Hope Graduates Hear Dr. Theodore Yntema; Five Persons Honored

Hope College's 95th annual commencement was held Monday in Dimnent Memorial Chapel, with 189 seniors receiving A. B. degrees and hearing an address by Dr. Theodore O. Yntema, vice president of the Ford Motor Co. The commencement address was entitled "Liberal Education."

In his speech, Yntema classified a liberal education into four parts. They are the acquisition and development of, respectively, (1) a considered sense of values based on philosophy, religion and experience; (2) the basic abilities and skills that are widely transferable and needed in nearly all walks of life; (3) a judiciously selected knowledge of classified facts and relationships; and (4) joy, satisfaction, well-being, in the exercise of one's faculties in perceiving, hearing, touching and doing in all the various aspects of life.

During the service, honorary doctoral degrees were conferred upon five persons; a Doctor of Laws to Miss Beth Marcus, executive secretary of the Board of Domestic Missions of the Reformed Church; a Doctor of Laws to Roger F. Murray, S. Sloan Colt Professor of Banking and Finance at the Graduate School of Business at Columbia University and acting treasurer of the Reformed Church in America; a Doctor of Literature to Dr. Gerrit T. Vander Lugt, president of Central College, Pella, Iowa, and newly appointed Sydnay Professor of Theology at New Brunswick Theological Seminary.

Also receiving honorary degrees were G. John Van Zoeren, retired chemist and donor of the Van Zoeren Library, who received a Doctor of Science degree, and Dr. Theodore Yntema, who received the degree of Doctor of Science.

The pitcher must throw the ball above the head of the batter at some time during its flight to the plate. The arc of the ball may be between one and 10 feet above the batter's head before it comes across the plate.

No base stealing or bunting is allowed in the slow pitch league and it is the first time that slow pitch has been tried on a league basis in the Drenthe area.

The players in the slow pitch league are between ages 25 and 45 and Berens reports that the men have really been having a lot of fun with the game. "And the entire family turns out to watch dad play," Berens said.

School Board Boosts Taxes 71 Cents

Drop in City Rate Keeps Overall Figure Down to Small Increase

Holland taxpayers will pay 1 cent more per \$1,000 valuation in the over-all tax picture this year.

Total tax rate for city property owners, within the Holland school district will be \$48.50 per \$1,000 assessed valuation compared with \$48.49 last year.

Final determination of tax figures was made at a special meeting of the Board of Education Monday in which the board adopted a school operations levy of \$17.70 per \$1,000 valuation, an increase of .71 cents over last year's figure of \$16.99. Already set is the school debt of \$5.96 per \$1,000 valuation.

The \$48.50 tax rate, to be split in summer and fall tax bills, is divided as follows: school operations, \$17.70 compared with \$16.99 last year; city operations, \$16.11 down \$2.21 from \$18.32 last year; county operations, \$7.15 compared with \$7.12 last year; school debt, \$5.96 compared with \$4.41 last year; city debt, \$1.58 compared with \$1.65 last year.

On state equalized figures, school operations total 9,663 mills which is considerably under the 11.09 allowed by the Ottawa county tax allocations commission. The school debt rate is 3.25 mills on equalized figures of \$5.96 on assessed. This covers the new high school. Promotional materials preceding the February election had indicated a 4.25 rate on equalized values or \$6.50 per \$1,000 assessed. That figure had covered the combined program of both school and swimming pool.

Based on equalized figures of \$67,470,179 for Holland school district, the operational millage will provide \$652,030, plus \$219,278 for debt. The school budget will be adopted by June 30.

Board members pointed out this morning that efforts had been made to keep operational costs down and the new budget is regarded as an economy budget, not an austerity budget. The budget included an estimated \$60,000 for increases in teachers salaries and \$4,870 in adjustments for salaries for 16 principals and non-teaching professional employees.

The board has made it clear to principals that the coming year is to be used to evaluate principals' positions and to set up criteria so that for the school year 1961-62 principals will be paid on achievement and competency in relation to the total teacher salary schedule.

The tax rate covers only that part of Holland city which also is Holland school district. Those areas of the city which lie in other school districts will have other school tax figures, although such figures will appear on their city tax bills.

School tax figures for the last few years are difficult to compare since Apple Ave. district annexed to the school district two years ago and Montello Park the past year.

Ritsema Concludes Collegiate Career With New Discus Mark

Ray Ritsema made several contributions to Hope College's athletic successes during his brilliant four-year career and he climaxed it with a new Hope discus record.

The 6'6" senior who was twice voted the most valuable basketball player in the MIAA, threw the discus 136' against Ferris Institute in Big Rapids on May 17.

A check of the Hope athletic records shows that this is a new Hope discus record and breaks a mark that had stood for 11 years. Fred Veltman of Grand Rapids threw the discus 132'9" against Calvin in 1949 for the old mark.

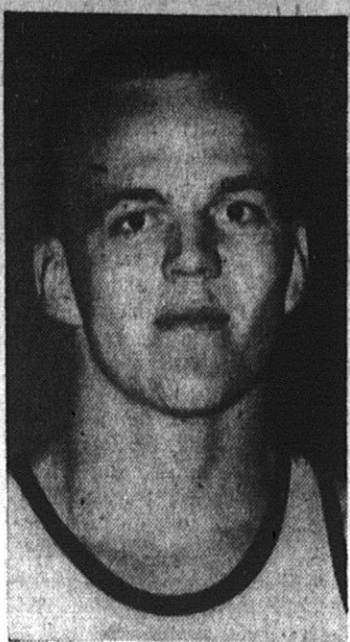
Ritsema's discus record was one of three set at Hope this spring. The other two were made by junior Jim Rozeboom who set an MIAA and Hope mark of 1:58.9 in the half mile and set a Hope record of 4.33 in the mile.

