Contract Okayed For Teachers

Agreement on a 1973-74 contract between the Holland Education Association and the Holland Board of Education was announced by Board President James O. Lamb at the monthly meeting of the board Monday night in the library of Holland High School.

The wage agreement which calls for a total of just under 5 per cent in salary increases and fringe benefits was ratified by the HIEA Monday afternoon and by the board Monday night.

Finances are the one negotiable item each year in the three-year master contract which was adopted in 1972. Negotiations have been under way for about three months.

President Lamb thanked Gardner Wieringa, personnel director of the district, and Board Members Robert Gosselaar and Charles Bradford for their work in finalizing the agreement. "We are all happy that agreement was reached before the end of the school year," Lamb said.

Contracts for four new teachers were approved, all on the elementary level. They were for Dawn Eding, a 1973 graduate of Western Michigan University; Karen Van Hekken, a 1972 graduate of Grand Valley State College; Mary Veele and Barbara Smalling, 1973 graduates of Hope College. The first three will be elementary teachers and Miss Smalling an elementary specialist.

Only three teachers remain to be hired on the high school level, none on junior high and there is fine progress on the elementary level, Wieringa said.

On recommendation of the deputy city attorney, the board approved signing a waiver and consent form for a \$50,000 bequest for the Hazel Forney Herick Art Center from the will of Ray W. Herick, Tecumseh industrialist. Plans call for putting the principal in trust and using the interest.

A communication from the Ottawa County Tax Allocation Board placed final tax allocations for school operations at 10.295 mills, unchanged from last year.

The board approved in part a recommendation pertaining to a Kammeraad - Strop - vander Leek land usage study of campus development for the high school, calling for a final development plan this summer, a time table for a master plan, and allocating funds for the first phase to be completed by the spring of 1974.

A communication from the Ottawa County Red Cross chapter thanked the school board for the use of Jefferson School and the high school commons for Red Cross classes, and a letter from Tulip Time Manager Dwight Ferris expressed appreciation for the great contribution of the schools to the festival for "without the bands, the klompen dancers and the costumed children, we would have no Tulip Time."

Announcement was made that the building and grounds committee had inspected all buildings with a view to the summer maintenance program and figured costs at \$47,000 not including the junior high school buildings.

President Lamb presided at the brief meeting which lasted 22 minutes. Lamb also gave the invocation. Absent were John Amaya and John Weeber.

Pullman Man, 18, Loses Probation

ALLEGAN — Probation was revoked for Roy Dale Jackson, 18, of Pullman and he was sentenced to prison for 26 months to four years on a charge of larceny in a building. Jackson appeared in Circuit Court Monday, June 4.

Robert Galligan, 43, of Allegan, was ordered to pay fine and costs of \$125 on his guilty plea to a charge of use of indecent language.

Donald Cronkrite, 30, of Allegan, was placed on 18 months probation and ordered to pay court costs of \$35 and make restitution on a guilty plea of writing a check with insufficient funds of \$50 or less.

Arrowsmith, Ford, Swainson and Woodcock Honored

GVSC Presents Degrees

ALLEDALE — U. S. Rep. Gerald R. Ford and former governor John B. Swainson are among four national and state leaders received honorary degrees Saturday from the Grand Valley State Colleges during commencement exercises.

The presentations were being made by Arend D. Lubbers, president of the colleges.

Ford, minority leader in the House of Representatives, and Swainson, justice of the Michigan Supreme Court, were to receive Doctor of Laws degrees.

In addition, Dr. William A. Arrowsmith, professor at Boston University, was to receive the Doctor of Humane Letters while Leonard Woodcock, president of the United Automobile Workers union, was to receive the Doctor of Humanities degree.

Dr. Arrowsmith, a native of New Jersey, completed degrees at Princeton and Oxford and was cited by GVSC for his prominence as the nation's leading classicist, translator of Greek plays, leading critic of American higher education, and

proponent of alternative forms of higher education.

Ford was honored as an athlete, lawyer and congressman and as a "national leader and dedicated representative of the people."

