Beech-Nut, Inc., Breaks Ground for New Plant

Beech-Nut Life Savers, Inc., Tuesday broke ground for its new \$11,000,000 confections plant on its 100-acre site in Holland's Southside Industrial Park.

Sherman A. Morse Jr., vice president-production, and John Van Dyke Jr., president of the Holland Economic Development Corp., turned over the first spadefuls of earth, wielding gold spades presented by Grant R. Smith, president of Owen-Ames-Kimball of Grand Rapids, general contracting firm.

"This new modern facility for the production of Beech-Nut gum and candy, Life Savers, and cough drops will provide much needed capacity to meet the requirements of a rapidly growing market, particularly in the Midwest," Morse said.

Alger B. Chapman, chairman of the board and president, who was unable to attend, wired his greetings, pointing out it was particularly fitting that the company mark its 75th year of progress with this important step in its continuing industrial growth.

Morse paid tribute to the officials of the Holland Economic Development Corporation whose continuing interest and cooperation aided materially in the initial search and planning stages. Long one of the leaders in baby food processing, Beech-Nut plans for the future include expansion of the Holland plant to provide for a baby food facility. The availability of raw materials for baby food — particularly the wide variety of fruits and vegetables in Michigan, was an important criteria in selecting the plant site location.

The confections plant is designed so that the baby food facility can be added without disturbing the appearance of the original building. Beech-Nut baby foods are now processed in Canajoharie and Rochester, N.Y., and in San Jose, Calif.

Booth B. Miller, director-industrial relations, estimates that eventually 350 persons will be employed in the confections operations, most of them to be recruited from Holland area.

Mayor Nelson Bosman delivered the city's welcome at ground-breaking ceremonies, and B. M. Conboy, director of the Michigan Department of Economic Expansion, gave the state welcome. John Van Dyke Jr., president of HEDCOR, brought greetings and Morse responded.

There were 150 or more persons attending the ceremonies. Later they toured other Southside Industrial establishments where Holland Wire Products, Slick Craft Boat Co. and Seven-Up Bottling Co. of Western Michigan have plants well along in construction.

Because the food industry is highly competitive and operates

on a low profit margin food manufacturers must continuously invest in new equipment and modernize plants to step up production, Morse told more than 170 persons at the Holland Chamber early bird breakfast Tuesday in the Tulip Room of Hotel Warm Friend.

The Holland plant will provide the corporation with excellent production space and make possible improved techniques in confection processing," Morse said.

The new plant which will be approximately 245,000 square feet will produce stick gum, pressed mints and boiled hard candy. It is located on a 100-acre site on 48th St. in the southeast corner of the South Side Industrial Park.

Morse outlined the plans for the \$10 million confections plant. "It will be a single-level building with mezzanine areas for service and storage. The exterior construction of the plant will be of precast concrete panels with tinted glass windows, enameled face brick and aluminum siding.

"The interior, he said will be attractive and functional, with good use made of colored glaze tile and painted plaster."

Adequate parking and a unique system for tours through the plant are also planned, Morse said.

Bids for the plant were submitted to contractors in March, 1966. The Owen-Ames-Kimball Company of Grand Rapids was awarded the general contract in April. The main equipment, and supplementary equipment are either on order or in the process of construction, Morse said.

The building is scheduled for completion in the last half of 1967.

"It is estimated that over \$80 billion was spent for food products in 1965," Morse said. "Still only 19 per cent of the disposable income in the U.S. is used for this purpose," he added.

Because of this, Morse said, the food industry is highly competitive and has had low profit margins. "Food producers are constantly confronted with the problem of meeting rising costs . . . from the pressure for higher wages, more liberal fringe benefits, higher taxes, increased transportation rates, etc."

To meet the problem food manufacturers continuously invest "to step up machine productivity," he said. Food companies have invested more than \$10 billion since 1946 in new plant and equipment.

"Our type of manufacturer currently has an investment in facilities of more than \$20,000 per production worker," Morse said.

"If our business is to grow and prosper, it is necessary that

we develop more new products," Morse said. "This year the food industry is spending \$140 million for research and development, and it has been estimated that approximately half of this is for new product development work."

Morse said the chances of success with a new product are not too good. Of 100 new ideas that a company tries, about 25 per cent survive the economic exploration. Half of these may go through laboratory development, and half of these survive consumer testing. One out of the remaining six may be really successful, he said.

Morse concluded that Beech-Nut as a business enterprise recognizes its civic responsibility to the communities in which it operates.

"We shall join with others to advance the growth and welfare of these communities and shall participate in civic activities which fulfill that goal," he said.

Douglas Youth Drowns in Lake

DOUGLAS — Tragedy struck the Morgan Edwards family, 79 Washington Ave., Douglas, for the second time in two weeks when Howard Edwards, 13, drowned in Lake Kalamazoo here about 2:35 p.m. Friday.

General Synod Opens Session

Under the theme, "For Thine Is the Power," General Synod of the Reformed Church in America opened its 1966 annual session in Dimnent Memorial Chapel on Hope College campus today. There are 300 delegates, but with wives and families the number assigned to five dormitories is well over 500.

An orientation session at 11 a.m. today briefed delegates on details of the synod program and procedures that will be followed, plus introductions of staff members, other denominational representatives and synod leaders. The Rev. Donner B. Atwood of Pompton Plains, N.J., presided and Dr. Marion de Velder, stated clerk, gave the briefing.

A new president and vice president were to be elected at the official opening session at 2:30 p.m. today.

The proposed merger of the Reformed Church in America with the Presbyterian Church U.S. loomed as the major topic of discussion at the seven-day session scheduled to close June 15.

The proposed merger would unite the Reformed Church of 232,000 communicant members with the Presbyterian group which has about 950,000 members. The Presbyterian leaders will be asked to "clarify relationship" between what seems to be "conflicting actions of the recent Presbyterian assembly."

