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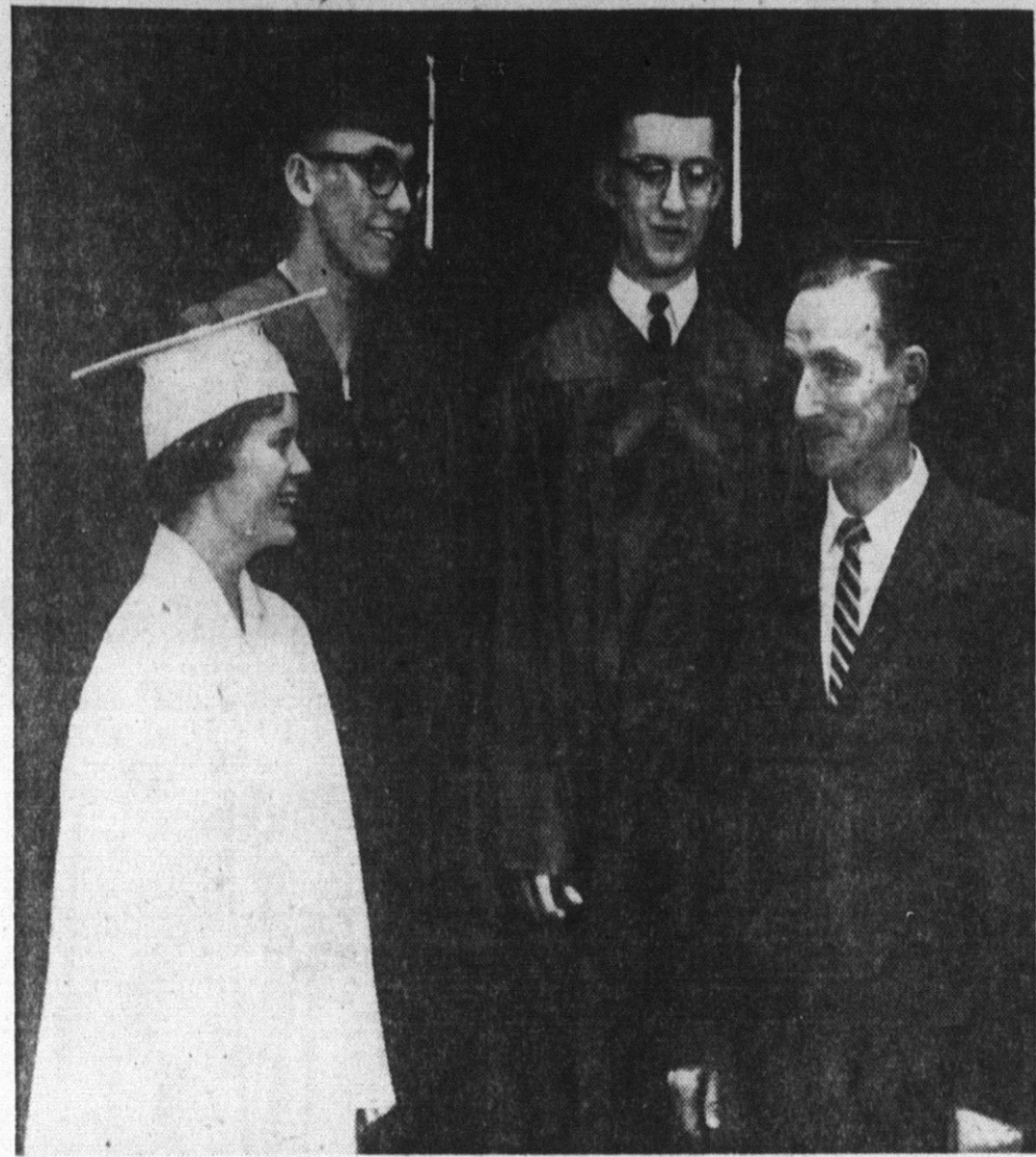

Holland Christian Awards Diplomas to 192 Seniors

Diplomas were presented to 192 graduating seniors at the Holland Christian High School commencement exercises held Wednesday night. An overflow crowd of 2,300 witnessed the first Christian High graduation ceremony to be held in the Civic Center.

Supt. Bert P. Bos in presenting the class for diplomas remarked that this was his 15th and last time that he would certify a graduating class of Holland Christian High. He expressed appreciation for the cooperation extended him during his administration and publicly congratulated faculty member Henry Kuiper on the Freedom Foundation award which he had received this spring.

Bos complimented the class on their choice of class song, "O Master Let Me Walk With Thee." He said this song which is a prayer, "not only gives evidence of dependence but also of consecrated Christian service." He told the class that dependence upon God and consecrated service to Him should be their goal in life.

Cornelius Westerbeek, president of the board of trustees, awarded the diplomas and also addressed the class. He referred the group to "the goal of all goals,—to be approved of God." He said "what really counts is not whether we are approved of man, but of God." He urged the class to "walk with God daily as we prepare for the life beyond."

Westerbeek in the name of the board and society expressed appreciation to Bos for his years of service in Holland.

Several Appointed To Boards

Several appointments were made by Mayor Nelson Bosman at the close of Wednesday's regular meeting in City Hall.

Guy E. Bell, superintendent of the Board of Public Works, was appointed as an administrative official to serve on the Planning Commission, the term to expire with the term of mayor on the second Monday of April 1963.

Donald J. Thomas was reappointed as a member of the Library Board for a five-year term and Clarence J. Becker was reappointed a member of the Hospital Board for a five-year term.

Mayor Bosman named Dale E. Van Lente, John Rooks and J. Dale Fris to the Traffic and Safety Commission for three-year terms and named Bert Reimink as a member of the Panel of Space Heating Examiners for a four-year term.

Two Council appointments to the Board of Appeals resulted in naming John Volkers and John J. Sternberg to the board.

The formal session was preceded by an informal dinner meeting at the Warm Friend Hotel. No members of the press were invited.

Council spent considerable time in discussing oil and gas leases with the city and finally approved a request from Lokker and Boter, attorneys, on behalf of R. B. Somerville Construction Co. to lease approximately 150 acres of city-owned property in the eastern section of the city at the rate of \$10 per acre for a five-year lease and an annual rental of \$1 plus the usual 3% overriding royalty on proceeds.

It was made clear that the lease is for communication only and that no drilling will be done on city property without written consent of the city. The area, mostly in streets and scattered acreage, lies in the Ottawa County portion of the city in sections 26, 27, 33, 34 and 35 in the east half of section 26. Peter S. Boter, who represented the firm, assured Council that the firm had sufficient acreage under lease to proceed with its program but that it wanted the city acreage for orderly development.

