Jerry Lee Amsink, 21, of 11064 Greenly St., charged with the break-in at Forest Grove Farm Equipment in Hudsonville on Feb. 14, is also slated to appear in Ottawa Circuit Court Monday.

City Election Set for April 7

All arrangements have been completed for the city's biennial election Monday, April 7, calling for electing a mayor, a councilman-at-large, three ward councilmen and deciding on seven amendments to the city charter.

All 14 precincts will be open from 7 a.m. to 8 p.m. Full text of election issues appears on page 13 in today's Sentinel.

There is opposition in only one city race. Elmer Wissink, who operates a trucking company in Holland, and Charles M. Keefe, a high school teacher in Hudsonville, are seeking the office of councilman-at-large, a post vacated by Donald D. Oosterbaan, who is a candidate for third ward councilman.

Mayor Nelson Bosman is unopposed for his fifth two-year term as mayor. Other candidates are Lou Hallacy II, first ward councilman, and Morris Peerbolt, fifth ward councilman. In running for third ward post, Oosterbaan will be replacing Dr. Hollis Clark who did not seek reelection.

All voters will vote on all councilman posts. It is only in primary elections that wards vote separately to nominate councilmen. No primary was held this year.

Brief explanations of the charter amendments follow:

Proposal 1 would limit appointments to the Board of Public Works, Library Board and Hospital Board to two consecutive five-year terms.

Proposal 2 would set the mayor's salary at \$1,500 a year. The mayor presently is paid \$5 a meeting plus \$100 for maximum of \$280.

Proposal 3 would set compensation for councilmen at \$750 a year. Councilmen presently are paid \$5 a meeting for a maximum of \$180.

Proposal 4 would change the time of appointment to members of the Board of Public Works to the month of June. Appointments presently are made in May.

Proposal 5 would redefine hospital board powers and duties so that the Holland charter would conform with policies laid down by accreditation practices.

Proposal 6 would require the Hospital Board to submit its

annual budget to the city manager on or before Feb. 15 instead of the second Monday in March.

Proposal 7 would increase the limitation on interest rates on unpaid installments of special assessments from 5 per cent to 6 per cent per year.

Absentee ballots are available at the city clerk's office on the second floor of City Hall. To date, the demand has been extremely light.

Hope Biology Teacher to Be Honored

Dr. Norton has several research projects in progress with his students. He is the Hope College science representative to the Great Lakes Colleges Association. Dr. Norton holds memberships and plays active roles in several professional organizations.

Before joining the Hope faculty Dr. Norton was a member of the University of Minnesota botany faculty where he completed graduate and doctoral study.

From 1962-63 he was chief paleontologist (Chicago area) for the Humble Oil & Refining Co.

A native of Illinois, Dr. Norton received his bachelor of arts degree from Southern Illinois University.

Court Rules On Galien Opinion

GRAND HAVEN — In an opinion filed late Tuesday, Circuit Judge Raymond L. Smith ruled in favor of the city of Holland in the "superintending control" case relating to legal interpretation of two charges, driving under the influence of liquor and driving while ability visibly impaired by liquor.

The city of Holland through the city attorney's office had made application to Ottawa Circuit Court for a ruling on an opinion filed Jan. 22 by District Judge John Galien Jr. stating he could find no legal difference in the two charges and he ruled that the state statute was not enforceable because of vagueness and lack of ascertainable standards. The local ordinance is based on the state statute.

In seeking the order of "superintending control" Feb. 5, the city asked that all outstanding cases be held in abeyance, pending the opinion of the higher court. This involves well over a dozen drunk driving (DUIL) cases, many of them under Holland Municipal Court which became Holland District Court Jan. 1.

Judge Smith's opinion directs Holland District Court to proceed with pending cases "with all prudent speed."

In bringing the suit to the next higher court, the city of Holland claimed that the Galien opinion would have an adverse effect on the control of drunk driving cases in Holland.

Because of vagueness in the statute, Judge Galien has concluded he would charge all drunk driving offenders with the lesser count of driving while ability visibly impaired by liquor. This offense does not require mandatory license revocation.

In 1954, a state law established that a person with .15 per cent blood alcohol content was presumed to be under the influence of liquor, and chemical tests under .15 did not end up in DUIL charges. In 1968, another state law established that a person with a .10 per cent blood alcohol content was presumed to be "visibly impaired."

Galien's opinion in January was in answer to a motion to dismiss a DUIL case by Attorney George Lieveson of Holland on behalf of Dale Wesley Schut.

