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Ottawa County Branch Building Issue Confused

Councilmen Refuse To Discuss Other City Hall Area Sites

The site for a county branch office building in Holland remained a confused issue today.

Reluctant to give up the Little Netherlands property at 13th St. and Central Ave., City Council nonetheless declined to discuss possible available sites near City Hall at a regular meeting Wednesday night.

Technically, Council voted down a resolution 7 to 2 to inform Holland Tulip Time Festival, Inc., which has a 10-year lease on the Little Netherlands property to vacate the premises in 60 days. Terminating the lease which runs to 1959 would be a necessary step to turning over the property to the Ottawa County Board of Supervisors.

The county board at a special meeting in Grand Haven May 27 had granted 30 days' delay to allow the city of Holland time to arrange a transfer which would allow the branch building to be built next to City Hall on River Ave. But after two special Council meetings, Council voted down this alternative 7 to 2 on May 31.

To get the issue on the floor Wednesday night, Councilman Raymond Holwerda moved the adoption of the resolution which would notify Tulip Time officials that the lease would be terminated. Only persons in favor of the resolution were Mayor Robert Visser and Councilman John Belmont.

Before the vote was taken, Mayor Visser told Council that the Ottawa County Board of Supervisors will meet Monday and Tuesday for the annual June session, and if the site issue is not resolved in Holland by that time, the county branch building probably will go by default, particularly so far as a central location in Holland is concerned.

"I've done everything humanly possible to get the branch building in a central location in Holland, and Council is placing the city's five members on the county board in a most embarrassing position if something isn't decided soon," the mayor said.

City Clerk Clarence Greengood earlier had read a petition from the Holland Retail Merchants and employees with about 200 signatures asking that the branch building be located in Holland and suggesting that possible sites on 11th St. and 12th St. be given every consideration. The petition stated that the signers do not feel that the proposal to erect the building on the Little Netherlands site is sound or wise, a reiteration of a previous letter from retail merchants.

The city clerk also read a letter from the Holland Board of Realtors stating that it had voted unanimously proposing Council retain Little Netherlands at its present location. Both communications were received and filed without further comment.

Nor was there any comment from the audience of some 35 persons, most of whom were present for other purposes.

Mayor Visser today reiterated previous statements that the county board has been most cooperative and patient, but after two years of discussion it's time for decisions. He pointed out that the county already had spent \$13,750 in purchasing the Ferris home on West 12th St. adjoining the Wagner home which the city offered to the county as an inducement to settle inside the city. The city had spent \$7,000 for the Wagner home. The plan to locate the building there however was abandoned when the appeal board declined to grant a variance.

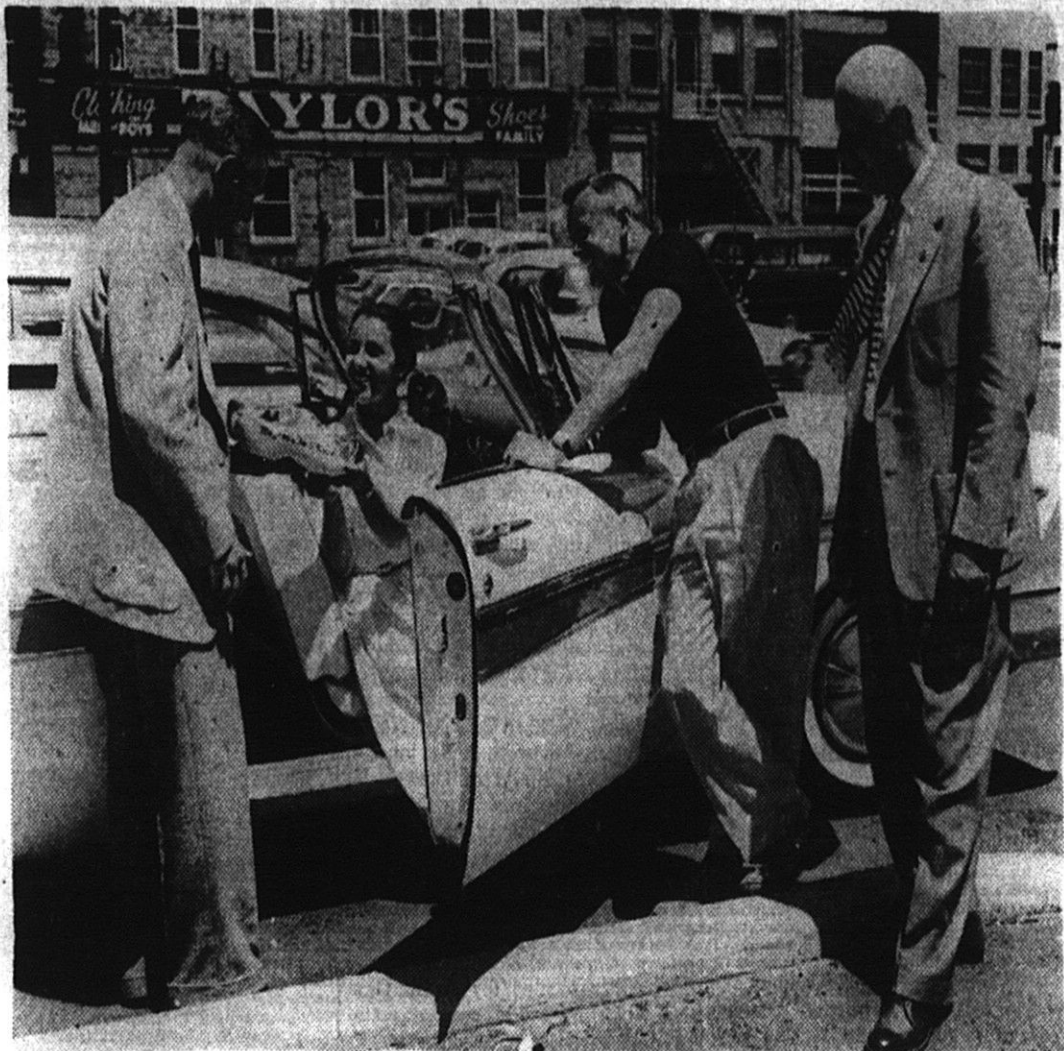
Previously the county board was considering a site a few miles north of the city which at that time could be obtained for \$8,000. The board rejected this option for a central location in Holland city. If the Little Netherlands site is turned over to the county, the resolution provides that the county deed to the city the property on West 12th St.