City Attorney James E. Townsend and Deputy Attorney Gordon Cunningham explained the city's part in such a lease, pointing out that any alternatives would be competitive bids or possible open auction. Beyond the maximum paid in this area was \$10 an acre plus \$1 a year and the usual 3% royalty.

There were seven mishaps, including two personal injury accidents, in Zeeland last month compared to four mishaps and no injuries during May last year. Property damage resulting from the seven accidents last month was estimated at \$1,400.

Honorary Degrees Go To 4 Persons

Glorification of God Only Real Aim in Life, Dr. Elson Tells Seniors

Honorary degrees were awarded to four persons at the 96th annual commencement service at Dimnent Memorial Chapel on Hope College Campus Monday when diplomas were presented to 208 seniors.

Degrees went to Mrs. Josephine Bay Paul of New York City, doctor of laws; the Rev. Lowell R. Ditzen of Bronxville, N.Y., doctor of humane letters; the Rev. Edward L. R. Elson of Washington, D.C., doctor of laws; and the Rev. Raymond D. Meengs, retired Reformed minister living in Kalamazoo, doctor of divinity.

The commencement address was delivered by Dr. Elson, minister of National Presbyterian Church of Washington who had the recent honor of being pastor to former President and Mrs. Eisenhower as well as members of the cabinet and other government officials.

Dr. Ditzen, pastor of the Reformed Church at Bronxville, New York City, delivered the baccalaureate address in the chapel Sunday. Although Dr. Ditzen presently is minister of the largest congregation in the Reformed Church, his background and former pastorates were with the Presbyterian Church.

Mrs. Paul, a New York financier, was given recognition for the gift of a chapel to the new Inter-Church Center in New York City on behalf of herself and her late husband. Mrs. Paul was the first woman to have a seat on the New York stock exchange.

In his address on "Life's Single Vocation," Dr. Elson said for Christians there are many ways of making a living but there is only one way of life and that is to glorify God. He said individual man is being overwhelmed today by mass man and all are tending to become conformists, living under a dictatorship of sociological ideas and psychological climate.

"The basic problem today is that the technical development of man has far exceeded his moral development and we must rekindle in ourselves a desire for this single vocation 'glorification of God' to prevent deterioration of this culture," he said.

He said the man with this single vocation ought to enter the political arena as a Christian calling. "Christians are desperately needed in public life today and if they do not enter this vocation they vacate the field to the opportunists and political scoundrels and we then will deserve what we get," Dr. Elson said.

The presentation of awards and prizes was one of the highlights of the commencement service. Winners include Gertrude Ruth Van Lente of Holland, who received the Herman Miller Art award, Ronald Ryckman of Dore, who was awarded the Godfrey

Prize for outstanding work in chemistry.

Recipients of the Egbert Winter Education Prizes for the man and woman giving promise of making the most significant contribution in the field of teaching were Mary Decker of Grand Rapids, and Edward Ericson of Chicago.

Frederick Kruitthof of Holland and Delmont Neroni of Lodi, N.J., received the Pieterpol Prizes as the seniors giving promise of greatest success in the christian ministry.

The Southland Medal for the senior woman who has maintained the highest overall standard of scholarship, character and usefulness during her four years at college went to Mary Decker of Grand Rapids.

The Christian Herald award for the finest example of Christian leadership and scholarship went to Gordon Stegink of Muskegon.

Hope College President Irwin J. Lubbers presided at the commencement ceremonies with Dr. Winfield Burggraaf, pastor of the Huguenot and Prince Bay Reformed Churches of Staten Island, N.Y., giving the invocation and Dr. Lester J. Kuiper, professor of Old Testament Language and Literature at Western Theological Seminary, reading scripture. Dr. John A. Dykstra, president of the college Board of Trustees, gave the benediction.

Gordon Stegink of Muskegon sang "Thus Saith the Lord" and "But Who May Abide" from Handel's Messiah, and William Kuiper, hornist from Holland, played "Chant Corse" by Tomasi and "Canon in Octave" by Francaix. Dr. John Hollenbach presented the prizes and awards and Prof. Roger Rietberg was organist.

Graduates, their parents and friends met in the Pme Grove on the campus for congratulations and refreshments following the service.

Seek Waiver Against Slayer

ALLEGAN (UPI)—The Allegan County Prosecutor has filed a petition to waive a murder charge against Donald J. Moon, 19, held in the death of Geraldine Williams, 15, and have him declared a criminal sexual psychopath.

Moon, of rural Van Buren, is accused of raping and killing the Williams girl after picking her up near her rural South Haven home. The petition was filed Wednesday by Prosecutor Ervin Andrews. It asks that Moon would be examined by three psychiatrists appointed by the Circuit Court.

If found to be a criminal sexual psychopath, he could be committed indefinitely to the Ionia State Hospital for the Criminally Insane.

Foundation Processes Many Gifts

Wishes of Donors Carefully Followed By Trust Directors

Ten years old this year, the Greater Holland Community Foundation has been reviewing its accomplishments while looking forward to even greater service to the community.

The foundation first was broached back in 1949 by the late Harry Harrington, mayor of Holland at that time, who suggested that in the drawing up of wills for private individuals of charitable inclination the seed be planted for remembering the civic institutions of the city with particular reference to the needs of Holland Hospital.

The suggestion was well received and groundwork was laid for a community trust. This idea was first advanced by the late Charles A. French, editor and publisher of The Holland Evening Sentinel based on a report he had received from Mt. Vernon, Ohio, where such a trust was in successful operation.

Many conferences were held and the structures of several trusts were thoroughly examined. Active in this work were Municipal Judge Cornelius vander Meulen, Marvin C. Lindeman, the late O. S. Cross, Mayor Harrington, and others.

The incorporation as a non-profit organization called for an obligatory \$1,000 paid-in capital and this was supplied as gratuitous gifts by Mayor Harrington, W. A. Butler, Mrs. B. P. Donnell, De Pree Co., Holland Hitch Co., Spring Air Co., and Holland Chamber of Commerce.

There is nothing complicated about the Foundation's operation, and one should not allow the simplicity of its structure to obstruct its breadth and vision. Gifts, donations, bequests and devises may be made with every assurance that they shall have the fullest measure of protection and diligent management, according to the expressed wishes of the donor.

