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City Council Okays New Wage Plan

City Employees Put
On 40-Hour Week
Except Firemen

City Council Wednesday night adopted a classification and compensation plan for city employees as recommended by a special committee on wages and salaries which will cost the city an additional \$50,000 for the coming year, an amount which has been provided in city budget adopted last month.

One of the main features of the new plan is to reduce the basic work week for all city employees to 40 hours except firemen who will be on a 63-hour week. To compensate for some employees who have been working 48 and 44 hours a week, the plan provided for certain steps in specified ranges.

The pay program for the coming year is largely the classification and compensation plan prepared by the Public Administration Service last December, with some revisions made last February.

The plan also provides that prior to Oct. 1, 1959, the hospital and surgical insurance program of the city be changed to a deductible or co-insurance plan. The city manager also is directed to complete a personnel code that will provide for uniform rules and regulations on personnel procedures.

The new program covers city employees in general departments, the hospital, Board of Public Works and City Library. The estimated \$10,000 also provides for some new employees who will be needed as shifts in the 48-hour and 44-hour week are made.

The program was introduced by John Van Eerden, chairman of the Council committee on wages and salaries. Other members of the committee were Ernest Phillips, Nelson Bosman and William Heeringa. The committee has been meeting with city employees, their representatives and department heads over a period of several months.

Council okayed the committee recommendation 8 to 1, with Councilman Phillips dissenting. Richard Kemp, a labor official representing a number of city employees, said Council's action concurred with aims of the employees and thanked the committee for its many kindnesses and the time spent in an effort to develop a good plan. Mayor Robert Visscher also thanked the committee for its work and discharged it since it had completed its assignment.

By a vote of 6 to 3, Council approved a city manager recommendation on bus licenses for the Holland City Bus Line and Lake Shore Line, a subject which had been tabled at the June 3 meeting. The recommendation called for licenses for both firms, but specified that the Lake Shore Line "shall not establish, advertise or make regular bus stops east of Ottawa Ave. except the bus terminal at Eighth St. and Lincoln Ave."

Council spent 40 minutes discussing the situation. Alden Vander Kolk spoke for the Holland City Bus Line and George Lievens, local attorney, represented the Lake Shore Bus Line. The issue arose after the city boundaries were extended. Previously, the Holland City Bus Line operated within Holland City and not further than two miles outside, and Lake Shore Bus Line operated routes extending to Macatawa Park, Ottawa Beach and other locations under the Michigan Public Service Commission.

Dissenting votes were cast by Councilmen Richard Smith, William De Haan and John Van Eerden.

In other business, Council approved a Library Board recommendation awarding a contract for multi-tier book stacks for Holland's new library to Hamilton Manufacturing Co. of Two Rivers, Wis., for \$27,608, lowest of three bids received. The bids had been opened June 12 and received further study by Arthur Read whom the Library retained as consultant on the matter.

Council also authorized Read to negotiate with the sub-contractor engaged to install other floor coverings in the building in stack areas which were not included in the general building contract.

All Councilmen were present at the meeting which was delayed until shortly before 8 p.m. for discussion on the salary issue at a pre-Council meeting. Councilman Nelson Bosman gave the invocation. William Oonk represented Van Raalte area as ex-officio representative.

Port Sheldon Plans Citizens Meeting

PORT SHELTON (Special) — The Port Sheldon Township Planning committee today announced a citizens meeting to be held Monday at 7:45 p.m. in Robart school to discuss a bond issue for the construction of a new rural high school and a July 1 election to vote on an ordinance permitting Consumers Power Co. to carry on an electric business in Port Sheldon township for a period of 30 years.

This ordinance grants right, power and authority to construct, maintain and commercially use electric lines consisting of towers, masts, poles, transformers and other electrical appliances on and across the highways, streets, alleys and other public places.

There also will be a report on progress of a new town hall currently under consideration as well as other business. The township board will be present, also a representative of the West Ottawa School District.

Boat Hits Submerged Piling in Grand River

GRAND HAVEN (Special) — Shortly after noon Sunday, a runabout boat owned and operated by Ralph C. Donaldson of Grand Rapids, hit some submerged piling in Grand Rapids in Tallmadge township causing about \$200 damage.

