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New Physics Building Tops May Permits

A \$730,000 physics building for Hope College boosted building permits to \$844,682 during May, a review of the month's building activity revealed today. City Building Inspector Gordon Streur said there were 97 building permits, 51 of them for residential repairs and alterations.

There were three new houses for a total of \$46,254: one swimming pool, \$2,500; 10 fences, \$1,277; four garages, \$8,200; 12 garage alterations, \$7,675; nine commercial alterations, \$7,135, and 51 residential alterations and repairs, \$344,682. 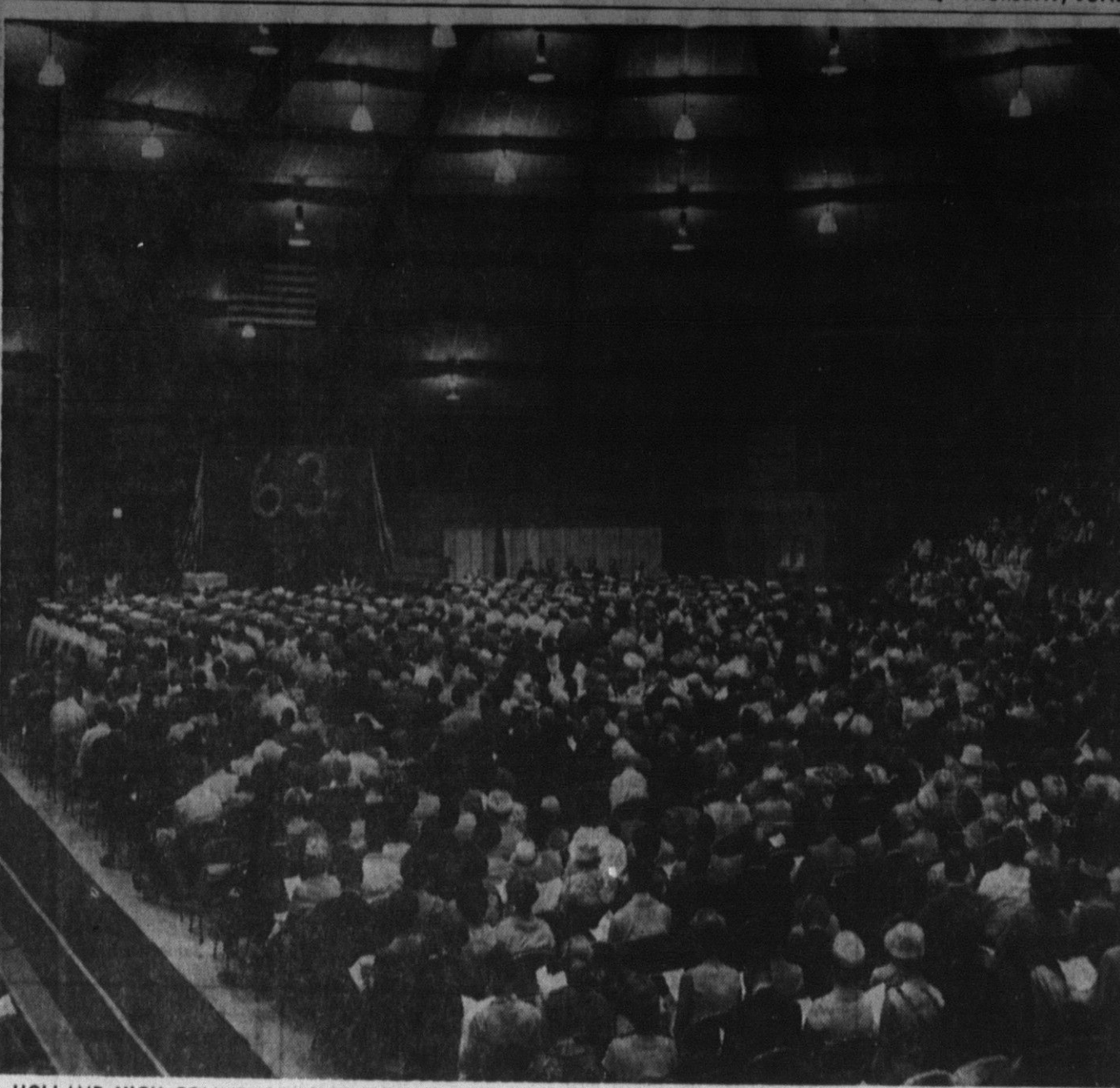

77 Accidents During May

Failure to yield the right of way to through traffic was the biggest cause of accidents during May in Holland, according to police Sgt. Ike De Kraker. Right of way was the cause of 18 accidents out of 77 in the city during May.

Improper backing and failure to drive an assured clear distance were a tied second cause of accidents, he said. Thirteen accidents were caused by each.

Out of the 77 accidents for May, 17 caused injuries to persons involved and one was fatal. Police recorded 552 accidents since Jan. 1, as compared to 507 last year during the first five months.

In addition, for May, seven accidents were caused by improper left turns, three each for improper right turns and reckless driving; two for defective equipment; and one each for no lights, disobeying a stop sign, hit and run, improper starting, and red light violation. No violation was indicated in four of the accidents, De Kraker said.

Following a theme of "Tomorrow," 246 Holland High School seniors received their diplomas at the 80th annual Commencement of the school Thursday night in the fieldhouse.

Although the robes the seniors wore became slightly damp in the 8 p.m. shower as the class formed its procession, the graduates made a fine picture of youthful vitality as they marched according to height.

It was the wish of the class to have three speakers, a student, a faculty member and a parent instead of an address by an outside speaker.