Hudsonville Pilot Hurt In Plane Crash

WHITE CLOUD — William Rinesmith of rural Hudsonville, was injured in a crash plane landing in a swampy area at Broham during a fog Thursday night, Newaygo State Police reported.

Rinesmith, 43, who was piloting the plane, had a fractured nose and other head injuries but his condition was reported good in Gerber Hospital, Fremont.

He told investigating officers he was flying his single engine Globeswing from Traverse City to Hudsonville when he encountered poor visibility and decided to set the craft down on a drag strip at Broham.

The plane hit electric wires and crashed, State Police said. Damage to the craft was extensive.

Federal Dredging Permit Sought

SAUGATUCK — Roy Van Dragt, route 2, Fennville, has applied to the Detroit District Corps of Engineers for a federal permit to dredge two canals in Kalamazoo River approximately a mile upstream of the I-196 highway bridge near Douglas, all dredged material to be placed on shore.

The applicant has now applied for a revision of plans which reduces the length of the proposed canals and includes dredging in the Kalamazoo River. Written objections should be filed not later than 4:30 p.m. April 8.

Woman Pleads Guilty To Reduced Charge

ALLEGAN — Mary Elva Vandenberg, 28, of Holland, charged by Allegan authorities with breaking into a house in Fillmore township on Feb. 2, appeared before Judge Patrick McCauley of Kalamazoo in Allegan District Court Tuesday afternoon and pleaded guilty to a reduced charge of simple larceny.

Judge McCauley ordered her placed on probation for a period of six months to one year. She must pay \$25 in fine and costs and \$5 a month probation fee.

Charges against Mrs. Vandenberg came after Ottawa county sheriff's detectives cleared up some 23 break-ins in the area.

Assessments Are Boosted For Allegan

ALLEGAN — A gain of \$3,218,200 in real and personal property assessments was reported by City Manager Kenneth Bollinger at Monday night's City Council session.

Most of the gain was scored in personal property assessments which increased from \$5,607,200 to \$8,132,050. A major part of the gain in personal property was traceable to the acquisition — by Consumers Power Company — of the municipal electric plant and to expansion of North American Rockwell Corp. facilities here.

Real property assessments increased \$693,350 over the previous year's tax roll.

Bollinger told council members that new city assessments appear to be within State Tax Commission guidelines which were established following a county-wide spot-check last year.

There were other echoes of the sale of the city electric plant at Monday night's council meeting.

Lewis Krause, Farmers Home Administration director for Allegan county, told council members that proceeds from the sale — which, with accrued interest, now total more than \$2 million — could earn up to 7½ per cent annual interest if placed on deposit with the Federal FHA.

It was pointed out, however, that no disposition of the funds could be made until a taxpayers suit opposing the sale is settled. An appeal in the case is now pending before the U. S. Court of Appeals.

City Manager Bollinger was directed to make inquiry regarding the present status of the appeal. In the meantime, councilmen discussed plans for a special city-wide election to determine how the money might be handled, if and when the litigation is settled. Under the city charter, no disposition of the money can be made without a three-fifths majority vote of the people.

One proposal under consideration would put the principal amount in trust, with interest earned going into the general fund.

Truck Hit Twice Within 10 Minutes

The rear end of a pickup truck driven by Hugh D. Harper Sr., 47, of 887 Graafschap Rd., was struck twice within 10 minutes Wednesday morning.

At 7:50 a.m., Holland police went to Graafschap and 32nd St. to take the report of a car driven by Roger De Waard Jr., 17, of 4620 66th Ave., that had slid into the rear of Harper's truck as it was stopped for traffic.

At 7:57 a.m. the Harper truck, now parked along the road awaiting the arrival of the police officer, was struck from behind by a car driven by Wayne Philip Speet, 18, of route 1, Holland.

Speet told officers he saw the truck and he saw Harper wave his arms but the car he was driving slid into the truck when he applied the brakes.

When the officer arrived, he took the reports and issued both De Waard and Speet tickets for failing to stop within an assured clear distance.

The sirens are to sound on a steady tone for one minute at 11 a.m. Friday, remain silent for another minute and then sound in a wailing tone for another minute.

