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## Hearings Occupy City Council

Fully one hour of 1½-hour meeting of City Council Wednesday night was devoted to public hearings with the greater share of the discussion on paving and sidewalk projects slated this summer.

Upshot was that four of the five paving projects were approved, as was the sidewalk program for East 24th St. with some revisions. Action on one paving project calling for improvements on 40th St. extending west of Ottawa Ave. for 500 feet was delayed for two weeks, after Gerald Van Noord sought curb and gutter as well as pavement.

The four approved paving projects list 24th St., Lincoln to Apple Aves.; 24th St., Plasmann Ave. to Graafschap Rd.; First St., from River Ave. 330 feet west; Ottawa Ave., 32nd to 40th Sts.

The 24th St. paving and sidewalk projects are somewhat conditional. Former Councilman Richard W. Smith served as spokesman for several residents protesting high costs of the project. Smith explained that early estimates had listed \$10 a foot for paving and \$2 for sidewalks whereas latest estimates list \$12.50 for paving and \$3 for walks. And some residents feared final costs might even be higher.

Council resolved this matter by stating further consideration would be given at the time bids are taken, and if bids are unrealistic the project could be called off. Council expected there would be a saving in asking one bid for sidewalks and curb and gutter in this particular project.

Other hearings were held on two zoning ordinance amendments. One rezoned a 53-foot parcel of property lying east of the present gasoline station at the southeast corner of 15th St. and River Ave. to C-1 neighborhood commercial. The other was to allow gasoline service stations in C-1 neighborhood commercial zones. Both were approved.

Council also approved a recommendation of the city manager allowing Shell Oil Co. to construct a new service station on the 15th St. and River Ave. site, subject to approval by the Board of Appeals. Plans call for using the present station site, the small parcel to the east and Had's Sandwich Shop to the south for a new Shell station.

Also approved was an application from Hoe's Maplewood Service for a permit to move gas pumps, close a door opening and erect a fence at its location at 881 Lincoln Ave.

Petitions for sanitary sewer service in Pioneer Ave. from 32nd to 33rd St. and in 33rd St. from Pioneer to Washington Ave., and in Beach Dr. from Myrtle Ave. west, were referred to the city manager.

Council approved certifications from Councilman Peerbolt, Peerbolt's Inc., street department, \$2.25; Councilman Lamb, Lamb, Inc., library, fire, park and cemetery departments, \$108.18; Councilman Smith, Wade's Drug store, photographic supplies for Windmill Island and police department, \$2,425.99.

Claims against the city were filed for Frances J. Walker, 640 West 20th St.; Jacqueline Elzinga, 216 Beth St.; William Schuuring, 738 State St.; Johanna Blystra, 4436 64th St.; Ivan Schaap, 129 West 38th St. All were referred to the city insurance carrier.

Approval was given black-topping around the new service building at the tennis courts not to exceed \$400.

Approval also was given transfer of ownership of the 1967 SDD and SDM licensed business at 451 Washington Ave. from Gerard and Martha Raffenaud to Albert and Phyllis Klinge, following a city manager's report at the request of the Liquor Control Commission.

Council approved an agreement with the State Highway Department to share cost of energy for traffic signals at 16th St. and US-31 bypass on a fifty-fifty basis, the city's share to be charged to the Motor Vehicle Highway Fund.

Oath of office of Dr. S. W. Kuipers as a member of the Hospital Board for a four-year term was filed.

Council acknowledged gifts to Holland Hospital consisting of a flag from Mrs. Eleanor Cotts in memory of her son, decorative brass items from Dr. and Mrs. Tappan, a magazine subscription from Ebelink's, and surgical instruments valued at \$30 from Dr. William Weststrate Jr.

Council adopted a resolution commending Donnelly Mirrors Inc. for winning county, district and regional awards in Michigan Week competition for its locally manufactured product, a vinyl clad rear vision mirror. The resolution ex-

pressed appreciation to the 450 employees for the honor brought to the city and to thank them for their part in continuing efforts to make Holland a progressive and growing city.

Mayor Nelson Bosman presided. All Councilmen were present. The invocation was given by the Rev. Jacob Hoogstra, retired Christian Reformed church minister.

## Seven to Appear In Circuit Court On Meat Scandal

GRAND RAPIDS — A number of persons indicted by a grand jury investigating meat processing operations in Western Michigan were bound over to Circuit Court Tuesday by Municipal Judge Louis E. Simhauser.

Facing arraignment are Theodore Everse, 58, of Holland, and his son, Lyle Everse, also of Holland. The two were officers of Holland Meat, also doing business as Ottawa Sausage Co. The firm was also indicted. Also to be arraigned are Roy Cooper, 62, and his wife, Doris, 66, both of Rockford; William Peterman, 33, of Rockford, employed by Cooper; Gerhard A. Ritsma, 31, and Edwin L. McIntyre, both of Holland and former employees of a Holland supermarket.

