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Board Hires New Visiting Teacher

Hiring a new visiting teacher for Holland public schools in the face of stringent cutbacks prompted by the May 10 defeat of special operating millage proved a difficult decision for the Board of Education Monday night, but the issue was finally approved following a long discussion and a searching study into the needs of the service.

Crux of the issue was that the cost of this teacher would be totally borne by outside money coming from special education funds of the state and county.

Nonetheless, board members felt public opinion important in such a move and listened intently to the new program as outlined by School Diagnostician Gene Scholten, Psychologist Robert De Haan of Hope College, and Principals Earl Borlace of E. E. Fell Junior High School, Harold Streeter of Washington School and T. J. Pruis of Montello Park School.

Mrs. Romana Swank, second grade teacher at Washington School, has indicated interest in this area of work, and because of her teaching experience and general ability to work with both students and parents in problem areas, she was recommended for the position. She will take some training before receiving a provisional certificate for the work, and later in the year will take special courses at Michigan State University for full certification by the end of June, 1963.

Scholten explained that the program might involve 20 to 40 students with behavior problems in which the visiting teacher would work with parents and agencies. He said elementary principals had sought this service for several years.

De Haan, speaking professionally, endorsed the program wholeheartedly. As for the Committee on Education Assistance of which he is a temporary co-chairman, he felt that insofar as the committee had studied and been advised that it would support the program.

Borlace, as junior high principal, said it is important to try to solve these problems in elementary school before the students reach junior high. He said he previously had served as visiting teacher and was aware of some of the problems. He added that parents whose children are in need of such help are generally the kind who do not attend PTA meetings. He said the primary difference between counseling on the secondary level and visiting teacher on the primary level is that the primary level works more with parents in the home.

Streeter said he had worked with Mrs. Swank for six years at Washington School and while he would be losing an excellent second grade teacher, he felt the board couldn't make a better choice and heartily endorsed her for the post.

Pruis said most everything had been covered in other talks and he heartily endorsed the program too.

Wendell Miles asked two questions. Of Dr. De Haan he asked what the likely figure of children needing help the first year would be. De Haan figured 30 to 45 and of Scholten how many children he felt needed help right now (30 to 40).

Robert Slocum pointed out that Mrs. Swank in the new post would be working as an intern at Holland Guidance Clinic, working with that agency in solving some children's problems.

Harvey Buter, who represented the Holland board on the special education group of the county, said he had had occasion to review the special education program in the county. He said Holland was fortunate to have a person who would receive accreditation. Some schools, he said, operate such services with teachers without proper certification and pay all expenses.

President Jack Plewes, while favoring a visiting teacher, expressed regret that the counseling programs in high school and junior high school had to be limited because of finances.

William Hinga, a high school counselor whose program was being curtailed, spoke highly of a visiting teacher for elementary levels.

Holland Man Will Head Synod

BUCK HILL FALLS, Pa.—General Synod of the Reformed Church in America Thursday afternoon elected Dr. Bernard Brunsting, pastor of First Reformed Church of Holland, Mich., as its president.

Dr. Brunsting, who was installed as pastor of the Holland church two months ago, had served as vice president the past year. He is a graduate of Central College, Pella, Ia., and Western Theological Seminary of Holland.

He is a member of the executive committee of the denomination and served on the editorial council of the Church Herald, the denominational organ. He has served on the Board of World Missions and is a member of the board of trustees of Northwestern College in Orange City, Ia.

At its commencement June 4, Central College conferred upon him a degree of Doctor of Divinity.

Dr. M. Verne Ogel, pastor of Community Church of Glen Rock, N. J., was elected vice president. He is a graduate of the University of Michigan and the New Brunswick Theological Seminary.

After serving the Reformed Church of New Paltz, N. Y., he served three pastorates in the Presbyterian Church USA, before going to Glen Rock in 1943.

Dr. Ogel has been an occasional contributor to Christian Century and to the Church Herald.

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He has served as chairman of the General Synod committee on the World Council of Churches. Wabash College conferred the degree of Doctor of Divinity on him in 1926.

Before coming to Holland, Dr. Brunsting served as pastor of First Reformed Church of Grand Haven, and Reformed churches in Bellflower and Canoga Park, Calif. He succeeds Dr. Norman Thomas, pastor of First Reformed Church of Albany, N. Y., as synod president.

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Crash Kills Local Man, Family Hurt

WHITE PIGEON — A Holland man was killed, and his wife and four children injured in a three-car crash on US-12 three miles west of here at 7:30 p.m. Sunday. Seven other persons were injured.

The victim, Richard Stanley Tobias, 38, of 84 West 29th St., died two hours later in Sturgis Memorial Hospital.

Tobias' wife, Mary, 36, is listed in fair condition at Sturgis Hospital. Officials said she suffered a fractured lower vertebra and possible head and internal injuries.

The Tobias children, Marcia, 15, Linda, 14, Kathleen, 11 and Ruth Ann, 7, were treated at Sturgis Hospital and released to the care of a Sturgis minister.

