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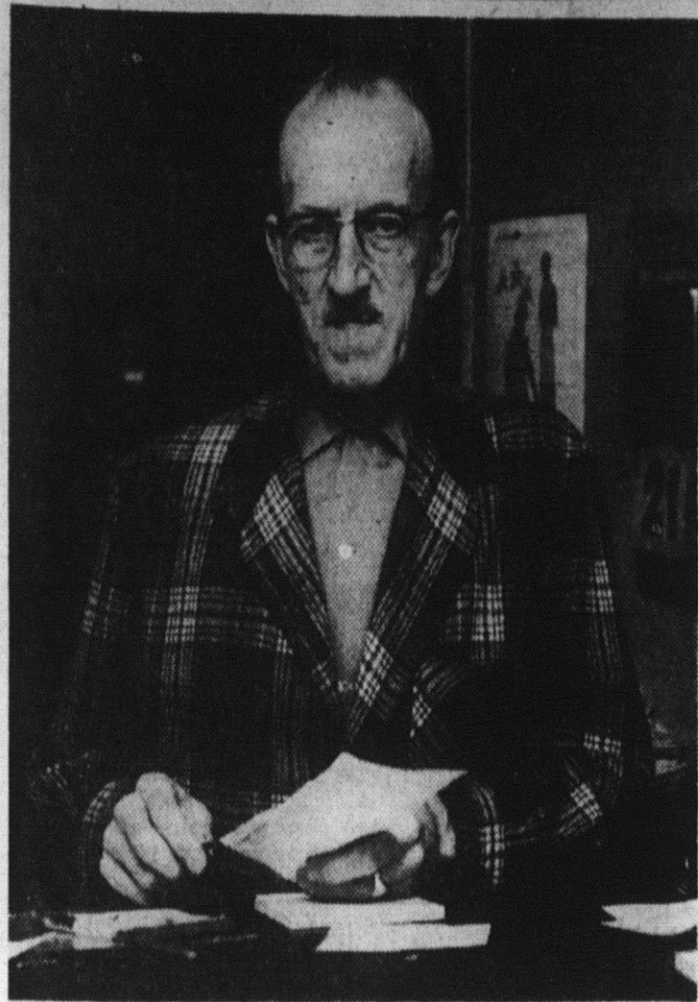

## New Acting Postmaster Is Appointed

**Louis A. Haight, Long Active in Democratic Party to Take Over**

Holland will have a new acting postmaster Friday.

Louis A. Haight, 52-year-old office manager at Beach Milling Co., was advised Tuesday afternoon by Ottawa County Democratic Chairman Roy Hierholzer of Grand Haven that he will be installed as acting postmaster in Holland at the close of business on Friday, June 23. Hierholzer was informed of the appointment in a telegram from U.S. Sen. Patrick V. McNamara.

Haight has been with Beach Milling Co. for 2½ years. Previously he was with the Ray N. Smith Oil Co. for 10 years. Before that he was with the Michigan Department of Agriculture in the food and standards division for three years and with the State Highway Department in the research and testing division, also for three years. Although he operated out of Lansing on both these positions, he maintained his home in Holland.

Haight is married and has five children and four grandchildren. His home address is 1659 Vans Blvd. He has been active in the Democratic party for many years and was a candidate twice for county treasurer and three times for township offices. He is a member of St. Francis de Sales Church and of the Elks.

Haight succeeds Kenneth E. Scripsma who has served as acting postmaster since his nomination in February, 1958. Scripsma, former Ottawa County Republican chairman, resigned to become general manager of the Macatawa Bay Yacht Club.

## Pleads Guilty To Bigamy

**GRAND HAVEN**—Gilbert Blok, 25, Grand Rapids, who was arrested Wednesday on bigamy charges, pleaded guilty today in Circuit Court and will return Aug. 3 for sentence.

Bond of \$500 was not furnished. Blok, who waived examination Wednesday afternoon, had obtained a marriage license in Grand Rapids under the name of Gilbert Laak and married Patricia Ann Naylor Saturday. Justice Edward Kelly of Conklin performed the ceremony. In 1955 Blok had married a Latvian girl.

James Streeting, 30, Grand Haven, pleaded guilty in Circuit Court to a non-support charge and will return for sentence Aug. 3. He allegedly failed to support his wife, Betty, and 7½-month-old daughter since June 2. He waived examination in Municipal Court earlier this morning.

Leon Johnson, 24, of 274 East Ninth St., Holland, pleaded guilty to a charge of larceny from a store and also will return for sentence Aug. 3. Bond of \$200 was continued. He allegedly took a transistor radio from Sears Roebuck store in Holland June 17.

