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Councilmen Vote Down \$1 Chairs

Councilmen won't be able, after all, to buy their seats for \$1 at the close of a full term or more of service on City Council.

By voice vote, Council turned down the proposal which had been introduced two weeks earlier by Councilman Donald Oosterbaan who was not present Wednesday night.

Councilman Bertal Slaght favored the idea, stating the city spends plenty of money on entertainment. Councilman Robert Dykstra said he did not object to the idea but felt the fee should be a bit more realistic.

Current price of a chair, reporters learned, is \$77.50.

Following a public hearing, Council voted to vacate a portion of an alley lying between 19th and 20th Sts. running from Central to College Aves. but amended the original 220 feet a few feet less to coincide with the east boundary of the Charles Mulder property. Mulder objected to the closing. Several other residents explained they wanted the alley closed because of speeding cars, motorcycles, dust and danger to children.

A hearing also was held on a zoning ordinance amendment to rezone a parcel of property at 37th St. and Maple Ave. to C-1 neighborhood commercial, but Council postponed action until July 5 after some property owners expressed the hope of redesigning the street into a cul de sac, cutting off access at Washington Ave.

A letter from Building Services Employees Union local 515M requesting a meeting with a council representative to further negotiate fringe benefits was referred to the personnel officer. The letter also thanked council and others for the 5 per cent increase to city employees.

A public hearing was scheduled July 19 at 7:30 p.m. on a petition requesting that the alley lying between 12th and 13th Sts. running east from Lincoln Ave. be vacated.

Council approved certifications from Councilman Dyk, Holland Litho Service, \$3.84; Councilman Lamb, L.W. Lamb Co., \$19.50; Councilman Peerbolt, Peerbolt Sheet Metal Co., \$10.50.

Approval was given appointment of the National Bank of Detroit as paying agent for \$1.5 million electric revenue bonds, series 1967A.

Claims against the city on behalf of Felipe Bermudez, 135 Burke Ave.; Gilbert Tors, 384 Wildwood Dr.; Dale Van Oosterhout, 204 West 20th St., and the Michigan Department of State Highways, were referred to the city insurance carrier.

Council approved low bid of Lamer Pipe Co. for approximately 3,000 feet of various size drain pipe for the street department in net amount of \$17,035.83.

Transfer of \$1,500 from the contingent account to provide a parking area for 60 cars at the Maplewood playground was approved.

Councilman Dykstra said some Central Park residents were unhappy over discontinued bus service in the area and asked if the city could do anything to reinstate such service. City Manager Herb Holt explained that this was an inter-city route from Zeeland to Macatawa and was cancelled following a hearing before the Michigan Public Service Commission.

Councilman Slaght said shuffleboards installed last year at Kollen Park are cracking and asked the city manager to investigate upon his return from vacation. The city manager will be absent from the city for 10 days and designated City Treasurer Jack Leenhouts to act as city manager during this period.

Area Rainfall Hits 5.4 Inches For Record

Bright sunshine and refreshing winds today followed an extremely wet spell in Holland in which a total of 5.4 inches of rain fell in less than 36 hours. Rainfall for the 24-hour period ending at 5 p.m. Wednesday measured 4.16 inches. Since 5 p.m. Wednesday, another 1.24 inches fell.

The rain became less welcome after the first two inches descended marked the end of a dry spell of several weeks. The total precipitation for May measured only 1.29 inches. The April total was 7.13 inches including 2.04 inches which fell during a single hour April 22. Official temperature at 6 a.m. today was a humid 67 degrees which rose to 77 in midmorning and then dropped to 71 as brisk winds dissipated the clouds which had hung heavily over the region.

The 4.16 inches for a 24-hour period in Holland is believed to be a record in recent years. Other high readings listed 3.55 inches for a single day in June, 1954, and 3.66 inches in October, 1954.

Average rainfall for Holland is 33.40 inches a year.

Passenger Train Derails; 10 Hurt

Ten persons received minor injuries when a Chesapeake and Ohio passenger train derailed at New Richmond at 8:20 a.m. today.

Nine passengers on the five-car, Grand Rapids-to-Chicago train and one railroad official were treated at Holland Hospital for minor injuries suffered in the derailment.

Ted Jozwiak, 38, of Wyoming, assistant cost engineer for the railroad maintenance department, was riding in the engine when the train derailed and suffered bruises.

Passengers treated at the hospital were: Wilma Stob, 38, Grand Rapids; Lorie Stob, 5, and Carol Stob, 6, also of Grand Rapids; Mrs. William Tolly, 27, and daughter, Mary Beth, of Grand Rapids; Mrs. Hermina Groenewald, 47, Muskegon Heights; Mrs. C. N. Trenker, 70, Irene, S.D., and Mr. and Mrs. D. H. Cranko of Grand Rapids.

The engine and four of the five cars making up the train remained upright; only the baggage car overturned in the derailment.

Railroad officials said most of the train's 43 passengers were riding in the first coach behind the baggage car.

K. E. Bomar, C and O superintendent, said rail traffic between Chicago and Grand Rapids would be halted until approximately midnight. He said it was hoped the track would be cleared and damage repaired in about 16 hours.

Bomar estimated damage at about \$100,000. More than 280 feet of track was torn up in the derailment.

