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## \$4½ Million Judgment Is Sought

GRAND HAVEN — James D. Robbins and Jack De Young, Spring Lake inventors, started suit in Ottawa Circuit Court today against Dow Chemical Co. of Midland, seeking \$4,500,000 judgment in connection with a contract for the manufacture and distribution of a dry cleaning solvent sold by Dow Co. under the trademark of "Norg-Clor."

The two Spring Lake men, inventors in the domestic dry cleaning appliance field since 1936, claim that an appliance developed by them is being used in homes and in do-it-yourself dry cleaning commercial establishments.

Plaintiffs claim that in December of 1958 they approached the Dow Co. and explained the process relating to a special type of solvent to be used in the appliance. Plaintiffs also claim that they furnished the company with a formula and requested a royalty retention in connection with its manufacture and distribution.

The pair claims Dow has been selling the solvent and has refused to account and honor any agreement with the plaintiffs.

The second count in the suit involves alleged contractual interference on the part of the Dow company in connection with plaintiffs' relationship with the Borg-Warner Corp.

## \$500,000 Sought in Death of 5

GRAND HAVEN — Administrators of four Holland and one Grand Rapids young people who were killed in a traffic accident on Riley St. near Holland Oct. 5 started five damage suits totaling \$500,000 in Ottawa Circuit Court today.

Each suit seeks \$100,000 damages from Dennis Donald Hardy, 3538 Lakeshore Dr., Holland, who was found guilty of negligent homicide.

Ottawa sheriff's officers charged him as the driver of a car that crashed head-on into a car driven by Thomas Fairbanks, one of the crash victims. Hardy and a younger brother were injured in the accident.

The four plaintiffs in the suit are Dr. H. C. Fairbanks of Holland, father of Thomas and Jeanne Fairbanks; Wallace Bradley of Holland, administrator of the estate of Pamela Bradley; John Hilbink of Holland, administrator of the estate of Todd Michael Hilbink, and William Van Overloop of Grand Rapids, father of David Van Overloop.

Attorney for the plaintiffs is Earl Waring Dunn of Grand Rapids.

## Clarify Charge Against Man

## West Ottawa Building On Schedule

West Ottawa's building program is on schedule, the Board of Education was informed at a regular meeting Monday night. Guido Binda of Battle Creek is architect for a new 14-room centrally located elementary school and a four-room addition to Lakewood School. Planning also continues on site selection for two more new elementary schools in the north and east parts of the district.

Supt. Lloyd Van Raalte explained a new model of an overhead projector desk especially designed for West Ottawa schools by Fleetwood Furniture. The board voted to purchase 28 such desks which allow the teacher to reproduce a transparency from the desk to a screen. Interest in the innovation is state wide, the board was informed.

Van Raalte also reported that the summer swim program was filled to capacity, stating it would be the last year West Ottawa could take beginners from Holland. One pool is not enough to meet the needs of the community, Van Raalte said. He also reported that West Ottawa could be losing some \$5,000 in penal fines for library books, due to a new state law.

A letter from Holland Mayor Nelson Bosman expressed appreciation to West Ottawa for its continued support of Tulip Time and was particularly grateful for Dutch Dance participation and the use of the school for the square dance.

The board approved contracts for Rachel Slusher and Mrs. Nine Bontar as elementary teachers.

## Power Interrupted North of Holland

Electric lights flickered or dimmed in Holland Sunday night when some 3,000 homes north of the city plunged into darkness because of a blaze in one of the transformers of Consumers Power on a pole off East Lakewood Blvd. near Holland Die Casting Co.

The pole was believed struck by lightning in last Tuesday's storm and caught fire in Sunday's prolonged rain. Most homes west to Lake Michigan had power interruptions for 20 minutes. Later a smaller area was without power close to four hours.

The momentary dimming of lights in Holland city occurred because Holland and Consumers Power were joined by an interconnection which was installed a few years ago. Automatic cutting in of circuits accounted for the change of voltage which was quickly synchronized.

## Holland Man Hurt Near Port Sheldon

Louis Hekman Jr., 18, of 143 Sunrise Dr., suffered a laceration of the arm Saturday after his car left US-31, one-half mile north of Port Sheldon, skidded 363 feet, rolling over at least three times, and came to rest on its top.

Hekman, who was ticketed by Ottawa county sheriff's deputies for a violation of the basic speed law, told deputies he was wearing a seat belt at the time of the crash. Deputies said he apparently fell asleep at the wheel.

## City to Get New Industry From Chicago

Vent-O-Lite Inc. of Chicago, an industrial skylight manufacturer, is moving to Holland. Chamber Vice President L. C. Dalman told the Board of Directors of the Holland Chamber of Commerce Monday night.

The firm is to be located in the former Neuman Truck Trailer and Body Service at 969 Washington Ave.

The company is now in the process of moving from Chicago to Holland, and it is expected that the plant will go into full production in about three weeks. The sales office will remain in Chicago.

The officers of the firm are president and treasurer, Paul Van't Hof, and Albert Bluekamp, vice president and general manager. Van't Hof and Bluekamp, working with Peter Elzinga of Holland, selected Holland as the new home for the industry.

Both Van't Hof and Bluekamp have been in western Michigan. Van't Hof was with the Acme Box and Pallet Company of Zeeland for several years before moving to Phoenix, Ariz. Bluekamp has worked with various metal working plants in the area, both in production and supervisory departments.

The Vent-O-Lite skylight provides natural light and ventilation to large buildings at low cost. The window is constructed of iron, sheet metal and glass or plastic and is made in many sizes up to 120 feet in length.

There are many models such as single-pitch, sawtooth or high curb light, or a combination of single-pitch and sawtooth. The window is operated with a worm gear and hook. The crank is a detachable hook which can be manually operated or motor driven.

Assemblies are made to specifications of the purchaser. The purchaser can obtain any type of glass, wire mesh, sun diffusion, regular window glass, or plastic panes.

The firm, which has been in operation for 34 years, has installed skylights at several locations in the Holland area.

## Norlin Quits School Post At Federal

Carroll Norlin has resigned from the Board of Education of Federal school district. It will be effective July 1.

Norlin, who had served on the board 19 years, submitted his resignation at a board meeting Tuesday. Since Roger Kragt, another board member, had moved from the district, two vacancies had to be filled.

Appointments were made by three new board members who had been elected June 8. They are Parker Everitt, Rudolph Fojtik and Dennis Huxhold. In Kragt's place, they appointed James Spoor, 346 East Fifth St., and in Norlin's place they appointed Charles Vande Water, a board member who did not seek reelection in the June 8 election.

The board then elected Vande Water president, Fojtik secretary, and Huxhold treasurer.

Norlin who has served as secretary for 15 or 16 years announced he would compile the annual report.

Norlin taught in Federal school for 10 years from 1933 to 1943. In 1943 he became a teacher in the Holland system and when the new Thomas Jefferson School was completed, he was named principal.

His present term on the Federal board has two years to go. Norlin continues as a member of the Ottawa County board, known as the Ottawa County Intermediate School District. He was elected to this body in 1947 and currently is serving his third six-year term.

## City Ordinance On Garbage Has First Reading

## Resignation Is Tabled By Council

Municipal Judge Cornelius vander Meulen Wednesday night tendered his resignation to City Council, effective June 30 or at such time thereafter as a successor shall have been appointed and qualified.

Council voted to table the resignation, explaining afterwards that it wanted to draft the proper resolutions and public gestures recognizing Judge vander Meulen's great contributions to the court during a long, distinguished career dating back to 1948.

Earlier in the evening City Clerk D.W. Schipper had submitted a report from the board of canvassers on the special election June 8 in which electors favored a charter amendment changing the judge's salary by a vote of 2,098 to 1,567.

Council took action to set the salary of the municipal judge at \$10,000 a year, effective July 1. There was no discussion on a possible successor.

In his letter, Judge vander Meulen said it was with regret that he steps down from his post which he has found challenging and stimulating but he felt the best interests of the court could be met by a man with youthful vigor and energy.