## Hurt in Fall From Tree

Jeffrey Morel, 12-year-old son of Rev. Hollis Morel of 698 150th Ave., was listed in fairly good condition at Holland Hospital today with injuries suffered when he fell out of a tree at his home about 3:15 p.m. Wednesday. Hospital officials said the boy received head and back injuries. Ottawa County deputies said the boy fell from a tree 15 feet after a limb he was standing on broke.

## House Fire Injures 3; Loss Heavy

**Leonard Buursma Home Extensively Damaged; Owner Hospitalized**

Three persons were burned in a flash fire that severely damaged the home of Leonard Buursma at 344 East Sixth St. early Thursday night.

Buursma, who was in the basement of the home when the fire started, was listed in good condition Saturday at Holland Hospital with burns. A neighbor, Herman Jager of 338 East Sixth St., and a Holland Township fireman, Jack Kievit, both were released from the hospital after treatment for minor burns.

The flash fire started in the basement of the Buursma home about 7:45 p.m. The blaze started when gas in the basement ignited, Holland Township Fire Marshal Andrew Westenbroek said.

Buursma had been working in the basement and was going to turn off the gas when the valve at the gas meter broke off, filling the basement with gas. Buursma's wife and daughter were upstairs when the flash fire occurred, and Buursma called to them to get out of the house. Neither was hurt.

Westenbroek said firemen were hampered by the gas which kept pouring into the basement. He said the fire was nearly out several times but an accumulation of gas each time ignited, and kept burning.

Workmen from the gas company cut the line leading to the house, and firemen finally were able to put out the blaze.

Westenbroek declined to estimate damage to the house, but he said it was extensive. The fire was confined to the rear of the house and the attic. Westenbroek said the blaze worked up through the kitchen walls into the attic and roof. The furniture was covered and escaped serious damage, he said.

Both the house and contents were covered by insurance, Westenbroek said. Firemen were at the scene of the blaze for about 2½ hours.

## Mrs. De Boer Dies at 80

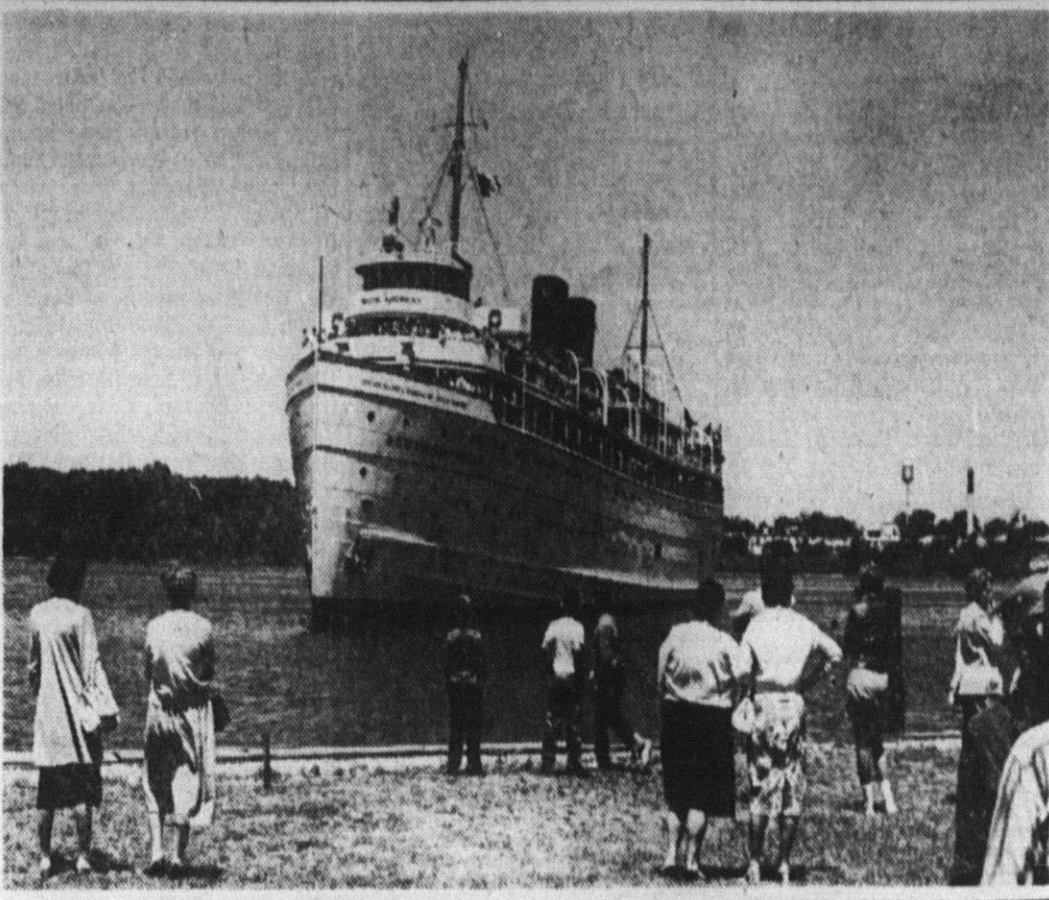
Mrs. Anna De Boer, 80, of 243 West 10th St., died in Holland Hospital Wednesday evening after being hospitalized since June 11.