The Presbyterian Assembly, according to synod officials, voted in April in Montreat, N.C., to continue union conversations with the Reformed Church in America, but at the same time also to participate in consultations on church unions under the Blake-Pike Plan. The Reformed Church is not a member of the Blake-Pike Plan consultations.

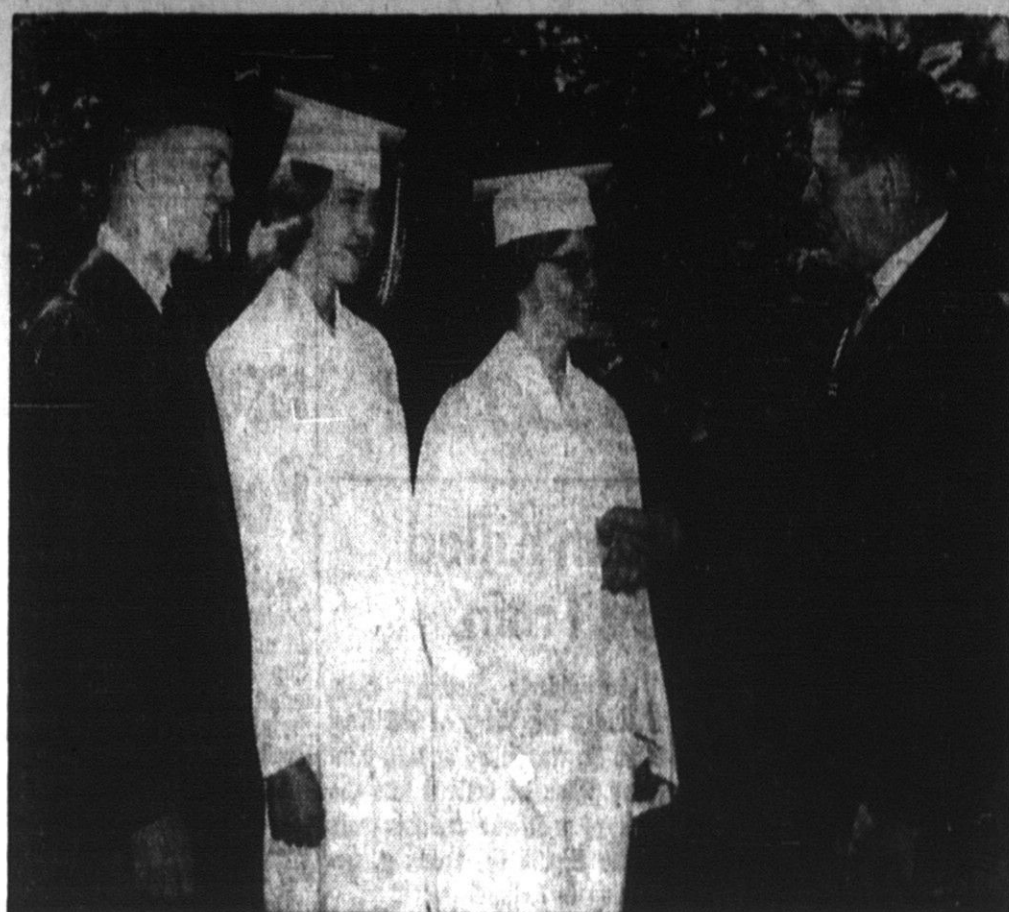

The largest display of orchard machinery anywhere in Michigan will be luring fruit growers from orchard and vineyard to Leisure, located 3½ miles north of South Haven on US-31 and 4 miles east of 107th St.

More than 600 fruit growers annually attend the event to keep pace with the many technological changes this age is bringing to the fruit grower.

The program will open at 2 p.m. with a demonstration of new tillage equipment. Included will be an experimental machine to pick up apple drops; a new small tree shaker and a low volume sprayer. Experimental toppers and hedgers and many other pieces of machinery adapted for orchard use, will also be shown.

Evening demonstrations will start at 6 p.m. with more than 25 orchard sprayers shown in action, including spraying by helicopter. Other features will be a talk on orchard problems by MSU personnel and a pesticide test.