Elaine Yamaoka represented the students, likening the years of preparation leading to high school graduation to the years of planning and tremendous effort that went into the first space flight of Alan B. Shepard in the capsule Freedom 7. She paid tribute to the parents, the teachers to society and all the other influences which mold character, and expressed general appreciation of the graduates for spending a year and a half in a wonderful new high school.

As faculty representative, Mrs. Edward Donovan, school librarian, pointed out there is 37 years to a new century, predicting almost unbelievable changes in the mode of living in the age to come. Citing examples at the Seattle World Fair, she pointed to what can be expected in travel, home living, communications, and the like, giving a vivid picture of unbelievable changes.

Maintaining that new ideas are the keynote to the greatest power, Mrs. Donovan told the graduates that in the next 37 years she hoped America would do business with a united Europe, that population would be controlled in a humane way and not by war or starvation, that an easy way would be made to desalt water so that the deserts and arid areas would become productive and that science would find a way for people to live to be 100 "so that I can be around to see what you are doing."

With a 31-hour work week in prospect and more leisure, Mrs. Donovan said the new generation must learn not to pursue pleasure but to promote the better culture and "see that your government does more than collect the garbage and build sewers." She quoted Clare Boothe Luce: "Pray like everything depends on God while working like everything depends on oneself."

Dr. D. Ivan Dykstra of the philosophy department of Hope College, speaking as a parent, told the young graduates he hoped they would make an art out of living, working at it all times with imagination, hard work and a tireless zeal. "You should not be pushed through life, but should do some pushing yourself. You should not wait for the breaks in life but should be making your own breaks," he said.

"Brave new worlds do not just drop down. They are made by people who are willing to work for them, and you should not settle for anything less than the best. Be more ambitious about what you will be than what you will have, and have reverence for all things that are good. Cynicism is cheap; learn to trust," he said.

The speakers were introduced by Robert J. De Vries, Class President Carl D. Walters announced the class memorial consisted of three stone benches to be placed about the campus. David Tubergan played a violin selection, accompanied by Janice Van Lente. Diplomas were presented by Supt. Walter W. Scott and Principal Jay W. Formsma.

William Driesenga Succumbs at 66

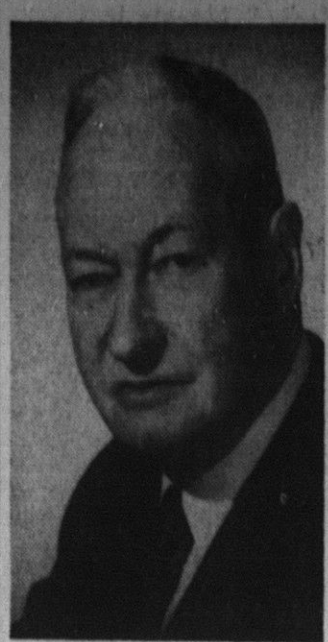

Former Local Man Heads General Synod

PELLA, Iowa — Dr. M. Verne Oggel, former resident of Holland, Mich., was elected president of General Synod of the Reformed Church in America on the first ballot at the opening meeting of the 157th session Thursday afternoon.

Dr. Oggel, at present pastor of Community Church in Glen Rock, N.J., one of the largest congregations in the denomination, succeeds Dr. Bernard Brunsting of Holland, Mich., as synod president. He had served as vice president the past year.

He is the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. John P. Oggel who lived on 12th St. across from Hope College on property now occupied by Kollen Hall. His father formerly was a salesman for the De Pree Co. Dr. Oggel was in Holland last year to participate in the Hope Church centennial. His wife is the former Louise Warnshuis.

Dr. Oggel was graduated from Hope Preparatory School in 1907, from the University of Michigan in 1911 and New Brunswick Theological Seminary in 1914. He has served in the Reformed Church at New Paltz, N.Y.; South Shore Presbyterian Church in Chicago; Wabash Avenue Presbyterian Church in Crawfordsville, Ind.; Westminster Presbyterian Church in Lincoln, Neb., and Community Reformed Church in Glen Rock, N.J., his present charge.

In 1925 Wabash College conferred on him the degree of doctor of divinity and this year Central College conferred on him the degree of doctor of humane letters. He was the first Reformed Church minister to become a chaplain after the United States entered World War I, attending the first chaplain's training school ever held. He was an occasional contributor to "The Christian Century" from 1924 to 1943 and has written for the "Church Herald" since then. He wrote the first nationally circulated pamphlet for the Committee to Outlaw War whose proposal was written into the Pact of Paris (Kellogg-Briand treaty) on the basis of which Nazi war criminals were prosecuted.

Dr. Oggel has served as chairman of his denomination's committee on the World Council of Churches and as chairman of several committees of General Synod.

The monthly meeting of the Board of Education Monday night in the high school library was the occasion for a "swan song" for two members, Wendell A. Miles and Alvin J. Cook, who are retiring after 11 years of service.

The board adopted resolutions recognizing the two men's efforts throughout the years, and Board President Bernard Arendshorst spoke for the board in summing up some notable accomplishments.

"You have witnessed many changes. The expansion of our educational plants on elementary and secondary levels, the geographical enlargement of our school district, the installation of several novel approaches to teaching methods and the introduction of new subjects to our curricular program were all during your terms on this board. You actively proposed and promoted many of these changes. Your background on the many and varied facets of school problems are not easily acquired by any new school board member."

"You are to be congratulated not only by our colleagues but are deserving of recognition by every citizen in this district for your display of devotion, the personal sacrifice of time and eagerness to work only for seeking the finest education facilities for the children of the Holland school district. We will feel the loss of your counsel, but will not lose the feeling that future boards of this district will well know that they will continue to have the backing of your strong educational interests," Arendshorst said.

