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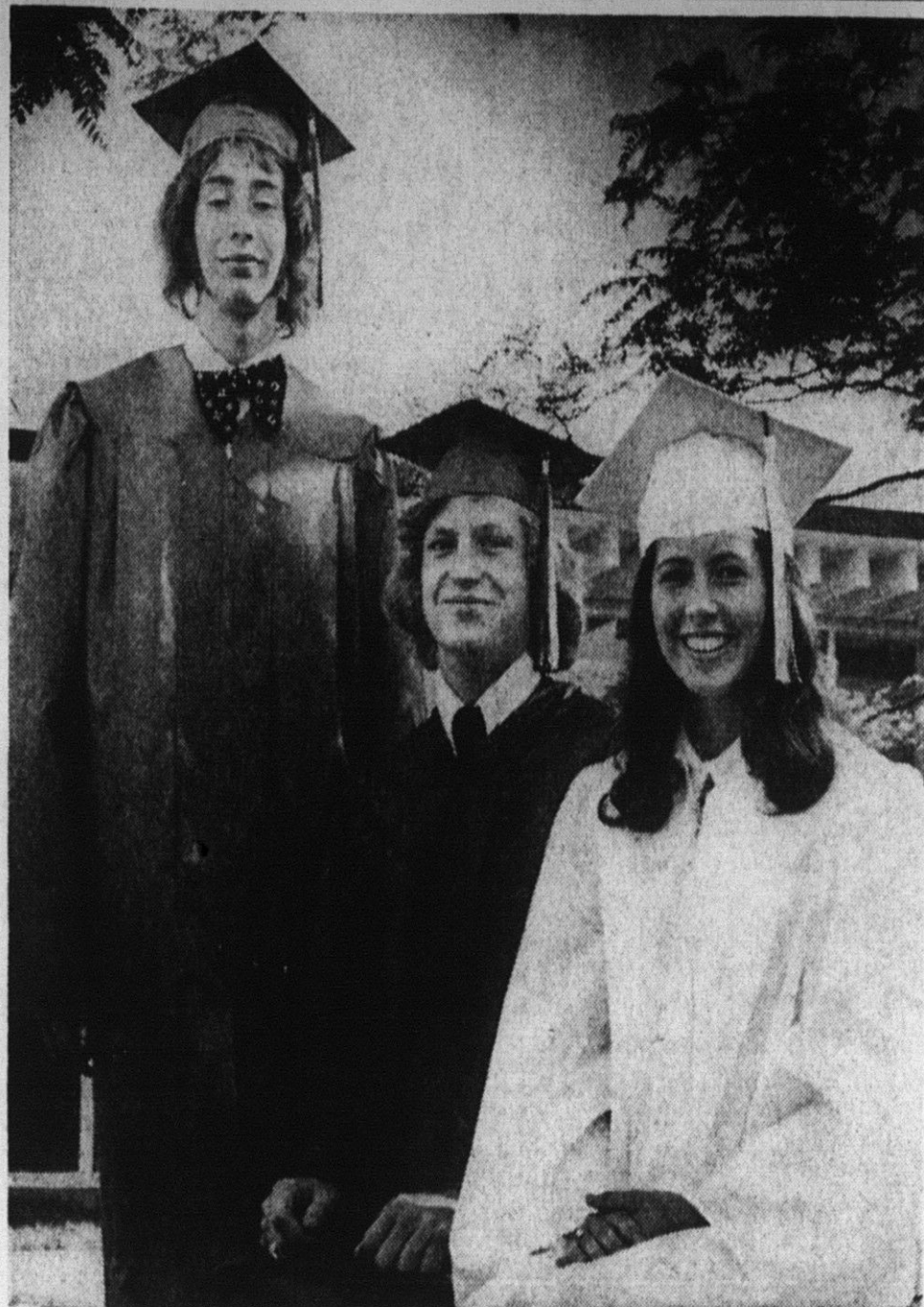

## 'South' Price Tag Reduced To \$100,000

The price of the South American has been reduced to half or \$100,000, members of the Save the South American committee learned in Detroit Saturday.