Tobias was the driver of the family car. Another driver, Ora Warren, 58, of Constantine, Mich., was transferred from Three Rivers Hospital to a hospital in Elkhart, Ind., in critical condition.

The driver of the third car, George Dewells, 38, of Fort Wayne, Ind., and his wife, Betty, 33, were both reported in good condition at the Three Rivers Hospital.

Dewells' sons Edward, 9, Clifford, 4, and Donald 1 1/2, and a daughter, Sandra, 6, were discharged.

charged after treatment at Three Rivers Hospital. A passenger with Warren, Lewis Bradley, 40, of Elkhart, Ind., is in fair condition at Sturgis with a broken arm, possible internal injuries, and shock.

State Police of the White Pigeon post said the crash occurred at the highway's intersection with Vista Rd. They said Warren, headed south on Vista Rd., crossed the highway in front of the westbound Tobias car.

After the impact with Warren's car, the Tobias auto spun into the eastbound lane, where it was struck by the Dewells' car. Troopers said several people were thrown from their cars.

The investigation is still proceeding, troopers said, but preliminary findings indicate that Warren failed to stop for a stop sign at the intersection.

Tobias was employed as a foreman in the winding room of the Holland General Electric Co. plant. The family was returning from Fort Wayne, Ind., where they had spent the weekend with their parents.

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Gargano and Schaafsma Elected to School Board

Incumbent John Plewes Is Defeated

Holland Board of Education will have two new members as a result of the annual election Monday which attracted 1,486 voters or about 15 per cent of the estimated registered vote of the district of 9,694.

Albert Schaafsma, a former high school teacher and former operator of the Du Saar photo and gift shop, led the field of four candidates with 972 votes, and William Gargano, program director for radio station WHTC, was second with 928 votes. Both positions are four-year terms.

Other candidates were incumbent John D. Plewes who received 393 votes and Dr. J. A. Lubbers, local dentist, 633 votes.

After the vote was announced at the June meeting of the board Monday night, Plewes said he had enjoyed his four years on the board and was glad to have worked with "a grand bunch of fellows" and since he was still very interested in education in Holland, he would be willing to do anything he could for the schools.

James Hallan, another board member who had not sought reelection, was grateful for his experiences the last 11 years on the board. He said he regretted leaving but school responsibilities should be something to be passed around to interested people.

Commenting on the so-called 30 days of criticism he said he was sorry the critics had not attended more meetings the last 11 years. If they had, he philosophized, they would not have become experts overnight.

Harry Frissel spoke for the board in bidding farewell to both members and thanked them for their contributions to community service.

Other elections follow:

West Ottawa
West Ottawa district reelected John Daniels to the board in an election which attracted 549 votes. Daniels received 425 votes. Next high was Cornelius Kalkman who received 193. Both are four-year terms. Kalkman will succeed Dr. J. Dyke van Putten who did not seek reelection. Other candidates were Mrs. Carl Schaftner, 186; James Corwin, 152, and Robert W. Fitzgerald, 110.

West Ottawa passed its 4.5 millage for special operating by a 4 to 1 majority, 437 to 111.

Van Raalte
Van Raalte district passed two millage issues, one a bond issue calling for 3.44 mills to finance a \$185,000 addition to the Holland Heights school and the other 3.8 mills for special operating. Vote on the bond issue was 162 to 140, and on the millage issue 165 to 138.

Louis N. Brunner with 259 votes was elected to a three-year term on the board and Earl D. Schipper with 191 votes was elected to a two-year term. The third candidate, William G. Oonk, received 91 votes. The district also voted to close the seventh and eighth grades, 265 to 38.

Maplewood
Donald Cochran and John Weeber were elected to three-year terms and Gary (Gerhardt) Beckman was elected to a one-year term in an election which attracted 751 votes. Cochran received 415 votes and Weeber 426 votes. Other candidates for three-year terms were Gradus Geurink, 317, and Richard Streun, 330. Beckman received 435 and his opponent, Andy Koeman, received 302 votes.

The district also voted 3 mills for special operating, 390 to 310.

Federal
John Baldwin and Roger Kratt were elected to three-year terms at the annual meeting of Federal School district which attracted about 75 persons. Baldwin received 36 votes and Kratt 34 votes. Other candidates were Jack Nieboer, 32; Kars Peterson, 26; Norman Boeve, 18.

Elmer Atman with 45 votes was elected to a two-year term. Ronald Westbroek received 26 votes.