Any gift accepted by the Foundation becomes a trust fund bearing the name of the donor. Literally, this means that the Foundation is custodian of both the gift and one's name, thereby linking the name to a good deed and perpetuating it. Using the Foundation as an instrument of service, the donor is assured of a continuing recognition that formally amounts to a memorializing of the giver.

In effect, the Foundation is a specially created convenience serving the donor as though it were privately established for that purpose. In other words, each one utilizing the Greater Holland Community Foundation in whatever manner it is directed, enjoys all the advantages of having one's own foundation. The scope and breadth of the Foundation's powers, as stated in its incorporation charter,

Dr. Lubbers Gives Report To Alumni

Physics-Mathematics Building, Dormitories Included in Program

Plans for construction of a physics-mathematics buildings and men's and women's residences were announced by Hope College President Dr. Irwin J. Lubbers to 400 alumni and graduates gathered in Phelps Hall Saturday evening for the annual alumni banquet.

Dr. Lubbers announced that construction would begin as soon as architects plans and government loans are approved.

The new physics-mathematics building, a project of the "Looking Ahead With Hope" \$3,000,000 development campaign, will be located on Graves Place directly west of the new Van Zoeren Library now nearing completion.

The building will be L-shaped, the east-west portion of the building being three-leveled. The north-south section of the building will extend towards Graves Place on the extreme west end of the property. This portion of the structure will house two large lecture halls.

The two sections of the building will be joined by a glass lobby. Ten faculty offices, five classrooms and a complex of laboratories will be located in the three-leveled portion of the building.

The exterior design will match that of the neighboring library with extensive use being made of glass and pale-yellow brick to maintain the continuity in appearance.

New men's dormitory facilities are slated for erection on 12th St., west of Kollen Hall, present men's dormitory. The new dormitory will be built in five units, each housing 50 men. There will also be an apartment in each unit for the resident director.

Two comparable women's units will be erected on 10th St. directly across from Phelps Hall, the newest college residence for women. Both facilities, in architectural appearance, will be similar to Kollen and Phelps Halls. Application is being made to the Federal Housing Commission for funds to construct the dormitories.

Estimated cost of the physics-mathematics building and the dormitories was not disclosed.

During his announcement, Dr. Lubbers informed alumni of the college's plans to develop recently acquired property bordering Fairbanks Avenue from 9th to 12th Sts., for the college's athletic program. The 25-acre site is scheduled to be cleared and graded and seeded soon.

Immediate plans call for the construction of a football field, baseball field and a track. The track will be constructed of a rubber-like material similar to the track built at Calvin College this year.

Future development plans at this site, which is to be known as the Dr. A. C. Van Raalte Campus, includes the erection of a field house, swimming pool, tennis courts, football stadium and softball fields.

Closing his remarks, the president gave a brief resume of the progress of the "Looking Ahead With Hope" campaign, noting that to date over \$2,270,000 had been received or pledged to the college by alumni, parents and friends of Hope College.

BUCK HILL FALLS, Pa. (Special) — Dr. Marion de Velder of Grand Rapids, former pastor of Hope Reformed Church in Holland, appeared on the floor of General Synod at 10:10 a.m. Tuesday and personally accepted the appointment of stated clerk of the Reformed Church General Synod.

Dr. de Velder, who will begin the new work about Aug. 1, succeeds Dr. James E. Hoffman who is retiring after 19 years of service in this administrative post.

This chief administrative office of the 333-year old denomination is being expanded this year and the new stated clerk will be the church's official representative at various ecumenical, public and area church occasions. He will speak for the Reformed Church at meetings of the World Council of Churches, the National Council of Churches, and the Reformed and Presbyterian Alliance. He also will supervise day-to-day administrative responsibilities during meetings of General Synod.

Dr. de Velder served as Hope Church minister in Holland for 20 years before leaving for Grand Rapids in 1959 to become pastor of Central Reformed Church. He will end his ministry there to take over the new post.

Dr. de Velder's appointment is for five years, subject to reappointment.

For the first time in history, General Synod has established an executive committee to implement the decisions and policies of General Synod and to strengthen and coordinate the work of the several boards, institutions and agencies of the Reformed Church in America.

This committee, consisting of present and past presidents of synod, the stated clerk and representative pastors and elders of the denomination, is established for a trial period of three years. Dr. de Velder is a former synod president.