Donald Disselkoen, Stephen Northuis and Seymour Padnos met with Louis Sarco, president of Ships Inc., owner of the South American, who informed the group that the price would be reduced to \$100,000 provided the committee raises that amount by June 22.

Upon fulfilling that arrangement Sarco agreed to make arrangements for towing the ship to Holland, would suspend the \$200 a day docking fee and would dock the ship for free for a "limited time."

Cost of towing the ship to Holland — which would include insurance, crew, two tugs and tolls in the St. Lawrence Seaway, would be an additional \$100,000. It would take from 40 to 50 days to tow the ship.

The ship would be guaranteed to be seaworthy by the towing company and according to Reed Brown, secretary of the committee, a Value and Conditions Survey, required by most insurance companies, has probably been completed.

That survey as well as information provided by Johnson and Higgins, who insured the ship from 1914 to 1967, will provide valuable portions of the feasibility study committee officers are engaged in.

The committee is depending solely on contributions since current 16 per cent bank loan rates have eliminated floating a loan as a possibility. Members are contacting possibly large contributors around the Great Lakes who have an interest in the ship or maritime history.

"The committee is totally committed to the project and we believe it can be done. If the ship is returned and restored it would be an asset to Holland both culturally and historically," Brown said.

A public meeting will be held Wednesday at 7:30 p.m. at the Holland Country Club with progress reports presented.

## Another Vote Seen For West Ottawa

West Ottawa school district voters are expected to return to the polls Monday, Aug. 26, to vote again on operating millage, following the district's first millage defeat in its history of almost 16 years Monday.

The vote for 22 mills was defeated, 567 to 504. Supt. Lloyd Van Raalte said there is no question another millage vote will be held, but the West Ottawa Board of Education at its regular monthly meeting next Monday will take official action. He said the Aug. 26 date is the one day such an election can be held before the opening of schools this fall.

Van Raalte explained that failure to pass operating millage also severely reduces state aid, and that with allocated millage of 8.445 allowed the district by the Ottawa County Allocations Board and the reduced state aid, income would amount to \$1.8 million or approximately one third of the total budget of \$5,681,000 which was described as an economy budget.

The district elected incumbent William Lalley and newcomer Miriam Schroeder to four-year terms on the board. The vote: Lalley, 750; Mrs. Schroeder, 587; Dr. Eli Coats, 476; John Getz, 291.

The district also approved a \$10,000 transfer from debt retirement to the building and site fund by a vote of 764 to 289.

Holland school district voters returned incumbent Robert Gosselar to a four-year term and elected Deanna De Pree in Monday's election which attracted a total vote of 2,729 or 18 per cent of a total registered vote of 15,300. (See table on page 6).

Results: Gosselar, 1,601; Mrs. De Pree, 1,519; Jessie Dalman, 1,146; Eugene Westra, 1,022.

Mrs. De Pree will replace John Weeber, board member for eight years, who did not seek reelection. Earlier this year, district voters approved adding operating millage of 16.7 mills for three years.

**Zeeland** Zeeland school district approved a millage proposal calling for an increase of 1.205 mills by a vote of 455 to 335. The proposal is for one year.

Elected to four-year terms on the board were incumbent Gary De Witt and Ronald L. Machiele. The vote: De Witt, 704; Machiele, 505; Incumbent Elmer Boer, 423; Hoyt Higgs, 62.

**Saugatuck-Douglas** Saugatuck-Douglas voters renewed a 6-mill operating proposal for two years, 180 to 46 in an extremely light vote for the district. Incumbent Eugene Snyder was returned to office without opposition.

**Hamilton** Incumbent Jerald Sternberg was returned to a four-year term and Donald Koopman was elected to the other vacancy. Sternberg received 538 votes.

**Grand Haven** Grand Haven voters rejected an operating millage request of 17 mills for three years, 3,150 to 2,538. The figure represented an increase of two mills.

Ronald Windemuller and Judith Ralya were elected to two-year terms. The vote: Windemuller, 1,990; Mrs. Ralya, 1,662; Cindy Edgerle, 1,467; Lawrence Kuipers, 1,151; David Engel, 1,109; Joseph Kolenic, 1,097; Lawrence Culverson, 1,090; Martha Hendricks, 1,042.

