but Manager Holt felt the "newcomers" would not like to lose their present identities altogether. He felt sure the residents would be referring to Montello Park, Maplewood and Apple Ave. for a long time to come.

Mayor Visscher concurred on this point, much as residents of Holland's newest subdivision identify themselves as living in Wildwood. "Just remember we all live in the city of Holland now," the mayor said.

Boat Docks Here

Montello Park docks in Holland will be the final stop June 12 at 2 p.m. for the S.S. North American carrying more than 150 Grand Rapids businessmen on a four-day cruise starting Monday, June 9. The cruise is the 18th annual sponsored by the Grand Rapids Chamber of Commerce and will start at Muskegon, continue north to Sault Ste Marie and St. Ignace and south to Holland.

Mayor Grooms New Residents

"We're very happy to welcome all these people into Holland," Mayor Robert Visscher said Wednesday. "As soon as annexation is effected (July 4 for Apple Ave. and Montello Park and July 18 for Maplewood) these sections will have police and fire protection immediately. And we're going to extend other city services and utilities just as rapidly as we can for those sections which request them."

The Mayor's words reflected the happiness of other city leaders in the belief that a larger community can better solve its problems by working together than working separately.

Jack Plewes, who with Mrs. Clarence Becker headed the city's get-out-the-vote promotion, was extremely grateful for all the effort expended and thanked all the hard workers inside and outside the city for their efforts.

Plewes, who is president of the Chamber of Commerce, was particularly happy that Holland can now expand industrially as well as residentially. He said there are many potential industrial sites in the new areas which should answer Holland's industrial needs for a long time to come.

They will return for sentence at 11:30 a.m. July 10. The offense occurred May 24 at the cottage of Charles Price in Port Sheldon township.

Harry Emerson, 51, route 1, Marne, who was arraigned on a charge of rape, waived the reading of the information and a plea of not guilty was entered. Cash bond of \$500 was to be furnished and trial will be set for the June term. The alleged offense occurred on or about April 5, 1957 in Wright township, involving a 16-year-old girl.

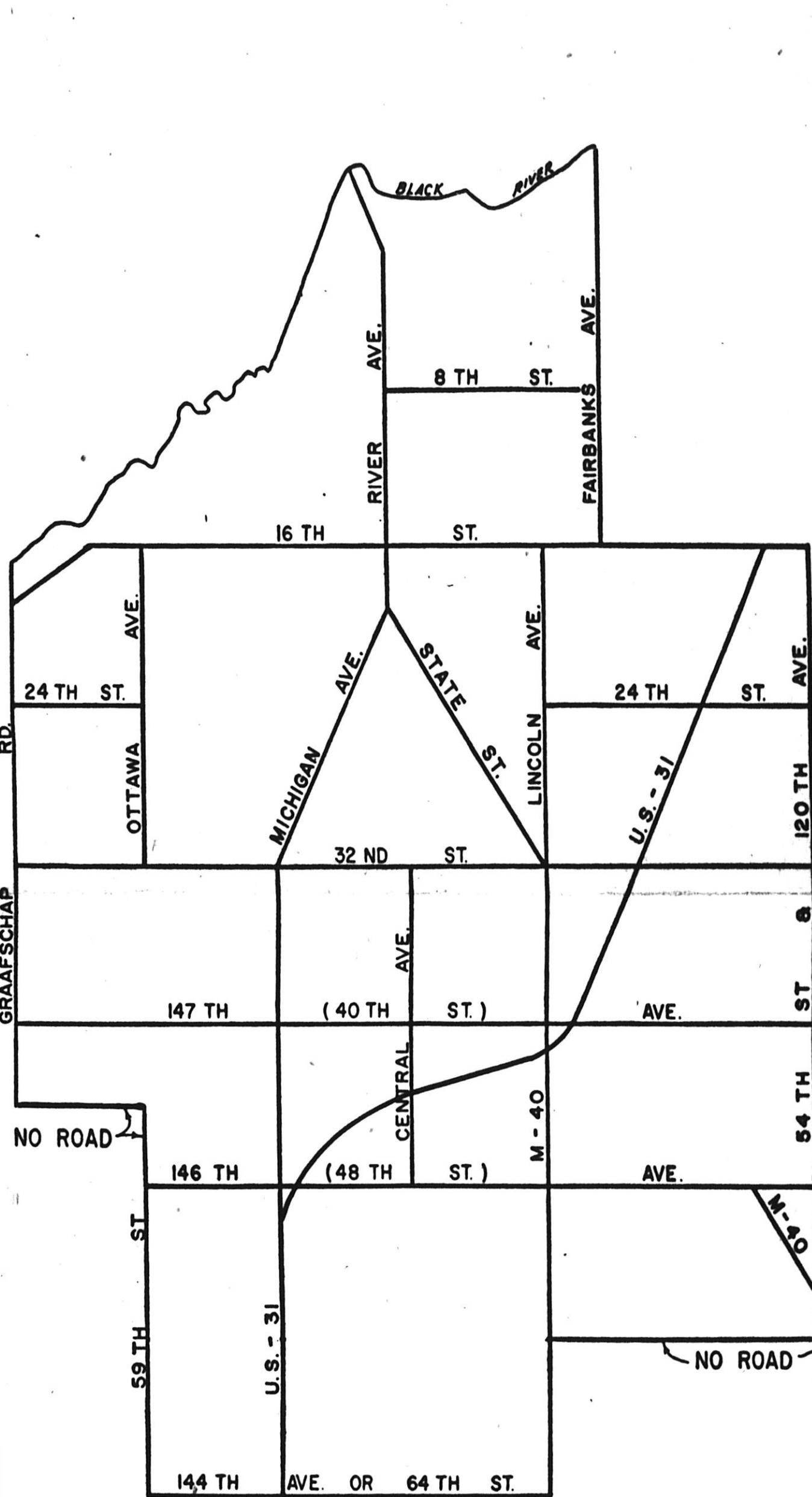

Plans Under Study to Extend Services to Annexed Areas

City Manager Herb Holt met this morning with heads of city departments to discuss all phases of city services to the newly annexed areas of Apple Ave., Maplewood and Montello Park. Some services such as police and fire protection will be made available immediately and others will require more time.