Judge vander Meulen marked his 84th birthday last April 7.

## Revenue Closing Here Opposed

On suggestion of Mayor Nelson Bosman, City Council Wednesday night adopted a resolution opposing the closing of the Internal Revenue Service office in Holland, urging that the order to close the office be rescinded.

In general, Council was of the opinion that more service, not less, was needed in Holland.

The vote was not unanimous. Councilman Henry Steffens pointed to what he called an inconsistency in that people want taxes decreased but want services increased.

Mayor Bosman said Holland was growing and felt that Internal Revenue men available one day a week during tax period was not adequate to meet the needs here.

It appeared that Steffens' vote was the only dissenting one. Copies will be sent to the Internal Revenue Department, both Michigan U. S. Senators and Cogg. Gerald R. Ford Jr. and Edward Hutchinson.

The new landfill program at the city dump is slated to go into operation at the beginning of the fiscal year July 1. However, final reading of the new garbage and refuse ordinance is slated that night before City Council.

On passage, an ordinance ordinarily takes effect in 21 days, but Council may waive this period. The ordinance must be published before it takes effect, and present plans call for the new program to become effective July 6.

The tractor, an Allis Chalmers type, will be purchased from Earle Equipment Co. of Grand Rapids for \$22,540, lowest of four bids meeting specifications. The carry-all trailer will be purchased from E.K.S. Equipment Co. of Grand Rapids for \$3,059.38, lowest of eight bids meeting specifications.

Casting dissenting votes were Councilmen Richard Smith and Donald D. Oosterbaan. Smith questioned proposed charges, feeling that those persons given free privileges because they have pickup garbage service at home might have an unfair advantage over those who have disposals in their home and are charged for going to the dump. He felt it might be easier to charge everybody than to fuss with identification slips, etc.

He also was concerned over charging for the size of the vehicle rather than the load to be dumped, and City Manager Herb Holt explained that it would be difficult to make decisions on whether it were a half load or a third of a load.

Holt also explained that the program in Grand Rapids is tax supported and that Grandville's program is a private operation. Smith felt there should be more study with a view to having Holland's program a city-wide tax supported program serving industry as well as residents.

Councilman Bertal Slagh said there were several things about the ordinance that



# Bullets Finally Stop Fleeing Car

A high-speed chase over Ottawa and Allegan county highways by Holland police with the aid of Allegan county sheriff's deputies ended early Saturday with the arrest of a Coopersville man. Seven shots were fired during the chase.

Gerald John Erickson, 24, was jailed in Holland and charged with reckless driving after his capture one mile north of Otsego by Holland police officers Glenn Geerts and William Keizer.

Geerts said the chase covered at least 45 miles. Four warning shots were fired into the air but Erickson refused to stop.

The fleeing vehicle finally came to a halt about 300 yards short of an Allegan county sheriff's roadblock after three bullets were fired directly at the car. All three hit the auto. Keizer fired the shots shortly before the speeding car and two police cruisers reached the roadblock just north of Otsego on M-89.

Geerts said the chase began when he saw Erickson leave the Progressive Gas Station at 33rd St. and Washington Ave. at a high rate of speed. He said the fleeing car soon reached 70 miles per hour, as he gave chase with the red flasher light and siren operating.

As the police cruiser chased the car, Erickson turned onto Michigan Ave. The vehicle sped down old US-31 to New Richmond Rd. and when Erickson turned left into East Saugatuck Rd., Geerts pulled along side the fleeing auto in an attempt to force it off the road. The attempt failed, however, and officer Keizer joined the chase.

At one time near Hamilton, Erickson was forced partially off the road, but he recovered control of his car and continued his flight as Geerts fired two warning shots.

As the fleeing car neared Allegan, Allegan deputies set up a roadblock at the city's north city limits. Erickson would not halt however, and a deputy backed his patrol car off the highway just seconds before an apparent collision. Geerts and Keizer then chased the speeding auto through the streets of Allegan.

As Erickson turned onto M-89, Keizer fired the second two warning shots, but Erickson only increased his speed to over 80 miles per hour.

About three miles north of Otsego, Keizer aimed directly at the fleeing car and put one shot into the right side of the trunk, another into the area above the center of the car's bumper, and a third shot hit the bumper. It was then Erickson began to slow his vehicle and pulled it to a stop just short of an Allegan sheriff's roadblock.

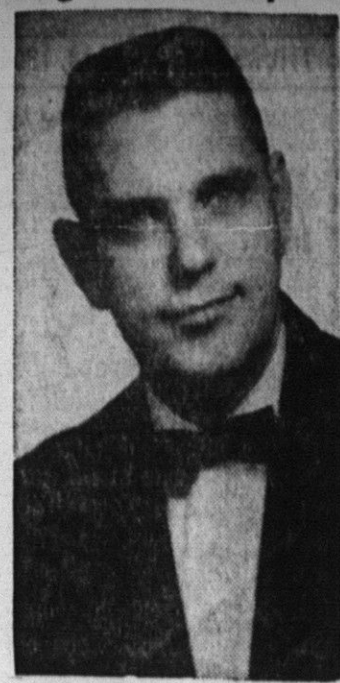
A total of 278 camp permits were registered during the past week bringing the total for the year to 1,336.

The rose chafer beetles are appearing on the highly colored flowers. This fall colored beetle eats not only roses, peonies, iris, etc. but when present in large numbers they will feed on many plants including trees. To control, treat the lawn and shrub beds with 5 lbs. of five per cent chlordane dust or 10 oz. of 40 per cent emulsion per 1,000 square feet watered in, to destroy the grubs.

To kill the adult beetles, use a combination of 2 tablespoons of 50 per cent wettable DDT and 2 teaspoons 50 per cent malathion emulsion in one gallon of water. Spray at 5 day intervals. (50 per cent wettable methoxychlor may be substituted for the DDT.) Thoroughly cover all affected plants. Soil treatment for grubs will control other insects such as wireworms, ants, June beetles, and cutworms also.

The two leading rose diseases are mildew and black spot. Both are trouble-makers in moist, hot weather. Mildew produces a very fine white webbing over buds, leaves and stems. Infected stems may be twisted, leaves puckered, and flower buds may be killed.

Black spot starts as black spots surrounded by yellow zones. The spots first occur on lower leaves, enlarge quickly, and may spread upward in the plant in a few days. Rapid defoliation often follows.

Disease control is similar to insect control. Effective chemicals are Miltex and Captain or sulfur and Captain. Spraying may be done in a light wind whereas dusting can only be effective when the air is still. Many people prefer to use a dust, however, because the equipment is much lighter than that used for a spray solution made up with water. Either method is effective when applied regularly.

We've had word from Harvey Marlowe of the Michigan Department of Agriculture that Japanese Beetle traps are being placed in several locations in Holland. These traps are baited with a material that also attracts other insects. We hope everyone will cooperate with the Department of Agriculture in the Japanese Beetle program.

The suit is the result of a traffic accident on Chicago Dr., near 120th Ave. in Holland on Sept. 27, 1961, in which David Waber and Arden Pace were injured.

The plaintiffs claim that James Waber was the driver of a 1958 sedan owned by Emil Waber which was involved in an accident with a car driven by Janet Kunkel of Ottawa County. David Waber, who was paralyzed in the accident, seeks \$200,000 damages and the Paces seek \$35,000.

## Saugatuck Okays Budget

SAUGATUCK—The Saugatuck Board of Education has adopted a general fund budget of \$226,010 for the 1964-65 school year. This represents an increase of approximately \$24,000 over the 1963-64 general fund budget.

The budget was increased to provide for normal increases in salaries and operating costs, as well as additional operating expenses anticipated at Douglas Elementary School. Fuel, utilities, insurance and custodial personnel for the enlarged Douglas School accounted for most of the budget increase.

No additional taxes will be needed to meet 1964-65 budget.

