## Two Entry Attempts at Aerosols Plant

# Tracking Dog Finds Break-In Suspects

Police using a tracking dog flushed two young men from their hiding place near American Aerosols Inc., 636 East 40th St., early today where officers investigated two break-in reports. A third subject was arrested as he walked toward his home.

The trio was apprehended with the cooperation of Ottawa County deputies, Zeeland police and State Police from Grand Haven and their tracking dog.

The first report of a break-in was received at 12:50 a.m. by a night employee of the plant who surprised subjects inside the building. No one was taken into custody.

A police officer patrolling the area at 3:20 a.m. spotted a car parked behind the building which was similar to the description of a car believed involved in the earlier break-in report.

Officers found a coin changing machine outside the building which had been removed from the plant. An attempt had been made to force open the device. Entry to the building was believed made through a rear door.

## Engine Fire Destroys Car Along Freeway

GRAND HAVEN — A 1963 model car was burned out in a fire that occurred along the Gerald R. Ford Freeway at 48th Ave. in Jamestown township Thursday at 3:40 p.m.

Ottawa County deputies said the driver, Brian Lanore of Grand Rapids was not injured. He smelled gasoline moments before fire broke out in the engine compartment at the rear of the small car. The loss to the car was set at \$400. Jamestown firemen responded to the alarm.

## Two Holland Men Appear in Court For Break-In

William Van Dyke, 18, of 10464 Paw Paw Dr., and James Wimberly, 20, of 212 Arthur St., demanded examination Monday at their District Court arraignment in Allegan to charges of breaking and entering the American Aerosols plant, 636 East 40th St., early Saturday.

Both were to return June 16 for examination. Bond for Van Dyke was set at \$5,000 and for Wimberly at \$2,500.

Van Dyke, Wimberly and a juvenile were taken into custody early Saturday after a tracking dog was used.

Police said two of the subjects were found hiding behind some barrels at the aerosols company and the third was arrested as he walked toward his home in Holland.

Police said a coin changing machine has been removed from the aerosols plant and an attempt had been made to force it open. An officer patrolling the area investigated after seeing a car parked behind the plant at 3:20 a.m. Saturday hours after a company employee had reported seeing subjects inside the plant.

Officers had investigated the first report and kept a watch of the plant.

## Prince Charming Technique Fails

The Prince Charming technique failed to work for an unidentified man early Sunday as he leaned over a woman sleeping in her bed at home and kissed her.

Police said the kiss awakened the 20-year-old woman who reached up to touch the face of the male subject and screamed. The man fled.

Officers said the woman screamed after she found Prince Charming without a moustache. Her husband wore a moustache. She was not harmed. The woman's husband was said to be in another room, police added.

## May Was Cool, Wet

May was cool and wet, but Tulip Time was beautiful and the blooms which came early stayed late. The festival had three days of fine weather and one rainy day at the close, but it was a gentle rain which did not deter crowds for the big band parade in which President Ford rode.

Not once did temperatures approach 80 degrees after an April which had four days in the 80s at midnight, according to records kept by Civil Defense Director Glen Timmer.

A high of 77 was recorded May 23. The same day a low of 26 was recorded.

Rainfall totaled 6.93 inches, a high total but not a record. Heaviest rainfall in a 24-hour period was 1.64 inches May 6.

On the last day of Tulip Time Saturday, May 15, rainfall up to noon totaled .07 inch and for the 24 hours thereafter 1.18 inches.

## Three Plead Guilty In Circuit Court

GRAND HAVEN—Three persons pleaded guilty in Ottawa Circuit Court Monday and will be sentenced July 12.

John Batema, 18, of Holland, was charged with attempted embezzlement; Leo Davis, 33, of Grandville, was charged with drunken driving, second offense at Holland on July 4, 1975, and Donald Baylor Jr., 23, of 427 East Eighth St., Holland, was charged with driving away a car without intent to steal.

Harold Leonard, 18, of Allendale, charged with larceny from an Allendale apartment, was placed on probation two years and given a six month jail term to be reviewed after three months.

## Power Plant Outlook Said Brighter

The future of electrical generation in Holland turned a little brighter at the Board of Public Works meeting Monday.

Electric power usage was said equal to the level of a year ago, showing a slight increase in recent months; joint participation with Consumers Power Co. seemed closer; a delay was seen in the time table when the power plant would run out of capacity and additional funds were "found" for harbor dredging.

BPW general manager Frank Whitney said kilowatt hours of power sold during the 11-month year was about equal to a year ago, showing some improvement in power usage in recent weeks. He attributed the increase to industrial uses.

But Whitney said the coming hot months and air conditioner uses would indicate the peak demands on the power plant and act as a barometer for forecasts of power uses.