All department heads were instructed to draw up supplementary budgets to finance their programs until July 1, 1959, taking into account increased responsibilities.

The street department flusher which has a 2,500-gallon capacity will be placed in a local fire station to be used in event of fire in the new areas.

Allegan and Ottawa Road Commissions will be asked to effect transfers of roads as soon as possible, with a view that next November's road aid covering July, August and September will be available from the Motor Vehicle Fund.

City Manager Holt, City Attorney James E. Townsend and City Auditor Fonger will go to Kalamazoo Friday to study Kalamazoo's methods of expediting services in its city enlargement program which involved four annexations within the last two years.

Preparations also are under way for registering new residents in time for the state primary election in August.

Water and sewer lines will be laid as soon as requests for such services can be processed by the Board of Public Works. These services require petitions and the establishment of benefit districts.

Federal Turns Down Proposal

Maplewood, Apple Ave., Montello Park Okayed In City by Heavy Vote

Holland city tripled in size as the result of annexation elections Tuesday. Population wise, the city's 15,858 inhabitants (1950 census) increases to approximately 30,000.

Three of the four districts seeking political annexation to Holland city were victorious, and a fourth district lost.

Apple Ave. and Montello Park will officially become part of the city on July 4 and the Maplewood area joins the city July 18.

Voting to come into the city were Apple Ave. district, Montello Park and Maplewood area. The vote failed to carry in Federal district. Apple Ave. is a mile-square area bordering Holland to the southeast. Montello Park consists of a half mile lying just west of Holland. Both are in Holland township.

Maplewood is a 4 1/2 mile area directly south of the city. It lies in Fillmore township, Allegan county.

These three areas add up to six square miles which is double the present size of the city which in land area is just under three square miles.

Apple Ave. voted 98 to 70 to come into the city, or a 58.3 per cent. Montello Park voted 227 to 173 or 56.9 per cent. Maplewood voted 435 to 392, or 52.6 per cent. Federal lost 96 to 168, or a 33 per cent yes vote.

Holland city rallied tremendously to the annexation issue and voted all four issues with a better than 5 to 1 majority. Total city vote was 3,646 giving each issue a plurality of better than 2,450 votes. The city's vote for the Apple Ave. issue of 3,028 to 555 was indicative of the vote on the other three areas.

As expected, the outlying areas in Holland township and Fillmore township voted against annexation, but Holland's plurality offset the township vote with a large margin. Annexation is a three-way vote. The area seeking to annex must have a positive vote. Then the city vote is added to the vote in the remainder of the township, and the result must also be positive.

Tuesday's vote was particularly complex in view of the fact that in Holland township, the areas seeking annexation also voted whether to release other annexing areas.

Precinct 3 in Holland township (fire station at Hart and Cooley) had a difficult time because both Apple Ave. and Federal districts lie in the precinct, plus a considerable area outside the two districts. This outlying area (roughly Van Raalte school district) was the only outside area favoring annexation.

Beechwood area (precinct 1) opposed annexation almost 5 to 1. Precinct 4 (near Zeeland) opposed it almost 20 to 1, but precinct 5 (town hall on 120th) opposed it 10 to 1. Yet when these votes were added to the city vote, all measures carried comfortably 2 to 1, roughly 3,600 to 1,800 votes.

In Fillmore township, the opposing vote in outlying areas was better than 10 to 1, but added to the city vote the Maplewood section carried about 3,000 to 1,000.

News of the annexation success was greeted jubilantly by the hard-working committees who promoted annexation in their own areas and by city workers. Some Apple Ave. residents and city leaders planted a "city limit" sign at 32nd St. and 120th Ave. as soon as it was determined that the Apple Ave. district was "in." This intersection is the furthest point from the city in Apple Ave. district.

Holland's new boundary is thus: 16th St. east to 120th and south to the county line and continuing south another 1 1/2 miles, then just west one mile to Lincoln Ave., then south another half mile, and continuing west 1 1/2 miles on 144th Ave. in Allegan county, then north 1 1/2 miles to what would be 44th St. west to Graafschap Rd. and north to Lake Macatawa at Montello Park.

Main issue at stake in the four elections was a school problem involving secondary education. The Holland Board of Education had promised to continue to educate high school students of any district that annexed to Holland city.

Appeals Conviction

He was charged with running a stop sign on Lakewood Blvd., and 152nd Ave. in Park township March 2. He was convicted at trial in Justice Wilbur Kow's court May 2 and sentenced to pay \$5 fine and \$7.50 costs.

May Dry And Warm: Steketee

May was warm and dry—very dry—according to weather statistics compiled by Observer Charles Steketee at Hope College.

The average temperature was 58.6 degrees or 1.9 above normal, and the warmest stretch occurred during Tulip Time with temperatures in the upper 70's and 80's. Maximum temperature recorded was during the afternoon of band day, May 17, when 84 was registered.

Rainfall during the month amounted to only .88 inch, almost five inches under the heavy rainfall for the same month last year which measured 5.54 inches. May's light rainfall was 2.54 inches below normal. Rain fell on only five days, compared with 11 in 1957, 21 in 1956, 11 in 1955 and 11 in 1954. Largest amount in a 24-hour period was .37 inch registered May 18, the day after Tulip Time. Rainfall Saturday, May 31, measured .21 inch.

Fog was noted May 2 and thunder May 17 and 18, and also on May 31.