Railroad officials said the derailment was caused by a roadbed washout due to heavy rains in the last two days.

Engineer Sam Chidester of Grand Rapids said he saw the washout as the train rounded a curve and applied the emergency brake. The engine rode over the washout and was derailed but remained upright.

The baggage car, immediately behind the engine, left the rails and overturned. The third car, occupied by some of the train's crewmen also left the track but did not turn over.

The fourth and fifth cars, occupied by passengers, remained on the rails.

Railroad officials said there were 4,000 baby chicks aboard the baggage car. Some got loose during the derailment and others were killed, but rail officials said they were able to save much of the shipment of chicks.

Bus transportation back to Holland was arranged for stranded passengers by the railroad.

Today's derailment occurred at the same place where 38 cars and two locomotives of an 80-car C and O freight train derailed March 5.

Marvin Nevenzel Of Hamilton Dies

Marvin Nevenzel, 62, of route 1, Hamilton, died Sunday afternoon at Holland Hospital following a heart attack.

He was a life-long resident of Hamilton and was employed as custodian at Hamilton High School.

Seven-Week Bay Casting Strike Ends

A seven-week old strike at Bay Casting Company in Holland ended Monday night when members of United Auto Workers Local 406 ratified a new three-year contract with the company.

Full-scale production at the plant was resumed Wednesday with workers being called back to work on a seniority basis.

Union officials said the new pact was ratified by almost a five-to-one vote of the union membership. Some 180 members voted to accept the new contract while 41 voted against ratification.

The contract calls for a 12-cent an hour pay increase over the three years with a four-cent hike in the first year, six cents the second year and two cents the third. The pact also retains cost of living adjustments.

Union officials said the contract provides improved pension benefits and hospitalization insurance coverage along with two additional paid holidays, bringing to nine the number of annual paid holidays. In addition, the pact allows up to three days bereavement leave with pay.

Union spokesmen said that improved grievance procedures were a part of the new contract and that the pact also permitted volunteer layoffs.

Local 406 has been on strike at Bay Casting since April 18 when the company reopened its doors after what the union termed a lockout on March 15, the expiration date of the previous contract.

A skeleton force of non-union workers continued working during the strike period. Non-union workers were jeered as they left the plant Monday night by several hundred union members following ratification of the new contract.

Hearing Set On Paving Program

City Council tentatively approved a \$178,900 street paving program on a special assessment basis this summer at its regular meeting Wednesday night in City Hall and set June 21 for a public hearing.

The proposed program covers the following streets: 24th St., Lincoln to Apple Aves.; 24th St., Plasmann Ave. to Graafschap Rd.; First St., River Ave. 330 feet west; Ottawa Ave., 32nd to 40th Sts.; 40th St., Ottawa Ave., 500 feet west.

The paving report was compiled by City Manager Herb Holt who also reported on proposed sidewalk construction on 24th St. from Lincoln Ave. to Apple Ave. The program calls for sidewalks on the south side from the C and O mainline to the west line of Apple Ave. and on the north side from Lincoln Ave. east 650 feet. Total cost is estimated at \$7,600. Public hearing also was set June 21 at 7:30 p.m.

By a vote of 6 to 1, Council recommended approval of a new SDD license for Donald Kingsley in conjunction with his 1966 SDD licensed business at 531 West 17th St. Motion to reconsider the Kingsley application came after the matter had been tabled at the last meeting. Dissenting vote was cast by Hollis Clark. Mayor Nelson Bosman and Donald D. Oosterbaan were absent.

Most of the 25 minutes spent on the packaged liquor application was taken by two attorneys, one representing Kingsley and the other representing Hansen Drug Store in the same neighborhood which was granted a license last December.

Ronald Dalman, representing Hansen's, reviewed rules and guidelines followed by the State Liquor Control Commission which does not as a rule grant SDD license to businesses 200 feet apart. He said established practice the past 35 years has led to so few exceptions they could be counted on two hands.

He said many pressures had been brought to bear on the state level and many accusations had been made, and he said the main question is what is best for the city of Holland, and what precedent is Council establishing in a situation he deemed highly unorthodox.

Donald Hann, representing Kingsley, presented petitions signed by 700 persons favoring an SDD license. He also said the subject was reopened on communication from the Liquor Control Commission for information only on Kingsley's moral and financial responsibility.

He disdained Da. s allegations of pressure at the state level and invited him to name names, whereupon Dalman rose and said he would be more than happy to provide names, but he did not think this was the proper place to drag names through the mud.

A communication from the Liquor Control Commission requesting council action on a request from Albert and Phyllis Klinge for transfer of ownership of 1967 SDD and SDD licensed business located at 451 Washington Ave. from Gerard and Martha Raffenaud was referred to the city manager for study and report.

Also referred to the city manager was a petition for water service in South Shore Dr. from Lugers Rd. to Allen Dr., and in Allen Dr.

Applications from Shell Oil Co. to construct a new service station at the southeast corner of 15th St. and River Ave., and from Hoek's Maplewood Service Station at 881 Lincoln Ave. to move gas pumps, close door opening and erect fence, were referred to the city manager.

May Was Cool and Dry In Holland

May was cool and rather dry, but sunny weather prevailed for the week of Tulip Time, according to statistics compiled by Lynn P. Wheaton, official weather observer.