A report from R. W. Beck and Associates regarding negotiations for joint participation with Consumers Power Co. nuclear generating facilities at Midland was received and meetings were scheduled with company officials in Jackson.

Whitney said enabling legislation was expected to be introduced in the state Senate next week but action was not expected by the July recess. A poll showed 21 senators favored the legislation which would allow municipal power plants to purchase part ownership in the Consumer's facilities.

Beck also suggested BPW renovate units 1 and 2 at the De Young power plant for backup units which could provide additional power in case joint participation is delayed.

Additional oil storage is necessary for the oil-burning generators but Beck indicated the use of the two stand-by generators could meet power needs of the city until 1983, allowing the BPW additional time before a decision was needed on future expansion.

And Whitney and city manager Terry Hofmeyer reported on a meeting with the Corps of Engineers in Detroit in which the Corps said funds may have been found for Holland Harbor dredging.

Bids on other Corps projects came in lower than expected creating additional funds available for other harbor projects, including Holland Harbor.

Whitney said the Corps told them the decision rests with Washington and Congressional representatives were being asked to push for the Holland Harbor project.

There were fears that lack of dredging the past two years and another two-year delay might create problems for shipping, including the arrival of coal for the power plant by boat.

Whitney said the BPW would conduct a customer survey this summer regarding high energy appliances, water uses and attitudes toward the BPW.

The BPW was to meet Thursday with about 100 customers whose water, electric and sewer rates would be increased by more than the reported average ten per cent hike. All have been notified of the meeting by mail, Whitney said.

## Intruders Use Loader to Move Upright Safe

Intruders used a forked lift truck to move an upright safe in the office of the Hekman Rusk Co., 18th St. and Ottawa Ave. Saturday but failed to open the safe.

Police said the report was received at 9:50 a.m. Saturday. A doorway to the office was damaged where the intruders apparently struck it with the truck.

Officers said an attempt was made to dismantle hinges on the safe.

Police said the intruders wrapped a half-inch chain around the safe and connected the other end to the loader in an effort to move the safe.

Nothing was reported missing from the building.

## Glider Pilot Escapes Serious Injuries

PLAINWELL — Brad Whitmore, 23, of Plainwell, escaped serious injuries Sunday at 3:23 p.m. when the glider plane he was operating crashed while attempting to become airborne at the Plainwell airport.

Allegan County deputies said the glider was being towed by a plane piloted by Bob Bennett and his glider failed to gain altitude, struck some tree tops and crashed into a yard. The glider was extensively damaged.

## To Bring Water to South Side

# Park Files Plans For Lake Crossing

Park township has applied for permission to cross Lake Macatawa with a submerged water pipeline but township supervisor Jay Van Wieren said a final go ahead has not been given.

Van Wieren said the proposed pipeline is designed to bring fresh water service to township residents living on the south side of Lake Macatawa and added that negotiations for such a pipeline have been under way for some time with Laketown township in Allegan county and the Holland Board of Public Works.

Petitions were being circulated among residents in Park township on the south side of the lake to create a special water assessment district, Van Wieren said.

He said the purpose in filing for permission to cross Lake Macatawa was to learn what difficulties might be encountered in winning permission from the Corps of Engineers.

The Holland BPW has shown interest in the past in another lake pipeline to loop its water system and to provide additional water pressure to residents in the western areas of the city. The only water pipeline crossing the lake is along the River Ave. bridge.

Laketown township has been interested in water supplies to serve the proposed Carousel Mountain development where condominiums have been planned.

Van Wieren said should Lake Macatawa and the BPW decide at this time not to participate in the lake crossing, Park township probably would begin crossing by itself and perhaps later this year pending financial arrangements. Cost of the crossing has been estimated at \$250,000.

The exact crossing location has not been determined but Van Wieren said Park township was looking at the area near the channel entrance about 200 feet east of the Holland State Park entrance gate on the north side of the lake to the Point West area on the south side.

Water supplies would come from the Holland BPW pumping station.

In its public notice, the Corps of Engineers said the request indicated the pipeline would be installed by dredging approximately 2,000 cubic yards of material, sufficient to bury the line a minimum of 36 feet below low water datum in the channel and a depth of 5 feet below the existing lake bottom outside the channel.

Backfill material will be clean sand trucked from an upland source.

The dredged material is to be deposited on land near the existing county landfill long

## Streets Closed For Resurfacing

A portion of 16th St. will be closed to traffic beginning at 8 a.m. Wednesday for resurfacing, the city engineer's office announced.

The street will be closed to traffic between College Ave. and Van Raalte Ave., a block at a time. Parking will be restricted along the street during the resurfacing program and signs will be erected in the area.

