## School Millage Down Half Mill

The Board of Education at a special meeting Thursday afternoon reduced the operating millage levy by a half mill for the 1975-76 school year.

The decision followed a careful study into financial needs of the school year and the general economic and employment conditions in the community. The board decided the district could maintain a balanced budget with an authorized levy of 16.2 mills. The former levy was 16.7 mills for operations.

In addition, the board authorized a levy of 2.26 mills (a reduction of .08 mill) for debt retirement for city residents. Residents of the district residing in Laketown, Park and Holland townships will be levied .38 mill for debt retirement.

By resolution, the board

urged the public to continue its support of the Community Pool program by supporting a renewal of the half-mill operating levy in Monday's annual election.

President James O. Lamb, responding to a newspaper article concerning attendance of a member at board meetings, and to numerous queries from the community, personally presented the records of the entire membership. Out of 20 official called regular and special meetings in the 1974-75 school year, as recorded in the minutes of the Board of Education, attendance records of board members are listed as follows: Deanna De Pree, 0; Charles Bradford, 1; Katherine MacKenzie, 1; A. James Prins, 2; Robert Gosselaar, 3; James Lamb, 4; John Amaya, 9.

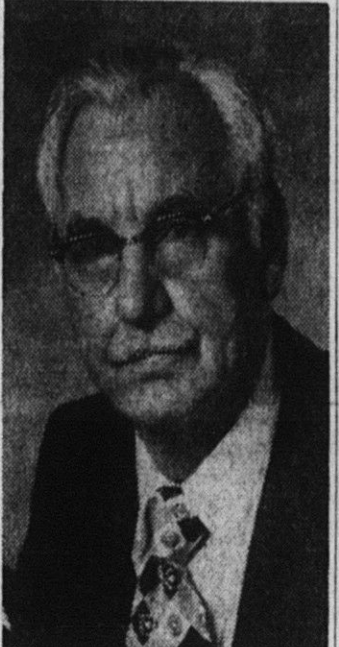

Relatives and friends met the family Sunday and Monday from 7 to 9 p.m. at the Notter-Ver Lee-Langeland Chapel.

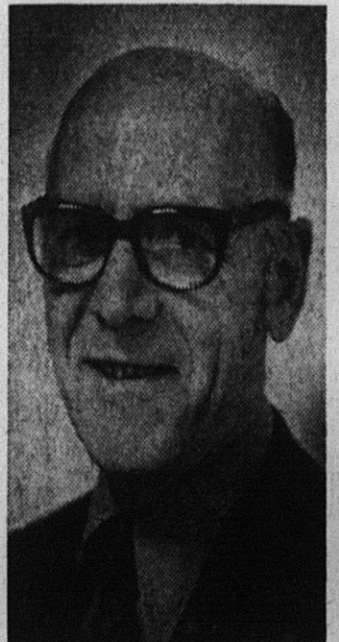

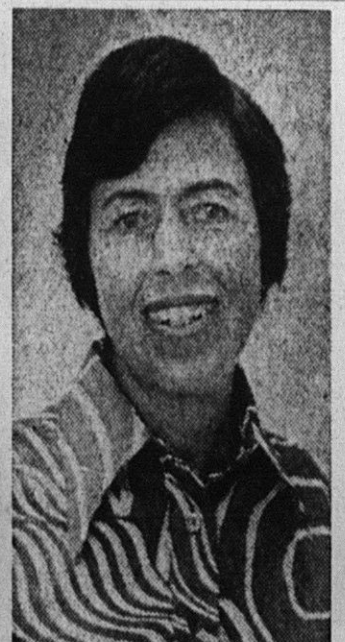
county treasurer since 1972. Previously he had served as a state representative from 1959 to 1964.

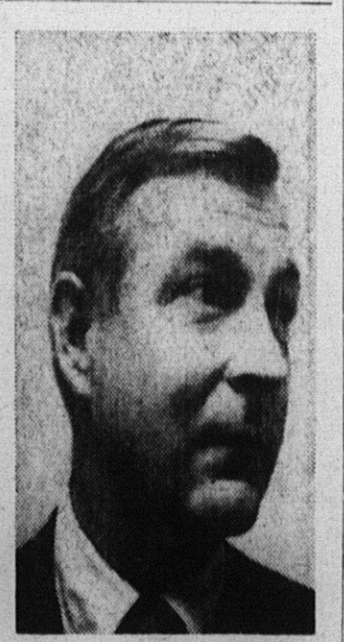

West Ottawa Approves 18.4 Mills for Operations

## New Pair on Local Board

The Holland Board of Education will have two new faces when it convenes for the new school year in July as a result of the annual school election Monday which attracted 2,744 voters, or 18 per cent of the total registration in the school district's 19 precincts.

The newcomers are Carroll Norlin who received 1,448 votes and Marilyn M. Feininger who was a close second with 1,429 votes. Other candidates were David G. Myers, 971; incumbent John Amaya, 873; Miriam Den Eyl, 588; James O. Lamb, board member for 12 years, did

not seek reelection. Norlin is retiring this term after 20 years as principal of Thomas Jefferson Elementary School and a total of 42 years in education. Mrs. Feininger came to Holland three years ago when her husband Jack became manager-marketing at the Holland General Electric plant. The half-mill renewal for swimming pool operations for three years passed overwhelmingly, 1,587 to 649. (See election chart on page 13).

Percentage of voter response was the same as last year —

18 per cent. Last year the total vote was 2,729.

At West Ottawa, voters approved a request for 18.4 mills for one year, 907 to 369, but rejected an additional half-mill for counseling and administrative enrichment by 20 votes. That vote was 624-644.

Incumbent Wesley E. Waldron was returned to the board for a four-year term with 786 votes. His opponent, Susan Carlin, received 456 votes. Waldron is a blueberry grower with a background as an investment broker in California.

## Two Wanted Men Held In Indiana

GRAND HAVEN — Two men wanted in connection with last week's slaying of a Zeeland woman have been apprehended by authorities in Indiana and were in custody awaiting extradition proceedings, Sheriff Bernard Grysen said Saturday.

The two were wanted in connection with the death of Janice Buczynski, 33, of Zeeland, whose body was found May 30 in a ditch near 72nd Ave. and Felch St. north of Zeeland.

