Thousands See Holiday Parade

Thousands of persons lined local streets Saturday for Holland's annual Memorial Day parade which seems to attract more people each year.

And a fine parade it was, sparked by 12 bands, patriotic units and more flags than ever, thanks to a new shipment received by the city for veterans graves, thereby releasing hundreds for marching children, mainly Boy Scouts and Camp Fire Girls. Calvinist Cadets and Calvinettes also had sizeable numbers.

Although the morning was overcast at times, there was no real threat of rain on the parade route, nor did any freight trains bisect the parade this year, thanks to advance planning by Parade Marshal John Schutten. Rain fell in Grand Haven and several places nearby.

The usual 200 to 300 persons gathered in Monument Square in Pilgrim Home Cemetery for Memorial Day exercises in a spring setting which puts Holland cemeteries at their very best with lush green lawns and a profusion of flowering growths.

As orator of the day, Clarence Jalling, retired banker, spoke feelingly of his visits to World War I cemeteries in Chateau Thierry and Verdun in France and the World War II cemetery at Margraten in The Netherlands 20 years ago. . . an experience which made him sad yet proud of the many American boys who sacrificed their lives to enhance ideals of democracy.

Referring to the old saying that the heritage of the past contains the seed that produces the harvest for the future, Jalling pointed to the concept of liberty, freedom of thought and expressions, love of home, law and order and patriotism. He then traced what had happened to the 56 stalwart men who had

signed the Declaration of Independence . . . five of them tortured and killed, 12 whose homes were destroyed, and many others dying in the Revolutionary War.

These men were not just workers and farmers . . . they were lawyers, merchants, plantation owners — men of means and education and all that signified knew full well that death would result if independence were not forthcoming, yet they valued liberty more and pledged "our lives, our fortunes and our sacred honor."

Jalling spoke of Holland's Dutch heritage in a world of rapidly changing times and asked whether people today can maintain this liberty in the light of welfare, social security, education, natural resources, labor, high costs, a world in which one out of every seven employees works for some form of government. "Are we guilty of accepting handouts when we should be taking care of our own problems," he asked.

"We are facing many problems and a staggering difference of opinion, particularly among the young, some of whom want to overthrow the establishment. Anarchy is not the answer, so what can we do about it? Too often we are afraid of being involved, but it is time that the silent majority stand up and be counted. America has made grievous errors but self-government is still the greatest in the world. Our founding fathers gave us an independent America. Can we keep it?"

Dale Van Lente served as chairman at the cemetery program. Lincoln's Gettysburg address was read by James Sills of Hope College. Mayor Nelson Bosman was president of the Memorial Day committee and the Rev. William P. Van Malssen of Fourth Reformed Church was chaplain.

Visiting Judges Hear Cases Here

With District Judge John Galien III for two weeks and Judge Jacob Ponstein in Europe, the three district courts in Ottawa county have been served by Judge Gerald Van Wyke of Holland and a number of visiting judges. Judge Van Wyke usually handles cases at Hudsonville.

Judge Donald M. Goodwillie Jr., of South Haven presided at a jury trial here Tuesday and Judge Edward Campbell Farmer Jr. of Muskegon presided at a jury trial Wednesday.

In Tuesday's case, Ivan Schrotenboer, 36, of 481 Howard Ave., charged with disorderly-intoxicated, was found guilty after the jury deliberated only seven minutes. Judge Goodwillie sentenced him to pay \$103 in fine and costs and put him on probation for six months. A conditional 30-day sentence will be reviewed at the end of five months of probation to determine whether he will serve the 30 days.

Schrotenboer also was found guilty of a charge of driving under the influence of liquor in a jury trial before Judge Van Wyke Monday and was sentenced late Thursday to pay \$150. He also must serve 20 days starting June 12.

In Wednesday's trial, Robert Wilson, 20, route 1, was found guilty of a charge of aggravated assault and was sentenced to serve 30 days and pay \$53 costs and was put on a year's probation. He was also given a suspended year's sentence which may be served if probation is violated. The alleged offense occurred Feb. 13 upon Penny Jaques who, according to testimony, was unconscious 17 days.

Judge Goodwillie is from the 7th district in Michigan and Judge Farmer from the 59th district.

Sidelights of Hannah's Visit

Dr. John A. Hannah, former president of Michigan State University who now heads the U.S. Agency for International Development (AID), said at a press conference preceding Hope College Commencement exercises, that his work with underdeveloped countries stems from the Point 4 program instituted by President Harry Truman.

Since such aid listed as the fourth point in Truman's inaugural message in 1949, the initial program became known as Point 4, and in recent years as AID.

"Actually, most of the money in this program is on loan, not as gifts," he explained. "Out of a \$1.3 billion program about \$1 billion is on loan. And the United States is only one of many nations in the program," he added. "On the basis of gross national product and population, the U.S. ranks ninth."

As for the \$24,000 party for his farewell at MSU in 1966 which hit the news over the weekend, Dr. Hannah was inclined to be philosophical.