Separate resolutions called attention to Miles for his valuable service with citizens committees in planning Thomas Jefferson school and the new high school, and his contribution from his wide experience in the law, as well as courageous leadership to improve the status of teachers and to interpret to them the aims and policies of the board.

The resolution recognizing Cook's contributions called particular attention to his interest and talents in design, building construction and the use of new materials, as well as his practical knowledge and experience in building renovation and rehabilitation.

A communication from the Holland MEA district expressed appreciation to the board for placing teachers with masters degrees on the proper step in the salary schedule. The letter also suggested further meetings with the salary and welfare committee to avoid misunderstandings in the future.

A communication from the Christian School Society inquired about school property at 16th St. and 112th Ave. A meeting is being arranged for further discussion by the two school bodies.

'Beautify Cities' Speaker Tells Garden Club Group

"We can turn ugliness to beauty in our cities with careful urban designing by qualified architects," Mark T. Jaroszewicz of Bloomfield Hills told an audience of Federated Garden Club members at their banquet Tuesday night in Phelps Hall dining room on the Hope College campus.

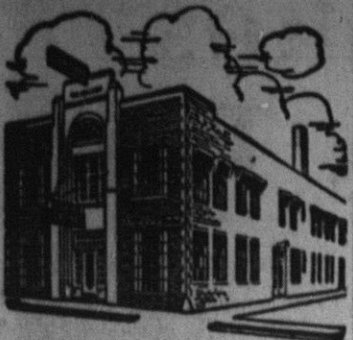
Residents Reminded Dump Closes at 8 p.m.

Sunday School Lesson

Sunday, June 16
God in Courts of Justice
Psalm 72:1-4; Psalm 82
By C. P. Dame

The more we study the Bible the more we realize that the problems that trouble us also plagued people in ancient times. Today there are many voices calling for justice. The prophets of Israel living in the eighth century also summoned the leaders and the nation to execute justice in the land. This lesson tells us that God is the source of all justice.

I. God is just. Many people do not care to hear about a just and holy God. They think that God loves much but they overlook his justice. The God who himself is just demands that the rulers of nations do justly.

In the days when the Psalms were written, all nations were ruled by kings who had supreme authority—all nations except the Hebrew people. They believed that their rulers were responsible to God. The prophets at times denounced kings who violated the moral law. In these days the biblical truth that rulers and governments are responsible to God should be proclaimed loudly.

Psalm 72 is a prayer on behalf of a king—which king we do not know. The Psalm is considered Messianic for it portrays conditions which people expect to be realized in the Messianic age. In the Psalm there are two words, "judgments" and "righteousness" which speak of a well established government. A nation's welfare depends in a large measure upon its government whether it is stable or shaky, crooked or just. It is hard to have a sound economy when the government is unsound.

II. Just rulers are a blessing to a nation. The Bible champions the cause of the poor, oppressed, and underprivileged. Today there are many who are poor and needy. The colored people in many parts of the nation are cheated out of their rights. In a class there can be a lively discussion on the kinds of people who belong to the poor and needy group. Nations all want prosperity and peace but not all are willing to pay the price.

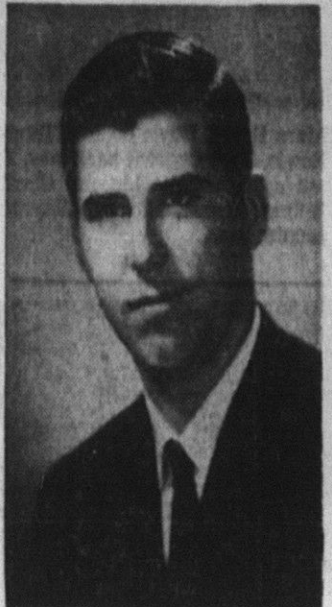
The Bible teaches that righteousness fosters both prosperity and peace. Unrighteousness undermines a nation's economy and promotes conflicts.

III. God is the Judge of all

Judges. The writer of Psalm 82 pictures God in the midst of the gods—the judges and authorities in the lands—presiding over them. These men had misused their responsibility and shown partiality to the powerful and the rich. Bribery was common in the Orient in the past and in many nations it still is.

God commanded these judges to, "Defend the poor and fatherless; do justice to the afflicted and needy; rid them out of the hand of the Wicked." God not only denounces the crooked dealings of the judges but also pronounces judgment upon them. These men were given responsibility by God but they failed and thus they hurt the nation.

As one looks around in the world today and sees the much bungling in the real of government one can't picture the future bright. The Christian who looks forward to the rule of Christ can face the future cheerfully.

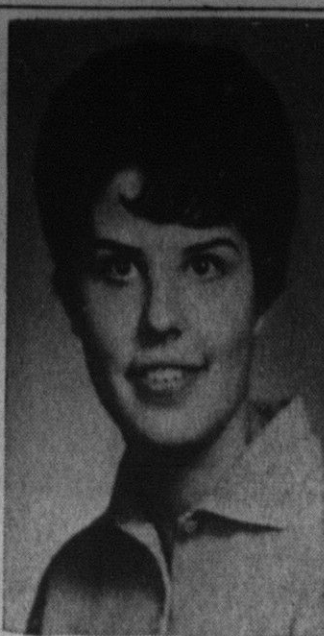

KALAMAZOO — Holland Christian's tennis squad won its third state class B championship in 10 years here Saturday on the Stowe Tennis stadium courts staving off a challenge by Kalamazoo University High, the defending champs, in the semi-final round.

