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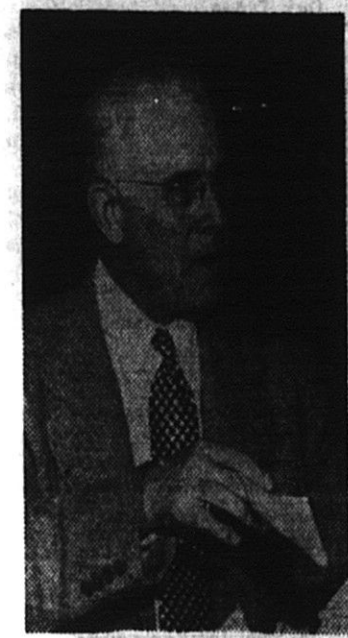
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## Theater Owner Dies at 74

Henry Carley, 74, long-time operator of motion picture theaters in Holland, died this morning in Holland Hospital where he had been a patient for five weeks. In all, he was associated with theaters for 43 years, 32 of them in Holland.

Carley came to Holland in 1926 to take over operation of the Holland Theater, and the former Strand Theater, and the following year purchased interests control-

ling Colonial Theater. He operated all three theaters under the Holland Theater Corp. until June, 1931, when they became affiliated with W. S. Butterfield Theaters, Inc., and the name of the local corporation was changed to Carley Amusement Co. At that time the Strand Theater was closed. Today Colonial Theater is known as Park Theater and Strand Theater is Center Theater.

At 22 years of age, Carley formed the Carley and Hansen partnership which for 11 years engaged in the wholesale and retail flour and feed, hay and grain business on the south side in Chicago. He became associated with the theater business shortly thereafter. He built his first theater in Chicago in 1915 and operated it for five years. Then in 1920 a corporation of which he was president built a 1,500-seat theater in Chicago Heights. A year later the corporation sold out to a firm which operated a chain of theaters and Carley served as manager until 1921. Then he and a partner, Herman Levenez, purchased theaters in South Haven, Otsego and Allegan.

Carley's only son, Robert, has been active in the business for several years. Today the Carley Amusement Co. operates seven theaters, two in Holland, a drive-in between Holland and Saugatuck, two theaters in South Haven, one in Greenville and one in Allegan.

Carley was a member of Hope Church and formerly was associated with the Rotary Club, the Exchange Club and the Macatawa Bay Yacht Club. The Carleys have made their home at 141 East 26th St. for about six years. Previously they lived on South Shore Dr. and on State St.

Surviving are the wife, Caroline; a son, Robert; and a sister-in-law, Mrs. Allen Carley of Chicago Heights, Ill.

Funeral services will be held at 2 p.m. Saturday from Dykstra Funeral Chapel with Dr. Marion de Velder of Hope Church officiating. Burial will be in Pilgrim Home Cemetery.

Pallbearers will be John Fenlon Donnelly, W. A. Butler, Chester Van Tongeren, Hollis Northuis, Al Shaffer, Merrick W. Hanchett.

Relatives and friends may meet the family at Dykstra chapel Friday from 2 to 4 p.m. and 7 to 9 p.m. Theaters in Holland will be closed Saturday afternoon.

## Fillmore Group Protests Vote

Holland's annexation election last week may be contested.

City Manager Herb Holt received a telephone call from Leo Hoffman, Allegan attorney, stating he had been approached by a group of Fillmore township individuals to contest the election as it affects the Maplewood district.

Holt referred Hoffman to James E. Townsend, local attorney, who represented Maplewood district and others in the June 3 election. Their conversation dealt with state laws under which the election was carried on.

It appeared that Hoffman would study the situation before deciding whether to go ahead with the case.

## Attendant Told to Hand Over Money

Two men, one armed with a pistol, robbed the Wooden Shoe gas station, located at the corner of 16th St. and the US-31 bypass, of \$1,200 Monday night, according to the owner, John DeGraaf.

The men apparently made a successful escape through a ring of roadblocks. All the police forces in the western part of the state were alerted to watch for the fleeing bandits, while more than 20 cars combed the roads in the Holland area and participated in roadblocks.

DeGraaf told Ottawa County deputies he was alone in the station when two large colored men entered shortly after 10 p.m. One of the men, DeGraaf said, drew a gun and demanded "Give me your money."

DeGraaf told deputies he surrendered about \$100 from his cash register and \$1,100 from his pocket, the \$1,100 being weekend receipts he had planned to bank.

One of the men ripped the receiver from the wall phone before racing out to their car, DeGraaf said, the cord breaking off about one inch from the receiver.

The robbers had parked their car between two tractor-trailers in the driveway, he said, but he got a glimpse of the car as it roared east on 16th St. DeGraaf said he believed it to be a light-colored 1956 model. The gun he described as a .38 caliber revolver.

DeGraaf immediately called the Ottawa County Sheriff's department from another phone in the back room, and the alarm was quickly relayed to the Holland police, state police and police in surrounding communities.

Grand Rapids set cruisers headed west on roads leading toward Holland in an effort to intercept the bandits. Zeeland, Hudsonville and Grand Haven cars moved into roadblock positions. Holland police manned positions along US-31.

The holdup men were never sighted. About 12:30 a.m. the blockade was lifted, but cars continued to patrol the area.

One of the men was reported to be wearing a striped shirt and blue jeans, while the other was said to be wearing a light blue shirt and dark pants.

The loss was not covered by insurance, DeGraaf said, since insurance companies refuse to cover him because of the number of times his station has been burglarized.

He plans to attend the Brooks Institute of Photography after his graduation and eventually to do photography in connection with a magazine, newspaper or syndicate.

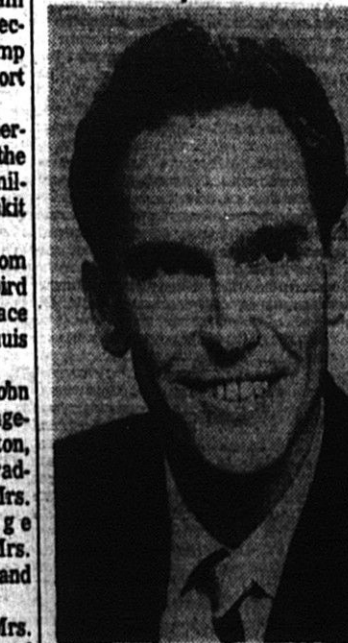
His hobby is baseball.

## Craft Hits Near Water South of M50

Two Muskegon men were killed Friday afternoon when their light plane crashed and burned along the shoreline of Lake Michigan just off Lake Shore Dr., two miles south of the M-50 intersection.

The Ottawa County Sheriff's Department identified the men as Robert S. Peterson, 39, of 2445 Maffett St., Muskegon Heights, and Raymond Lavender, 33, of 559 Eugene Ave., Muskegon.