Ritsema also threw the javelin for the Dutch in track competition and high jumped when he was a sophomore.

Setting a track record is another fine credit to Ritsema who also set three Hope basketball records. A great rebounder, he grabbed 28 in one game and had 385 in one season and made 86 free shots in one season.

He scored a total of 490 points last season for an average of 23.3 and made 321 points in MIAA competition. He scored a total of 1,510 points in four years to be third in the all-time Hope scoring derby behind Paul Benes and Warren Vander Hill. Ritsema scored 37 points in one game.

A resident of Momence, Ill., Ritsema won the Randall C. Bosch of Holland gold, diamond-studded basketball as a sophomore and senior. The presentation is made annually to the most valuable

Coach Russ De Vette called Ritsema "the greatest all-around player" he ever coached. Ritsema made all-MIAA all four years.

Following his graduation Monday, he plans to participate in a Venture for Victory, sponsored by the Youth for Christ. Under the program Ritsema will visit several countries in the Far East to play basketball and give religious talks.

Ritsema is undecided about his future plans but may play basketball this winter for the New York Technical Trade Corp. in New York City. The team is a member of the National Industrial Basketball League. Ritsema plans to enter business and sales work and was a business administration major at Hope.

Van Eenenaam Dies at 57

MUSKEGON (Special)—Funeral services were Saturday at 2 p.m. in the Central Reformed Church in Muskegon for Gordon F. Van Eenenaam, 57, of Muskegon who died Thursday in University Hospital in Ann Arbor two days before his 58th birthday.

Van Eenenaam was born in Zeeland, June 4, 1902, was a Muskegon attorney and served four terms as state senator and was a power in the Republican Party at county and state levels for many years.

He was first elected in 1928 and was named GOP floor leader in 1935 and became the administration's "whip" to direct legislation through the Republican-controlled Senate.

Van Eenenaam bolted the Republican party in 1952 and supported Democrat Adlai Stevenson for President and G. Mennen Williams for governor. He broke with the party during the William C. Vandenberg of Holland-Fred M. Alger primary race. Vandenberg was former lieutenant governor.

He accused Alger of "dragging Vandenberg's good name through the gutter." Van Eenenaam served as Vandenberg's political advisor during the campaign.

Van Eenenaam attended Hope College from 1920 to 1922 and graduated from the University of Michigan Law School in 1926. He began law practice in 1927 and married the former Isla G. Pruim in Zeeland, Aug. 17, 1928.

A member of the Central Reformed Church, Van Eenenaam also was a member of the Muskegon County Bar Association, Michigan State Bar Association, American Bar Association, American Judicature Society and the Muskegon Lodge No. 274 BPOE.

Besides his wife, he leaves two sons, John of Muskegon and David of Ann Arbor, one daughter, Isla, of Ann Arbor and one granddaughter. Burial will be in Zeeland.

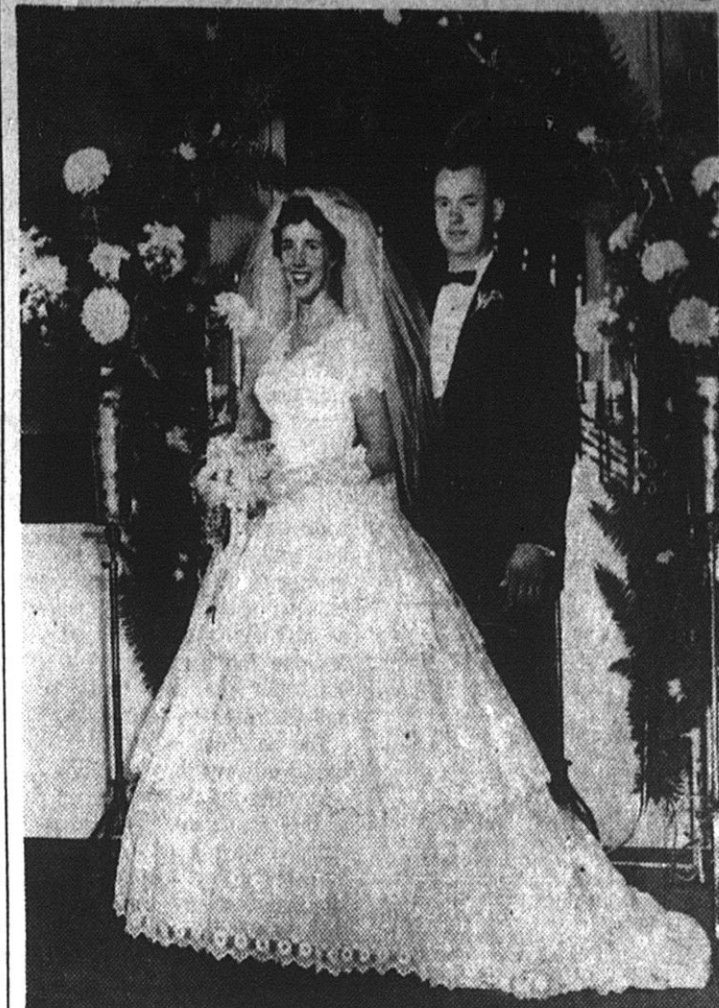

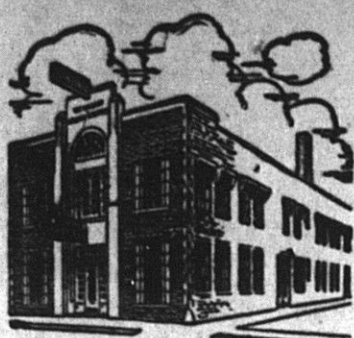

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SOUNDS LIKE A GOOD IDEA
Recently there appeared an editorial in the Milwaukee Journal that reads as follows:

"FOR BETTER

POLITICAL FINANCING
Politics cost money and, in a democracy, there is a duty to participate in politics. One way to do so is to help support the party of your choice.