A.E. Veldhuis Honored On His 80th Birthday

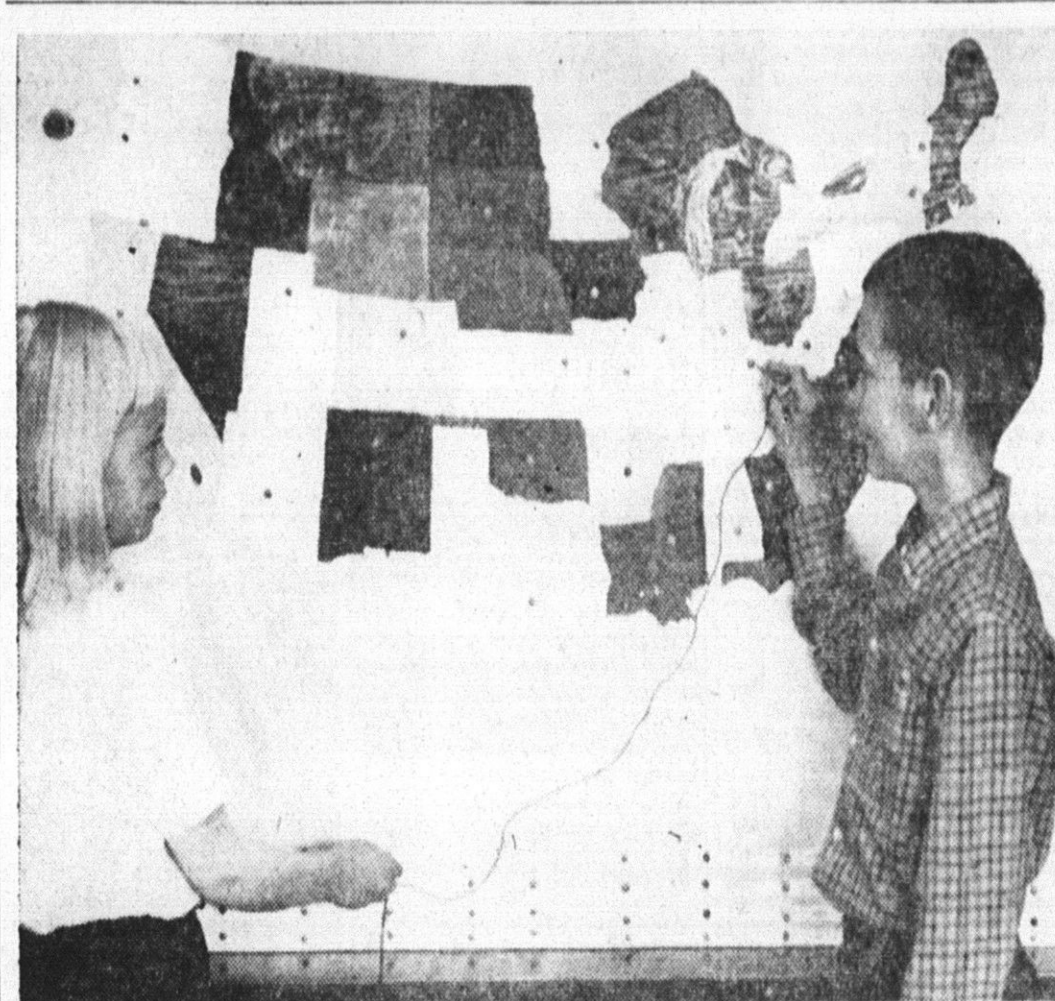

Electrical Map Provides Studies on Many Fronts

The age of automation and electronics has come to Montello Park School where fifth graders with the aid of their teacher, Harold Knoll, Jr., have constructed a map of the United States, hand drawn and painted in multiple colors and electrically wired. The three-by-five foot plywood map is operated by a six-volt battery.

Object of this geographical game is to learn and locate the capital of a given state. Each of the 50 capitals is represented by a bolt in its proper setting within the state. A list of the capitals is printed below and marked with a similar bolt head.

Children drilled the holes for the bolts and connected each one with an individual wire involving 50 separate circuits. It took the children about a month in their free time to construct and connect the machine. Older students also like to play the game.

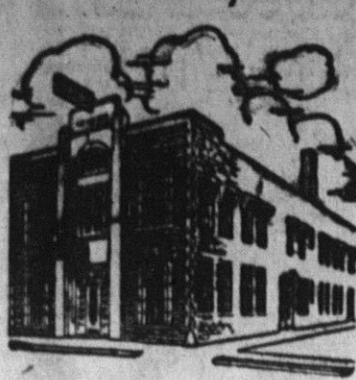

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CONSERVATION AND PARKS

We here in Holland have been going to Lake Michigan and Holland State Park for many years and have found it more and more difficult to find a place to park.

We talked with the Conservation Department about the small amount of space that there is for people who drive into the parks for a few hours or a day.

Most of the acreage is taken up by camping sites. This is valuable space and the fee of \$1 a night doesn't do much for the help on the amount of space that is used.

We are well aware of the many problems that our Conservation Department and the elected, appointed and hired people have with the population increasing all the time and no more space available for the influx of people.

If there is not enough money to hire a few extra people for the areas below the Saginaw, Bay City, Muskegon Line then perhaps we should charge more for the spaces that the people take up for their car trailer and tents.

A \$1 a night fee for best spot on the lakes is not enough. At least that is the thinking of thousands of people that are and will be trying to use our crowded state parks.

The \$5 million dollars that the park fees are supposed to bring in is earmarked for other things than manpower according to the Conservation Department in Lansing.

If we can't get relief then we should perhaps try for some voluntary help from some of our local clubs that are interested in parks and conservation. This is just an idea, if we do not have the money to hire the extra help.

I am not so sure that this could not be straightened out, then perhaps the voluntary help is the answer. We do need relief and we need it now.

Holland State Park campers get the space for \$1 a night and 25 cents a night for electricity.

Park manager Lou Haney reports that the campers receive park protection by park employees who patrol the area throughout the day and night. Campers also receive daily garbage service and some playground equipment is available.

A library is also set up for the campers and more than 300 books, including about 150 children's books are available for use. The books are primarily fiction and historical, Haney said.

The park office is open from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m. to register campers and supply service, Haney said. "We try to supply as much information as possible and point out points of interest to campers," Haney said.

Trailer campers are allotted a 20-foot wide space for their car and trailer, table, bench, etc. Tent campers are allotted 40 to 50 foot square area and a regulations state two parking spaces per camp. But Holland State Park officials have discouraged the two cars per site and most camps have just one car, Haney said.

Sunday School Lesson

Two Views of Life
By C. P. Dame
Ecclesiastes 12:1-8; II Timothy 4:7-8

This lesson is a study in contrasts. A part of the lesson text is from the Old Testament, from the Book of Ecclesiastes and another part is from the New Testament, from Paul's Second Epistle to Timothy his spiritual son. The two writers had conflicting views of life—one a pessimistic view and the other a cheerful view.

I. We always have the pessimists with us. In times past they were here. The writer of the Book of Ecclesiastes was a pessimistic soul. No one should wish to be like him. The words, "Remember now thy Creator in the days of thy youth while the evil days come not, nor the years draw nigh, when thou shalt say, I have no pleasure in them" are as timely now as when they were written.

Young people have much to talk about but many forget their obligation to Him. Today many allurements face youth. Taverns, movies, dance halls, beer joints, recreation centers, and education make their appeal to youth. How fitting is the call to remember God! The best time to do that is in youth.

When Ecclesiastes was written people did not live long. Today the span of life is much longer. It is, however, just as necessary to consider God in youth now as in times past. The important decisions of life are made in youth. Not many people turn to God in their old age. The writer of Ecclesiastes paints a gloomy picture of old age. He does not mention any of its blessings. In his opinion old age is a time of fading light, fleeting satisfactions and failing strength. Finally death comes and the body returns to the earth and the soul to God who gave it. The writer says not a thing about the Father's House with its many mansions.

II. Christians with faith face the future with courage. What a contrast between the two writers of the lesson text! Paul was in jail waiting for the end. In his letter to his spiritual son Timothy he could write, "I have fought a good fight, I have finished my course. I have kept the faith." Some church members bewail their past, marred by faithlessness, lukewarmness and indifference. Alas, some church members keep everything they think precious but they lose their faith! The Lord's commendation is far better than that of the world. Keeping the faith is highly important. Paul, the Christian, made an excellent record. He looked back upon his Christian life with much satisfaction. He lost some non-essentials along the way but kept the essentials.

It is good to look back upon life as the end is drawing near but it is also good to look forward. Many people have no yesterdays and no tomorrows. They live only for today. They are like children—they never think of or plan for the future. The word "eternity" is not in their vocabulary.