Deputies said Peterson was piloting the plane, a single-engine Aerona Champion owned by the Continental Motors Flying Club of Muskegon.

Three Grand Rapids teenagers who were down on the beach witnessed the crash. Robert Stehouwer, 17, Linda Strobaum, 15, and Janet Schultz, 14, told State Police the plane was flying south, low over the water and a little way out from shore.

As the plane passed, Stehouwer told police, they waved at the plane and the men in the plane waved back and giggled their wings.

Then, according to Stehouwer, the plane banked to the right, out toward Lake Michigan.

The plane never came out of the turn. It turned full circle and crashed into the sand dune about 150 feet from the water's edge.

The fabric-covered craft burst into flames immediately upon crashing, Stehouwer told officers, and they were unable to get to the occupants. One ran to call the State Police while the other two tried to put out the flames and stopped a spreading grass fire with sand.

The plane and the occupants were completely burned.

The bodies were identified by William Hathaway, president of the Continental Motors Flying Club. The bodies were taken first to the Van Zantwick Funeral Home in Grand Haven and then transferred to the Lee Funeral Home in Muskegon Heights.

## 80-Acre Site Sought for High School

The Suburban School Planning Committee, consisting of representatives of some 12 school districts north of Holland, Tuesday night adopted a resolution recommending an 80-acre site somewhat north of the Beechwood area for the construction of a high school and related educational facilities.

The building site policy subcommittee recommended that the site be located in an area three miles square, bounded by New Holland Rd., 138th Ave., James St. and 160th Ave. This area was selected with regard to geographic and population centers, plus consideration for future growth trends. The nine-mile area lies in both Holland and Park townships.

The committee, which met in Robert School Tuesday night, also heard reports on other matters.

The sub-committee surveying existing facilities reported that a 1,000-pupil capacity high school will accommodate the projected high school enrollment as well as seventh and eighth graders through 1961 without exceeding the designed capacity.

The sub-committee also said present elementary facilities will accommodate kindergarten through sixth grade students through 1963 without exceeding designed capacity, provided seventh and eighth graders are placed in the new high school.

A steering committee for curriculum development was appointed and the publicity committee was instructed to prepare a brochure to be distributed to residents in the area involved in reorganization.

The next meeting will be held June 23 in Waverly School.

## Principal Named for Van Raalte

Miss Fannie Bultman, Lincoln school teacher who has had 19 years of teaching experience with Holland public schools, was appointed principal of Van Raalte school at a meeting of the Board of Education Monday night in E.E. Fell Junior High School.

She will succeed Hermine Irmann who is retiring this year after a long record of fine service with the Holland school system.

Miss Bultman holds an A.B. degree from Western Michigan University, has attended Northwestern University and holds a Michigan Life Certificate. She lives in Hamilton.

The board also approved the teachers' committee's recommendation of appointing Harvey Kollen of Overisel township as a teacher in later elementary grades. Mr. Kollen attended Hope College, the University of Michigan and the University of Chicago. He holds both bachelor's and master's degrees.

He has taught 15 years, 12 of them with Bilefield High School. For the past three years he has served as a substitute on several occasions in junior and senior high schools. He is married and has four children.

In other business, the board adopted budget estimates for 1958-59 totaling for a total outlay of \$1,372,327.89. This is an increase of \$72,000 over last year, and the board approved the budget recognizing that there will be several changes throughout the year because of district reorganization and other factors.

Revenues list \$536,283.41 from state aid, \$549,847.56 from local taxes (based on 10 1/2 mills) and \$208,000 from tuition (800 pupils at \$260). These figures will be revised as a result of last week's annexation elections.

The board also approved custodians' wages for the coming year, following the same policy for teachers in annual increments and some adjustments. The total amounts to \$92,000.

The buildings and grounds committee recommended removal of the vacant Gonzales home on 24th St. and the former Ver Beek and Leo Loew houses near Washington street. After removal of the latter two houses, the Washington school playground will be extended on the south side of 11th St.

The board approved bills amounting to \$168,595.89 including teachers' salaries in July and August.

President A.J. Cook presided at the meeting which got off to a late start because of the school election in the building. Supt. Scott gave the invocation. The meeting adjourned at 10:48 p.m.

## Rotary Speaker Calls Airport 'Inadequate'

James D. Ramsey of Lansing, director of the Michigan Department of Aeronautics, told members of the Holland Rotary Club Thursday noon that Park Township Airport is "inadequate."

Ramsey suggested the airport should be developed. He drew these conclusions after making a preliminary survey. Ramsey felt that if the airport was developed, federal aid would pay for 50 per cent and state aid 25 per cent. The balance would be paid by the local taxpayers.

The speaker felt that airport improvement would encourage business to settle in Holland. James Hallan, program chairman, introduced Ramsey. A total of 50 Rotarians and one guest attended the meeting.

## State Order May Close County Jail

GRAND HAVEN (Special) — First matter of business at a meeting of the Ottawa County Board of Supervisors June 24 will be a new jail for the county.

Board Chairman Martin Boon made this abundantly clear following a meeting Tuesday with the buildings and grounds committee, the sheriff's committee, and William H. Nestle, state inspector of jails.

Nestle, who has issued many warnings previously on the need of a new jail or drastic remodeling of present quarters, told the group flatly that unless the board takes action "within a reasonable time" the jail in Grand Haven may be closed by court action.

Plans call for a new jail accommodating 50 to 55 prisoners. It probably would take until the middle of 1959 to finish plans and perhaps another year and a half for completion. Cost would be somewhere in the neighborhood of \$350,000.

Nestle made it clear he will recommend closing the jail if initial action is not taken immediately. Chairman Boon contends the present jail is outmoded and outdated and he feels it would be a big mistake to spend a lot of money remodeling or enlarging it. He will recommend to the board that a new jail be built.

## Drain Chief Demands Examination

ALLEGAN (Special) — The Allegan County drain commissioner Wednesday afternoon was arrested by Michigan State Police on the charge of accepting a bribe.

The commissioner, Darl R. Jennings, 30, of Allegan, demanded examination when arraigned in Allegan Municipal Court before Judge Dwight M. Cheever. He was released on payment of \$1,000 bond and ordered to appear in Municipal Court on June 17.

Michigan State Police Detective Victor Beck said the alleged offense occurred Wednesday morning near Hopkins. Jennings, he said, is in charge of letting out ditch and drainage contracts for the county.

According to Beck, Jennings demanded \$500 from Hudsonville drain contractor Willard Meyers in order to let a contract for cleaning and extending county drains.

Payment was made Wednesday with \$500 of marked money, Beck said. Meyers then went to Allegan County Prosecutor Chester Ray, who authorized a warrant for Jennings' arrest.