"It was a fine party with a dinner in the Civic Center arranged by the alumni and I thought the alumni had financed it. Even after reading the article, I'm still of the opinion that alumni funds paid for it," he said.

He said a person in public life is bound to be criticized and will be blamed for a lot of things he didn't do, and also receive credit for many things

not of his making, and he only hoped the two would balance out."

As for dissent on the campus, Dr. Hannah said it was only natural that many people are fed up with the war in Vietnam. He said he served as Civil Rights chairman for 12 years and it has come a long way and still has a long way to go. He felt the time has come for acceptance of a basic premise that the skin color is not a permanent bar for any person's contribution to the world.

He said destruction on campus brings the sharpest concern, and pointed to a handful of anarchists adept at revolution and destruction, with no idea what to put in its place. Even so, he seriously doubted whether Mao Tse Tung is behind it.

If all people were satisfied there would be no progress, he said, and there are many things which can be improved through dissent.

In aiding any undeveloped country, the main concern is to get this country to help itself, Dr. Hannah said. The first objective, of course, is food, then family planning, then education and health.

He said there are 300 million children in the world today who have never gone to school because there were no schools to go to.

In developing an educational program in such a place, one does not build a university.

These countries must develop their own skills to run their own governments.

"We cannot transplant American concepts per se elsewhere and expect them to work," Dr. Hannah said. "We can only help them to work out a system with minimal assistance."

Dr. Hannah said overpopulation in underdeveloped countries is a far bigger problem than Americans believe . . . that it transcends any environmental problem which receives so much attention in this country today.

As an illustration he said the total population of India exceeds the population of the entire continent of Africa, and that Indian population jumps a million every four weeks — which means another million mouths to feed.

In the face of these staggering statistics, the issues of clean water and clean air in America pale almost to insignificance. Awareness is most important, he said, because what affects other countries in the world also affects America.

In his commencement talk, Dr. Hannah said he welcomed the opportunity two years ago to become a member of Hope's Board of Trustees. "It has been a disappointment to me that other commitments have made it impossible for me to be effective in that role, but I hope to do better in the years ahead."

417 Hope Seniors Get Diplomas

4 Honorary Degrees Presented at Hope's 105th Commencement

Dr. John A. Hannah told Hope College's largest graduating class Monday that each member of that class, and each member of the world community, is "a rider on this earth."

Dr. Hannah, former president of Michigan State University and currently administrator of the Agency for International Development, spoke to the 417 graduates and their guests who filled the Civic Center about the role of his agency, known as AID.

The Grand Rapids native and member of Hope's Board of Trustees said that the "usual commencement formula" (telling the graduates about the "real world") could be discarded for the class of 1970 which has "distinguished itself by a sensitive and thoroughgoing concern for the problems of this country and the world."

Dr. Hannah said the President will send a message to Congress this week on foreign aid in the 1970's. He expects it to include a proposal to remove "all military aid and other short term programs designed to attain political objectives" from AID.

Dr. Hannah said this would result in two-thirds of all AID funds being expended "in the form of loans to the receiving countries, to be repaid with interest."

Four honorary degrees were conferred during Hope's 105th commencement exercises: a Doctor of Humane Letters degree upon Dr. Hannah, a Doctor of Divinity degree upon Rev. David Poling, president of the Christian Herald Association; a Doctor of Divinity degree upon Rev. Franklin John Hinkamp, minister of the Fourth Reformed Church, Poughkeepsie, N.Y.; and a Doctor of Science degree upon Dr. Eugene E. van Tamelen, professor of Chemistry at Stanford University.

Dr. Hannah also said, "There can be no assured peace for Americans unless we join other nations in creating a stable world order. We cannot ask ourselves where the United States will be in the next few decades without asking where the world will be." He called upon the graduating seniors and other "members of the world community" to recognize the giant strides developing nations have made since President Truman initiated the Point IV Program in 1949, and to continue our willingness to our fair share to provide hope and encouragement to people everywhere on earth who want to work toward lives of better quality."

Dr. Hannah noted "measuring assistance as a percentage of GNP (gross national product), the U.S. now ranks ninth among AID donors" at one-fifth of one percent of GNP, and that The Netherlands ranks first in foreign aid generosity, contributing one per cent of its GNP.

A growing trend in foreign aid, said Dr. Hannah, is cooperation among contributing nations (U.S., western Europe, Japan) and through the World Bank and United Nations agencies.

He said that all of the money loaned by AID to a foreign government must be spent in certain ways (in health or education, for example) and that it all must be spent in the U.S. if not within the developing country itself.

He said that developing nations match each dollar of foreign aid with about eight dollars of their own money. Through this formula, said Hannah, "a number of countries—Taiwan, Argentina, Mexico, Iran, Greece and Israel—have progressed to the point where they can grow by themselves and have been 'graduated' from AID's programs." He said that Korea and Turkey will soon join them.