## Dutch Hospitality Is Shown To 300 Cleveland Visitors

Three hundred Cleveland visitors, on a cruise aboard the S.S. South American, got a taste of Holland hospitality during a brief visit here Wednesday afternoon.

All seemed genuinely impressed by what they termed a beautiful and clean city and many expressed the hope of return visits, either on vacation or during Tulip Time.

The luxury liner docked at the Penn Dixie docks at the foot of West Eighth St. and the visitors walked to Civic Center where a group of Dutch dancers performed and put on a street scrubbing demonstration. The dancers again performed on the docks just before the ship left at 5 p.m., giving many the unusual treat of viewing the spectacle from the third deck. The oft-used klompen dance record was put on the ship's public address system.

C. Neal Steketee, president of the Holland Chamber, welcomed the visitors of the Cleveland Chamber cruise and Mayor Nelson Bosman presented a pair of wooden shoes on behalf of the local Chamber to Curtis Smith, president of the Cleveland Chamber.

Through arrangements by the Dutch Village and Wooden Shoe Factory, shuttle bus service was available to the visitors and most of the 300 visitors were taken to the two places on US-31 and then returned to Netherlands Museum

and some to Baker Burnette Museum. A few visited Baker factory. Some played golf.

Since several members of the Cleveland school board and administration were present, Jack Plewes and Vern Schipper arranged for those persons to visit the new high school site.

The local Chamber provided wooden shoe tags to all visitors plus literature on Holland and on some places visited. Present from the local Chamber were Executive Secretary William H. Van der Water, John H. Van Dyke, Jack Plewes, Elmer Wissink and Steketee. Chester Walz was introduced as the new Tulip Time manager.

The only disappointment voiced was that visitors could only "window shop" in Holland on Wednesday afternoon.

The Cleveland group included 21 councilmen, several members of the school board and administration, and many representatives of business and industry. Traveling with the group was Randall (Mike) Ruhlmann, vice president and secretary of the Cleveland Chamber.

On leaving Holland, 300 copies of the Holland Evening Sentinel were made available to the visitors.

## Will Study Swimming Pool Needs

Possibilities of a municipal swimming pool for the city will be studied, City Council decided Wednesday night.

On suggestion of Councilman Richard Smith, Jr., Mayor Nelson Bosman will appoint a citizens committee consisting of two qualified voters from each ward to investigate community interest, the need, location, cost and financing of such a facility and then present these facts to Council for submission to the voters of the city.

Smith said he has had repeated inquiries from voters showing their continued interest in such a pool which could be used for year-round recreational opportunities for young and old. He said such a pool could be used for physical education programs by all schools of the city, pointing to obvious benefits of a centrally located municipal swimming pool for Holland.

In other business, Council referred to the city manager for study a report from the Board of Public Works together with a proposed Civil Defense agreement with Ottawa County and a copy of a federal surplus property resolution. It was requested that Council seriously consider this program to enable the Board of Public Works and other departments of the city to take advantage of surplus government material that is available through Civil Defense at a very nominal cost.

City Manager Herb Holt pointed to an ordinance passed July 27, 1960, in which the city set up its own Civil Defense program. Whether this ordinance would have to be revised would be part of the study, Randall C. Bosch, president of the Board of Public Works, pointed out local use for some items available such as portable generators, etc. Holt said there appears to be more interest generally in acquiring CD surplus materials than in establishing a CD program.

## Informal Council Sessions Remain Closed to Press

## Many Items Processed By Council

Several routine pieces of business were processed by City Council at its regular meeting Wednesday night.

Council accepted with regret the resignation of John Volkers as a member of the Board of Appeals. Volkers, who had served three years, said he was unable to accept reappointment because of other commitments and the nights required for the work.

Two water main petitions and a sanitary sewer petition were referred to the city manager. The sanitary sewer is requested in West 18th St. between Diekema and Plasman Aves. Water main requests are for Sunrise Dr., Sunset Dr. and East Eighth St. from 112th Ave. to Sunrise Dr.; also in Paw Paw Dr. from Eighth St. easterly to Hope Ave.