Ray, with Beck, State Police Detective Norwood Neinninger and State Trooper Richard Dalton then picked up Jennings.

According to Beck, the \$500 allegedly accepted as a bribe was found on Jennings' person and is being held as evidence.

Jennings, an announced Republican candidate for state representative from Allegan County, charged that his arrest was persecution because he is opposing incumbent Rep. Ben E. Lohman (R-Hamilton).

Jennings said the money was not a bribe, but funds for a lakefront development project he and Meyers were planning.

Last April, the county board of supervisors adopted a resolution calling on Jennings to render a complete account of the operations of his office since January 1957, when Jennings took over.

# Tornado Alert Passes Safely

A five-hour tornado alert in Michigan, including the Holland area, was lifted at 8:15 p.m. Tuesday with no tornado funnels sighted in this area.

The warning went into effect at 3:15 p.m. and covered a broad, 120-mile belt running diagonally across the state from southeast to northwest.

During the alert, Holland reserve policemen manned the tornado headquarters radio control room on the second floor of the police station, which serves as the clearing center for all communications during an emergency.

Civil Defense personnel were also on duty at the radio control room, in direct contact with the Civil Defense unit at the Red Cross headquarters. From the Red Cross building there is direct contact with the weather bureau at Muskegon.

Ottawa County deputies, on watch in the tower at the old Coast Guard station, and Holland police and reserve police on duty at the watching station near Lake-town Township Park, reported in to the radio control room each half hour, and these reports were relayed to the weather bureau at Muskegon.

Following the alert, the local forces received a note of thanks from the head meteorologist at Muskegon for their reports.

Ottawa County deputies also manned the post at the water tower on 29th St.

The Red Cross provided coffee and sandwiches for the men at all posts in the area during the alert.