## 9 Teachers Get Board Approval

The Board of Education approved contracts for nine new teachers at its monthly meeting Monday night in Federal School.

New elementary teachers will be Ramon Baca, a 1971 graduate of Western Michigan with no teaching experience, Federal School; Barbara Emerson, a 1954 graduate of Heidelberg College of Tiffin, Ohio, with six years' experience, unassigned; Gilda Holvick, a 1969 graduate of Hope College with four years' experience, Longfellow School; Sherry Schrotenboer, 1974 graduate of Hope College, Maplewood School; Martha Wing, a 1971 graduate of Hope College with two years' experience, Jefferson School.

Hired on the secondary level are Jesse Miller, a 1974 graduate of Michigan State, economics and social studies; Cheryl Johnson, a 1973 graduate of Northern Michigan College, German and English in junior high; Gary Feenstra, a 1972 graduate of Taylor University with two years' experience, mathematics in junior high.

For special education, Nancy Steenwyk, a 1974 graduate of Western Michigan University, was approved. She will be an occupational therapist at Jefferson School.

Tax levies and millages were approved for the 1974 summer tax bills. The breakdown lists 10.295 mills for allocated operating, 16.7 mills extra voted; 2.343 mills for debt retirement and 5 mill for swim pool.

There is varying millage for debt service in townships listing .181 mill in Holland township, .18 in Park township and .18 in Laketown township.

Total school taxes to be levied are \$4,880,599, earmarking \$1,699,504 for allocated, \$2,756,846 for special voted, \$341,709 for debt and \$82,540 for swim pool.

The board expressed special thanks to Dr. Wayne Woodby for representing the Holland district on the Ottawa county tax allocations board.

Announcement was made that Gloriana Long and Mary Lou Folkert would not be returning to the teaching staff next year and that Carol Himebaugh, who had been on leave of absence, also would not be returning.

A framed resolution honoring John Weeber who is retiring after eight years on the Board of Education was presented, calling attention to dedicated service, particularly as chairman of the buildings and grounds committee. In responding, Weeber said he had enjoyed his work on the board and the many meetings throughout the eight years, as well as three years he previously served on the Maplewood board.

First National Bank and Trust Co. was named as depository for the general operating fund.

An additional two rooms being renovated in the old Maplewood School have been leased to the Regional Educational Materials Center, making four rooms the REMC will be occupying as of July 1. Total rental for the four rooms will be \$6,200 a year, with the lease running two years.

Curriculum Director Philip Schoo outlined plans for a Senior High School Social Studies Workshop starting July 29 to Aug. 23 with a maximum of six participants at \$3,600, materials at \$500 and clerical help of \$250 for a total of \$4,350. The group would revise the social studies program and develop a curriculum resource guide.

Changes were approved in the Materials Selection Policy of 1972, mostly minor revisions but broadening them to include materials selection instead of just books.

A delegation of Montello School headed by Linda Coupe and Roger Plagenhoef asked reconsideration for busing kindergartners to Lakeview School next fall. With a class of 17 kindergartners from Montello, the representatives asked the board that inasmuch as Lakeview must bus seven students because of distances, that these seven students be taken to Montello, allowing each school to have approximately 24 kindergartners. The request will be considered at a Monday night study session of the board.

A delegation of residents living near Holland High School sought relief from blowing sand in connection with development of the athletic field. President James O. Lamb said there had been some delays because of planned sewers and that a contractor had defaulted. He said there would be further study at a board work session and persons concerned would be notified of what action would be forthcoming.

President Lamb presided at the meeting which lasted just over an hour.

### One Block at a Time Downtown

## Beautification Schedule Listed

Except for noisy machines breaking up pavement, the downtown area was a quiet place today with the block between River and Central Aves. closed to traffic for the Downtown Beautification project.

The working schedule started Monday with excavation, underground drainage and utility work starting at the intersection of Eighth and Central and moving westward. After excavation and drainage, comes curb and concrete base work. During this period, the block is closed to vehicular traffic but pedestrian traffic is permitted and should be able to continue with minimum interference except at mid-block crosswalks.

As soon as this phase of the work is completed, traffic and to a limited extent parking, will be allowed in the block while workmen continue with brickwork, sprinkler system and landscaping.