Paul looked forward to the crown of righteousness which the Lord, the righteous judge, would give him and to all who love His appearing—His coming. The crown which Paul expected to receive he would obtain not because of his work but on account of God's grace. It is good to remember that there is no wearing of crown without carrying a cross.

It is right for us all to think about the future. In youth it is fitting to plan and think of the years ahead. It is not enough to think of old age and its problems—God summons us to think of and prepare for eternity. The words, "Remember thy Creator in the days of thy youth" and the words, "Remember Jesus Christ" fit together splendidly. The Christian's view of life and death and the life to come adds much to the joy of living.

Dr. Lawrence Banner, president of the Kalamazoo Academy of Medicine and for seven years chairman of the Lansing Regional blood program covering 23 counties, told the honored donors they are the most important part of the blood program.

Describing the blood program as the brightest jewel in the crown of Red Cross philanthropy, Dr. Banner described operations of the nation-wide blood program and explained the new reciprocity program between the Red Cross and the American Association of Blood Banks which will involve exchange of blood or blood credits. He said by July 1, 56 blood centers will be cooperating, providing some 5,000,000 units of blood a year to 5,500 of the 7,000 hospitals in the nation.

"If you have a relative in California who needs blood, you can provide it here and have it sent out or as a paper credit," he said. He warned, however, that this liberalized program will bring problems and that further education of the public is needed. He described standardized techniques in use in all blood centers, the Coombs test and other safeguards.

"People working in the blood program take nothing for granted," he said.

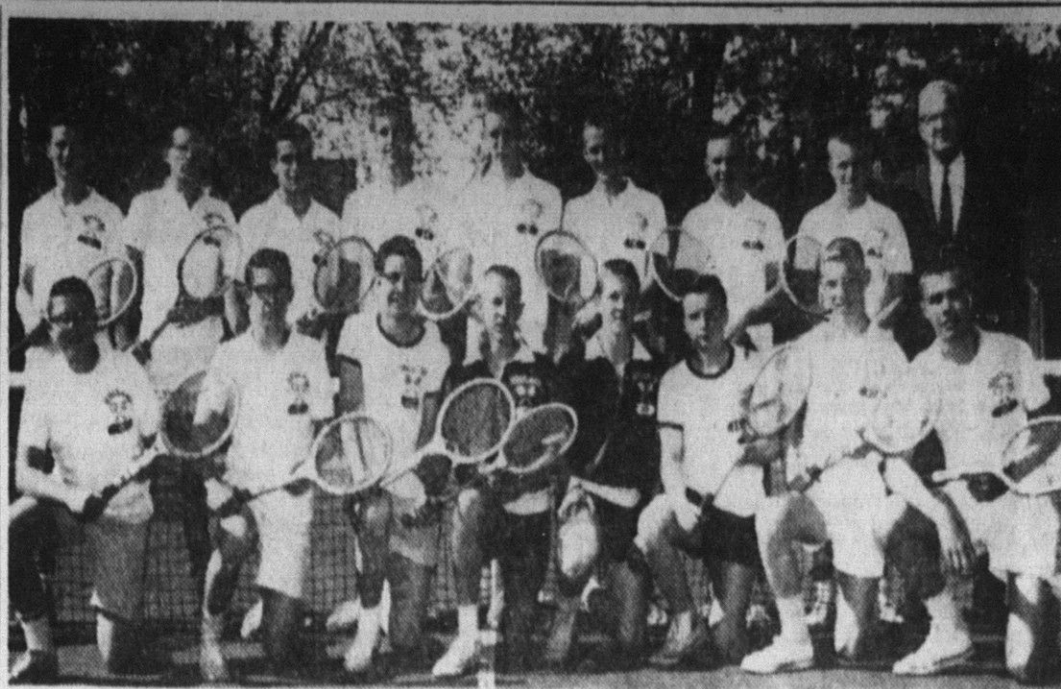

Area Church Women Buy Harlem School

Holland Area Council of Church Women submitted high bid of \$300 for the Harlem School property at a bid opening Friday night conducted by the West Ottawa Board of Education, and plans are to use the property this summer in the women's Migrant Ministry program.

It will be the fourth year that women carry on the Migrant Ministry for the benefit of some 1,500 migrants who come to Southern Ottawa County each year to work in the blueberries and a few other crops. About 90 per cent of these people are from the southern states and 10 per cent are American Mexicans. Approximately 100,000 migrant workers come to Michigan each year.

Plans call for erecting a clinic building on the property and to use the present school building which currently is rated as 1½ rooms. Harlem School is being used for seventh and eighth graders the current year but these students will attend the new West Ottawa Junior - Senior High School next fall. The land is west of US-31 and north of the New Holland Rd.

The church women and the school board have an agreement that should the buildings be needed for school purposes in emergencies later the buildings would be available for such purposes.

The church women's bid was the highest of two bids submitted for the property which covers about two acres. Only other bid was from an adjoining farmer.

Children living in the immediate Harlem area will be absorbed into the Pine Creek, West Olive and Robart Schools, all of them a part of West Ottawa School District.

The Migrant Ministry program offer Sunday worship services, daily Bible school, family nights, teenage parties, medical services and rummage sales.