As the boat started to sink, Donaldson jumped overboard and swam ashore while a passing boat towed the boat with three other occupants to shore. With Donaldson were his wife, Eva, and Mr. and Mrs. J. Stempel of Grand Rapids. Donaldson told state police he was traveling about eight miles an hour and had spotted some piling 40 feet away which he sought to avoid. A hole 2½ feet by four inches was torn in the bottom of the boat on the starboard side.

School Vote Set July 13 In Zeeland

ZEELAND (Special) — Voters in Zeeland school district will go to the polls Monday, July 13, to elect two board members and to vote special operating millage amounting to .93 mill. Polls will be open in the old high school gymnasium from 1 to 8 p.m.

Board members whose terms expire this year are Vern Poest and Randall Dekker. Candidates have until June 23 to file petitions. Poest and Dekker have not announced publicly whether they will be candidates for reelection.

The Zeeland school district covers Zeeland city and parts of Zeeland, Holland, Olive and Blendon Townships. About 80 per cent of the assessments lie in Zeeland city.

The board at its June 2 meeting adopted resolutions to levy nine mills for operations and four mills for debt service. The .93 mill vote would make operation millage uniform throughout the district since certain areas may levy only 8.07 mills for school operations, as determined by the Ottawa County Tax Allocation Commission. Areas not in home rule cities are subject to the 15-mill limitation covering school operations, county and township operations. Home rule cities may share 15 mills for school operations and county operations.

In any case, nine mills will be levied in Zeeland city since the tax allocations commission has allowed "split millage" for the district without exceeding 15 mills. A favorable vote on the .93 mill would bring all areas in Zeeland school district to the nine-mill levy.

State Owes Ottawa Over \$400,000

Since last January United Press International has carried hundreds of thousands of words on its wires or Michigan's cash crisis. There were predictions that by June Michigan's debt would be \$110,000,000.

But who was owed what—and how much?

UPI has tabulated all these figures in a county-by-county breakdown, compiled by George Weeks, UPI Lansing manager.

Ottawa County is listed for \$400,569 under the general tabulation and Allegan County for \$295,476.

The Ottawa breakdown follows: armories, \$3,600; county fairs, \$19,750; liquor licenses, \$15,841; school aid, \$359,903; veterans tax exemption, \$1,475.

Allegan breakdown: county fairs, \$13,000; liquor licenses, \$11,600; school aid, \$263,848; veterans tax exemption, \$3,028.

A second tabulation on lesser items lists \$8,934 for Ottawa and \$5,886 for Allegan. Ottawa lists delinquent tax properties, \$66 fee branch payroll, \$903; school lunch, \$32; foster care, \$116; operators and chauffeur's licenses, \$1,260; crippled children, \$6,388. Allegan lists delinquent tax properties, \$1,145; fee branch payroll, \$645; school lunch, \$19; operator's and chauffeur's licenses, \$691; crippled children, \$3,386.

According to UPI tabulations, total owed counties under various classifications is \$38,575,247, of which \$27,875,202 is for school aid.

Parke, Davis Studies Bids

DETROIT — Parke-Davis Co. today evaluated bids on a new 80,000 square foot chemical manufacturing plant at Holland, Mich.

The company accepted and opened bids on the new plant Wednesday but a spokesman said it would take several days to evaluate the bids and make an award. Total cost will approximate \$6.4 million.

Plans call for construction of a two-story, H-shaped building made largely of pre-stressed concrete. It will have plastic windows.

A spokesman said the company will make fine chemicals in the plant for use in other products of the company.

The new building will boost to 250,000 square feet the floor area of the plant facilities Parke-Davis has on a 28 acre site at Holland.

Parke-Davis now employs 150 persons in six buildings at Holland.

New Sewage Plant Will Use Bonds

Plans for providing a new sewage disposal system for Holland took another step toward reality Wednesday night when City Council adopted a Board of Public Works recommendation on a "cost estimate" which provides for 25-year general obligation bonds in the amount of \$2,900,000.

The BPW report included revised plans by Black and Veatch, consulting engineers. In view of the annexation of two new areas to the east and west of the city, engineers revised plans originally introduced last January to extend service to these areas.