With that in mind, the Ford Motor Co., backed by the United Auto Workers' union, has started a program to generate among its employees more grass roots political participation.

The company has distributed to its 152,000 workers a set of envelopes. In the small envelope, the company suggests, the employee may put whatever he cares to give to his political party. The envelope is sealed, the party name is written on the outside, and the whole is inserted in a second envelope, which can be dropped in boxes conveniently placed in Ford plants and offices.

Whether or not a particular employee fills out a contribution slip and signs his name the company will never know. The sealed inner envelopes are turned over to the state committee of the party listed on the outside.

"Any support you give to the party of your choice will help to strengthen our American political system," the company has told its employees. Here's a fine idea. Parties need money. It's much better to have the source of that money widespread than to force them to depend upon smaller numbers' of big contributions.

If you favor a political party, why not show it and help its cause by contributing in this election year?"

This sounds like a fine idea. It could be expanded and would help pay for the operation of our political organizations. With this a presidential year and many people finding that they cannot afford to run for high political offices, this method of finance might be the answer to many of our political and government problems. If people support the candidates or their party with their dollars they may become more interested. This we think could be all to the good.

Sunday School Lesson

The Two Ways
Matthew 7:13, 14; Luke 15:11-24
C. P. Dame

This is a timely lesson for a generation that does not care much about discipline, self-denial and restraint. It is much more interested in self-indulgence. Any one familiar with modern life knows that self-discipline is needed much in our land.

I. Jesus tells us about two ways. There is "the strait gate" which leads to the "narrow way," which leads to life. It is unpopular, for but few find it. There is also the wide way. In the words, "wide is the gate, and broad is the way that leadeth to destruction." Jesus tells us about that way which is popular for many walk thereon. Observe the contrast between the ends—the one way leads to life and the other to destruction.

The Lord not only tells us about the two ways but he also gives counsel in the words, "Enter ye in at the strait gate." Luke gives the stronger saying of Jesus, "Strive to enter in by the narrow door: for many, I say unto you, shall seek to enter in, and shall not be able." The broad way is easy and crowded and that appeals to many people. The narrow way is hard and not popular. Of course it is popular to be broadminded in the realm of religion. Is it not strange that science demands narrowness and we want our banker, our druggist, our doctor to be narrow but the Christian minister who is broadminded is lauded?

Let us remember what Jesus says about the narrow way and show disregard for what the crowd has to say. It is the disciplined life that leads to life here and to life in the other world. God has given us the opportunity and privilege to choose. What is your choice?

II. Some young people want their own way. Every church member should know the contents of Luke 15. This chapter contains the three parables of the lost—The Parable of the Lost Sheep, The Lost Coin, The Parable of the Lost Son. Some scholars think that the three parables are really but one. The sheep was lost because it was ignorant and thoughtless, the coin got lost on account of some one's carelessness and the son was lost because of self-will. Anything that is lost has been misplaced and it has become useless to the owner. The person who lost something misses that which has been lost. The father in the parable, who represents God, missed the son more than the son missed the father. Jesus told the three parables in order to justify his associations with publicans and sinners and to reveal the longing heart of his Father for the wayward.

Why did the prodigal leave home where he had everything? It is not told us but we can guess by reading between the lines. Today teenagers complain because of parental guidance and rules. Many want to do as they please, go, leave, act as they wish, regardless of whether it is right or wrong, or contrary to the habits of the family. The Prodigal was a waster, he squandered his inheritance for which he had asked and which he had received and thus showed that he had no sense of values, and no concern about the future. There are young people like that today.

When the young man's money was gone, his friends too left him. Just then a famine came upon the country and he was in dire distress. He looked for a job, finally got work taking care of pigs, the most degrading work a Jewish lad could do. In the midst of his depression he began to think and compare the condition of his father's hired servants and his miserable situation and he resolved to go home. His father saw him coming, ran out to meet him, kissed him and feasted him royally. There is a greater story than this—the story of Jesus and his passion, a story that speaks of the redemptive love of God.

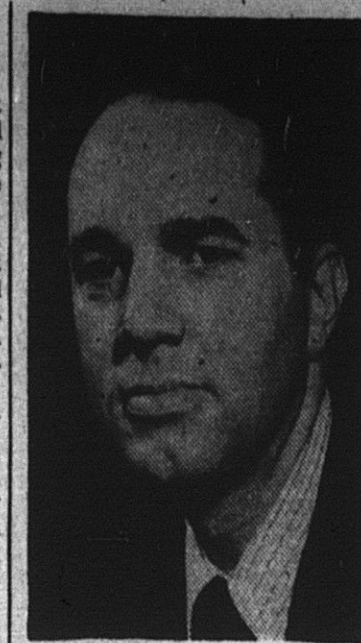

No Election Monday at Harrington

Circuit Court Judge Raymond L. Smith Friday night granted an injunction halting the Harrington School district election set for Monday.