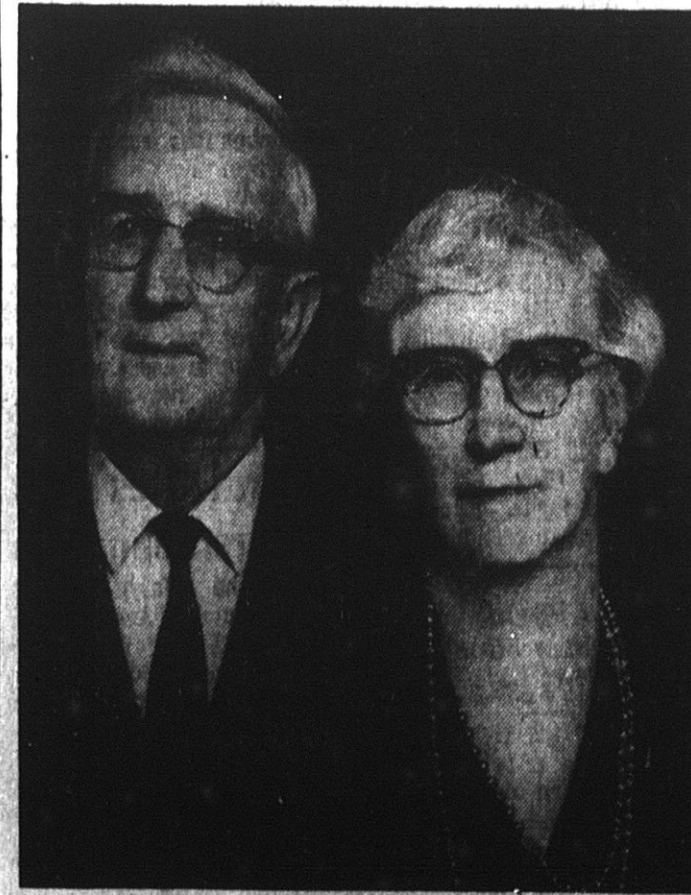

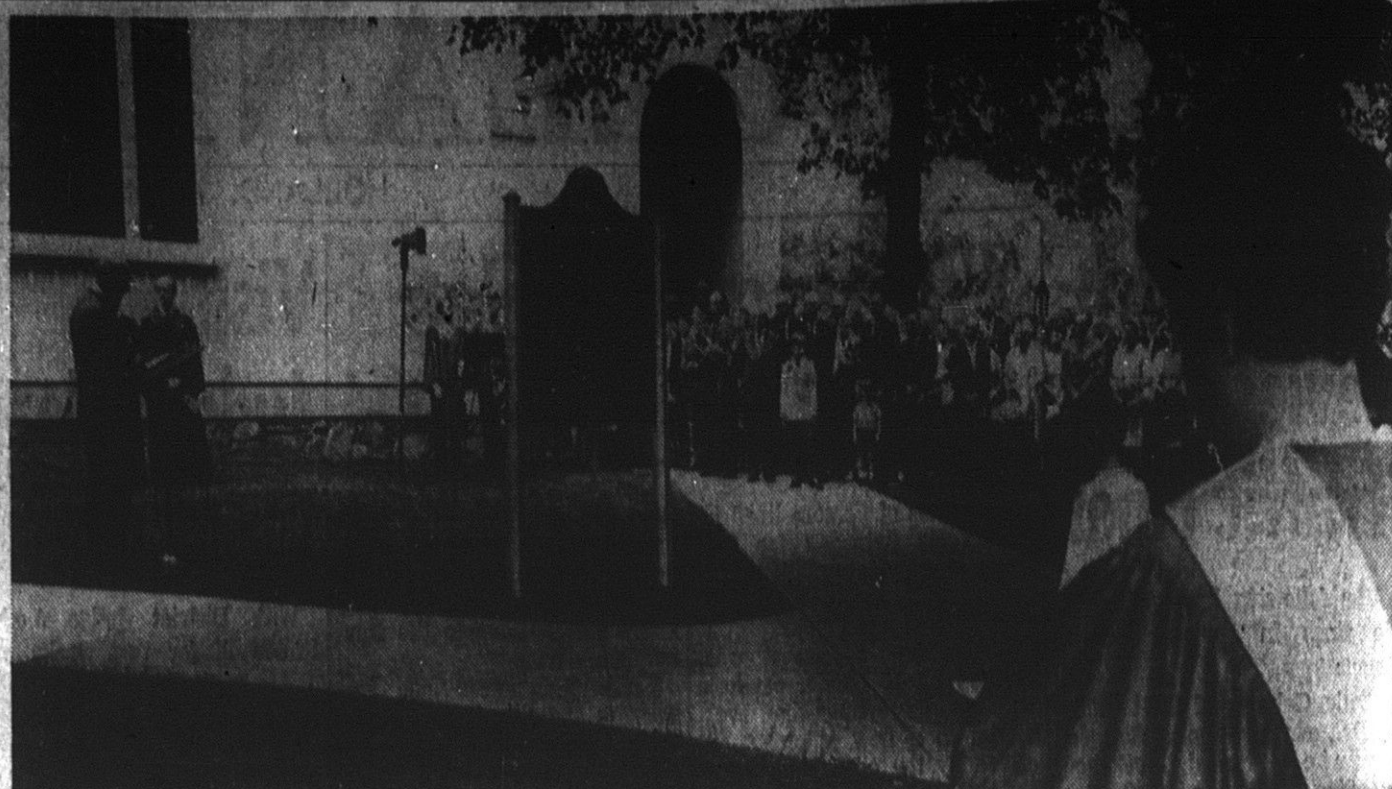

Third Church Dedicates State Historical Marker

Third Reformed Church held a dedication service Sunday morning for a Michigan Historical Commission historical site marker which has been placed in front of the church, located on the corner of 12th St. and Pine Ave.

Miss Lavina Cappon, daughter of Isaac Cappon, charter member of Third Church and four time Holland mayor, unveiled the marker which was presented by Willard C. Wichers, president of the Michigan Historical Commission. Dr. Henry Tempas, vice president of the Third Church consistory, accepted the marker on behalf of the church.

The service of dedication was part of the morning worship service in which church historian, Dr. Elton Bruins, delivered the sermon. The Rev. Henry Voogd, head of the Hope College department of religion, was also on hand for the ceremonies. The associate pastor, the Rev. Mark Walvoord, gave the closing prayer and benediction. The congregation assembled outside for the dedication while the choir sang a processional, accompanied by a brass trio, all directed by Prof. Roger Rietberg.

The portion of the marker, facing 12th St. reads: "Under the leadership of the Rev. Albertus C. Van Raalte, founder of the Holland colony, the Third Reformed Church was organized on September 9, 1867. The first home of worship measuring 90' long, 56' wide and 32' high was erected on this site. In the great Holland fire of October 8 and 9, 1871, the first structure was destroyed. On Jan. 2, 1873, disaster struck again as the newly erected framework of a second building was demolished in a high wind. The present church, a structure of beauty and symmetry, was dedicated on November 25, 1874. The architectural style is known as carpenter's Gothic. The building is of balloon frame batten perpendicular on the outside finished with buttresses. The steepled belltower was added in 1891. The parish hall and educational facilities were built in 1952. During the centennial observances of 1967-68, the church building underwent extensive restoration so that it continues to stand as a significant historical landmark."

The opposite side of the marker facing the church reads: "From the time of its organization, a progressive spirit has marked the life of the Third Reformed Church. The congregation immediately organized a Sunday School with Isaac Cappon, Holland industrialist and the city's first mayor, as superintendent. In 1872 the Church gave impetus to the establishment of a \$30,000 endowment fund for Hope College. The missionary fever of the Reformed Church in America caught