Arraignment is expected to take place later this month. Indictments were returned last fall by Circuit Court Judge Stuart Hoffius who served as grand juror.

The indictments allege the respondents, between Jan. 1 and Sept. 12, 1966, conspired to acquire, process, transport or deliver in unlicensed and unsupervised vehicles, meat carcasses, sausage, ground beef or other meat products of dead animals which had died of natural or unnatural causes, including disease.

## Corps Dredging In Holland Area

The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers is conducting its annual maintenance dredging operation in the Holland area this week.

A dredging boat is now in Black River dredging the area near the River Ave. bridge to a depth of 18 feet.

The operations are under the authority of the Detroit District Corps of Engineers with Col. Edward C. Bruce, district engineer. Based in Grand Haven, the area corp is responsible for maintenance of the entire east Shoreline of Lake Michigan and its 16 harbor areas.

The specified project depth is 23 feet at all entrances to navigation channels, 21 feet in the navigation channels and in the upper channels to the turning basins and 18 feet in the turning basins.

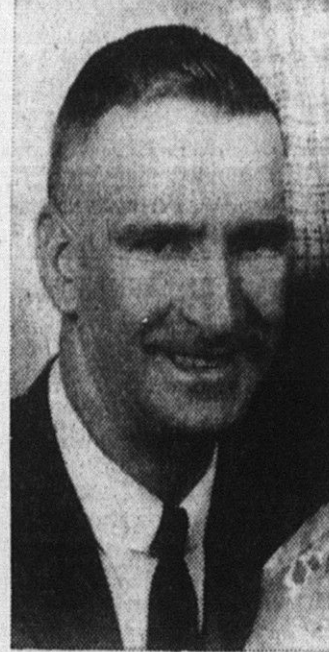
## Injuries Fatal To Holland Man

GRAND HAVEN—The George K. Hitsman family, of 14080 Johnson St., Grand Haven, was notified Tuesday that their son, George Jr., 20, lost his left leg in an explosion June 18 in Vietnam. The leg was amputated below the knee.

The soldier was placed on the seriously ill list, but it was the judgment of the attending physician that there was no imminent danger to life. The family will be advised of his progress within five days, or would be notified immediately in case of change.

Hitsman was walking in the company area when hit by a fragment from an unknown explosive device.

He enlisted at 17 and took his basic training at Fort Knox, Ky. He went to radio school at Fort Gordon, Ga., and spent 13 months in Korea. He was home on leave last February and then went to Vietnam with the 101st airborne division. The family attends West Olive Christian Reformed Church.

The Holland City Hospital Board has submitted a request for a study of the reported lack of approved nursing home beds in the county. Effective Jan. 1, the board reports, all Medicaid patients must be in an approved nursing home or they will not be eligible for assistance.

The Holland body requests that a group of professional and lay people be named by the supervisors to make a study which may result in the erection of a county medical facility, a matter that has been discussed several times in the past five years.