Grysen said Indiana state troopers stopped the pair hitchhiking along I-65 near Schererville south of Hammond at 10:30 p.m. Friday and took Roger York, 26, of Kansas City, Mo., and Eugene Howard Farley, 21, of Bessemer, Ala., into custody.

Grysen said York had identification and Indiana authorities checked with a law enforcement computer system which indicated he was wanted.

But Farley apparently had no identification and Indiana authorities released him after York said he was his brother. A check with Ottawa County authorities revealed the other man may have been Farley and Indiana police arrested him minutes later.

Grysen said Ottawa county authorities began extradition procedures to have Farley and York returned to Michigan to face charges.

Farley was named in a first degree murder warrant while York was wanted as a material witness.

## Gifts Spearhead Funds for Floats

Announcement of two sizeable gifts for Holland's float in the Tournament of Roses parade was made at an organizational meeting of the Rose Parade Float committee Tuesday night in City Hall.

Mayor Lou Hallacy announced a \$1,000 gift from the Exchange Club and \$500 from Albert P. Kleis and his three sons. Kleis, 98 years old and blind for over 30 years, served as councilman in the 1920s and still avidly follows the work of City Council through his son, Councilman-at-large Al Kleis Jr. It was the elder Kleis' idea for the gift and his sons endorsed it.

The Exchange Club through its president, Harold Vande Bunte, and Jack Leenhouts, chairman of the Exchange Club foundation, was eager to help the local project since the National Exchange Club has a traditional entry in the Rose parade.

June 23 and 24 were selected for canvassing local homes for contributions for the float with a general aim of \$25,000. Mayor Hallacy said he was splitting the float committee into two groups, funding and design, and Councilman James Vande Poel and John Bloemendaal would head the finance committee.

Preliminary plans for the home canvass are being made by Loretta De Weerd, Phyllis Ryzanica, Beatrice Pauw, June Sundin, Jane Schaap, Darlene Boersen, Mr. and Mrs. Dale Timmer, Cal Prince, Pauly Housenga and Elizabeth Bristol. These people, working with others, will attempt to lineup volunteers, particularly those familiar with this type of fund raising.

Announcement was made that many offers of goods and services have come from local merchants and dealers. The National Guard has offered the use of the armory as a headquarters.

Mayor Hallacy reviewed events that led to Holland's application for the float entry. He said he got the idea while flying to New York with his wife and reading that the Rose parade would have a festival

theme. After application, former City Manager William L. Bopf who had a week's time between posts in Holland and Tustin, Calif., offered to appear before the Pasadena committee, and his presentation was made May 14, the opening day of Tulip Time.

Hallacy said the city has been in communication with several float designers and had a meeting with one who is designing a float for Montreal. The representative said the 60 floats in the Rose parade cost an average of \$25,000 to \$30,000 apiece, and usually run 50 feet long, 18 feet high and 15 feet wide. Hallacy said most floats in the Tulip Time parades run 21 feet long.

## Damage in Storm Shows Increase

Loss estimates to homes and barns damaged in the recent hail storm have been increased by \$2 million, according to Ottawa County Civil Defense director Glenn Timmer.

Loss to homes had been estimated at \$5 million but Timmer said more structural damage has been reported since the initial survey was completed and he estimated loss at \$7 million. That brings the total loss estimate from the storm to \$17 million.

Timmer said additional loss estimates were expected by the end of this week as insurance adjusters complete their work. Additional adjusters have been brought into the area to handle complaints.

Timmer estimated as many as 2,000 roofs were damaged by the hail storm and some of the damage did not show until a day or two later.

## Bradley Henson Begins Duties

"Getting acquainted with everything" is the summertime objective of West Ottawa's new superintendent, Bradley Gene Henson, who began working for the district Monday.

Henson, 39, began his first full day on the job following an early morning breakfast at Beechwood Inn with several administrators of the district. "Rather than coming into the district with ten specific objectives to be accomplished, I plan on getting acquainted with everything," Henson stated today.

Henson noted that when he assumed the Imlay City superintendency, six years ago, the district had an immediate problem: a shortage of classrooms. West Ottawa, he said, "has no such specific, immediate problem."

Members of the West Ottawa Board believe they have a "good school system" and they plan

to "continue improvements in the curriculum area," Henson assessed the board's evaluation of the district.

One of Henson's first visitors this morning was former superintendent of the district, Lloyd Van Raalte, who stopped in to meet Henson and offer his best wishes.

Henson assumed his duties prior to his formal contract starting date of July 1 in order to meet with each building administrator before summer vacations began. "I could have called each one back in, but I thought this would be more efficient," Henson said.

He is planning to tour each building soon.

The Hensons have purchased a home at 1440 Seminole. Henson's wife, Judith, and sons, Kent, who will enter ninth grade and Chad, who will enter seventh grade, will be joining him in Holland when their Imlay City home is sold.

## 3 Districts Approve Millage; 2 Reject

ZEELAND — Zeeland voters approved renewal of 5.205 mills for operating for five years, 633 to 363.

Herbert Wybenga with 852 votes and incumbent Bruce De Pree with 821 votes were elected to the Board of Education. Dr. John H. Yff received 435 votes.

HAMILTON—Incumbent Gene Immink and Gary Klingenberg were declared the winners of two vacant seats on the Hamilton Board of Education in the Monday school election, in a close race between Klingenberg and Loren Joostberns. The vote was 547 for Immink, 468 for Klingenberg and 465 for Joostberns.

The renewal of 15.91 operating millage was approved by a good margin, 618 in favor to 195 against.

SAUGATUCK — Saugatuck voters approved the 11 mills for two years request Monday by a vote of 346 to 123.

Elected to the Board of Education were Franklin E. Lamb with 358 votes and Janet May Wolbrink with 251. Incumbent Thomas Phelps received 193 votes, Sally K.

Erlandson, 164, Arlene M. Philp, 90, and Bonnie Lowe, 83.

FENNIVILLE — Fennville's request for 17 mills was rejected by voters Monday by seven votes, 559 to 552. Eight ballots were spoiled.

Margaret Sessions was elected to the board with a vote of 419. Karen Schermer received 309 votes, Lee Ver Hoeven, 240 and Marcelino Espinosa, 83. There were eight write-ins and 60 spoiled ballots.