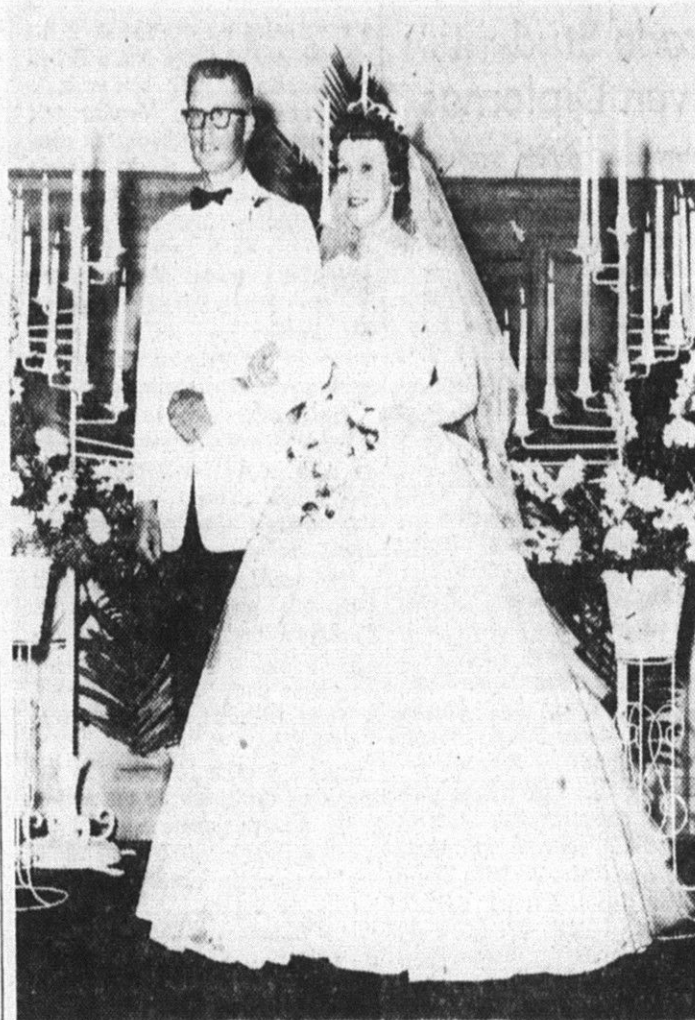

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Holland's Weather Had Everything During May

A wide variety of weather including snow on the 26th and a tornado alert early in the month featured the weather in Holland during May, according to statistics compiled by Weather Observer William De Boer.

A 30-degree low reading with frost penetrating about an inch into the ground on May 27 ruined some crops in the neighborhood. A trace of snow fell the preceding day but it was not of measurable proportions.

This leaves the season's total of snowfall at 66.2 inches, compared with an average winter of 60.5 inches, although Holland has had over 100 inches of snow for several past seasons.

Snowfall listed 4.5 inches in November, 16 inches in December, 27 inches in January, 3 inches in February, 5 inches in March and 10.7 inches in April. There were only traces in May and last October.

Average temperature for May was 54.3 degrees or 24 degrees below normal for

Holland Park Will Open At 5 a.m. After Protest

Holland area fishermen, protesting the 8 a.m. opening at Holland State Park, Saturday won the first round of their bout with the Conservation Department as the gate at the state park was opened at 5 a.m.

Park manager Lou Haney said he received a telephone call from Conservation Department officials in Lansing Friday night instructing him to open the gate at 5 a.m. today.

Haney said seven cars entered the park between 5 and 8 a.m. Saturday. He said two of the vehicles had no park permits and were issued violation notices.

Haney said he believed the new 5 a.m. opening would be in effect on a trial basis. The early closing hour of 10 p.m. remains in effect, Haney said, with the gate being opened briefly at 11 p.m. and at midnight.

Complaints about changes in the administration of the Holland and Grand Haven state parks started pouring in several weeks ago, according to Conservation Department parks and recreation division chief Arthur C. Elmer.

In previous years the parks opened at 5 a.m. and remained open until midnight. This year, Elmer said, manpower and fund shortages prompted a change in park hours to 8 a.m. to 10 p.m.

The first batch of complaints were from people who either were locked into or locked out of Holland State Park at the 10 p.m. closing.

Department officials offered a partial solution to the problem by ordering the park to open the gate at 11 p.m. and midnight.

Then early-rising fishermen began demanding their rights.

"We've agreed to resume opening the gates at 5 a.m. But there's no telling what will happen now," Elmer said. "It's reasonable to expect that we'll start getting the picknickers at 7 a.m. and the campers at 7:30 with this early opening."

"There is little chance of having any trouble with vandals or rowdiness at that hour in the morning, but if the traffic increases too much it will mean we'll need extra manpower to administer the park sticker program," he said.

Although Holland and Grand Haven parks are among the smallest in the state in area, more than one million people visit each park annually. Holland State Park has an area of 43 acres.

Haney said that since there was no addition to the number of personnel employed at the park, he was afraid services to other groups using the park would have to be curtailed. People who work the gate would have to be taken off other jobs, he said.

Haney said he believed officials had been doing the best they could with the overused park area creating a bad situation. He said he believed the situation could be remedied only by acquiring more area.

Elmer said he would also look into the possibility, suggested by publisher W. A. Butler of the Holland Evening Sentinel, of getting volunteers to help man the gates during the extra hours.

Haney said, however, that he did not think outside volunteers would be capable of handling the rush caused by the influx of campers during the summer rush. He also said that volunteers would probably have to be bonded since the job involves selling permits and handling sums of money.

The job would involve more than merely opening the gate, Haney said. The park could not discriminate against all visitors by allowing only fishermen to enter between 5 and 8 a.m.

"It's something that's hard to understand," Elmer said. "One of the main complaints of the fishermen down there is that they need to get in through the gate to park their cars inside. At Sterling State Park, where fishing is also very popular, the fishermen park their cars outside before the opening hour — and some of them walk a mile to get to where they want to be."

Haney said he had been informed by Park Township Supervisor Herman Windemuller that the area along Ottawa Beach Rd., just outside the park gate, may be posted with 'no parking' signs.

He said as many as 100 cars used to park along both sides of the road, creating a hazard to vehicular and pedestrian traffic.

Elmer said the early opening at Holland would be run as a test, just as the "grace period" gate opening after closing.

Resthaven Board Hears Reports

New Wire Insulating Co. Is Located in Holland

Hampson Manufacturing, Inc., is Holland's newest industry. Holland Chamber of Commerce officials announced today.

The new firm, under the direction of John C. "Jack" Hampson, president, is located at 346 West 13th St. The firm produces wire insulators for the automotive, furniture and bedding fields. The product is manufactured under the trade name of "Insul Flex," a patented process in which material is woven together on specially patented machines. End use of the product is an upholstery pad support.

"Insul Flex" is manufactured from a combination of domestic and foreign materials, making the local firm somewhat international in obtaining working supplies. Raw materials are composed of burlap, wire and paper. Burlap is imported from India, paper cord is manufactured and obtained from Saugatuck, and the oil tempered wire is shipped here from Buffalo, N. Y.

Distribution currently is in the Great Lakes and New York areas with distribution centers in Michigan, Ohio, Indiana, Wisconsin, Kentucky and New York.

The plant is beginning production in a small way and the ultimate goal is employment of 25 to

30 persons, most of whom will be male.

"Jack" Hampson has been in the upholstery insulating business for 37 years, spending most of this time in the Detroit area. In 1924 he went to work for the L. A. Young Co. of Detroit and became superintendent. In 1935 he went to Falls Spring and Wire Co. of Detroit as vice president. Ottawa County Farm News

By Richard Machle Extension Agent, Agriculture

Michigan dairy men can increase milk production by harvesting hay at an early date.