Also referred to the city manager for study and report was a petition requesting vacating of an alley lying between 14th and 15th Sts. running from Van Raalte Ave. to Harrison Ave.

A letter from Paul Van Valkenburgh of the Memorial Day committee requesting Council to purchase 600 U.S. flags 12 by 18 inches to decorate graves of veterans was referred to the city manager for study and report. Van Valkenburgh's letter pointed out that the current flags had been used many years and were well worn.

A liability claim from Mrs. George Frego for injuries received in a fall June 14 on a sidewalk on 30th St. between Michigan and Washington Aves. was referred to the city attorney and insurance company.

The following oaths of office were filed: Bert Reimink, space heating examiners; Guy E. Bell, planning commission; Dale E. Van Lente and J. Dale Fris, traffic and safety commission; Clarence J. Becker, hospital board; Donald J. Thomas, library board.

Council okayed a Board of Public Works contract with Bosma Painting Co. of Kalamazoo for painting at the new power plant addition. The Kalamazoo firm had entered low bid of \$45,000.

Council adopted a recommendation of the city manager on a deviation in curb cuts in the Third St. paving project at Northern Fibre Products. The city engineer who had no objection to the curb cuts suggested that the same privilege be extended to Service Machine Shop if requested.

Also adopted was the city manager's suggestion to order 25 copies of the Fantus report. The contract with the firm provides two copies of the report. It was indicated the Board of Education, Chamber of Commerce and Board of Public Works might each want to start with 25 copies.

City Attorney James E. Townsend reported on the Circuit Court ruling in the Roland Spaek case in which Holland city will be ordered to issue a building permit for a multiple dwelling. Townsend said the city has 30 days in which to file an appeal but he recommended no appeal be filed.

The city manager's monthly activity report outlining activities of various departments including collections by the city treasurer was presented. The report also included the semi-annual report of parking meter project receipts, listing revenue to six leased off-street parking lots.

All Councilmen were present at the meeting which adjourned at 9:35 p.m. Mayor Bosman presided and the Rev. Simon De Vries gave the invocation.

Informal council sessions will remain closed to the press.

City Council indicated this view in answering a letter from Dick Cheverton, Vice President of Radio Television News Director Association, protesting closing of the meetings to all news media.

After first stating that the issue of the closed door sessions were "blown up" by the press with sinister overtones" the letter said "invitations to such meetings will remain discretionary with council."

The "blown up" issue resulted when a Sentinel newsman was asked to leave a closed door informal session in May when he entered uninvited and requested to remain. The Sentinel had been present at previous meetings for the last six years.

At that time the Sentinel said it felt that the public should be allowed to know what was discussed at the meetings which preceded the formal council meetings.

Although no formal legally binding action is taken at the informal sessions each item on the agenda is discussed, frequently in detail, and the discussion is not always repeated during the open session.

Wednesday night's formal session was preceded by an informal dinner meeting at the Warm Friend Hotel without the press present.

The full text of the letter to Cheverton follows:

Mr. Dick Cheverton, Vice President, Radio Television News Director Association, Care of WOOD-TV, Grand Rapids, Mich. Dear Mr. Cheverton:

Your letter of May 29th addressed to Holland City Council has been accorded the consideration due it by Council, and this reply is Council's acknowledgement of same.

Holland City Council has no quarrel with the contention of the press that it must have access to information regarding the actions taken by Council. On the contrary, the presently constituted Council has an inherent desire to fully and impartially communicate such information to the people of Holland, and to that end Council wishes to encourage a solid relationship with the press.

The recent impasse resulting from Council's excluding the press from its informal discussions was taken by the press as an affront to its integrity. There was no such intent on Council's part, nor was there any thought of drawing a battle line between Council and press. The complexion of the Council had changed as a result of the April election, and the Councilmen thought they needed an initial period of orienting themselves, and this could best be done informally without the presence of the press restraining them from free and exploratory discussion. It was a privilege they knew the local public would understand, and a right they expected the press would respect.

Regrettably, it was blown up by the press with sinister overtones, thus making it appear that Council was using privacy to suppress publicity, and that what was meant to be a temporary expedient had become a fixed policy. It was not conducive to calm, dispassionate settlement of an inadvertent issue.

Council has appraised the situation for what it essentially is, a tempest in a teapot, and now wishes to have normalcy restored. In this normalcy there must be the dominant perspective which makes one see that Council is not subservient to the press, but is responsible to the people of Holland. If, in Council's judgment, the people of Holland can be served with greater enlightenment and efficiency through Council's giving of its time to informal briefings and unofficial discussions, Council will so act. Since these have not been, are not, and cannot be meetings in which business is officially transacted, invitations to such meetings will remain discretionary with Council.