The Monday election was to vote on annexing the school district to the Saugatuck district.

Specifically, Judge Smith ruled that the resolution of the Harrington School Board of Education on Sept. 14, 1959, was sufficient to constitute said district as a registration school district. And since the election set for Monday does not meet requirements of an election under the general election laws the proposed election would be illegal and should be halted.

The bill of complaint was signed by Clarence Maatman, Donald Rietdyk and Roberta Kingshott. A Circuit Court hearing was held Friday night before Judge Smith in the law offices of Ten Cate, Townsend and Cunningham.

In general terms, the election as scheduled would have allowed any resident, including summer residents of the district, to vote on the issue.

However, the judge's ruling puts the district as a registration district and as such only registered voters may cast ballots.

Fish Off Pier At Own Risk

Work is continuing on the north breakwater of the Holland channel to repair damage done by ice, but fishermen are again being permitted to fish off the pier at their own risk, BMCs Port Stone, commander of the Holland Coast Guard station, said today.

Stone said the Corps of Engineers tug and barge have left the harbor for Wisconsin for another load of stone to lay along both sides of the breakwater, and will return in a day or two. Some stone has already been laid along the base of the breakwater, and two or three more loads are expected to be needed.

Coast Guardsmen have been boarding boats in the Holland, Port Sheldon, and Saugatuck areas for several days, Stone said, checking for safety equipment and proper registrations.

He explained that registration for all boats is required by the state, and Federal laws also require certain items of safety equipment for the different size boats. These include fire extinguishers, life preservers, lights, horns and whistles.

The Ottawa County Sheriff's Department water patrol has also been checking boats for registration and safety equipment.

The local Coast Guard station is now up to its summer complement of seven men, working with a 30-foot utility boat, a 36-foot motor lifeboat, and, when needed, a 14-foot skiff.

Warren Vander Hill Wins All-Campus Award at Hope

Warren Vander Hill, holder of six Hope College basketball records and winner of a National Defense Fellowship in American Studies at the University of Denver, Monday received the Dr. Otto vander Velde all-campus award at the 95th Hope College commencement in the Dimment Memorial chapel.

The gold medal is presented annually to the senior man chosen for his outstanding contribution to the college in athletics, scholarship and participation in student activities.

Vander Hill, a four-time All-MIAA selection, scored 545 points this season for a new Hope single season record and made 236 field goals, also a new mark. He scored 366 points in 14 MIAA games, a new MIAA record.

His 18 baskets in one contest is a new Hope mark and his average of 26 points a game is also a new record. His free throw shooting average of 73 of 91 for 80.2 percent is also a Hope mark.

An outstanding outdoor jump shooter, Vander Hill was called by the late Milton (Bud) Hinga, former Hope coach, "the great shooter in Hope's history."

Vander Hill's greatest basketball thrill was a 22-foot jump shot in the final second against Wheaton College in the Civic Center on Jan. 2, 1960 that gave Hope an 87-85 win.

The 6'1" shooter, one of the most difficult players in the MIAA to defend, made a total of 1,375 points in four years to be the second all-time scorer in Hope's history. Paul Benes holds the record of 1,761 points from 1955-1959.

Vander Hill made 37 points in one game, a mark equalled by teammate Ray Ritsema and two short of tying the Hope mark of 39 set by Benes in 1958. Vander Hill and Ritsema were Hope co-captains this season and were selected co-most valuable players.

A resident of Kollen Hall, Vander Hill served as a student counselor during the past year. He was selected to be a pallbearer for Hinga's funeral last week. Hinga was counselor at Kollen Hall.

Vander Hill is the son of the Rev. and Mrs. Laverne J. Vander Hill of Queens Village, N.Y. Rev. Vander Hill was captain of the 1929 Hope basketball team and Warren's brother, freshman Jim,

was a Hope starter this past season.

The 22-year-old Vander Hill was awarded \$2,000-plus National Defense Fellowship in American Studies to the University of Denver. Under the program, Vander Hill will receive the fellowship annually with increased increments each year in his three-year program which culminates with a Ph. D. in American Studies.

The program is set up to prepare the student for college teaching and Vander Hill plans to teach in a college at the completion of the three years.

Included in the American studies division will be work in American History, anthropology, economics, geography, international relations, political science, sociology, American literature, philosophy, arts and higher education.

Vander Hill maintained a 3.2 (B-plus) average at Hope and a 4-point (all-A) record in history. He has been on the dean's list all four years and was recommended for the Denver fellowship by Al Vanderbush, history and political science professor and athletic director.

A graduate of St. Paul's Academy in Garden City, N.Y., Vander Hill attended the University of Maryland one semester before entering Hope. He is a member of Phi Alpha Theta, national honorary history fraternity.

Vander Hill will marry Miss Joy Philip, a Hope graduate from Wyondotte, in August.

Students Who Flew Nazi Flag Memorial Day Face Action

Hope College officials and Federal authorities Saturday strongly condemned the action of two students who flew a Nazi flag from a campus dormitory during the Memorial Day parade Monday.

The two freshmen students, Sidney Smith, 18, of Port Jervis, N.Y., and Bruce Roe, 18, New Hyde Park, N.Y., flew the flag from their window in Kollen Hall in full view of the marchers in the parade.

Dr. John Hollenbach, Hope College vice president, said the school deeply regrets the incident and will take disciplinary action in keeping with the seriousness of the offense.