Swainson was being cited as a leader in all three branches of government in Michigan while Woodcock was being honored as "a man who has dedicated his life to the American worker, a great labor union, and the welfare of all mankind."

Hamilton Names Superintendent

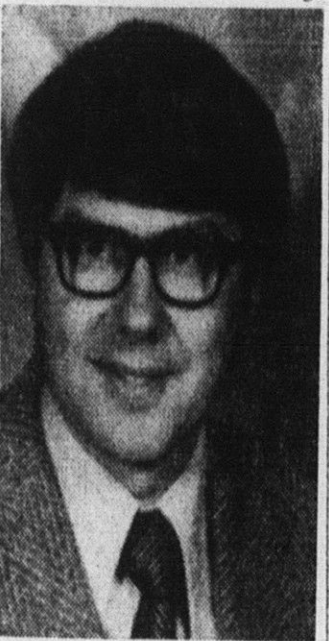

Kevin had just completed seventh grade in L. E. White Junior High in Allegan and was a member of the Junior High Band.

Surviving are his grandmother, Mrs. Gertrude Noble, with whom he lived in Allegan, his mother, Mrs. Shirley Noble of Bloomingdale and a brother, Sam also of Bloomingdale.

Two Drown As Pram Capsizes In County Bayou

GRAND HAVEN — Two of four persons riding in a ten-foot pram in Helman's bayou in Crockery township drowned Saturday at 6:26 p.m. when the small boat capsized. They were the first two drownings reported in Ottawa County this year. The bodies of Shirley Green, 24, and Francine Key, 6, both of Grand Rapids, were recovered later by Ottawa County marine patrol deputies.

Deputies said the boat was operated by James Key Sr., Francine's father, and also contained another daughter, Corine, 4.

After the boat capsized and Key noticed Francine and the Greene woman were missing, Key called to shore for help to his two sons, James, 16, and William, 15, who paddled another boat to the scene and picked up their father and sister.

Deputies were notified at 7:50 p.m. and recovered the two bodies through dragging at 1:10 p.m. Key and Corine were treated in North Ottawa Community hospital and released.

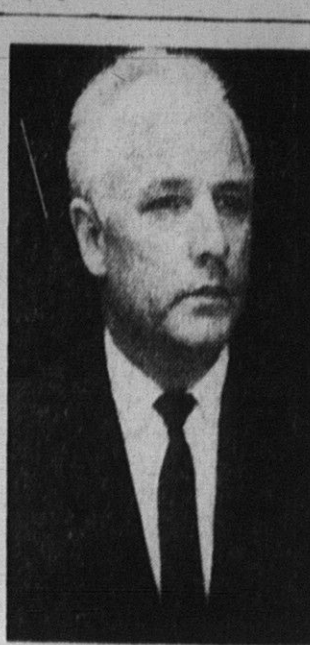
Mercury Hits 91 in Holland

Annual School Vote

Districts Okay Millage Issues

West Ottawa Incumbents Donald L. Ladewig and Louis J. Van Slooten were returned to four-year terms on the school board Monday and Wesley Waldron, who was appointed to fill an unexpired term, was elected to a two-year term. Van Slooten received 536 votes and Ladewig 506. They were not challenged. Waldron polled 325 votes compared to 286 for challenger Ruth Van Kampen.

Renewal of an 18.9 mill levy for operations was approved, 451 to 175, and residents approved equalizing salaries of board members at \$150 annually, 413 to 200. The voter turnout was considered light by school officials.

Zeeland

Incumbent school board member Robert Formis was defeated in his bid for re-election to the Zeeland Board of Education. Challenger John Smallegan outpolled Formis for the four-year term, 557 to 360. Zeeland school voters also approved 9½ mills for five years for operating funds, 651 yes to 238 no.

Hamilton

Arnold Yonker was elected to the single vacancy on the school board. He received 330 votes compared to Bob Teed, 282; Donald Brower, 74, and Ronald Hill, 41. The incumbent, Jarvis Zoet, did not seek re-election to the four-year term. Voters approved renewal of a 13 mill operating levy, 567 to 167.

Allegan

Incumbent and board presi-

dent John Miller won a second term with 524 votes. His opponent, former prosecutor George Greig, received 254 votes.

