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Council Requests Study of Speed On New Bypass

Resolution Will Be Sent to State Police Commissioner Childs

Using Tuesday's double fatality on US-31 bypass as prime example, City Council Wednesday night unanimously passed a resolution asking for a study of speed on the new bypass which has been in use a little over half a year. Council is asking state authorities to make such a study to determine whether such accidents are caused by excessive speed and whether it is advisable to limit speed on the highway.

The resolution will be sent to State Police Commissioner Joseph A. Childs and to Ralph Shoemaker of the Michigan State Highway department. The resolution pointed out that several accidents have occurred on this highway since it was opened.

In other business, Mayor Visscher reappointed John H. Van Dyke to a five-year term on the hospital board and Mrs. Henry Steffens to a five-year term on the library board. The appointments were approved by council.

Two public hearings were held Wednesday night, one for laying a water main in Harrison Ave. from 27th to 26th Sts. thence west to Cleveland Ave., and the other was on constructing a sanitary sewer in Ottawa Ave. between 24th and 26th Sts. No opposition was voiced and the necessary resolutions were passed.

Council granted permission to Sam McCoy to move a house from 322 River Ave., to 289 East 11th St., and to move a one-story frame dwelling from 174 West 12th St. to Scotts Dr. The latter request was granted, provided he use the route from 12th St. to Pine Ave., thence north to River Ave., and provided the loaded height does not exceed 20 feet.

Council okayed an outside fire protection agreement with the Holland Die Casting Co.

Approval was given the city manager's recommendation to purchase a Ford model 850 tractor with 9 cubic foot bucket at a net cost of \$2,000 including trade-in of Case V model, for the park department. Council okayed the manager's recommendation to purchase vitrified sewer pipe and fittings, placing such order with T. Keppel's Sons for shipment from the Grand Ledge Clay Products Co. in three-foot lengths at unit prices totaling \$2,733.92.

Licenses to collect rubbish were okayed for George Kotman, Fred Stam and Peter Jaccouse. The latter also was granted a license to collect garbage. However, City Clerk Clarence Greengrove called attention to the requirements of the ordinance whereby garbage collectors licenses are to be for a two-year period and expire April 30 of even years. In order to conform, Jaccouse was issued a license for one year at half the normal fee of \$25.

Council also okayed an application from Arthur Quist to operate a bowling alley, and application from the Holland Hotel Co. (Warm Friend Tavern) to allow dancing.

The clerk also presented notice of a hearing from the Michigan public service commission on application of Michigan Bell Telephone Co. and Louis P. Vanden Berge of Ottawa Telephone Co. for authority for the former to sell and the latter to buy certain telephone property. The hearing will resume at 8:30 a.m. June 23.

Frantic Efforts By Wife and Kin Fail to Save Man

Apparently Fell Off Dock After Awakening Near Windmill Park

A Grand Rapids man drowned in Black River near Windmill Park Saturday night despite the frantic efforts of his wife and relatives to save him.

The body of William Manning, 46, of 23 Sycamore Ave., SE, Grand Rapids, was recovered from the water less than 20 minutes later by a Holland police boat.

Officers used the resuscitator but to no avail. Medical Examiner Dr. Warren Westrate ruled death was due to accidental drowning following an investigation with police.

Police said Manning had fallen asleep on the south bank of Black River while his wife fished along side him. He apparently woke with a start and toppled into the water. His wife said she attempted to help him but her husband said he could make it alright. Instead of walking forward to the bank he stepped out into deeper water she said.

Manning began calling "Bo, Bo, help." His brother-in-law, William Lee Davis, Grand Rapids, fishing a few hundred feet away, rushed over.

Davis and another fisherman, Frank Hill, Grand Rapids, formed a human chain and extended a fishing pole to Manning. Davis said Manning seemed to float backwards out into the water where he sank from sight.

The water is approximately eight feet deep at that point. Manning's body was recovered 25 feet from shore. The body was taken to Dykstra Funeral Home and then to Brown Funeral Home in Grand Rapids.

Officers Seek Driver Whose Car Hit Garage

Sheriff's officers today were seeking the driver of a car which hit a garage at 1755 South Shore Dr. in Virginia Park and then left without identifying himself or reporting the accident.

The crash occurred at 1:30 a.m. today when the car hit the corner of the frame garage at the summer home of Mrs. J. H. Johnson on Lake Macatawa. The garage was considerably damaged, and there also was some damage to the car. Officers said damage on the car would be to the left front, and at least a headlight was broken, judging from glass at the scene. A scrape of paint indicated the car was light green or blue.