The flag was finally taken down when a former Hope student and Western Theological Seminary graduate, the Rev. Allen H. Aardsma, watching the parade went up to the dorm and removed the flag.

Wendell A. Miles, United States Attorney, today released a statement following an investigation by the Federal Bureau of Investigation. The American Legion had informed Miles of the incident.

"Upon my return to Holland, after participating in Memorial Day services in another city, I was advised of a shocking incident involving a display of a Nazi flag in our city during the Memorial Day Parade in Holland."

"This appeared to me to be a most reprehensible act, especially because, as I understand it, the display was made in the presence of Gold Star mothers whose sons had given their lives in defense of the United States and for those who apparently hold it so lightly as to wave an enemy flag in their presence in an hour of bereavement and commemoration."

"I thereupon requested agents of the FBI to check on this matter. After doing so, they have reported to me."

"In view of the fact that no evidence of subversion has been shown to exist in connection with the display of the Fascist emblem, we do not have any basis for federal prosecution in the United States Courts. I am sure, however, that the matter can be and will be adequately disposed of on a local basis."

Boaters and Skiers Reminded Of Macatawa Regulations

Leo Salisbury, Ottawa County water safety patrol officer, reminded Holland area boaters and water skiers today about regulations on Lake Macatawa.

Salisbury said that boaters must have numbers on their boats or have the proof saying that they have applied for the numbers. Boaters also must carry their boat registrations with them.

For the water skiers, Salisbury pointed out that the center of Lake Macatawa is the shipping channel and no skiing is allowed in this area.

Skiing also is not allowed on the west side of the Big Bayou, the north Portion of Pine Creek Bay, through "the Narrows" and around the Kollen Park area. Skiing is not allowed in the turning basin on the east end of the lake or in the immediate west channel area.

Starting at the west channel, Salisbury said water skiing is allowed from the old Macatawa Hotel site to the red buoy and in area around Chippewa, north of the Coast Guard station.

The east side of the Big Bayou is also available, east of the buoy, south of the shipping channel area and north to Bay Haven.

Another spot is between Waukazo Point and "the Narrows" and then east of "the Narrows" on the south side of the H. J. Heinz Co. and north of the shipping channel north to Brown's Boat House to Horner's Point and east to the end of the lake.

Skiers will be allowed to cross the shipping channel area going from one ski area to another but may not remain in the area designated for boats.

Salisbury said that there is no

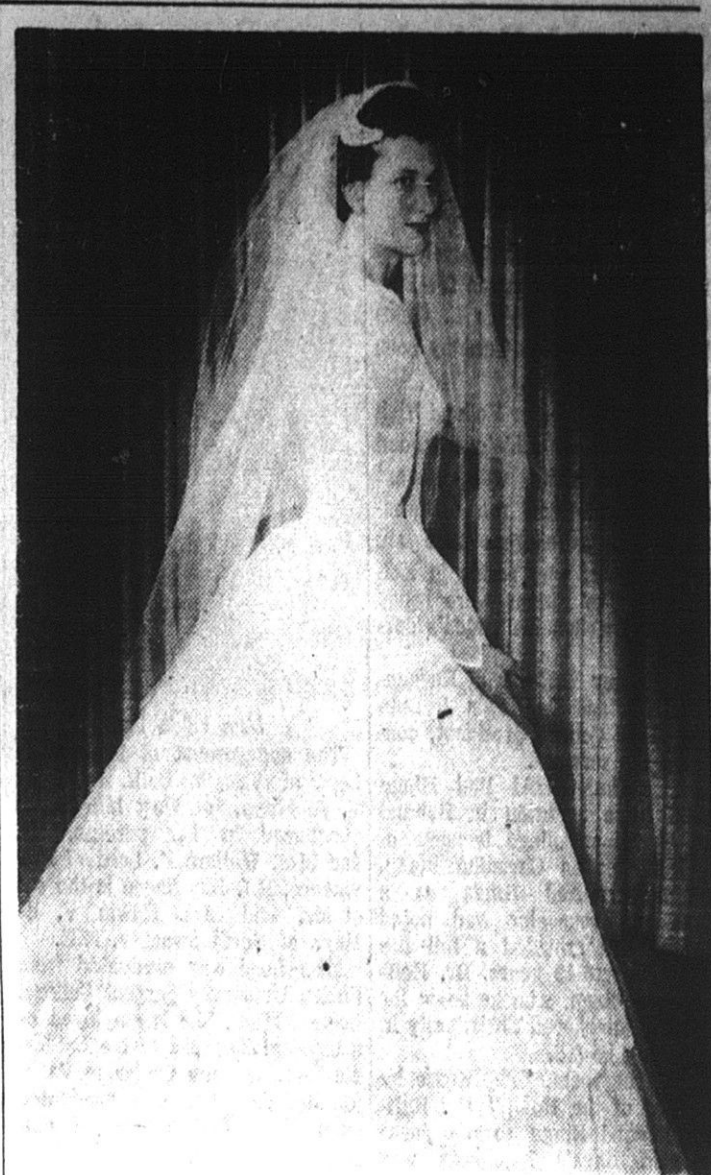
water skiing from one hour after sunset to one hour prior to sunrise. Salisbury is a member of the Ottawa County sheriff's department. The U. S. Coast Guard is also cooperating with the program.

Miss Ross Retiring After 34 Years on Hope Faculty

Miss Metta J. Ross, professor of history at Hope College, who is retiring after more than a third of a century of service to the teaching profession, was honored at a luncheon Friday held at Castle Park for members of the Hope College board of trustees, college faculty and members of the Hope College Community Council.