Christian racked up 8½ points by the end of the semi-final round and coasted in for the victory ahead of U-High which had 7½, Sturgis, 7, East Grand Rapids, 6½, Masc., 6½, Cadillac, 6, Big Rapids, 2½, Algonac, 1½, Northville, 1½ and Dearborn Riverside, ¾.

The win was particularly sweet to Coach Clare Pott and his Maroons having finished in the runner-up spot the last two years. Two years ago they lost the title by a ½ point and last year by a ¼. Christian last won the state championship in both the 1953 and '54 seasons on the strength mainly of state doubles champs, Jim Teerman and Paul Dykema.

Christian also won the doubles championship in 1955 with Dykema and Norm Lokker taking the crown. The Maroons also won the doubles championship last year with Tom Deur and Randy Nykamp.

Christian had three qualifiers in the final round, Don Kronmeyer in singles and Deur and Nykamp in doubles. With the pressure off and the championship already won, both groups faltered in the finals.

Kronmeyer was completely exhausted before beginning his final round against Phil Campbell of Cadillac after winning a 3½ hour match in the morning from James Phillips of Mason, 6-2, 7-9, 9-7. In this match Kronmeyer led 5-2 in the second set and held a triple match point but couldn't put over the clincher until an hour and a half and 25 games later. In the finals he bowed to Campbell, three times class B champion, 6-1, 6-0.

Deur and Nykamp played beautiful tennis in the morning semi-final round to ice the championship with a 6-2, 6-2 win over J. Stulberg and J. Harada of Kalamazoo University High, Christian's last challenger. In the finals the Maroons lost to a fine doubles combination, Rick Steketee and Win Irwin of East Grand Rapids, 6-4, 5-7, 8-6.

Pott said he felt that with the pressure of winning the crown already off, the Maroon duo wasn't quite as sharp as it was in winning the title a year ago. However he said they fought back to win the second set and held 5-4, 6-5 advantages in the deciding set. Steketee and Irwin advanced to the finals by stopping Kalamazoo University High's Ron Creager-Steve Campbell, 6-2, 6-4 in the semis. Both are sophs.

Pott praised the play of his entries and said they showed plenty of "heart" against perhaps the toughest B competition in recent years.

In the other morning semi-finals singles match, Campbell had stopped Bill Ayers of Sturgis, 6-2, 6-0.

Holland High's Ken Harbin became the school's first singles finalist Saturday by stopping highly regarded Ed Waites of Jackson 6-1, 1-6, 6-2 in the semi-final round. Harbin played well in winning the first and last sets, relaxing a little too much in the middle round.

Then in the finals, Harbin bumped against Chuck Brainard of Hamtramck, the tourney's No. 1 seed and fell 6-1, 6-3. Brainard is a sophomore. Harbin also showed the effects of his tough morning round but still extended Brainard all the way. Brainard had advanced to the finals by stopping Bill Kirkpatrick of Kalamazoo Loy Norrix in the semi-finals.

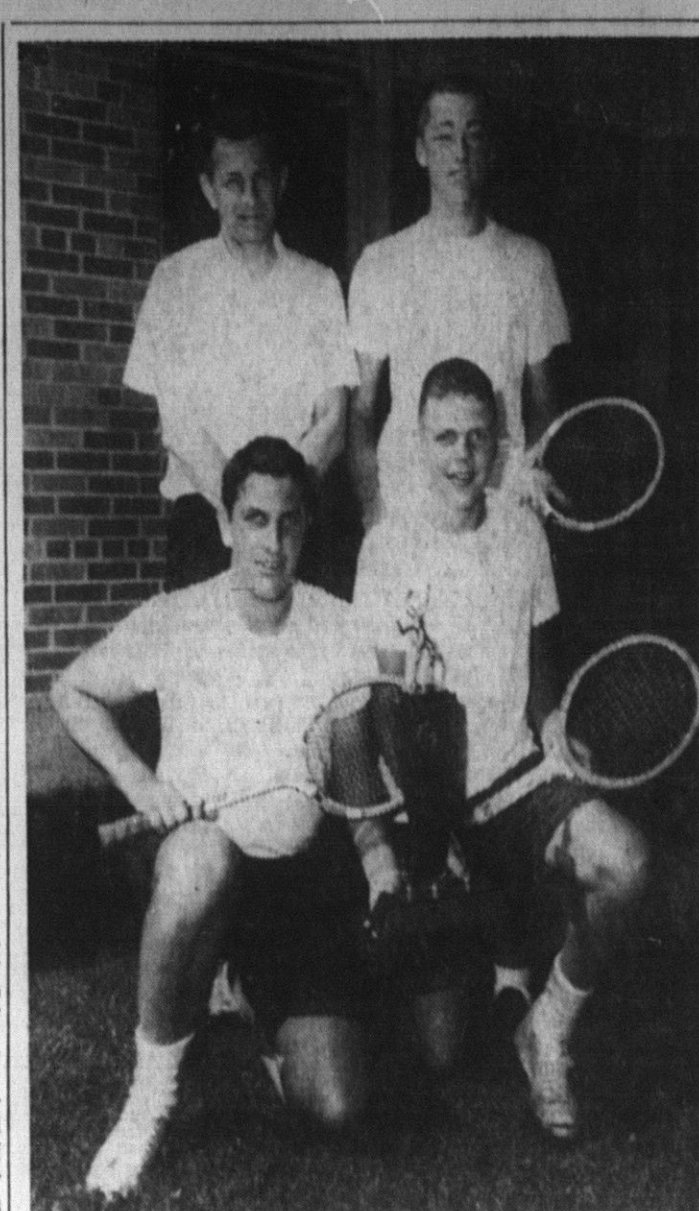

Gifts For Year Total 26 Million

PELLA, Ia. — Dr. Bernard Brunsting, pastor of First Reformed Church of Holland, Mich., and president of General Synod the past year, told synod that 340,000 members of Reformed churches had contributed \$26,111,587 for all kingdom causes in 1962. Of this amount, nearly \$6,000,000 was for denominational causes.