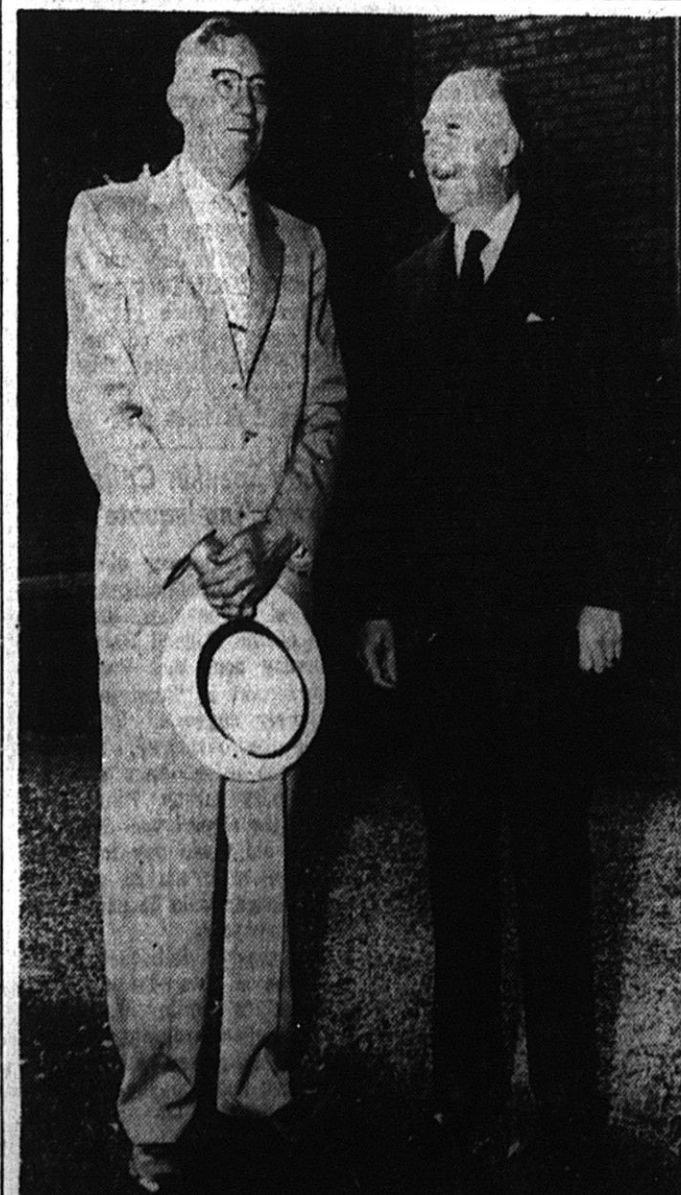

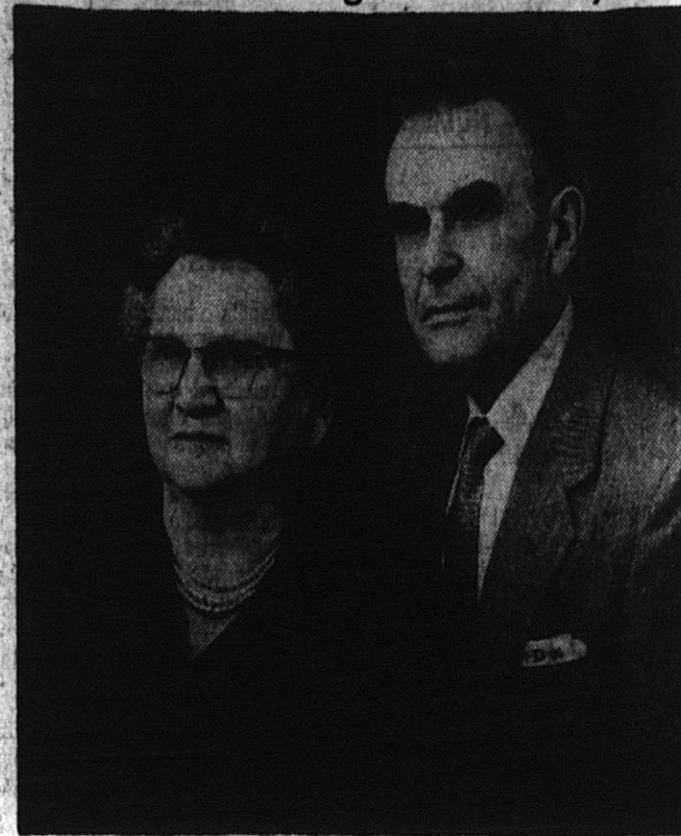

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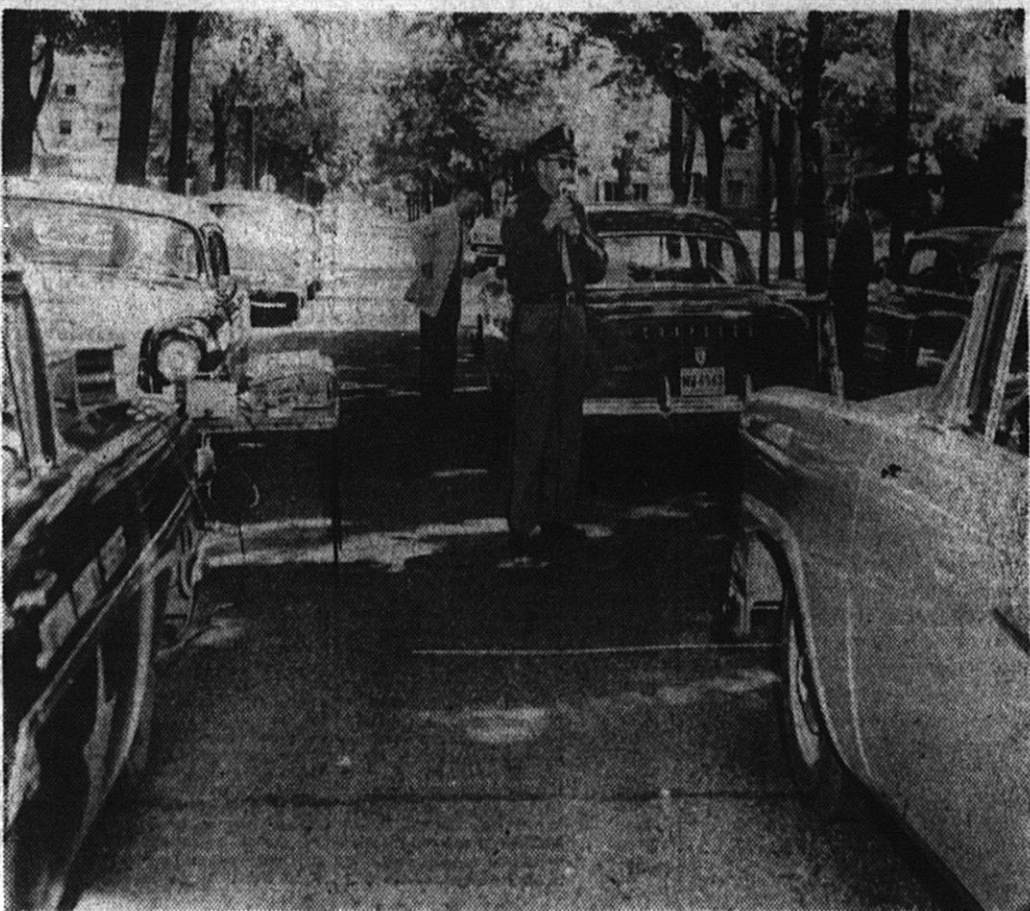

## Grand Haven Mall to Open On June 12

**GRAND HAVEN (Special)** — Today work will commence on the mall which will be in operation in Grand Haven from June 12 to 18, on Washington St., between 1st and 3rd Sts. Construction workers and decorators will move in on that day with all their equipment so that the play areas, stands, stage and tree and floral arrangements will be completed for the opening day.

Work on three new downtown parking areas is being rushed to completion in time for the opening. One is behind the Armory between 1st and 2nd Sts.; another is the former "boneyard" property on 1st between Washington and Franklin Sts., and the third is an "L" shaped space between Columbus and Washington, with entrances on Columbus and 2nd Sts.

This mall is being tried out in a long range program recommended by the City Planning Commission for downtown development, and conceived by Robert Van-Hoef of Muskegon, consultant of the commission, former Grand Haven resident.

The idea is to circulate traffic around the downtown business section, leaving Washington St. open to foot traffic. It will also give merchants an opportunity to display their merchandise out of doors.

There will be supervised play areas for children in the street so that parents can enjoy their shopping in a more leisurely manner. The experiment is made possible by six public parking lots, which will accommodate 245 cars. Private parking lots in and adjacent to the area will provide enough parking space for another 205 cars, according to Jack Reichardt, chairman of what is known as "Projection 60".

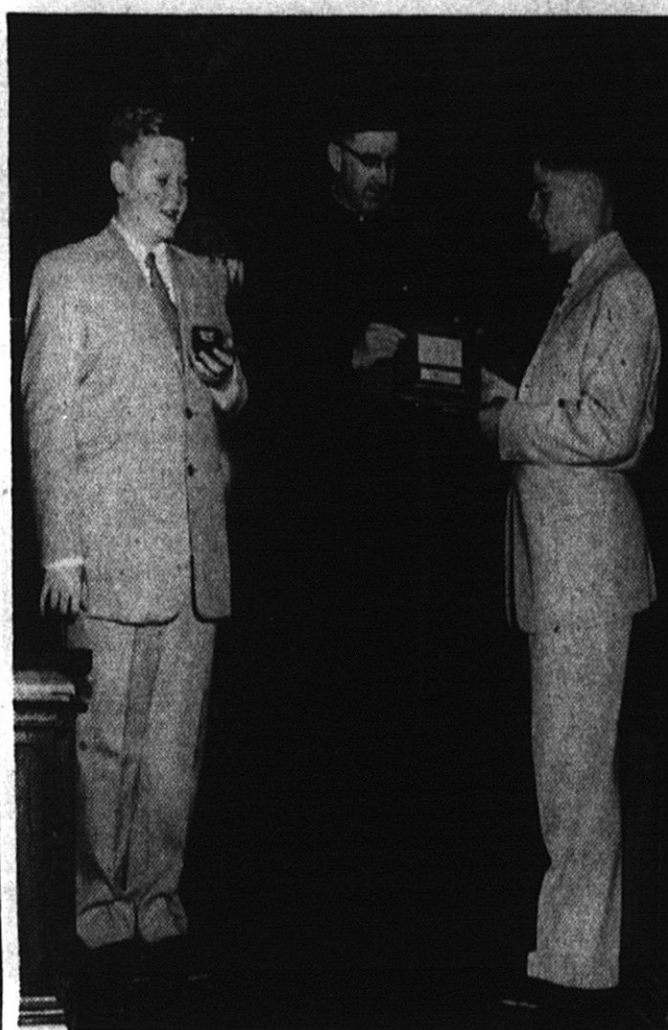

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## LAW OF AVERAGES

## ON SMALL CARS

That famous "law of averages" is a wonderful thing. You can prove or disprove almost as many things by the use of it as you can by citing texts from the Bible.

Here, for instance, is a vice president of one of the "Big Three" in the automotive field who proves to his own satisfaction, by using the law of averages, that the big cars are cheaper for Americans than the little ones are for drivers of other countries.

The average American worker, so his argument goes, gets such high pay that at 14 miles to the gallon he rides more cheaply than a foreign worker, at that worker's much lower pay, does who gets 35 miles from his small car job.

The British auto worker - still in line with the vice president's argument - if he can afford to buy a small car, "would travel approximately 39 miles on the amount of gas he could buy for one hour's pay." Under similar conditions the "American car worker, at his higher take-home, would travel approximately 94 miles, or nearly two and a half times as far as the British worker, on the gas he could buy for an hour's pay."