Average temperature was 58.6, compared with 57.1 in 1957; 57.3 in 1956, 61.1 in 1955 and 54.8 in 1954. Maximum was 84, compared with 81 in 1957, 85 in 1956, 85 in 1955 and 86 in 1954. Minimum was 32 (May 5), compared with 33 in 1957, 34 in 1956, 30 in 1955 and 31 in 1954.

Average maximum was 71.1, compared with 66.5 in 1957, 67.9 in 1956, 73.2 in 1955 and 65.8 in 1954. Average minimum was 46, compared with 47.6 in 1957, 46.7 in 1956, 49 in 1955 and 43.7 in 1954.

Precipitation was .88 inch, compared with 5.54 inches in 1957, 5.39 in 1956, 2.04 in 1955 and 1.19 in 1954.

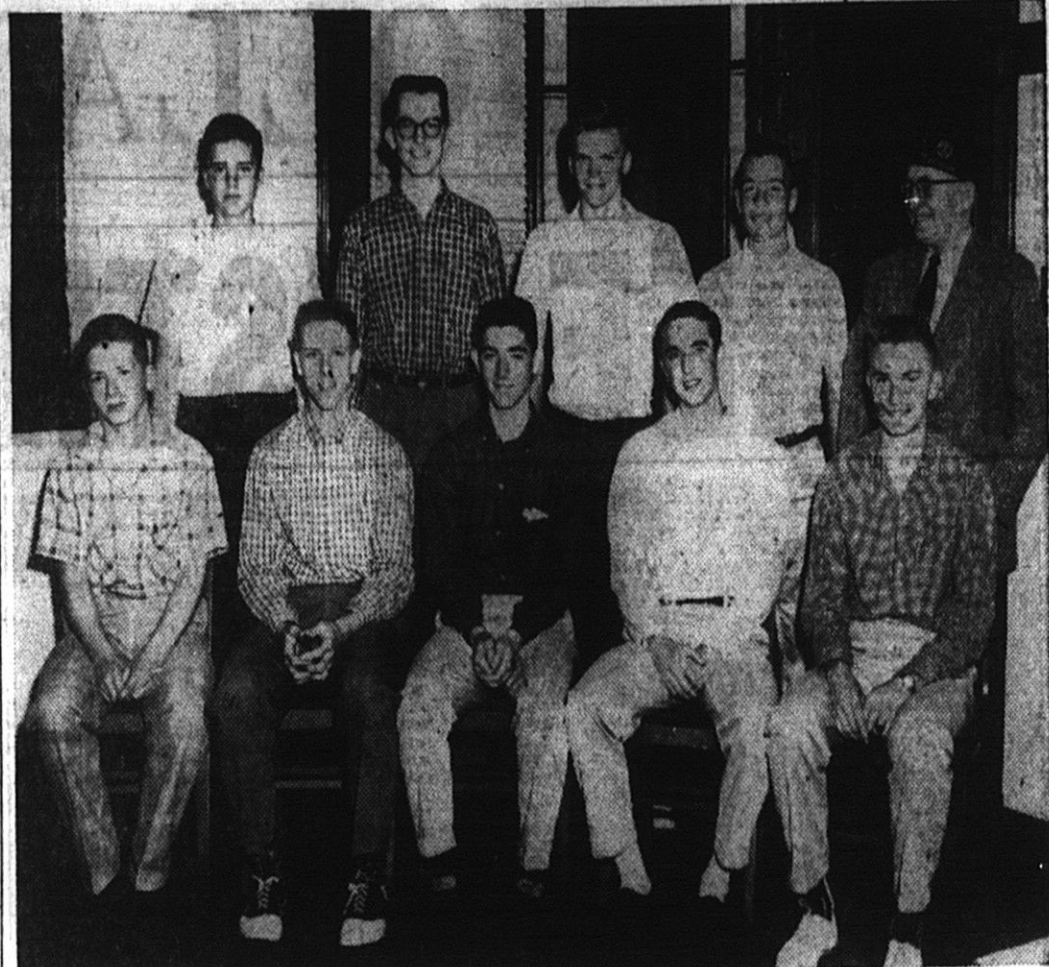

Vander Lind Received 11 Letters at Hope

The finish to a brilliant four-year Hope College athletic career took place Monday on the stage of the Hope Memorial Chapel as Merwyn (Mert) Vander Lind received the Dr. Otto Vander Velde of Holland all-campus award.

This award is presented annually to the outstanding senior athlete at Hope College and Vander Lind was certainly deserving of the honor. Last week he received an H blanked, awarded seniors who have completed four years in a sport.

Besides being an outstanding campus personality and a good student, Vander Lind is the first 11-varsity letterman at Hope College.

Vander Lind lettered in football and baseball each of his four years and in basketball three times. He made the varsity basketball team this past season, too, and would have lettered but he decided to give up the sport in favor of spending more time with his studies.

This paid off too, as Vander Lind, 21, received an assistantship in physics at the University of Ohio. It is an instructional type of assistantship in the graduate school.

At the same time, Vander Lind, who majored in physics and mathematics, plans to do additional studies and obtain a master's degree.

Vander Lind's accomplishments on the gridiron are the best known. He operated as a halfback and quarterback as last year he was captain of the Hope team which finished in a tie for second in the MIAA.

"Being elected captain by the best kind of guys I know," Vander Lind said was his biggest athletic thrill during college.

Last season, he started at halfback, but was switched to quarterback where he functioned well and was rewarded with a unanimous selection on the all-MIAA team. He also received all-state mention.

In speaking about Vander Lind's football ability, Coach Russ De Vette said "he had the ability to do anything. He had been a quarterback in high school and we made him a halfback and then switched him back to quarter. And wherever we played him, he performed well. He would get hit and bounce right up and if he did get hurt, he would hit just as hard,

the next time," De Vette said.

Vander Lind played regularly for a time during the 1956-57, 1956-57 seasons in basketball. "He was our middle man and saw a lot of action," De Vette said.