Average temperature was 52.8 or 3.9 degrees below normal. Precipitation measured only 1.29 inches or 2.13 inches below normal. In April, rainfall measured 7.13 inches or 4.12 inches above normal. In 1966, the May average was 50.6 degrees or 6.1 degrees below normal, and spring arrived two weeks late.

Light snow flurries were noted May 4 but did not increase the season's total of 126 inches established at the end of March. A tornado watch was called May 18, the day of the Tulip Time children's parade when high winds upset some of the parade props.

Maximum was 84 on May 25, compared with 82 in 1966, 83 in 1965, 85 in 1964 and 78 in 1963. Minimum was 26 on May 2, compared with 20 in 1966, 32 in 1965, 35 in 1964 and 26 in 1963.

Average temperature was 52.8, compared with 50.6 in 1966, 61.3 in 1965, 61 in 1964 and 57.1 in 1961.

Average maximum was 64.1 in 1967 61.9 in 1966, 73.4 in 1965, 72.8 in 1964 and 69.9 in 1963.

Average minimum was 41.5, compared with 39.3 in 1966, 49.3 in 1965, 49.2 in 1964 and 44.3 in 1963.

Precipitation measured 1.29 inches, compared with 2.93 inches in 1966, .99 inch in 1965, 3.74 inches in 1964 and 2.31 inches in 1963.

Precipitation fell on 15 days this year, 11 days in 1966, 13 days in 1965, 7 days in 1964 and 13 days in 1963.

Greatest precipitation in a 24-hour period was .65 inch on May 11, 1.63 inches in 1966, .31 inch in 1965, 1.19 inches in 1964 and 1.05 inches in 1963.

General cooling period during May allowed for a longer blooming season of Holland's favorite flower, the tulip. Early varieties started blooming the latter part of April and late varieties could still be found on Memorial Day. Heavy precipitation in April had its effect on longer stems, the usual guide for a fine blooming season.

"The use of prayer and Bible reading in our school systems has been banned. Second, Abandonment of the Ten Commandments.

"Crime has increased, immorality and divorce are becoming an accepted factor in society."

"The Home. God was once honored by parents and children alike. Many homes are a commissary by day and a dormitory at night, and as a result are falling apart," he said.

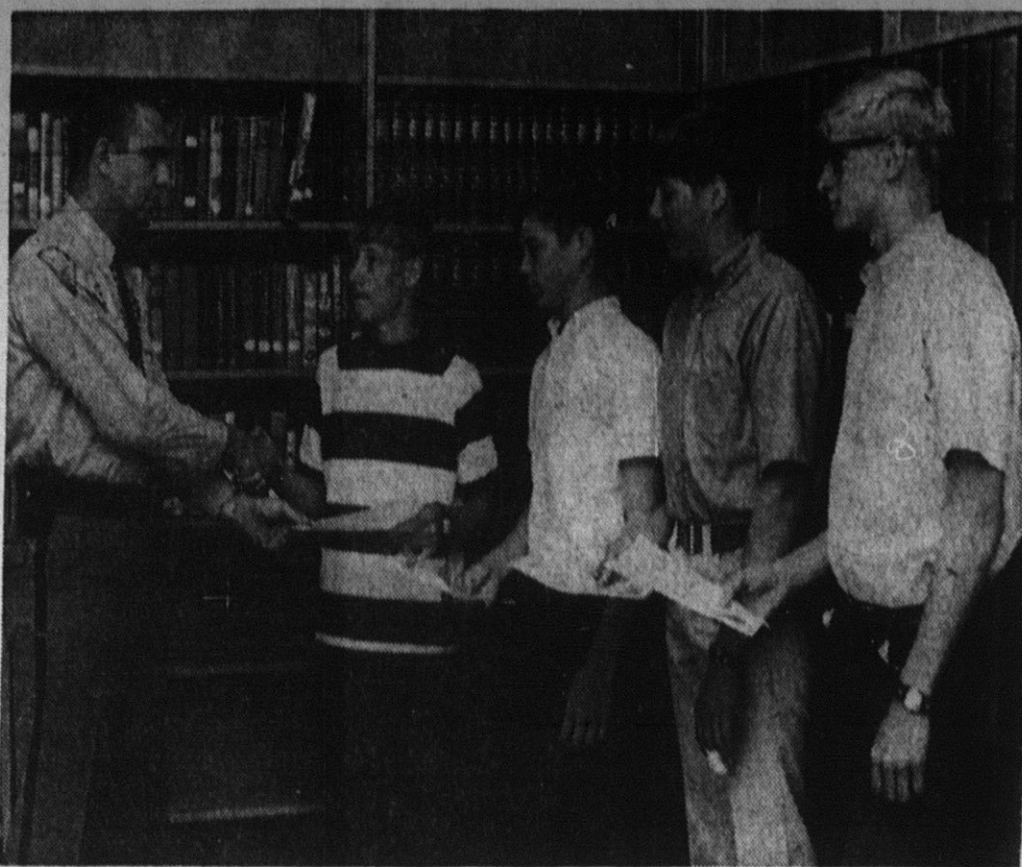
"We seem to have an easy-going, lukewarm religion. We are plotting a course away from God."

"There is only one solution, and it begins with us. We must be committed, a definite turning back to God, so we can preserve our 'Birthright of Freedom,'" he concluded.