Also scheduled for resurfacing Thursday or Friday is 30th St. between State St. and College Ave. and traffic along those blocks will be restricted during resurfacing.

# Bikeway Signs Are Delayed

GRAND HAVEN — Fears of county liability flattened, for now, plans to install signs proclaiming certain roadways in the Holland, Zeeland and Grand Haven areas as bikeways.

Ottawa County Commissioner Marilyn Sherwood Tuesday recommended installation of 200 signs along 40 miles of roadway at a cost not to exceed \$10,000 but commissioners decided to refer the matter back to the development committee for additional study.

Commissioners feared that by erecting the bikeway signs and indicating certain routes as bicycle routes, the county might become liable should bicyclists become injured along the routes.

County prosecutor Wesley J. Nykamp agreed especially if there was some question about maintenance of the roadway and if the bikeway was along high speed roadways.

A \$10,000 study on bikeway routes in Ottawa County was accepted by commissioners from the West Michigan Shoreline Regional Development Commission earlier this year.

Commissioner Sherwood, following the guidelines of the study, recommended bikeway signs be erected from Zeeland to Ottawa Beach starting at Paw Paw Dr. and 104th Ave. north to Chicago Dr. then west to Lakewood Blvd., Douglas Ave. and Ottawa Beach Rd. to the state park; along Butternut Dr. from Lakewood at Douglas west on Lakewood to Butternut then north-west to Lake Shore Dr., and along Lake Shore from Ottawa Beach Rd. north to Grand Haven.

Citing the high cost of legal fees and other court-related expenses, commissioners approved \$55,100 in budget adjustments.

The adjustments sapped the contingent account and left a balance for the remaining six months of \$50,832.67.

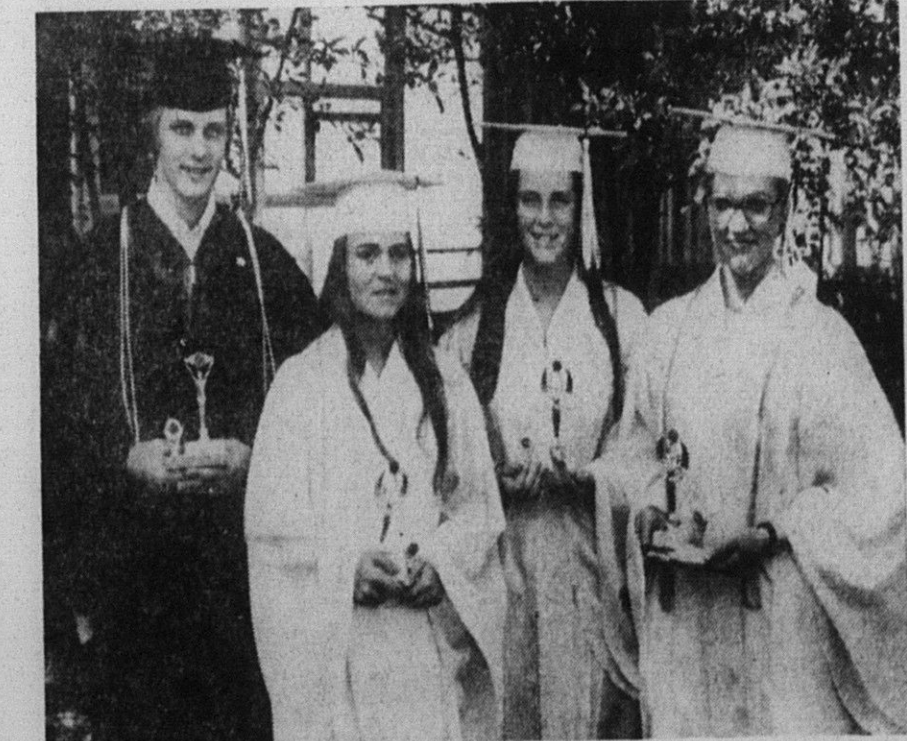
Commissioners legal expenditures were doubled to \$20,000; Circuit Court was given an additional \$15,000; District Court, \$14,200; Probate Court, \$2,000; prosecutor's office, \$5,400; building and grounds, \$8,000 to cover cost of utilities, and \$500 for the jury board for printing and mailing.

A new telephone system for the county building was expected to be operational June 23 meaning new telephone numbers for all county offices. The system will allow county offices to transfer incoming calls from one office to another, something not available under the present system.

Commissioner Jack Smart reported on a \$13,900 request from the West Michigan Health Systems, a federally mandated program to coordinate health care facilities in a 12-county area. Representatives of the agency were to be asked to attend a commissioners meeting to explain their request.