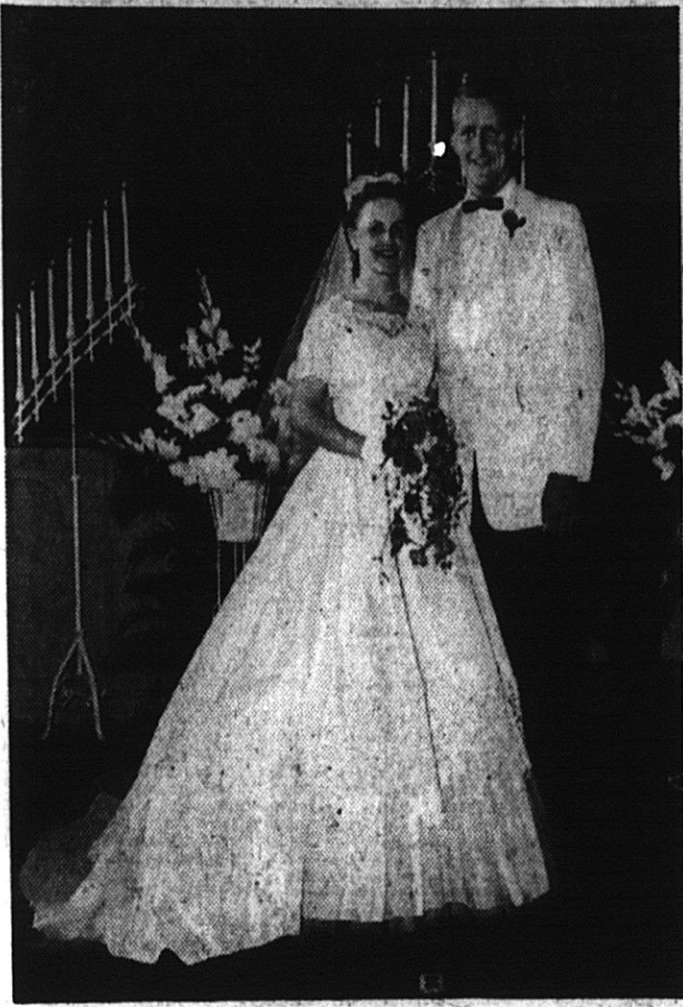
Versatility again was noticed in baseball where, after catching in high school, he became an infielder at Hope and then was made a pitcher his final two years.

A reception for 140 guests was held in the church parlors.

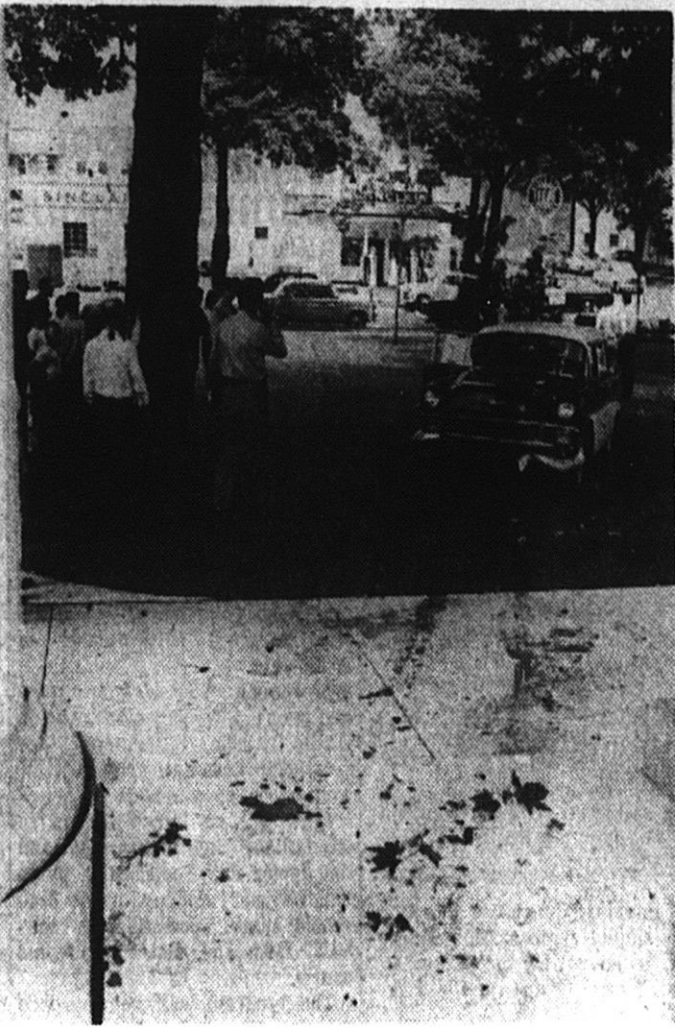

'Spirit' and 'Desire' Kept Hope's Hilmert in Athletics

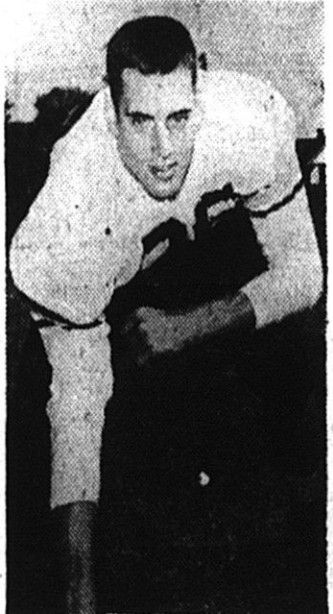
A story Hope College track coach Gord Brewer is going to tell to future Hope athletes concerns one of his best tracksters, Jim Hilmert.