Miss Ross has been teaching at the college for the past 34 years. Prior to this she taught at Holland High School for several years.

Except for one course, "Europe and the World in the Atomic Age," the breadth of Miss Ross' instruction has included all 28 courses offered by the history department—ranging from "Cultural History of the Early Mediterranean" to a major course, "Contemporary Problems." Four courses now offered by the department were proposed, developed and first taught by her.

Under her guidance Palette and Masque, Hope's dramatic society, was born. She also started the International Relations Club. In 1932 she was drafted by the students to coach women's oratory. She has served on important faculty committees including the Ford Committee on Critical Thinking under Dr. John Hollenbach who at that time was dean of the college.

Miss Ross received her early education in Wayland, and studied at Western Michigan University, University of Chicago, University of Wisconsin and received her undergraduate degree from Hope College in 1926, her master's degree from the University of Michigan in 1935 and has done additional work toward a doctorate.

Miss Ross who joined Hope faculty in 1926 has seen the college enrollment grow from 450 to a student body of 1,325. She has taught under the reign of three presidents, the late Dr. Edward Dimnent, Dr. Wynand Wichers and Dr. Irwin J. Lubbers.

Last week Miss Ross received another honor when Hope students conferred on her an honorary membership in Pi Epsilon Delta, National Collegiate Players. Among memorabilia of her professional years is a bronze medal presented to her by former Queen Wilhelmina in recognition of efforts in correspondence with Dutch citizens during the occupation . . . the citation reading that her correspondence was effective in keeping up the morale of many during those trying days.

Miss Ross and Miss Janet Mulder, her close associate of many years, will continue to spend their summers at their cabin on Drummond Island. Miss Ross has several hobbies including woodworking, carving, bird watching, fishing, boating and cooking.

Ottawa County Farm News

Ottawa County Extension Director During the past week we have had many requests for mosquito control. Mosquitoes seem exceptionally bad this time of the year because of the great amount of moisture. Recommendations for seldom visited areas: spray all grass, shrubs and trees with DDT, using 4 pounds of 50 per cent wettable powder to 100 gallons of water.

Caution: Do not use DDT on privet, delphinium or bleeding heart as it will damage these plants. Around buildings, and areas visited often, use methoxy-chlor—4 pounds of 50 per cent wettable powder to 100 gallons of water. If mosquitoes are abundant, and quick control is needed, add 4 pounds of 25 per cent malathion wettable powder to the sprays listed above. It is suggested that if malathion is used, allow a day before frequenting the area.

Another problem on which we have had frequent calls this spring is regarding ants in the lawn area. There is an almost 100 per cent control in the use of clordane, either in wettable powder or emulsion form, following the manufacturers directions. This material can be sprayed in the area in which the ants are troublesome.

It has been called to our attention by the Department of Agriculture that commercial or custom sprayers will have to be licensed by the Dept. of Agriculture if money is accepted for such spraying. However, a farmer may spray his neighbors fields if such work is on an exchange basis and no license will be requested. This rule pertains to any herbicide, insecticide or fungicide used out of doors. The license fee is \$10 per year and in case you are interested in obtaining a license, write to C. A. Bover, Dept. of Plant Pathology, Michigan Department of Agriculture, Lansing.

The European Sawfly seems to be on the increase this year. We have observed many in Christmas tree plantations. They are in the larvae stage and feeding heavily causing irreparable damage on Christmas trees because they eat the foliage which cannot be regrown. They are green in color with two white lines down each side. If on inspection you find the sawfly larvae numerous, it will be necessary to control with a stomach poison. We suggest 3 pounds of 50 per cent wettable DDT to 100 gallons of water for control.

Growers may be able to control troublesome Christmas tree pest called the Spruce Gall Aphid without spraying. In test plots control was gotten by removing infected trees when the pest first appeared. The gall, aphid, whose presence is indicated by small pineapple-shaped swellings at the base of shoots, is present in almost all Norway and White Spruce plantations of Michigan. Growers in the state are now raising about 15-20 million Christmas trees of these species. Many growers delay cutting young trees that develop swellings, they hope another year's growth will bring such trees back to top quality. But studies suggest that infested trees more often than not get reinfested later. Growers might profit by cutting young trees at the first sign of infestation and selling them for table use. Careful culling of this type may rid plantations of the pest within a few years.