After the block from River to Central is completed, crews will move to College Ave. and work westward from that point, following an identical schedule.

The city manager's office said contractors are making every effort to minimize the time a particular block will be closed to traffic, as well as reducing as much as possible any inconvenience to merchants and customers.

Attempts will be made to keep merchants and the public aware of progress in the beautification program.

Serving on the committee are Terry Hofmeyer, Gordon Start, Jacob De Graaf, Charles Lindstrom and Roger Stroh. Al Busscher has been named city foreman for the project.

## Report Few Game Fish In Lake Kill

"Hats off to Holland and to the Holland Fish and Game Club."

Those were the words today of John Trimmerger, DNR fish biologist, as cleanup operations to dispose of over 300,000 pounds of dead fish ended Saturday in Lake Macatawa.

"Without the 150 to 200 volunteers Saturday, we wouldn't have been able to finish the cleanup," Trimmerger said.

"Around 90 per cent of the dead fish taken were carp and gold fish," Trimmerger stated. Less than one per cent of the fish killed were game fish which should make all fishermen very happy."

It was reported that some dead carp weighed 40 pounds.

Asked if fishing in Lake Macatawa will ever be as good as it once was, Trimmerger said, "We're headed in that direction."

The DNR will be taking surveys on the project throughout the summer months, Trimmerger said.

### Summer Work Program Ready

GRAND HAVEN — A summer youth work program in Ottawa County, funded with \$79,500 from the Department of Labor, is ready to begin next week, according to Ottawa County Commission Chairman William Winstrom.

The program is designed to create work experience jobs for the county's disadvantaged youth between the ages of 14 and 22.

Each of the participating agencies will be responsible for recruiting and paying participants at the rate of \$2 per hour.

Those taking part include Holland Public Schools, Holland Christian schools, West Ottawa, Zeeland schools, Holland City, Hudsonville schools, Jenison schools, Allendale schools, Coopersville schools, Coopersville city, Spring Lake schools, Grand Haven Chamber of Commerce, Grand Haven schools and the Ottawa Intermediate schools.

### Rep. Vander Jagt Leaves Hospital

Rev. Gritter served Ninth Street Church here from 1940 to 1947 and Maple Avenue Church from 1962 to 1965.

Other synodical officers elected include the Rev. John Ver Brugge of Randolph, Wis., vice president; the Rev. B. Nederlof of Vancouver, Wash., first clerk and Dr. John Vanden Berg of Calvin Seminary, second clerk.

### Voters Overturn Council Zoning

GRAND HAVEN — Voters Monday rescinded actions of the council to rezone land on the north shore for development of luxury homes. The council rezoning was overturned by voters, 2,167 to 107.

The area in question includes 25 acres of land along the Grand River between Dewey Hill and the North Shore Marina.

Developers had proposed a series of waterways and homesites for luxury homes. The rezoning had drawn objections of environmentalists.

He is married and lives with his wife and daughter in Plainwell.