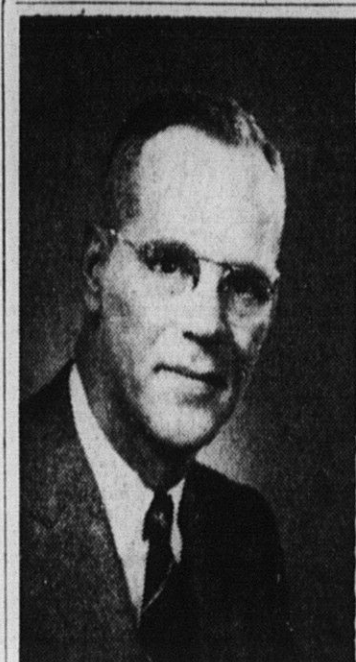
The district voted 1.31 millage for special operating, 60 to 13, and voters favored making Federal a registration district, 71 to 3.

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Youth Describes Fatal Shooting

ALLEGAN—William Warner, 18, of Saugatuck who admitted shooting his mother during an argument at their home on April 26, described events leading up to the shooting during a two-hour hearing before Circuit Judge Raymond L. Smith in Allegan Wednesday.

At the conclusion of the hearing Judge Smith said he "would take the matter under advisement." The Holland judge, after studying the testimony, will determine the degree of murder and after a pre-sentence investigation hand down the sentence.

Warner had pleaded guilty, through his attorney Gordon Cunnephe.

When he was 15, Warner said, he was told to leave home. He said he got a job and went to Chicago Vocational School at night. His mother had changed the locks on the doors and told the landlady to call the police if Warner returned. He had been nabbed by police when he tried to return home, he said.

When his mother moved to Michigan, Warner told a full year of school. He said he got along well with students at Saugatuck High School and had become interested in the high school science club. He won two science fair awards early this year for rocket exhibits.

Warner and his mother had argued several times over an old automobile he had tried to restore to running condition. He said he had had a "bad argument" with his mother on April 25, one day before the fatal shooting over the car and that she had told him to get out of the house.

Warner said he grabbed his school clothes and walked three or four miles to a friend's house where he spent the night.

When he returned home from school the afternoon of April 26, the rear screen door had been latched from the inside so he could not get into the house. He said he broke a pane of glass from the front door in order to get into the house.

He said he had done the housework, which he always did on Thursday, before his mother came home at 6 p.m. and began scolding him for breaking the window. The ensuing argument had resulted in his mother's death. Warner said he had never struck his mother prior to that time.

State police detective Charles Long of the South Haven post also related the incidents of the fatal shooting for the court. Long said — once in the face from a distance of 10 to 12 feet and once in the back of the head from four or five feet away.

Long said he had been assigned to the case May 2, following a report by Saugatuck Police Chief Gerald Kok that Mrs. Warner was missing. Long said Warner, on May 3, told police he had a fight with his mother, that she had cut him with a knife while he was cleaning his rifle on the kitchen table and that he then shot her.

Warner said he took his friends home again at about 10 p.m. and then disposed of his mother's body. Warner could not recall his father, whom he said he had not seen since he was two years old. When asked his father's name, he replied, "Joseph. I think."

Warner said he had spent his school years in boarding schools.

He said he had argued frequently with his mother since he was about 12 years old about his friends and money he made peddling papers. He did housework and tried to save money for college. His mother had accused him of not helping out around the house, he said.

Racing Homer Pigeons Have Several Long Races

Racing homers from several lofts will be competing Saturday in the 400-mile race from Bowling Green, Ky., to Holland in one of the eight old bird races staged by the Holland Racing Homer Club this year.

Other races remaining on the calendar include a 500-mile race from Nashville, Tenn., Friday, June 29 and the season's finale, a 600-mile race from Memphis, Tenn., July 6.

Old birds are defined as yearlings and older. Wayne Overbeek, who has been racing homers for several years, reports racing homers are at their best between the ages of three and six years.

Training the homers to race starts when the birds are young. They are taken from the loft, placed in a training box and then released from the box.

The birds are first sent on races of one mile. This is followed by two miles, then five miles, 10, 15, 20, 30 and 50 miles.

Young bird training starts when the birds are about three months old. The training flights start this season July 11 with a flight from New Richmond.

This will be followed with flights July 14 from Fennville; July 18, from Pullman; July 21, from Bangor; July 25, from Lawrence and July 28 from Dowagiac.

The first young bird race will be Aug. 4 from Elkhart, Ind.; a distance of 80 miles. Homers competing in this race are between five and six months old.

A charity race from Indianapolis, Ind., (210 miles) and a one bird special race will be held Sept. 1 to climax the young bird season. Proceeds of the race will go to a Holland charity.

Old bird training was held during April and May. During this year's training, handled by Overbeek, Jarvis Ter Haar, Paul Veele, Laverne Barkel, Lavern De Jonge and Harold Driesenga, the birds were taken on jaunts of 20, 34 and 55 miles from Pullman, Bangor and Dowagiac.

The birds have been transported to Indiana and will be transported to the Kentucky and Tennessee starting points by the Woodland Racing Home Club of Grand Rapids.

Races were from Elkhart, Warsaw (110) and Marion, Ind. (155) last month and from Indianapolis last week.