Some neighbors were awakened by the crash and said they would be able to identify the car. Persons with information, particularly garage personnel who might make repairs, are asked to get in touch with Deputy Len Ver Schure or other law enforcement officials.

Public Hearing Set for Vacating Short Street

City Council Votes To Close 20th St. At Christian School

In keeping with plans set forth by the Holland Planning Commission, City Council Wednesday night voted to vacate 20th St. between Michigan and State and set Wednesday, July 20, at 7:30 p.m. as date for a public hearing on the matter.

Council's action followed a statement by Mayor Robert Visscher who said when he made his acceptance speech a few months ago he listed three major points which he hoped would be accomplished during his term of office. One was that as soon as possible Council put into practice the principles outlined by the planning commission.

"The master plan calls for the closing of certain streets in the city where it would be to the advantage of the city as a whole. The precedent has been set by Council with the closing of West 25th St. between Harrison and Van Raalte, certain streets in the Wildwood Subdivision, West 31st St. between Van Raalte and Washington, and River Ave. from 29th to 32nd Sts. Two of the foregoing closings were made at the request of the Holland Board of Education.

"It is my personal belief and it is also consistent with the master plan drawn up by the planning commission that the closing of 20th St. between Michigan and State would be in the best interests of the city of Holland," the mayor said. Council's vote was unanimous.

This short street runs between the two high schools of the Christian school system. Closing the street was a rather heated controversy back in 1945 and again in 1948. A public vote was called in 1948 and the street remained open. In keeping with the city plan drawn up by the planning commission, Council voted unanimously to make 22nd St. a through street from Ottawa to College Aves., with the exception of Michigan Ave. and State St. The through street will be effective as soon as traffic signs are put up.

Council tabled until next meeting a request from John Vander Kolk of the Holland City Bus Lines to reduce insurance requirements in the new city ordinances. The communication cited the increase in gasoline costs and the decline in passenger revenue. Unless the ordinance is changed, the bus lines operator listed two alternatives, increase passenger fees or discontinue operations in the city.

Council granted the request of Don Oosterbaan, school safety officer, to use Riverview Park Friday from 1:30 to 4:30 p.m. for a city-wide party for safety patrol boys and girls. The regular fee for use of the park was waived.

A request of the Board of Education for a study of sidewalks to service the Thomas Jefferson elementary school area was referred to the city manager and city engineer for study and recommendation. The communication pointed out that the school was putting in the necessary walks on its own property, but that many other walks are needed in the locality. Work should be completed before Sept. 8, according to the communication.

On recommendation of the Board of Public Works, Council approved an agreement between the city and Ivan A. and Adlyn Bosman granting access to the city for leveling land in the vicinity of the new pumping station at Lakewood Homesites.

Council also decided that it was not feasible at this time to purchase the Dwight Ferris property on West 12th St., even though the city plan has shown this property as part of a desirable site for city hall expansion.

Mayor Visscher presided at the meeting which lasted less than an hour. All councilmen were present. Councilman Robert J. Kow gave the invocation.

Light Vote Is Cast In School Election

Wendell A. Miles and Alvin J. Cook were reelected to the Board of Education without opposition in Monday's annual school election and Bernard J. Arendshorst was elected to serve a one-year term.

Monday's election attracted a light vote with only 332 persons casting ballots at the polls.

Miles and Cook, who have completed three-year terms, were elected to four-year terms. Miles led the ticket with 317 votes and Cook received 298 votes.

Arendshorst with 203 votes defeated George Minnema who received 123 votes. Arendshorst succeeds E. V. Hartman who is retiring this year after many years of service on the board.

The vote will be canvassed at a meeting of the Board of Education tonight at 7:30 p.m. Ordinarily, the board meets the second Monday of each month, but in June the meeting is held on Tuesday.

GRAND HAVEN (Special)—Municipal Judge Jacob Ponstein was elected to a four-year term and Dr. John H. Kitchel to a two-year term in the annual school election here Monday.

Ponstein polled 429 votes defeating Dr. Robert Stobbeelaar who received 192 votes. Dr. Kitchel received 367 votes defeating Paul A. Johnson, incumbent, who received 316 votes. Johnson chose to seek a two-year term rather than a four-year term. The two-year term is to fill the unexpired term of Dr. W.B. Bloemendal who resigned.