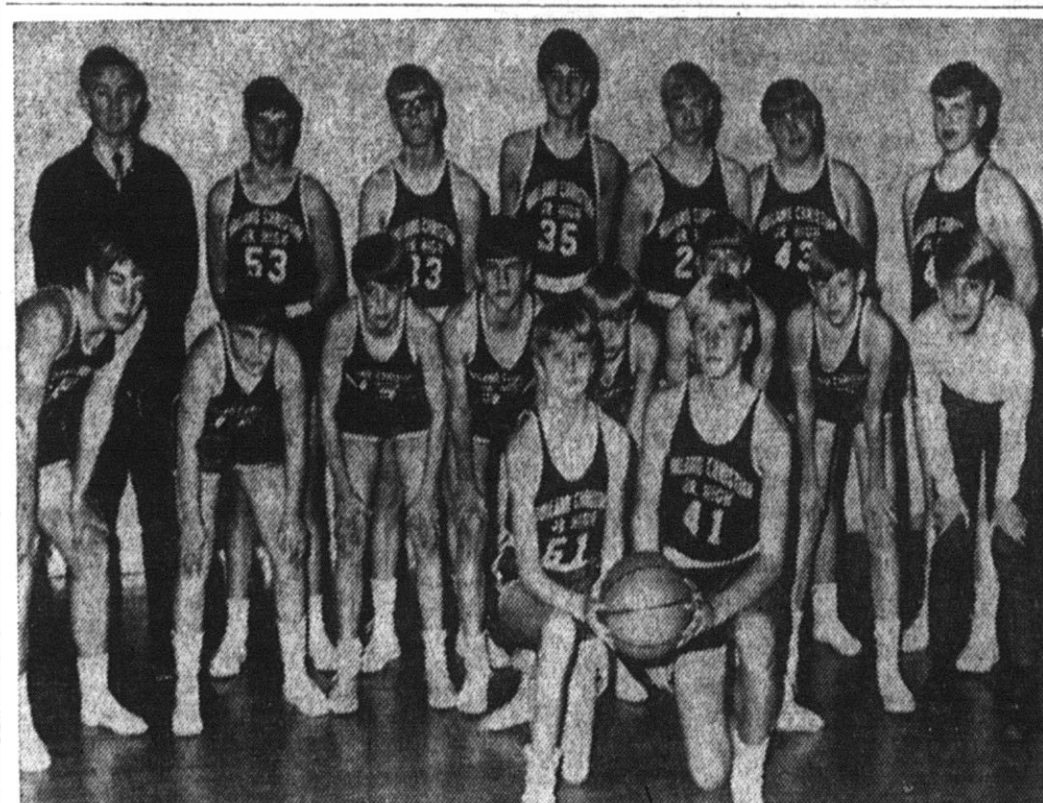
Residents are reminded that Friday's siren alert will be only a test.

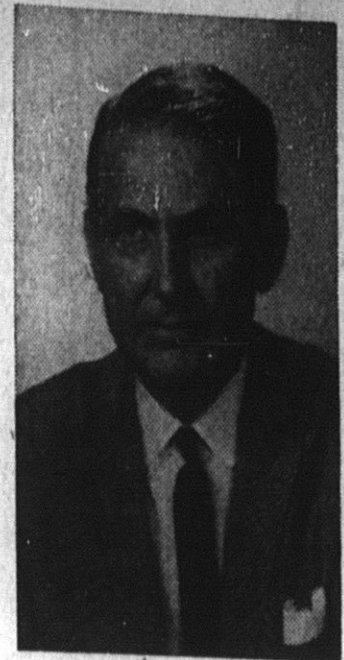

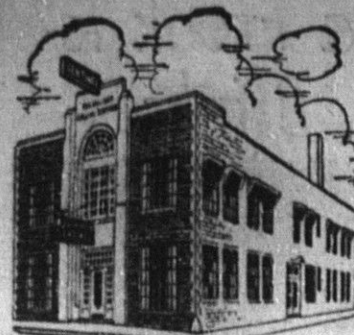

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"THE BISHOP SPEAKS"

The Right Rev. Richard Em-
rich, Episcopal bishop of Michi-
gan said something that makes
sense. Commenting on the Tom
Sincavitch case in which 40 sup-
porters of an alleged army de-
serter all claimed to be Tom
Sincavitch while they used a
church for an asylum, the bis-
hop said: "It is out of bounds
to ridicule government, to
seek to make it a laughing stock,
to plan a confrontation whose
aim is to make the majesty of
the law amusing."

The bishop has put his finger
on the real danger to the nation.
The nation that can play with
the basic structure of govern-
ment without losing the protec-
tion that government affords is
silly. We had better not kid our-
selves about this matter of de-
mocracy. At best it is a very fra-
gile affair and once the founda-
tion is undermined, the confi-
dence shaken, it can quickly dis-
integrate. The fact that we are
a nation of some 200 years is no
guarantee that we shall continue.

In the past the majesty of the
law has been a bulwark of free-
dom. Today that majesty is un-
der fire while those who con-
front it are given accolades. It
is a dangerous game.