Tuition students from Glenn and Pearl will attend Saugatuck High School next fall. This will be first time students from these schools have enrolled at Saugatuck. Approximately 16 seventh and eighth graders will attend from Glenn while eighth ninth and tenth graders will enroll from Pearl. ## Worms Cause Damages To Grain, Corn Crops

Ottawa County and other southwestern Michigan grain and corn farmers are now faced with an invasion that could hurt much of the county's hay, barley, wheat and corn crops.

The invaders are army worms, one-and-a-half-inch devils, with a big appetite for grain and corn. County Agricultural Director Richard Machiele explained that the army worm is not new to Ottawa County, but that this is the first time it has invaded in such force. Machiele said that he has already sent out over 300 letters advising farmers on how to spray for the foragers.

Machiele predicts the army worm will cause major crop losses. He adds, however, that quick and effective spraying by area farmers can cut losses considerably. Machiele said that the battle against the army worm should be determined in the next two weeks.

The army worm whose scientific name is *Pseudaletia Unipuncta* is greenish brown with dark brown stripes on its head and orange and white bands on its back and sides. In the past the worm was confined to low-lying, damp areas. It caused some damage in this area, but never any widespread destruction.

This year, however, large flights of moths in three groups laid considerably more eggs in this area. Machiele said they were probably blown north by strong winds about five weeks ago. They deposited their billions of eggs in wheat and barley fields.

Machiele said that first reports of crop damages three weeks ago didn't worry him too much. He became alarmed, however, as these reports increased rapidly. He said that the army worms are now spread throughout most of Ottawa County. They are finishing up with wheat and barley fields and moving to the corn and hay crops. Machiele said that his biggest worry now is the wholesale destruction the worms might bring to the corn crop.

To combat the invasion Machiele has recommended six highly toxic sprays. He said that farmers should not spray until the worms show up in sufficient quantities. He defined sufficient quantities as more than 12 worms per square foot. The agricultural director warned that farmers must be

careful that the highly toxic sprays don't drift on to their livestock. He said that this drifting could cause more damage to area farming than the army worms.

Machiele said that any farmer with questions about the worms should contact him at the Ottawa County Courthouse in Grand Haven.

Machiele said that the fight against the army worm could be helped immensely if the county gets a week of hot, dry weather. He explained that the worms thrive in damp areas, and only come out of the thresh to feed at night. The agricultural director said that the hot, dry weather could kill many of the pests.

The six sprays that Machiele has recommended are approved by the Federal Department of Agriculture. They are:

Corn Crops—"Dieldrin," one-half pound per acre in cool weather about 60 days before harvest, or "Parathion," one-half pound per acre.

Hay Fields—"Sevin," one-and-a-half pounds per acre of hay, four or five days before harvest.

Small Grains—"Malathion," one-and-one-quarter pounds per acre; "Parathion," one-half pound per acre; "Sevin," one pound per acre, or "Toxaphene," one-and-a-half to two pounds per acre, but not for use on crops to be fed to livestock.

On the optimistic side, Machiele said, is the fact that after the three waves of army worms have matured the danger is over. The army worms pick up a parasite carried by the tachnid fly. This parasite will keep the worms from producing new worms next year. A repeat of the destruction could only be brought about by other moths flying north next year.

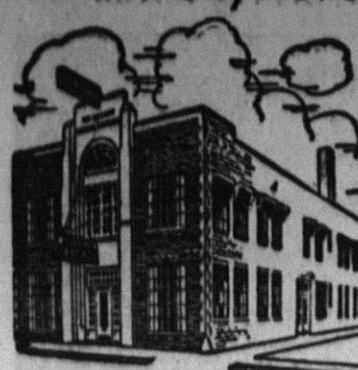

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## WHEN FREEDOM'S GONE

"I was a communist in America but I will never be a communist again!" These were the words that Mrs. Mollie Block shouted at a Russian customs officer as she, her husband, and 13-year-old daughter left Russia for the United States.

The Blocks had spent five years in Russia hoping to find here the millennial life that communists so often describe. But two and one-half years later they began a two and one-half year attempt to leave the country. It was only because they had kept their United States citizenship that they were able to get out of Russia, even though this meant being expelled as propagandists for the Chinese Communists.

The story of the Blocks has been repeated again and again, especially in those countries where incessant communist propaganda has finally led to a communist takeover. People were convinced that their own government offered less than what the communists offered only to find out too late that the rosy promises were fabrications that never brought reality.

Perhaps one of the interesting sidelights of the Block story was the description of life in Russia. The Blocks could not make ends meet even though both husband and wife worked. But this wasn't that which caused their illusion. After all this may and does happen in all countries. It was this in the words of Mrs. Block: "But the main thing we couldn't stand was the lack of freedom here. Our friends were afraid to come and visit us. We couldn't read the things we wanted to read."

When personal freedom is gone the very heart of life is gone. It is precisely for this reason that those who love their country always place freedom in the most conspicuous position. One can live without certain comforts, but one loses the best of life when freedom is gone. It would be well to remember this if you are ever tempted to sell freedom for a temporal gain.

## Sunday School Lesson

The Christian and the Missionary Imperative  
Matthew 28:16-20; Romans 10:18

Some church members frankly say that they do not believe in foreign missions. The Bible says that the Christian Church has a gospel which it must preach to the whole world. In view of the population explosion the Church has a big work to do.

I. The Lord gave an order to the disciples. After his resurrection Jesus spent forty days with his disciples to give them the assurance that he had risen and a message.

At the appointed time Jesus met with his disciples on a mountain — we do not know which one. It is likely that the five hundred disciples of whom Paul wrote in I Cor. 15:6 were present. In his final message to these disciples Jesus told them that all power had been given to him and then he commanded them to go into all the world and teach all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit. In addition, they were ordered to teach the nations to observe all things which he had commanded them. It was a big order.

The word "baptize" has a number of meanings — dip immerse, wash, sprinkle, cleanse. It points to the task of bringing the individual into relationship with God. Both nations and individuals need the gospel. The Lord gave them the assurance that he would be with them. "I am with you always even unto the end of the world."

The command the Lord gave before going to heaven is still in force. It has not been repealed.

II. The gospel must be preached and confessed. Hearing the gospel must be followed by accepting it which leads to confessing it with the lips. Belief is followed by confession. We are told to believe in the resurrection of Jesus—believing with the heart, confessing with the lips.

God's terms for salvation are universal. Both Jews and Gentiles must meet the same terms. Any one, regardless of his race or color who calls upon the name of the Lord will be saved.

In order to be saved it is essential to call upon the name of the Lord. They cannot call on him if they do not believe and they surely cannot believe if they have not heard of him. Preachers are needed to order to spread the gospel. God sends men to preach. These men are the heralds of good tidings. They bring good news.

All who accept the good news upon hearing it reveal their faith. "So then faith cometh by hearing, and hearing by the word of God." May the many who have not heard the gospel hear it and may the many who hear it believe it wholeheartedly.

## Dismantle Mill For Shipment

AMSTERDAM, The Netherlands — Dismantling of an 80-year-old Dutch windmill in Vinkel, Noord Brabant, the Netherlands, will start this week, according to word received today from Willard C. Wichers of Holland, Mich., who made final arrangements for the purchase of the mill last week in the Netherlands.

The mill named "De Zwaan" (the Swan) will be dismantled and will be ready for shipping in early August, arriving here by early September. It will be the focal point of Holland's new Windmill Island Recreational Program along Black River which is slated to be ready by Tulip Time of 1965.

Wichers, midwest director for the Netherlands Information Service with offices in Holland City Hall, is serving as agent for Holland city in expediting the sale and shipment of a Dutch windmill.

He made original contacts on a visit to the Netherlands two years ago and arranged with the Dutch government to release a mill for export, something not done easily since the Dutch government guards its

mill and restores them wherever possible.

Project Windmill which has been under study for three or four years calls for a development in the Black River delta with a large imported Dutch windmill as central attraction. There also will be a miller's home and barn (doubling as concession), tulip fields, gardens, a small church, canals with boats and a gatehouse.

The idea for an imported windmill originated with Carter Brown of Castle Park who later was appointed chairman of the Windmill study committee by Mayor Nelson Bosman.