Double Rites Set Friday for Victims Of Two-Car Crash

Double funeral services will be held Friday afternoon in Ninth Street Christian Reformed Church for Mrs. Henrietta Van Dyke, 57, of Holland, and her daughter, Mrs. Marian Vander Woude, 27, of Zeeland, who were fatally injured in a two-car crash Tuesday morning at the intersection of US-31 bypass and 16th St.

Services will be held at 2 p.m. in the church. Relatives are asked to meet in the church basement at 1:30 p.m. The Rev. Marvin J. Vanderwerp of Ninth Street Church and the Rev. J. Guichelaar of North Street Christian Reformed Church of Zeeland will officiate. Mrs. Van Dyke will be buried in Pilgrim Home Cemetery in Holland and Mrs. Vander Woude in Zeeland Cemetery.

Four others were injured in the crash which claimed the two lives. Karen Vander Woude, 6, was in good condition Wednesday in Holland Hospital. In addition to lacerations of the lower lip reported Tuesday, she also received a possible concussion. Her sister, Marianne, 5, who received face lacerations, remained in good condition.

Also in good condition are Charles O. Krause, 19, Riverdale, Ill., and Joyce Smith, 18, Homewood, Ill., riding in one car. Miss Smith is expected to be released from the hospital in a day or two.

Mrs. Van Dyke, driver of the local car, was killed instantly in the crash. She was traveling west on 16th St. Her daughter died about a half hour later in the hospital. Another daughter, Mrs. Hester Van Haltsma of Zeeland, also was riding in the Van Dyke car but escaped with minor bruises.

Mrs. Van Dyke was born March 9, 1898, in Holland, daughter of George De Weerd and the late Mrs. De Weerd. Surviving are the husband, Frank; the daughter, Mrs. Van Haltsma of Zeeland; two sons, Franklin of Holland and Willard Van Dyke of Holland; two granddaughters, Frank Van Dyke, Sr., and George De Weerd of Holland.

Holland Mother And Daughter Victims of Crash

Two Children, Couple Also Are Injured; Doctor Close to Scene

A Holland woman and her daughter were killed and four others injured in a two-car collision shortly before 10 a.m. Tuesday at the intersection of 16th St. and the US-31 bypass.

Instantly killed was Mrs. Frank Van Dyke, 55, of 177 East 15th St. Her daughter, Mrs. Russell Vander Woude, 27, of 314 Colonial Ave., Zeeland, died at Holland Hospital at 10:30 a.m. from a skull fracture and chest and internal injuries.

Mrs. Vander Woude's two children, Karen, 6, and Marianne, 5,

received facial lacerations. Their condition was described as "good" by hospital authorities.

Also injured were Charles O. Krause, 19, of 6 West 137th Place, Riverdale, Ill., who received a fractured jaw, knee and leg injuries and facial cuts.

Joyce Smith, 18, of 1661 Ridge Rd., Homewood, Ill., received severe facial lacerations and cuts about the legs. Their condition is "good."

Mrs. Van Dyke and the Vander Woude family were riding in one car and the Illinois couple in another car.

Ottawa County deputies said Mrs. Van Dyke was driving west on 16th St. and apparently drove out in front of the northbound car driven by Krause, where her car was struck broadside.

The terrific impact sent Mrs. Van Dyke's car skidding off the intersection into the boulevard 60 feet away. Pieces of both cars were scattered in a wide area.

Three unidentified workmen nearby heard the crash and phoned for an ambulance before the cars had stopped spinning. A car just behind the Illinois vehicle was driven by Dr. G. J. Kemme of Drenthe.

He was on the scene in seconds and administered first aid before ambulances from three local funeral homes arrived to remove the injured.

Deputies were forced to rip out seats and pry open the doors to remove many of the injured who were pinned in the cars by the force of the impact.

Traffic was slowed for nearly an hour as wreckers were forced to move slowly in towing away the damaged vehicles as spilled gasoline saturated the area.

Grandville Youth Dies in Hospital; 3 Others Injured

Two Cars Collide East of Zeeland Sunday Afternoon

Injuries received in a two-car crash Sunday night proved fatal to a two-year-old Grandville boy who died in St. Mary's Hospital in Grand Rapids Monday. The crash occurred at 24th St. and Byron Rd. eight miles east of Zeeland.

James M. Poelman, 2, son of Mr. and Mrs. Marvin Poelman, Grandville, died of head and chest injuries at 6:30 a.m. His sister, Kathleen, 3, received a fractured collarbone. She is in St. Mary's Hospital.