The bishop was careful to
respect the consciences of oth-
ers, but the right of conscience
can very easily become con-
fused with attempts at self-ag-
grandizement. And we have a
number of examples of those
who made a good deal out of
their protests, finding the lec-
ture circuit at a high honorar-
ium a pretty good return on
their protest.

We think the time is overdue
for people to speak out on the
disregard for proper channels of
protest. Bishop Emrich put the
whole matter rather succinctly,
but with words that described
the issues.

Sunday School Lesson

Sunday, March 30
Jesus Rejected and Crucified
Mark 14:55-65; 15:24-27

The past can teach us val-
uable lessons. We live in a
lawless age and we are often
amazed at the attitude some
officials take. This lesson tells
us that Jesus was put to death
by the leaders of the church
of that day who illegally tried
and judged and sentenced Je-
sus to death. Jesus was slain
by sinners and for sinners.

I. Church leaders plotted to
destroy Jesus. The four gos-
pels give much attention to the
last week of the Lord's life.
Mark states the facts briefly.
After His arrest Jesus was first
tried by Annas, the father-in-
law of Caiaphas the high priest,
and then before Caiaphas and
then before the whole Jewish
council and then before Pilate
and then before Herod and then
before Pilate the second time.

The Sanhedrin had charge of
the religious life of the Jews.

It was composed of seventy-
two religious leaders of the na-
tion. A court should be con-
cerned about keeping the law
but this court acted illegally
by holding session at night
with not all the members present
and a court should insist on a
fair trial but this court tried
to present evidence that would
lead to conviction and the chief
priest who was the
chief justice played the role of a
prosecuting attorney and not
one witness for the defense
was called. Jesus was unfairly
tried and illegally sentenced.

II. Jesus gave witness re-
garding Himself. When the high
priest asked Jesus, "Are you the
Christ, the Son of the Blessed?"—that is of God, Jesus
said, "I am," and then quoted
from Daniel 7:13, 14, which sub-
stantiated His claim and was
prophecy: "And ye shall see
the Son of man sitting on the
right hand of power and com-
ing with the clouds of heaven."
Either Jesus spoke blasphem-
y or the truth, the Sanhedrin
considered it blasphemy. "And
they all condemned Him to be
guilty of death." In addition
they maltreated Jesus and
showed that their hearts were
wicked. When people reject
Jesus and His teaching almost
anything can happen.

III. The church leaders got
what they wanted. "And they
crucified Him." The church
leaders had to get permission
from Pilate, the Roman gov-
ernor, to have Jesus crucified.
Pilate tried hard to set Jesus
free but all his efforts failed.
He had the power to free
Jesus but he was afraid to do
so because the Jewish leaders
threatened to report him to
Caesar and so he cowardly
yielded.

Jesus was sentenced by sin-
ners and surrounded by them.
Roman soldiers gambled at the
foot of the cross. A howling
mob faced Him. On one side
hung a thief and on the other
side another. Above His head
was the inscription, written in
three languages, "The King of
the Jews"—but only a very
few acknowledged Him King.
Today millions do so, but alas,
millions still reject Him. And
why?