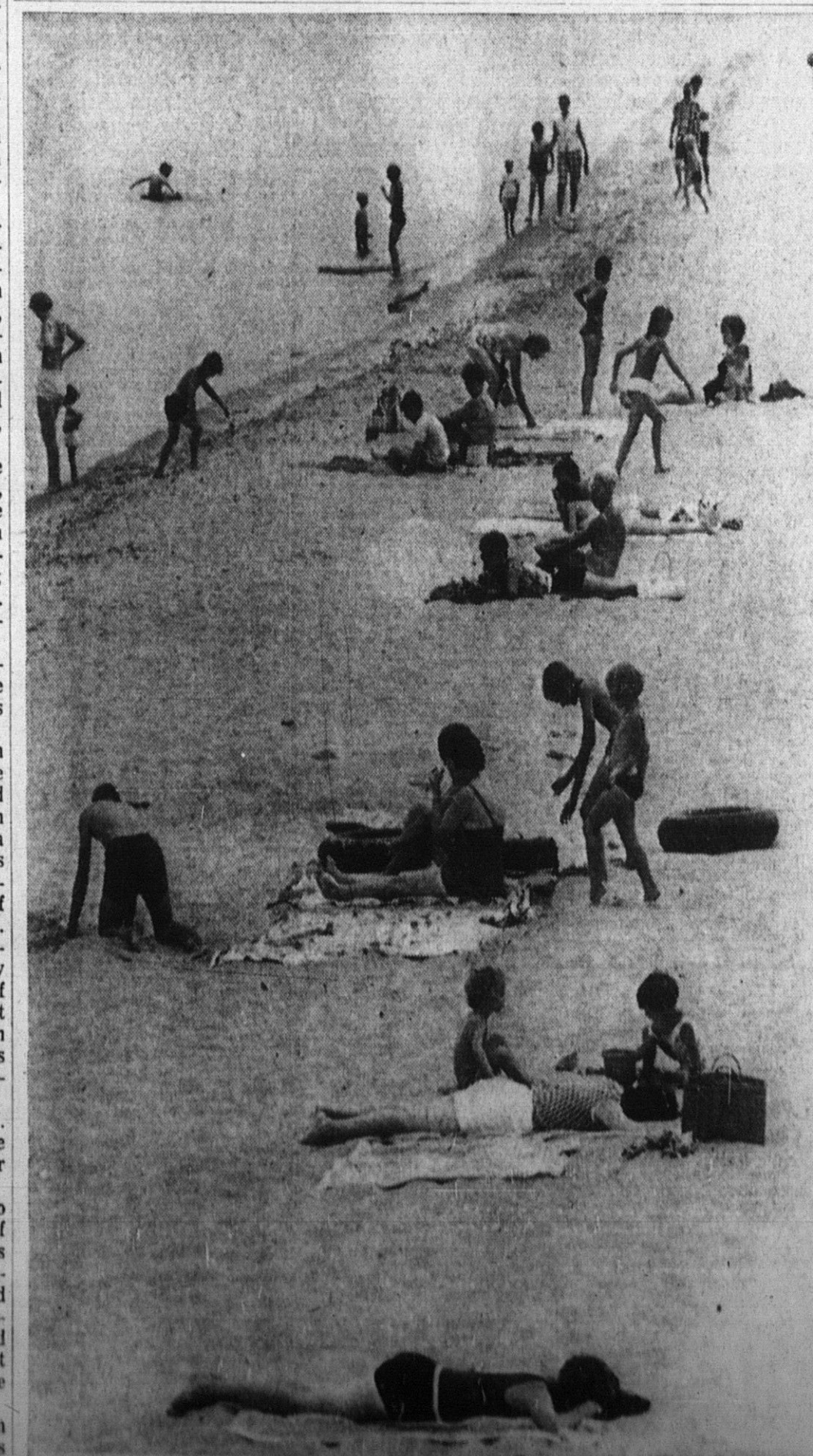

## Two New Stamps Will Go on Sale

Two new five-cent commemorative stamps will be available at Holland post office early in July.

A stamp commemorating the 150th anniversary of the Erie Canal will go on sale July 5. This engineering marvel of its day had a tremendous economic impact on the country. It was 40 feet wide, four feet deep and stretched 363 miles from the Hudson River just north of Troy westward to Buffalo. Eighty-three locks lifted boats 568 feet, the difference in altitude between the Hudson and Lake Erie.

This horizontal stamp picturing a canal boat is in red, blue and black.

A "Search for Peace" stamp, marking the 50th anniversary of Lions International, will go on sale July 6. The vignette is based on the ancient Greek symbol for peace, the dove and laurel branch. As part of its anniversary activities, Lions International is sponsoring a "Search for Peace" essay contest and the stamp reflects the theme of the program.

There are divisions for nearly all hobbies and crafts and hobbyists are encouraged to compete for the premiums offered, Steketee said.

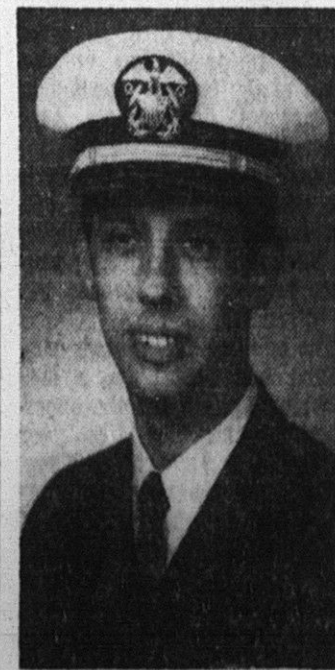
## Man Arraigned In Stabbing Case

## Time Change Was Opposed By Volkema

LANSING — "Only about 5 per cent of Michigan's voters have blocked the legislature's efforts to keep Michigan on Eastern Standard Time as it has been observed 22 years," Sen. Harold J. Volkema of Holland said Saturday.

He said he has received many complaints since the state was forced on "double fast time" a few days ago as a result of initiatory petitions.

"Early in the session, the legislature could foresee chaotic conditions resulting from a time change and voted overwhelmingly to keep Michigan in its present time zone. I not only voted to keep Michigan's time the way it was but did everything to convince other legislators to do the same," he said.

He said the drive for petitions centered largely in Detroit and it required signatures of only 125,000 persons, many of them spurred by tv pressures, to force Michigan's 8,000,000 citizens to have daylight saving time for two summers. A vote on the issue will not come until November, 1968, he added.