Dennis Dirkse, 20, Of Hudsonville Drowned in Lake

GRAND HAVEN (Special) — Dennis Dirkse, 20-year-old son of Jacob Dirkse of 5665 40th Ave., Hudsonville, was drowned in Spring Lake about 4:45 p.m. Wednesday.

Dirkse, who was reported to be a poor swimmer, had been water skiing from a boat operated by Jay Stehouwer, of 1719 Gratiot St., N.W., Grand Rapids, and had been let off at a mooring float used for tying sailboats at the Spring Lake Yacht Club about 50 yards offshore. It is believed Dirkse tried to swim to shore without a life jacket.

After Stehouwer had left Dirkse on the float, Arnold Rinzema, of 1530 Tannell St., Grand Rapids, got on the skis and as the boat got underway Stehouwer looked around and saw Dirkse splashing in the water. But by the time he turned the boat around and got back to the float Dirkse had disappeared.

Coast Guardsmen, state police and sheriff's officers dragged for two hours and recovered the body at 6:45 p.m. under the float where the water is 40 feet deep.

Undersheriff Harris Nieuwma who recovered the body indicated no negligence charges would be filed since the victim was not water skiing at the time.

The body was first taken to Barber Funeral Home in Spring Lake. Upon release by Dr. Peter McArthur, medical examiner, the body was taken to Vander Laan Funeral Home in Hudsonville.

In another drowning mishap Wednesday, Ted Hurkmans, 14, East Kingsford, was the victim. He was swimming with some companions in a swimming hole called Powder Lake when he fell into the water. Duo to the murky water, he couldn't be found until an hour later.

Extra Bus Aids West Swimmers

A plan has been worked out this year to aid west end youngsters to get to swimming classes this summer at the Martin Michelsen property on Lake Macatawa.

The first session of classes will be held from July 8 to July 26 and the second session from July 29 to Aug. 16. Registration is being conducted this week at Lincoln School.

Two bus loads of youngsters will be picked up at 1:15 p.m. at Van Raalte School. Participants must register for the first class to take advantage of the bus.

The bus leaves Van Raalte at 1:15 p.m. and class runs from 1:45 to 2:30 p.m. The group arrives back at the pick up point at 3 p.m. The other groups will leave from Lincoln School at 2:05, 3:15 and 4 p.m. The first Lincoln group will swim from 2:30 to 3:15 and return back at 4 p.m.; the second group will swim from 3:40 to 4:25 and be back at Lincoln at 4:45 p.m. and the third group will swim from 4:25 to 5:15 p.m. and return at 5:30 p.m.

A total of 100 Zeeland children will have instruction from 9:30 to 10:15 a.m. followed by 100 from Beechwood from 10:15 to 11 a.m. and 11:15 to 12 noon. Pine Creek, Jamestown, Forest Grove, Vriesland and Borculo kids will swim from 1 to 1:45 p.m. This pattern will be followed during the first session.