A third passenger, Cynthia Gross, 18, of Grand Rapids, and the driver Thomas Caldwell, 20, Grand Rapids were treated for minor cuts and released.

Driver of the other car, William Berkempas, 24, Byron Center, was not injured.

Ottawa County deputies said all the injured were thrown from the car following the impact in the intersection.

Deputies said Caldwell was heading north on 24th St. and apparently went through the stop street without stopping and struck the Berkempas car which was eastbound on Byron Rd.

The two vehicles were swung around by the impact. Berkempas' car ended up on the east side of the intersection. The driverless Caldwell car knocked down a directional sign and finally came to a stop 137 feet from the road nearly hidden by tall grass in a field.

Deputies said it appeared that all the occupants of Caldwell's car were thrown out one by one as it skidded off the road into the field. Irreparable damage to the cars was estimated at less than \$300, deputies said.

Deputies planned to confer today with Prosecutor James Bussard on possible charges that may be filed against the driver of the death car.

A South Bend couple were killed on the same spot street a year ago under nearly identical circumstances.

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GYPSY BLOOD

The two Holland boys who are making a trip to California in a 1919 Model T Ford, with so slim a bankroll that it would hardly pay for a night's lodging in a Florida ocean front hotel, are doing something that many solid citizens would like to do if they just had the gumption. There is still so much gypsy blood in may of us that we would love to cut loose from normal humdrum security and take our chances with those boys on the open road.

For all of us come from ancestors who were wanderers, and it takes thousands of years for those impulses to die out. Away back in the days of Abraham in the Bible, the Oriental forebears of the human race were gypsies of necessity, although that name had not yet been coined. They had to follow their flocks into the regions of grass and water.

Ever since then many people have had itching feet. They are ever wondering what there is just beyond the hill, what the river looks like just beyond the bend, what there is "Beyond the Horizon" to use the title of a once famous American play.

Just as necessity in primitive ages compelled people to wander, thus developing gypsy blood in their veins, the compulsions of more modern life have forced people to stay put. When farming became the chief means of producing food and clothing and shelter, people settled down for life. This started ages ago, and it has become the rule where once it was the exception.

But in spite of many millennia of life on farms and in cities, staying put for lifetime or even for several generations, our heritage of gypsy blood is still with us. Only a few have the courage to let it have its way. Occasionally, especially in youth, some one, like the two Holland boys, will answer the call of his gypsy blood and give it play.

Most of us are merely prudent. It does not pay in dollars and cents to go wandering beyond the horizon; there is much more of that handy folding green in getting and keeping a good job at home than there is in following the green pastures of the world in a Model T Ford. But there can be a lot of fun for those who answer that call that the stay-at-home will never know.

Those Holland boys are going to have some rough times. Now and again they may have to go hungry, and they may have to go to their hard bed drenched to the skin. But they are going to have a glorious time. Many a man with a fat bank account would give his eye-teeth if he could find the courage in his heart to follow the trail with them into the unknown.

Joshua Keeps the Passover—
2 Chronicles 35:1-6; 16:19

When Josiah restored the worship of Jehovah in the temple, it followed that those who had been ministering to false deities in that sacred place were removed. They had been ordained by kings who foresaw the Lord and established a regime that was pagan from start to finish. They had to be deposed, and the king lost no time doing it. He was aware that the old-fashioned religion could never be restored by a group of officiating priests who had been in the habit of kindling fires before strange altars. A grave situation like that had to be handled with firmness. This house cleaning process was carried on throughout the land of Judah.

To destroy the old and to root out the false is but half the process. We shall never succeed in destroying the love of a people for one thing unless we can give them something else and something better to love. In order to forestall the sacrifices offered to pagan gods and to put an end to feasts observed in their honor, Josiah commanded the people to make their sacrifices to Jehovah and to keep His Passover, in celebration of the mighty deliverance from Egypt. It would seem he believed in the value of popular religious gatherings. This one in particular must have fortified the resolve to turn to Jehovah and to seek Him only, for it was the only one of any consequence held in many years.

Least anyone would suspect that this was not so important a Passover, the writer informs us that not since the days of Samuel, who was the last of the judges, was such a Passover held. What the writer means is that not one on purer principles, was more heartily joined in by the people present, more literally consecrated, or more religiously observed. The words do not apply to the number present, but to the manner and spirit. It was a day of victory for the hosts of the Lord, and a day of defeat for the devotees of paganism. There must have been joy in heaven when the sun went down that day.