Four Youths, Holland Man Are Cited

Holland Police Chief Les Van Beveren Friday presented citations for outstanding bravery to four West Ottawa Junior High School ninth graders for their part in rescuing four persons after a boat capsized in the Black River last Saturday.

The youths are Randy Bleeker, 15, of 2534 Williams St., Barry Haltenhoff, 15, of 189 South Division Ave., Jerry Plaggemars, 15, of 56 East Lakewood Blvd. and Dan Tripp, 14, of 231 West Lakewood Blvd.

A Holland man, James Rotman of 323 East 11th St., will also receive a citation for his part in the rescue.

The four youths were fishing near Van Bragt Park when the boat containing five Gary, Ind., residents capsized in the river.

Plaggemars and Tripp got into a boat and rescued a man and two children. The man who was struggling in the water was hanging on to an infant boy and a girl about 10-years old.

The youths lifted the infant into their boat and told the man and girl to hang on to the side of the boat. The three stranded persons were then taken to shore.

Haltenhoff and Bleeker reached the capsized boat in another boat, and Bleeker dived into the water to rescue five-year old John H. Lewis who had gone under. Bleeker swam ashore with the unconscious child and attempted to apply mouth-to-mouth resuscitation.

Rotman took over for Bleeker and revived John Lewis through mouth-to-mouth breathing. The boy was later released after examination at Holland Hospital.

The fifth person in the capsized boat was able to swim to shore on his own. The boat was owned by Chester Lewis, grandfather of John Lewis.

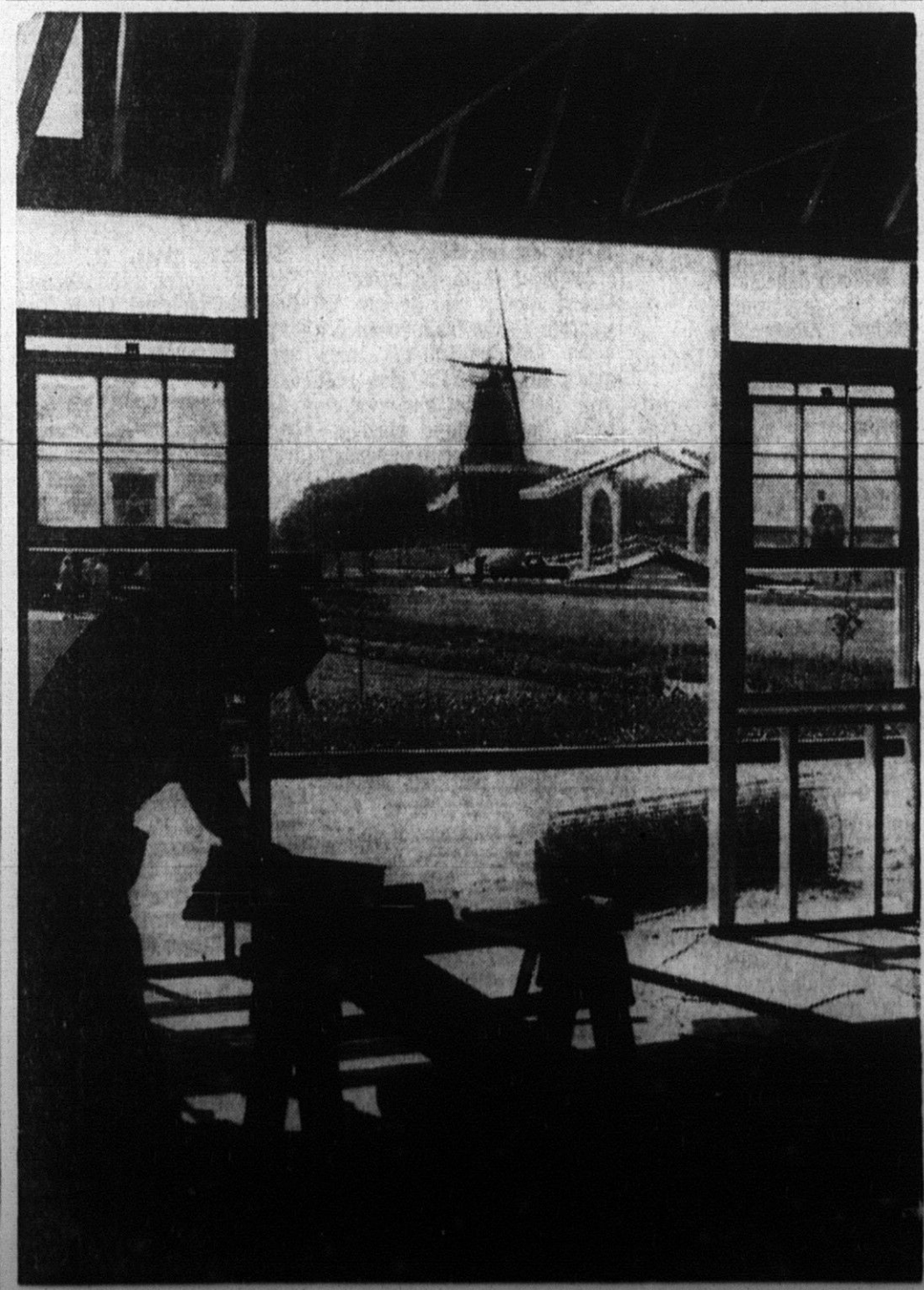

Christian School Drive Nets \$46,000

A total of \$46,000 in cash has been received after the second week of the Sustaining Membership Campaign for special funds for the Holland Christian Schools, Supt. Mark Vander Ark reported Saturday.