The second session calls for Zeeland children at the same time while Harrington and North Holland will swim from 10:15 to 11 a.m. and Lakewood from 11:15 to 12 noon. Additional Zeeland and Jamestown children will swim from 1 to 1:45 p.m.

They won the trip and title at the Detroit Travel Show by answering seven multiple choice questions on Michigan Tourist attractions and an essay question on why they wanted to tour Michigan. They are making the tour as guests of the Automobile Club of Michigan.

Their "dream" itinerary started in Detroit with a sendoff by Mayor Albert Cobo, who presented them with a key to the city. The tour has taken the couple along US-12 and the Lake Michigan shoreline. They will go north to the Straits and return by way of the Lake Huron shore.

New Manager Of Tulip Time

Appointment of Sipp H. Houtman as Tulip Time manager, effective July 1, was announced by President Laverne Rudolph at a meeting of the Tulip Time board of directors Tuesday night in Civic Center.

Houtman, who was associated with Tulip Time as manager in the pre-war period, will succeed Earl F. Price who has served as manager for three years. Price succeeded Larry Wade who also served about three years.

Houtman served as Tulip Time manager in 1939, 1940 and 1941 during the period when Tulip Time continued its climb from a little festival to a big festival. At one time he spent considerable time with Hollywood Producer Joe Pasternak in providing material for the musical "Seven Sweethearts" which featured Kathryn Grayson, cast against a Dutch background. Houtman also worked closely with Wessel Smilter, author of the best seller "FOB Detroit," who had been commissioned by Paramount studios to do a story for Sonja Henie with ice skating in a Holland, Mich., locale. This story, although completed, was never produced.

In other work, the board of directors authorized appointment of a committee of three by Rudolph to work on a Tulip Time budget for next year. The preliminary survey of the financial report for the 1957 budget shows that receipts were down but expenses remain the same. The report is still incomplete.

Suspect Sought By Holland Police

Holland detectives today were investigating a report that a youth answering the description of one who attempted to pick up a Vicksburg young girl had tried the same thing in Holland late Wednesday. Detectives said a resident said he had read the story in Wednesday's Sentinel which told of a search for a youth in connection with the rape-slaying of Mary deCaussin in Detroit last week.

Kalamazoo authorities said they were hunting for a man who tried to entice a girl into his car with a piece of candy. The six-year-old girl said the man was wearing very few clothes.

Local police repeated a frequent warning to parents not to allow their children to talk with strangers or to accept rides, candy or money from them.

The youth being sought is described as 17 to 20 years old, has dark hair, olive complexion and dark eyes. He was reported to be driving a 1951 or 1952 model car and light grey or green in color.

Anyone having any information on this incident or seeing anyone attempting to pick up youngsters is urged to immediately call police and to obtain the car's license number if possible.

C.H. Dickenson Dies in Hospital

GRAND HAVEN (Special) — Charles H. Dickenson, 73, of 209 South Fifth St., died Monday morning in Municipal Hospital after a long illness and confinement.

Born in Coopersville Nov. 24, 1883, he was a graduate of Grand Haven High School and of the Civil Engineering Department of Michigan State College in 1907. He was a member of the National honorary Engineering fraternity, Tau Beta Pi and received his BS degree in Civil Engineering in June 1912 and later his Masters degree.

Employed in Grand Rapids he later was associated with the Detroit Edison Building Department as building inspector. From 1942 until his retirement in 1949 he was heat installing and refractory engineer.

He married Mrs. Isabelle Adams Baker in Detroit and after retirement they moved to Grand Haven in 1951. He was a member of the Presbyterian Church.

Besides the wife he is survived by three daughters, Mrs. William Reiter and Mrs. Mary Posey of Detroit; Mrs. Jean Wagner of Dearborn; a son, Charles H. Dickenson, Jr., of California; two sisters, Mrs. George L. Olsen and Mrs. Thomas Cox of Grand Rapids; 11 grandchildren; two stepsons, Douglas Baker of Spring Lake and Charles Baker of New York City.

C.E. Delegates Arriving Today For Convention

McQuilkin Will Speak At Official Opening Assembly Tonight

Delegates to the 69th annual Michigan Christian Endeavor Convention which opens officially tonight in Third Reformed Church began to trickle into Holland today from all sections of the state. Headquarters are in Third Church where delegates obtained badges, convention material and housing assignments. This afternoon was turned over to recreational pursuits and most of the young people headed for Holland State Park and an afternoon of swimming and sun bathing. The water temperature was 67 and the air 70.

Other attractions listed visits to the Wooden Shoe factory, Netherlands Museum, Little Netherlands, tennis at the city courts and ping pong at the convention church. Nathalie Nyhuis of Allegan, a local school teacher, was recreation chairman.