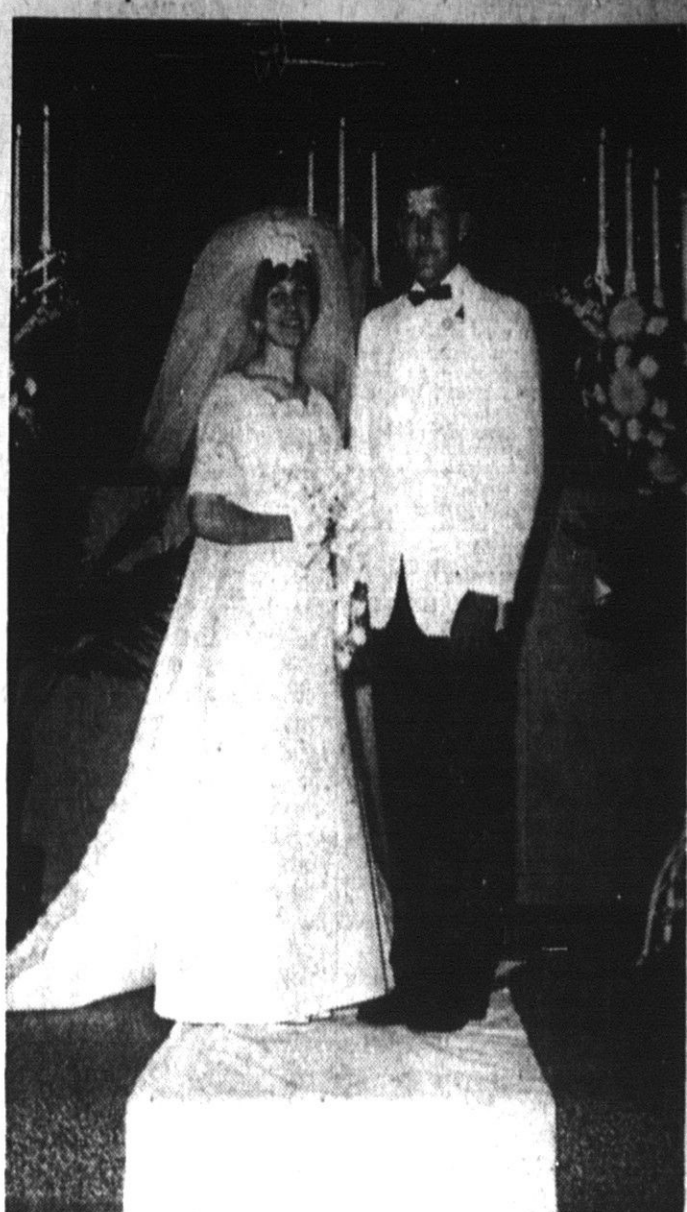

Sunday School Lesson

Sunday, June 12
Manasseh Leads Judah Into Sin
II Kings 21: 1-4; 9-15;
II Chronicles 33: 12-13
By C. P. Dame

Manasseh, the son of a godly father, Hezekiah, should have walked in the footsteps of his father, but he walked in the ways of his idolatrous grandfather Ahaz and brought the nation to the brink of ruin. One man of power and position can do a lot of damage.

I. Prodigal sons create much grief. Manasseh is often called the prodigal of the Old Testament. He ruled the nation from 696 to 641 B.C. a period of fifty-five years. Some sons walk in the ways of their fathers—either in godless or godly ways but not Manasseh for he chose to do "that which was evil in the sight of the Lord." He undid all the good work of his father. He worshipped Baal, introduced the worship of the sun, moon and stars and stooped so low that "he burned his son as an offering," practiced augury, soothsaying and necromancy and "dealt with mediums and wizards" and "shed very much innocent blood" in the nation.

The King's course of action was inexcusable.

He knew about God and his revelation and he knew what special help God had given to his father in destroying 185,000 Assyrian soldiers when Jerusalem was besieged. This knowledge only added to his responsibility.

II. Some prodigals will not listen. The prodigal king led a nation into sin. God sent "his servants the prophets" but the people would not listen and "Manasseh seduced them to do more evil that did the nations whom the Lord destroyed before the children of Israel." God was not indifferent for He "spoke by his servants, the prophets."

God speaks today through His Word and through godly parents and pastors and personal workers. Some people listen but some refuse. The Northern nation, Israel, had already been carried into captivity but Judah did not heed the warning. History teaches lessons but not all heed the lessons.

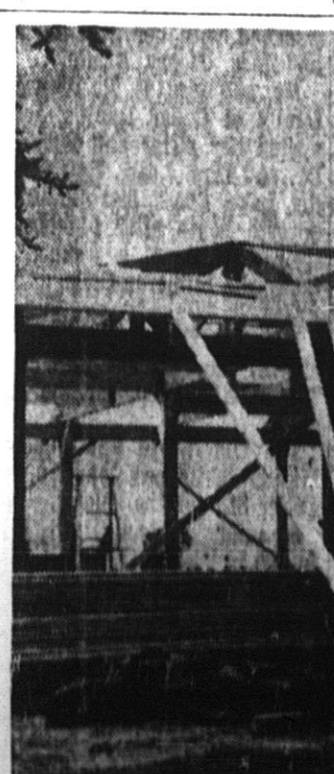
III. Prodigals can change. Manasseh was locked up in prison in Babylon due to a plot he had joined in to throw off the Assyrian yoke. While in chains in prison the king did some clear thinking. Sometimes God puts people in a tight place in order to wake them up. The king "besought the Lord his God, and humbled himself greatly before the God of his fathers" and he prayed. Did God ignore his prayer? Indeed not. We read that God "was entreated of him, and heard his supplication, and brought him again to Jerusalem into his kingdom." Evidently the king was pardoned for his disloyalty and got another chance.

After his conversion the king tried to undo his evil and persuade the nation to serve God but this did not happen. The king's conversion changed him, but the nation did not have a similar experience. The bad seed which the king had sown yielded a harvest. A father who was converted late in life wanted his children to change their ways but this did not happen. Seek the Lord early in life and sow good seed.