Commissioner Donald Stoltz of Holland said the county administration committee would have a recommendation on methods for a dog census before October. Township aides have complained that fees for the census were too low.

Stoltz said his committee was recommending no participation by sheriff's department personnel in a Red Cross program because of the projected \$10,000 cost in paying deputies to attend the meetings.

## Holland Family Builds Their Own Motor Home

Combining a love for travel and doing things themselves, the Ed Koops family of 18 East 12th St. spent eight months building their own motor home. "It cost me under \$6,000, which was less than I expected," Koops said of their 22-foot motor home which sleeps eight. "I doubt if you could find something like this for even \$12,000."

The main advantage of building their own motor home was being able to build it to their own specifications, Mrs. Koops said. They visited many recreational vehicle (RV) shows and took features they liked from all makes and put them into their own personal motor home which fit the needs of themselves and their four children aged 9-15.

Koops said he began the project with a Ford motor home chassis last October. Koops, a letter carrier, said he worked on the vehicle on his days off and during the evenings.

He had no idea of the amount of man-hours he put into the motor home, but estimated he worked on it about three or four nights a week. "My wife would probably say about six nights a week," he grinned.

Koops said he built the body on the chassis out of 2x2s and covered them with plywood on both sides after insulating it with styrofoam. "We didn't have a place to work on it inside, so we hurried up and got the outside on before winter," he said.

Much of the work on the motor home involved finding the parts to make the vehicle. "Most of your RV stuff is available in Northern Indiana and lower Michigan. We took at least six trips down to Elkhart, Ind., for parts," he said.

A lot of money was saved by buying parts for the vehicle before they were needed. "Bargains just fell our way," Mrs. Koops explained. Items such as the stove, refrigerator and furnace were purchased earlier than needed from different manufacturers of recreational vehicles.

The Koops also found bargains by buying directly from parts manufacturers. The aluminum sidings were purchased at a great savings from a factory in Hastings, Koops said.

Other parts for the motor home came from junkyards. This allowed Koops to install a tilt and telescopic steering wheel from a Cadillac, a driver's seat from a Chevrolet Nova, and air conditioner out of a Chrysler, an instrument panel from a Ford and a variety of other parts.

"Rounding up all the stuff is probably the most fun," Mrs. Koops said.

The Koops family took their motor home on its "maiden voyage" to Terre Haute, Ind., over the Memorial Day weekend and experienced only minor problems, Mrs. Koops said.

"It was just a fantastic family project," Mrs. Koops said. "We all had to give and take, everyone helped a little bit."

"I would build another one," Koops smiled. "If our needs change."

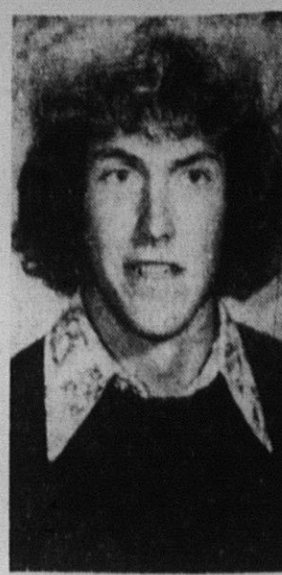

lost to Southgate's Dale Steiss-Jim Fitzpatrick in the first round, 6-7, 6-4, 6-3.