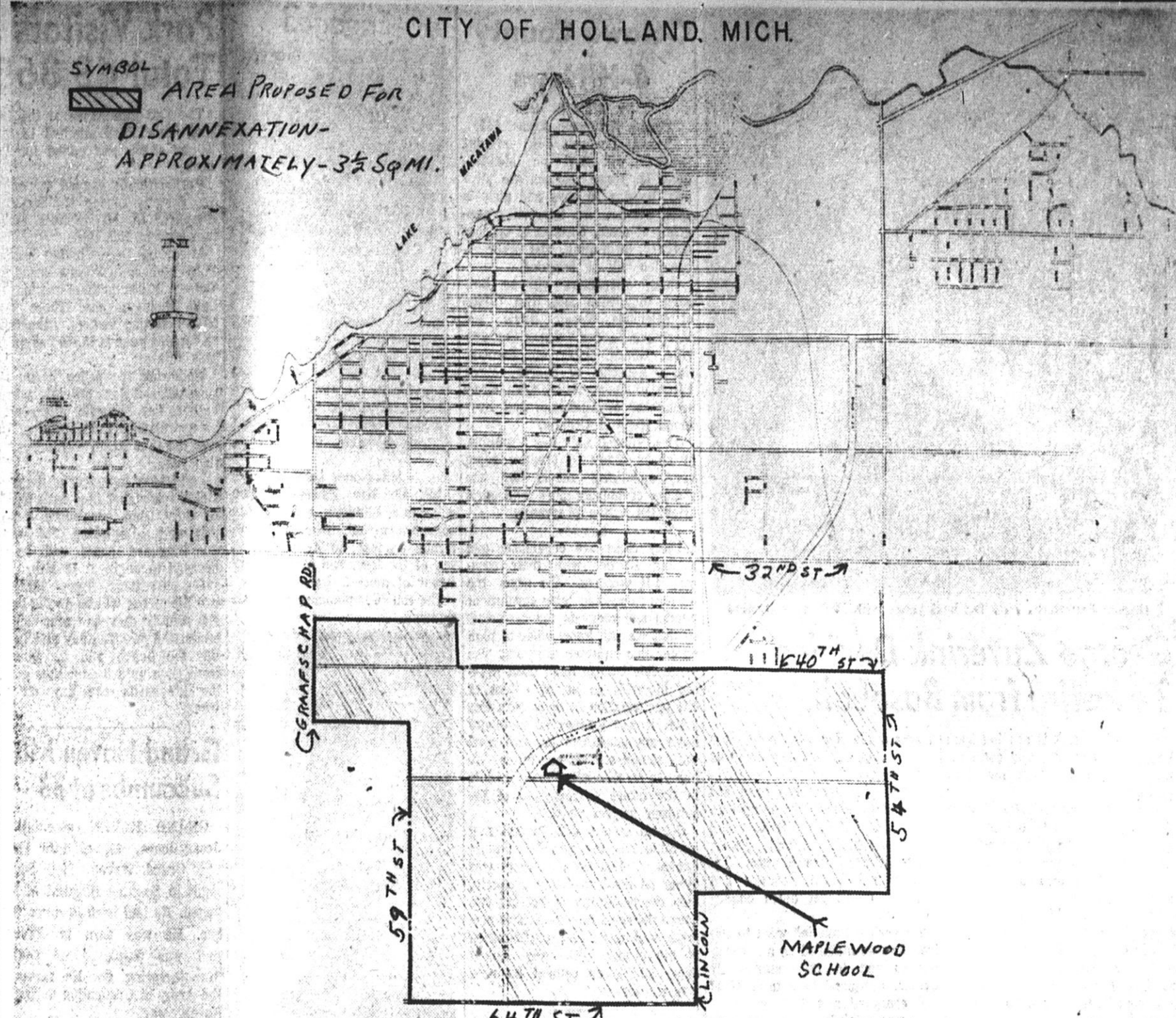
Lindane spraying has proved effective, too. Most growers now spray every tree in their plantations, which can get expensive. Entomologists feel spraying only infested trees might give adequate control. Most experts have long felt that certain strains of trees resist attack by the aphid, but M.S.U. researchers have found that many trees escape largely because the pest moves from tree to tree very slowly. They aren't sure that heredity is involved.

This 18-month course includes 12 months instruction at M.S.U. and six months on-the-job training in a Michigan elevator or farm supply store.

Industry scholarships are available to qualified young men who want to continue their education in this phase of agriculture. Elevator Career Day speakers include Charles Force, Kalamazoo, president of the Grain and Feed Dealers National Association along with Michigan elevator managers and former short course graduates. University staff members will also be on hand to talk over opportunities in this industry.

Runs Into Doctor's Car Near Funeral Home

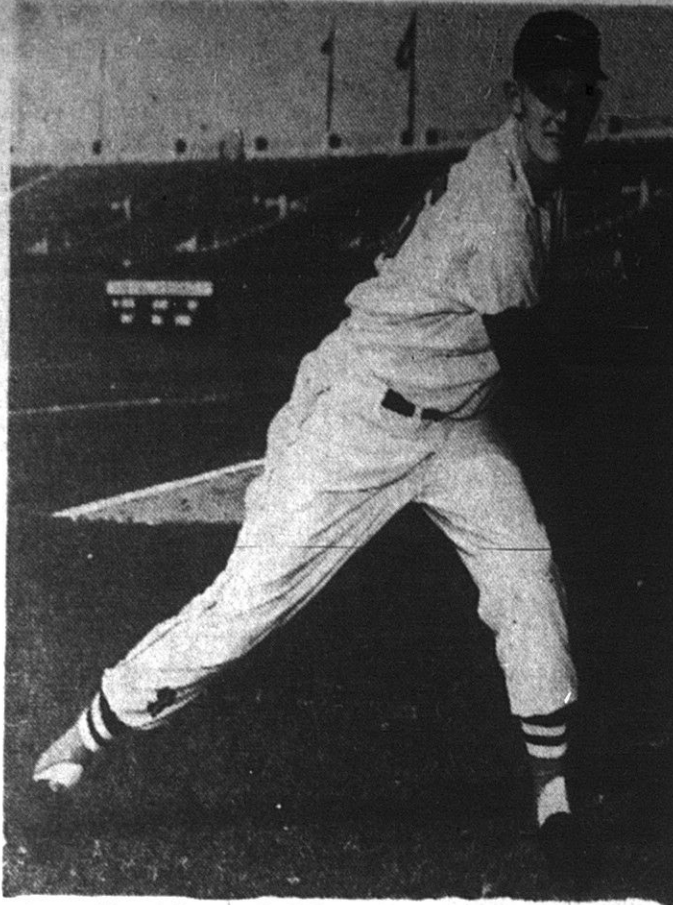

George Zuverink . . . had best years with Baltimore Orioles

George Zuverink Decides To Retire from Baseball

George Zuverink is retiring from baseball and is presently considering a couple of offers for sales positions.