GRAND HAVEN — School district voters Monday rejected two requests for additional operating millage and chose one of four candidates to fill the single vacancy on the board of education.

Voters rejected a request for four mills for three years, 3,471 no to 1,642 yes and turned back a second proposal for three mills for one year, 3,311 no to 1,858 yes.

Last August voters approved a 16 mill levy for five years.

Elected to the board was Charles Anderson with 2,591 votes. He succeeds Dr. David Seibold who did not seek reelection. Other candidates were Robert Alcala, Patrick Dillinger and Patricia Timmerman.

## Found Slain In Douglas Home

DOUGLAS — The owner of the Fennville Auto Parts Co., Harry Holzer, 50, and a woman, identified by State Police as Linda Turner, 28, were found shot to death in Holzer's house Friday afternoon.

State Police at South Haven said the two died of multiple gunshot wounds and had been dead at least 12 to 16 hours. The bodies were found by employees of the auto parts firm who went to Holzer's home to check on

him after he failed to report for work Friday.

Detectives said the bodies were found at 4 p.m. Friday in a dining room of Holzer's home at 3035 Harbor St. just outside Douglas. Both bodies were fully clothed. No weapon was recovered.

Troopers said the Holzer and the woman were last seen alive Thursday at 9:30 p.m.

Exact time of death had not been established by an autopsy. Officers said the home had been ransacked but it was not immediately known whether any items were missing.

Detectives said there was some question whether Holzer and the woman were married and indicated conflicting stories from relatives of the dead persons.

## Chicago Checked For Death Leads

DOUGLAS — Detectives from State Police at South Haven and Allegan County sheriff's department were in Chicago Monday checking leads in the slaying of a Douglas businessman and a woman.

Found shot to death Friday were Harry Holzer, 50, owner of Fennville Auto Parts Co., and Linda Turner, 28. State Police said they died of multiple gunshot wounds.

Deputies said the weapon appeared to be a hand gun but the caliber was not immediately determined. State Police said no one was in custody.

## Deputies Say Wife Dead Two Weeks

Patricia Moore, 26,  
Of Grand Haven, Shot  
With Rifle 5 Times

GRAND HAVEN — David Barton Moore, 28, who worked for the Spring Lake High School as a parking lot attendant, was arraigned in District Court Monday on a murder charge in the death of his wife whose body was found Friday in Olive township.

Moore demanded examination at his arraignment just before 1 p.m. and was held without bond.

Ottawa County Sheriff Bernard Grysen said Moore was taken into custody at his home within 24 hours after the body of his wife was found by a horseback rider off a trail near 136th Ave. and Stanton St. Friday afternoon.

The dead woman was identified as Patricia Gail Moore, 26, the mother of five children ranging in age from 18 months to eight years.

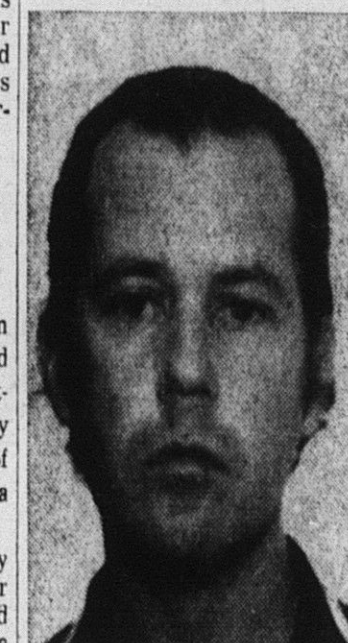
Grysen said the woman had been shot five times with a .22-caliber rifle and had been dead since May 24. The shooting was believed to have occurred where the body was found.

Grysen said the weapon was believed tossed in the area of Fillmore St. and 146th Ave. and asked persons who may have found a weapon in that area to contact the department.

The sheriff said the contents of a purse found in the area where the body was discovered carried zip codes of Redlands, Calif., where authorities were contacted and assisted in the identification of the woman.

Grysen said the Moores lived in Redlands before Moore came to the Grand Haven area last September. His wife and children arrived in the Grand Haven area about April 1.

Grysen said babysitters and neighbors took care of the children while Moore worked after

his wife disappeared and indicated neighbors believed his wife had returned to California. She had not been reported missing.

The sheriff complimented law enforcement agencies in Michigan and California and the cooperation of the prosecutor's office and crime laboratory experts at the State Police post for their work in the investigation.

Moore was taken into custody late Saturday afternoon at his home. Grysen said a search warrant was obtained for Moore's car which was found near the home on Washington St.

## DART Ridership Declines in May

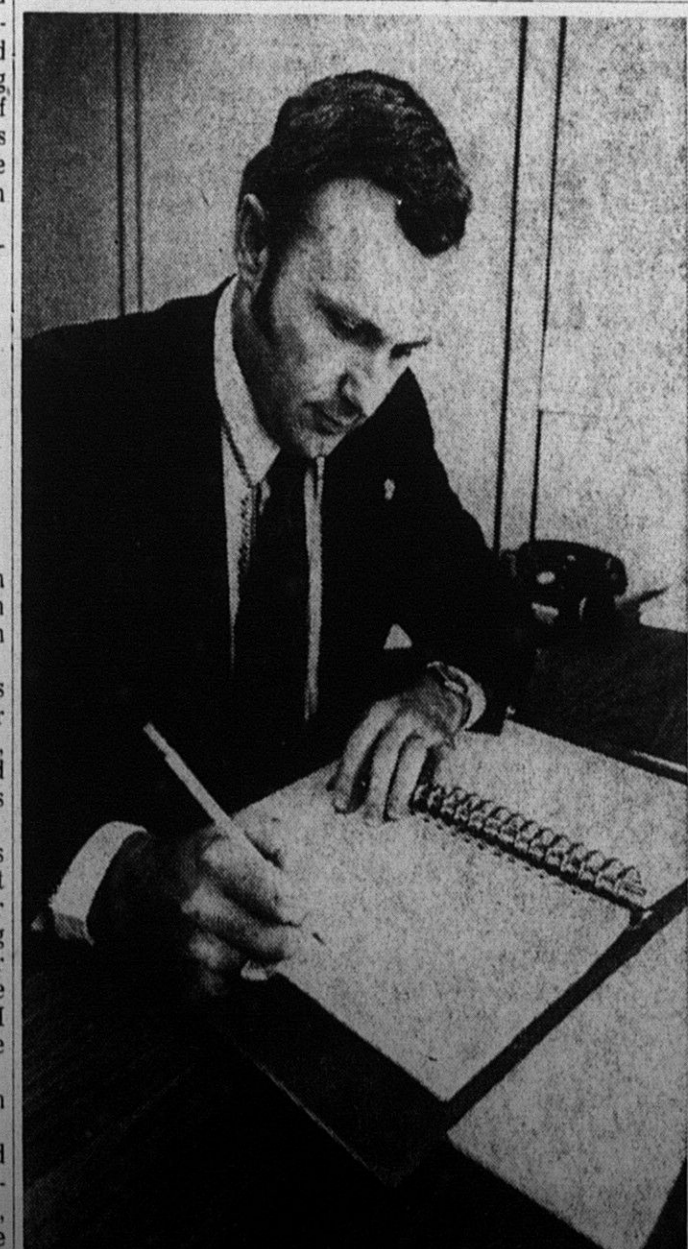
Ridership on Holland's Dial-A-Ride system declined again in May with a daily average 254 down from 271 in April. The average fare remained at 34 cents.