The argument is a little complicated at this point and it is not too easy to spot any fallacies in it. But the vice president's conclusion is comforting for the big car manufacturers. It boils down to the assertion that Americans not only want cars that are "long, low, fancy, big and powerful," but such cars are (for the average American) actually cheaper to own and to run.

The catch in this vice presidential argument is that there may be millions of potential car buyers who are not "average." Not nearly everybody has the take-home pay that the industrial workers enjoy. The automobile vice president appears to have judged the American people by the assembly line worker his company pays.

The popularity of the small car of foreign make seems to show that there are plenty of car buyers who do not consider themselves "average," who do not despise that 39 miles to the gallon, or whatever mileage they can get out of their means of transportation.

The automobile vice president who advanced the argument of the "average man" seemed to suggest that the American motor manufacturers need not consider the small car as an addition to their line, that they should stick to the needs of the "average man." But what about the thousands, perhaps millions, who are not in any sense "average" as to income. The argument may be convincing to the manufacturers, but the number of small cars on the road seems to prove that there are enough un-average buyers to cause the automotive engineers to think again. The price of everything today must enter into every phase of our way of life.

Government waste of our tax dollar is a large item. This is a good time to write your elected officials.

This is the time for us taxpayers to start our campaign.

No money for State Maps, but there are more than five thousand more people on our State payroll in the last few years according to one of the commissioners.

## Sunday School Lesson

Sunday School Lesson

The Times of the Judges  
Judges 2:16-19; Judges 4:4-9;  
Judges 5:6-9

The history of Israel is marked by faithfulness and faithfulness. One truth the Bible plainly teaches and that is that it seems so easy to go backwards and to deteriorate morally and spiritually. The history of Israel shows that the nation had a tendency to wander away from God.

I. It does not pay to forsake God. The Israel that conquered Canaan was disciplined and faithful. The unbelievers and grumblers had died in the wilderness—God could not use them. In time the generation that conquered Canaan died and another generation arose. Scripture says that "the people served the Lord all the days of Joshua, and all the days of the elders who outlived Joshua...."

And all that generation also were gathered to their fathers; and there arose another generation after them, who did not know the Lord or the work which he had done for Israel" (Judges 2:10).

Why did this happen? Who failed? Who was to blame? Perhaps this new generation looked upon their predecessors as old-fashioned. So they "went after other gods" and "forsook the Lord, and served the Baals and the Ashtaroth" and they allowed themselves to be misled by their pagan neighbors.

The conduct of Israel angered God and he "gave them over to plunderers, who plundered them" and he "sold them into the power of their enemies round about, so that they could no longer withstand their enemies" and hence "they were in sore straits." "And when the nation was in trouble it called upon God. We do likewise today. God heard their cries and "raised up judges who saved them out of the power of those who plundered them." When they were delivered from their enemies they turned away from God again and worshiped idols.

The Israelites were shepherds when they came into Canaan where they had to farm. The Canaanites were farmers who worshiped Baal, the god of fertility. These Canaanites taught Israel to farm and to worship idols. Israel was not strong enough to resist the temptation to idolatry.

II. One inspiring leader can accomplish much. The prophetess Deborah was such a leader. Jabin, king of Canaan had an army equipped with nine hundred chariots of iron. He oppressed Israel for 20 years. The oppression made Israel call upon God. Deborah judged Israel sitting under a palm tree in the hill country of Ephraim. She was a brave patriot with a militant conscience who kept the fires of patriotism burning in the hearts of some people. Sometimes when men fail a woman comes to the rescue.

Deborah summoned a man to lead an army. Balak responded to the call with the understanding that Deborah would assist. The two made a great team. Balak gathered together an army of ten thousand. The soldiers had meager weapons but great leaders and a confident spirit and God was on their side. Jabin's army was defeated and his general killed by a woman. It was God who made the victory possible. The Bible tells us that God sent rain and storm and the river Kishon overflowed its banks and the iron chariots and the horses got stuck in the swamp and mud and were finally swept away by the rushing waters of the river. The chariots which should have given the Canaanites the victory was their undoing. The enemies of Israel were scattered because God interfered.

The way of the transgressor is hard—this truth the Book of Judges makes clear. Observe how this lesson speaks of sin, judgment and grace. When any one turns away from sin and turns to God with a penitent spirit he can be sure of pardon. God however is pleased when people serve him with a steadfast heart and with unswerving loyalty.

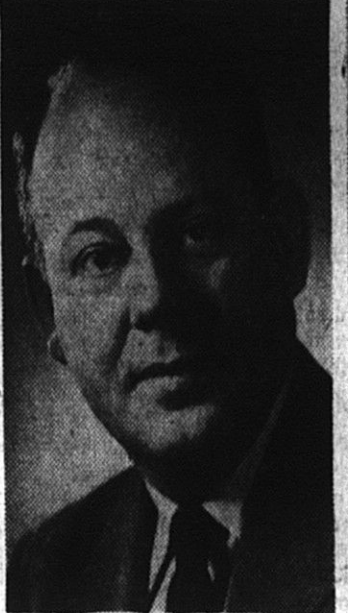

## Program Materials At Library

Program chairmen, church workers and others who are active in local clubs and organizations will find practical programming assistance in the 1957 edition of "Educational Film Guide," which has been added to the Holland Public Library, according to librarian Hazel Hayes.

More than 18,000 16mm. educational films are listed in the 1954-1957 annual supplements and the 1953 basic volume of the guide, the librarian said, including thousands of films that are available on a free loan basis. The Educational Film Guide is considered to be the most comprehensive guide to 16mm. films available for purchase, rent or free loan.

Films can be obtained on a wide range of subjects, including adult education, Christian life, the family, history, mental health, nature study, photography, sports and hundreds of other topics.

The latest edition is arranged in three parts: first an alphabetical title and subject index, then a list arranged by subject according to the Dewey Decimal system — which groups all the film titles on the same subject together — and concluding with a directory of sources from which the films may be rented, purchased, or obtained on free loan.

Included with the title of each film is the name of the producer or distributor, the running time, age level suitability, the cost for rental or purchase, and whether the film is black and white or color, and whether it is sound or silent.

A five-year 1954-1958 revised cumulation of the "Educational Film Guide" will be published this fall.

Of special interest to teachers in their audio-visual programs is the latest edition of the "Educators Guide to Free Films," which can be used in the reference room of the Holland public library. This manual indexes by title, subject and source, 3,800 free films, and contains many valuable cross references to films in related fields.

The library also subscribes to the Michigan State Library Film Circuit, which makes available each month four educational and entertaining films. Patrons may borrow these films free of charge and may reserve them at the circulation desk. Ask to see the advance bookings of the Michigan State Library films the next time you visit the Holland Public Library.