In his report on "State of Religion," Dr. Brunsting called for a greater commitment to Jesus Christ and to the confessions of the church. He called for a "theology of the heart," one which is not so much interested in debating the gospel as proclaiming it, not to much interested in evidences of learning as evidences of life. He warned that the church "cannot be unconcerned about creeping universalism or low views of scripture."

He recommended that the Reformed Church consider establishing a Medical Guild of physicians to aid medical missions abroad. Such a Medical Guild could supply personnel for short-term emergency situations in mission lands, could arrange to provide drugs and hospital supplies for mission hospitals, and scholarships for those who intend to enter medical missionary service.

He also recommended that Synod go on record as favoring the establishment of a closer relationship with churches outside the ecumenical movement, recognizing a oneness with them in Christ.

In the area of organization, Dr. Brunsting declared that the church must ask the question, "Just how many people and reports does it take to make a decision?" and strike a balance between efficiency and democracy. He suggested it might be possible without any real loss to reduce the size of boards of the church by 50 per cent.

Dr. Justin Vander Kolk, past president of New Brunswick Theological Seminary at New Brunswick, N. J., was elected vice president of Synod. He succeeds Dr. M. Verne Oggel of Glen Rock, N. J., who was elevated to the position of president. Dr. Oggel is a former Holland resident.

Fence Policy Is Clarified

Gordon Streur, building and zoning administrator for Holland city, has sent notices to fence distributors clarifying fence policies in the city.

All fences of either wood, wire or other material are determined to be structures under the Holland

building code and will require a building permit.

The permitted height of fences on other than corner lots shall be a maximum of 30 inches high for front yard fences to the setback line with a maximum of six feet in height on the side and rear yard back of the setback line.

Fencing on corner lots shall not exceed 30 inches in height within 20 feet of the intersecting property lines along the street sides of the property.

40,455 Visitors Attracted To Holland State Park

A total of 40,455 visitors attended Holland State Park last week according to Louis Haney, State Park Manager. The attendance for Sunday was 8,020, while 8,325 visited the park on Saturday. This brings the total attendance for the year to 233,855.

Haney said 198 new camping permits were issued last week bringing the yearly total to 1,025.

The daily motor vehicle permits issued last week totaled 838 and 15,034 annual permits were given out, according to Haney.

Curtain time is the same as last year, 8:30 p.m. Monday through Saturday with a 2:30 p.m. matinee Wednesday.

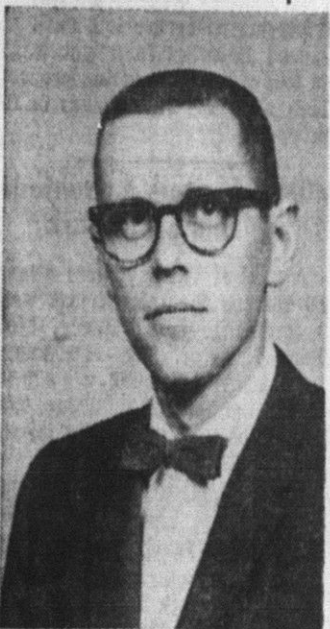

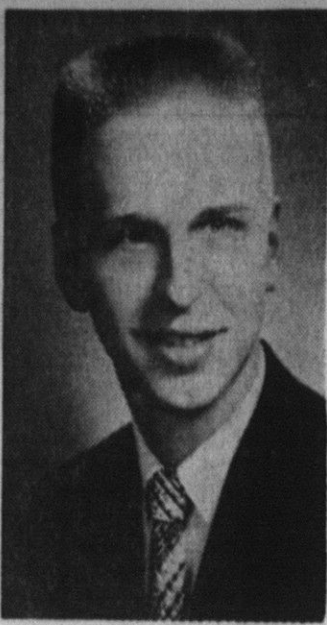

Board Votes Conversion Of Old Jail

ALLEGAN — An expected hassle over funds for readying the old county jail, preparatory to its being turned over to the Allegan County Historical Society for use as a county museum, failed to develop at Thursday's one-day board of supervisors session.

By a substantial majority, the board approved a motion offered by Alger Workman, Allegan city supervisor, authorizing the expenditure of not more than \$2500 for painting exterior trim, replacing broken windows, removing some cell blocks and plumbing and installation of a new, automatic warm-air furnace.

Jail Committee Chairman Francis Cronen said he had received a low bid of \$728 for painting and glazing and \$1400 for the new furnace.

Board Chairman Greg Nulty named four other supervisors to serve with him on a special committee to oversee construction of the new county juvenile home.

Named to the committee were Cronen, Francis Brower, Fritz Jager and Carl Arenhovel.

The board approved a joint recommendation of county buildings and salaries committees, setting a salary in the \$5,000-\$6,000 range for the new post of maintenance superintendent for the county building and jail. The building committee has nearly 20 applicants for the post and will begin interviews soon.

Also approved was a recommendation from the civil defense committee for turning over the civil defense "duck" for water safety use in the Saugatuck area. The CD kitchen truck will be made available to the conservation department for use in feeding forest fire fighters and for training purposes.