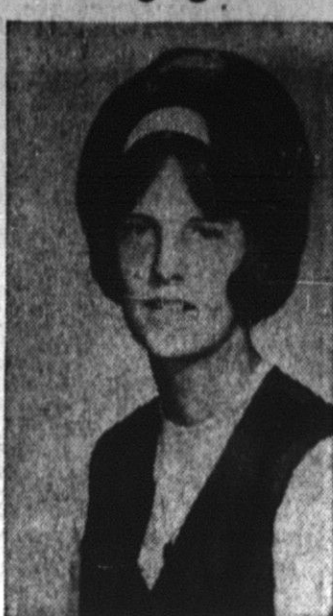

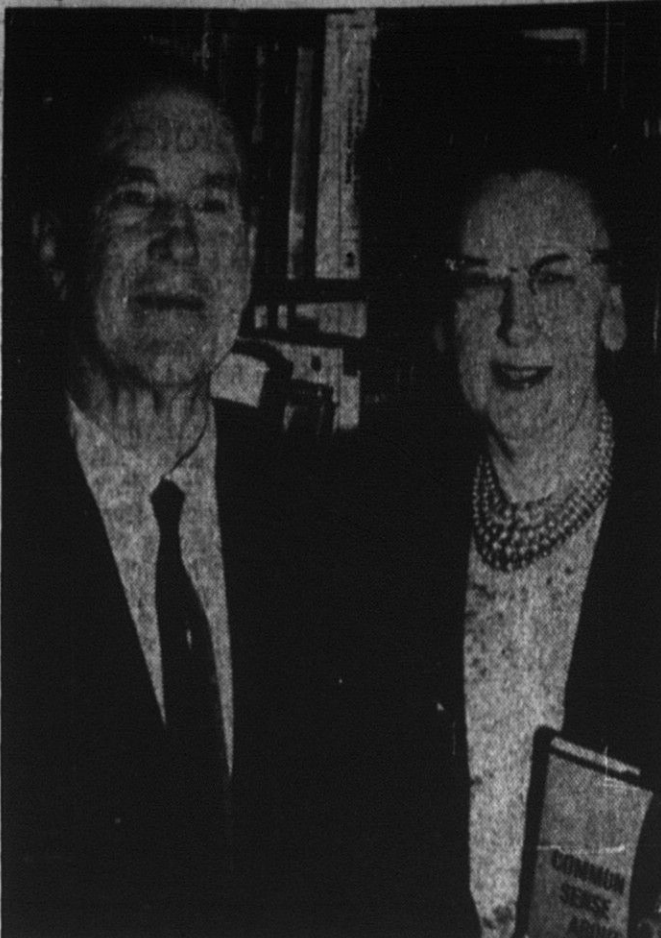

It Won't Be Quite the Same With These Two Retiring

Two long-time teachers at Holland High School are retiring this year and a good chunk of the city-at-large is as interested as the students in school.

Ervin D. Hanson is completing 37 years as a teacher in Holland High and Mrs. Lucille Donovan is leaving after an even longer period, although her teaching career has touched primary, junior high and a stint at substituting as well as a good number of years as high school librarian.

Thus, the influence of these two teachers has reached into the second and third generations of family living in Holland, and anybody who has attended Holland High in the last 35 to 40 years has definite memories.

Mrs. Donovan, who started her teaching career in Holland back in 1924 in the grades and progressed to junior high and high school, has a stimulating sparkle that many a humorist and after-dinner speaker might envy. Coupled with undying energy, she could and does enliven any gathering. She has a gift for deflating cocky youths, and to their undying credit they take it in good spirit and return for more.

As High School Mayor Jeff Padnos said in a tribute to her at a recent school assembly: "Mrs. Donovan has chopped off most every student's head at some time, but she always put it back in better condition."

Her rejoinder: "Twenty-six years ago I had trouble teaching public speaking to my father. I just couldn't get him on his feet to make a speech. But you! All I can say to you is sit down and shut up!"

Hanson, who was nicknamed "Prof" in the early days by students, occupies a unique spot in the hearts of thousands of students who have passed through his courses in the 37 years. His was the room that students headed for, once out of school.

And it was his room that young people in the service during World War II headed for, once on furlough. And Prof Hanson was always there to greet them. It would not have been quite right without him.

As librarian, Mrs. Donovan is in a central spot in the new high school to attract all the visitors. Besides, it's a lovely library, and she's proud of it.

Mrs. Donovan, then Lucille Lindsey, started teaching speech at Holland High school in 1928 and Prof Hanson came a year later. Together with Ed Donovan of the manual training department who was courting Lucille, the three made quite a team at senior play time. Lucille directed the play, Ed built the sets and Prof helped with promotion and made pep talks.

Ed Donovan retired last year, and now he and Lucille plan a lot of trips and Lucille is all set to do more book reviews,

something she does extraordinarily well.

When Prof Hanson came to the high school in 1929, he was elected patron of the sophomore class. The next year he was elected patron of the same group, now the junior class, and the third year he became patron of the senior class. Miss Lindsey was patroness of the senior class at that time, and together they served as faculty advisers for senior classes until Lucille married Ed in 1936.

Then for a time she did substitute work, and in 1943 helped "fill in" at the library.

Then as now, librarians were hard to come by and after a time she decided to get her library training. She took a very special one-member-class in cataloging from the Hope college librarian and then completed her training at Western Michigan University.

Hanson figures he was nicknamed Prof because of seven years at college which included one year in grad school and two in law school. The third year he was at Holland High, arrangements were made for him to conduct a course in commercial law. To everyone's surprise, 150 students enrolled and the class shifted from room 102 to the main assembly hall.

There, Prof followed the law school method, having students prepare briefs from basic facts, issues and discussions.

Prof's well known pep talks, given once a week in the old days, have now tapered down to about once a year.

Both teachers have retained the effervescence of youth and both are in demand at school reunions, usually two or three a summer. Both keep a stack of school yearbooks for their research.

But mostly, they have no trouble recognizing their students.

Bredeweg Achieves Fine Record at West Ottawa

Although his teams have compiled a 33-5 won-lost record in dual meets in the last two seasons Norm Bredeweg, West Ottawa track and cross country coach, was most proud of his team off the cinder track on May 5, 1965.

On that afternoon a school bus carrying the team to a track meet collided with a car and rolled over at M-21 and the US-31 bypass. A total of 50 persons on the bus were treated at Holland Hospital for injuries.

"There was no panic and everyone was helpful and cooperative," Bredeweg said. A nurse at the hospital commended the group for its behavior.

"Our main goal is to develop men," Bredeweg said, "and this incident showed we're succeeding."

"We stress that each kid is important as an individual," Bredeweg said. "They're treated like men, and I expect them to act that way."

He demands that team members are loyal and act like gentlemen on and off the field.

Bredeweg lists three ingredients that are necessary to develop a runner — desire, determination and loyalty.

"You can make a runner out of an average human being if he has desire, the coach said. "Ability is secondary." He has to run, and want to hurt himself to improve."

Loyalty to the coach and team are necessary to build the comradery required for success, Bredeweg said.

Bredeweg's approach allows team members to build up pride in themselves.

"We win because of it," he said. "Technically, I don't think I'm a good coach," Bredeweg said. "I just run the daylight out of them, and we win."

He believes in a "no fads or fancy stuff" approach to training. Bredeweg's teams don't work on isometric exercises, weighted equipment or specialized devices. They just run.

Many of the runners compete on both the track and cross country terms, and run nearly year round. From August until November they train and compete in cross country. Track training and competition runs from January through June. In the summer there is A.A.U. competition. Jaycee junior champs and personal training programs, he said.

Although training sessions vary they usually consist of running a set distance several times in repetition, calisthenics and other running exercises. The cross country team sometimes runs eight miles per day.