Cows in milk-production trial at Michigan State University produced 375 pounds more milk from each ton of hay harvested in the pre-bug stage than from hay cut at three quarters bloom. The cows received no grain during this trial.

An average Holstein cow will eat about four and one-half tons of hay during a 240-day barn-feeding season. On this basis, the additional return of \$10 to \$17 for a ton of early-cut hay results in \$45 to \$75 worth of additional milk from each cow.

Hay harvested in bud stage is usually more digestible, higher in protein and more palatable.

Dairymen should plan to start hay harvesting when the stand reaches one-tenth bloom. This is usually during the last week of May or early June in East Lansing. Harvesting should be finished before the hay reaches the half-bloom stage.

Rain which usually falls in early June can increase the yield of second cutting if the first cutting is harvested early.

There is a chance in some parts of Michigan of harvesting a third cutting if the first cutting is removed early.

Early cut hay is often difficult to dry without a drier because of the possibility of frequent rains.

Farmers should be cautious against cutting hay before it reaches the bud stage. Cutting before this time can lower the yield and damage a stand on poorly drained soils.

Farmers need to add about four per cent protein in the form of a 44 per cent supplement when feeding corn silage to cows. This is 80 pounds of supplement for each ton of silage.

Good quality hay should be fed daily to each cow when feeding high levels of corn silage. Corn silage is deficient in vitamin A or carotene. By feeding five to ten pounds of hay daily, the vitamin A requirements of the cow are easily met.

The annual Michigan State University Crops-Soils Field Day is to be June 29 at the College of Agriculture farms on the East Lansing campus.

Early maturing crops and forages will be featured this year with four stops of experimental plots planned to show the latest research of the departments of Farm Crops and Soil Science.

Some of the important features will be: Wheat Breeding Program, Fertilizer placement and Row Spacing, on Wheat and Oats. Oat and Barley Breeding, Early Planting of Oats and Barley, Chemical Weed Control in Field Crops, Forage Production and Management, Forage Breeding, Corn Production, Continuous Corn and Efficiency of Nitrogen on Corn.

Supervisors Told Building Is Completed

ALLEGAN — Allegan county supervisors convened Monday for an early start on their June session and heard a report from R. S. Gerganoff, Ypsilanti architect.

Gerganoff said the new county building is officially completed and that razing of the old court house is expected to start next Monday. Grading and landscaping will be scheduled after the old building has been removed.

The architect reported that actual costs for the new building totaled approximately \$34,000 less than his \$38,000 "working figure" . . . then outlined \$12,590 in outside work which he recommended undertaking.

Although some of the work can be charged against cost of the new jail, the extras include lowering the grade on the north and west sides of the new building, construction of steps and inclined ramps for the north and west porches, razing of the old county building, formerly occupied by the health department, and excavation and grading of the site, in preparation for construction of the new jail.

Finding a new home for an "old soldier" is proving to be increasingly expensive, supervisors also learned Monday. The county's Union Soldier monument, moved from the south-east corner of court-house square last year to make way for construction of the new county building, will have to be moved once more. The 28-foot granite monument, topped by a bronze statue of a Union Army color-bearer, will be traveling south again, displaced this time because he stands on the site chosen for the new jail.

Cost of the first move was \$1,500, but all bids submitted thus far for moving him to the extreme southeast corner of the square have totaled more than \$3,000.

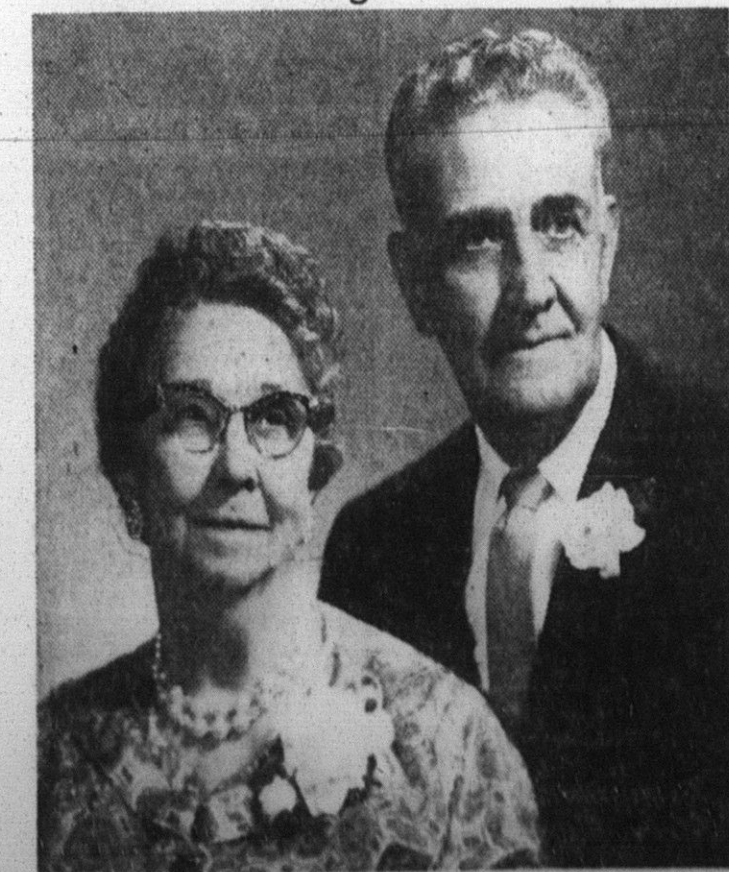

Vehicle Safety Program Started

Ottawa County this week joined in a nation-wide voluntary vehicle safety-check program in progress during the entire month of June.

Garages and service stations throughout the county are taking part in the safety-check campaign and will issue orange safety-check windshield stickers to drivers who have their vehicles checked and found in safe condition.

Ottawa County Safety Director Donald Oosterbaan said that safety-check lanes will be set up in cities throughout the county during the week of June 24 to July 1.

In Holland, the safety-check lanes are tentatively slated for June 28 and July 1. Oosterbaan said. In previous years the check lanes were open for several days, but Oosterbaan said most people took advantage of the safety-check program on Saturday, and he felt two days would be sufficient for the city of Holland.

Oosterbaan said the check lanes would be set up on 12th St., between River and Central Aves., the same location for safety-check lanes in other years.

Safety-check lanes are also scheduled to be set up in other cities in the county during the week of June 24 to July 1. Oosterbaan said the lanes would probably be operated one day each in Hudsonville, Zeeland, Allendale, Coopersville and Grand Haven.