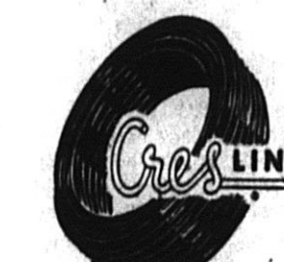

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## New Project Starts Here Next Fall

Collaborative Efforts Will Select Gifted Children on 3 Levels

The Holland Youth Development Project, a program of research and experimentation of education teachers of the kindergarten, for gifted children, will get under way in the fall of 1958, it was announced today by Dr. Robert F. De Haan, chairman of the department of psychology at Hope College.

The Holland Youth Development Project is first of a five-year program of educational experimentation designed to improve the education of gifted children in the community through the collaborative efforts of Hope College, the Holland Public Schools, Christian Schools, and Catholic Schools. At the same time, a special research study will be made of how leadership qualities and abilities in children can be best developed.

The first year will focus at the kindergarten, fourth and ninth grade levels. The pupils to be directly benefited by the project will be those with high intellectual capacity, those with personal, social, and moral traits needed by future leaders, and those with special talents in art, crafts, writing, music, drama and mechanics.

Beginning in September, 1958, all children in the kindergarten, fourth and ninth grade levels will be studied intensively to discover those with the highest mental capacities, leadership potential and other special talents. The screening will be done by personnel from Hope College and the school systems.

During the school year of 1958-59, a special in-service education program will be established for fourth and ninth grade levels. This program is designed to help the teachers do their part in discovering gifted children in their own classrooms and help them devise special educational experiences for gifted children who have been selected. The program will begin with a full day session just before the beginning of the fall semester and will continue with periodic meetings. Hope College and the school systems will provide the leadership for the in-service education program. Consultant help will be obtained from neighboring universities whenever needed.

In the second year of the project, the original pupils will have moved ahead one year and the project will continue with their new teachers at the first, fifth and ninth grade levels. Meanwhile, the teachers at the kindergarten, fourth and ninth grade levels will continue to put into effect, practices and procedures which they had developed in the first year of the project. Thus in a period of five years, the schools will have systematically discovered the gifted children, trained the teachers to work with them, and developed educational programs best suited to develop their potential at all grade levels.

The project is meant to supplement the already excellent education being offered by the schools and other agencies in Holland. Programs such as the foreign language program in the elementary schools and the science seminar at the high school level will continue to operate as before.

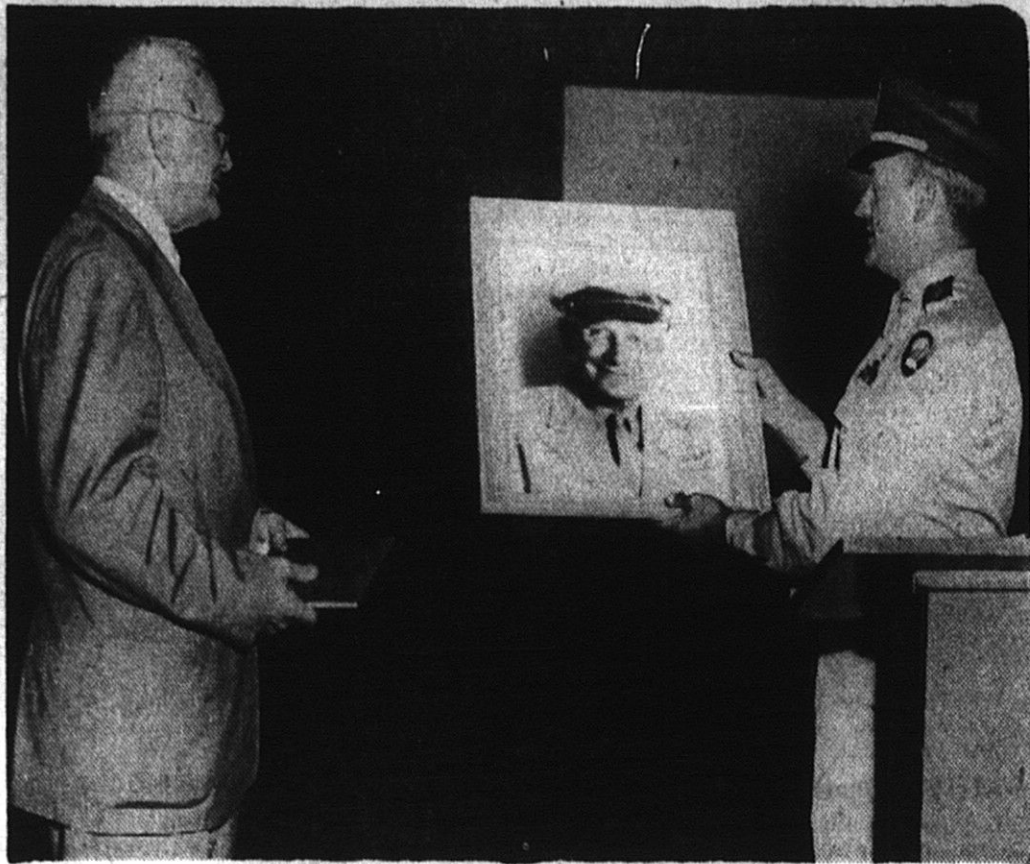
Each school will be allowed to operate autonomously within the overall project design, at the same time sharing their experiences with the educators from all the schools. It is expected that this interchange of ideas will be mutually advantageous.

This project grew out of three converging interests. The first is the perennial concern of the three school systems in Holland to provide a more effective educational program for all its students, especially the gifted children. The second is the special interest of the chairman of the department of psychology of Hope College to explore further into the nature of social leadership and the ways in which young people can be aided in developing qualities of leadership. The third source of interest is the desire of the educators of the schools and of the college to work together for their mutual benefit.

The idea of a research-development project was initially presented and favorably received by a group from all the school systems at an exploratory meeting called by Hope College Sept. 27, 1957. The meeting led to the formation of a central planning committee made up of representatives from the three school systems and Hope College. The various boards of education gave tentative approval and the planning committee began meeting regularly to design the structure of the project and to evolve a working plan. A final statement of the project was drawn up and presented to the initial planning group and to the various boards of education. Authority was given to proceed with the project.

The plan was then submitted for review to the administrators of the three school systems in May. Likewise, the project was described to the kindergarten, fourth and ninth grade teachers and their part in the program was discussed.