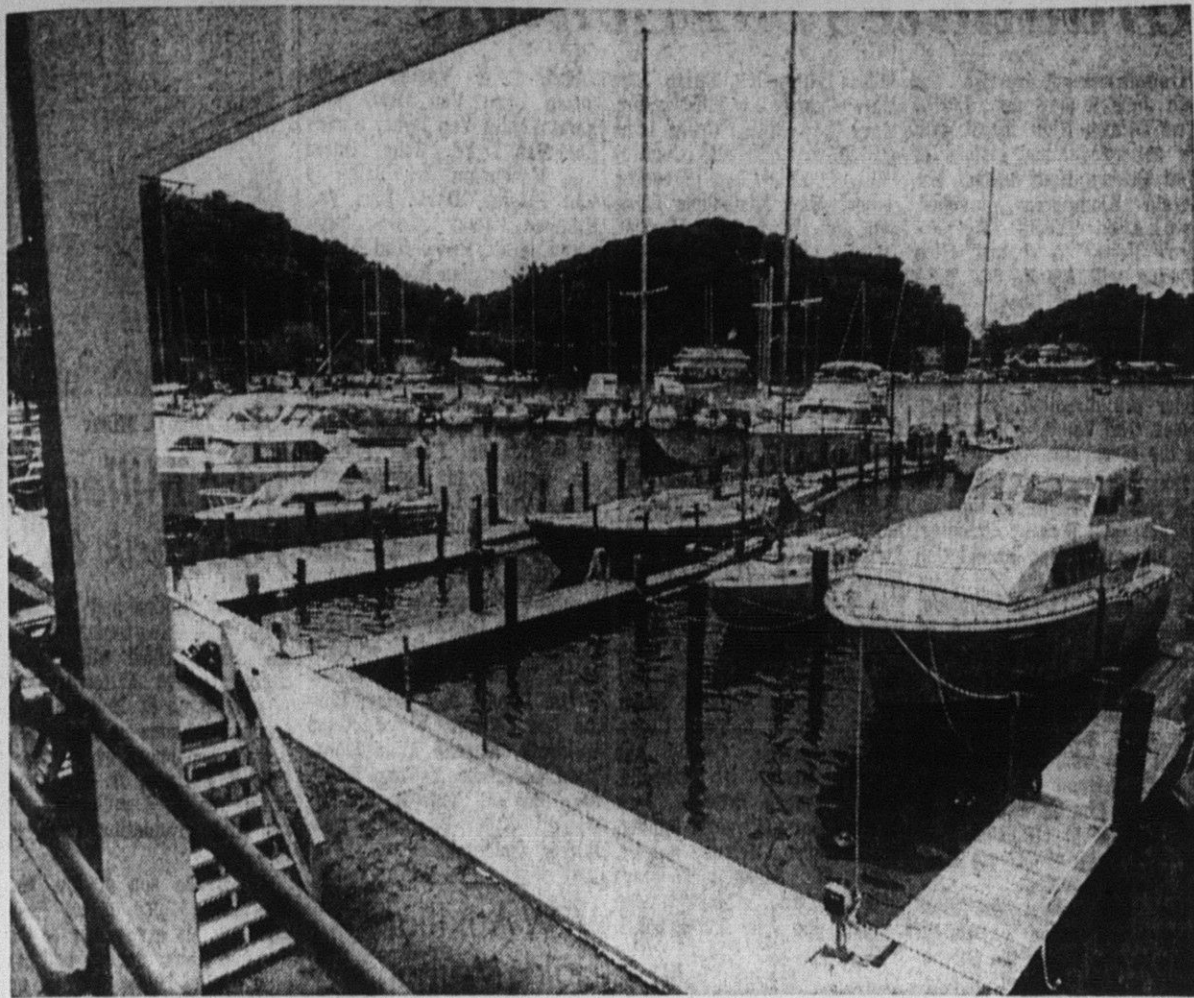
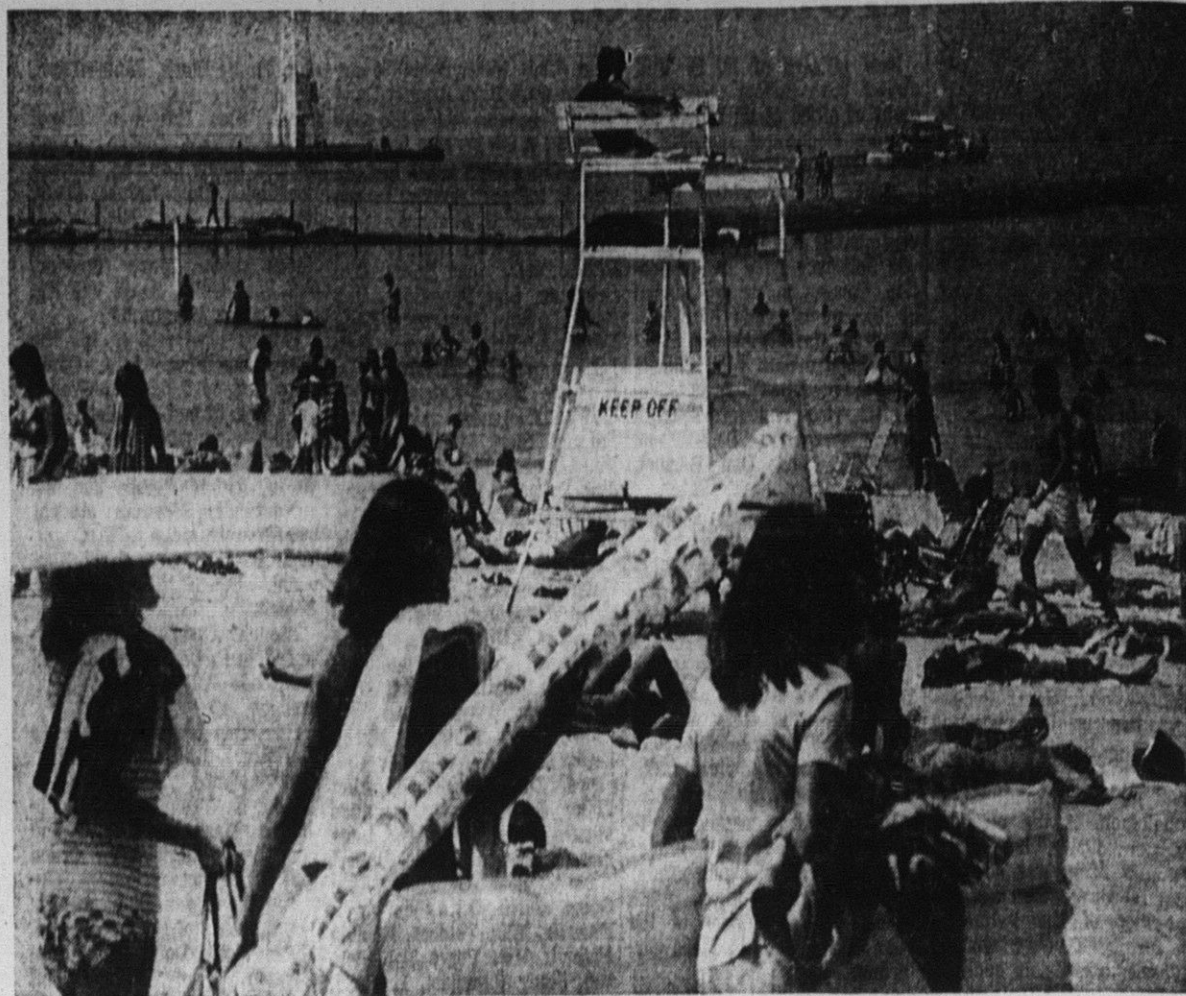
Big Seven champion Kalamazoo Loy Norrix took the team title with six points. Holland and Detroit Mumford were second with five points apiece.