Allegan Intermediate

Voters in the Allegan Intermediate School District, which covers all of Allegan County except the Hamilton and Saugatuck school districts, approved a \$650,000 bond issue for a training facility for mentally handicapped persons in the district. The vote was 2,646 in favor and 1,540 against. The issue was approved in all nine school districts. The facility will be located in the Allegan area but no site has been selected.

Saugatuck

Incumbents Deborah S. Hoffman and William C. McVea, among six persons running for two vacancies on the school board, were returned by district voters. Hoffman received 184 while McVea polled 168. Others were James Boyce III, 125; John O. Blok, 83; Albert H. Siska, 74, and James R. Potts, 38. An 11-mill operating levy for two years, representing a decrease of one mill from the expiring levy, was approved, 215 to 93 in a light voter response.

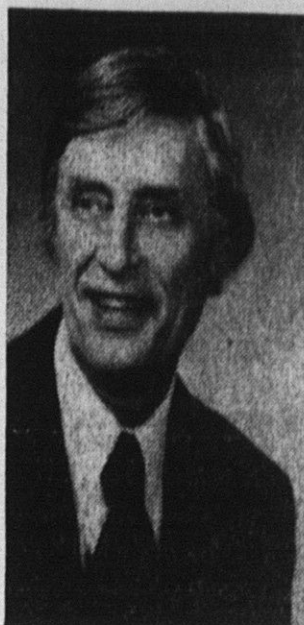
Fennville

Incumbent Clifford Paine Jr. was defeated in a bid for re-election in Fennville by challenger Ralph Shaw. Another incumbent, Ernest Curtis, was returned to the school board. Shaw received 436 votes, Curtis, 378, Paine 351 and another challenger, 11.

Incumbents Returned To Office

Board of Education
Disappointed But
Not Discouraged

Holland school district voters returned two incumbents to office but turned down a proposition to build two new junior high schools by a margin of 211 votes in Monday's annual election. A separate proposition for

swimming pools at the two schools lost about 2½ to 1. A. James Prins and Mrs. Katherine MacKenzie who have served four and five years respectively were reelected to four year terms.

The school proposition lost 2,282 to 2,493 in an election which attracted 4,930 votes. The swimming pool issue lost 1,463 to 3,442.

The two incumbents emerged out of a field of five candidates. The vote: A. James Prins, 2,862; Mrs. Katherine MacKen-

zie, 2,084; Graham Duryee, 1,001; Dr. George F. Jacob, 1,787; Rebecca Arenas Rivera, 908.

The school proposition had called for constructing two junior high schools, one east and one west to replace crowded, outmoded quarters in the center of the core city. Two sites have been selected, one on the southwest corner of 24th St. and Plasman Ave., and the other on the north side of 24th St. at Apple Ave. Each site is about 30 acres.

The school construction proposition carried in five of the district's 19 precincts, tied in two others and lost in 12 precincts and in absentee votes. The swimming pool issue lost in all precincts. Absentee ballots totaled 75.

Supt. Donald L. Ihman today said the Board of Education was disappointed over Monday's defeat but not discouraged. "We will continue to be concerned over education, safety and welfare of our junior high school students. We will analyze Monday's vote, study alternatives and probably think in terms of another vote in the fall," he said.

Auto Top Inc. Receives Contract For Bus Seats

Auto Top Inc., 10972 Chicago Dr., has received additional orders under a contract with American Seating Co., to provide seating backs for new buses in major metropolitan areas. The contracts call for about 45,000 of the backs by Sept. 15 at a cost of between \$90,000 and \$100,000.

The upholstered backs in various colors are being made under a process developed by Auto Top for American Seating which uses a leather-like covering over foam and steel pans. The backs will be used in buses under construction by General Motors Truck & Coach division expansion of transit systems in Chicago, New York, Philadelphia, Boston, Atlanta and the West Coast.

It is the largest contract Auto Top has received from American Seating, according to Auto Top officials.

Gasoline Ignites, Man Is Burned

COOPERSVILLE — Michael J. Peck, 18, of Coopersville was doing some welding in a shed belonging to Melvin Molyneux of Coopersville when a can of gasoline ignited and exploded, about 8 p.m. Monday.