Tonight's meeting at 7:30 to which the public is invited will feature a message by Arch McQuilkin, trustee of the Pennsylvania Christian Endeavor Union and a life elder in the Presbyterian Church. His subject will be "Let's Get ready to Live."

Brief welcoming messages are scheduled by Mayor Robert Visser speaking for the city, the Rev. Christian Walvoord for the host church, the Rev. Raymond Denekas for the ministerial association and Kay Ten Brink for the Holland and Allegan unions, host unions for the convention.

Driver Charged In Death of Child

Holland police Monday charged Theodore Tervoort, 42, of 147 West 11th St., for driving without due care in the traffic death of a three-year-old boy June 3.

Tervoort was driving a car east on Eighth St. near Pine Ave., May 31 when he struck and fatally injured Douglas Topp, 3, of 94 West Seventh St. as the child darted across the street.

The charge followed a Saturday conference between police officials, city attorneys, and Prosecuting Attorney James Bussard. The charge is a violation of city ordinance 2-1.82.

The child became Holland's first traffic fatality in two and a half years. He died in Holland Hospital June 3, four days after he was injured.

Duane Wiersma, 12, of 753 Ottawa Ave., suffered a deep gash on his lip this morning when the bicycle he was riding collided with a parked car at 357 Wildwood Dr. The boy was treated at Holland Hospital and released.

Officers Probe Strange Death of Grandville Man

Found Critically Injured in Middle Of Tallmadge Road

Ottawa county sheriff's officers Monday were investigating conditions in connection with the death of William Rex Tuttle, 26, Grandville, which occurred in St. Mary's Hospital about 10:30 a.m. Saturday, about six hours after he was found critically injured lying in the middle of Leonard Rd. near 14th Ave. in Tallmadge township.

Tuttle, who lives at 4260 Pine Bend Dr., SW, Grandville, had brought his wife and child home about 10 p.m. Friday after which he reported for work on the mid-night shift at Marvel Refining Co. in Grand Rapids.

According to Tuttle's companion, Ted Sysma who lives in Tallmadge township, Tuttle checked out of work at 1 a.m. and he and Sysma visited several establishments before ending up in the Sysma home. The two men agreed to meet at a drive-in in a short time and Tuttle left while Sysma remained to change clothes.

En route to the drive-in restaurant, Sysma saw Tuttle's car in the middle of the road with Tuttle inside. Tuttle told Sysma he was all right and could be joining him shortly at the drive-in. When Tuttle failed to appear, Sysma went looking for him and met a car with a trailer. Then he found Tuttle lying in the middle of the road badly injured. Officers believe Tuttle had stopped his car because there was evidence he had vomited in the road. His death was caused by a skull fracture which encircled most of the upper part of his head. He also received a severe gash above the eye.

Just before Sysma arrived, three Grand Rapids fishermen headed for Spring Lake came upon the scene. The driver, Donald E. McTivitz, of 1104 Diamond Ave., NE, Grand Rapids, told officers he saw a car with lights on in the east bound lane of traffic and then saw the body in the road. He swerved to the right and there was a possibility the car may have hit the victim's legs. Riding with McTivitz were Mike and Stanley Milanowski.

Tuttle is survived by the wife, the former Mabel Darlene Williams, and a daughter, Jeanette Leora. Another child is expected in August.

Van Wyk of Muskegon and the charge to the congregation by the Rev. Ralph Menning.

As his first official act, the new pastor will give the benediction. The public is invited.

Pipeline Project Still Under Study

ZEELAND (Special) — Seven Western Michigan communities will vote by July 12 whether they will attempt construction of a water pipeline from Lake Michigan.

Representatives of the seven communities met in Grandville Thursday night. The two major possibilities open to the communities if they activate such an authority are to build a water pipeline from Lake Michigan with the seven areas as members, or, to work in connection with Grand Rapids. There is some possibility that Grand Rapids will build another pipeline and sell water to the seven members of the authority.

The seven areas considering the formation of the authority are the same ones which voted for the formation of the Greater Grand Rapids-Ottawa Water Authority, but which was turned down by Grand Rapids voters in the June 4 election. The communities include East Grand Rapids, Zeeland, Hudsonville, Grandville, and Wyoming, Paris and Georgetown townships. Many legal and engineering technicalities have to be ironed out before the group can decide to build a pipeline, because the plans were geared to include Grand Rapids.

The state equalized valuation for the seven communities was previously believed to be under \$200 million, which would make it impossible according to state law, to build a pipeline without Grand Rapids being included. After careful study, it was discovered that the valuation for the areas is \$216 million. Thomas Robinson, a representative of the engineering firm of Black and Veatch, estimated that the communities could build a pipeline for \$18,210,000.