Tougher Motorcycle Laws Go Into Effect

Operators of motor - driven cycles and motorcycles will be under more stringent restrictions June 1 when a new law governing registration and use of the two-wheeled vehicles become effective.

The law, passed during the 1969 legislative session, sets requirements on equipment, number of persons riding a cycle and hours of operations.

The state statute identifies motor-driven cycle as every motorcycle with a motor that produces less than five gross brake horsepower every motor scooter and every bicycle with motor attached.

Under the law, a motor-driven cycle of less than five gross brake horsepower or a motorcycle with an engine of less than 125 c.c. displacement may not travel on limited access highways in Michigan.

Use of motor-driven cycles at night is forbidden unless written permission is obtained from the chief police officer of the city, township or county. The machine may not be driven at a speed in excess of 35 miles per or as fixed by local ordinances.

All riders of motorcycles and motor-driven cycles are required to wear approved crash helmets on their heads and handlebars may not be higher than 15 inches

from the lowest point of the empty seat to the highest point of the handlebar. No cycle shall carry more persons than the number for which it was designed and equipped.

Drivers of cycles must wear some form of shatterproof eye protection when operating the vehicle at speeds of 35 miles per hour or faster.

The law requires a special endorsement on a drivers license for anyone who operates a motorcycle on public streets or highways. Drivers who either renew their Michigan operators license or who receive such a license for the first time on or after June must qualify for the endorsement if they wish to operate a motorcycle on public streets.

Holland police, who operate a license examining station, caution that there is no provision in the law for a motorcycle learner's permit and that applicants may not drive the motorcycle to the test area when ready for the test.

Police said it is the responsibility of the applicant to have the cycle taken to the test area by other means.

All motorcycles operated on public streets and highways must be registered and must bear valid license plates.