Over 400 workers canvassed approximately 3,000 homes of of Christian education locally. Funds collected are used for supplementing the operational budget of the school system. Approximately \$200,000 of the school's budget of about \$1,000,000 is brought in through the SMP program.

Besides the cash received in the annual drive, many society members give systematically in weekly envelopes provided through the churches. In order to reach the goal, members are asked to raise approximately \$20,000 per month by using envelopes.

The SMP is handled by a separate committee working under the school board. Jerry Vande Vusse, a board member, is chairman of the SMP committee. Others on the central committee are Ken Lambers, C. J. Westenbroek, Harold Bakker, Vernon Beelen, Russell Bouws, Warner De Leeuw, Donald Larsen, Steven Snoey and Nicholas Yonker. This group meets monthly and periodically meets with various church and community representatives.

The SMP program is in its 15th year of operation.

JUST A GOOD OBSERVER

A number of years ago, the editor of the Michigan Tradesman wrote that he had considerable confidence in the good sense of the common man. He was talking about that non-expert who minds his business, observes what is going on around him, and does some thinking about what he sees. We had reason to be reminded of this statement, when the wires brought the story about Joe Linko and the subject of road hazards.

Joe Linko, a Bronx tv repairman got interested in road hazards and decided to do some research on his own. He started checking potential highway hazards, made slides of these, and then made some slides of what these hazards had done to cars. He checked misplaced road signs, poorly designed freeway access roads, and hazardous guardrails.

Linko had a rough time getting heard, but when finally he got his chance before a congressional committee, that committee found him with more information than generally credited to highway engineers. With the nation's highway program running around \$15 billion a year, and with hundreds of engineers on the job, it seemed almost incredible that Joe Linko could spot all these flaws in one area of the country. But he was able to do this and he did it with real style.

We aren't suggesting that we get rid of our engineers and turn the job over to Joe Linkos. But it is still true that one can live so close to a particular problem, that one loses sight of the most obvious. And this seems to have been the case with road engineers. As we said at the start, the good common sense of the observer, even though he may not be an expert, ought never to be tossed aside. Isn't this also something of the strength of democracy? And don't we lose something when we toss this strength aside?

Our planners, architects, engineers and all people that work on many of our public projects should do some looking. There is much room for improvement.

Sunday School Lesson

Sunday, June 11
Peter and the Gentiles
Acts 11:1-18

By C. P. Dame

The Lord Jesus told His disciples to go out into all the world and preach the gospel. The disciples were slow in obeying this command. This lesson tells us how the Lord pushed the disciples into the world to preach.

I. God sends messengers to present the gospel. In order to understand this lesson read Acts 9:32 to 11:18. The story is about two men, Peter and Cornelius, a Jew and a Gentile. They got together. That was unusual, God did it. At Lydda, Peter healed a paralyzed man, from there he went to Joppa where he called Dorcas back to life again. Here he lodged at the home of a tanner. According to rabbinical rules this made him unclean. At Joppa Peter had a remarkable vision. While he was on the house roof praying he saw a sheet with animals of all kinds on it coming down from heaven and he heard a voice saying, "Rise, Peter, kill and eat." Peter answered, "Not so Lord, for I have never eaten anything that is common and unclean." Then Peter heard the words, "What God hath cleansed, that call not thou unclean." This took place three times and Peter was perplexed.

At that time three messengers of Cornelius were at the house where Peter was and asked for him. Peter and some disciples went with the messengers of Cornelius and came to his house and preached the gospel to those who were met there and the Holy Spirit fell upon them. The conversion of the Gentile Cornelius was a historic step—it broke down the middle wall of partition between Jew and Gentile.

II. Even people of character need conversion. Cornelius was a praying, devout, charitable Roman officer in the army to whom an angel spoke, giving him orders to send messengers to Peter in Joppa, which he did. God brought Peter and Cornelius together. Note that Peter did the preaching—not the angel. And Peter preached about the crucified, risen Jesus—not about the many political problems in Joppa or in Rome.

Cornelius was an exemplary man but he did not know Jesus or the way of salvation. This Peter taught him. Peter learned something also. "Of a truth I perceive that God is no respecter of persons; but in every nation he that feareth Him, and worketh righteousness, is accepted with Him." These words do not mean that it is enough to be a nice, honest person. Peter said that through Christ men of all nations and races can be saved, even though they are not Jews.

Peter was criticized for socializing with Gentiles. When he gave the facts to his critics they sided with him. He could point to converted people. Can the modern church point to converted members? Two large denominations report a decline in membership. Why? What are they going to do about it?