Elmer Hartzgerink, chairman of the Zeeland Board of Public Works, estimates that it would be four years before a pipeline could be in operation if the authority does decide to take action. Also attending the meeting in Grandville Thursday night from Zeeland was Peet Brill, a member of the Board of Public Works.

Thrown From Car After Collision North of Holland

Officers Unable to Question Drivers; Injured in Hospital

A West Olive woman was instantly killed shortly before noon today and her husband was among three others injured in a two car crash at 120th Ave. and Port Sheldon Rd.

Mrs. Gerrit Van DeWeg, about 45, route 2, West Olive died of multiple fractures. She was thrown from her husband's car and pinned underneath it.

Gerrit Van DeWeg, 49, received a head injury and his condition was described as critical. Claud Scott, 60, route 4, received head and left wrist lacerations and is reported in good condition. Victor Milton, 38, of 122 Putnam, Grand Rapids, received a fractured pelvis and multiple lacerations and is reported in good condition. All are in Holland Hospital.

Ottawa County deputies said that Van DeWeg was apparently heading north on 120th Ave., and the car driven by Milton was westbound on the Port Sheldon Rd.

Deputies were not immediately able to question either driver. The Van DeWeg car collided broadside with the Milton vehicle. Both cars locked together and slid out of the intersection into an open field.

Scott and Milton both remained inside their vehicle. Van DeWeg was knocked from her car into a ditch.

Both late model vehicles were demolished. Pieces of the windshield from Scott's car were found 50 feet away from the vehicle.

Deputies said there were apparently no witnesses to the accident. Scott said he was on his way to a funeral in the car driven by his son-in-law.

Summer Reading Program Booming

The children's summer reading program sponsored by the Holland Public Library is off to a booming start with a circulation figure of 2,581 books checked out under this program since it began on June 10. On the first day of the program the library checked out 678 books.

So far around 500 children are enrolled in the session which this year is centering around the theme, "Modern American Explorers." The library hopes this summer to go beyond their last year's enrollment of 737.

A free party planned for Saturday, Sept. 7, at Kollen Park, and a certificate is in store for each child who enrolls in the program and completely reads 10 books during the summer.

Each child enrolled has a map of the United States which is kept in the library. The children must choose books from the grade into which they will be going in the fall. The first 10 books must each be about a different state. After the child gives an oral report or answers questions to show he has read the book, he is given a picture of the particular state about which he has read to paste on his map. When his 10 books are completed, the child can pick a book on any state and get credit for any other state he desires.

The grades included in the program run from the first grade through high school. The books are both fiction and non-fiction. 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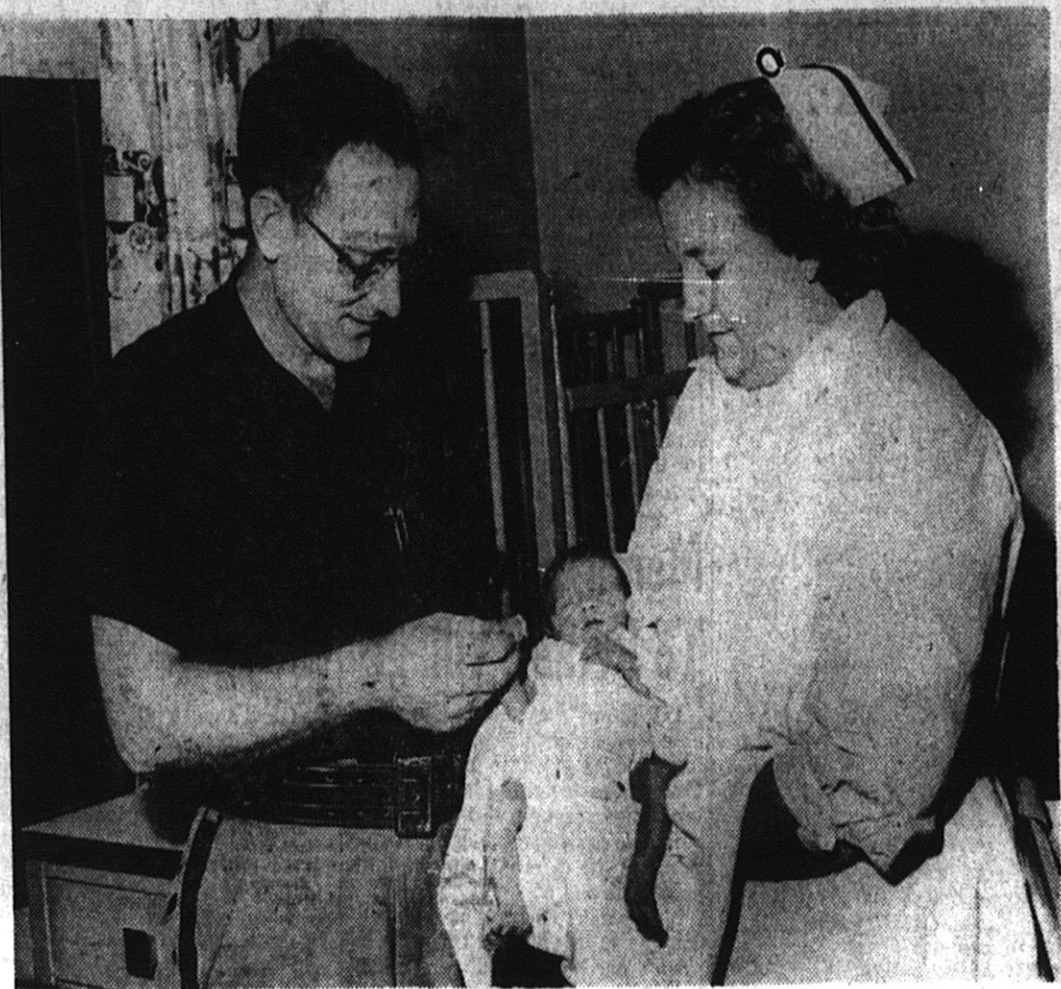