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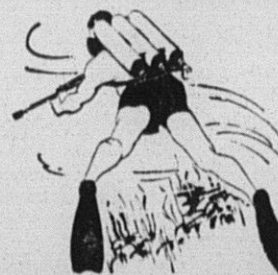

We feel that the playoffs should be expanded to include

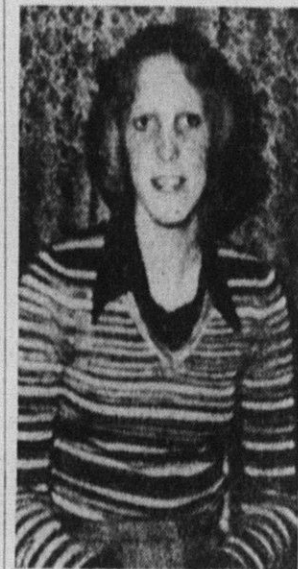
a quarterfinal round with four more qualifiers in each class. The state won't change its ways in 1976 but it could next year and that will be a step in the right direction.

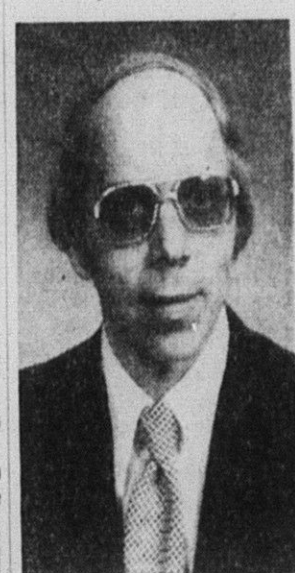

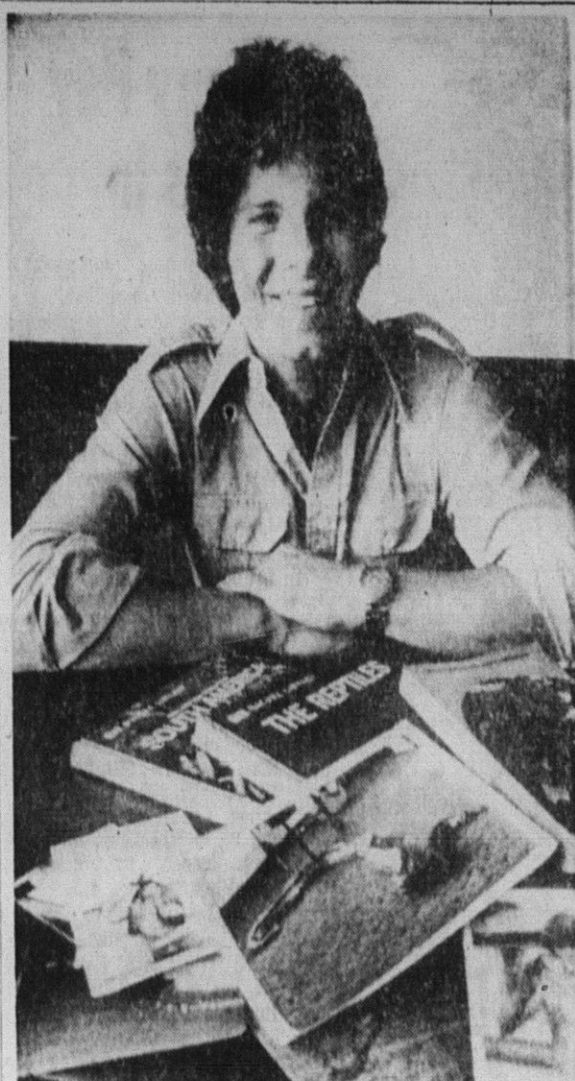

In addition to the jungle wild life, visitors will also see a few Indian tribes (Yaguas and Ticunas) and their villages.

Joel says the job mainly requires that he keep the tourists "enthused" about their trip and to "pass on to them everything I have learned about the Amazon river and jungle."

Joel will also go on nighttime Calman (crocodile-like creatures) hunts, and will help out at Leticia's animal compound. He will be paid \$20 per week and room and board.

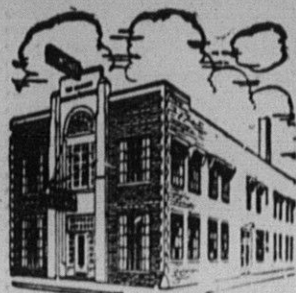

Britain's loan of an original  
copy of Magna Carta was ac-  
complished in ceremonies of  
pomp and splendor, first in Lon-  
don, then in Washington. On the  
second occasion, in the rotunda  
of the Capitol, dignitaries, rep-  
resenting the two countries  
again extolled the great char-  
ter of 1215 as the very trunk  
of the tree of our liberties  
formulated and refined over  
nearly eight centuries.

Lord Elwyn-Jones, speaking  
for the British who are so  
handsomely joining in com-  
memoration of our Bicentennial,  
described Magna Carta as  
"fundamental law against which  
all other laws and executive  
acts should be tested." House  
Speaker Carl Albert called it  
"the most important single po-  
litical document in the long his-  
tory of the English-speaking na-  
tions."

These and other comments  
remind us of what is often re-  
marked, that above all Magna  
Carta — signed at Runnime-  
de by King John under pressure  
from his rebellious barons —  
established the rule of law.  
This concept is conspicuously  
reaffirmed in our own Consti-  
tution.

Yet there is something more  
to be said. It is that were it not  
for the determined, conscient-  
ious actions of judges and oth-  
ers down through the years the  
"rule of law" might be a mock-  
ery.

Documents, even such gen-  
erative documents as Magna  
Carta and the United States  
Constitution, are pieces of pa-  
per. The rights they guarantee  
must be constantly nourished  
and strengthened as each suc-  
ceeding generation of free  
people takes the stage. Ours is  
a government of laws, not man  
— but it is men and women de-  
voted to that great principle  
who breathe life into it.