The coach used the first few weeks of the season to assess the members of the team. He then sets out individual goals for each member of the team.

The goals are raised each week. The progressive goals require that a trackman hurt himself to keep up.

Bredeweg never cuts men from the track team. Those who can't keep up with the pace usually drop out, he added.

He doesn't believe in "chewing out" members of the squad. Instead, he tries to lead in a quiet way frequently flashing a broad smile.

Bredeweg, who teaches history at the high school, began coaching track eight years ago when it was started at the high school. He started coaching cross country when the sport was introduced at West Ottawa four years ago.

Besides seeking to develop men Bredeweg went into coaching because of "a love of track." He was a low hurdler and sprinter at Holland High School in the mid-1940's, and developed a keen interest in the sport. He received a minor in physical education in college.

Bredeweg's goal when he began coaching was to make West Ottawa a track power. Although he sometimes doubted whether they would make it in the first few years, West Ottawa has now arrived as one of the top teams in western Michigan.

The Panthers won league championships in the O-K league and the now defunct Grand Valley league in the last two years. They also finished near the top in track competition.

"The trouble is there's little or no track tradition in western Michigan," Bredeweg said. "You're only as good as your competition," and West Ottawa needs to face more strong track teams such as there are in the eastern part of the state, the coach said.

West Ottawa also needs to develop some outstanding performers to help raise the goals for other members of the team. In addition, the Panthers have been a running team.

"My assistant coach, Karl Von Ins, has done a good job in bringing up the field events," Bredeweg said. Von Ins, a social studies teacher in the junior high school, is in charge of the field events.

Bredeweg foresees a bright future for West Ottawa track and cross country. Only four consistent point getters graduate this year, and there are always new runners coming up, he said.

One big goal is to have a team which ends up the season with white letters for its sweaters. The team normally gets black letters, but if it goes undefeated it will receive white letters.

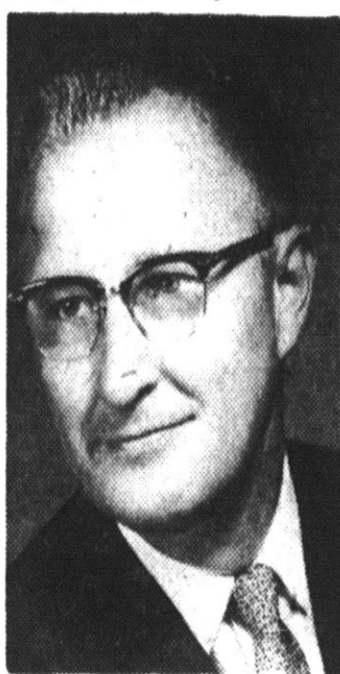

Auxiliary Sees Hospital Equipment Demonstrated

Demonstration of hospital equipment provided the program at the annual luncheon of the Holland Hospital Auxiliary Tuesday afternoon in Bethany Christian Reformed Church attended by about 200 persons.

H. A. McKinnon, director of nursing, demonstrated operations of an isotope used mainly to sustain life in premature babies (any baby less than five pounds) with controlled warmth and humidity and sometimes oxygen. He explained that oxygen for preemies is never over 40 per cent after it was learned about 10 years ago that some babies went blind because of underdevelopment of the capillaries in the retina. Full term babies are not affected even by 100 per cent oxygen, he said.

Also on display were a respirator and automatic resuscitator, used mainly for emphysema patients, an automatic rotating tourniquet for pulmonary edema patients, and a positive pressure machine and defibrillator for heart patients.

In demonstrating a cardiograph (a sort of tv for heart beats) he used Nicky Vreeman (Mrs. Michigan) as a patient and when her heart beat came through clearly in a darkened room remarked, "She has a most regular heart beat. I don't think she smokes. No nicotine fuzzy lines."

McKinnon remarked that even in a day of better and more refined hospital equipment, the physician has less time than before to devote to patients and must turn over more duties to nurses who already are in short demand. He asked the auxiliary to push for a four-year nursing program in western Michigan to provide more topnotch nurses. He said Holland Hospital will provide better chances of survival for acute cardiac patients when the intensive care unit is in operation in the new addition.

Throughout his talk, he quoted prices of the equipment (usually quite high) and the need for more, giving due credit to the hospital auxiliary and Junior Welfare League for many gifts along this line through the years.

Mrs. Gerald Rocks, president, presided at the luncheon, and introduced other officers. Mrs. John K. Winter, vice president; Mrs. S. Walter Kuipers, secretary; Mrs. Allen Fraam, corresponding secretary, and Mrs. Glenn Mannes, treasurer. Mrs. W. A. Butler was introduced as chairman of the coffee shop and Mrs. Vernon D. 301 Hope Seniors Receive Degrees

A total of 301 Hope College seniors were awarded bachelor of arts degrees at commencement exercises Monday in Civic Center which was filled with faculty, parents and friends.

Two Hope alumni were significantly honored, Judge Cornelius vander Meulen receiving an honorary degree of doctor of humanities and Dr. Everett T. Welmars a doctor of science degree.

Speaking on "Horizons Unlimited," Dr. J. Ralph Murray, president of Elmira College, Elmira, N.Y., said, "Because you are now a college graduate you will not be someone startlingly different tomorrow, nor will you make some discovery of unlimited influence, nor will you produce an idea suddenly that will revolutionize any of the major problem areas of mankind."

"But it is possible that one or all three of these potentialities may occur if your college experience has been a sequential outgrowth of a building on the basic core of knowledge and processes which will permit and encourage continued expansion of your horizons for the rest of your life."

He said some problems that seem new are really old ones that have existed for one generation to another. "It is the difference in the means used to meet these problems that change, that make life meaningful and beautiful, or ugly and distasteful."

In mentioning ways in which independence is created and maturity probed, Dr. Murray said, "Some of you caused your parents to worry considerably because they had grave concern whether you would be able to participate in these graduation exercises. You have used this as a kind of rebellion. Some of you have let your hair grow and wear clothes so that it is difficult to discern whether you are men or women. Some have overspent the family income or created other problems. And without doubt, all of you have told your parents that they are just too old to understand your problems and that things are different."