Baby's Identity Still Unknown to Authorities

Twenty-four hours have passed since a four to 10-day-old baby was found in a mailbox on Butternut Dr. near Port Sheldon Tuesday and the baby still remains unidentified.

Ottawa County deputies believe the baby was placed in the box two to three hours before it was found by West Olive mail carrier Robert Bethke.

The T-shirt and skirt wrapped around the baby bore no identifying marks except a small label in the red and white striped T-shirt.

Meanwhile a flood of calls have been pouring into the Grand Haven hospital and Probate Court seeking to adopt the baby.

Ken Bosman, juvenile agent for the court, said the baby will remain in the hospital for at least several more days and will then be placed in a boarding home for three months.

Bethke was complimented by the West Olive postmaster for making the right decision in calling the Sheriff's Department. Technically, however, he violated postal regulations.

According to the postal manual, all non-mailable matter should be turned over to the postmaster.

After all, said Postmistress Mrs. Anne M. Polich, the baby's health was the first concern. It would have been a five-mile run to the postoffice and a newly-tarred road would have forced Bethke to leave his mail route another breach of postal regulations.

Mrs. Polich was at a loss as to whether a formal report would have to be submitted to the post-office department. The district manager's office at Grand Rapids promised to notify her if such a report would be necessary.

Cornelius Voorhorst was appointed moderator and Hendrick Brower and Jan Boer were appointed inspectors of the first election. The officers elected for the year were: Voorhorst, supervisor; Jan Boers, clerk; Hendrick Bower, treasurer; Gerrit J. Wolteink and Henry J. Michmerhuizen and Bartel Vredveld, justices of the peace.

Lucas Dangremont and Hendrick Brower were elected school inspectors; Harm Wolters, R. Van Dam and Hendrick Beltman, highway commissioners; Elbert Nykerk and Harm Schepers, directors of the poor and Mannes Hulsmann and Albert Vredveld, constables.

The first cemetery was begun in 1848 when Cornelius Voorhorst gave an acre of land on his farm to be devoted to burial. The first burial was the child of Gerrit J. Veldhuis in 1848.

The following supervisors served the township from 1857 to 1957: Cornelius Voorhorst, Hendrick Brower, Gerrit H. Nykerk, Mannes Veldhuis, Gerrit H. Koopman, John J. Hulst, Harm G. Ver Beek and Gerrit J. Lampen.

The following clerks served the township since 1857: Jan Boers, Hendrick Kok, H. Brower, John Bollen, Ben Voorhorst and James A. Kleinheksel.