When the birds return from the race, they fly directly into the coop and a rubber counter is removed from one leg of each bird. The band is stamped with a registered number and the band is put into a timing clock.

The race is capitated on yards per minute right to each loft. The number of miles and the elapsed time is used to determine the yards per minute.

Since the various lofts are located in several spots in and around Holland, the times are checked to determine the exact winner. Frequently the birds finish seconds apart.

Henry Berghof's pigeon won the 322-mile race from Louisville, Ky., last Saturday covering the distance in seven hours and four minutes.

Berghof's bird finished one hour ahead of the rest of the birds. Other finishers were birds owned by Ter Haar, Fritz Kliphuis, Veele, Cal Nykamp, Barkel, De Jonge and Driesenga.

Mrs. Della Arkema, 79, Dies After Heart Attack

GRAND HAVEN — Mrs. Della Arkema, 79, of 523 Pennoyer Ave., died in Municipal Hospital Thursday night. She had been battling when stricken with a heart attack and died shortly after admittance to the hospital.

She was born in Grand Haven and was the widow of Henry Arkema, who was formerly with the Grand Haven Tribune and later owned and operated the Franklin Press. He died in 1942. She was an active member of the Second Reformed Church.

She is survived by one sister, Mrs. Reyer Beekman of Grand Haven and a brother-in-law, John Schroeder of Grand Rapids; also several nieces and nephews.

You take an old bicycle frame and turn it upside down.

Then you reverse the sprocket and the front-end steering shaft. Take some pieces of half inch pipe; weld a two-foot extension onto the handlebar shaft, and a tripod standard to put the saddle on.

Then put the wheels in the forks in the regular way, run the chain from the sprocket to the rear wheel, tighten the wheel nuts, and you're all set to ride—if you can climb on.

Isn't it hard to ride? "No," says Rod, "once you're up there. And that's not too hard, either."

He demonstrated. But it did look hard, to someone who isn't used to it.

Dangerous? "Well," says Rod, "getting down off it is a bit tricky. You don't want to ride one much where there's traffic and you have to stop a lot. Still, my brakes are good, and I can stop fast if I have to, and usually get down all right."

In fact, Rod admitted with an engaging grin taking hold of his freckled face set off by light blond hair, "I haven't fallen off yet."

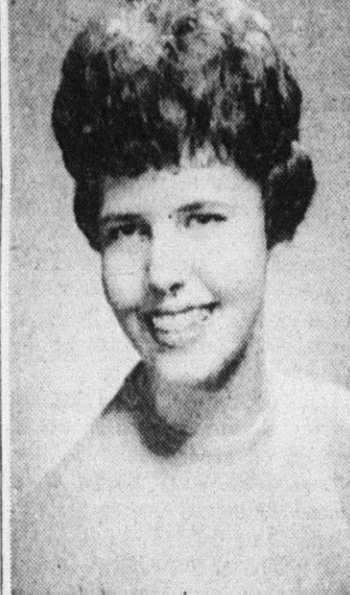

As part of the orientation, Jaehning has been asked to do some research into the history of Nigeria during its colonial period, to lecture to the 10 other Experimenters going to the country. Each member of the groups is reading up on a phase of the country's culture to be an "ambassador" at the orientation.

In the meantime, there are decisions as to packing, transportation from Holland to Vermont, some interviews with other people who have been to the country, and, of course, the seemingly interminable string of inoculations against tropical diseases.

Within the past few weeks, Jaehning has been immunized against smallpox, yellow fever, typhoid, typhus, polio, tetanus, and cholera. He'll get a gamma globulin inoculation just before he leaves, and take along some medicine to guard against malaria.

A Hope College student, Sentinel reporter and staff announcer for WHTC, Jaehning will find himself among interesting company. In the group going to Nigeria are several students of political science, history teachers, a woman accountant, a first grade teacher, a college chaplain, and a young Negro woman who has been arrested six times in Houston, Texas, as a sit-in demonstrator.

Beula Kampen, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Albert Kampen of 45 Lawrence St., Zeeland, chosen alternate to this year's Ambassador, has undertaken to go abroad on her own, through the Experiment program.

Miss Kampen will go as an experimenter to Belgium. She is due in Brattleboro for orientation on July 4. The two local experimenters will travel together to the eastern states.

Wolverine is jointly owned by Cities Service Oil Co., Shell Oil Co. and Texaco, Inc.

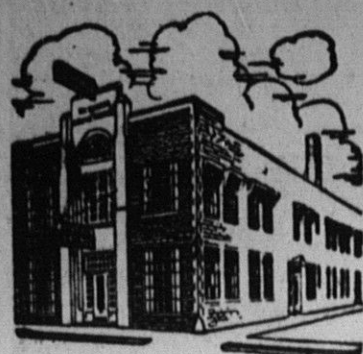

Sunday School Lesson

Sunday, June 17
The Praise of the Redeemed
Revelation 7:9-17
By C. P. Dame

Many Christians turn away from the Book of Revelation because they think it is clothed in mystery. When you read this book remember that it was written to and for persecuted believers who needed encouragement. During all past ages Christians faced difficulties and words of encouragement helped.