Total number of riders during May reached 5,330 with 2,265 regular fares, 2,408 half, 649 free and eight others. The number of riders per vehicle, per hour declined from 6.5 in April to 6.1 in May.

GRAND HAVEN — Preliminary allocations for three units of government (county, cities and schools) were made final at a session of the Ottawa County Tax Allocation Board Wednesday in the county building.

No appeals were voiced. The motion to make allocations final was made by Phil Bronkema and seconded by Jack Smant. Only James Dressel, county finance chairman, dissented.

Allocations Board Chairman Roger Troupe said 4,575 mills were allocated to the county and .13 mill to the intermediate school district.

School district allocations granted 10,295 to Allendale, Coopersville, Grand Haven, Holland, Hudsonville, Jenison and Zeeland. Spring Lake was granted 9,295 mills and West Ottawa 8,445 mills.

Township millages listed 3 mills for Blenden, Chester, Jamestown, Polkton, Robinson and Wright; 1.44 for Grand Haven, 1.85 for Olive, 1.5 for Park and Zeeland, 1.1 for Port Sheldon, and 1 each for Crockery, Spring Lake and Tallmadge.

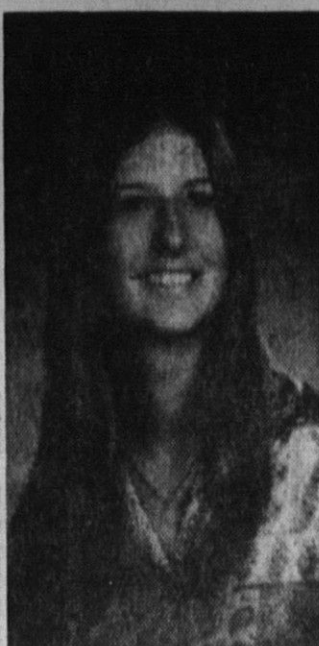

## Realtors Told Of New Laws

Realtors and representatives of lending agencies and municipalities were brought up to date on federal legislation effective June 20 that affects the buying and selling of residential property at a noon luncheon Friday at the Holland Board of Realtors at Beechwood Inn.

Tom Boyen, Grand Haven attorney specializing in real estate law, said the Real Estate Settlement Procedures Act will mean more paper work for realtors and is designed to allow the home buyer to shop around for the lowest closing costs.

The new law requires a uniform settlement statement, an advance disclosure of closing costs, a settlement cost booklet for applicants of loans, disclosure of previous selling price in certain circumstances and limitations on escrow amounts for taxes and insurance.

In addition the law prohibits kickbacks or gifts for services performed and prohibits the designation of a title insurance firm.

Boven said the law will cover virtually all mortgage loans for one to four family residential properties in the nation but does not cover home improvement loans.

Failure to comply with provisions of the law could result in a fine of \$10,000 or a jail term.

Boven said the law requires certain time elements in compliance of the various sections of the loan application procedure.

Dick O'Neill, vice president of the Michigan Association of Realtors in charge of legislation, reported on state bills affecting realtors.