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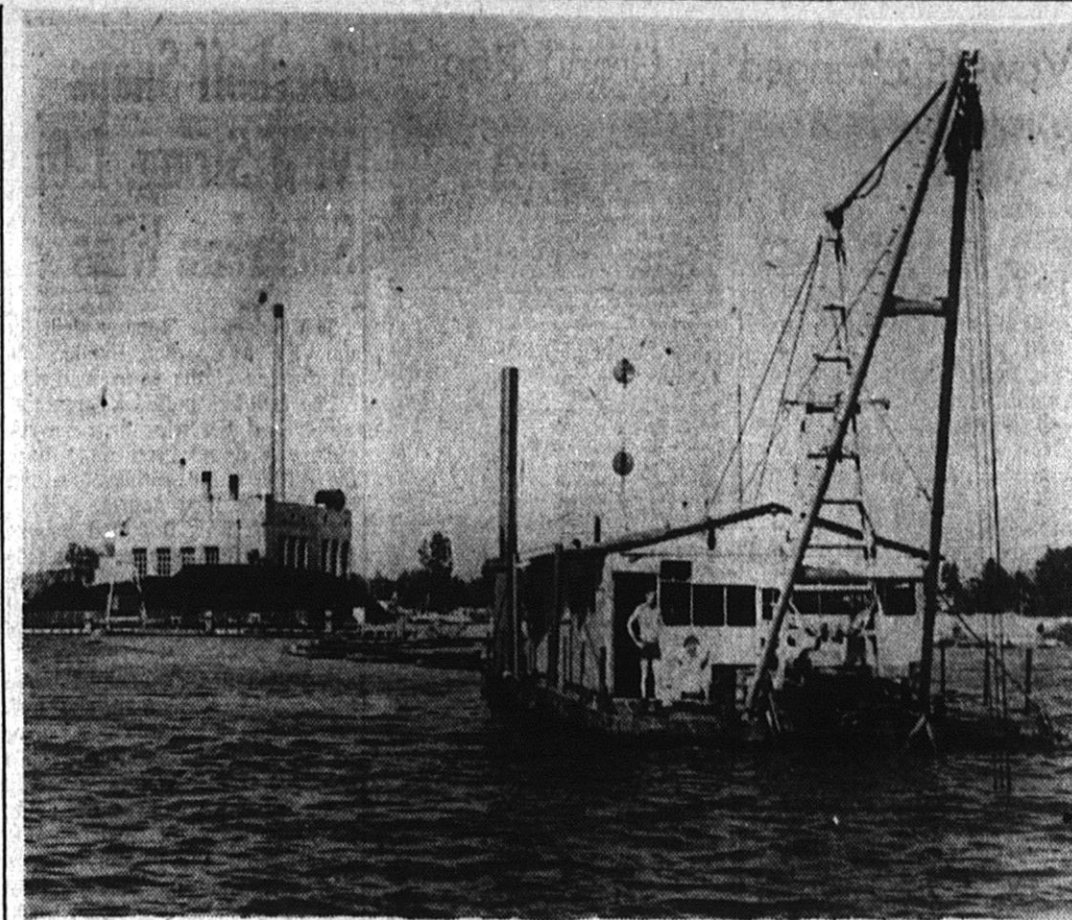

Library Adventures

Biographies are getting briefer. This type of literature is feeling the effect of the "digest" movement in periodical literature; it looks as if modern man just does not have the time to read the fat volumes in biography that once were the fashion.

A great New York and London publishing house, the Macmillan Company, has taken note of this new demand for brevity by bringing out a series of books under the general title, "Brief Lives." In the last listing I saw there were 14 titles in print, with others to follow.

"Brief Lives" is made up of volumes that seldom run to so many as 150 pages, and the page in each case is somewhat smaller than the page of a conventional biographical volume. A typical volume in the group can be read in a couple of hours at average reading speed.

Perhaps because of the fact that the books come from the presses of the London publishing house of Macmillan, 12 of the 14 titles so far issued deal with British subjects. The only two exceptions are "Rupert of the Rhine," by Bernard Fergusson, and "Abraham Lincoln," by Herbert Agar. But since Lincoln is almost as much a subject for British as for American biographers, the list remains almost unanimously British in character.

An important thing about "Brief Lives" is the fact that the biographies are written, every one of them, by specialists in their field. They are in no sense hastily slapped together by "popularizers;" books of that type seldom are worth reading. The chances are that each volume, represents a much labor in research as the traditional two-volume biographies that were common in the nineteenth century.

There is no attempt to make the biographies seem attractive by jazzing up the titles. Trying to attract readers by giving a picturesque title to a volume is a technique that is familiar to the "popularizers." In the new series the title is invariably simply the name of the person treated in the volume. Thus the life of Lincoln is simply called "Abraham Lincoln," no more and no less; Queen Victoria is simply treated under the title, "Queen Victoria," and so on all along the line.

Neither is there any attempt to jazz up the text of the volumes. At least those of the group I have read are sober and scholarly. There is no debunking, there are no efforts at smartness, no attempts to win reader appeal through rhetorical devices. The authors depend exclusively on the solid historical scholarship. Style and diction differ with different writers, but all the books are characterized by the same appeal to the intellectual curiosity of the reader class.

That means that the biographies in "Brief Lives" are not for readers who wish to become acquainted with a large number of celebrated figures as a substitute for watching a jazzed up television program. The reading is almost certainly going to be a total loss to those who approach the books in that spirit.

The proper reading for "Brief Lives" calls for a wide background in the periods discussed, on the part of the readers. Given such knowledge, the readers will find the books excellent summarizing accounts of some of the great figures of history.