Previously, City Council adopted a program of charges for sewerage service and the plan adopted will provide approximately \$65,000 over and above operating and maintenance expenses.

The report stated that the annual debt service on 25-year bonds at 4 per cent would be approximately \$190,000 per year. Surplus from revenue would reduce this to about \$124,200 to be paid from taxes. Assuming the new assessed valuation at \$45,000,000, the needed tax millage would be 2.76 mills.

In other business, Mayor Robert Visscher appointed Hero Bräfl to a five-year term on the Library Board, and Henry Vander Ploeg, Vern Schipper and Robert Strabbing to three-year terms on the traffic and safety commission. He also appointed George Dalman to the panel of space heating examiners. All were reappointed with the exception of George Dalman who succeeds his brother, Andrew Dalman. Council approved the appointments.

Council accepted with thanks the following gifts for Holland Hospital: as reported by the Hospital Board emergency oxygen unit from Christian Reformed Auxiliary, \$65; wheelchair from Martha Kollen guild, \$126.01; two walkers from North Shore guild, \$155.30. The Hospital Board also informed Council that the last two or three months has seen an increase in the number of patients which has resulted in an increase in expenses and in revenues. This report was accepted as information.

City Manager Herb Holt recommended various end-of-the-year budget adjustments for the 1958-59 budget, all of which were approved.

A city manager report was presented in connection with the parking program on Seventh St. between Central and College Aves. and Council approved leases for Gerrit C. Knoll and Martin Oudemool who each own a strip of property on the west side of the lot 10 feet in width by 132 feet. This area will provide an additional row of parking.

The city clerk was authorized to obtain bids for purchasing 122 parking meters for the new lot, obtaining bids on both automatic and manual types. Cost is estimated at \$6,000 and is provided for in the parking meter fund.

Council adopted a resolution suggested by the city manager on accepting certain county roads due to annexation which became effective June 5. This includes 3.52 miles of primary roads and 22.17 miles of local roads, lying in both Holland and Park townships.

Council adopted resolutions relative to utilization of the services of the Federal Reserve Bank of Chicago and also the Detroit Branch of the Federal Reserve Bank of Chicago for the safekeeping of U.S. government securities owned by the city for the Board of Public Works.

Council accepted for first reading a new ordinance which would extend present township zoning regulations in areas annexed to Holland last year until Holland city adopted revised regulations and maps for the new areas. A public hearing on the ordinance will be held July 15 at 7:30 p.m.

Applications from Theisen Clemens Co. to build a gasoline station at the northeast corner of Michigan Ave. and 32nd St. replacing an existing station, and for a permit to remodel a gasoline station at 500 West 17th St. and to move tanks were referred to the city manager for report.

No Parking On River Ave. Considered

Two traffic proposals recommended by the Traffic and Safety Commission were tabled by City Council Wednesday night.

One called for removing all parking on the west side of River Ave. between the hours of 3 and 6 p.m. including Sundays and holidays. This would affect parking from 12th St. to North River at Pine. Parking already is restricted on the east side, and on both sides south of 12th St.

The other recommended removal of certain parking meters in the downtown areas, generally at corners and at some intersection crosswalks. The report also recommended that two parking meters be installed on the east side of College Ave. north of Eighth St. in area presently available.

Council generally tables traffic recommendations to learn public reaction before final action is taken.

Referred to the Traffic and Safety Commission was a suggestion of Council William Heeringa for a drag strip for Holland.

Heeringa pointed out that a well supervised drag strip would reduce racing on city streets. There was a question whether this might be classified as a recreational matter, but Council decided it belonged with traffic and safety.

A petition requesting water service in Holland Heights subdivision in the area south of Woodbridge (East Eighth St.) extending to 112th Ave. on the east and 12th St. on the south, was referred to the city manager for the necessary reports.

The oath of office of Clarence Jalving as a member of the Hospital Board was filed.

Gerald Marier, 14, of 155 West 15th St., and Charles Browner, 12, of 361 Maple Ave., have collected over \$3 in two days from their friends and neighbors who have given donations to see a collection of turtles, alligators, frogs and fish. Their small-scale zoo is set up in the backyard of the Marier home.