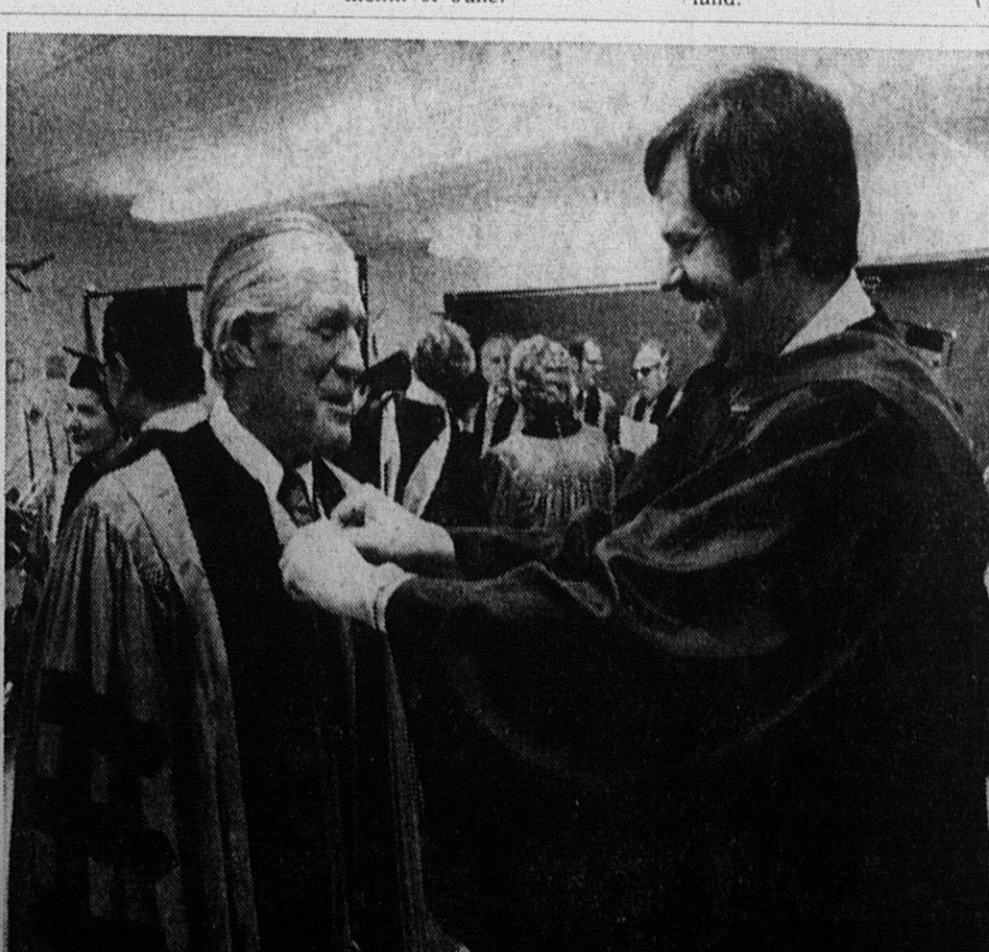

## Change Skill Center Vote To Sept. 29

GRAND HAVEN—Date for a special vote on 1.2 mills to finance a Vocational-Technical Center for 11 schools districts served by the Ottawa Area Intermediate School District has been changed to Sept. 29 from Sept. 9, because of activity early in the month with the opening of schools.

Districts voting on the proposition will be Allendale, Coopersville, Grand Haven, Hamilton, Holland, Hudsonville, Jenison, Saugatuck, Spring Lake, West Ottawa and Zeeland.

Announcement has been made that the intermediate district has been recommended by the Vocational - Technical Service to receive \$1,600,000 for the new center. The state action was taken June 4. This grant would pay for 50 per cent of the cost of construction, purchase of site, and site development.

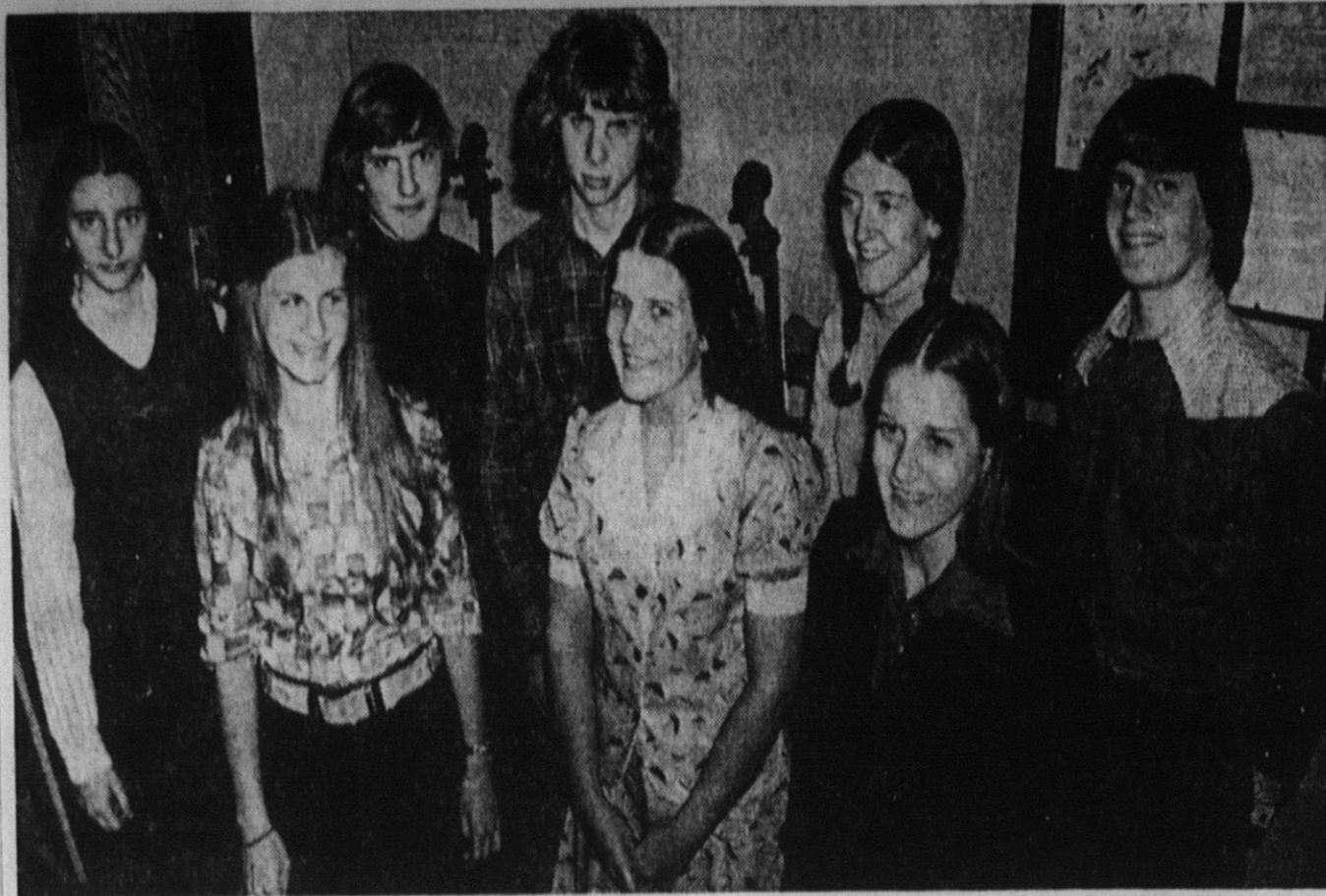
The other 50 per cent would be funded by the 1.2 mills. The first three years of revenue from the 1.2 mills together with federal funds would pay for construction and equipment. From that point the 1.2 mills will be used for operation. This would be a charter millage and would continue as long as the programs are in operation.

## Arts Council in Holland In Operation Since 1967

The Holland Council for the Arts has been in operation since late in 1967, a year after the Michigan Council for the Arts was established under the leadership of Gov. George Romney, funded in part by state appropriation.

Active in the early days were Donald L. Ihrman, superintendent of public schools, and Mrs. Paul McIlwain who were appointed by the then mayor Nelson Bosman to attend an organizational meeting in Lansing.