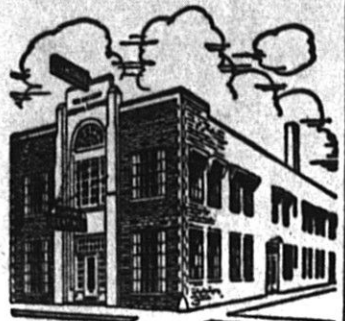
State Park Attracts 18,500 on Holiday

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GATHERING THE NEWS

The announcement that the United Press Association and the International News Service have united to form a single news agency may not mean much to the average newspaper reader. That average reader is likely to take the news in his paper for granted; he doesn't trouble his head much as to how it gets there.

But news is a commodity that is bought and sold exactly in the same way in which a bushel of potatoes or a ton of steel or an automobile or an airplane carrier is produced and put to the service of the public. In both cases human lives are often sacrificed. Gathering news is not infrequently a highly dangerous business. Once in a great while the general reader becomes conscious of that fact, when such a tragedy as the death of an Ernie Pyle in wartime brings it to his attention. But such tragedies are not confined to war time, they are happening in peacetime as well.

The average newspaper reader understands that it takes millions, sometimes billions, to run a steel plant or an automobile concern or an airplane industry. He does not always understand that the same thing is true of the business that supplies him with the news items from far away India or Europe or South America. It was because the great news associations had the capital, and hence the equipment and personnel, to cover such events, that the recent flap in South America in connection with the Nixon visit could be set forth each night in such papers as the Sentinel.

The Sentinel is directly interested in the consolidation of the two great news associations just announced because this paper has been a member of the United Press since the present management took over in the middle twenties. To the Sentinel, and hence to its readers, it means that the coverage of world news will be greatly increased; local readers will get the benefit of the equipment and staff of the added organization facilities that are spread all over the globe.

The new organization will from now on be called the "United Press International," thus combining in one convenient phrase the essential parts of the names of both bodies. The familiar symbol with which Sentinel readers have become familiar over national and foreign news stories, "UPI," has been changed to the symbol, "UPI," thus preserving even in the identifying symbol the main parts of both.

But the important thing about the new combination is that it will double the coverage of world news. That's where the average reader comes in; he gets more for his money in the news that he buys in the local paper.

Sunday School Lesson

Sunday, June 8
In the Land of Promise
Joshua 11:16-20, 23; 24:14-18
by C. P. Dame

The Israel which left Egypt with hope and enthusiasm failed to enter into the Promised Land. The children of those who marched out of Egypt marched into Canaan and under the leadership of Joshua conquered the country. To gain a country is one thing to keep it is another. Before his death Joshua told them how to keep it.

I. To do a job well gives satisfaction. "So Joshua took all that land, the hills, and all the south country. . . . the land that God had promised to Abraham, Isaac and Jacob. Canaan was a small country but it was divided into many little city-states which all had their kings who often fought with each other. This was a war of invasion. The Israelites partially exterminated the inhabitants. The Bible tells us that the inhabitants of Canaan were terribly corrupt. Archeology confirms what the Bible teaches. The book, "The Bible as History" by Werner Keller tells us how corrupt those people were. Religion and all manner of immoralities were closely tied together.

If those corrupt people would have continued to pollute themselves and other nations the condition of that part of the world would have been frightful. The cup of their iniquity was full. God hardened their hearts so that they fought against Israel and got defeated. The hand of God was in this conquest. The judgment of God came upon this nation. God still judges nations—this we have seen in our own time.

Joshua completely conquered the land. This does not mean that there was no more mopping up to do. There were localities to conquer. However Israel failed to do this and later on these natives tempted Israel to idolatry and misled many. The one failure led to others. This still happens too frequently.

II. Good counsel deserves to be followed. Joshua called together the leaders of the nation to Shechem a short time before his death. This was a memorable gathering. Undoubtedly those who were there remembered it for a long time. Joshua, who was the first citizen of the nation, gave an address. In it he first told them about their history and the big role God had played in their national affairs—how he had led them all the way. And then he presented them with a challenge to serve the Lord and put away their idols.

He told them that they should serve God in sincerity and in truth. However if they did not want to serve God then they should choose to serve the idols of their fathers which they worshipped in Chaldea or the idols of the nation they had conquered. Before the nation could make a choice Joshua said to them, that he and his family would serve God. The nation loudly said that it would serve God. Individuals and nations need to choose what kind of a god they intend to serve. Today we too must choose and we do. If we do not serve the living God then we serve an idol of some kind. Yes, there are plenty of idols to choose from now—a car, a house, an easy chair, a business the family or self.

The generation that promised to serve God in Canaan did so as recorded in the words, "And Israel served the Lord all the days of Joshua, and all the days of the elders who outlived Joshua and had known all the work which the Lord did for Israel." After the passing of that generation another generation arose who "did not know the Lord or the work which he had done for Israel" and some of these forsook God. Generations are not all alike. It is a blessed thing when generation after generation serves God.

The welfare of a nation depends upon its loyalty to God. Too many families fail to realize the importance of worship and godliness. Paganism ruins a nation but godliness blesses it. Each family can make a contribution to the well-being of the nation or subtract from it.