"The ways in which you have met and will meet such concerns really show your maturity and are indicative of the creative and significant opportunities with which you function as an individual. They show whether the spiritual and educational processes have been fruitful."

He said riots, demonstrations, sit-ins, teach-ins and all related activities cannot become a way of life in a democratic society if that society is to survive.

"Like many events in the French revolution, those events in our own society among labor unions, supports of civil rights and so-called freedom of speech are also anarchistic, as are many of the recent actions of college students on campuses. To support such activities through civil disobedience and other unlawful means reveals a lack of understanding of the tenets, both religious and governmental, which have sustained man through the ages. We cannot afford to have the materialistic concerns of our society continue to overpower the spiritual ones," he said.

The citation for Judge Vander Meulen read in part: "For your efforts to provide a social order that values persons above things, for your firm belief that, unless we give ourselves away, we cannot be helpful to others, for living a life that gives strong evidence of having been touched deeply by charity, loyalty and vision, and for your faith in a God who supplies the wellsprings of life that lie outside of the self."

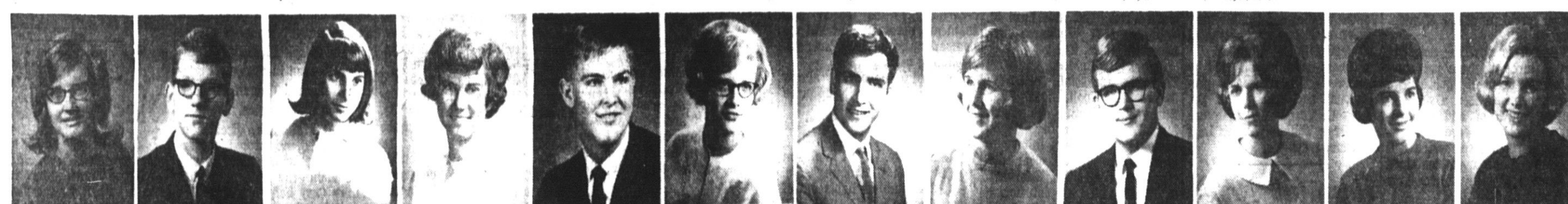

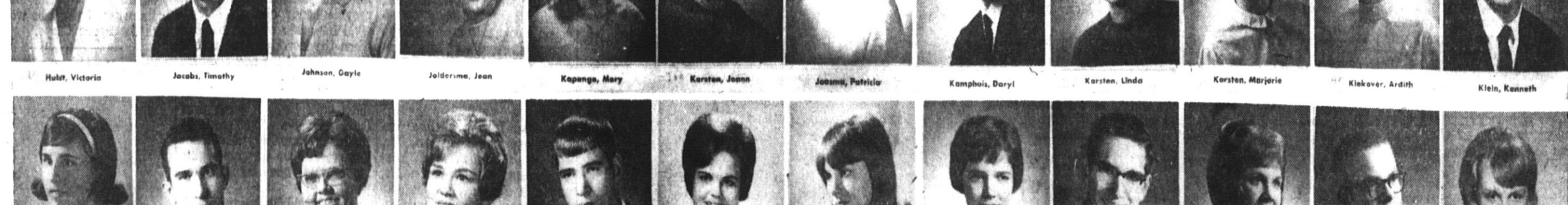

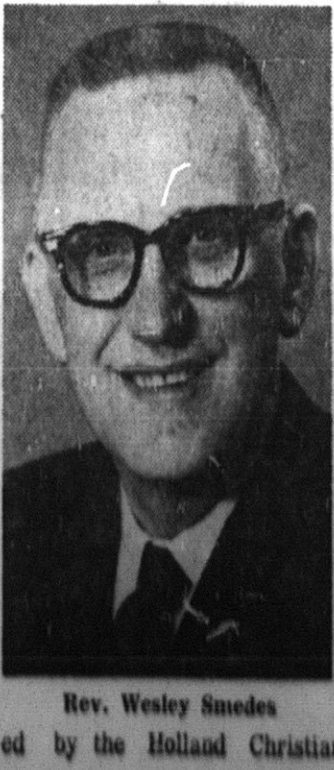
Graduates of Christian High To Hear Talk by Rev. Smedes

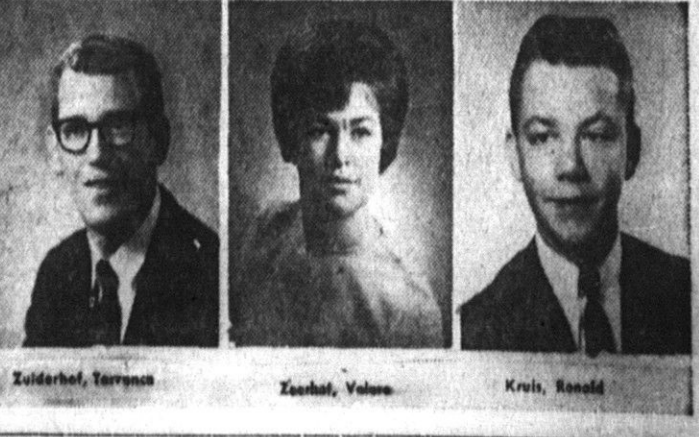
Summer Baskets Deck Downtown

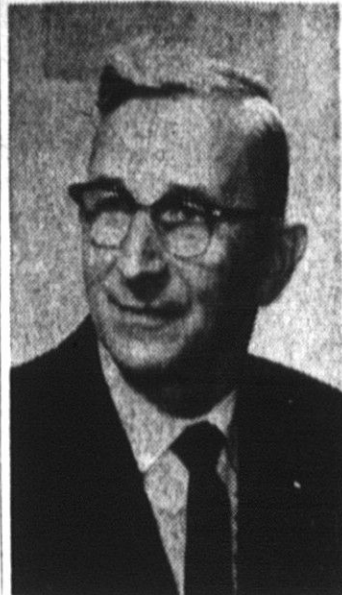
Honor Two Faculty Members Retiring from Hope College