Council appreciates the interest taken in its proceedings by the local press, and commends the Holland Evening Sentinel, WJBL, and WHTC for the full coverage they have always given Council's actions. Council trusts that this clarifies matters, and that such misconceptions as may exist are hereby corrected.

## 2 Permits Help Boost Building

Applications for building permits for a \$90,000 doctors' building and a \$72,000 addition to Holland Cotton Products Co. boosted building activity substantially this week, according to records of Building Inspector Gordon Streun in City Hall.

The medical building permit was taken out by the 26th St. Corporation. It calls for a building to be erected at 144 West 26th St. with Five Star Lumber Co. as contractor.

The Cotton Products permit calls for a building 120 by 200 feet plus an office 30 by 50 to be added to the present Lincoln Ave. building, providing about 50 per cent more floor space than the firm presently has. This will complete the program started in 1956 when the Lincoln Ave. addition was erected, at that time doubling the floor space.

The new addition will put all manufacturing operations under one roof, allowing a more efficient layout of machinery and permitting a better flow of goods and products. The firm will acquire some new machinery for the new addition and operations are expected to start in the fall.

The building at 455 Columbia Ave. was built in 1922 at that time for Komforter Kotton Co. The name was changed to Holland Cotton Products Co. late in 1941 when William and John Arendshorst reorganized the company. The firm makes quilted mattress pads. Bernard Arendshorst is president-treasurer.

## Allegan CE Union Holds Picnic and Stunt Night

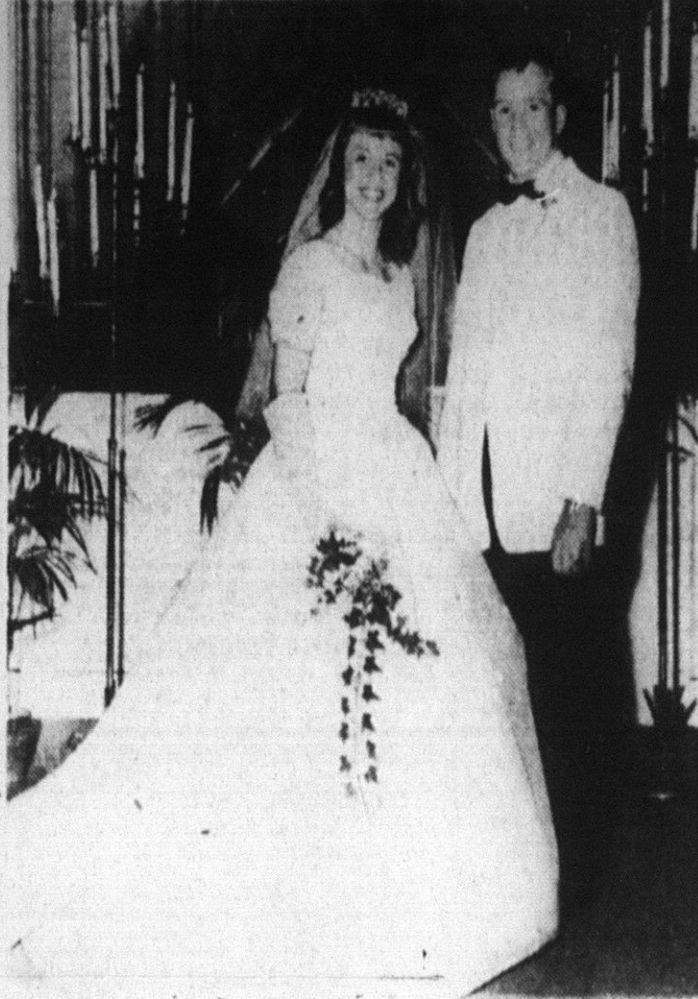
OVERISEL — The Allegan Christian Endeavor Union held its picnic and stunt night at the Overisel Hall Monday evening.

## Cement Slabs Provide Space for Games

Holland youngsters in the Montello Park and Apple Ave. school districts will be able to participate in many sports activities on a cement slab presently being constructed at the two schools.

Called "modified magic squares," the 120' by 60' cement areas at the two locations are the first such units in Western Michigan. The "magic square" 120' by 120' cement slab was first used in Ferndale. Mich., and received national publicity.

Ferndale also has several "modified magic squares" where space limitations prevent a full "square." The "modified squares" in Holland were built at a cost of about \$5,000.