The entire project is financed through a revenue bond issue of \$450,000.

## Garden Club Recognized For Watershed Project

The Holland Garden Club has received national recognition for its work in a field project on the Macatawa watershed.

The award came from the National Council of Federated Garden Clubs, and was presented to Mrs. J.W. Lang, retiring president of the local club, in connection with annual convention of the Federated Garden Clubs of Michigan last week in Kalamazoo. Only one other national award was given in Michigan this year.

The Holland project originated early in 1962 when the club became concerned over the deterioration of Lake Macatawa and pollution carried by Black River and its tributaries.

To create public interest, an open meeting was held in Herrick Public Library and the Garden

Club sent some 200 invitations to a wide range of citizens and organizations.

Representatives of women's organizations, service clubs, sportsmen's groups, industry, the Chamber of Commerce and other interested people attended. A panel of representatives from the Michigan Water Resources Commission, the U.S. Soil Conservation Service, Michigan Department of Conservation fish and game division and the Department of Environmental Health of Holland presented the history, the problems and possible improvement of the lake and the Black River drainage basin.

As a result of this meeting, a Community Conservation committee was established and funds were sought to carry on the project. Contributions came from 33 organizations and individuals totaling about \$1,000. Mrs. J.J. Brower of the Garden Club served as committee chairman and Mrs. W.G. Winter Jr., at that time president of the Woman's Literary Club, served as secretary.

Two Hope College students, Richard Brand and Paul Lucas, were employed to make a detailed survey of the lake shore, the river and its tributaries under the supervision of local health agencies and the Michigan Water Resources Commission.

This watershed survey encompassed about 260 square miles and involved 352 samples which were analyzed in the laboratory of the Water Resources Commission in Grand Rapids. Results clearly indicated the need for a county ordinance to control the disposal of wastes and subsequent study meetings of the special committee together with the county drain commissioner, representatives of the Board of Supervisors and the Department of Environmental health resulted in drafting a new ordinance on wastes and sewage disposal.

This ordinance was adopted by the Ottawa County Board of Supervisors in January, 1963. The city of Holland already had a similar regulation but the adoption of the county ordinance provided the County Health Department with the first regulation of its kind since the inception of the department.

Adoption of this ordinance is regarded not as the end but only the beginning of what should be a continuing project. Conservation-minded people feel

that the ordinance has two basic weaknesses:

1. The township building inspectors were given the task of enforcement without having had adequate training. It has been the experience of other counties that only a diligent and dedicated health department can adequately enforce a health ordinance.

2. The do-it-yourself section permits an individual to make his installation subject to the inspector's approval. All too often the project is finished and covered before the inspector is aware of it. Not only individuals but professional installers occasionally are guilty of bypassing this provision.

The Holland Garden Club feels that time is an element in the improvement of the lake and while progress may not be swift, it is constant. Improvements in Zeeland's sewage treatment reflects on the total drainage picture. The deepening of the channel would increase the flow. The arrival of "soft" detergents on the market will be a big improvement in sewage treatment in both public and private systems, and improved sewer installations will bring about gradual improvement.

Erosion of farm lands and careless use of land by builders which permits silting of creeks continue to be a problem and will continue until people realize they are caretakers not exploiters of the land to which they happen to hold title.

In an effort to see what can be done in this field, the Community Conservation Committee plans to work with the new Nature Center Committee on an erosion and stream improvement project on the former Cammenga property.

## Assessment Bonds Sold By Council

City Council Wednesday night sold \$95,000 in paving special assessment bonds to Manley, Bennett, McDonald and Co. of Grand Rapids, lowest of five bidders in a 10-year bond program, at a net interest rate of 2.8659 per cent. Offering a premium of \$64.60, the net interest cost amounts to \$14,938.53. Highest of the five bids ran 3 per cent.

The Grand Rapids Investment firm notified City Clerk D. W. Schipper this morning that the entire \$95,000 block has been purchased by First Michigan Bank and Trust Co. of Zeeland, which has been designated as paying agent.

Council authorized City Manager Herb Holt to have an independent appraisal made of lakefront property adjacent to Kollen Park which is owned by Charles R. Sligh Co. O. W. Lowry, president of the company, has been working with city officials in the possible purchase. Mayor Nelson Bosman said this is perhaps the last lakefront area near Kollen Park that might be available for park expansion.

Also authorized was \$750 of city funds toward the July 4 celebration at Legion Memorial Park sponsored by Legion post No. 6. This has been a community endeavor for many years and is arranged mainly to keep Holland people at home, not on the highways.

Council appointed Otto Schaap as a member of the Board of Appeals.

After considerable discussion, Council approved moving permits for Walter Deitz to move houses from 599 Michigan Ave. to 241 West 33rd St., from 601 Michigan Ave. to 247 West 33rd St., and 607 Michigan Ave. to 253 West 33rd St. A previous motion to table the applications lost 4-4, and after a long discussion in which the movers explained plans to meet certain requirements suggested by residents in the new neighborhood, Council approved the applications unanimously.

A new application of Deitz to move a house and garage from 164 West 17th St. to 319 West 24th St. was tabled until next meeting.

Oaths of office were filed for J. Dale Fris and Dale E. Van Lente as members of the Traffic and Safety Commission.

Following a public hearing, Council voted to vacate a portion of the alley lying between 18th and 19th Sts. running from Washington to Maple Aves.

Another hearing was held on a zoning ordinance to rezone a parcel of land on the east side of Lincoln Ave. lying south of 32nd St. shopping plaza to neighborhood commercial. Later in the evening the necessary ordinance for such a change was passed.

Petitions for a sanitary sewer in 38th St. from Columbia Ave. to Lincoln Ave. and paving 37th St. from Pine Ave. for a distance of 325 feet west were referred to the city manager.

Council scheduled a public hearing Aug. 5 on a petition from Home Furnace Co. requesting vacating of a portion of Dykema Ct. lying west of a line 258 feet west of Fairbanks Ave. to the C and O right of way.

Petitions from property owners on both sides of Myrtle Ave. lying north of Lakeview Dr. requesting said portion of Myrtle Ave. be vacated were tabled for further study.

Council unanimously approved purchase of a jeep with plow for the recreation department from United Motor Sales in net amount of \$2,725, lowest of three bids.

Also unanimously approved was the purchase of a new street sweeper for the street department from Bell Equipment Co. in the net amount of \$9,996, lowest of five bids. The present street sweeper will continue in use along with the new equipment.

City Manager Herb Holt submitted a report on applications for sanitary sewers in Holland Heights area and informed Council that before lateral sewers can be constructed to provide sanitary sewer service, it will be necessary to provide an interceptor sewer to transmit the sewage from a Holland Heights collection system to the sewage disposal plant. Council approved his recommendation to refer the subject to the Board of Public Works for study and report.

Council approved a city manager's recommendation for further improvements to the Kollen Park boat ramp at a cost not to exceed \$1,200. Holt explained that plans call for reducing the 20 per cent grade to a 10 per cent grade and lengthening the ramp.

Also approved was a \$1,200 expenditure to repair damage to the pump house at Kollen Park caused by a fallen tree in last week's storm. It was pointed out that this small structure was not included in the city's insurance schedule because it appeared that no exposure existed. Holt said it hereafter would be insured.

Council approved the annual contract with the State Highway Department for maintenance of state trunklines within

the city limits. This is the same form that has been used in the past several years and had been approved by the city engineer.

## Deer Problem Aired at Meet

Thirty-one farmers attended the meeting held by the West Ottawa Soil Conservation District in cooperation with the Game Division of the Michigan Department of Conservation.

Merle Raber, Game Biologist of the Conservation Department traced the history of the deer in Michigan up to the present time. An estimate of 8,000 deer now roam Ottawa County. In a two square mile area near Nunica 222 were counted in 1964. Crop damage for the state amounts to \$300,000 annually. The number of deer killed on Michigan highways in 1963 exceeded 4500 head.