Thus, Holland became a part of an art program that is not only statewide but also operates nationally.

One of the first big state projects was the Michigan Artrain which opened in the spring of 1971, carrying a six-car touring adventure in the arts to just about every part of Michigan located on a rail line.

The city of Holland was host to Artrain in June, 1972, placing

the train in a garden setting in Kollen Park where it was visited by thousands of area residents along with hundreds of school children. Bosman served as chairman of the local Artrain committee.

Artrain visits all over the state served as a stimulus for new art programs. In Holland, this took the form of a scholarship program for talented young people, artist-in-residence programs, special concerts and workshops.

Current officers of the Holland Council for the Arts are Mrs. McIlwain, president; William Gargano, vice president; Janet Kemp, secretary; Maxine De Bruyn, treasurer; Board members are Willard C. Wichers, Marian Stryker, Gerrit Van Ravenswaay, Donald L. Ihrman, Cornelia Van Voorst, and Sara Jo Bolte.

In mid-1966 when the Michigan Council for the Arts came into being, a 15-member

non-salaried board was appointed by the governor to develop programs and projects at a local level that would make music, painting, literature, cinema, dance, sculpture, crafts and architecture available to the people of Michigan, regardless of age, location, background or economic status. Some 150 professionals throughout the state serve on advisory committees in the various art disciplines, and a fulltime professional staff is headquartered in Detroit.

Two members of the state board are from the local area, Dr. Morrette Rider of Hope College, original appointee of the music committee, and Mrs. Maxine DeBruyn, also of Hope College, a member of the dance committee.

Prior to the installation Mr. Jalving, in connection with the upcoming Bicentennial celebration of the United States, gave a brief history of the events which led to the decision of the colonies to adopt the Declaration of Independence, quoting freely from the Bicentennial edition of Time magazine.

He said, although the population of the colonies was about 2,500,000, there were approximately 500,000 so-called Loyalists who maintained their allegiance to the Crown while many others were lukewarm or indifferent to the revolutionary movement for independence.

Jalving also gave a resume of the war years and gave credit to George Washington for his military genius in bringing the war to a successful conclusion in 1783.

In conclusion Jalving referred to an article published in the April issue of Readers Digest and written by William Simon, Secretary of the Treasury, in which he points out that, if present trends continue, government spending will take 60 per cent of our gross national products by the year 2000.

He also said that it took 186 years for the federal budget to reach the 100 billion figure, nine more years to reach 200 billion and only four more years to reach 300 billion. The federal budget ran a surplus four out of every five years until the 1930's but when we close the books on this fiscal year we will have had 14 deficits in the last 15 years.

One out of every six working Americans is employed by federal, state or local govern-

ments, making the government the nation's biggest boss with more employees than the auto industry, the steel industry and all other durable goods industries.

Mr. Jalving stated the Exchangeites, as citizens, must do our duty. Instead of saying, "Let's see if we can get a Federal hand-out for this project. Let us learn to be more self-reliant."

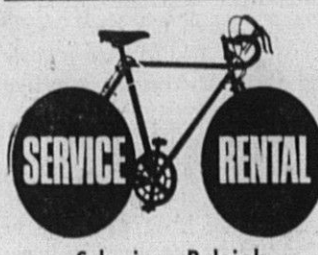

## Lamb Bows Out After 12 Years

After 12 years as a member of the Holland Board of Education, 10 of them as president, James O. Lamb presided at a monthly board meeting for the last time Monday night. He had not sought reelection, and his long tenure came to an end.

He had quite a lot to say at his last meeting. At the outset of the meeting, 28 minutes before the polls closed for the annual school election, he thanked all interested citizens who were concerned with the welfare of the schools and who were willing to be candidates. He said he was perhaps disappointed in the limited response but on behalf of the board and citizens, he thanked all the people offering their services.

And when the list of retirees was read, he computed totals and announced that the six persons retiring had given 182 years to education. "During the last 12 years, we have acknowledged perhaps 2,000 years devoted to education. It's difficult to say anything appropriate, but these teachers have touched many lives in many ways. We hope that the rewards will be seen each day."

"We all realize their contributions to the schools, to the communities, to the country and to the world, and we are indebted to these dedicated services. May their remaining years be full of joy, peace and satisfaction, and may they be as fulfilling as those spent in the school service."

When results of the election were announced and with it the defeat of incumbent John Amaya, Lamb thanked Amaya for his time and efforts, called him always a gentleman, and spoke for the board in a heartfelt thank-you.

Then with some reluctance, Lamb voiced an observation that one could just quietly fade away after 12 years but felt he should say something and did not want to be misun-

derstood.

He commended The Sentinel representative for fair treatment and personal kindness sharply critical of The Sentinel on other fronts in that it did not back school and civic projects. "Many things are happening in our community and other communities, and so much depends on the written word. Radio service is limited, but the challenging power of the Press could be a greater force for the good of the community."

He said he did not want to elaborate and declined illustrations, but indicated that other newspapers do much more for schools.

At the close of the meeting, Board Vice President Robert Gosselar presented Lamb with a framed resolution for his 12 years on the board, calling attention to his efforts in new elementary schools, the high school athletic site and dedicated service to schools and students.

## Skill Center Is Endorsed By Board

A resolution endorsing a new skill center for the Ottawa Area Intermediate District was adopted by the Holland Board of Education Monday night.

It was introduced by Katherine MacKenzie, board member, who called attention to a public hearing in Holland last November called by the Vocational Education, resulting in a grant of \$1,639,000 to aid in construction costs, provided the Sept. 29 vote for 1.2 mills for such a skill center is affirmative.

The resolution supports the concept that no student entering high school in the state of Michigan shall leave without having the opportunity to gain entry to vocational skills regardless of his or her ultimate career objectives.

A meeting of the Ottawa-North Allegan CEPD district is scheduled Wednesday, Aug. 13, in Holland with representatives of the Kent Intermediate Skill Center presenting a panel program.

## Bicentennial Music Presented to Schools

Representatives of music departments of area schools and Hope College were presented with music and arrangements of 100 minutes of Bicentennial music at a breakfast in Holiday Inn Tuesday, a gift of the J. C. Penney Co. as its salute to the nation's bicentennial.