At the present time, plans for the project are moving ahead on several fronts. A committee of teachers, administrators and Hope College personnel has just been appointed to the in-service education sessions to be held next school year. Another committee is pulling together the tests and instruments to be used for screening the gifted children next fall. A third com-

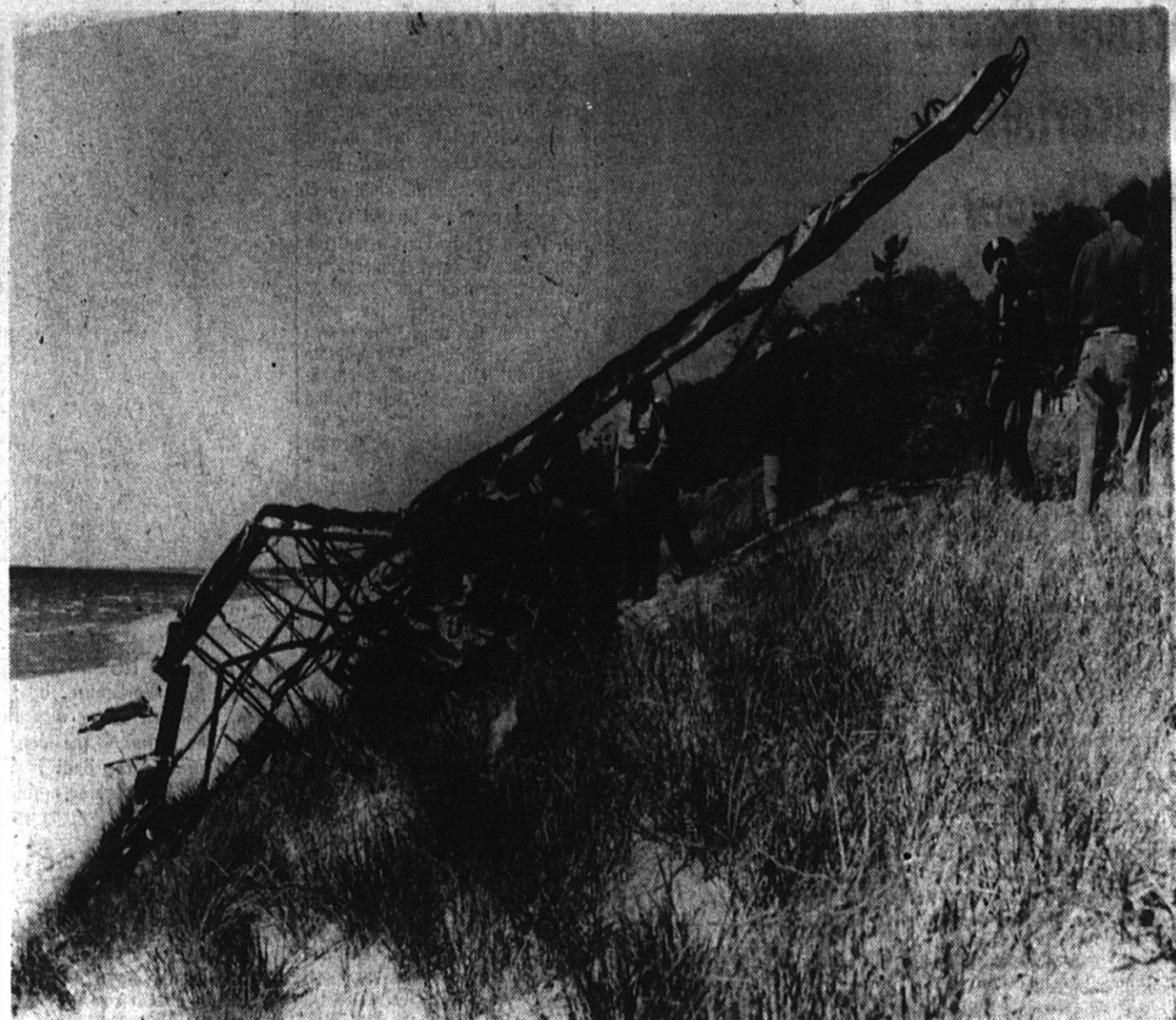

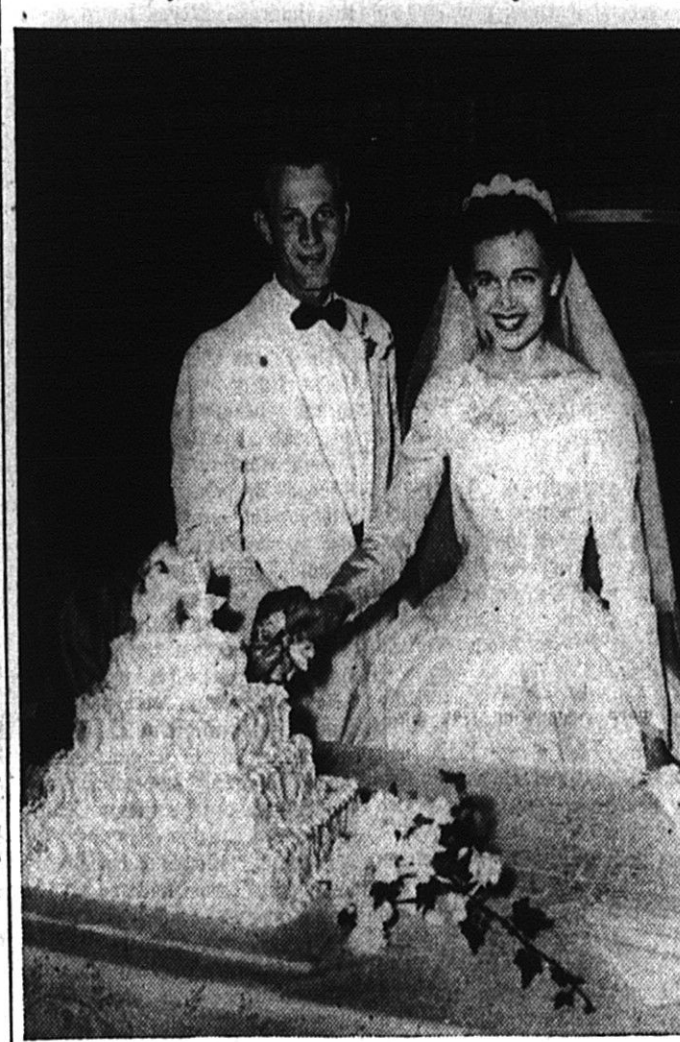

## School Board Welcomes 9th Graders

### Program Under Study For Representation By Annexing Area

The Board of Education Monday night joined Supt. Walter W. Scott in welcoming the new ninth graders of schools in the three newly annexed areas into the school system next September.

Wendell A. Miles, recommended some arrangement whereby the board will work with representatives of the new districts and Board President Alvin J. Cook referred the matter to the schools committee, consisting of Dr. Lester J. Kuyper, Mrs. John K. Winter and Miles. Since Kuyper and Mrs. Winter are retiring from the board, this study will be their last official duty for the board. Plans call for a special meeting to be held before July.