The striking scene of renewing the covenant was soon followed by a Passover celebration such as had not been experienced before or since. People came from all parts of the land to enjoy the newly renovated temple. Thirty thousand males of full age attended. The king provided for their paschal offering, a lamb for each, besides three thousand bullocks for thank offerings. Princes, leading priests, and the chief of the Levites followed the king's example with generous gifts.

The provisions of the law were carried out, including the function of singers and musicians, the order of priests, the return of the ark of the covenant to the Holy of Holies, and the ceremonial preparation of all attendants. The king found the people no less responsive to his call to worship than they were to his challenge to stand up to own the covenant. The two experiences are complementary. The renewal of the covenant involved, most of all, a recommitment to obey the laws of God. This represented Judah's ethical reaffirmation. The celebration of the Passover involved a happy experience of worship and fellowship. This represents Judah's religious affirmation. Both are essential aspects of Hebrew ethical monotheism and of our Christian faith. Both involve the twin principles of faith and grace, human faith on our side and divine grace on the side of God. Thereby, God becomes redemptively active in individuals and in the life of the nation.

The memorable celebration of the Passover and of the feast of unleavened bread associated with and following it ran the full course of eight days. In magnificence, number of celebrants and participants, this became known as the greatest Passover ever held. This celebration must have been long remembered also for its joyousness. As the years passed by during the remainder of Josiah's reign, this brilliant and happy occasion must have been a source of inspiration to individuals and families.

Josiah's reign is summed up by the usual statement of the chronicler about good kings, but with the addition of a declaration of excellence used of no other king. The king died right in the sight of God and walked in the ways of David. He declined neither to the right hand nor to the left. He showed a constancy and persistence in doing right and walking in the ways of God which were lacking in other good kings. Here was a devoted and consecrated youth who matured in personal piety and deep devotion as he grew to full manhood.

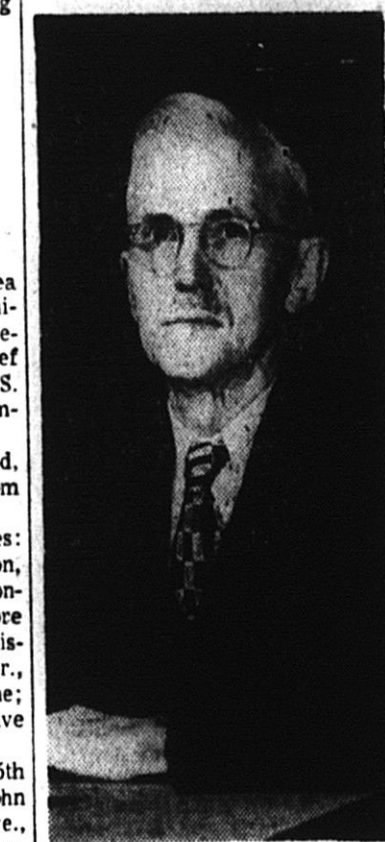

General Synod To Be in Holland For 1956 Session

Reformed Church Body To Join Celebrations At College, Seminary

BUCK HILL FALLS, Pa. (Special) — General Synod of the Reformed Church in America has adjourned its 149th annual meeting here and will meet next year in Holland, Mich., to share in ceremonies celebrating the 90th anniversary of Hope College and the dedication of the new Western Theological Seminary. Meetings will open June 7, 1956.

In its final meetings, Synod reaffirmed its kinship with and participation in the life of the ecumenical Christian Church, urged continued support of the work of the United Nations and strongly recommended that the churches give serious study to the question of the revision of the United States charter.

Synod also urged a continued program of foreign aid both through the church and by the government through the Technical Assistance Program, and registered its definite and unaltered opposition to the Communist ideology.

There was strong endorsement of the programs which look towards the development of atomic energy for peacetime purposes. Without partisan intent, Synod commended the work of the President of the United States to do all in his power to avoid the outbreak of wars and of his leadership by word and example, providing a climate of greater reverence for God and for his rule as a necessary precondition for a peaceful world.

Synod also recorded its opposition to the proposed new World Calendar on the ground that it was materialistic in its basis and would destroy the Church's basic concept of the Lord's Day.

Synod asked that a special committee be appointed to consider the ordination of women to the lay and ministerial offices of the church, to report back in 1958.