Molyneux assisted Peck who suffered first, second and third degree burns over 50 per cent of his body. Molyneux burned both his legs, also. Both were taken in a private car to Osteopathic Hospital, Grand Rapids, where Molyneux was released after treatment.

There was no damage to the shed, according to Ottawa County sheriff's deputies.

AIR-SEA TRAINING — Members of the Holland Coast Guard had an exercise in air-sea rescue Tuesday using a helicopter from Chicago and a boat from the local Coast Guard unit. The exercise is part of a new annual training event for all Coast Guard shore installations to familiarize personnel with the method of transferring persons

between boats and helicopters. The exercise took place in Lake Macatawa following a training film and a brief lecture in procedures at the Coast Guard installation. The three-man helicopter crew hoisted each member of the 13-man crew on the boat to the helicopter in the basket and

then returned him to the boat. Such a technique can be used in removing injured persons from a boat for transfer to a shore installation or depositing emergency personnel on a boat. Coast Guard helicopters are based in Chicago and Traverse City.

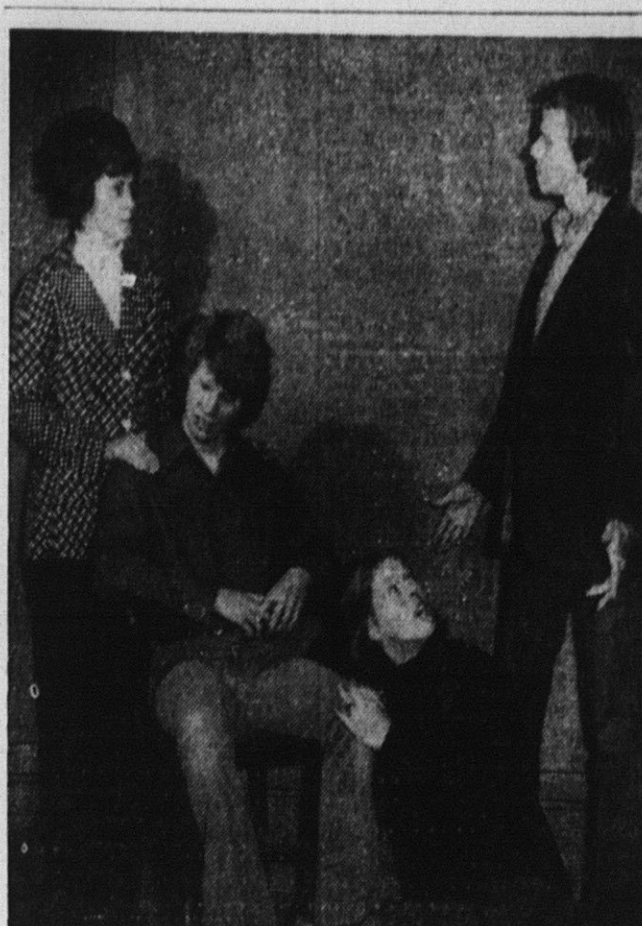

First Nighters Acclaim 'Butterflies Are Free'

Holland theatre lovers were treated to some truly fine drama at the opening Thursday night of Holland Community Theatre's last play of the season "Butterflies Are Free" in Holland High School.

This adult comedy, which may have been questionable a decade ago, had a depth of perception that left one contemplating despite sparkling one-liners that produced merriment from giggles to belly laughs.

Capturing the true essence of his hero role was Peter Van Howe as a blind chap, late of the Scarsdale suburbs, who was on his own in a cold water flat in New York City. It was a role that Van Howe could play with the vacant eyes of the blind, yet "see" far more than others in the cast. And he was never sorry for himself except in one big solo climaxing scene . . . and that turned out all right, too.

The phrase, "Butterflies Are Free," comes from a Dickens quotation. In the play it provides an ephemeral illusion which beautified a crummy set wondrous to behold with its covered footed bathtub which forms a table, a packing crate for a coffee table, a curtained

nook for a bathroom, and a hideous purple refrigerator. Everything was neatly arranged with rails for aids, and Van Howe, who had appeared as the energetic Jimmy in "110 in the Shade," was completely immersed in his blind role.