City Recreation Director Joe Moran recommended the "squares" to the Citizens Advisory Committee on Recreation. This group backed the plan and the Holland City Council approved the construction.

Ice skating next winter is ex-

pected to be one of the big activities on the slab. Moran reported the slabs were constructed with inside drainage with trapped water for ice skating.

A drain has been built into the center of the slabs and the cement has been laid with a slight decline to the center to allow for the drainage. A three-inch slanting curb is located on the sides of the cement area.

When the drain is closed, Moran said, a little pond will be formed by flooding on the cement and when this freezes an ice skating area will be created. An area for snow storage is also planned.

The smooth cement surface will provide space for many sports and roller skating, square dancing, tennis, volleyball, badminton, basketball, paddle tennis and shuffleboard are just some of the games that can be played on the areas.

Equipping of the areas will be the joint responsibility of the PTAs and the Recreation Department.

Moran said, and the areas will be equipped as rapidly as possible. Fencing, basketball backboards, tennis and volleyball nets and poles must be secured.

The name "magic square" was derived from all of the activities than can take place on the slab. Bud Brown, Recreation Director in Ferndale worked out the first "square."

City Engineer Laverne Serne and City Manager Herb Holt worked out the final details of the slabs in Holland after consulting with Moran.

The slab at Apple Ave. school is located northeast of the school while the Montello Park slab is southwest of the school. The cement was poured last week at Montello Park and is being poured this week at Apple Ave.

Many metropolitan areas have used blacktopped play areas for many years and five of the Holland city schools have the blacktopped areas—but this is the first such cement areas.

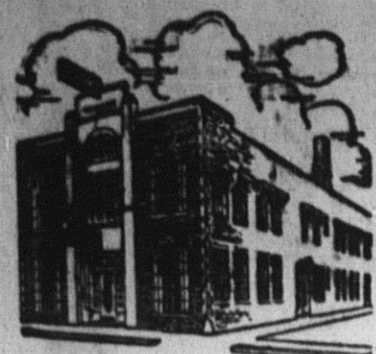

## Sunday School Lesson

Sunday, June 25  
The Fruits of Faith  
James 2:8-17; 5:7-8, 11  
By C. D. Pame

This is the last lesson of the second quarter and it is from the epistle of James, the brother of Jesus. One of the outstanding weaknesses of modern Christians is that they do not practice in their daily lives the religion they profess. Declarations must be followed by demonstrations or to use other words, profession should be followed by performance.

1. Keeping the royal law is a duty. The royal law is: "Thou shalt love thy neighbor as thyself" and it is stated in Leviticus 19:18 and it is cited by Jesus in Matthew 19:19 and explained by Him in the Parable of the Good Samaritan in Luke 10:25-37. This law is called "royal" or "kingly" because of its importance. The person who keeps this law does well, but the person who has "respect to persons" commits sin. Even in the early days of Christianity the rich and prominent got more attention than the poor. One of the chief faults of Protestantism is that it appeals to the middle-class people. Christians today violate the royal law when they will associate with only a certain type of people—their type. By being selective they set at nought the law of love. And when any one does that he transgresses the law of God and becomes a violator of the law. The person who violates one law disobeys God who is the Author of all law. When a person commits a sin he reveals a sinful disposition. According to James the royal law is also "the law of liberty" because it sets men free from the bondage of self and sin. Today not much is thought about judgment. The Bible teaches that we will all be judged. Awareness of judgment ought to influence us in living uprightly. All who are saved are saved on account of the mercy of God. Those who show no mercy to their fellow men give no proof of being saved.

II. Faith and Works Belong Together. Some people stress doctrine much while others emphasize ethics. Both are important. A faith that does not express itself in conduct is a dead faith. We are living in a needy, hungry, ill-clad world. It is not enough to talk about giving help when it is possible to minister. Some church members spend freely for themselves on Saturday nights but on Sunday mornings and evenings they share but meagerly. The only way that a person can show that he has faith is by his works and if they are not seen then there is every reason to assume that faith is absent. Often it is said that we cannot be saved by our good works neither can we be saved by our good works. We all are offered many opportunities in these days to give proof of our faith by serving and ministering.

III. Christian living calls for patience. In the early Christian era believers were oppressed by the rich who instead of paying their workmen a fair wage withheld it from them and thus enriched themselves. James tried to encourage the oppressed Christians by saying that their sufferings would not last forever and that their suffering would be followed by a reward. Christians were told to exercise patience since God would judge. James writes of the farmer who sows his seed and then patiently waits for it to grow. In five verses James uses the word patience six times. All who do Christian work ought to cultivate the art of being patient. Sunday School teachers, personal workers, ministers and parents will have to show much patience in these days in order to win converts. Dr. Peter A. MacArthur of Grand Haven was the medical examiner. Trampler's death was the third accidental drowning in Ottawa County this year, the Sheriff's Department reported. All three deaths occurred this month.