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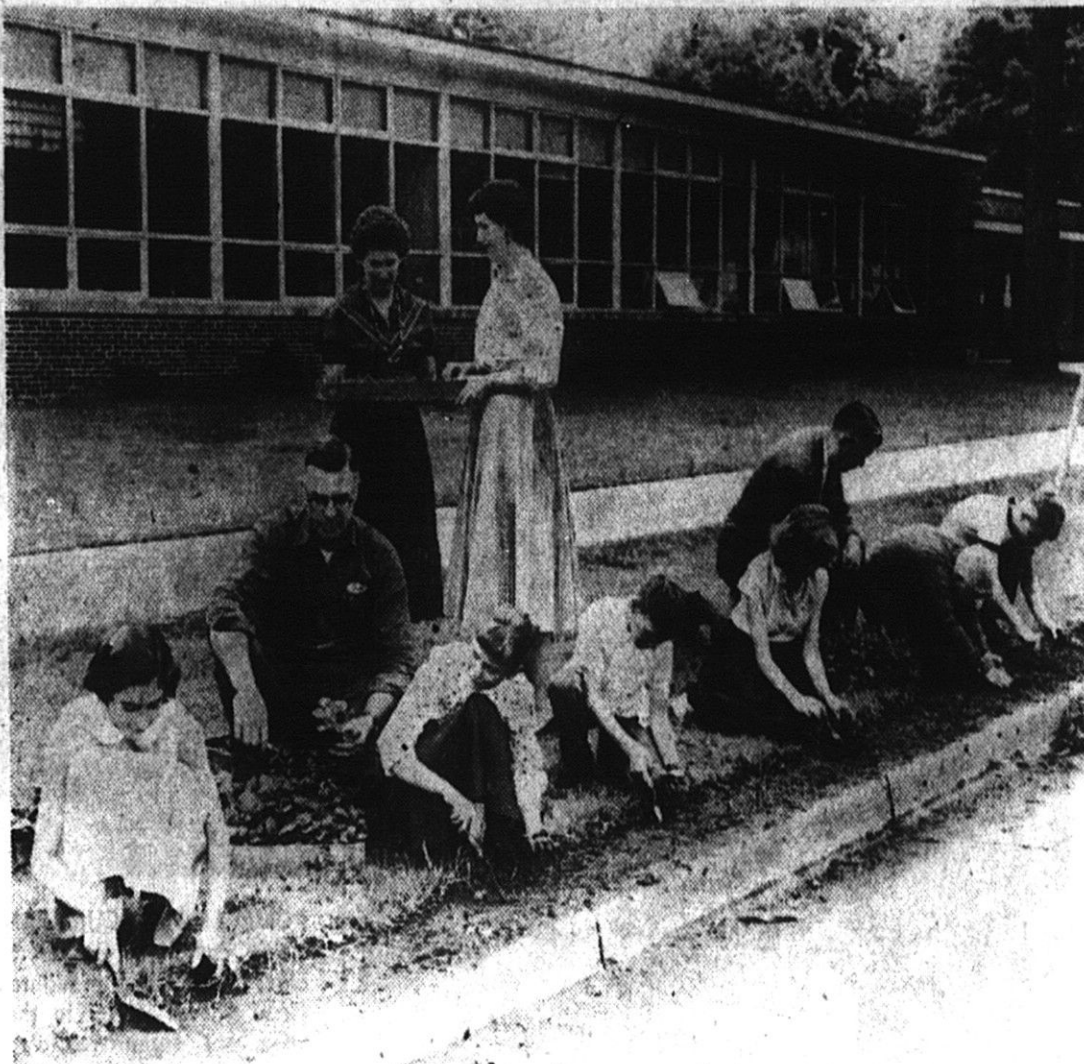