Margi Derks as the aspiring actress in the next door apartment played a convincing role as a warm-hearted friend, seemingly shallow with some questionable habits. The entire first act was dialogue between the two characters, something any professional will admit is difficult.

Lending strength to the situation-plot was Phyllis Holt, a Scarsdale matron who had trouble reconciling the grownup role her blind son had taken. Although all action in the two-act comedy took place inside of one day, all three characters matured considerably, there was a great deal more understanding, and the ephemeral beauty of the butterflies became more meaningful.

Rounding out the cast was David Van Heest as a breezy theatrical director, appearing in only one scene but providing zest and continuing motion.

Director Tully Daniel succeeded in producing just the right "feeling" for this popular play which also is being produced this week by Civic Theatre in Grand Rapids and is on the list for the Red Barn Theatre in Saugatuck this summer. The Holland production was exceptionally well paced.

Margo Bussies served as technical director, Nancy Gasper set designing and Tony Dziedzic lighting.

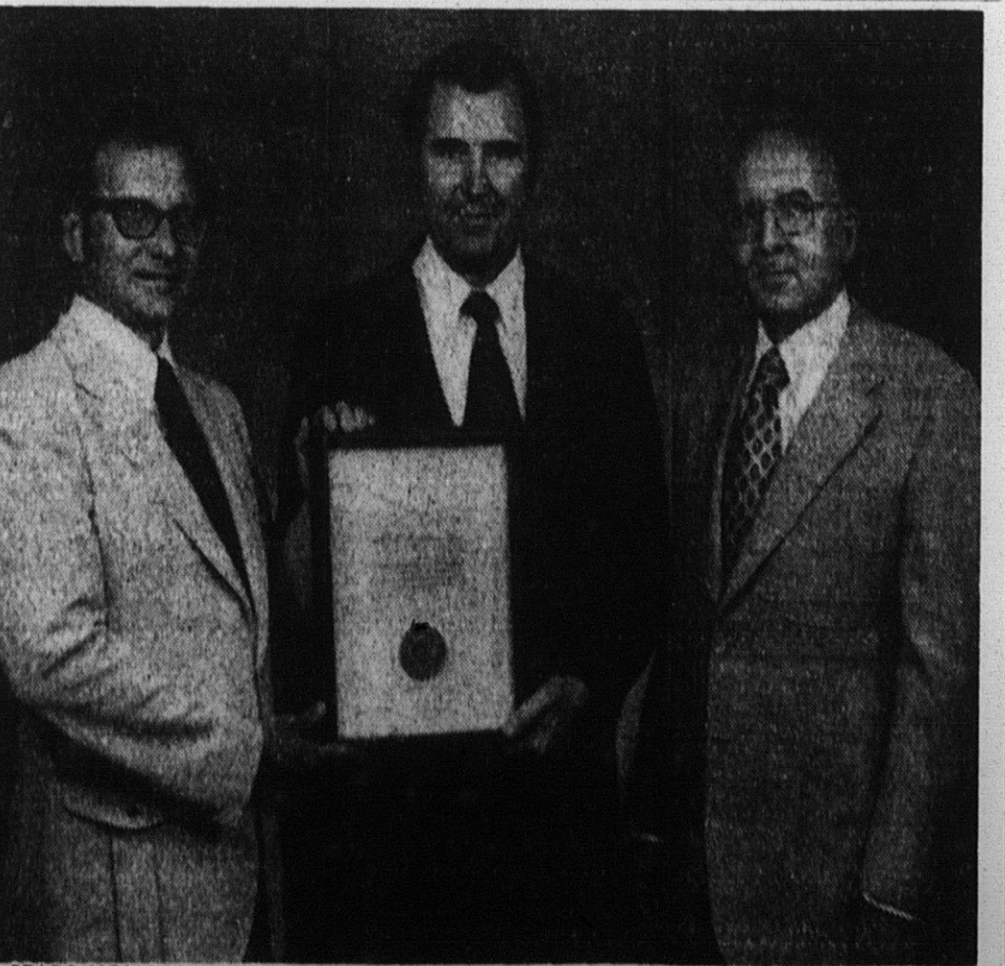

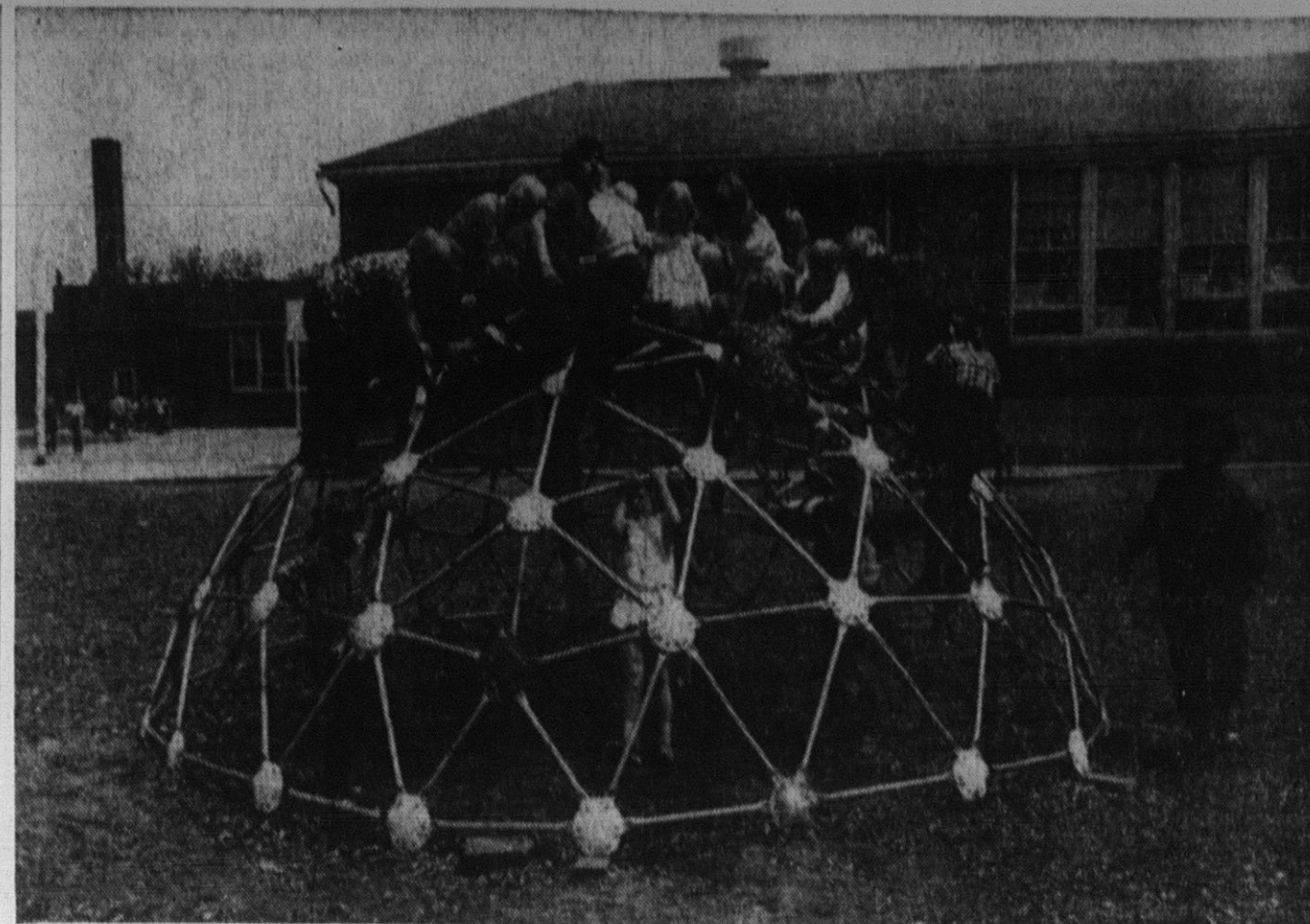