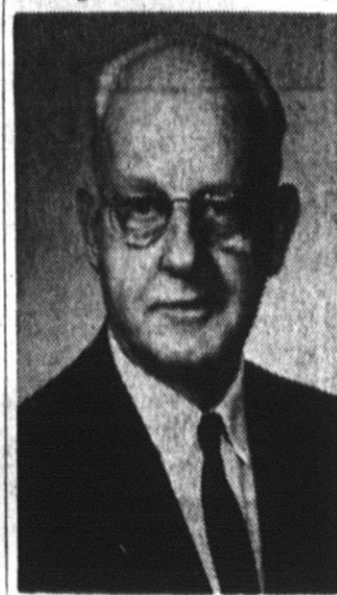
Dr. Clarence De Graaf, chairman of the English department, paid tribute to both for their

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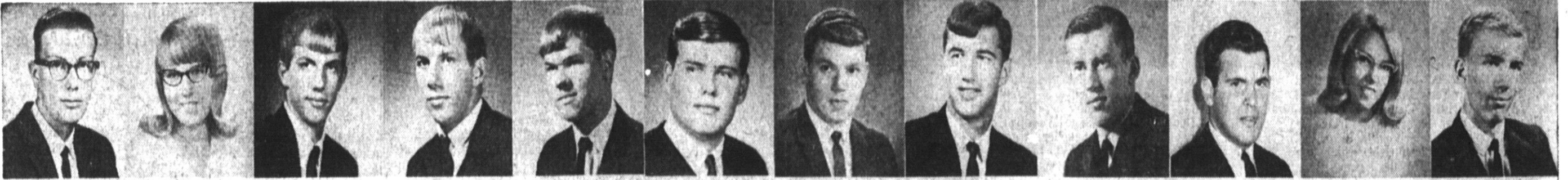

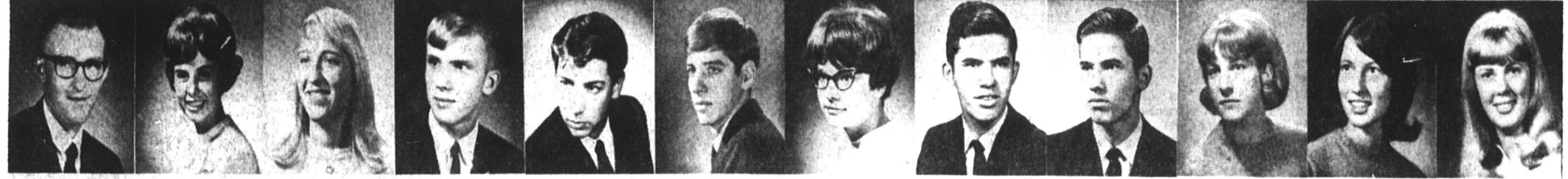

Temperature In May Down 6.1 Degrees

May was one of the coldest May's ever experienced in Holland, according to Lynn P. Wheaton, official weather observer.

It had an average temperature of 50.6 degrees which was 10 degrees lower than last year's average and 6.1 degrees below normal.

Holland was wet, wet, wet during Tulip Time, but otherwise the precipitation was below normal. Total for the month was 2.93 inches, of which more than 2 inches fell during the first three days of Tulip Time May 11 to 14. Prolonged cold, wet weather preserved the tulips which presented a far better picture on Memorial Day and early June than during mid-May, the usual blooming period.

A new record low of 20 degrees was recorded May 10, considerably lower than the 26 degrees recorded in 1963 and 1947. Temperatures in the 20's were recorded four times in the first 10 days, resulting in glaze on roads and pleas for cautious driving. There also were several foggy periods.

During the four days of Tulip Time, the highest temperature was 53 and the lows ranged from 32 to 36.

A high of 82 was recorded May 23, and 81 was recorded May 24. The 70's were listed on only five days.

Maximum was 82, compared with 83 in 1965, 85 in 1964, 78 in 1963 and 91 in 1962. Minimum was 20, compared with 32 in 1965, 35 in 1964, 26 in 1963 and 36 in 1962.

Precipitation totaled 2.93 inches, compared with .99 inch in 1965, 3.74 inches in 1964, 2.31 inches in 1963 and 1.56 inches in 1962. Precipitation fell on 11 days, compared with 13 days in 1965, 7 days in 1964, 13 days in 1963 and 11 days in 1962.

Local Man Defendant In Civil Case

The judgment was for \$3,774.30, plus \$35.75 costs.

A suit was started in circuit court Friday by James A. Mrozinski of Manistee county, who seeks \$25,000 damages from Earl Van Lente and Jay Groenleer of Jack and Earl's service station at Holland. The

suit is the result of a traffic accident Sept. 10, 1965, at River Ave. and Fourth St., Holland, involving Mrozinski's small sports car and a truck driven by Van Lente. The Manistee man claims he was injured in the accident.

Republicans Put Priority On People, Hatfield Says

GRAND HAVEN — A party label today is one of the most casual relationships in the history of government, Mark O. Hatfield, the youthful, articulate governor of Oregon, told about 300 persons attending a \$50-a-plate Ottawa county fund raising dinner Monday night in Spring Lake Country Club.

"Go down the street, talk to 10 voters, and while a good number will say they are registered as party members, invariably they say they are interested in the man."

"In putting a priority on people, the Republican party is concerned with open mindedness and responsibility, and is worthy of support. Many Democrats are disenchanted and are looking to the GOP for candidates who offer leadership."

There also is a priority on machines, but while our economy is rooted in production, machines cannot create in the sense of human need, and tend to dehumanize our population. In putting a priority on people, their hopes and their spirit, the Republican party does not treat them as a property to be cared for like animals on a farm."