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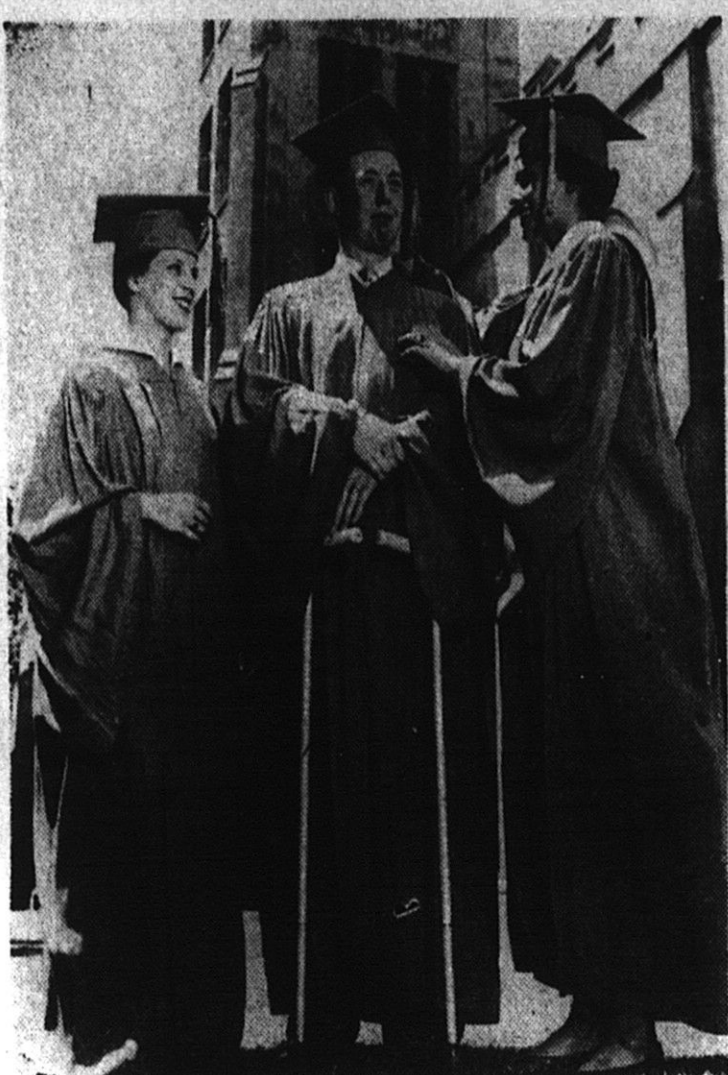

Polio Victim Catches Up In Time for Graduation

Missing classes for six months right in the middle of high school isn't exactly conducive to graduating with your original classmates.

But when Christian High's 1955 graduates went through their Commencement paces Tuesday night, their vice president, 17-year-old Gordon Bouwman, was right along with them. And he left his class for more than a semester in December, 1952, when he was a sophomore.

Gordon didn't leave school by choice. He wouldn't have wanted to. He liked school.

But when polio struck him down that December day he didn't have much to say about it.

That's why Gordon used crutches to make his way down the Hope Chapel aisle Tuesday night. That's why he wears a brace on a paralyzed left leg.

When they rushed him to St. Mary's Hospital he was paralyzed in both legs. After three weeks he was moved to the Mary Free Bed Hospital for rehabilitation. But he never regained use of his left leg.

Gordon didn't give up his studies even though he was confined. He took courses in biology and English from a Grand Rapids high school teacher who made frequent appearances at the hospital.

He wasn't released until June, 1953. Then there was the task of catching up with his classmates.

It wasn't too tough, Gordon claims. But he had to take heavy academic loads in both his junior and senior years.

Besides that he wasn't going to give up his flute position in the Christian High concert band. That took another period and left him without any study time during the school day.

So when he graduated, he had been a member of the band for all four years.

By doing all of his studying at home he managed to finish high school a solid member of the upper third in his class.

Getting around on crutches wasn't bad, but Gordon is thankful for the railings on the inside steps at Christian High.

"I think I've made a lot of progress," he said. "I don't get nearly as tired as I used to."

He's going to college, too. Right now, he plans to enter Calvin in the fall and take up secondary education.

Gordon is the son of Mr. and Mrs. John Bouwman of East Saugatuck. He has four younger sisters and a younger brother.

The whole family was proud of him when he received his diploma Tuesday night—right on schedule.

30 at Informal Public Hearing On Zoning Plan

Most Pressing Question Involves Zoning Change In 13th St. Shop Area

About 30 persons attended an informal public hearing on the proposed zoning ordinance for Holland city Thursday night in Council Chambers, conducted by the Holland Planning Commission.

Most of the questions concerned the change in zoning for the neighborhood shopping area at 13th and Maple, which in the new drafts is zoned residential. Planning Consultant Scott Bagby explained to Jack Smith, drug store operator, and others concerned in the change, that use of existing commercial properties may continue under the non-conforming use in the new plan and that there are some definite advantages to the plan.

Bagby assured owners of such establishments in non-conforming areas that there are definite provisions for remodeling, for some enlarging and for replacement in case of fire. Rather than decreasing the property value, he said the monopoly value might bring even higher value.

There were many other questions, most of them of a routine nature. Bagby explained that a violation under the current zoning laws would still remain a violation under the new plan unless the zoning map shows the right change has been made. He said the whole concept of zoning is to protect residential areas and to make proper provision for commercial and industrial activity to provide the tools for a healthy economy.