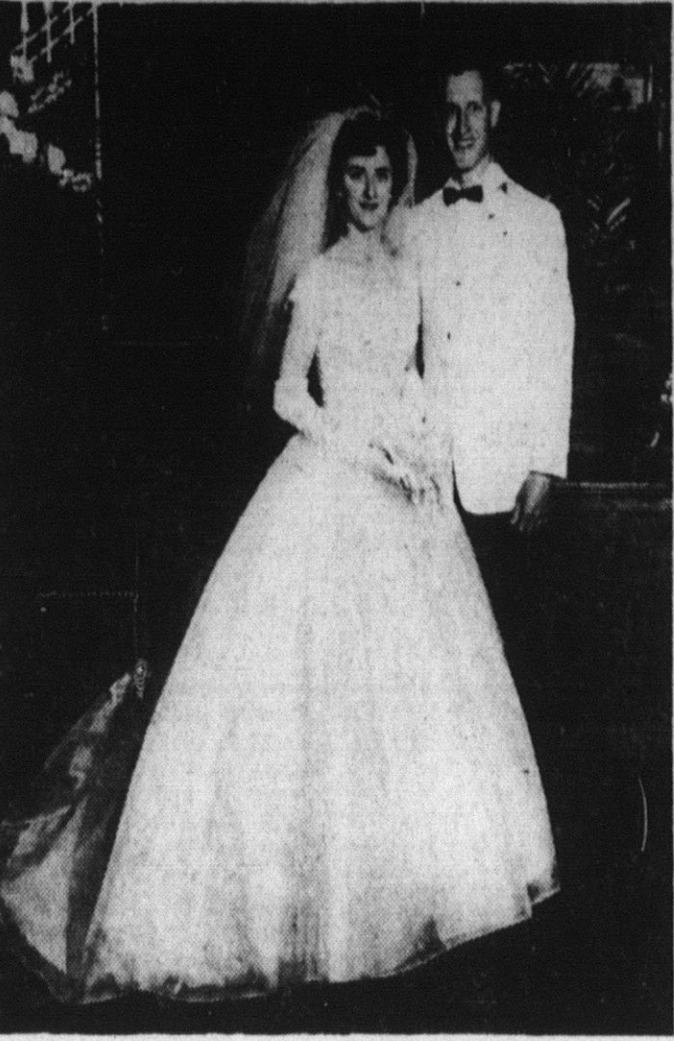

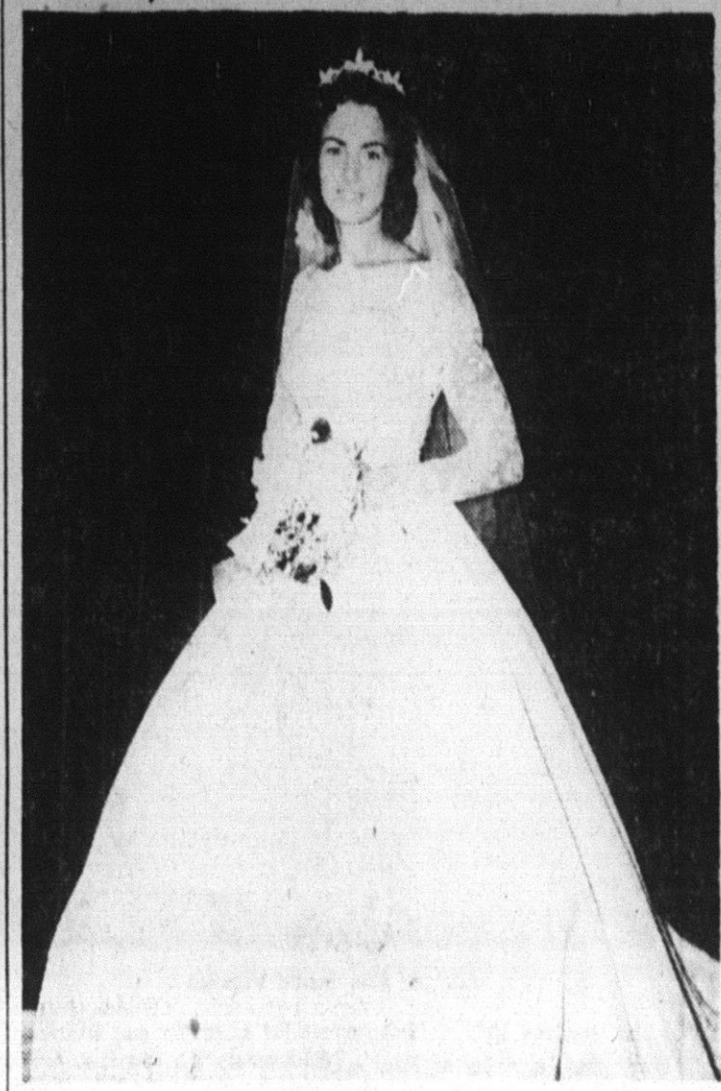
## Cabin Cruiser Rammed, Sunk by Outboard Boat