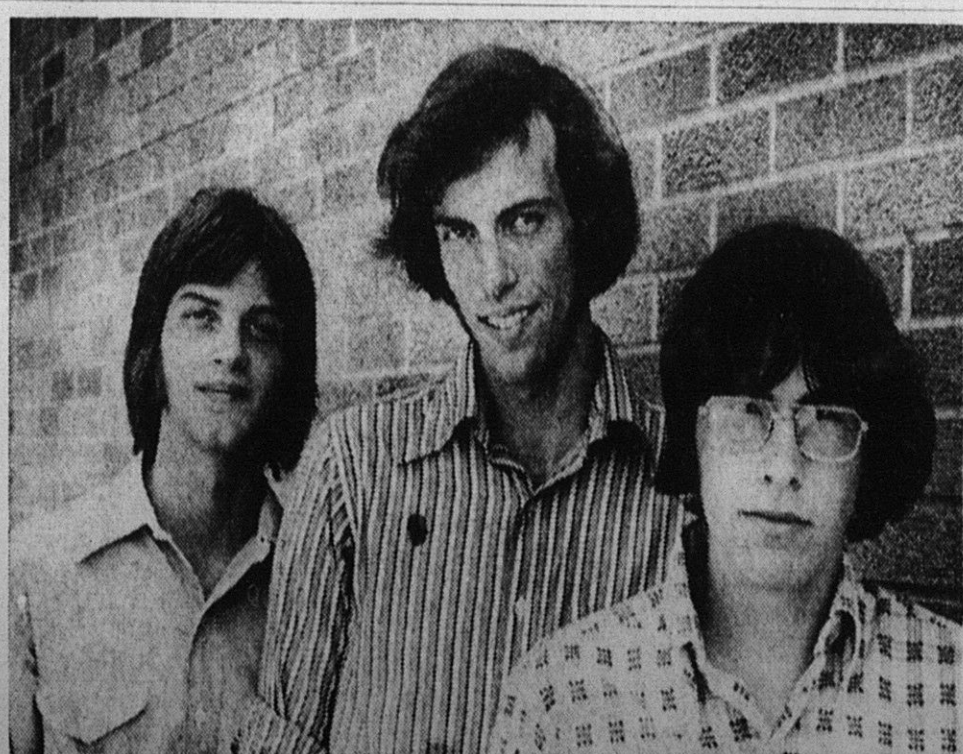


**Hope's Dr. Bedell Wins Grant**

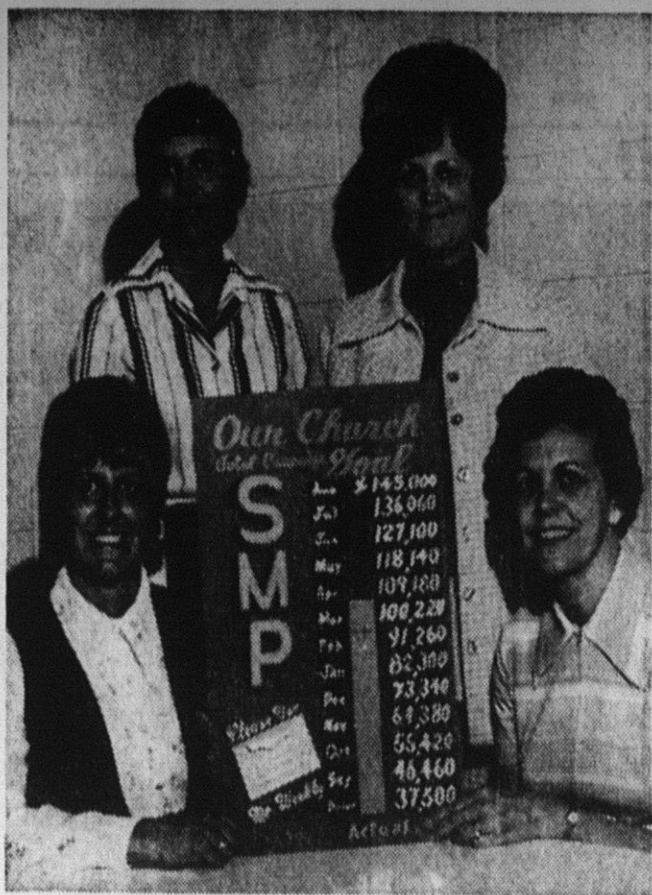

## Guild Visits World Vision

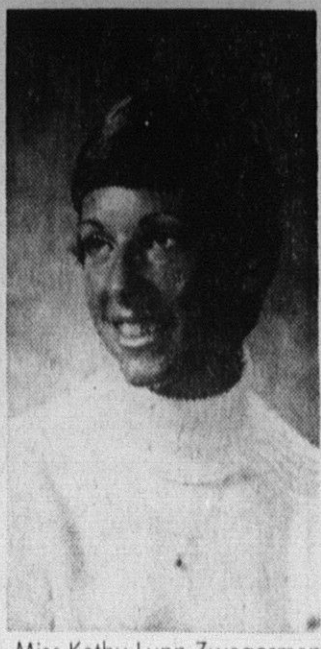
The Guild for Christian Service of the First Reformed Church of Zeeland met Tuesday evening.