Oosterbaan said that any Holland service station owners desiring to take part in the safety-check program may receive their supplies of windshield stickers from Holland police or the Ottawa County Sheriff's Department if they have not already been contacted by safety council officials.

Ten items will be checked on each vehicle, Oosterbaan said. The 10 items include brakes, front and rear lights, steering, tires, exhaust system, glass, windshield wipers, rear-view mirror and horn.

Oosterbaan pointed out that during the 1960 nation-wide safety-check campaign, one out of every six automobiles needed immediate attention to one or more of the 10 items checked.

"This voluntary vehicle safety-check gives every motorist a chance to do his part in making our community a safer place to live," Oosterbaan said. "Even our best drivers are poor risks if they are driving cars with bad brakes,

worn tires, or other neglected items."

The safety-check program in Ottawa County is part of the annual national vehicle safety-check for communities sponsored by the Auto Industries Highway Safety Committee and a national magazine, with the cooperation of the Association of State and Provincial Safety Coordinators, Oosterbaan said.

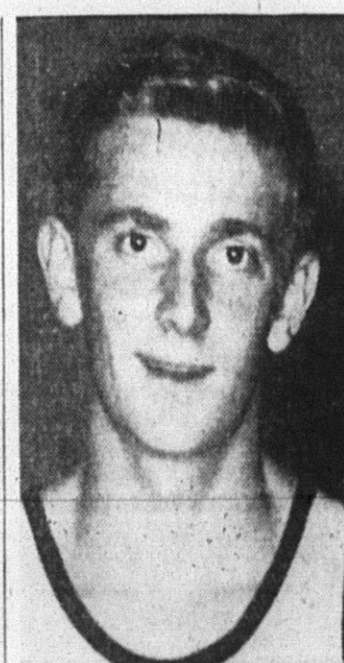

Lawns Troubled With Chickweed

Having lawn problems this year?

Latest plant of lawn tenders these days is the luxuriant crop of chickweed, the fast-growing weed with tiny white flowers.

Park Supt. Jacob De Graaf said local parks and cemeteries have not been bothered with chickweed particularly this season, but there has been a growing number of complaints of many types of weeds on private lawns. He said some of the awareness of weeds is due to stepped-up advertising campaigns of certain weed killers.

In general, a good turf properly fertilized and treated with weed killer will withstand the ravages of chickweed, De Graaf said. He added there are two kinds of chickweed, the common and perennial chickweed.

Meanwhile, Park Department employees are cutting the stems off tulips in tulip lane and in park plantings. Later when the foliage dies, they will cut down the foliage.

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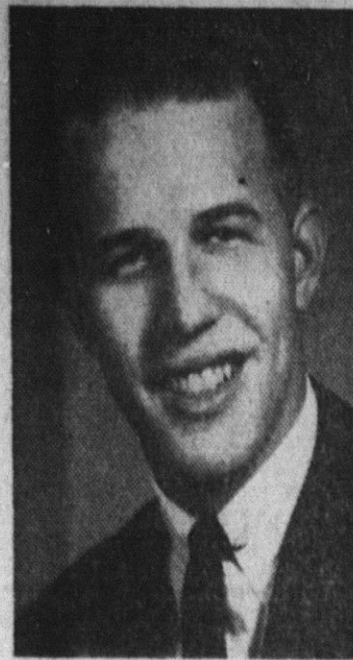

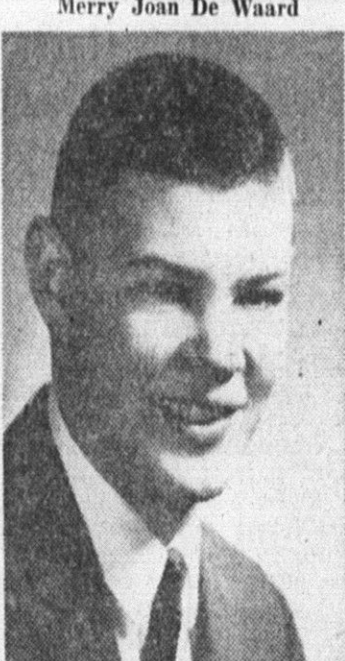

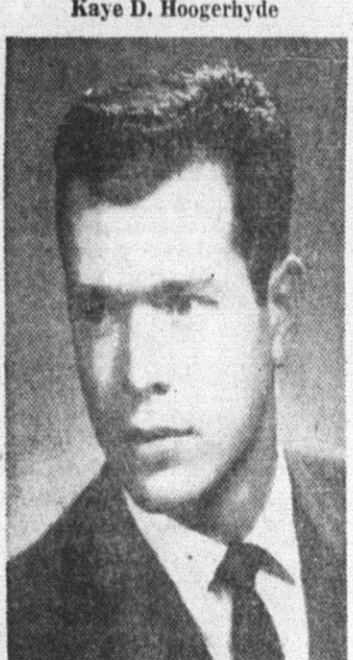

Albany Man Is Elected Synod Head

BUCK HILL FALLS, Pa. — The General Synod of the Reformed Church in America has elected the Rev. Norman E. Thomas, pastor of First Reformed Church of Albany, N.Y., as its president.

The ruling body of the Reformed denomination also elected the Rev. Bernard Brunsting, pastor of Family Reformed Church of Canoga Park, Calif., as vice president. Rev. Brunsting had served as pastor of First Reformed Church of Grand Haven from 1949 to 1952, of Bethel Reformed Church of Bellflower, Calif., from 1952 to 1957, and the Canoga Park church since 1957.

Rev. Thomas, who served as synod vice president last year, succeeds Dr. Henry Bast of Holland, Mich., as president. Rev. Thomas is a graduate Rutgers University and New York University. He has served St. John's Reformed Church of St. Johnsville, N.Y., Bellevue Reformed Church of Schenectady, N.Y., and First Church of Albany. The latter church was founded in 1642.

In his annual message, President Bast called upon synod to establish an executive committee which will implement the decisions and policies of General Synod in a way that is not now possible. Purpose of such a committee would give synod an "agency" to strengthen the work of the church and to unify ourselves as a denomination.

Stating that the real need today is revival, Dr. Bast said churches have often been in retreat because we have been practicing and promoting "Christianity" instead of Christianity.

The denominational membership of the Reformed Church increased to 235,927 and its total constituency to 352,282. The denomination raised a total of \$22,628,943 for all causes during the past year. Of this amount, \$17,740,642 was contributed for congregational expenses and \$3,888,301 for denominational and other benevolences. The denomination now has 897 congregations across the United States and Canada.