1. A great multitude will be saved. Those who think that only a few people will get to heaven are mistaken. "After this I beheld, and lo, a great multitude, which no man could number." Recall also the words of Jesus, "And I will say unto you, That many shall come from the east and the west, and shall sit down with Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob, in the kingdom of heaven." (Matthew 8:11.)

Note also the variety in this multitude. It is composed of people "of all nations, and kindreds, and people, and tongues" — all races, colors, nationalities, tribes, cultures and let me add—the rich and poor, the learned and unlearned, the weak and the strong, the wise and the foolish comprise the multitude. The large number and variety of people reflect the universality of the church. The multitude of the redeemed is the sum total of the fruit of the mission work of all ages.

Observe too that this multitude stands before the throne, and the Lamb. The word "throne" suggests power and authority, the word "Lamb" speaks of sacrifice. The redeemed are in heaven because of the power of God and the sacrificial death of Christ, the Lamb of God. The redeemed are all dressed alike, in white and they all hold palms in their hands. The white robes speak of holiness and the palms of victory.

The redeemed have but one theme voice. They were glad to sing. The redeemed have but one theme —salvation. And they ascribe salvation to God who sitteth on the throne and to the Lamb. The saved have not a word to say about their own good works.

Worship is the passion of all the redeemed. They worship because they have been redeemed and have come out of the great tribulation —the word affliction gives the idea —and now they express their gratitude for their redemption wrought by Christ's atoning death which truth is stated in the words, "and have washed their robes, and made them white in the blood of the Lamb."

II. The future of God's people is glorious. Bear in mind that the book of Revelation was written for persecuted people. They will enjoy the abiding companionship of God —"and He that sitteth on the throne shall dwell among them." A new translation says, "will shelter them with His presence."

The joys of the future are described in negative and positive words. "They shall hunger no more, neither thirst any more; neither shall the sun light on them, nor any heat." The Lamb, who made atonement for their sins, shall be their shepherd and watch over them and lead them to living fountains of waters.

The words "and God shall wipe away all tears from their eyes" have comforted many. We know that even today God wipes away tears and heals broken hearts and mends lives. Christians have much to sing about now. They can look forward to much singing, laughter, rejoicing and thankfulness.

Deur-Nykamp Win State Class B Doubles Crown

Christian Misses Title By 1/4 Point

KALAMAZOO — Holland Christian's doubles team of Tom Deur and Randy Nykamp captured the state class B tennis doubles championship here Saturday afternoon by topping Kalamazoo University High's top combination in the finals played on the indoor courts of Kalamazoo college.

Freshman 5'6" Deur and sophomore Nykamp played beautiful tennis to stop the highly touted Kazoo team of Bob Engles and Ron Creager, 6-3, 6-3. In the semis the Christian combination also looked sharp in stopping the best of East Grand Rapids, the Irwin brothers, John and Win, in straight sets, 6-4, 7-5. The match was started outdoors on the Western Michigan University hard surfaced courts but rain forced the final game of the set indoors.

For the second straight year, the Maroons had to be content with a runnerup trophy for the team championship. Last year Christian lost the top spot by 1/2 point to champion Sturgis. This year the Maroons missed by 1/4 point compiling 5 1/2 points to 6 for winner University High. Finishing third in class B was Cadillac with 3 1/2 followed by East Grand Rapids, 2 1/2, Big Rapids, 2 1/4, Northville, 2, Port Huron St. Stephens, 1 1/4, Mason, 1. Six other class B schools, including defending champion, Sturgis, failed to score.

Hamtramck for the 13th time in 14 years walked off with the A crown, followed by Ann Arbor University High, Muskegon, the local regional champion finished third, Byron Hopma, the Holland regional singles champ lost in the finals to Bill Dixon of Ann Arbor U High, 6-2, 6-0.

Two Hamtramck doubles team fought it out for the A title. Andy Kozinski and Jim Novitsky whipped teammates Charles Brainard and Mark Renich, 6-4, 6-3. Galesburg-Augusta won the singles and doubles in Class C-D followed by Wayland and Kalamazoo St. Augustine.

Bill Hoard of GA defeated Joe McCulloch of Ypsilanti Roosevelt, 8-6, 6-0 in the finals and Jack Campbell and Jim Peters, the GA doubles team, trimmed Jim McGuire and Kurt Spaulding of St. Augustine, 6-2, 6-1.

Phil Campbell of Cadillac repeated as the class B singles champion, stopping Tom Long of Northville, 6-2, 6-0 in the finals. Coach Clare Pott reported that the only set that Campbell lost on his way to the crown was the 6-4 decision to Christian's Don Kromeyer in the quarter-finals. Kromeyer became ill in the second set and was forced to default his match to the B champion.