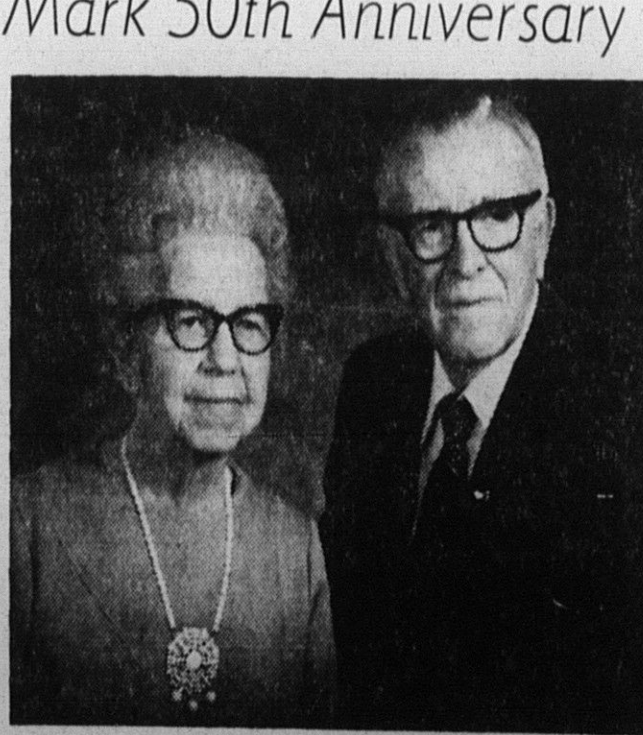

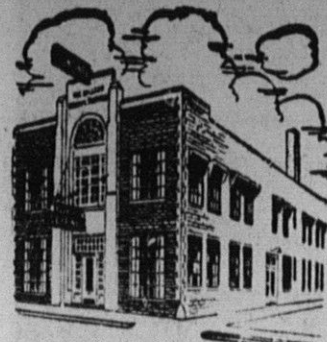
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## OUR LEGAL PROFESSION

Vice President Ford the other day in one of his many recent public appearances made the comment that the lawyers in this country should begin worrying about the health of their profession. What he meant was not that the profession seems to be losing popularity or that those who are in the profession have no work.

Fact of the matter is that law schools are besieged with applications from college graduates. It is the prestige profession of them all these days. And those in the profession do not lack for work, or pay either, for that matter. It is a thriving, well-paying profession.

What the Vice President meant was that among the people who should and do know the law so well there is so little respect for it. Among those on whom we should depend for explaining and maintaining the law we find altogether too much disregard of it as it pertains to their own behavior.

Just take a look. The President himself, a lawyer, is in trouble with the courts and being threatened with criminal prosecution. The former Vice President has been drummed out of his profession — a man who held the second highest office in the land. The former attorney general, who of all people should know and respect the law, has been found guilty of tampering with the legal system he was supposed to keep on the straight and narrow.

It is not only that the profession has many problems, but the very structure of justice can be threatened under these conditions. If those in whose hands resides the justice of this nation can be bought or sold or bribed or influenced by false loyalties, this nation could be doomed. Without justice life is unbearable. Without the proper processes of administering the law justice can be unattainable. For this we need not only knowledgeable men we need committed men. The time is here.

## Sunday School Lesson

Christ's Coming, Our Hope  
1 Thessalonians 4:13-5:6  
By C. P. Dame

The Bible plainly teaches that Jesus Christ will come again. The gospels and the epistles make this clear. It does not give a date. Unfortunately Christians have argued about this truth which has been revealed to comfort and encourage believers all through the ages. Today this subject is talked and written about and hence this lesson is timely.

I. Christians have hope. Many people today do not have any. Paul wanted his converts to have a good understanding of the Christian faith — not to be the ignorant believers some are. Some of the new believers were concerned about those of their number who had died — note the use of the word "sleep." Jesus spoke of death as a sleep. This does not mean that at death the soul becomes unconscious. The troubled Christians in Thessalonica believed in the second coming of Christ but they feared that their departed dead would miss the blessedness of that great day. This fear was groundless. Since these believers had put their faith in the resurrected Jesus they were linked to him forever. Christians have ever been people with a great hope.