The main attraction of the zoo is a pair of baby alligators which Gerald is caring for this summer. They belong in the general science department of E.E. Fell Junior High School, and were used in Gerald's class taught by Leonard Dick. The boys have 28 turtles, including six different kinds.

The "zoo-keepers" opened their display Tuesday and hope to continue it throughout the summer.

Patty played a consistent driving and putting game in winning the semi final Miss Way had trouble with her curves and was slicing them all over the fairway.

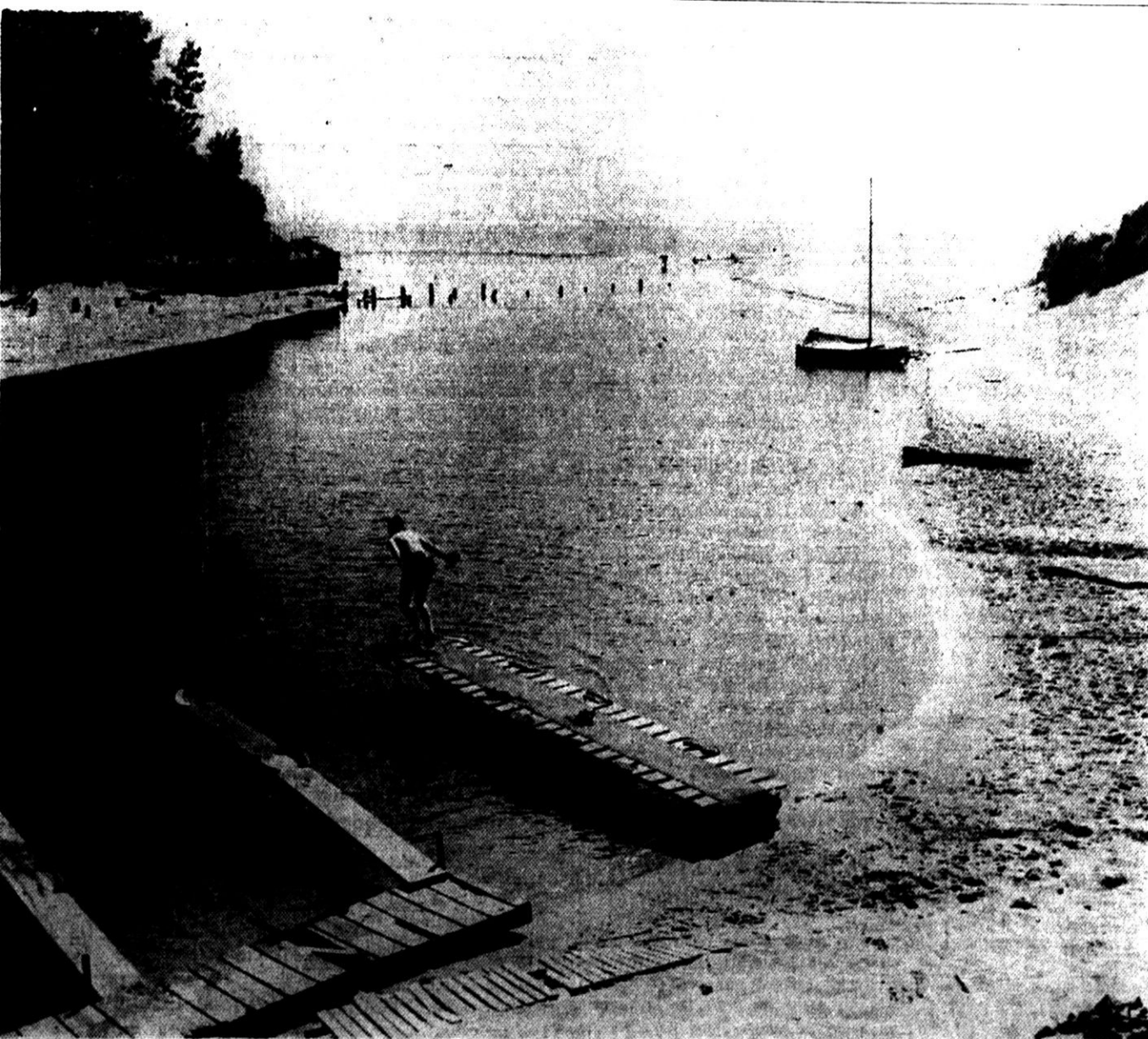
Appointments Made In Holland Township

Man Is Held For Larceny From Banks

GRAND HAVEN (Special) — Prosecuting Attorney James W. Bussard Saturday authorized the issuance of a warrant on a charge of larceny by trickery for an Indiana man who allegedly defrauded two banks at Grand Haven, two banks at Holland, and also banks at Saugatuck, Benton Harbor, St. Joseph, Dearborn, and other cities.