Pott said an unfortunate draw may have kept his team from winning the team championship for the third time in the last nine years. "It's one of those things that you cannot do anything about, but the tournament scoring has been a controversial issue for many years," he said. He referred to the tournament rules of not awarding any points for first round byes, thus limiting a team's potential to score enough points to win a championship.

"We are a perfect example of a bye stopping us from the crown," he said. "Deur and Nykamp, by virtue of the bye which is held in an open draw, could only play three matches to pick up points, while those teams not drawing byes were potentially able to play four matches. This makes a difference of 1/4 of a point in doubles and a 1/2 point in singles," he said. "In our case, it would have been enough to win." One other doubles team drew a first round bye.

Pott said that several changes in tournament scoring were studied and discussed in a meeting with Tournament Director George Acker Friday with participating coaches. He said several alternatives are being studied. One is to award the same number of points for byes as first round wins. Another is to award points for a first round bye, only if the team goes on to win its next match. Pott said he was in favor of the latter alternative.

The Christian coach was highly complimentary of the handling of the tournament by Acker and his Kalamazoo College staff. "They certainly did a wonderful job in running off the Saturday semi and final matches when rain forced them indoors," he said.

Air Force General Greeted At Grand Rapids Airport

The impact of the space age is keenly felt at the U.S. Air Force Academy, Brigadier General Robert F. McDermott, dean of the faculty at the academy, told newsmen on his arrival by Air Force plane Thursday afternoon at Kent County Airport in Grand Rapids.

Gen. McDermott who came to Holland to address the 79th annual commencement of Holland High School said the space age is a tremendous challenge to young men who aspire to top military training, and the new academy, in operation only since 1957, receives some 30,000 applications a year, more than the total of applicants to the other two academies.

These applications which are received by U.S. Representatives in Congress, are screened to 7,000 before the Academy takes over. This number then is screened to 750. After this year, the academy expects a full complement of 2,512, the same as West Point.

One change the space age has brought is that all cadets no longer must meet requirements for pilot, the general said, explaining that two-thirds of the men take pilot training and one-third take space training. He said that Astronauts would continue to receive training in both areas.

On his arrival at the airport, he was greeted by local school officials and by Mayor Nelson Bosman who presented him with a pair of wooden shoes, symbol of Holland's welcome to distinguished guests. The mayor was accompanied by his daughter, Susie, and Mary Slag, both wearing Dutch costumes.

School personnel at the airport were Lt. Col. Nicholas Dragash, assistant Supt. Robert Slocum and Vern Schipper of the Adult Education department. Also on hand were Lt. Col. Nicholas Dragash, active duty adviser of the 837th Grand Rapids Air Reserve Recovery Group; Lt. Col. John Gore, liaison officer coordinator for four Congressional districts; Col. Henry F. Smith, liaison officer for Col. Gore, and Capt. William R. Hill, field information officer for the area.

Gen. McDermott presented Supt. Scott with an air view color picture of the academy.

of the academy with Pike's Peak in the background. He said the academy the previous night had graduated 297 men including two Rhodes scholars. It was the fourth class of the academy, but the first sizeable graduating group.

Aside from previous visits to Selfridge Field, it was the general's first visit to Michigan, and his first opportunity to address a high school graduating class, although he has delivered college commencement addresses.

He spoke highly of Jerry Naber, a West Point graduate and former Holland man, who is an instructor at the Air Force academy. He said Jerry had briefed him well on his home town of Holland, Mich.

Miss Clark, an auburn-haired beauty who stands 5'5" tall and weighs 125 pounds, won over 11 other contestants in the pageant. Jacqueline Jan Kolean, an 18-year-old West Ottawa High School graduate, was named first runner-up, and 19-year-old Karen Lou Kolean, a student at Ferris Institute, was picked as second runner-up.

Third runner-up in the contest was Sandra Jane Munson, an 18-year-old Holland High School graduate, and fourth runner-up was Nancy Anne Loewy, a 20-year-old Hope College student. Miss Loewy also won the Miss Congeniality award.

Holland's first beauty pageant was enthusiastically received by local residents. Holland Jaycees, sponsors of the event, said 750 persons attended the contest. The high school auditorium seats 700 persons.