II. The Lord Jesus will return. Observe that Paul considers only believers and their concerns. When Jesus first came it was in humility and in poverty but when he returns it will be with awe-inspiring signs — note the words, "with a shout, with the voice of the archangel, and with the trumpet of God." The Lord will come with authority. The bodies of the departed saints will rise first and from 1 Cor. 15:51-52 we may infer that the living saints will be transformed and the departed and living believers will meet the Lord in the air. This is called the rapture. Pay special attention to the eternal fellowship with Christ which will follow. "And so shall we ever be with the Lord" — both classes of believers. "Wherefore comfort one another with these words." Being linked to Jesus Christ is all-important.

III. Christians are expected to be watchful. Do not let apathy take over! We know the Lord will come again. Unbelievers do not believe this — Christians do but no one knows the exact time, hence let us not argue about this. The Lord will come at a time when he is not expected "as a thief in the night."

In this lesson note the contrast between believers and unbelievers. "But ye, brethren, are not in darkness" — they were "the children of the light and the children of the day." Christian people belong to a distinctive class. Believers must take an attitude of vigilance and of spiritual preparedness and be in active service, not sleepy or drowsy but be building each other up in the faith. Our times call for devoted and warm-hearted work and unceasing prayer.

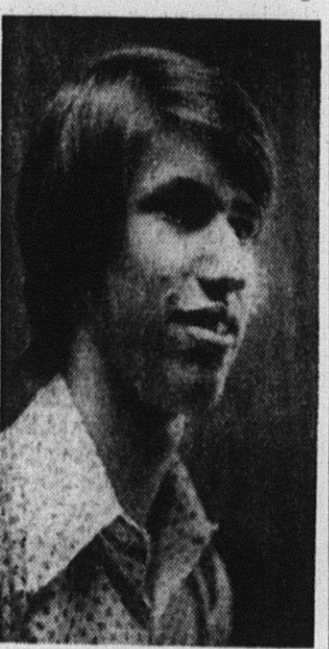

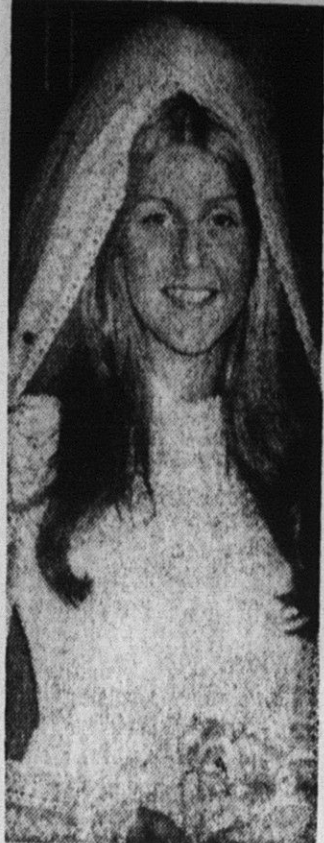

## BPW Learns Of High Costs And Losses

A picture of rising operating costs, widening losses and potential rate increases was painted for the electrical and waste treatment departments by Board of Public Works general manager Ronald L. Rains on at the BPW meeting Monday.

Some board members said it was time to renegotiate with the City Council the rate of payments the BPW makes to the general city budget.

Rains prepared charts indicating costs, anticipated revenues and losses for the coming years and predicted more rate hikes might be necessary. A 5.2 per cent hike in electric rates goes into effect July 1.

Rains projected a \$479,000 loss for the electric operating budget in 1974-75, up from the previously anticipated loss of \$179,000 because of rapid rise in coal costs.

The waste treatment plant, which operated on a net income of \$117,000 in 1972, is showing a projected operating loss of \$145,000 this year and a \$114,000 loss in 1975.

By 1976, Rains said, the plant can be expected to be operating at full capacity and an expansion project is needed which could cost \$10 million of which the city's share would be \$2.2 million.

As for the amount of money the BPW provides the city for general fund uses, Rains said the charter method, which was changed last year, would have cost \$49,000 but under the formula now used the BPW provides \$277,000 which Rains said amounts to a 272 per cent "tax" on the BPW.

BPW president Charles Cooper suggested the BPW meet with the City Council to review the figures and take into consideration increased fuel costs in making future contributions to the city's budget.