Harold Bowditch, Conservation Officer of Ottawa County, reported that 52 deer have been killed on highways in the county between January and June 15 this year.

Considerable discussion was held on having an antler season in Ottawa County. Doe permits would be limited and would be passed out by drawing.

Local land owners were interested in how this could be done to prevent hunters from being so close together that it would be dangerous to livestock and people. The discussion indicated that every one present felt that the deer herd should be reduced because of crop damage and highway accidents.

Clarence Reenders, chairman of the meeting suggested that this year's trial might not be the answer but would furnish information on which to base further programs.

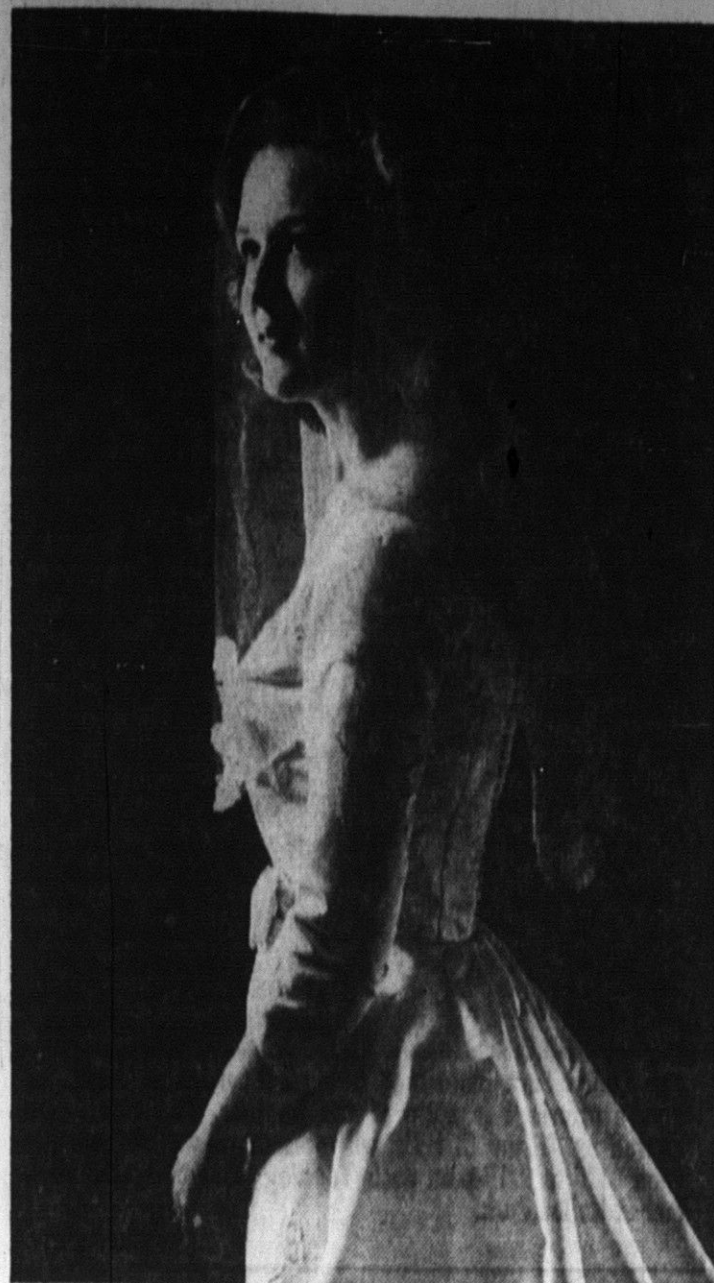

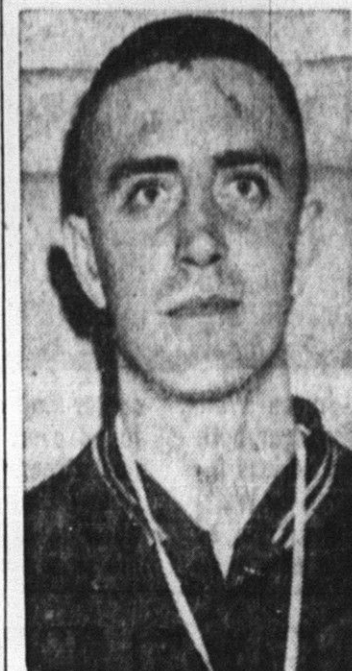

Three appointments to Holland public school athletic administrative positions were approved Tuesday by Holland Board of Education following recommendations by Supt. Walter W. Scott.

Kenneth Bauman was named athletic director while Donald Piersma was named coordinator of physical education for the public school system and Carl Selover was named junior high athletic director.

The three are Hope College graduates. Bauman and Piersma are Holland natives and Selover is a native of New Brunswick, N.J.

The 35-year-old Bauman joined the Holland system in 1963 after eight years of teaching and coaching at Hudsonville High School. Bauman replaces Joe Moran who resigned to become city recreation director.

Bauman will be given released time from his teaching schedule to serve as athletic director. Bauman is a history teacher and coaches the reserve basketball team. This fall he will be a varsity assistant football coach.

He received his master's degree in the administration of physical education from the University of Michigan in 1963.

The separation of the athletic director from the director of physical education was one of the recommendations made some time ago to the Board of Education by a citizens group.

Appointed by the Board four years ago, the citizens group made a table of organization and the separations of the two posts was one of the recommendations.

The 34-year-old Piersma will teach physical education in the high school and will coordinate the entire physical education program. He will continue as varsity basketball coach.

Piersma joined the Holland staff in 1957 after receiving his master's degree in administration of physical education that year from the University of Michigan. He has been teaching Michigan history and physical education. He became varsity basketball coach in 1962.

Selover joined the Holland staff in 1955 and received his master's degree in secondary school administration from Western Michigan University in 1954.

Bauman will hold a meeting with the head coaches in the near future to set up specific assignments.

All three men have worked closely with Moran during the past year and should make for close harmony in the athletic department, Board president Harvey J. Buter said.