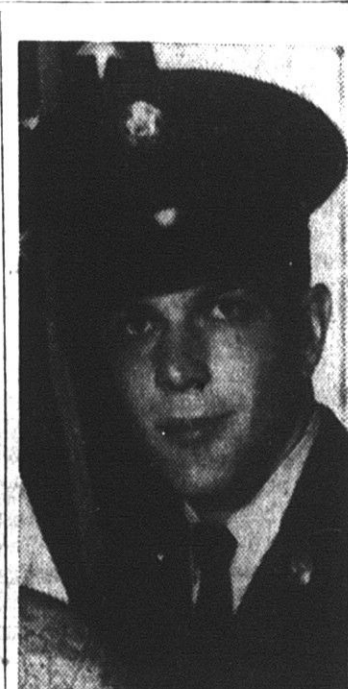

Sunday School Lesson

Sunday, June 7
The Nature of the Church
Ephesians 2:11-22
By C. P. Dame

The church is attacked today from within and from without. It is timely to study what the Bible has to say about the church which God established. The church is a fellowship of changed people who are delegated with the responsibility of witnessing for Jesus.

I. The church is composed of redeemed, changed people. Paul founded the church in Ephesus and because he was concerned about its welfare sent the church a letter from his prison. The Ephesian church was surrounded by paganism. It was composed of ex-pagans. The believers once were unbelievers. Paul reminded them of this fact. Once they were aliens, strangers, hopeless and "without God in the world." "But now" they were different people. Once they were far away from God but they were "made nigh by the blood of Christ." The church has unconverted members on its rolls. In reality they are not members of the true church. This is composed of converted members.

II. Christ unites people. "For He is our peace, who hath made both one, and had broken down the middle wall of partition between us" — that is between Jews and Gentiles. For centuries the Jews had been a separate people. When the Jew became a Christian he fellowshipped with the Gentile who had become a Christian. They found unity in Christ. Jew and Gentile approach God through Jesus who not only unites them but who also promotes peace in hearts and homes and in nations. Sin separates but Christ unites.

III. The church is one. Organizational unity is not essential. Spiritual unity counts. Paul points out that the Gentile Christians were not foreigners but fellow citizens with the saints. There are no second class citizens in the church. The Gentiles belong to the same family as do the Jews.

God is the Father of all, and all the members are brothers and sisters in Christ, a fact overlooked. Note also that the Gentiles are part of God's holy temple. Both Jews and Gentiles are used in the building of the temple. Jesus is the cornerstone.

The Holy Spirit dwells in every member and in the whole church. It is God's intent that every member grow in the knowledge of God and of himself and that he shares his knowledge with others. When you, one member, of the church grow, you contribute to the growth of the church. Every member is important, — he can build or tear down, strengthen or weaken the church.

Some of the educational goals and objectives, as outlined by Schackow and Vander Ploeg, are: a direct confrontation for the student on a one-to-one basis with a youngster from a different cultural, social and economic background, providing the students with an opportunity to observe the behavioral patterns characteristic of this type of child; to provide a bridge between the students theoretical knowledge and actual classroom experience; to create in the college students theoretical knowledge of the ecology; to provide the youngsters with a wholesome adult relationship and to provide them with a direct experience with the total environment; and to give both groups an opportunity to test their physical stamina.

When put this way, the program may seem rather cut-and-dried, but the underlying desire of the students to enter into a warm relationship with a youngster is the most important facet of the program.

Here is the opportunity every student wishes for to put the cold facts he's gathered in many years of education to some meaningful use, and to put the emphasis on action, not words.