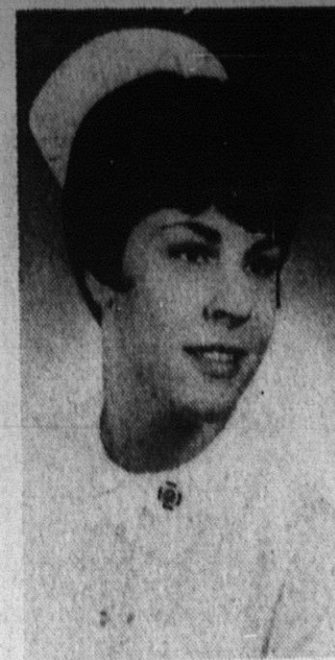

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1,490 Take Survival Training

The Ottawa County Civil Defense reports that 1,490 pupils in the Ottawa County schools have taken the special Medical Self-Help Training course during the 1966-1967 school year.

Medical Self-Help Training is designed to help people prepare for survival if disaster strikes and there is no doctor available.

The course consists of 11 lessons providing 16 hours of instruction which includes radioactive fallout and fallout protection in the event of an enemy attack, every day first-aid training, such as bandaging, splinting, treatment of burns and shock, mouth-to-mouth breathing, etc.

The courses were taught by the teachers using the films and materials supplied by the Michigan Health Department, and coordinated by Mrs. Howard Dorgelo, the Ottawa County Civil Defense Medical Self-Help director.

Schools that participated this year were Holland High School, Grand Haven High School, Coopersville High School, Jensen Christian Junior High School, St. Mary's Catholic School at Grand Haven, and Zeeland Middle School.

To prepare both incoming visitors and outbound Americans for a constructive international experience, the Experiment operates its School for International Training on a 160-acre campus in Brattleboro, Vt.

On this campus, it has offered intensive instruction in 20 languages to its program participants, trained 1,265 Peace Corps volunteers for service in 17 countries, and conducted orientation programs for students and professional men and women from around the world. Regional offices also are maintained in Boston, Chicago, New York, San Francisco, Washington, and a U.S. European office in Brussels, Belgium.

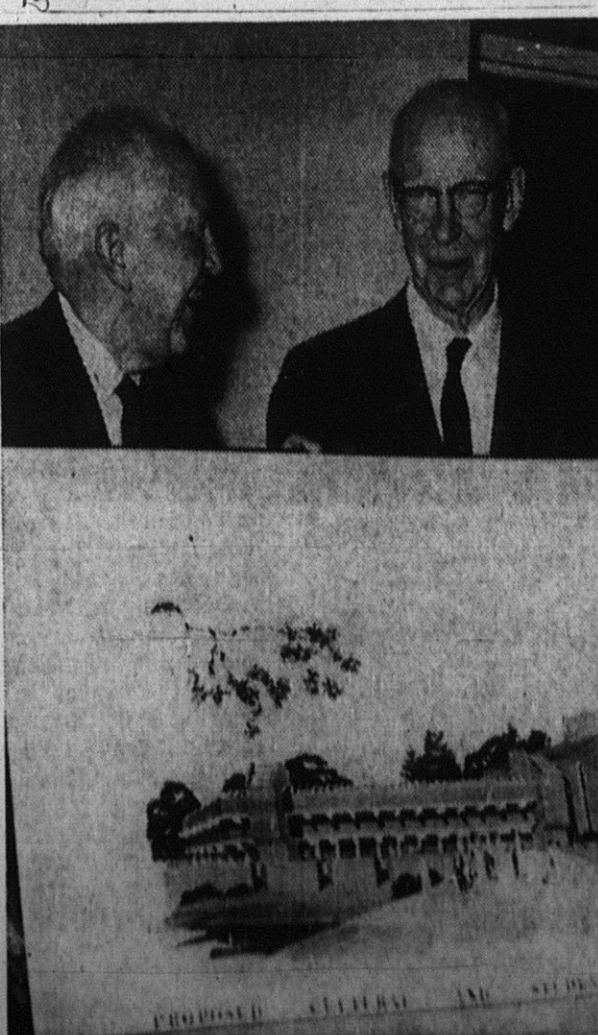

2 Lecture Halls Named For Lampen and Kleis

Hope College alumni had a full day Saturday, climaxed by an alumni dinner Saturday night which filled the large dining room in Phelps Hall.

The speaker, Dr. Calvin VanderWerf, college president, announced new names for two lecture halls in the physics-mathematics building, 117 to be known as the Lampen Lecture Hall and 118 to be known as the Kleis Lecture Hall, honoring Prof. Albert E. Lampen who served on the faculty from 1918 to 1957 and Prof. Clarence Kleis, faculty member from 1921 to 1965.

Robert Donia, president of the senior class of 343 members, announced a trust fund to run 20 years, after which the total will go into the college endowment fund. Initial gift this year is \$750, and the class plans a contribution each year for the 20 years, he announced.

Dr. Philip G. Crook of the faculty was the recipient of the 1967 Hope Award, given annually to a faculty member. He said he remained with Hope College because he is convinced the college is dedicated to serving students, not an ambitious staff.

Recognition also was given two retiring faculty members, Mrs. Helen Schoon of the education department and Dr. Dwight Yntema of the economics department, both with the college since 1946.

In a heart warming talk, Dr. Vander Werf said he felt particularly close to the 1967 class since it came to the campus the same year he became president. He welcomed two former presidents at the alumni dinner, Dr. Wynand Wichers and Dr. Irwin J. Lubbers, the latter

joining Hope's 50-year circle this year.