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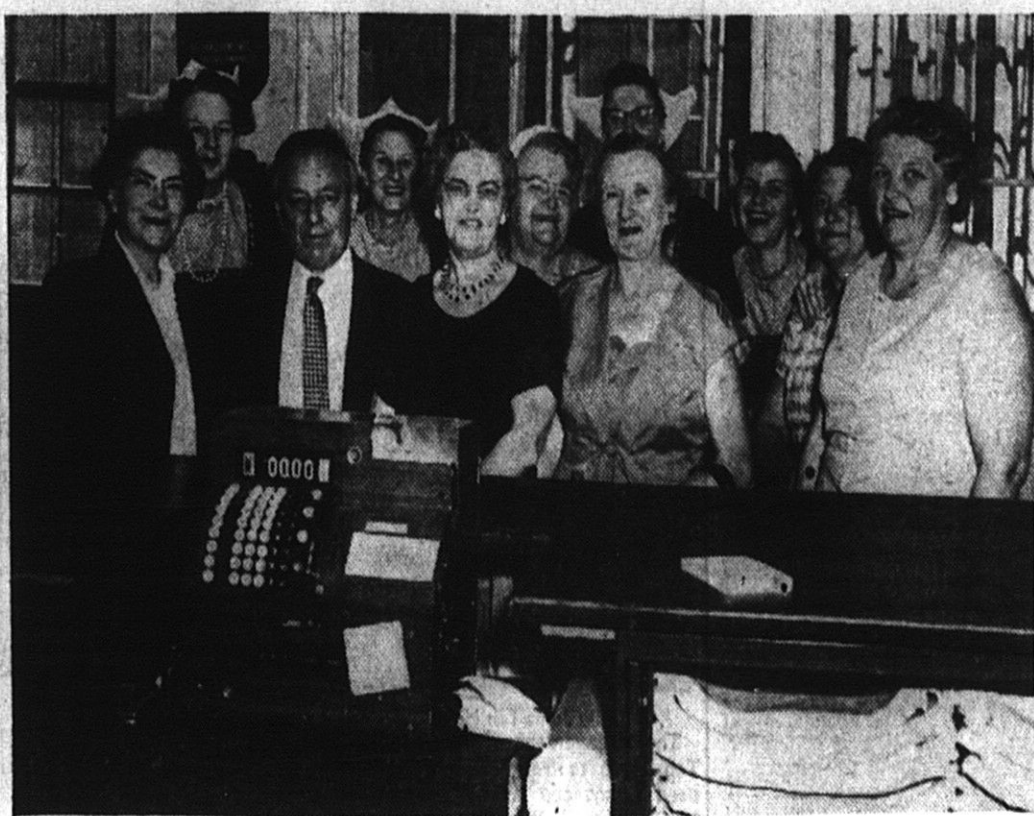

Former Co. D Men Have Rich Memories

Holland's National Guard Co. D Friday will celebrate the 37th anniversary of its existence as a proud unit of the 126th Infantry Regiment.

The history of Co. D started in March, 1921, when it was formed under the guiding hand of Capt. Henry Geerds, who made it a strong, crack outfit in which he is still personally interested, as a retired Lt. Colonel.

The local unit was formed with three officers and 52 men, and a proud Holland has since always kept it supplied with the finest young men. Today the company numbers six officers and 139 men.

Always outstanding in the field and in garrison, Co. D won the Badger Trophy at Camp Grayling in 1928, presented by the Wisconsin officers of the 32nd Division to the Michigan company showing the greatest all-around military proficiency. Co. D repeated the conquest in 1929 and 1930 to take permanent possession of the trophy.

In 1936 the local unit played an enthusiastic part in the Alagan war maneuvers, "battling" regular army troops in Alagan and Kalamazoo counties. The exercise was

called the greatest war maneuvers ever held up to that time.

During the labor strife of 1937, Co. D was called up, along with other state National Guard units, to keep order in the great Flint sit-down strike. Again the Holland boys conducted themselves well in a ticklish situation.

On October 15, 1940, with the world moving rapidly toward the most terrible war in history, Co. D was called into federal service, and ten days later the company of three officers and 77 men left for Camp Beauregard, La.

After extensive training the 126th left San Francisco for Australia in April, 1942. On Sept. 23, Co. D landed with the regiment at Port Moresby, New Guinea, to begin the long, tortuous, island-hopping battle against the Japanese forces.

The list of the places where Co. D fought is virtually the story of the war in the Pacific. They fought at Buna, they fought at Milne Bay, they fought at Saidor.

They fought at Aitape, at Morotai, at Leyte and on Luzon.

In 654 days of actual combat, eight men of Co. D were killed,

and 11 wounded in action, of the original group which left Holland.

One of the original group was killed in a military accident in the states and one, transferred from the outfit while it was in Louisiana, became a prisoner of war in Germany.

The 32nd Division was deactivated in Kure, Japan, on February 28, 1946.

Following the war, the 32nd Division's numerals were given to Wisconsin and the 126th Regiment became a part of the new 46th National Guard Division.

Co. D was reactivated as part of the National Guard here on Dec. 11, 1946, taking over again from the Home Guard troops.

Co. D is still a topnotch outfit, one in which the city of Holland takes justifiable pride. At the Camp Grayling encampment of 1954, Co. D won the coveted Eisenhower Award, as the "most outstanding company-sized unit in the Michigan National Guard."

Many former members of Co. D will gather at the Armory Friday for the reunion. They will have a world of memories to relate.

77 Seniors To Enter Field Of Teaching

Fifty-two per cent of Hope College's graduating class this year will enter the teaching profession, according to statistics compiled by Garrett Vanderborgh, head of the education department at the college.

"This means," Vanderborgh said, "that 77 members of the senior class will receive provisional teaching certificates. Thirty-five will teach in elementary schools and 42 in high schools. In the secondary field, 12 have majored in history, nine in mathematics, nine in English, five in science, three in business administration, three in music and one in psychology."

Nine teacher candidates plan to continue professional education in graduate schools where they will work towards master's and doctor's degrees before entering the teaching profession.

These nine seniors include three from Holland: Roger H. Borr, son of Mr. and Mrs. Richard Borr of 122 East 20th St. will study at Michigan State University. Stanley J. Harrington, son of Mr. and Mrs. James Harrington of 186 East 37th St., will study at the University of Iowa. Calvin Langejans, son of Mr. and Mrs. John Langejans of 199 East 37th St., will study at the University of Michigan.

In addition to the 77 students, two others have completed work in other fields and will take education courses in summer school to begin meeting teaching requirements.

Most of the graduates will begin their teaching careers in Michigan but some will teach in other states and in foreign countries. Some of the men graduates will delay their professional experiences and enter military service.