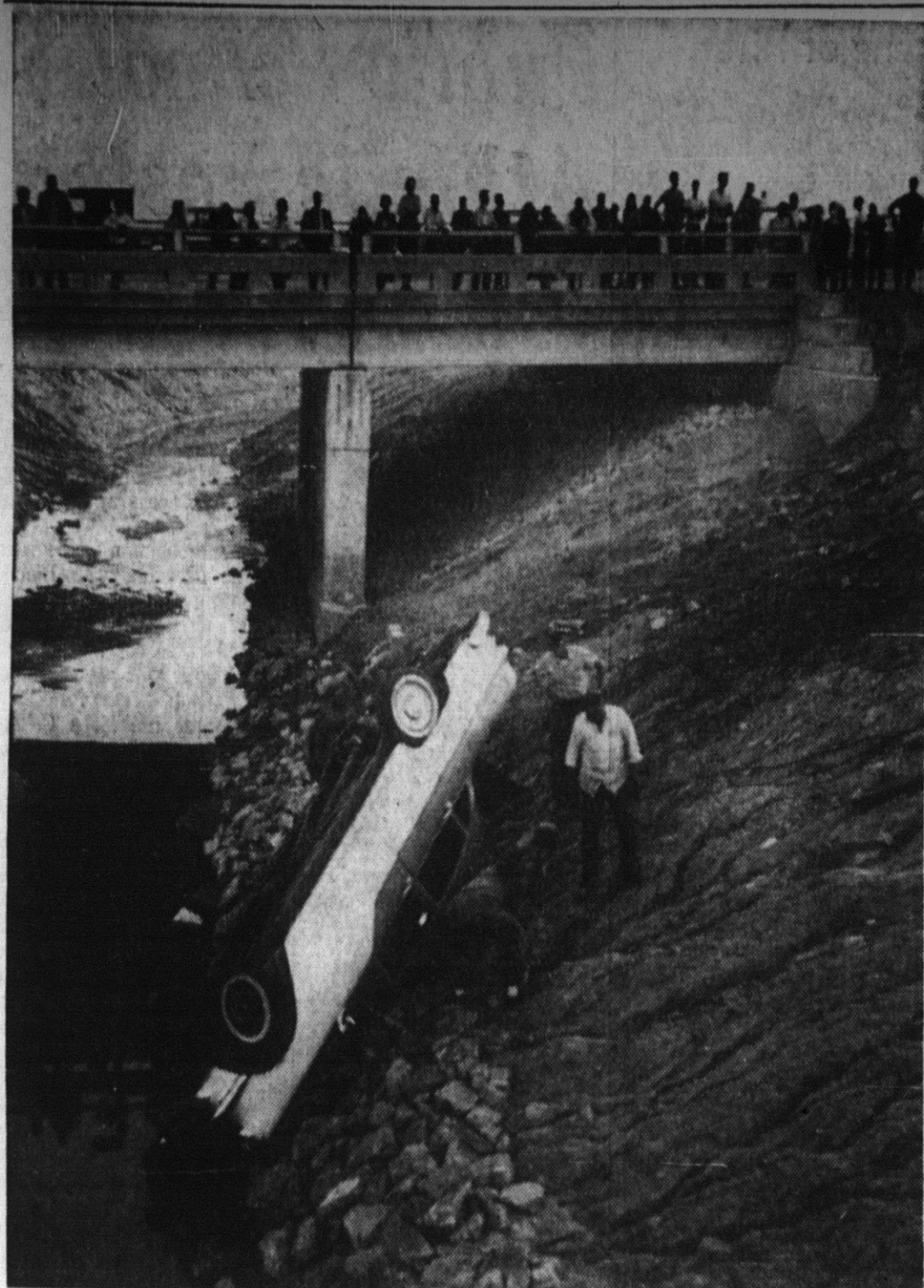

## Nature Center Gets \$1,000 From Holland Garden Club

Holland Garden Club has given \$1,000 to match Holland Council's gift to Holland's Nature center on the Graafschap Rd. This sum is to be used to start development of the property.

In November of 1963, shortly after the property was purchased by the city, a permanent committee, including several members of Garden Club, was organized to develop this ground into an outdoor laboratory, retaining as much of its natural beauty as possible, but also working out demonstrations for proper stream and erosion control, plant and wild-life conservation and observation.

It was agreed that the first step was to develop a "use" map of the area to include stream development and control, types of soil, and general topography, to see where excavating was necessary for placement of trails and walkways. This is being done.

Simultaneously, a cover inventory of all the plant material now growing on the land is being taken by Derk Bloemendaal's high school biology students. A bird inventory is also being taken.

Approximately a dozen camera - points are being established to record over-all development at all stages of progress.

The building on the property is to be made water-tight and secure for storage and exhibits as they are ready for display.

A diorama of the property was included in the Tulip Time Flower Show to help visualize the project.

Late summer, according to Jacob De Graaf, is the best time for excavation of the stream bed. Willow control will be undertaken next fall and winter. Bluebird housing, wood-duck shelter, and brush-pile nesting, planting of many types of Michigan trees and shrubs are in the plans.

A nature center is a fairly new concept in community education and recreation. It embraces land, building, and people. The site chosen for Holland's nature center is particularly well suited for this type of development; it is readily accessible, already has a usable building on the premises, and has a variety of natural land situations which are typical of this part of Michigan.

This feature is most important, for a nature center differs from a park, for instance, in this respect; it takes a representative sample of natural landscape, whatever a community's local environment happens to be, and with careful study and hard work, re-shapes and re-designs that land to better understand the relationships of all natural resources.

In making this gift to the community, the Garden Club felt it was making a wise investment in Holland's future by

providing an effective learning situation where land can be used more scientifically and responsibly and, with cooperation, natural beauty in the area may be preserved.