Grand Haven Man Pleads Guilty To Three Charges

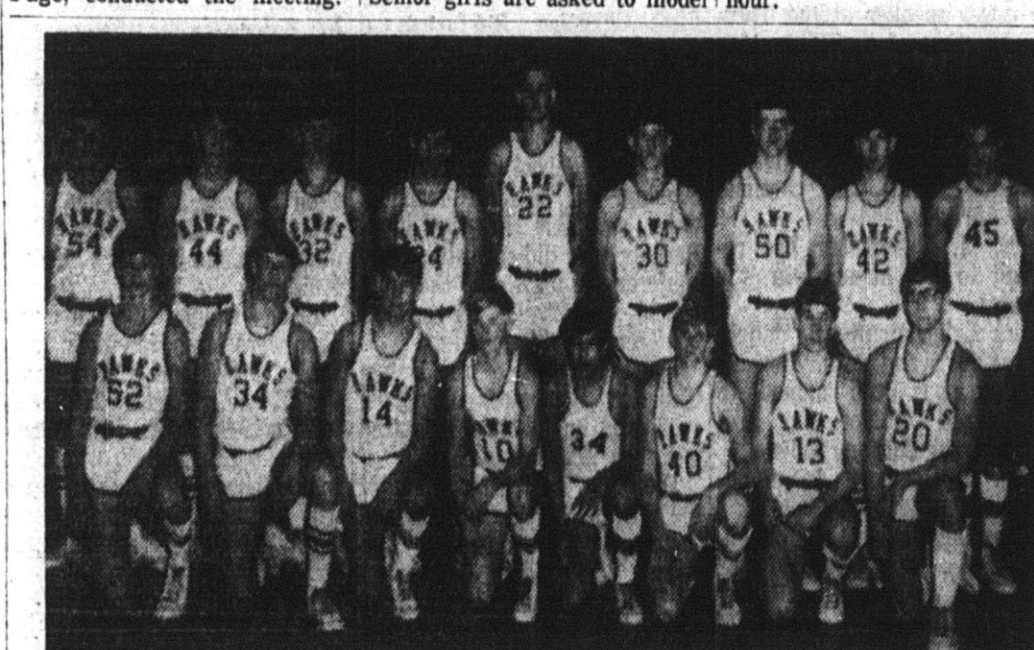
GRAND HAVEN — Floyd De

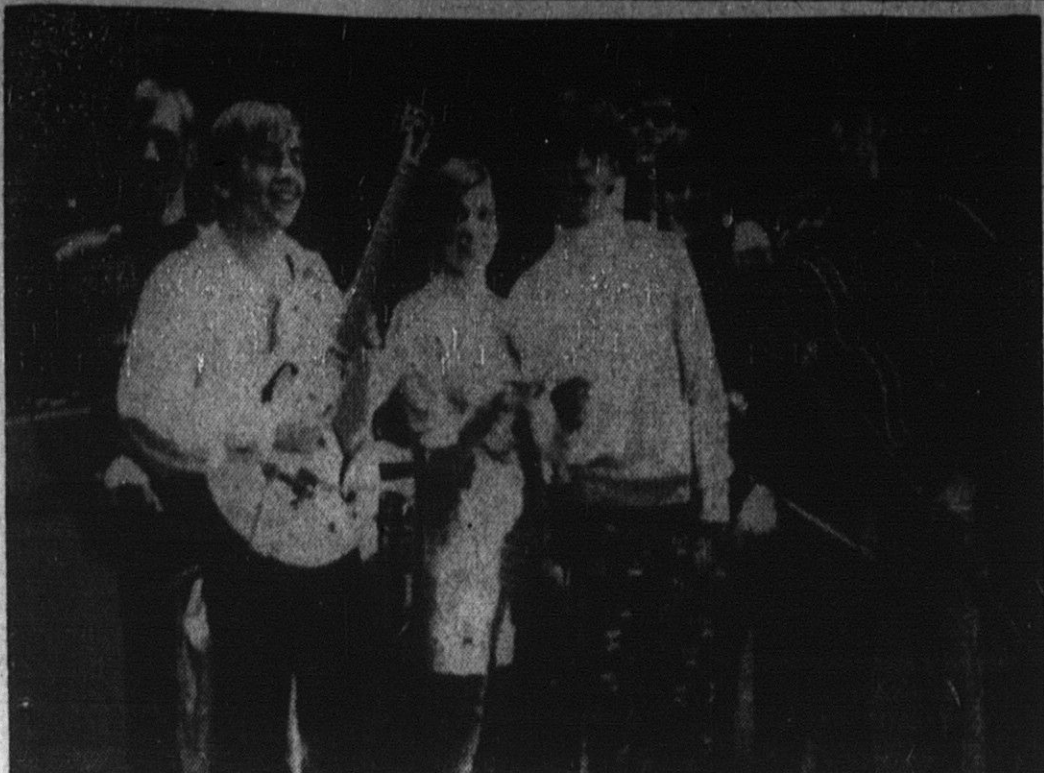

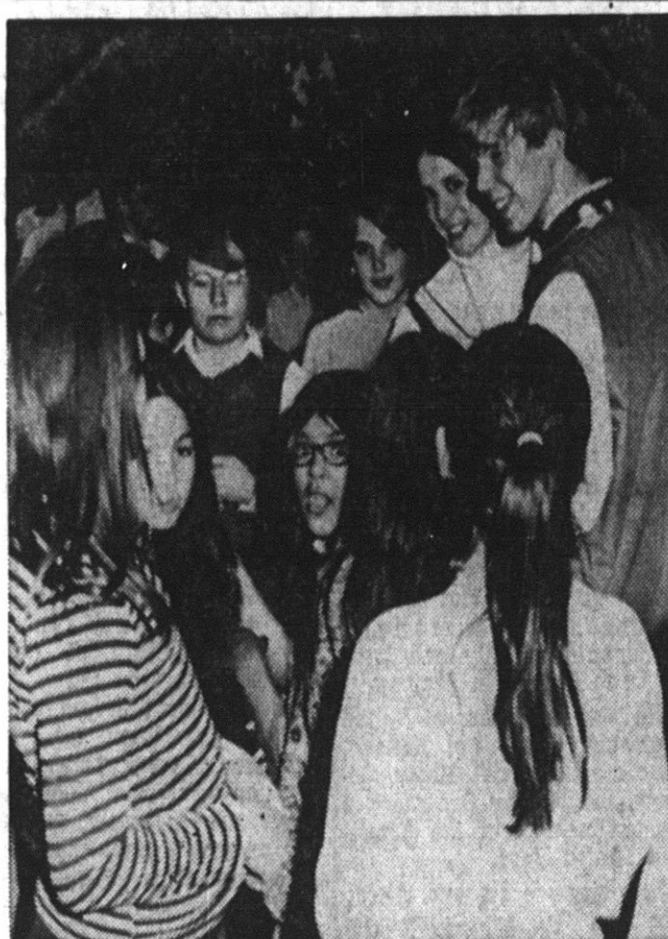

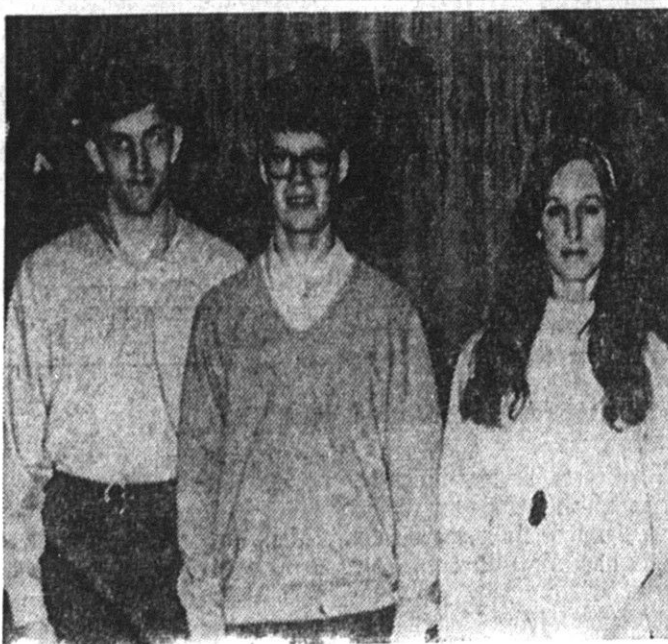

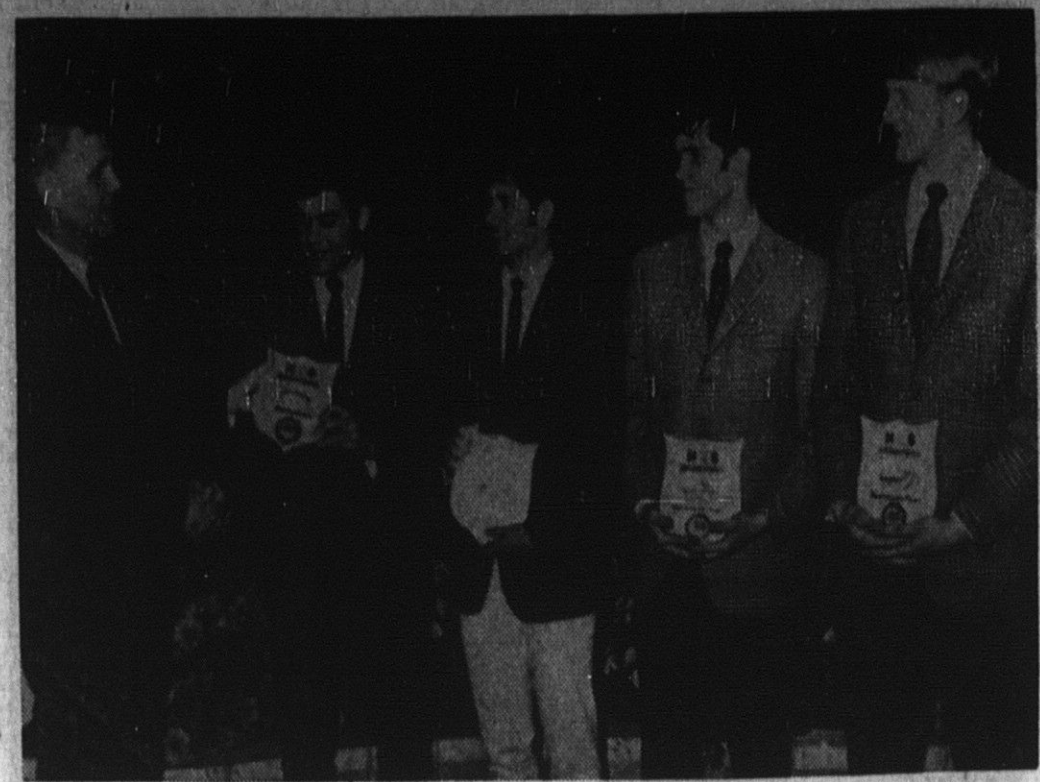

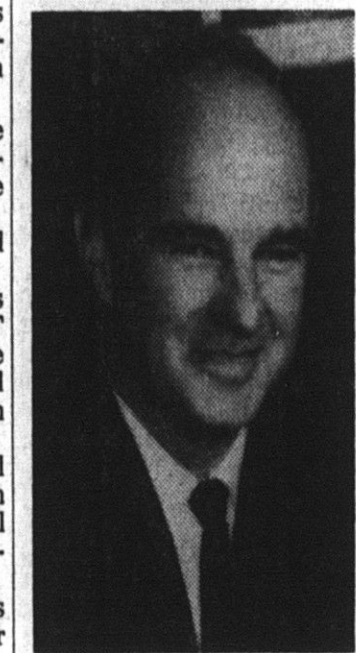

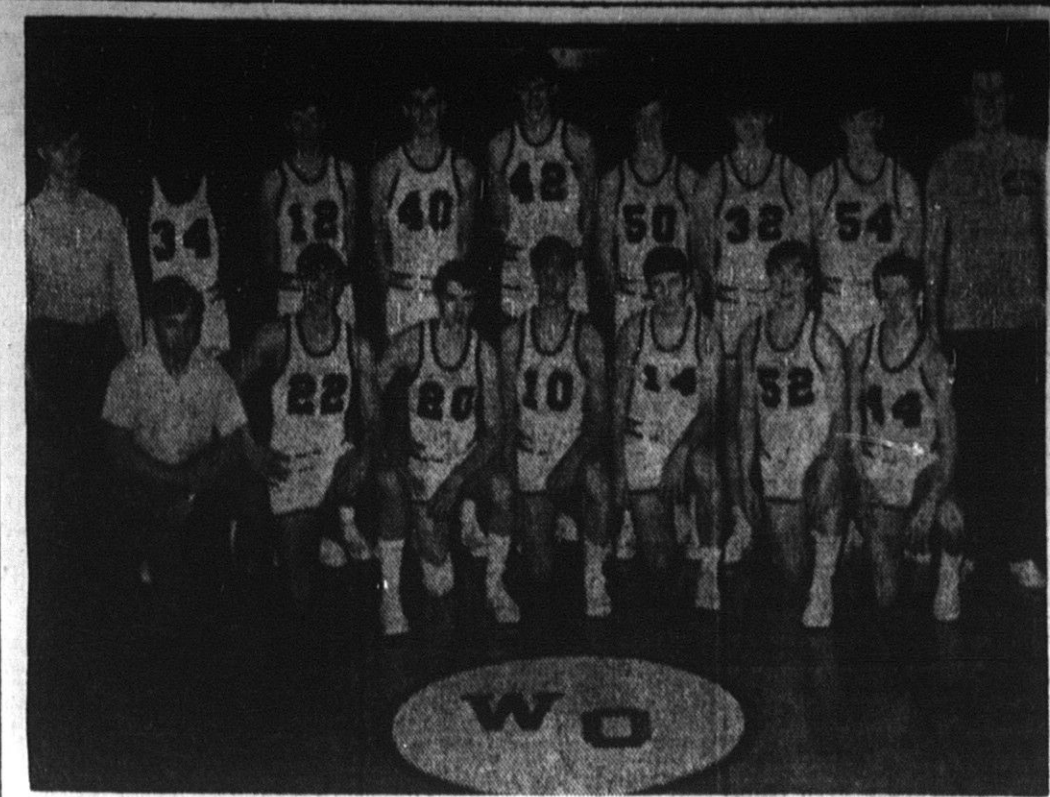

Centennial Farm Listed In Ottawa

A farm owned by Frank Kooyers and Foster and Mary Kooyers of 378 East 32nd St., Holland, Mich., has been designated as a Centennial Farm by the Michigan Historical Commission. The farm, located in Fillmore Township, Allegan County, has been in the possession of the family since 1851. It was originally purchased Aug. 10, 1851 by Albert F. Fennoff Sort, grandparents of Frank, from Dominick Wendegowish.

According to Secretary of State James M. Hare, whose department directs the activities of the Historical Commission, the Centennial Farm program in Michigan was established in 1948. Since that time, certificates and metal markers have been awarded to more than 2,500 Michigan farms.