"We must establish a philosophy on practical lines, one that allows creative new ideas, one in which the wellsprings of creation cannot be dried up by politics. We must look to human resources, from the national to regional, state and local levels, and mobilize private effort."

"America has the highest standards of living ever known to man, but government can halt or suspend the creative genius of an economic system. People who benefit from the system must give leadership."

In speaking of priority on people, Gov. Hatfield said top priority must go to the Americans in Viet Nam, and although he regarded Viet Nam policy as one of the most serious errors in America today, "whether we agree or disagree we must back the people in Viet Nam."

He expressed concern over an economy which provides both guns and butter and said people cannot afford to let this nation drift into inflation. Of all the 50 states, he said Oregon is likely to be the hardest hit both by inflation and deflation. "Some of our lumber mills are closing and building is off 20 per cent. Oregon has only 2.3 per cent

buying power in the space program, compared with 20 per cent in Washington and 19.4 per cent in California," he said.

He emphasized the need for convictions and beliefs, urging that people not only recognize the need in government but to involve themselves in these needs, working from conviction within.

"We are not trying to standardize the people and have them bow to the god of mediocrity, and we must stress that the Republican party believes in the role of law. When clergymen, educators and politicians deliberately violate the law, there is great trouble in our land. So long as the constitution provides ways of changing the law, we have no right to violate the law. The constitution provides peaceful methods for change. A law on the books itself will not cure all evils."

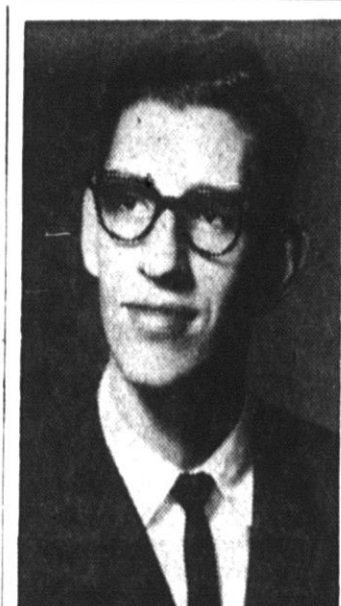
He spoke movingly of the tragic shooting of James Meredith Monday afternoon on a Mississippi highway, and the need of a change in men's hearts and a renewed trust and faith in God to combat bigotry.

Gov. Hatfield was introduced by Robert P. Griffin who was appointed U. S. Senator by Gov. Romney last May 11. Griffin assured 9th district residents that although they do not have a Congressman in Washington, an office is in operation there for their needs.

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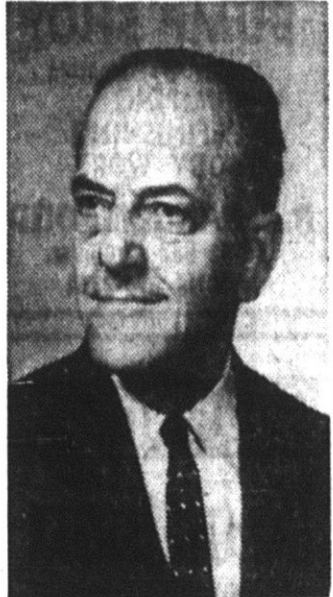

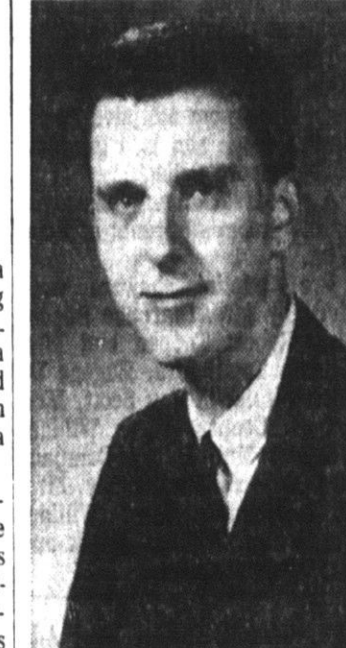

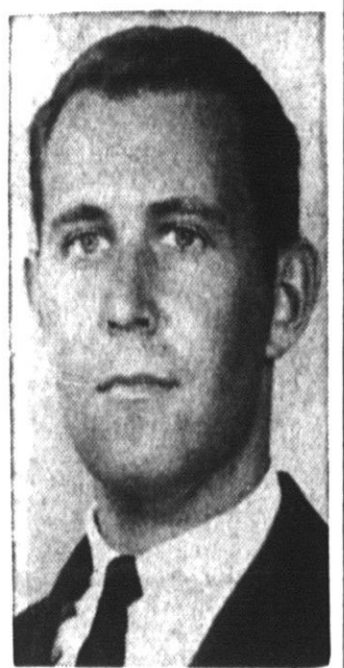

Improvement Of Street Is Okayed

ZEELAND — City Council Monday passed two resolutions which give final approval for the Washington Ave. improvement program.

The council passed a resolution confirming the tax assessment roll drawn up by Moore and Bruggink, consulting engineers. Two changes were made in the roll following a public hearing May 28.

Also approved was a resolution for presenting a proposed bonding resolution to the Michigan Municipal Finance Commission for approval.

The proposed bonding resolution calls for property owners along Washington Ave. to pay off their share of the project in 10 installments. The interest rate on the unpaid balance is 5½ per cent.

The estimated cost for the project is \$170,600. A total of \$119,000 of the amount would be paid through special assessment, and \$51,600 would come from city funds.

The project includes widening the street by six feet on each side, installation of storm sewers, curbs and gutters and blacktopping the whole street from Carleton St. to the old west city limits.

The council approved an ordinance repealing an earlier ordinance on employee vacation policy. The council then adopted a vacation policy for city employees. The policy calls for one-week paid vacation after one year employment; two weeks of paid vacation after three years of employment and three weeks of paid vacation after 10 years employment.

In other action the council: Authorized the city attorney to file the necessary legal documents to condemn property for use by the city for an outfall sewer.

Authorized the legal and ordinance committee to get bids for codifying and compiling city ordinances.