Authorities said Leroy C. Chaney, 36, of Ft. Wayne, is now being held by police at Tiffin, Ohio, on a similar charge.

Holland police said that on May 18, Chaney appeared at the Peoples State Bank in Holland, representing himself as Raymond Waters of the Waters Products Co., and opened an account with a deposit of \$50. Later he returned and deposited two checks, from Detroit area banks, for \$390 and \$358.

Then, police said, Chaney drew out \$348 from the bank and left before the checks were returned for lack of funds, thus getting \$298 from the bank.

Allegan OKs Cleminshaw Appraisals

ALLEGAN (Special) — With one dissenting vote from William Whitcomb, Allegan City Council voted Wednesday night to enter into a contract with the J. M. Cleminshaw Co. for a complete reappraisal of all commercial personal property assessments in the city.

City Manager P. H. Beauvais said that the city would get back the \$3,600 which the work will cost in "two or three years" through more realistic assessments.

Wisteria belongs to the pea family and grows best in deep, rich loam, not too dry. Only grafted or layered plants from flowering specimens should be planted because seedlings often do not bloom.

Sunday School
Lesson

Sunday, June 21
Jehoshaphat, Wise King of Judah
II Chronicles 19:4-11
By C. P. Dame

Judah had some bad kings and some that were good. Our lesson text directs our minds to one of the good kings who did much for his country and for the cause of religion. Jehoshaphat showed his wisdom by his efforts to strengthen the cause of religion in his nation.

I. Godliness benefits a nation. Jehoshaphat was 35 years old when he began to rule and he reigned 25 years in Jerusalem. His mother's name was Azubah and his father was Asa, who on the whole did what was right in the sight of God. The son did his best to build the nation along all lines. One of the first things he did was to build up the fortifications of Judah. No nation is strong if it has only material fortifications and this Jehoshaphat knew real well and therefore the king also did his best to exterminate idolatry and all the foul practices that were associated with it. In II Chronicles 17 it is recorded that the king "took away the high places and the Asherim out of Judah." It is not enough to take away something from a people—it is also necessary to give them something instead. And this the king did.

In the third year of the king's reign he sent his princes, laymen, five in number and two priests and nine Levites into the cities of Judah who taught the people. And what did they teach? The men had the book of the law with them and this they taught to all his people. The king knew that his people needed instruction in the doctrines of the ancient religion, and so he promoted adult religious education. Our people need instruction in the doctrines of our Christian faith most urgently. In the 14th century John Wycliff organized and sent out his "poor priests" who taught the English people the Bible in the vernacular and the work of these men did much to prepare the nation for the Reformation. Sound religion strengthens a nation — this history clearly teaches.

II. Justice is essential to the strengthening of a nation. The establishment of sound religion should be followed by the promotion of justice. The king set judges in the land "throughout all the fenced cities of Judah, city by city." A sound judicial system is important. Evidently there was a need for it in the land. A good system is commendable but not enough — the character of the judges is also important. The king gave instructions to these judges. Bribes, perversion of justice, partiality, were forbidden. The king impressed upon the minds of these judges that they were responsible to God—they judged not for man, but for God. These men were the representatives of God and hence they should give decisions upon which God could give his approval. In those days bribery was common. A reading of the prophetic writings makes that clear. The Hebrew religion taught that all people, the great and the little, are accountable to God.

It is worth noting that the king made it possible for people to appeal a decision of the lower court to the higher court. A special court was established by the king for "disputed cases." The judges of this court too were told to bring to every case the fear of the Lord, faithfulness and wholeheartedness. They were told to take their work seriously and conscientiously. Judges who disregard the right of the people offend God.