Grand Haven Water Front Display Attracts Thousands

GRAND HAVEN — Entering its second full week of operation, the Dewey Hill Musical Fountain continues to attract spectators to the Grand Haven area. The combination water, music and light display, which is synchronized by electronic tapes, has been viewed by 25,000 person since its opening on Memorial Day.

Two 20-minute displays, at 9:15 p.m. and 10:00 p.m., will continue nightly throughout the summer months. Although bleachers for viewers will soon be installed, the fountain can be seen from various vantage points along the river.

The fountain is billed as the largest of its kind in which water, lights and music all respond to automatic tapes.

The project was begun in 1960 when a group of civic officials, in cooperation with private individuals, took steps to beautify the riverfront area. The immediate objective of the group was to secure the endorsement of the community for a fountain on Dewey Hill. The city had only partial control of the land on the Dewey Hill side of the river.

A Chamber of Commerce committee, headed by Dr. William Creason, who is now the mayor of Grand Haven, proposed the combination water and music display after conversations with several civic organizations and officials.

Together with Clarence Smith of Spring Lake, Dr. Creason set out to design several fountains which were modeled after one he had seen in Germany.

In May, 1961, the Chamber of Commerce approved a model, but it was weeks before the program Dr. Creason had in mind could be put into action. A finance committee headed by Foster Poe of Grand Haven organized a two-week fund raising campaign which began on August 14, 1961, but fell over \$10,000 short of its goal of \$17,000. Undiscouraged by this response, the group continued to talk to community organizations, local busi-

nesses, and interested individuals until the goal was reached.

"Work on the fountain then began in earnest," Dr. Creason said. "Many obstacles were overcome. The city did not own all of Dewey Hill. After much negotiating it was learned that the property could be purchased but the price would have hampered the complete project. Help came from an interested source which bought the property and gave it to the fountain project," he said.

"The size and type of nozzles, size of pumps and pipe, method of controlling water pressure, types of water formations and types of lighting and sound equipment were, of course, many of the problems that had to be met, tested, and solved," Dr. Creason said.

Here are some of the solutions which the various groups eventually came up with:

1. Water for the fountain is pumped by the make-up water pump from the river's edge up to the fountain basin. The basin of the fountain contains 40,000 gallons of water — just about 800 bathtubs full, which is changed every 10 minutes.

2. Water in the fountain is circulated through over 1½ miles of pipe ranging in size from ½ to 16" in diameter.

3. Water patterns are made by 1,300 nozzles which can shoot water as high as 100 feet.

4. The fountain is 250 feet long by 100 feet wide — almost as long as a football field and half as wide.

5. There are nearly 4 miles of electrical wiring which can supply up to 100,000 watts of electrical power.

Dr. Creason emphasizing that the whole project had been a super "team effort," said, "If one were to figure the many donated services and equipment, the cost of the fountain would be approximately \$150,000.

Winds Demolish Gasoline Station

The owner of Mike's Highway Service, on US-31 near the US-31 bypass, demolished by Saturday night's high winds, had no estimate of damage to the service station and contents, but he said it would probably cost about \$15,000 to repair or replace the present structure.

A small part of the gas station was left standing and business was being carried on as usual today. Owner Mike Sale was holding an inventory of his stock today to determine loss of contents of the station. He said some of the contents suffered water damage and some were blown away.

Lightning struck the Martin Dykstra home at 94 East 16th St. Sunday night resulting in slight damage to partitions between the kitchen and a utility room. A neighbor, J. Vander Vliet, called the Holland fire department. Dykstra, who lives alone, was attending church at the time and arrived home to find about 300 people watching the firemen.

Two plywood panels in the new exhibit building at the Ottawa County fairgrounds were blown out in the weekend storms. The judge's stand also was demolished.

A large elm tree in the back yard of the Nicholas Ter Voort home at 480 Pine Ave. was uprooted in Saturday night's storm at 10:45 p.m. and fell across a corner of the garage. The falling tree snapped electric wires and the house was without electricity until 3 a.m. Ter Voort estimated damage at about \$100.

The 70-foot tall "lonesome pine" at the Lincoln Seifert home on South Shore Dr. was a casualty in Saturday's storm. This tree had had a good share of its branches stripped in the 1956 ice storm a week before the April 3 tornado. Now it lost more branches nearly to the top of the tree. It happened when a huge maple tree in the Winstrom yard next door split in two and fell against the pine tree.

A two-stall garage and a chicken coop at the Barney Zuidema home at 4495 48th Ave. near Overisel were blown down in Sunday night's storm. A living room window was blown out and the porch roof damaged. The Zuidemas and their three children were returning home from Overisel church when the storm hit. To add insult to injury, a pig coop across the street on the Andrew Boeve farm was blown down and all the debris settled on the Zuidema porch.

After Saturday's storm settled, there was a scramble at Holland State Park to retrieve beach balls, bathing suits and sundry other items which whipped across the sands in the wild windstorm. Most of the property was recovered. Park officials said blowing sand left huge deposits in some areas and figured it would be two days before all is shipshape.

The David R. Fetters family at 1210 Floral Ave. in Central Park, wouldn't really care to relive Saturday night. About a half dozen trees on their property were blown down, one of them onto a section of the house. Mrs. Fetters, fearing a tornado was coming, herded the children into the basement. Nobody was injured. In taking stock, three large trees fell, one against the porch. Two others had tops blown out, one in the next yard fell onto the lot and the other was "leaning." Of the eight children, two were ill and two were away at the time.