HHS Seniors Hear Hope College Dean

"First we must be learners, then doers and finally possessors," Dr. William Vander Lugt, dean of the faculty at Hope College, told Holland High seniors at baccalaureate services at 4 p.m. in Civic Center Sunday.

Dr. Vander Lugt based his message on three Biblical sayings: (1) Teach me Thy Word, O Lord. (2) I will walk in Thy truth, and (3) Unite my heart to fear Thy Name. His subject was "The Luster of This Hour."

He said religion has been defined variously as man's search for God, also man's attempt to escape from God. He said the search began in the garden in the cool of the day. To find God today he suggested reading the Bible, the autobiography of a living and a loving God. "We must be devoted to something greater than we are," he said, "and if your lives are to count you must be carried out of yourself. The gospel needs men — not passive men but those who will revolutionize the world. The gospel is uncompromising and at times you may think your task is hopeless, but a life devoted to Christ will bring the divine accolade, 'Thou Good and Faithful Servant.'"

Dr. Vander Lugt said many criticisms have been leveled against the younger generation — criticisms he felt often were unjust. He quoted a California educator who felt children today were not being taught the discipline needed to get along in this world.

For a solution, he turned again to the Bible telling the graduates to hold fast to this prayer and they would have a power nothing on earth can impeach.

The Rev. Herbert W. Scott of Immanuel Church gave the invocation and benediction and the Rev. Charles Vander Beek of Rose Park Reformed Church read scripture and gave prayer. Graduates Told Truth Will Prevail

Secretary of Army Brucker Tells Class, Character is Goal

Speaking to the 1958 graduating class of Hope College and a full audience in Hope Memorial Chapel, Secretary of the Army Wilber M. Brucker Monday told the graduates that character and sincerity are the most important weapons the United States possesses in its life and death struggle with the Communist forces in the world.

The Communists, Brucker said, have placed all their faith in science in their drive to enslave the world, but against this grave peril stands the courage and morality of the free world.

The victory will go to those, he said, who have the courage and conviction to stand for truth against those who would enslave the world with deceit.

"Forget yourself, and learn to be concerned about your fellow man," Brucker said, "and you will be far more effective in the end."

Brucker took issue with those who say, "Every man has his price," and when things go wrong in the United States, "That is the price we pay for democracy."

Millions of men of high character are not for sale at any price, he said, and courage and morality are the only price we pay for democracy.

Brucker spoke of his personal experience in seeing boys become men guarding the borders of the free world at the Iron Curtain, ready to lay down their lives, and asked for a similar devotion to duty from the Hope graduates.

On the subject of the size and number of Russian "Sputniks," Brucker defended American scientists, saying that our marvelously intricate satellites are fully large enough to do a far better job of reporting cosmic information than the Russian giants, "unless they are withholding a lot of information."

Brucker said that in speaking to the Congressional Medal of Honor winners in Washington a short time ago, he told them, "You did not get this highest award because you went out to get it, but because you thought of your fellow man."

Truth will ultimately prevail, he said, as immortalized in one of his favorite songs, "The Battle Hymn of the Republic." His truth goes marching on.

Following the presentation of diplomas as to the graduating class, Brucker was awarded the honorary degree of Doctor of Laws by Hope College President Dr. Irwin J. Lubbers.

The Rev. William C. Walvoord, an early graduate of Hope College, was awarded the honorary degree of Doctor of Divinity.

Hope Grads Win Honors at WTS

Of the 13 scholarship awards given at the Western Theological Seminary 1958 Commencement nine were won by Hope College graduates. Robert A. Nykamp of Holland won three of them.

Hope College is providing the church with an average of thirty ministers a year. There are at present 135 men enrolled at Hope College who have declared their intentions of going into the ministry. As lower classmen advance into their junior and senior years at Hope, others will be added to this number.

In New Brunswick and Western Seminars, there are enrolled at present 72 Hope graduates. The total for the seven-year period, from freshmen in college to seniors in seminary, is 207.

Ronald Hamelink of Holland Compiles All-A Mark at MSU

A couple of little girls won't know what it's all about when their daddy receives the plaudits of Michigan State University next Sunday for his outstanding undergraduate record.

But someday they will and with their pride will burst a probable desire to duplicate his feats, a task which will be difficult.

The girls, Mary, 1, and Jane, 2, are the daughters of 25-year-old Ronald C. Hamelink, an engineering student from Holland, who will graduate Sunday from MSU with the first 4.0 grade average in the school's history.

Hamelink is the first student in MSU's history to compile a 4.0 average through four years of undergraduate study, Registrar Kermit H. Smith reported.

The record is even more remarkable because Hamelink, an agricultural engineering major, took two years of German and a number of advanced mathematics courses besides the bachelor's degree requirements.

Four points are awarded for A's, three for B's and so on in the MSU system. Hamelink earned three B's while taking some 250 credits—212 are required to graduate—but in each case he took the subject over and got an A. He said a mixture of pride and a desire for perfection prompted him to repeat the courses.

Son of Dr. and Mrs. M. H. Hamelink, 700 West 26th St., Hamelink lives with his wife, Myra, and his two daughters in a six-room home in East Lansing. He sublets an upstairs apartment to help pay his rent, adding small-scale real estate brokerage to his other accomplishments.

Hamelink will take graduate work at MSU this summer and enter the University of Chicago in the fall. He has a National Science Foundation fellowship to study mathematics at Chicago.

Though four to six hours of daily study left him little time for outside activities, Hamelink was elected to several honorary societies and won three awards at a recent College of Agriculture honors banquet.