The king showed his piety when enemies attacked him by seeking help from the Lord who heard his prayers. God still answers the prayers of his people. Some who have been in dire distress and faced great difficulties can tell about how God gave help. God is still in his throne where he rules. Faith in God helps much.

Holland Motor Ups Service During Year

Holland Motor Express, Inc., has spent approximately a half-million dollars so far this year on new highway and terminal equipment, according to a report issued today by the company.

President Charles Cooper announced that although this \$500,000 could have been used in many other ways, the company's program of increased service for shippers continues to take precedence.

The biggest item in the list of equipment purchased since the start of 1959 is also one of the biggest pieces of equipment on the highway — the new 40 foot trailer of greater payload capacity. Holland Motor has bought 40 of these units since January. They bring the number of 40 foot trailers operated by the company to 72, and increase the total Holland Motor Express fleet strength to 204 units.

The company also purchased three pick-up trucks for transporting shipments from customers to loading docks; four passenger cars for use by traffic representatives; and 19 tractors all diesel-powered.

"Five of these new diesel jobs are in the 'super class,' Cooper said, 'and their price tags show it — about \$15,000 each.'"

The company also invested in new lift trucks for the 10 terminals it operates in Michigan, Ohio, Illinois, Indiana, and Kentucky. These are heavier-duty models to help expedite material handling in company terminals so that fast, frequent schedules can be maintained.

New highway services recently instituted by Holland Motor Express include a daily overnight run between Ft. Wayne, Ind., and Louisville, Ky.

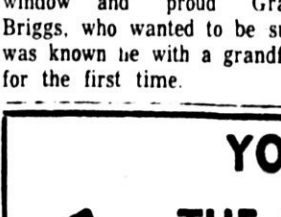

Grand Rapids Man Drowns In Bass River Near Allendale

ALLENDALE (Special)—Ottawa County waters Thursday claimed their second drowning victim in two weeks as a Grand Rapids man drowned in the Bass River, about five miles southwest of Allendale.

The victim was 33-year-old Robert L. Colema, Ottawa County Medical Examiner Dr. John H. Kitchel of Grand Haven ruled death was due to accidental drowning.

The body was recovered at 4 p.m. after three hours of dragging in the Bass River and the Grand River, which join at that point. Under-sheriff Forrest Salisbury, working in a Grand Haven Fire Department boat with Firemen Frank Vrablic and Ed Wozniak, found the victim.

Deputies said Colema had gone fishing with his wife, Arnetta, his mother Agnes, two sisters, Mrs. Rosetta Fortberry and Mrs. Viola Gorce, and a brother-in-law, Fred Brown, all of Grand Rapids. All the others were fishing in the nearby gravel pit, deputies said, while Colema went to fish alone in the Bass River.

About noon, Brown said he went to look for Colema and found only his cap floating in the river and his fishing poles on the bank. Brown then drove to a gas station and called deputies.

Deputies said the body was found in about four feet of water, some 10 feet out in the river and near where Colema had been fishing. The water was very muddy, and it was impossible to see down into it.

Hudsonville Police Chief Bill Ten Have also rushed to the scene with a resuscitator in case it was needed.

The roads leading to the gravel pit are in bad condition, and it was necessary to walk to the scene. Deputy Willis Bos ripped the gas tank from his 1958 model cruiser in attempting to negotiate the rutted road.

The body was taken first to the Allendale Funeral Home, and later removed to the Brown Funeral Home in Grand Rapids, where funeral arrangements are pending.

Rotarians Hear Charles Miller

There is no basic conflict between science and religion since each deals with unlike facts and in different worlds Charles Miller of Detroit told the Rotarians Thursday noon at the Hotel Warm Friend.

Miller is head of medical chemistry research of Parke, Davis & Co. and was brought to Holland to address the Rotary club by Don Vink, the company's local manager.

Using the title "Not by Bread Alone," the speaker pointed out that science and religion are the two most important elements shaping our western civilization today.

Many observers today declare that civilization is breaking down because science is so far outstripping moral standards and achievement.

To make real progress in life, man must have three things: knowledge, which we have in abundance; ideals, which it is doubtful if we possess in quantity; and the will to direct our actions rightly, Miller said.