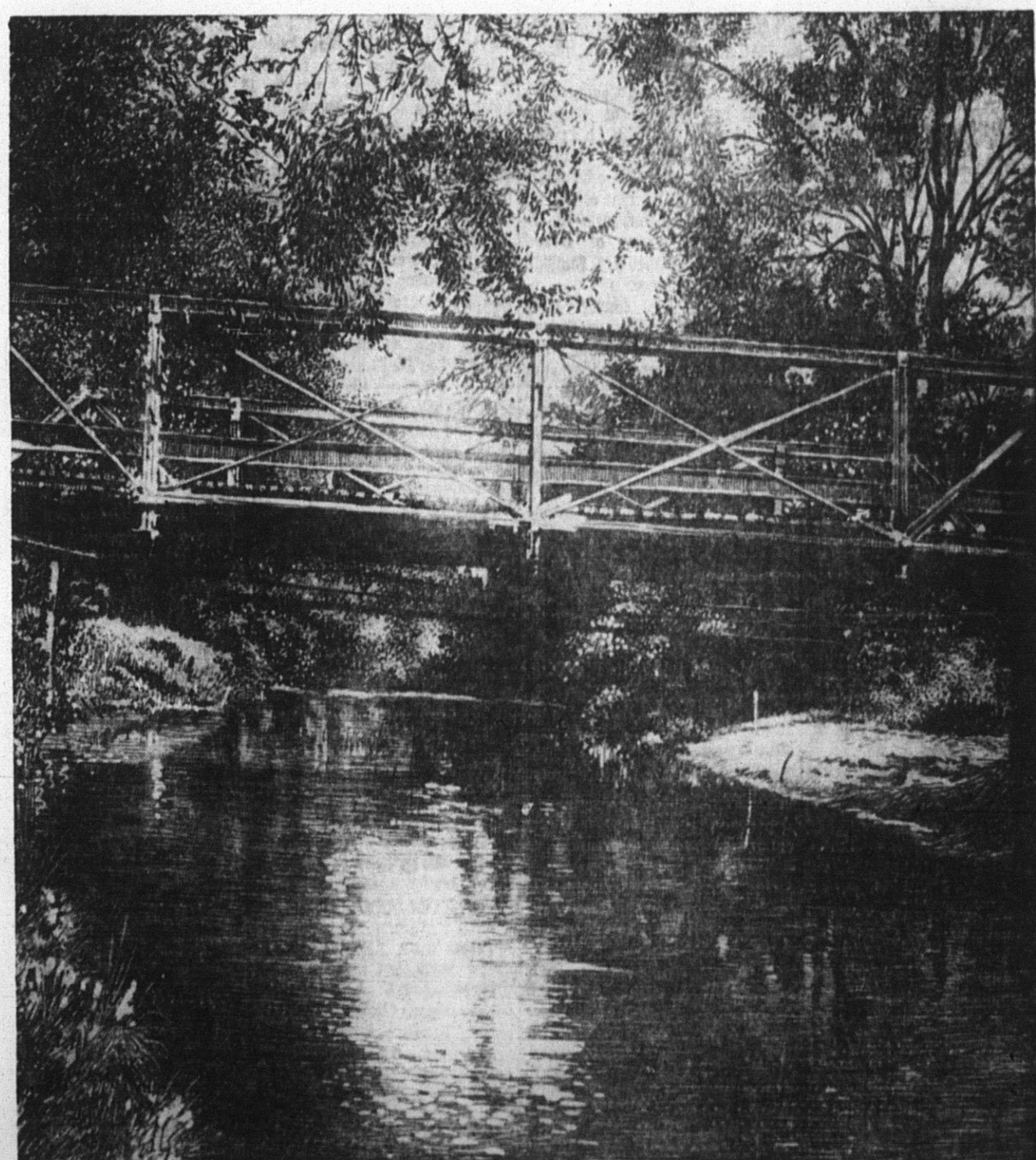