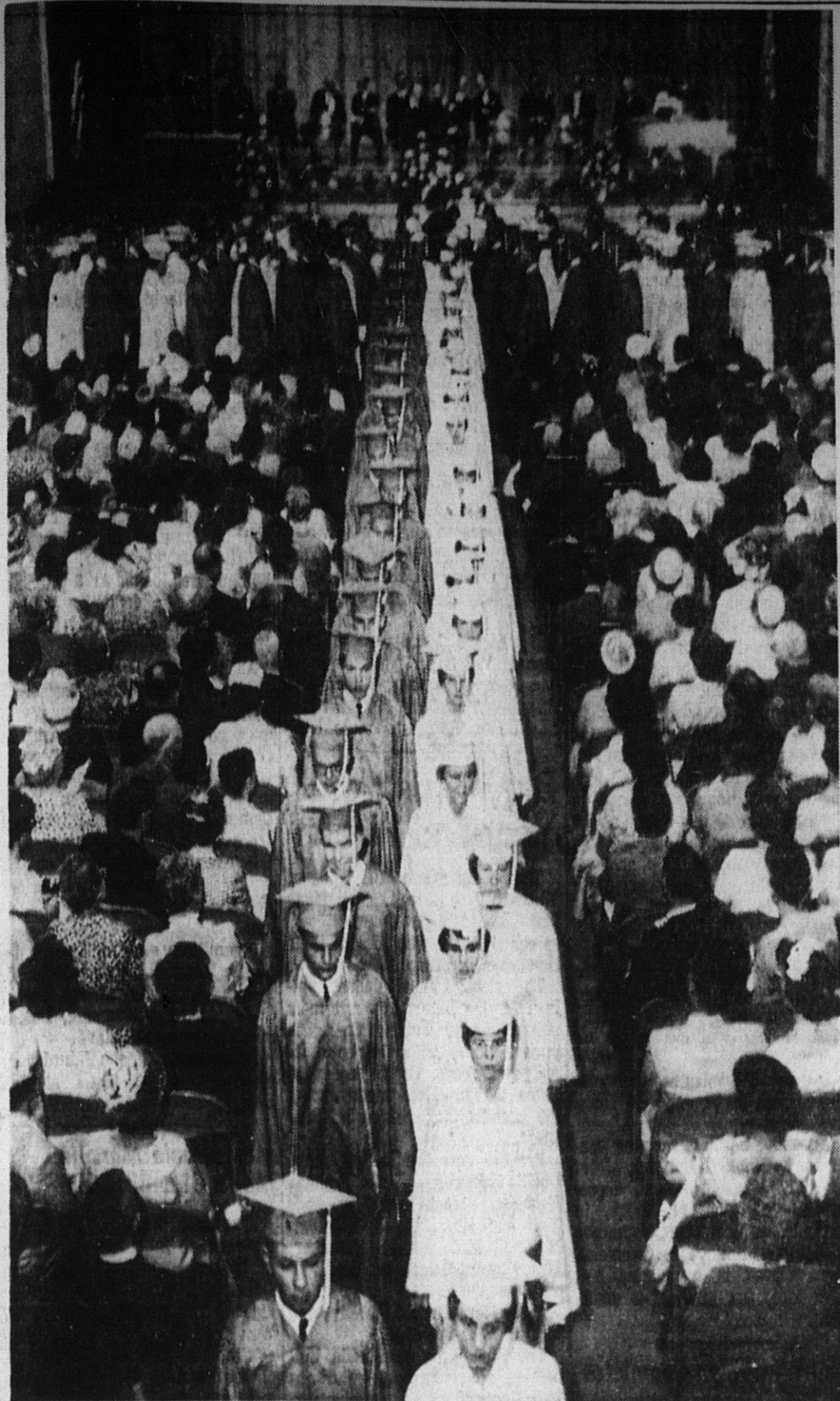

General's Talk Outlines Responsibility to Mankind

Speaking on the subject, "A Graduation Gift," Brigadier General Robert F. McDermott, dean of the faculty at the United States Air Force Academy at Colorado Springs, Colo., told the 1962 graduating class of Holland High School Thursday night in Civic Center that five senses of the mind and spirit are necessary to face the world today.

The first, he said, was a sense of responsibility, particularly responsibility towards mankind, and he quoted Luke 12:48, "For unto whomsoever much is given, of him much shall be required; and to whom men have committed much of him they will ask the more."

The free nations of the world and the oppressed peoples behind the Iron Curtain are looking to us for military, political and scientific leadership. In the Air Force and the other services we are aware of our share in this responsibility and we attempt to impress on our cadets the opportunities for constructive service they will have in a relatively new situation in American history. We are acutely aware that no two points on earth are more than 30 minutes apart in ballistic missile time.

"The peoples of the world are looking to us not only for political and military leadership but also for the moral, cultural and spiritual leadership of the world. In a sense, they are asking us to save mankind, and the responsibility for providing this leadership and meeting this demand will fall directly on you as educated citizens of the United States."

Gen. McDermott listed the second sense as a sense of duty, the hallmark of an officer in the American military tradition, a sense that embraces obedience, responsibility, integrity, perseverance, dedication and determination. "The hallmark of a good officer is also the hallmark of every good citizen. His success in whatever walk of life he chooses to follow will depend on his sense of duty. The more intelligent and better educated you are, the greater your understanding of what you ought to do."

Other "senses" were a sense of self-reliance in which Gen. McDermott expressed concern over trends on conformity, academic freedom and the subtle influences of mass communication; a sense of balance in which proper perspective is a necessity, and finally, a sense of humor in which bitter resentment can turn into wry humor and then into amusing reminiscence.