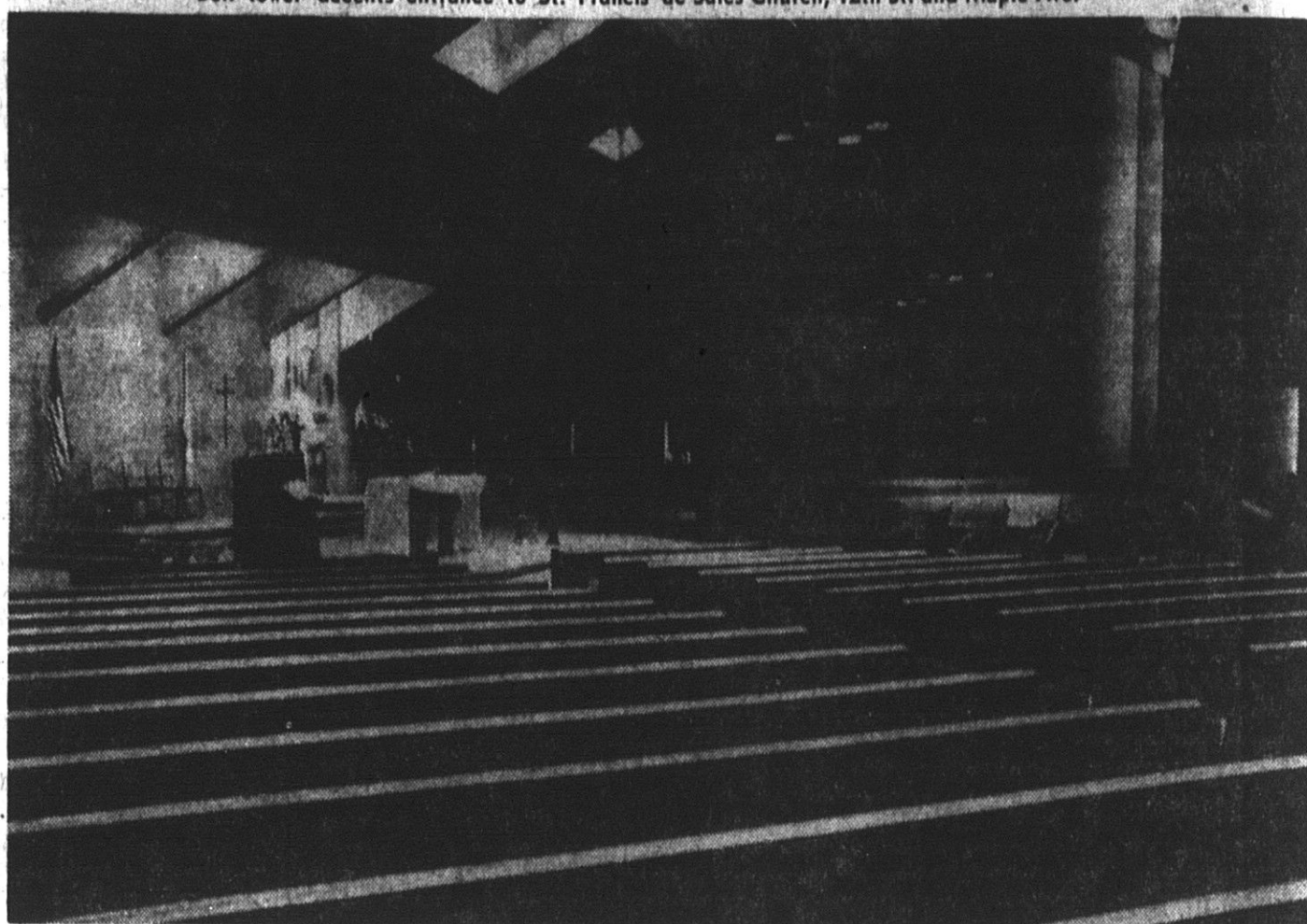

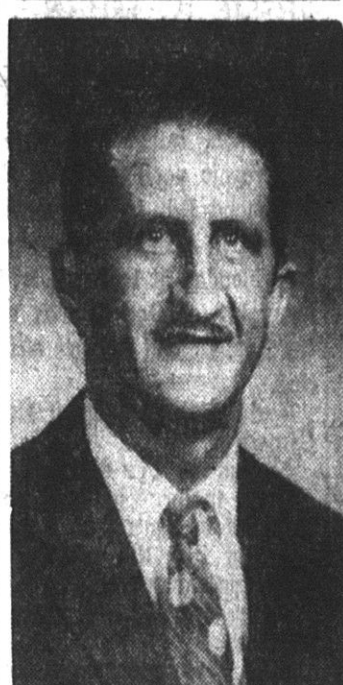

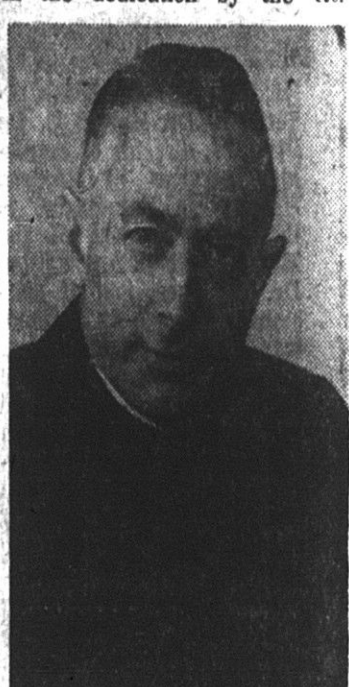

Foreign Policy Questionnaire Listed by AAUW

"Where Do You Stand on Our Vietnam Involvement" was the topic of a questionnaire distributed by Mrs. Delbert Michel, Implementation Chairman for American Foreign Policy, at the regular monthly meeting of AAUW.

The results of the poll determined that 71 per cent of the members present reject America's involvement in the Vietnam conflict, while 29 per cent support the action there. President Nixon's decision to send troops into Cambodia was opposed by a vote of 73 per cent to 27 per cent in favor.

The purpose of the poll is to inform Congressional leaders as to a general concern over recent upheavals in the nation following the President's Cambodian decision and over deepening involvement in Indo-China.

A general resolution was adopted by the Branch to be sent to President Nixon and key members of the Senate,

House of Representatives and Cabinet concerning America's foreign policy and present Indo-Chinese involvement.

The resolution and its vote tally are "A. We urge Congress to re-assert its Constitutional authority in making decisions of national foreign policy." (80 per cent favor; 20 per cent oppose). "B. We actively support the cessation of the allotment of funds for the continuation of the military involvement in Indo-China." (68 per cent favor, 32 per cent oppose); The prompt and orderly withdrawal of troops," (80 per cent favor, 20 per cent oppose).