One of the most harrowing stories to come out of Saturday night's storm was experienced by 10 persons of Waukazoo aboard Don Vander Baan's cruiser. The group left Holland for a cruise on a quiet evening when about a mile north of Saugatuck, the storm hit. Vander Baan headed for shore immediately while the guests donned life jackets. So turbulent was the sea that the skipper could see only during lightning. Once ashore, the drenched party

sought shelter and finally found a candle glowing in a window of a cottage. The friendly couple provided towels and blankets then took all 10 home in their station wagon. The women rose early Sunday morning to help their benefactor clean her home of the mud and sand they had tracked in. Vander Baan returned to his beached cruiser and managed to get it home under its own power.

Holland firemen received four calls within three minutes during the storm Saturday night, one at 10:56 p.m., two at 10:57 p.m. and one at 10:58 p.m. All were in the 26th and 27th areas where fallen trees had left sputtering power lines in the streets.

It's a sad story in one new subdivision in Waukazoo area. Three new ranch houses just off Waukazoo Dr. near Ottawa Beach Rd. are the victims of fallen trees or branches.

Add casualties: A large barn just outside of Moline was flattened by Sunday's storm. It was used as a warehouse by the Moline Iron and Metal Co.

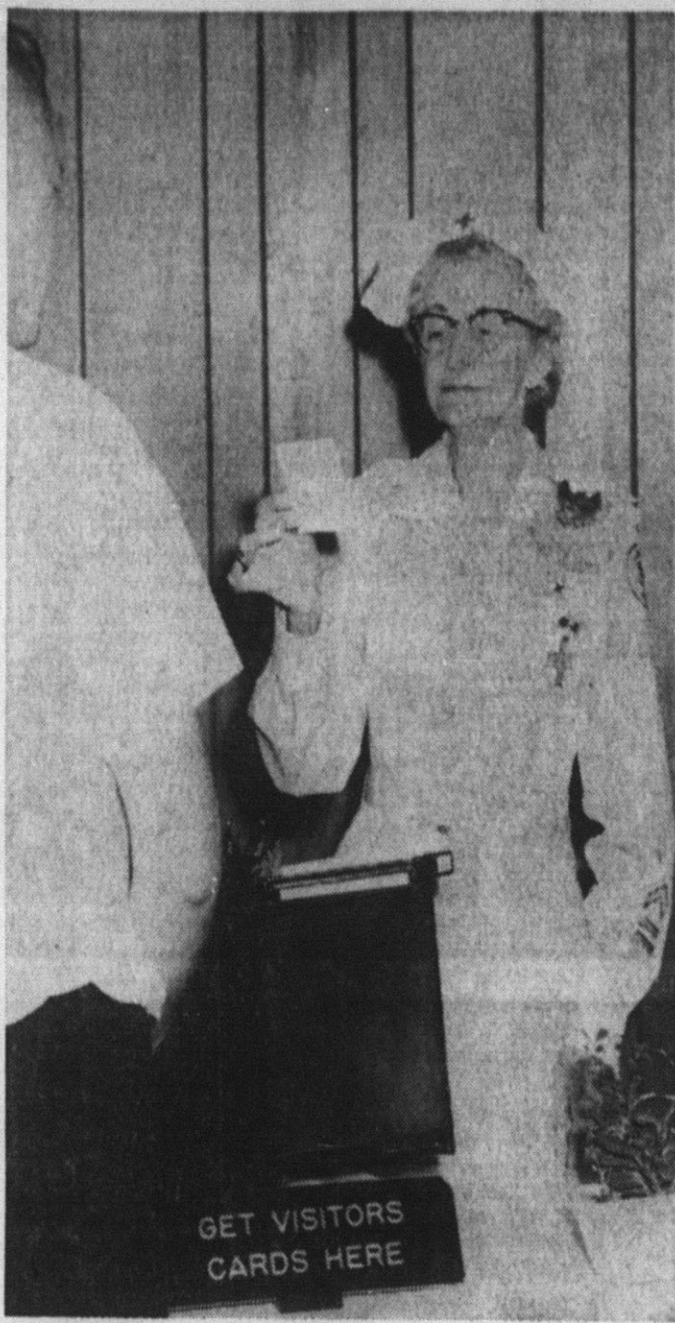

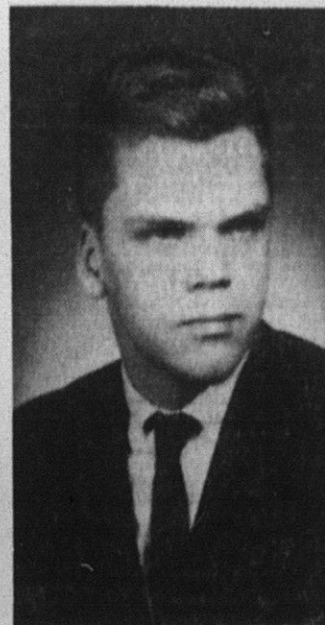

Edward Prins Named To Retirement Board

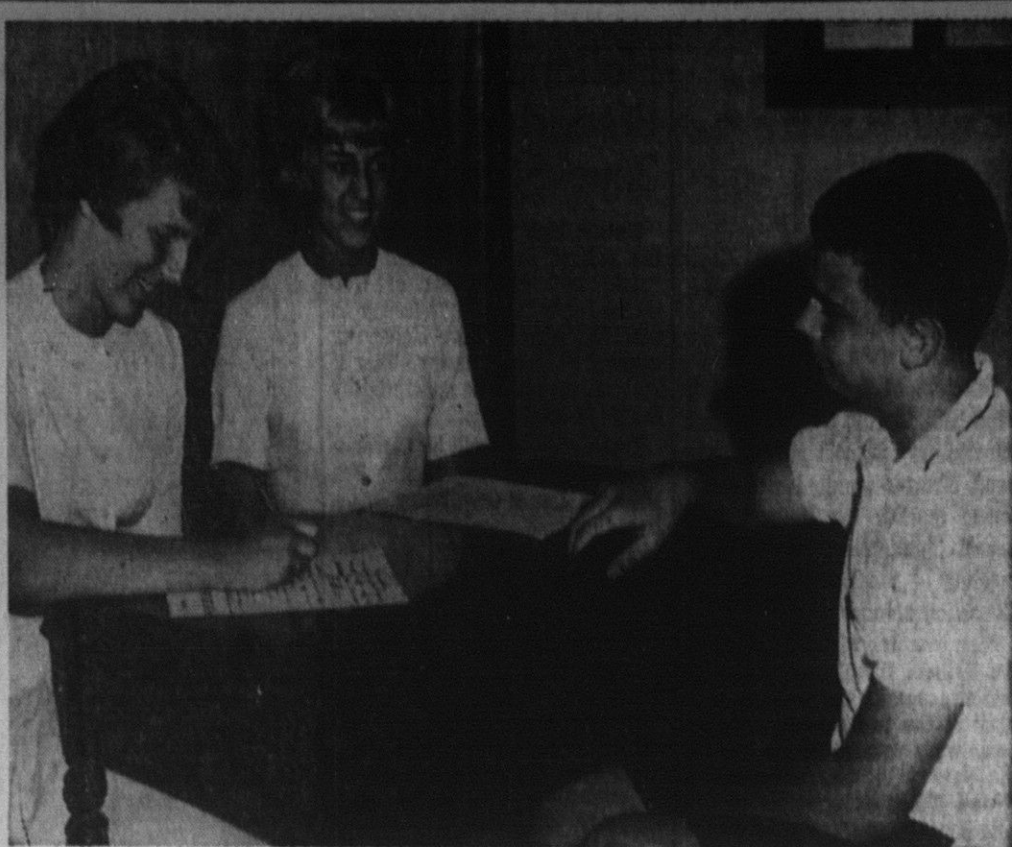

Board Hires Principal, Band Leader

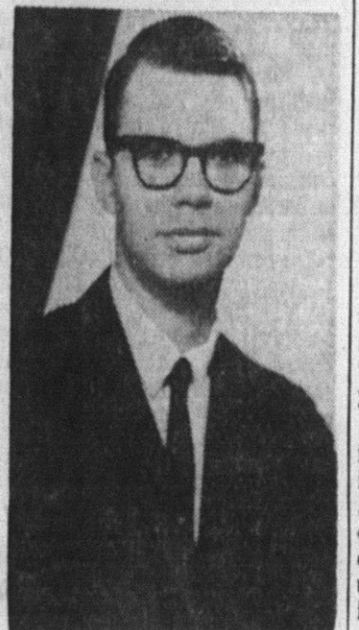

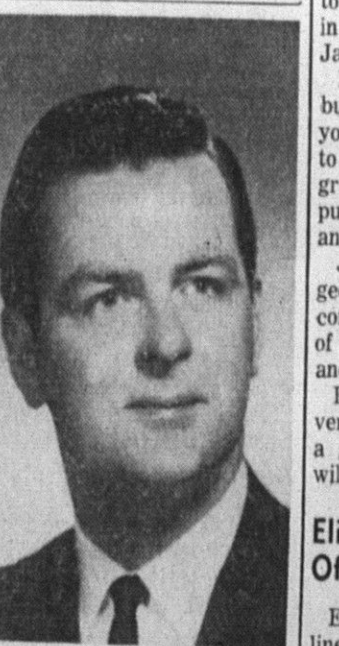

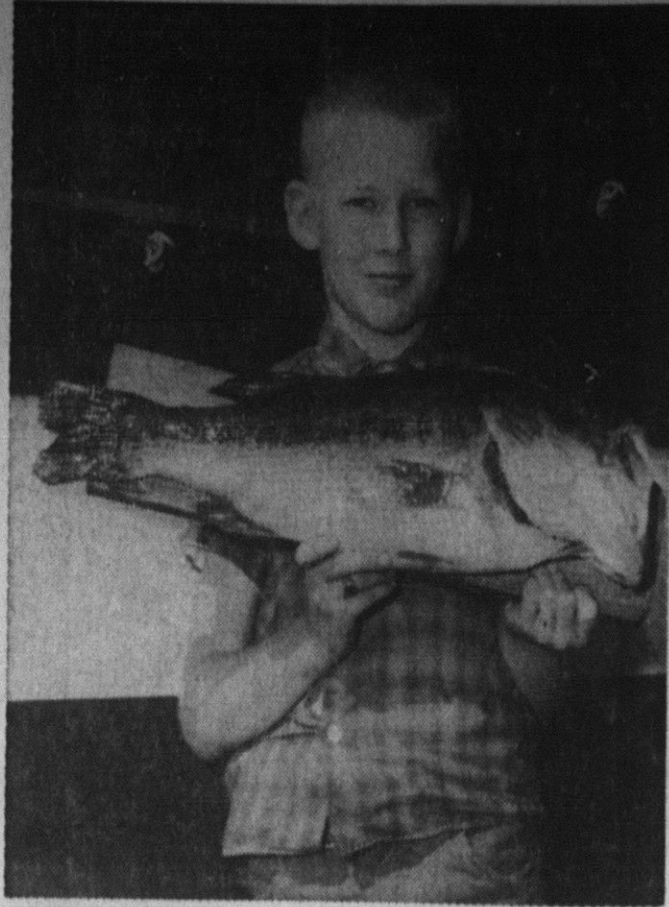