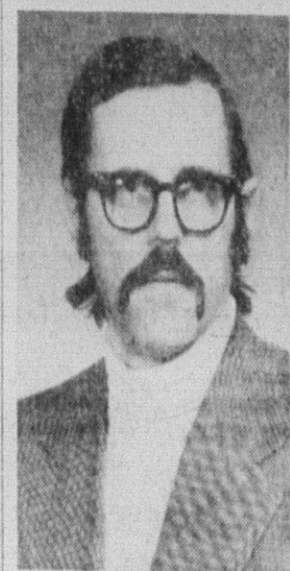

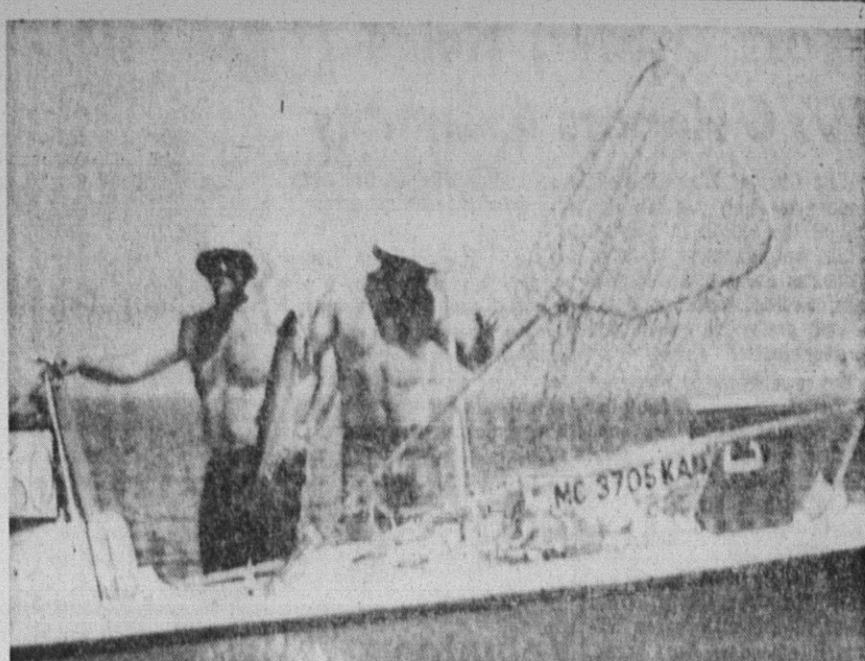

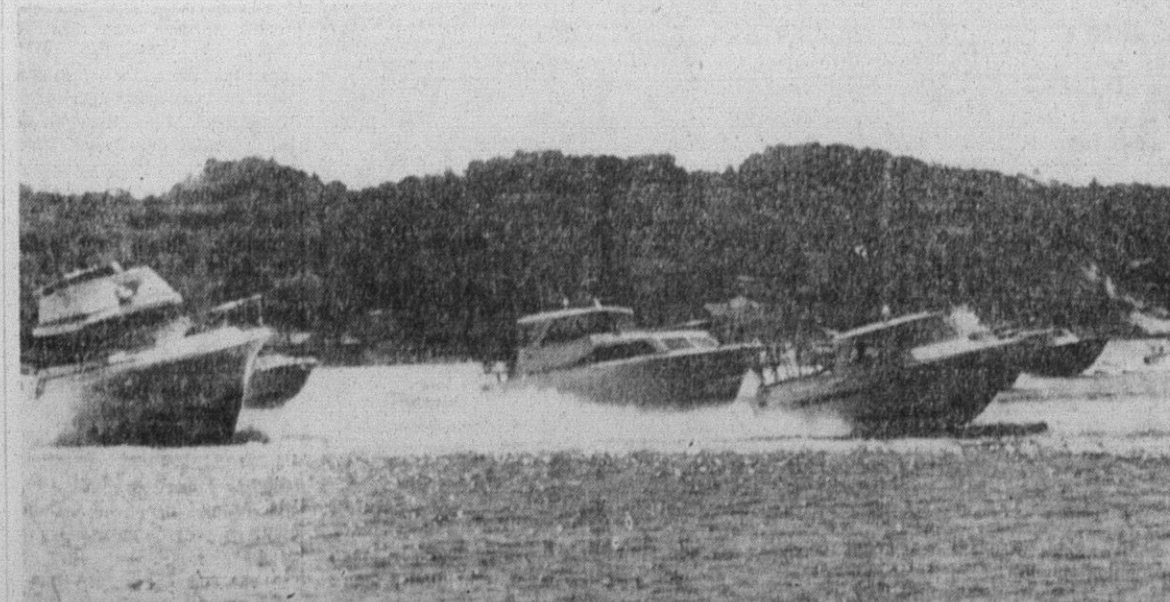

## County To Study Spray Irrigation

GRAND HAVEN — Ottawa County Commissioners Tuesday agreed to study a spray irrigation concept for waste water treatment in the county. A similar proposal for the Holland area was rejected before the present addition to the waste water plant was completed in 1972.

Commissioners reacted favorably to a letter and comments from Donald H. Williams and Thomas O. De Pree, both of Holland and members of the Kalamazoo, Black, Paw Paw, Macatawa Rivershed Advisory council and the Macatawa Task Force.

De Pree, a county supervisor in the early 1970s and an early advocate of spray irrigation, was a strong supporter of the program which eventually was adopted by Muskegon county.

Williams said he was concerned about the quality of water in the county and misuse of water by disposal methods and said a county-wide plan of action was necessary in light of regional studies now underway which would determine the course of waste treatment for decades.

"It seems to me that the county is in the best position to become the agent for such action by virtue of its broad perspective and jurisdiction over so much land," Williams said in his letter.

Commissioner William Kennedy suggested commissioners look toward a county-wide Board of Public Works.

"I strongly feel the county commissioners should give leadership to the planning of waste water treatment and land management," Kennedy added.

Commissioners asked chairman Kenneth Raak of Holland to appoint a committee to study county-wide waste water treatment methods and in particular spray irrigation.

Under the concept of spray irrigation, nutrient-rich effluent would be sprayed on land as fertilizer.

Commissioners authorized the use of surplus funds in a water expansion project in Holland Dr. and Howard Ave. and Division Ave. would be covered with \$65,000 of the surplus funds.