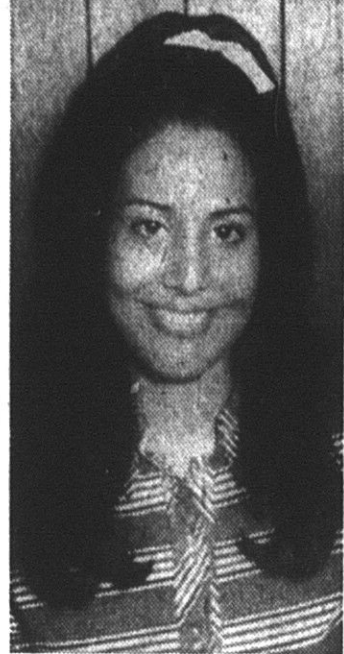

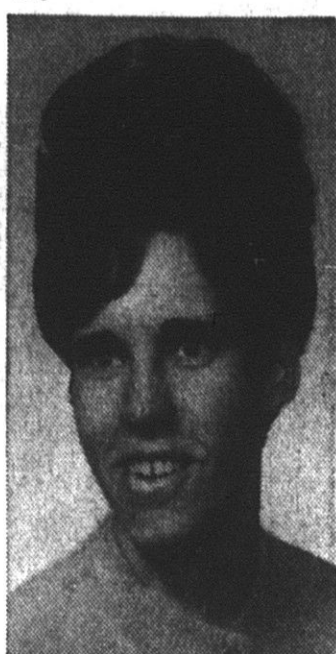

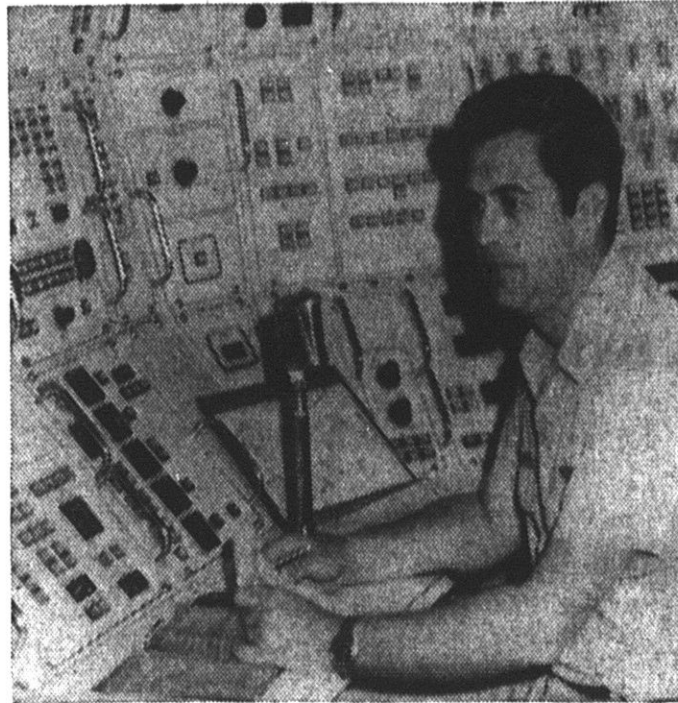
Approximately 40 of the members and families enjoyed a field trip on Saturday by bus to the Peabody Coal Co. at Braidwood, Ill. This is a strip mine, which means the coal is found by scraping off everything lying above the coal vein instead of tunneling underground to reach it. By testing, it was found that the coal was only forty or fifty feet underground in most places, and by using huge draglines with buckets, the overburden of glacial till and Pennsylvanian shale is stripped off and piled into long rows of high hills. The coal is then extracted and hauled away.

Since coal is formed from the altered remains of plants, many fossils can be found in the brown concretions in the area, which, when cracked open, either by frost action or a good whack with a hammer, show perfectly preserved specimens of ferns, bark, seeds, and sometimes prehistoric insects.