The program is administered under the direction of the Commission, while markers are provided by Detroit Edison and Consumers Power Companies.

According to Hare, a Centennial Farm is one which has been in the continuous possession of the same family for 100 years or more. For this purpose, the Historical Commission considers a farm to be 10 or more acres having estimated sales of more than \$50 yearly, or less than 10 acres but having estimated sales of \$250 annually. Persons owning farms who wish to apply for Centennial Farm certificates are asked to write for an application to Centennial Farm Program, Michigan Historical Commission, Department of State, Lansing, Michigan 48918.

The inside control wiring was burned and the knobs on the control panel doors were melted off. Fuse boxes were completely melted.

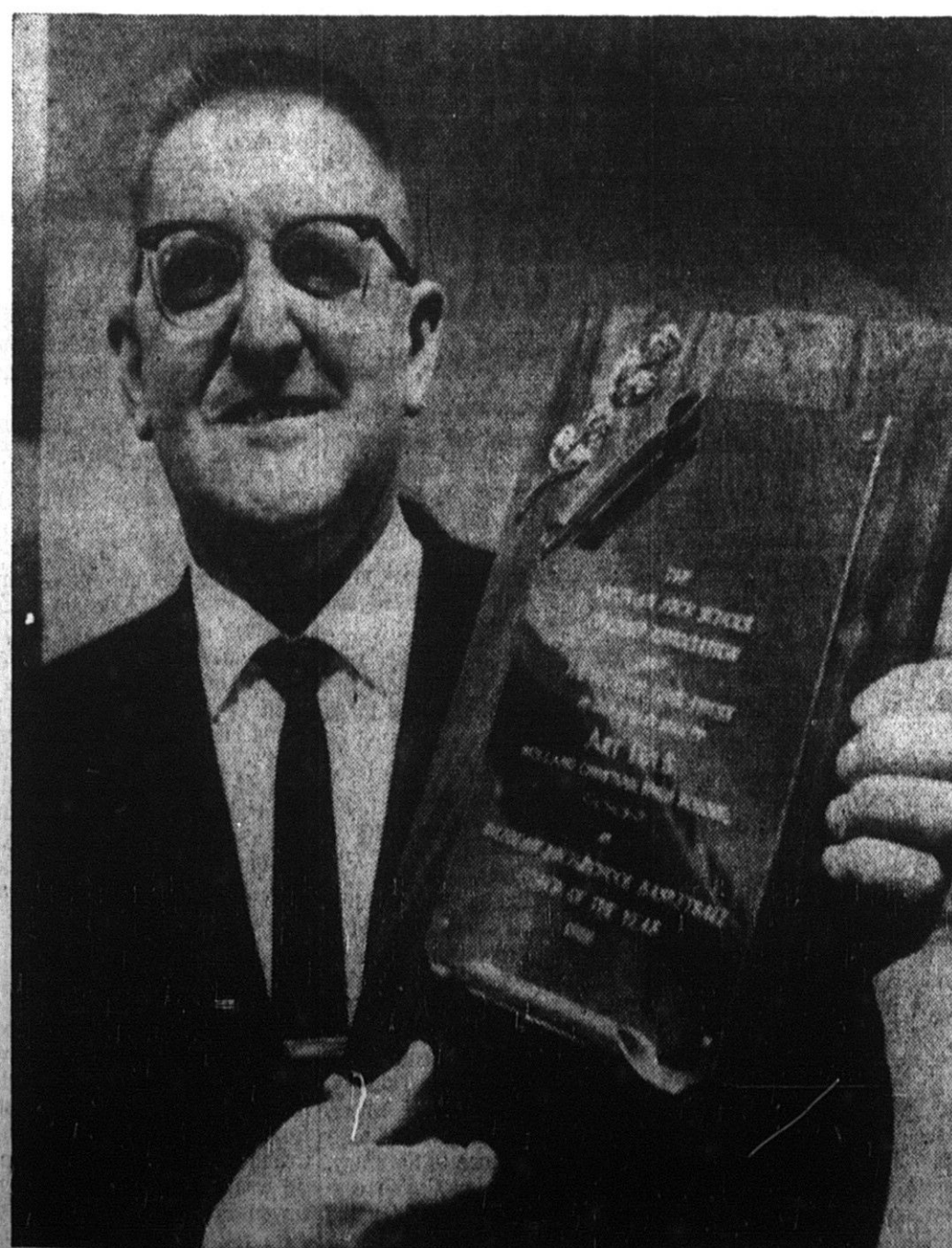
No one was reported injured; however, a desk officer experienced a deafening sensation for a short time, a State Police officer said.