Science can achieve many things, but it never can set up goals for life. It treats of the outer, the physical world. Religion deals with the inner world, the intangible which alone can set goals. And this is the sphere which science cannot measure nor control or direct.

Western civilization only developed the scientific method which had its greatest flowering under Christianity, the speaker said. For Christianity set the right climate for science by giving freedom to think and teaching faith. When a scientist works out and states a physical law, he is performing an act of faith — a faith that still undiscovered facts will bear out his belief.

Evolution can tell how and when improvements have come — not why. Determinism, as preached today, is anti-Christian, Miller said. For Christianity teaches that only by free will, deciding between right and wrong, can man be moral and grow in spiritual stature.

Goals for the individual, for the group and society cannot be set by science. It can only help make for a better environment in which to live. It cannot direct the use of the leisure time and abundant energies it makes possible, he said.

Each—science and religion—has its own great gifts for all men. But only as man uses religion as his guide will science serve best, the guest speaker concluded.

Holland Policeman Learns Chemistry

Holland Police Officer Gene Geib this week is attending a police-oriented chemistry course at Grand Rapids police headquarters.

Police Chief Jacob Van Hoff said the purpose is to have an officer on the force with some knowledge of various chemical tests used on prisoners to test intoxication, etc., for the purpose of testifying in court on these matters.

Of particular interest to local police is developing an expert on the "Breathalyzer," and the "intoximeter," two devices for testing the sobriety or intoxication of drivers with scientific precision.

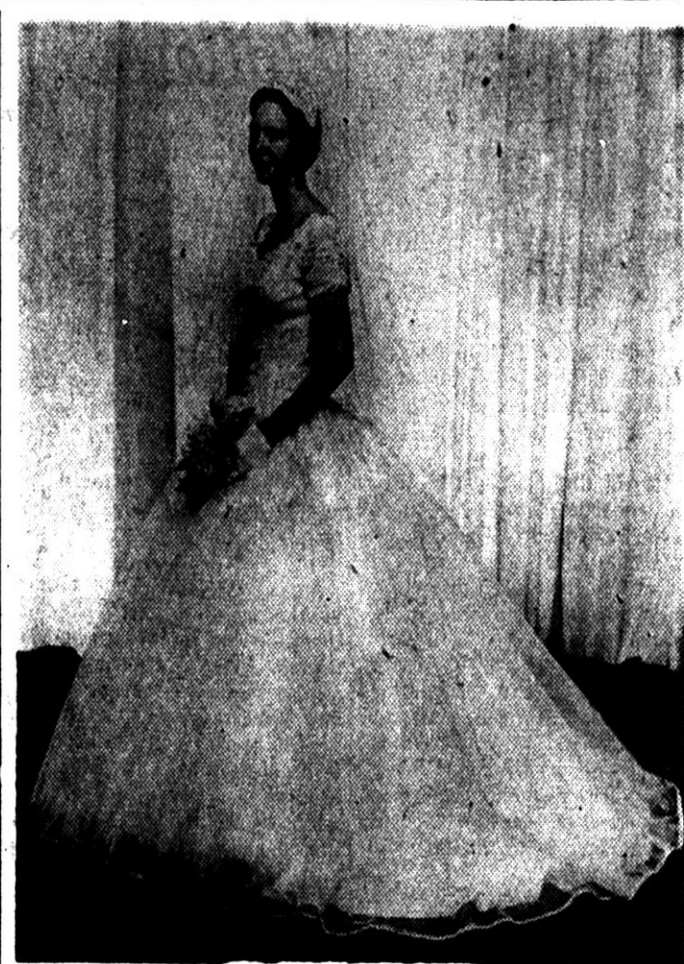
In the week-long course, Geib will also receive instruction in physiology, toxicology and the analyzing of blood, urine and other solutions.

Haney Outlines State Park Regulations

All campers at Ottawa Beach should stop at the park office located on the east end of the park for information and registration, Lou Haney, park manager, said Saturday.

The park office is open from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m. and is located in a small building at the entrance of the camping area. This is a new location this year. The office was in the pavilion last year.