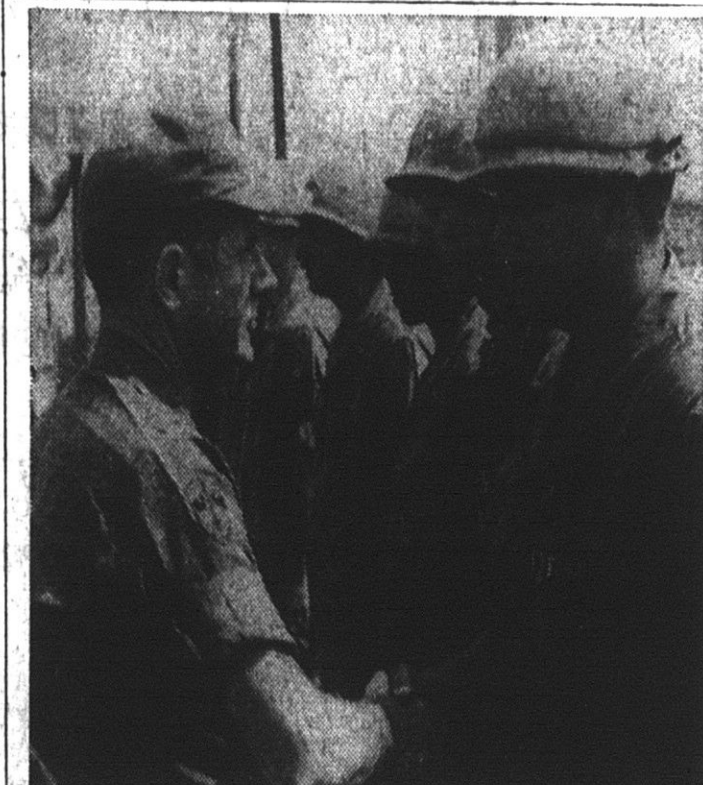

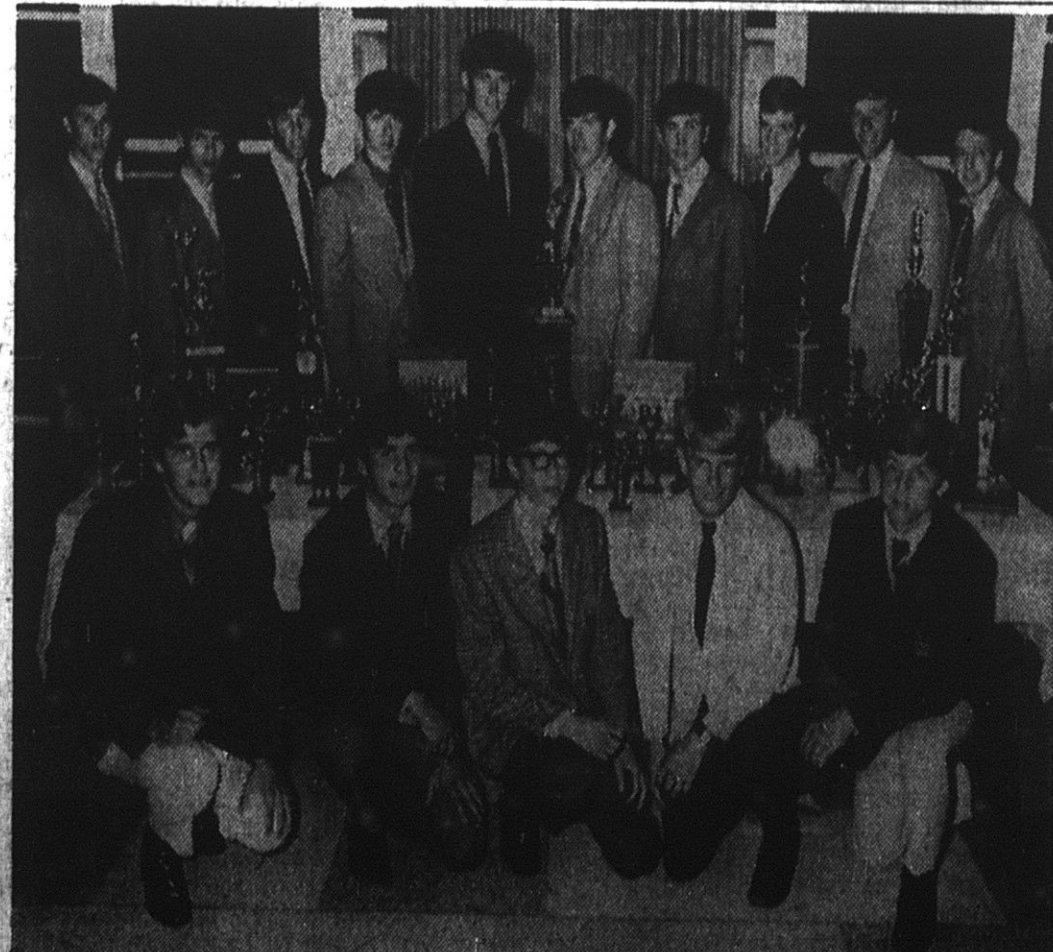

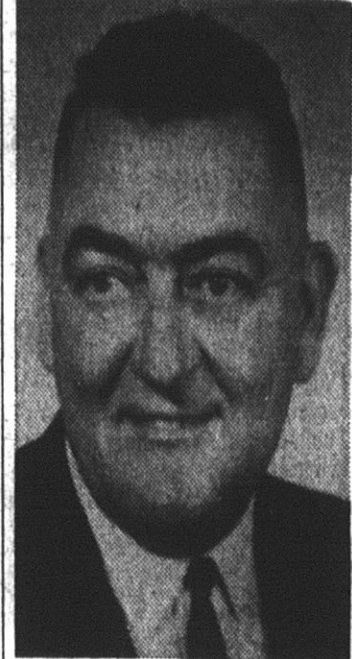