Folkert said, "God and the nation have been good to us and we have a lot of faith and confidence in America. We wanted to do something on a broad base and chose to work with the youth, the future of the land. We hope you will make good use of the music since music is the expression of the land reflecting moods of depression and good times. America is a lover of music and music is the true expression of what America really is."

Judy Zylman, chairman of the Bicentennial Commission, expressed appreciation for Penney's contribution to the bi-

centennial. "We have so much to be thankful for, and so much of our heritage is expressed in music," she said. She spoke of America's heritage and its hopes for the future as expressed in the three themes of the festival, Heritage, Festival and Horizons.

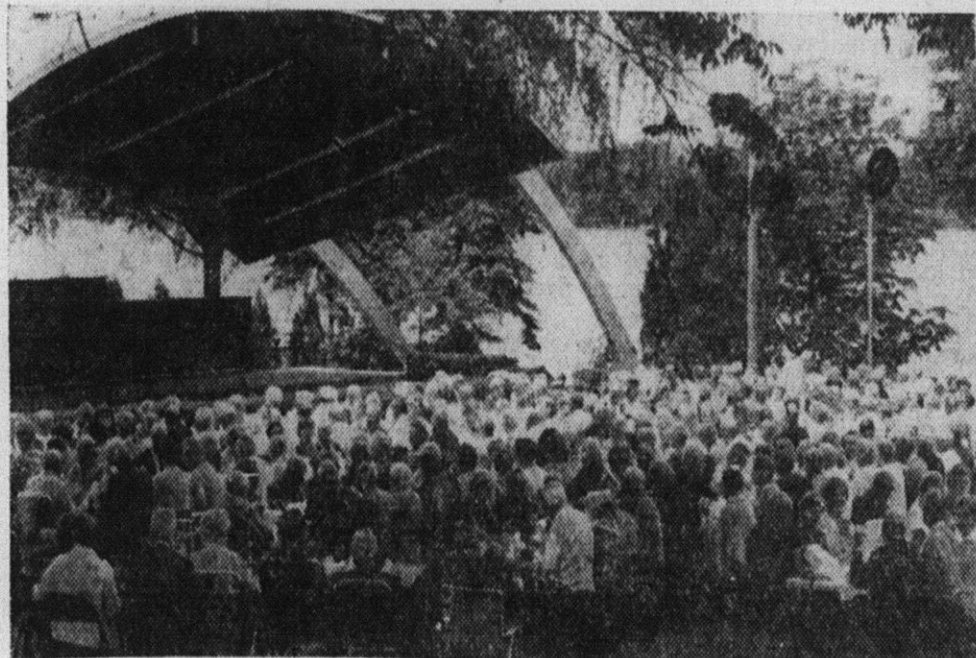

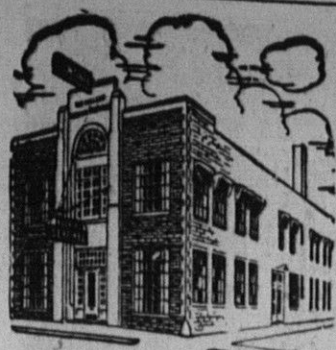

#### WHAT WENT WRONG?

It is interesting to look at contemporary history as it is being made. And it is even more interesting to note how wrong one can be, even when all the evidence seems to be in one's favor.

At the last congressional election, almost 100 new members were sent to Congress and the notion was abroad in the land that we were in for a new experience, a Congress that would act, be independent, and come up with some new legislation.

Some months have passed and in newspapers all over the country some evaluations are being made. What has happened? What has changed? And the answer seems to be that not much has changed. With a drastic change in the Congress, President Ford has a Congress that finds it most difficult to override his vetoes. The President has been able to impose his own energy solutions with nothing more from Congress than some loud noise that it is dissatisfied.

With the hope that there would come from Congress new bills dealing with energy, tax reform, certain economies, and renewed leadership, not much has happened. Why? And that isn't an easy question to answer. It might be a lack of leadership, or it might be a fear to take responsibility.

We go back to our first sentence. Our best predictions of what this new Congress would have gone awry. Even contemporary history is hard to interpret.

#### Sunday School Lesson

Sunday School Lesson  
Sunday, June 15  
Why the Bible was Written.  
Jeremiah 16:1-3; Luke 24:44-47;  
John 20:30-31; 1 John 1:1-4  
By C. P. Dane

We can't outgrow the Bible. Some books we lay aside after childhood days fade away. The Bible interests children; teenagers can get inspiration from it; adults keep on learning from it; and the elderly get comfort and strength from it when vigor gradually disappears. The Bible was useful in the first century and still is in the twentieth. People from every culture learn from it. This lesson teaches us that the Bible reveals man's sin, summons him to repentance, and points him to Jesus Christ, God's appointed Redeemer from sin.

I. The Bible reveals man's sinfulness. The lesson is composed of four passages, one from the Old Testament, three from the New Testament. The words from Jeremiah were spoken to God's wayward people for the purposes of arousing their consciences to see their sins and repent. Moses and all the prophets spoke of sin and the need of repentance. Jeremiah was told by God to give a message to his people as they were going to the temple to worship. He called upon them to amend their ways, obey God and live. Note the choice — obey God or perish as a nation. They would not repent, did not feel the need of it and were carried into exile. We face a choice.

II. The Bible reveals Jesus Christ. To the two downhearted believers on the day of his resurrection Jesus opened the Old Testament pointing out to how Moses and the prophets and the Psalms spoke of the Messiah who was to suffer, die and rise again and live and be preached to all the nations in order that they might repent and that they should begin in Jerusalem where they crucified him. John wrote the gospel so that by believing in his name they might have life.

III. We can be sure. The epistle of John was written about the year 90 A. D. in Ephesus to the churches in general. He wrote for the apostles and that is why the word "we" appears several times. Already heresies grew preached in his time — one was that was not real. Observe that John contradicts that, by saying that we, that is the apostles, we have heard and seen and did behold and have handled. They shared what they had. All Christians should do that. They had a purpose — in fact two. One was that they might have fellowship and thus enrich their lives mutually and enter into a larger fellowship with God. Leaders should strive to get people closer together in the church and closer to God.

The other purpose was to foster and promote Christian joy to the full. Both fellowship and joy are highly beneficial to individual believers and the church.