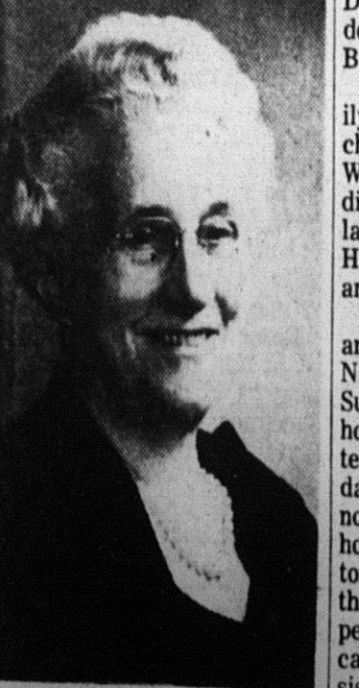

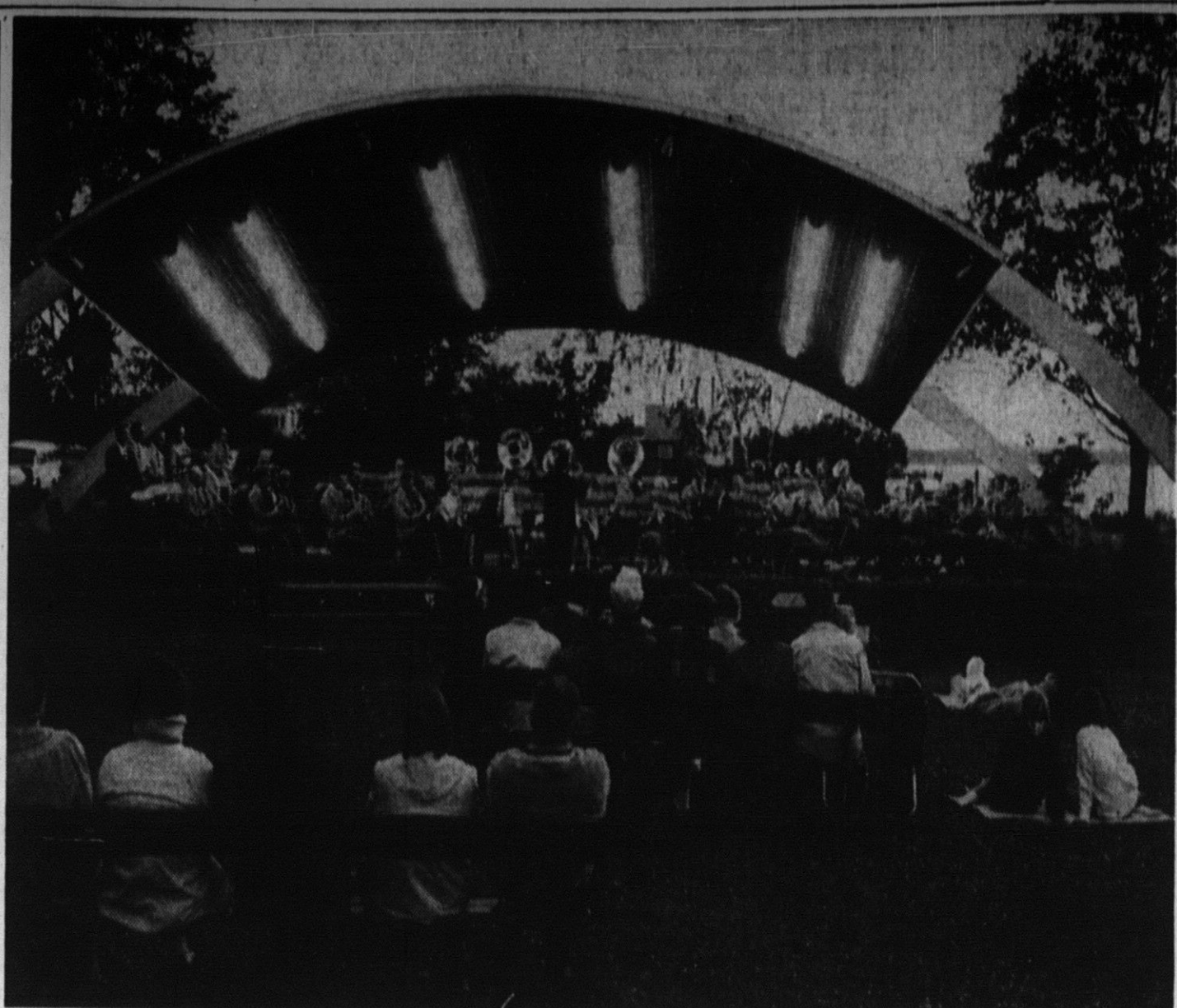

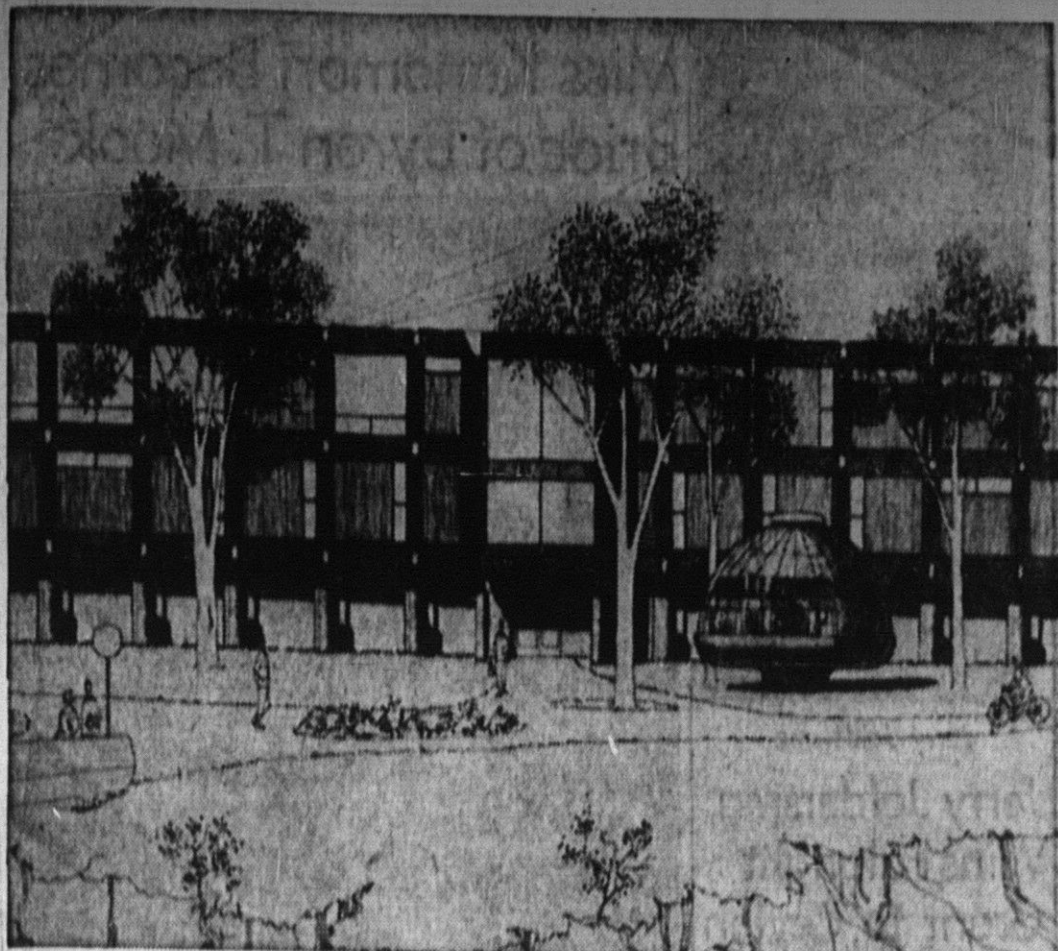
## Fair Board Membership Drive Being Conducted

## Grand Valley Asks Bids for Science Hall

Architect's drawing of the Loutit Hall of Science at Grand Valley State College, shows the three-level, 38,320 sq. ft. building, for which invitations to bid on construction will be sent out at the end of July.

Meathe, Kessler and Associates of Grosse Pointe have used steel, concrete, glass and opaque panels for the science hall, which will be located across a narrow ravine from the present college buildings. The ground level will contain the earth science rooms and special chemistry, biology, and physics labs for long-term experiments. The first floor will house the biology and physics classrooms and labs and professors' offices, while the second floor will contain the library and chemistry classrooms and labs.

The pedestal greenhouse, 28 feet in diameter and 560 sq. ft. in area, will be entered through a walkway from the main building. All utilities will be piped in through the pedestal.

Cost of the Loutit Hall is estimated at \$1,450,000, including equipment, furnishings, and related site improvements. \$300,000 of this cost was provided by a grant of the Loutit Foundation of Grand Haven, and the remainder from state appropriations. Estimated completion date of the building is the fall of 1965.

Invitations to bid on the \$2,450,000 central heating plant and distribution system will be sent out in August. The heating plant will be located on the north edge of the campus and is scheduled to go into use in late fall of 1965.

## Employment Agency Gets Judgment

**GRAND HAVEN** — Several actions took place in Ottawa Circuit Court Monday. The Michigan Employment Security Commission was awarded a judgment of \$1,122.50, plus \$14 costs, against Earl R. Deal, Spring Lake.

The commission started suit April 3 to recover unemployment benefits allegedly improperly obtained by Deal in 1961 and 1962.

## Views From the Campus

(Dr. Henry Voogd is professor of religion and Bible and chairman of the department at Hope College. Amidst the tensions of international relationships today and the pressures of contemporary life we are awaking to the fact that somewhere in the development of our educational pattern the true meaning of life and a sense of responsibility have been obscured or lost. The leaders of our nation and all persons of vision sense a critical need for an expansion of higher education that provides wisdom and moral direction as well as knowledge. It is incumbent in our day for Christian colleges and communities such as ours to stress in new and distinctive ways the value and function of teaching of religion in the educational process.

The difficulties in the way of understanding the relation of education and religion are due basically to our ignoring the fact that neither man's life nor his knowledge is bounded by things here and now. The spiritual and eternal impulses within us are forever struggling with the finite and material bonds which enclose them. No solution which does not take full account of the strength of each factor will ever be satisfactory. All educational progress must eventually posit us at the threshold of the unseen. It has not accomplished its purpose until that point is reached. Conversely, we can work backwards from the threshold of the mystery into the educational process. Every truly religious experience has the effect of stimulating the intelligence as well as the emotions. It unifies a person's life.

Things which have to be discovered by education will not be discovered by any other means, but neither can the things that are not discoverable by education be discovered by it. Unfortunately, we are so prone to believe that man can do everything that we insist on staying to enjoy our life as long as possible instead of going on to the rim of the dark. The true student, the profound philosopher, is never irreligious, for he has arrived at the threshold

of mystery and can go no further. It is the half-educated man, the self-satisfied, the cynic, those who have not yet arrived at the place where God can take the initiative, who have the glib short answers to the problems of the ages. The profound student is saved from the illusion of finality by the recognition of his own impotence and ignorance. The spiritual world has a law of its own and a certainty of its own but it is a certainty not of sight but of insight, the law not of knowledge but of faith.

Student's minds are filled with ideas unorganized, impulses uncontrolled and ideals unfulfilled. The coordinated and integrated spirit are the products of the right kind of education and in our view are quite impossible to achieve without religion. To see one's self over against the whole process of creation, in the presence of God who is from everlasting to everlasting, is to begin to see life in the proper perspective. It is presumptuous to suppose that we can enclose God within our human categories: self-flattery, pride and all manner of uncharitableness inevitably follow from such an assumption. Against all this the sense of a God whose throne is in the heavens and whose footstool is the earth is a healthy corrective. The sense of the majesty of God and of His overruling providence forms in the student that willingness to serve others which is the core of a wholesome full life.

Herein lies the value of Christian higher education. The Christian college is a community of faculty and students seeking to know the nature of the universe created by God and the kind of society in which man can live according to God's will. Christian higher education endeavors to develop persons who can live effectively as mature Christians in the twentieth century by providing the student with the opportunity to grow within the framework of a meaning and purpose that unifies and orders his knowledge, illumines his appreciations and gives direction to his existence. Without this type of context education of knowledge and technology may well enslave and destroy mankind.