Boaters Reminded To Get Numbers

All inboard motorboats, regardless of their size, and outboards exceeding 16 feet in length when operated on any of the five Great Lakes, must be numbered by the U. S. Coast Guard.

The only exception to this law are public vessels, motor lifeboats carried as lifesaving equipment on inspected vessels, and other vessels documented by the U. S. Customs Department.

The numbering act is for the purpose of identification only, it is not a license, or permit, for any such boat to engage in trade. To obtain a certificate of award of number, the boat owner may contact the Holland Coast Guard station on the north shore of Lake Macatawa.

Once a number has been issued the boat owner, he must display that number upon both bows of his boat, in letters at least three inches high and in contrasting colors to the background.

Grand Haven Planning Water Patrol Program

GRAND HAVEN (Special) — Plans have been completed for renting three inboard runabout power boats on an hourly basis for law enforcement in the trillies, mainly reckless driving or operating a craft while intoxicated. There will be patrols on Grand River, on Spring Lake and its tributaries and in the Grand Haven channel. Patrols will concentrate particularly on weekends. Meanwhile, the Coast Guard will cooperate by stepping up its boarding program, inspection of life preservers, lights for night use and fire extinguishers, required by law.

The new water patrol will be financed by the Grand Haven and Spring Lake police departments, Spring Lake township and the Ottawa sheriff's department. With water skiing a growing problem, the committee will meet soon with skiers to discuss a control program to reduce the hazard of skiers skimming over local waters, endangering other boaters, swimmers, bathers and fishermen.

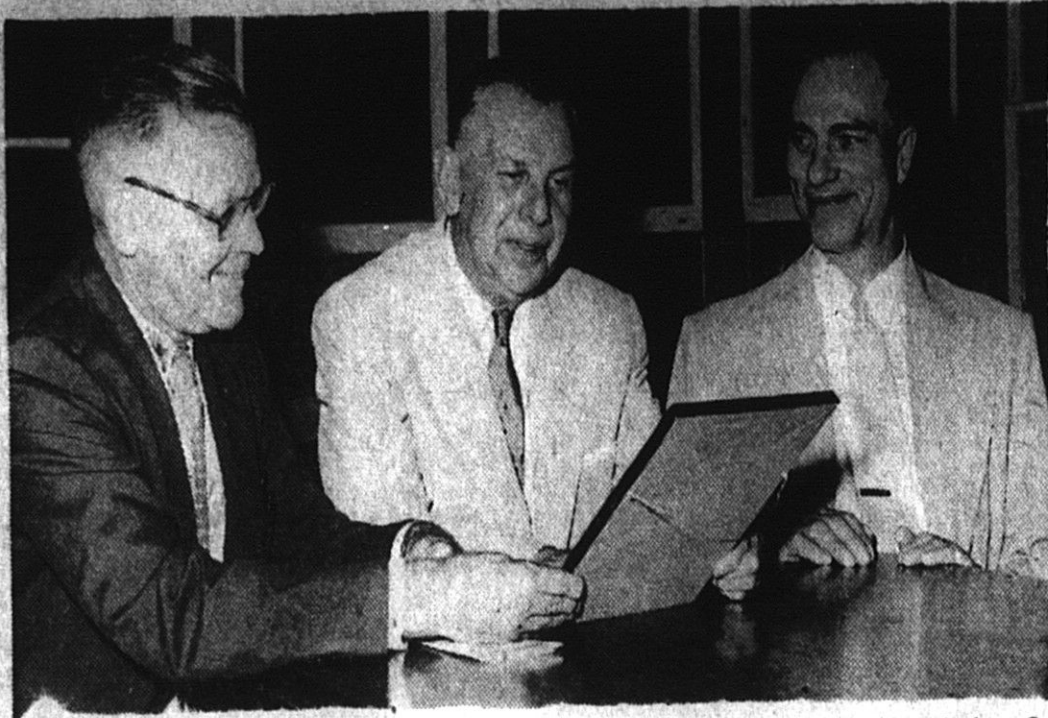

Well, officers arrived on the scene and arrested Tata. He told them that he "was accustomed to swimming nude in the 'Y' in Detroit and couldn't resist the temptation to do likewise in the big lake."

Tata said he was spending a few days visiting here.

The incident occurred at the end of Brand and Harbor Aves. Other bathers in conventional bathing suits, were about three blocks away.

Tata was arraigned in Grand Haven Municipal Court a short while later on a disorderly conduct charge and was assessed \$25 fine and \$5.10 costs.

Bullet Narrowly Misses Children

A 13-year-old Holland boy who became frightened after watching a television show, fired his father's deer rifle at a non-existent shadow and narrowly missed striking two children in bed nearby a block away.

Holland detectives said the boy had watched the show and then went upstairs where he picked up the gun, loaded it, and fired from the second floor of his home.