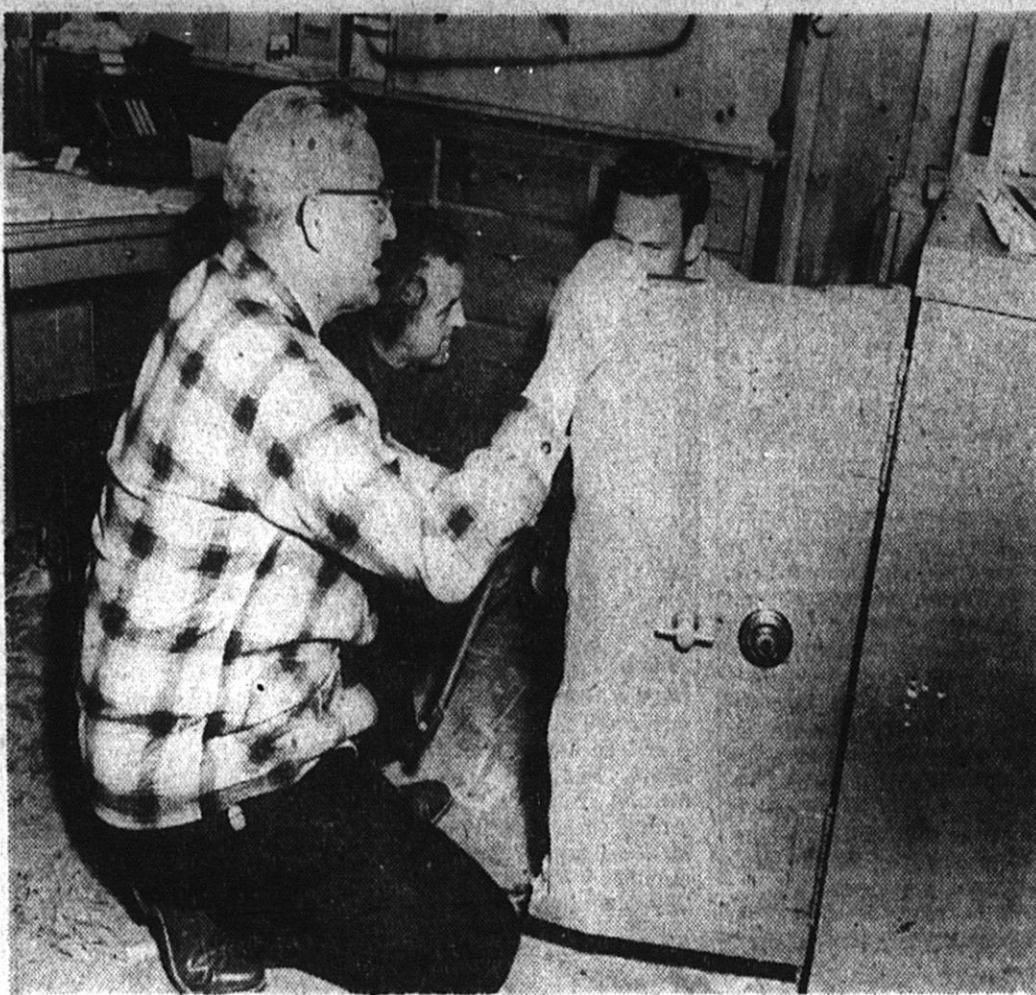

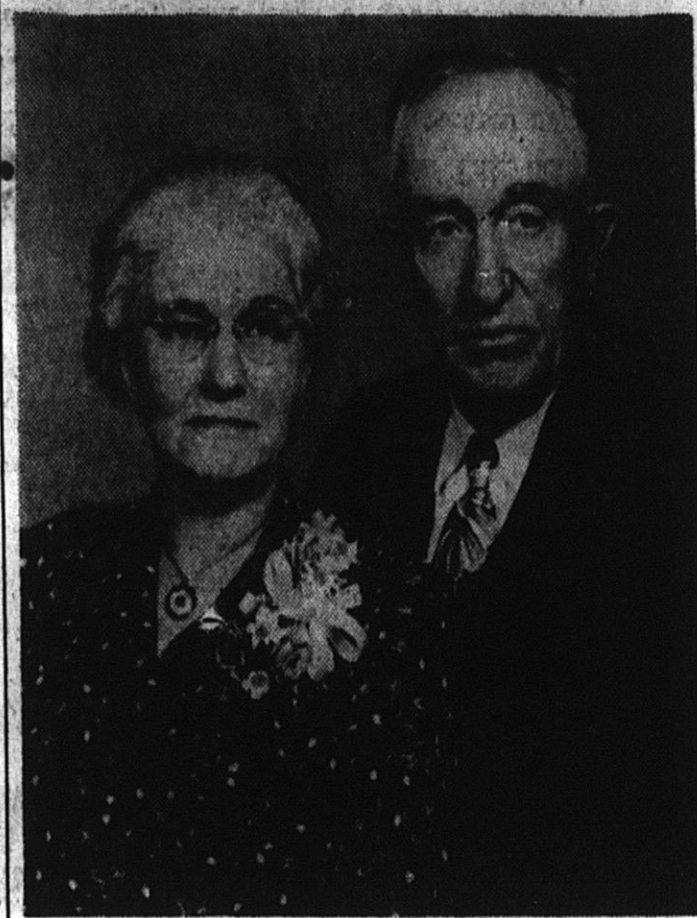

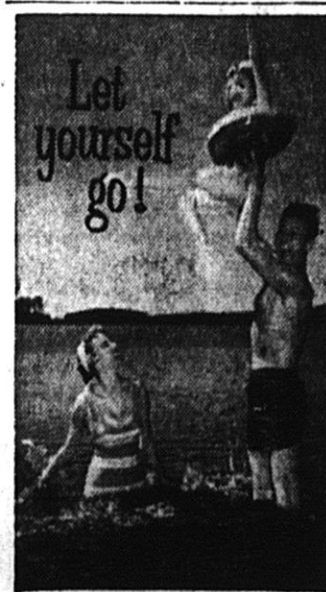