Zuverink announced Monday at the Noon Optimist Club that he is quitting professional baseball and plans to settle in the Holland area. The Zuverinks own a home in Scottsdale, Ariz.

The 35-year-old righthander spent 14 years in professional baseball, including 6½ years in the major leagues and received his outright release a couple weeks ago from Vancouver of the Pacific Coast League.

Zuverink was sure he could continue in baseball. But he said that he would have to face the fact sometime and felt that now was the time. It was the toughest decision he has had to make, Zuverink said, but after careful study he decided to hang up the spikes. Zuverink played with the Cleveland Indians, Cincinnati Reds, Detroit Tigers and Baltimore Orioles. He first came up with Cleveland in 1951. He opened the 1959 season with Baltimore but "shoulder trouble" caused him to be sent down to Miami of the International League.

Looking back on a career which saw him become one of the highest paid relief pitchers in the American League, Zuverink told the Optimists that two things stood out as the highlights of his career. While pitching for Detroit in 1954, Zuverink hurled a three-hitter against the Yanks and won the game, 1-0 in 11 innings when Harvey Kuenn slapped a home run. This was his top big league thrill.

His other thrill is his fine success against Ted Williams. In the time Zuverink was in the big leagues, Williams made only two hits off the veteran righthander.

Zuverink's best season was in 1957 when he compiled a 10-6 record with the Baltimore Orioles and appeared in 62 games, for a Baltimore team record. He compiled a 2.47 earned run average in 1957.

He had a 31-35 major league record and in one game against the

Yanks made five putouts to tie a major league record of putouts by a pitcher.

Zuverink's career has been one of paradox. When he came up with Cleveland in 1951, the Indians had a pitching staff of Bob Feller, Early Wynn, Mike Garcia, Bob Lemon and Steve Gromek and Zuverink didn't get much chance to throw.

Then when Zuverink went to Detroit he was installed as a starting pitcher and in 1954, started 27 games, appeared in a total of 35 and compiled a 9-13 record.

He was established and Manager Freddy Hutchinson planned to use him again as a regular starter in 1955 but Hutchinson got the ax and the Tigers brought in Bucky Harris and Harris sent Zuverink to the bullpen and then off to Baltimore.

The Baltimore deal proved a "big break" as Manager Paul Richards, whom Zuverink regards as the smartest man in baseball, took Zuverink and made a top-notch reliever out of the big fellow for the next three years.

But then when Zuverink attained veteran status, his shoulder trouble hit and Richards sent him to the minors. As the arm ailment cleared Richards had moved to youth and Zuverink was out.

Zuverink thanked the Optimists and all of the Holland area persons for the support he had received while in the majors. He asked that fans give the same support to Jim Kaat, 21-year-old lefty, now pitching with Washington.

The righthander said that Kaat made a smart move to sign with a club that was on the bottom and looking for young pitchers. He said that Manager Cookie Lavagetto of Washington told him last week that the Senators are sure Kaat will stick in the big leagues.

"At present," Zuverink quoted the Washington manager as saying, "Kaat gets behind a batter or has an error committed behind him, and then gets confused and gives up a hit or a walk." "But the Senators are sure that Kaat will be a fine major league pitcher," Zuverink said.

Local Hospital Auxiliary Holds Annual Luncheon

A heartfelt thank-you to the hundreds of women affiliated with the Holland Hospital Auxiliary for their efforts on behalf of the hospital was given by Clarence J. Becker, president of the hospital board, and Frederick S. Burd, hospital director, at the annual luncheon of the auxiliary Monday noon in Hotel Warm Friend. About 80 attended.

Director Burd quoted some interesting statistics on hospitals and hospital costs. He said 90 per cent of the drugs used today were unheard of 10 years ago; that hospital care costs about \$1 an hour and is considered a bargain at those rates; that one out of every eight people is admitted to hospitals every year.

He said the average life today is 71.3 years, compared with 64.2 years 10 years ago and 46.2 years in 1900, emphasizing that 25 years has been added to the life span in 60 years. Twenty years ago a pneumonia patient (if he survived) spent 29 days in the hospital compared with 8 days today; that 20 years ago a patient with a fractured leg spent 114 days in the hospital compared with 18 days, and an appendectomy patient spent 21 days, compared with three days today.

"We hear a lot today about the high cost of hospital care, but America spends \$4.8 billion a year on hospital care, compared with \$8.1 billion on alcoholic beverages.

Officials of the Capitol Wrecking Company of Grand Rapids said that they expected to be finished tearing down the building in about two more days. All that remains is to haul the debris away and to excavate the site, officials said.

Built in 1906 by the late John C. (Judge) Everett, the hotel and several cottages in the Waukazoo

area are now jointly owned by his son, Walker Everett of Waukazoo, and two daughters, Mrs. Earl Lothrop of Greenwich, Conn., and Mrs. Roger Q. White of Lake Forest, Ill.

According to Roger Mac Leod of Waukazoo, manager of the Everett property, plans for the future of the hotel site are not definite. Mac Leod said that he has an option on the 120 acres of land in Waukazoo owned by the Everett family. The 12 cottages on the property will be rented for the summer, he said.

Everett said that over the years he has grown to like Holland and that he plans to remain in the area.