Dr. VanderWerf said Hope College has two important points which distinguish the process of education, first to provide the best possible education for individuals, and secondly its interest in the whole person, not providing a disembodied intellect, but geared to moral, esthetic and spiritual values.

"We not only strive to teach our students how to think, but what to think about. We try to provide not only the tools to serve, but the desire to serve, plus a compelling desire to serve God and man through attitudes, insight, judgment and values. Education is a moral enterprise dedicated to the proposition of creating an environment in which the love of God comes alive. We become what we do," he said.

He briefly outlined plans for college growth in the next 10 years and said completion of the new residence hall at Ninth and Columbia will bring all students on campus except for those who commute or live at home. The new girls' dormitory will free cottages for male students.

He said the new student church on campus is perhaps the most exciting development in the last few years and that the board has voted to allow the church to receive members. He added that the Higher Horizons program at Hope College, one in which students serve as big brothers or sisters to less privileged children is the largest of any college in Michigan, not excepting the big universities.

Plans for a new science building are proceeding, leaving the present science facility to be used for offices and classrooms for the social sciences. He mentioned the international aspects of the curriculum, the Vienna summer program under Dr. Paul Fried and the plans of the Chapel Choir to tour Europe this summer with Dr. Robert Cavanaugh.

Taking a keen look at today's college students, Dr. Vander Werf commented, "Today's students are hypercritical, but not hypocritical, and we reverse them for it, and in all their searching and seeking they will learn many things... perhaps even to begin to trust people over 30. There is much in the past in heritage and tradition that is good, and we know we have provided a firm basis and foundation for building a better tomorrow."

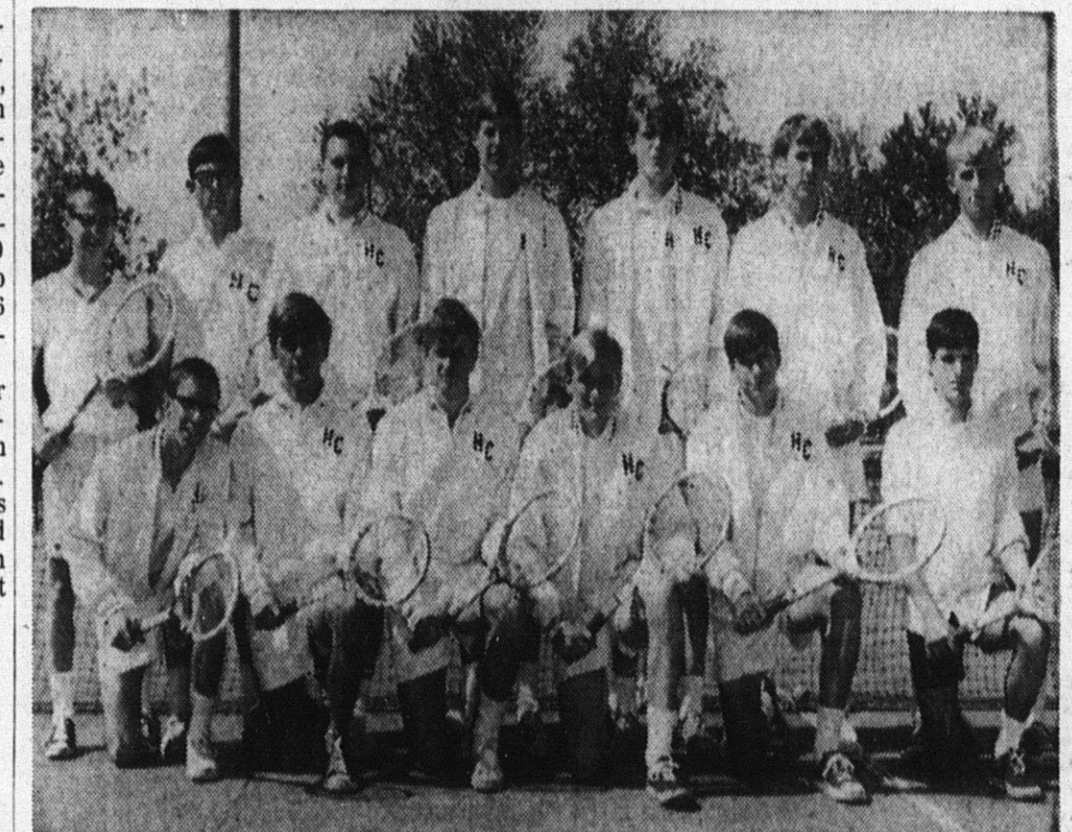

Slides of parks in Ottawa county were shown at an Early Bird breakfast of the Holland Chamber of Commerce Tuesday in Hotel Warm Friend by William Osner, engineer-manager of the Ottawa County Road Commission.

The breakfast was sponsored jointly by Park and Holland township boards, and Neal Van Leeuwen, chairman of the road commission, briefly described the county park program which was assigned to the road commission by the Ottawa County Board of Supervisors some years ago in an effort to provide adequate recreational areas for the people of Ottawa county.

Pictures taken in spring, summer and fall seasons, were shown of North Beach Park at Ferrysburg, Tunnel Park near Holland, Grose Park on the north shore of Crocker Lake in Chester township, Spring Grove in Jamestown, Riverside Park 12 miles east of Grand Haven on marginal land at the county gravel pits on Grand River; Pigeon Creek Park in Olive township started last year, Deer Creek Park on the north shore of Grand River a mile east of Eastmanville, and Hager Hardwoods Forest three miles northeast of Hudsonville.