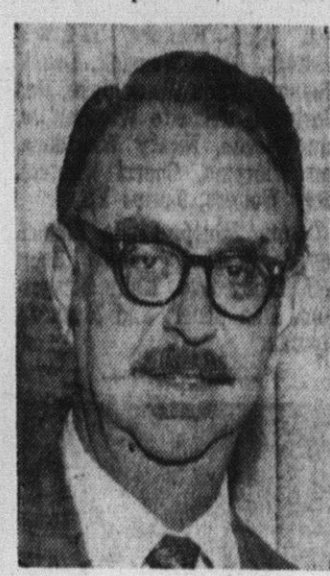

#### BPW Urges Funds For Grant to Study Solid Waste Fuel

The Holland Board of Public Works Monday recommended to council \$8,000 as a matching grant to study use of solid waste as a fuel for the electric power plant.

Holland has received an \$8,000 grant from the American Public Power Association contingent upon the local \$8,000 match.

The grant would allow research into the use of combustible waste material from the Louis Padnos Co. auto shredder. Such research will be conducted by the Ames Laboratories of Ames, Iowa.

The BPW proposes to use the waste material with coal in the power plant boilers and conserve coal uses.

A recommendation from the BPW staff to pay cancellation charges involved in the dropping of plans for a scrubbing unit to clean smoke from the power plant was tabled until a study session could be held.

Bids on an electrostatic precipitator for the power plant have been delayed a month and now will be taken July 17 instead of in June.

Methods of financing purchase of coal were explored by the board after controller Gordon Schrotenboer reported a heavy cash use to buy coal.

5. Voiced uneasiness about dismissal of a bilingual worker and reduction in hours of a secretary to the director, plus concern over cutbacks and refilling jobs promptly.
6. That bilingual bicultural persons be hired in case any such position is vacated for any period of time.
7. That post of director must be filled with bilingual - bicultural person, not just bilingual.

President Lamb said the recommendations would be considered in an executive meeting.

Earlier in the evening, a letter from Al Gonzales of the Human Relations Commission commended Amaya for support of the Latin community.

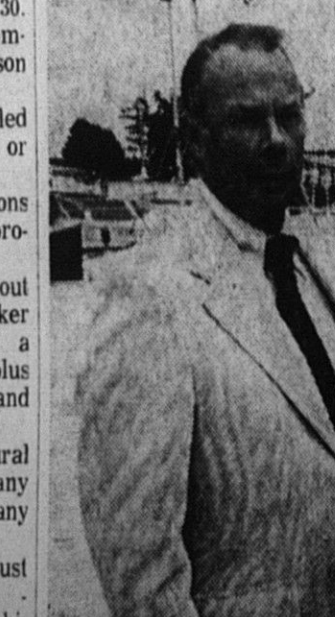

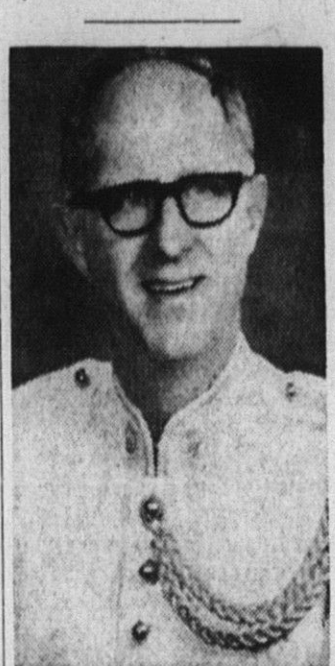

## Lighthouse Group Plans Joint Meet With Port Group

Holland Harbor Lighthouse Historical Commission held its June meeting at the home of Mary Heuvelhorst. The commission reviewed progress toward preservation and restoration of the "big red lighthouse" structure on the south inner pier.

Representatives of the Corps of Engineers and the Coast Guard are being invited to attend the next meeting with the Commission for the purpose of reviewing Federal plans that may apply to the lighthouse structure, its improvement and protection.

It was recommended by a Commission member that improvement and preservation of the lighthouse structure be considered as part of the area bi-centennial projects.

Marlin Vander Wilt described the sexuality course for parents which had recently been completed and was evaluated as having been successful. The group hopes to repeat the course.

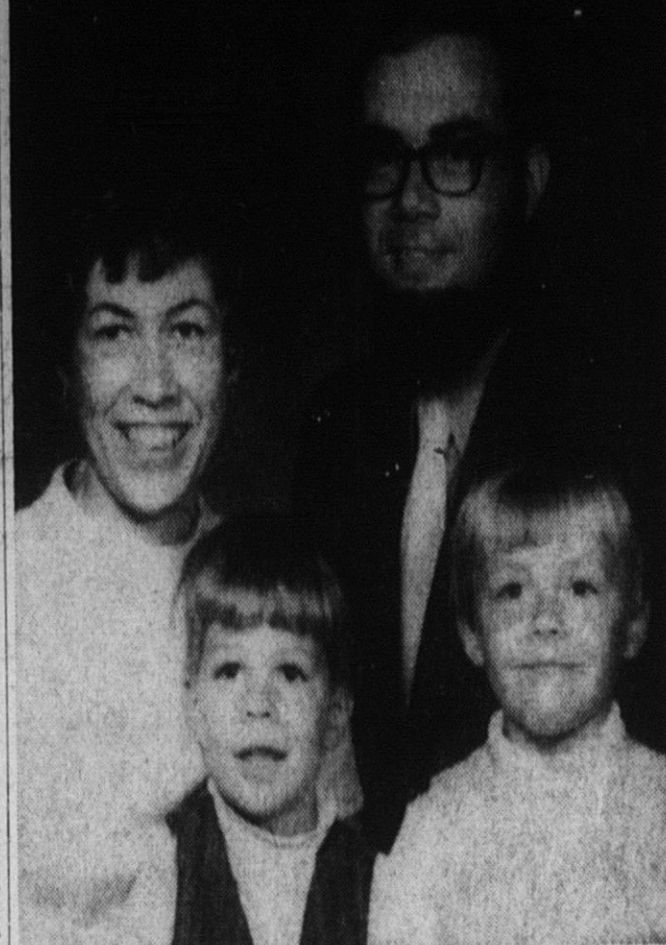