As Christian teachers we share with all genuine educators a commitment to the primacy of truth, honesty and integrity in the search for truth, excellence in teaching and scholarship and the acceptance of social responsibility. But beyond this we recognize that every philosophy of education rests upon certain presuppositions of faith which ultimately determine the nature of the educational process. The uniqueness of Christian higher education is the conviction that knowledge of reality and of the meaning of life is adequate and complete only in the light of the revelation of God through Jesus Christ. The most significant aspects of higher education can be maintained only through the type of education where spiritual values are made real and the secular is permeated with spiritual significance, where the knowledge of the sciences and the enjoyment of the arts are recognized as God's gifts to man.

It is this Christian conviction of the unity of truth under God and the dignity of man as a child of God that will ultimately safeguard freedom in our day and promote the higher moral standards and social responsibilities for which we are all, both consciously and unconsciously, seeking and praying.

For these reasons I am grateful for the high privilege of teaching religion in a Christian college such as Hope in a day as challenging as ours.

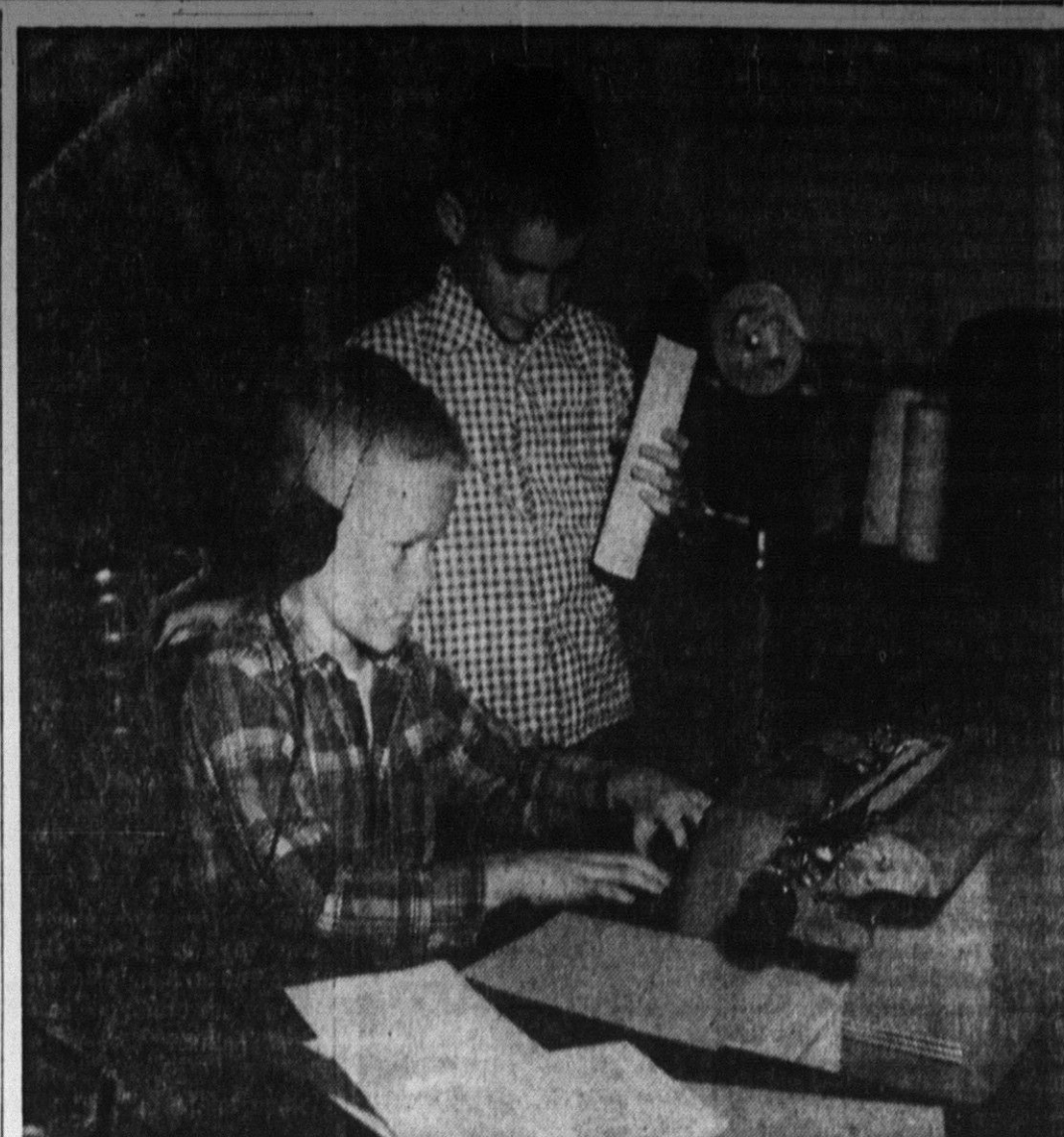

## Free Gasoline Proves Costly To Motorist

**ZEELAND** — Crime doesn't pay.

At least that is what John H. Smith, 28, of Grand Rapids, must be telling himself today after paying fines and costs totaling \$123.60 stemming from his failure to pay for 60 cent's worth of gas at a Zeeland service station Wednesday night.

Smith's auto ran out of gas on Maple St., just south of Komejan's service station at Main Ave. and Maple St., Wednesday night. Smith walked to the station and got a can of gas, saying he would return the can and pay the 60 cents.

Ronald Komejan, working at the station, watched as Smith poured the gas into his auto. He also saw Smith get into his car, turn around and speed south on Maple St. toward M-21.

Komejan called Zeeland police who radioed Holland and Hudsonville police to be on the lookout for Smith's white 1963 convertible.

Within minutes Smith was seen speeding through Hudsonville by Police Chief Bill Ten Have who gave chase. Smith led Ten Have on a wild 100-mile-an-hour ride to Jenison where he finally gave up and stopped.

Ten Have arrested Smith for reckless driving, and Smith wound up paying a \$100 fine and \$4.30 court costs before Justice Hilbert De Kline of Hudsonville.

Ten Have then turned Smith over to Zeeland Police Chief Lawrence Veldheer who brought him before Justice Hilmer C. Dickman where he was fined another \$15 and \$4.30 court costs on a charge of simple larceny.

Veldheer commended station attendant Komejan for his prompt action which enabled police to apprehend Smith quickly.

It should be a lesson Smith won't easily forget, and he'll probably think twice before paying almost \$62 a gallon for gasoline again.

## Dust Bowl Slows Traffic On New Road

Driving on the newly-completed section of I-196 near the south city limits of Holland has become quite hazardous with gusts of sand and topsoil blowing across the lanes and cutting visibility.

The strong winds today created a veritable "dust bowl" along the stretch which has not been landscaped. The dirt is especially dry from lack of rain, and blows quite easily in strong winds.

Senior engineer for the highway project, William Kasip, explained that little could be done about the dust until grass is planted. He added that the seeding wouldn't start until the middle of July when there is more moisture. He cautioned motorists to drive more carefully in this section until the landscaping is completed.

Work on the five-mile stretch of I-196 around Saugatuck and Douglas is going according to schedule, Kasip said, and should be completed by July 31. Most of the remaining work is on a double bridge which crosses the Kalamazoo River West of Douglas. The southbound span of the bridge is nearly completed. Workmen will begin pouring the concrete on the northbound span this week.

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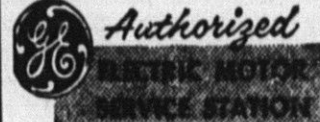
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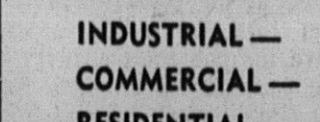
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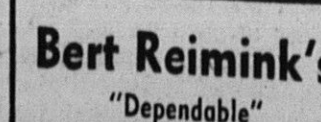
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