Gen. McDermott recalled how his parents viewed with alarm his fascination in the comic strip "Buck Rogers in the 25th Century" a generation ago, yet this fantasy today is a reality and not within the five centuries predicted by the comic strip writer, but within one generation of fabulous scientific achievement.

The speaker who was introduced by Barbara Plewes of the senior class, said he was most impressed by the new high school in a brief tour late that afternoon, but even more impressive, he said, was the new program in which earnest efforts are made to meet the needs of young people today.

Supt. Walter W. Scott presented

diplomas to 255 members as Principal Jay W. Formosa called the roll. The traditional "Pomp and Circumstance" was played by the Holland High Orchestra for procession and recessional as the class wearing blue and white robes marched according to height. Leslie Jean Clark played a violin selection, accompanied by her mother, Mrs. Larrie Clark.

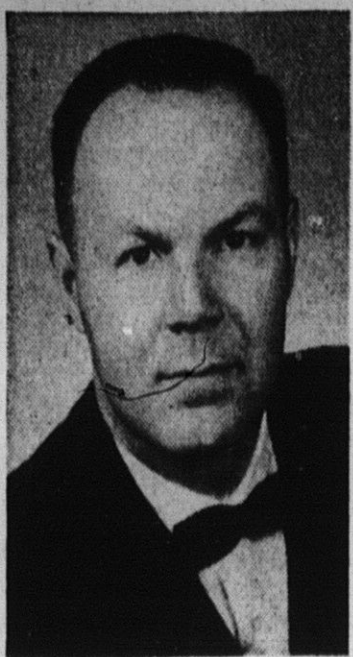

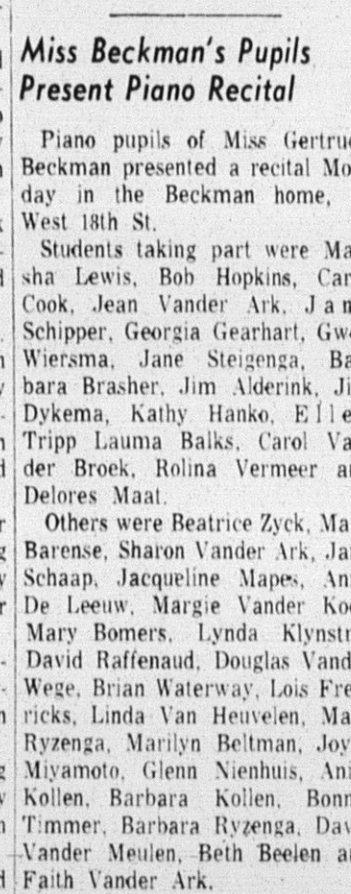

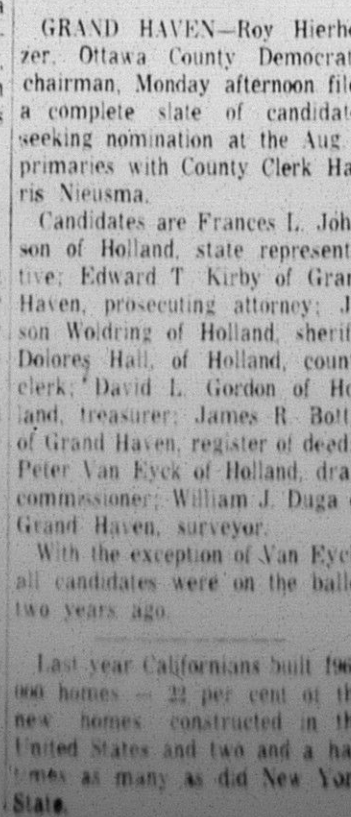

Allegan Board Hears Sheriff On Expenses

ALLEGAN—Recently appointed Allegan county Sheriff Harry Smith told members of the board of supervisors Monday that he was having a difficult time meeting the demands of the office without exceeding the current year's budget.

He asked the board for authorization to purchase gasoline through the county road commission instead of on the open market. Smith estimated this would save approximately half of the department's \$200 monthly expenditure for patrol car fuel.

Sheriff Smith also asked the board to consider a special appropriation of \$400 per month which would allow him to reinstate eight per diem deputies in time to handle the heavy load imposed on the department during the resort season.

Supervisors applauded his announcement that he would not ask for expenses to attend the state Sheriffs' Association convention this year. "We are working on this school for auxiliary police in co-operation with the Civil Defense department. . . and I think that's more important right now," Smith said.

Another Republican candidate for sheriff, Monterey township supervisor Bernard Miller, was heard from during the opening day of the June session.

Miller urged the board to accept his resignation as a member of the Jail Committee, saying "some of my actions as a member of the committee might be questioned since I am a candidate for sheriff." Miller's resignation was accepted and Chairman Wayne Steeby said he would appoint a successor Tuesday.

The board also approved a motion by Clem Rewa, of Dorra, calling for thorough cleaning of the Civil War monument now located on the southeast corner of the courthouse square.