Plans were shown for development of 50 acres north of Hager Park of which 25 acres already has been deeded to the county by the donor whose named the park bears. Plans call for a botanical garden which would eventually contain a half-acre map of the United States with ponds for the Great Lakes, trails, a band shell, an astronomy center, a model farm with animals and an arboretum.

Cost of the development is estimated at \$725,000, and contributions are being sought. Richard Smallegang, son of the late Dick Smallegang who served as city park superintendent for Holland for many years, is county park superintendent.

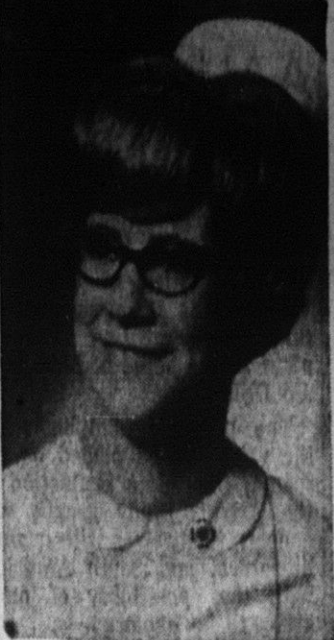

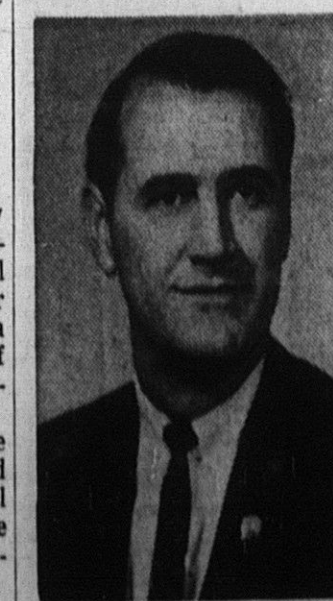

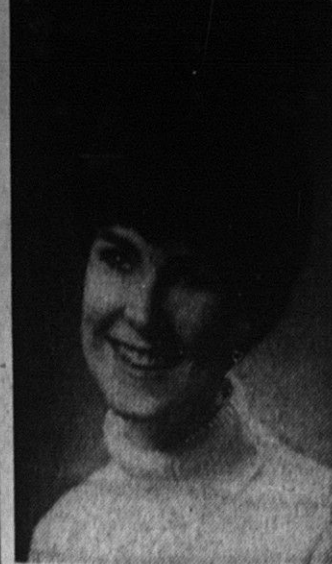

Speaking on "Peril of Fulfillment," Mrs. Lenore Romney, wife of Michigan's governor, told Hope College graduates at the institution's 102nd commencement Monday in crowded Civic Center, that education is much more than improving one's environment... that the "one thing that will be eternal is what you have done with character and personality, with your spiritual possibilities, that you could fill yourself with joy."

Mrs. Romney along with Alex Lumsden of Detroit and Dr. William E. Welmers, a Hope College alumnus now professor of African languages at the University of California at Los Angeles, received an honorary degree at the convocation.

Honorary doctor of humanities degrees went to Mrs. Romney and Lumsden, a retired Detroit industrialist, and a doctor of literature degree went to Dr. Welmers. A total of 316 graduates received degrees.

Gov. Romney accompanied Mrs. Romney to Holland and attended the commencement exercises.

In introducing Mrs. Romney, President Calvin Vander Werf described her as the world's most attractive dynamo, a devoted mother of four, grandmother of nine, and young enough to be one of the present graduating class.

"There are those who wonder whether we have lost our vision," Mrs. Romney said, "I believe the cur of our problem is that we have forgotten to clarify the ends for which the means have been provided, and our nation must clarify moral standards. We can't afford to be just spectators. How can we justify the wonderful advances of science with all the decay around us. We can use our knowledge for good or for evil. Whether our ideals can be fulfilled depends on you, how you feel about yourselves and not as the age that 'let you down.'"

She said motivation in life is not changed by improved wages, or a good environment, but that it takes more — much more — and the things you accomplish will be because of your faith in humanity.

"The most disruptive force in our society are people who have no stake in our society. We shouldn't have to send men and guns to prove that our way is right. Education, along with creating good environment must concern itself not only with the poverty of the streets, but poverty of mind and spirit," she said.

In being cynical, many have become too interested in living standards and have forgotten to reflect the knowledge of God and how to light fires around the world, she said.

"Communication has put everyone on a direct line, but instead we watch violent programs and don't hear the needs of those in the next room. We're striving for integration, not only racial but within ourselves."

"It's easy to create chaos. It's difficult to create love out of chaos, but we can. Don't become a law to yourself because anything you do on that basis lowers all of humanity. You think you are inconsequential. You are not. Every decision of yours affects all of us. The greatest failure of our day is that people don't trust anyone, not only that but we don't even trust ourselves. Democracy is built on trust, built on the individual, men and women who can be trusted."

"This is the magnificent opportunity for yourselves and posterity, where everyone is looking for truth, for things to believe in. Have the courage to fill yourselves with the best there is in life," she said.