Rains told the BPW he was able to obtain 3½ million gallons of fuel oil to operate the turbine generator at Sixth St. and College Ave. which will be used during peak electrical demand hours.

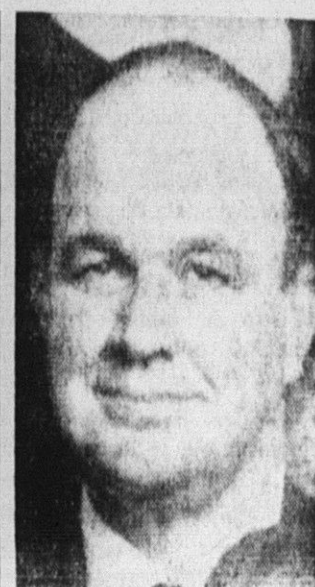

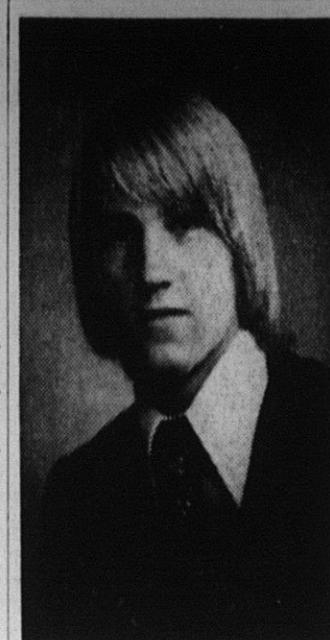
Martin Bareman, 70, of 115 East Lakewood Blvd., died in Holland Hospital Friday afternoon after having been in ill health for the past year.

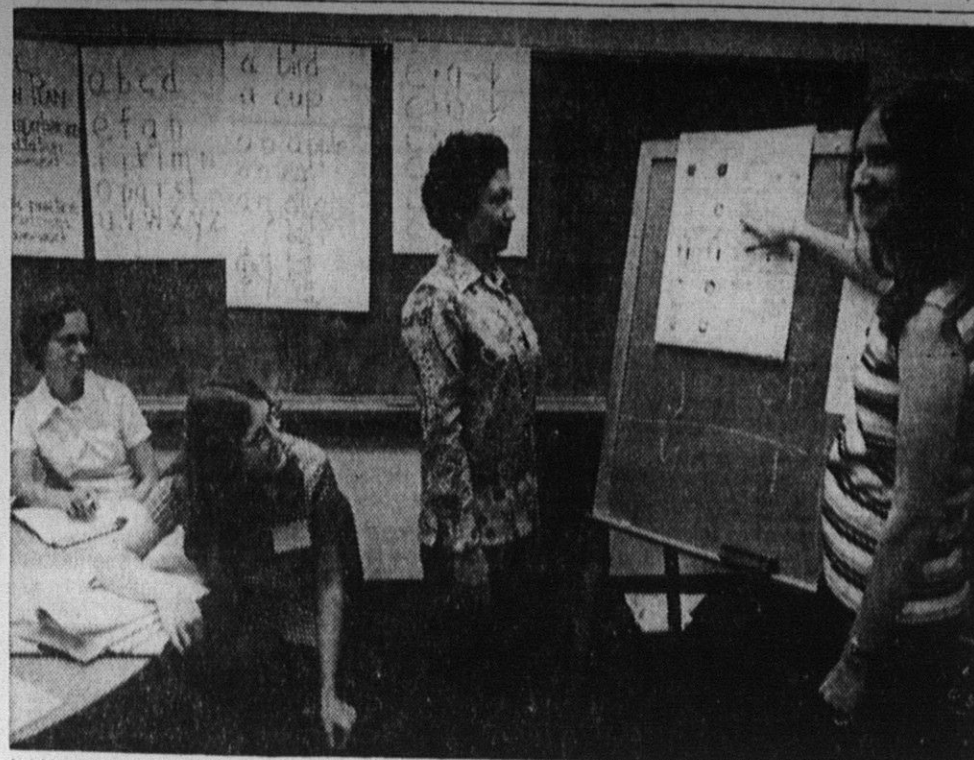