Miles commended Mayor Robert Visscher and City Council for their action in arranging to have a representative from each of the annexed areas serve as ex-officio members of City Council during the transitional period.

"We are all pleased that these three areas have annexed to Holland, but this move imposes obligation as well as opportunity and it is most important to disseminate and understand the different views," Miles said in suggesting special representation. It was pointed out that the Holland board has been working closely with boards of pending districts for five or more years.

Supt. Scott said Earl Borlace of the Junior high faculty had gone to the Apple Ave., Maplewood and Montello Park schools Wednesday to talk with the new ninth graders and to counsel them in their selection of subjects next fall. Scott also pointed to the need of solving a great number of problems on the legal, financial and policy fronts, and he paid tribute to an excellent board of education and a hard working staff of teachers in working together for the right answers.

The administrative council consisting of school principals and other administrative personnel reported on its series of leadership conferences held the past year in which Dr. Clyde M. Campbell of Michigan State University served as resource person. Clifford Marcus of high school administration coordinated Monday night's report, assisted by Principal Jay W. Formosa speaking for the high school, Bernice Bishop for junior high, Harold Streeter for elementary schools and Ed Prins for the maintenance department. Margaret Van Vyven also spoke briefly on the general program which had leadership for its central theme of the year. Generally throughout the year, the theoretical and practical aspects of leadership were defined and analyzed and consideration was given to developing a list of personal qualities and characteristics important for leaders to possess.

The board paid special tribute to Dr. Kuyper and Mrs. Winter who are retiring from the board this year and midway in Monday's session. Supt. and Mrs. Walter Scott served coffee. The board's letter to Mrs. Winter called attention to her 10 years of faithful service, her faithful representation of the woman's point of view in board policies, and said she had been most helpful to the board in obtaining the best teachers possible when so few were available in certain fields.

The board's letter to Dr. Kuyper expressed regret that he was resigning because of his sabbatical leave from Western Seminary in order to study in the Holy Land and visit seminaries in The Netherlands. The board paid tribute to his exactness in keeping correct minutes, his good humor and his sense of perspective. Both members had served as board president, Mrs. Winter in 1953-54 and Dr. Kuyper in 1954-55.

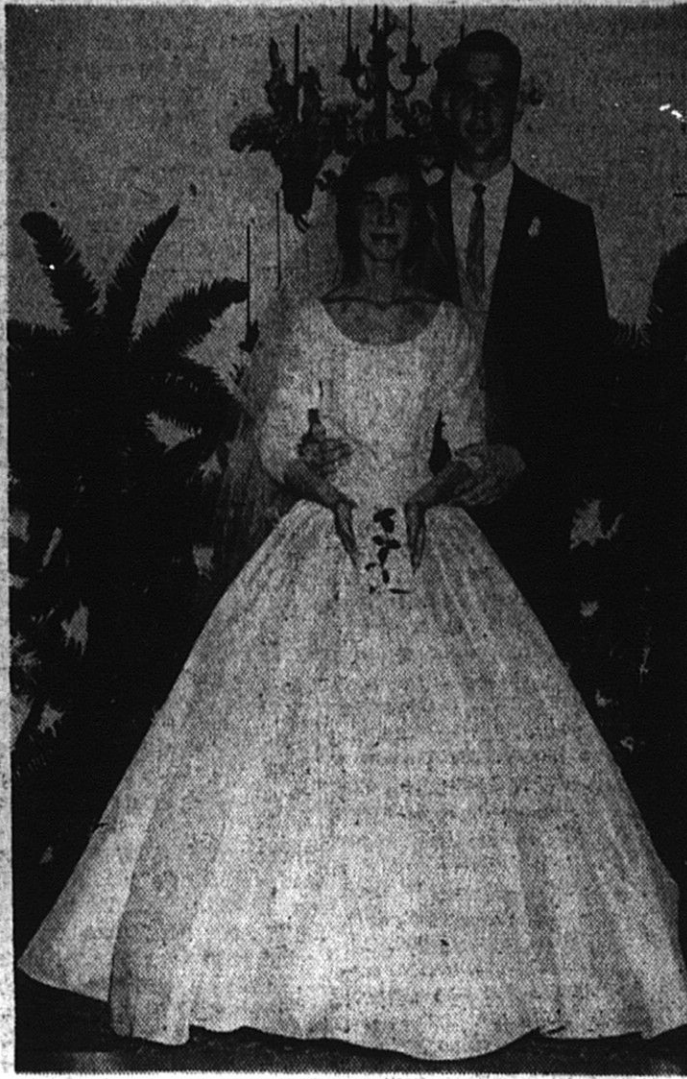

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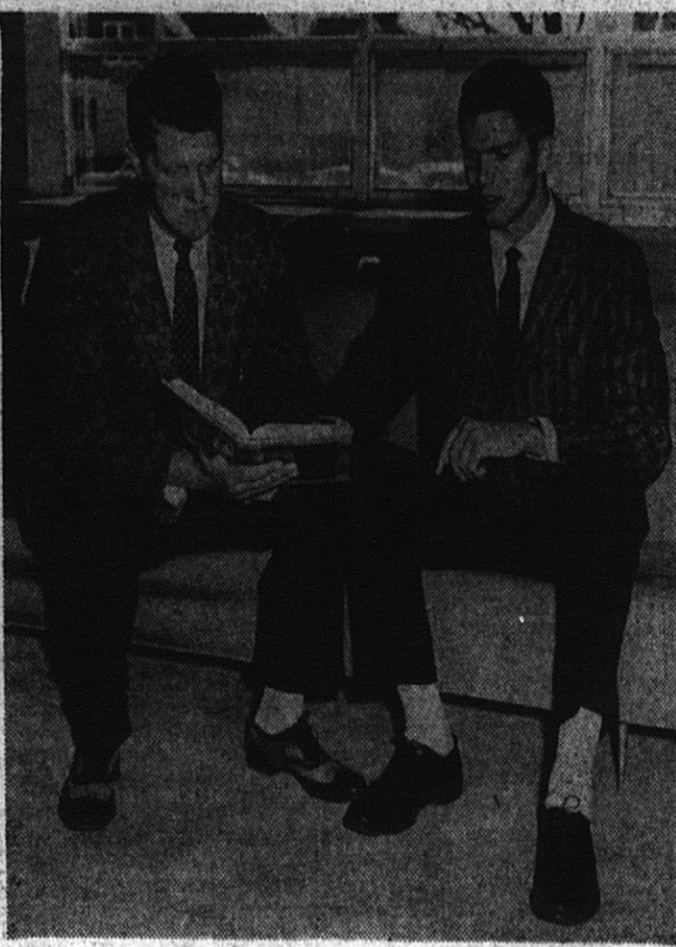