Haney said his staff is almost complete for the summer. He reported that a few more staff members are expected to complete the group. Haney expects the heaviest camping and park activity to be around July 4 and the park staff will be at peak strength by then.

A total of 204 trailer sites and 184 tent spaces are available in the park this year, Haney said. The fee this year for camping is \$1 per day, an increase of 25 cents over last year. Campers are

also charged 25 cents a day for electricity. The days are figured by the number of nights spent in the park.

Between the periods of June 15 and Labor Day, no camp is permitted for longer than 15 days. The 15-day period may be used on a day-to-day basis.

Not more than two extensions to any original permit will be issued and no permit, including the two extensions, may be issued to cover a period of more than 15 days.

One family is permitted on one camp site, Haney said. This allows more than one tent on a site, if the persons belong to the same family. But if the other party is a member of another family, they must obtain another permit.

Any persons under 18 camping in Holland or Grand Haven state parks must have a parent or one of the group with them, Haney

said. This is a special regulation pertaining only to Holland and Grand Haven, the state park manager said.

Check out time for campers is at 3 p.m. If a camper stays in the park for the rest of the day he must still break up his camp by 3 p.m. All camping equipment must be removed when the camper leaves. The camper and the equipment enter at the same time and leave the same time. This is to prevent persons from parking a trailer and then returning later to set up camp, Haney said.

Campers must occupy the camp the first 24 hours after the permit is issued. But 48 hours is allowed away from the camp on the permit after the first 24 hours, Haney said. Two cars are permitted per camp and the cars must be parked on the campers campsite. The cars are registered by license number.

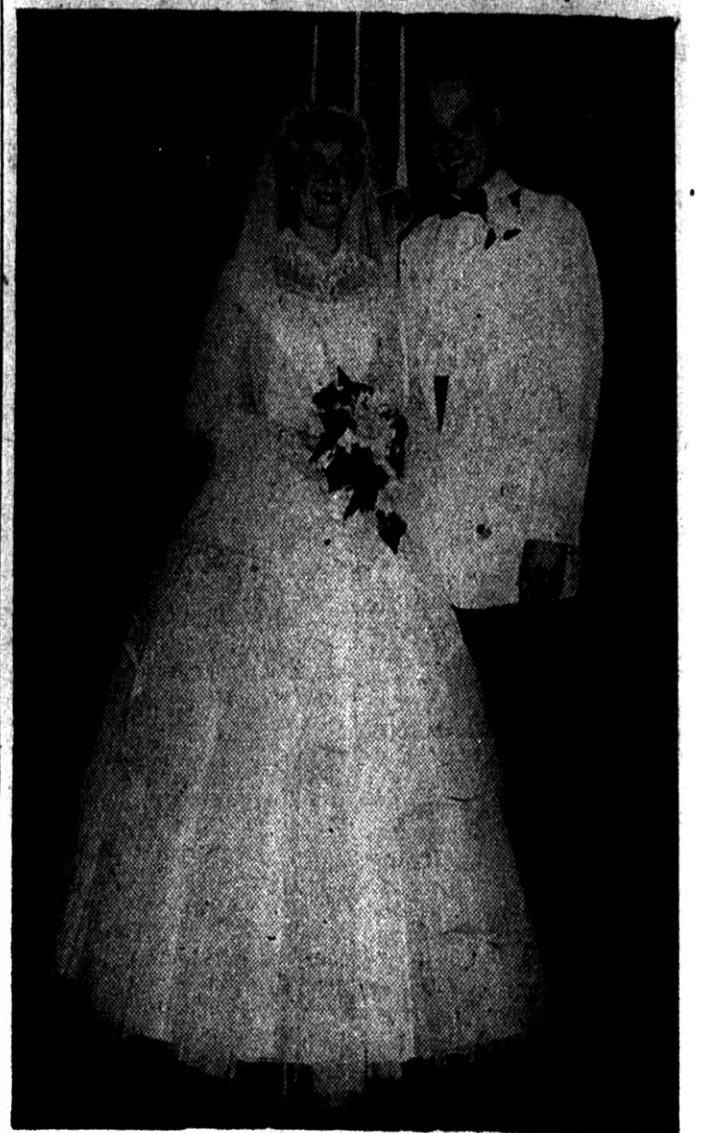