The basic concept of the use of property is to let everybody do what he would like to with the property he owns so long as others don't do the same things which would make the first man unhappy. To avoid such conflicts, the zoning pattern sets up such rule as setbacks, land use, etc. Zoning is protective, not restrictive, he pointed out.

Mayor Robert Visscher, long-time member of the Planning Commission pointed out that any further complaints or questions on the zoning ordinance should be directed to the Planning Commission before the ordinance is turned over to Council. This may be done either communication or by appearing at the Commission meetings held every month.

Visscher said there usually is a tendency to pass the Planning Commission, and leveling the criticisms at the public hearing called by Council. He explained that Council could not possibly put the time on the problem that the planning group has and is not geared to solve all the problems. "Any person consulting the Planning Commission will find the group is eager to cooperate and will certainly do what it can to make a fair adjustment," Visscher said.

Two formal requests were entered by Atty. Vernon D. Ten Cate for changes in rezoning the shopping district at 13th and Maple, and the Paul Baker property at Van Raalte and 19th St.

The informal hearing adjourned at 9:30 p.m. after which the commission held its monthly business meeting. A delegation of the Holland School for Christian Instruction consulted the group on its long-range plans for school expansion, and how they fit into the zoning plan.

Letters promising support for the zoning plan were read from the Holland Builders Association, Junior Chamber of Commerce Auxiliary, Junior Welfare League and Woman's Literary Club.

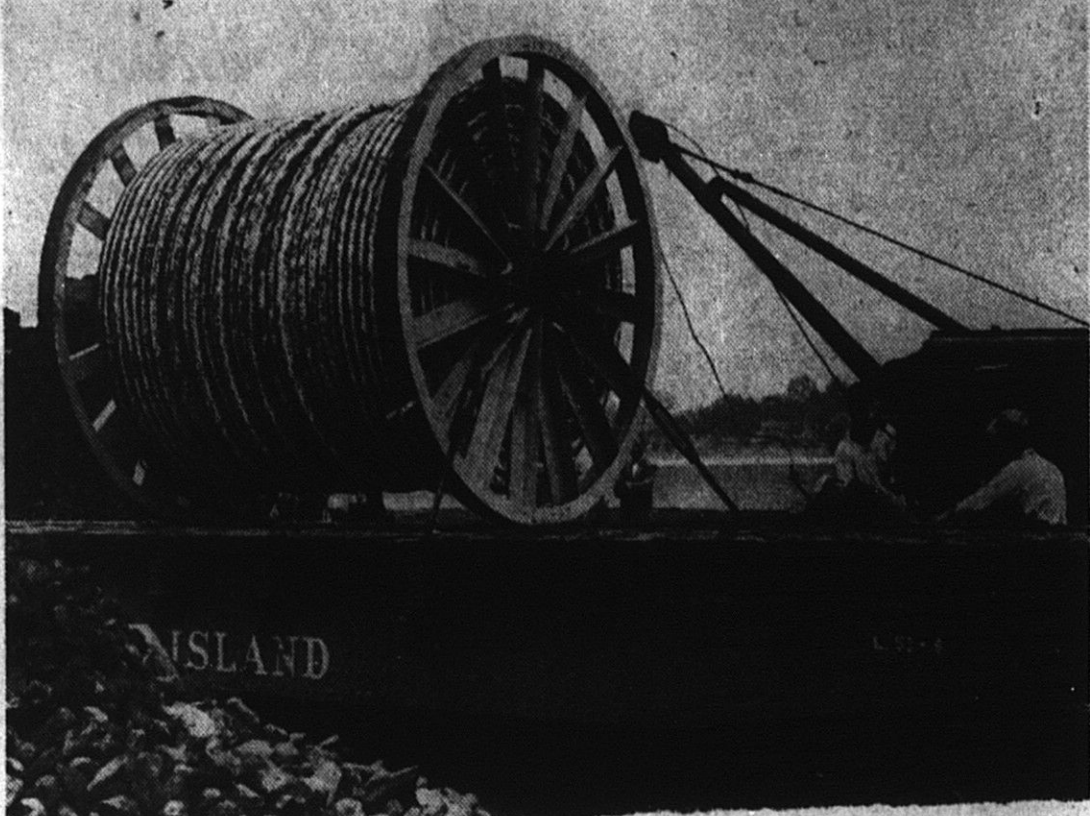