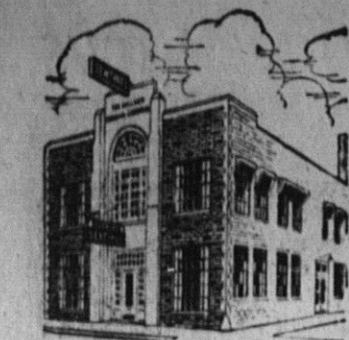

community.

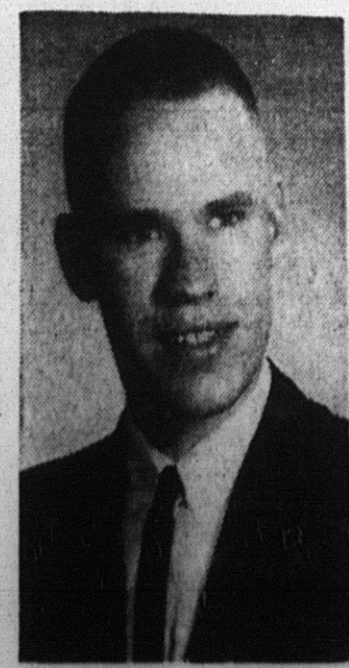
We are grateful to the hun-

#### Sunday School Lesson

Sunday, June 25  
Peter Imprisoned and Freed  
Acts 12:5-17  
By C. P. Dame

In this scientific age some  
people do not believe in mira-  
cles. Evangelical believers who  
accept the Bible as the word of  
God believe that in times past  
God performed miracles and  
they also know that God still  
performs miracles. This lesson  
tells about a miracle God  
wrought on behalf of the early  
church.

I. When a church gets con-  
cerned it prays. "Peter there-  
fore was kept in prison; but  
prayer was made without ceas-  
ing of the church unto God for  
him." This was the third time  
Peter was in prison and it looked  
as if it would be the last time  
Peter was in prison and it looked  
as if Herod had planned to put  
him to death. He had already  
killed James, the son of Zebe-  
dee, the brother of John. Six-  
teen soldiers were on guard,  
four during each watch and be-  
sides Peter was chained, and so  
it appeared as if death was sure.

The church had no money, no  
political pull, no influence with  
the authorities, and no power,  
according to the views of the  
world. The church used the power  
it had—and that is why the  
church group prayed. The prayers  
of that group were definite  
—they prayed for Peter. Take  
a look at the situation and note  
the contrast. On one side was  
armed military power, soldiers  
and a grim fortress, the might  
of Rome. On the other side a  
group of praying men and wom-  
en and lo, they won. What about  
prayer meetings today? Do con-  
gregations meet for prayer at  
more or is everyone too busy?

II. God answers prayer. "And  
behold the angel of the Lord  
came upon him, and a light  
shined in the prison" so that  
Peter could see. The angel woke  
up the sound - sleeping Peter  
and gave him orders which he  
obeyed. The angel led Peter  
past the iron gate which opened  
of its own accord and when the  
two got on the street the angel  
left Peter who went to the  
"house of Mary, the mother of  
John, whose surname was Mark,  
where many were gathered to-  
gether praying." Peter knocked  
at the door and at first got no  
answer.

A maid named Rhoda, was  
at the gate. She heard Peter  
knocking and speaking, but in-  
stead of opening the door she  
hurried to the group and told  
the people that Peter was stand-  
ing before the gate, but they  
would not believe her and so  
Peter kept on knocking until  
finally they opened the door  
and Peter walked in and told  
about his miraculous deliver-  
ance. What about the faith of  
these people? Peter told the  
group to tell James, the brother  
of Jesus who was then the  
leader in the church at Jerusa-  
lem. Peter then departed but  
we do not know for sure where  
to; some say to Antioch, others  
that he went to Joppa and took  
ship there for Rome. When Peter  
left Jerusalem the last of  
the apostles left that city.

Two women in this story mer-  
it praise. Mary used her spa-  
cious home for the gathering  
Christians. Since that time  
many women have opened their  
homes for prayer, for Bible  
study, for missionary groups,  
and for delegates to conven-  
tions. Rhoda, the maid had  
faith and persistence and re-  
vealed it. We are living in a  
time when women who love  
Christ and His church can  
serve in many and varied ways.

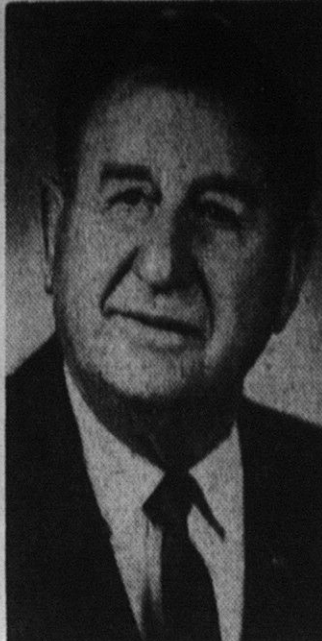

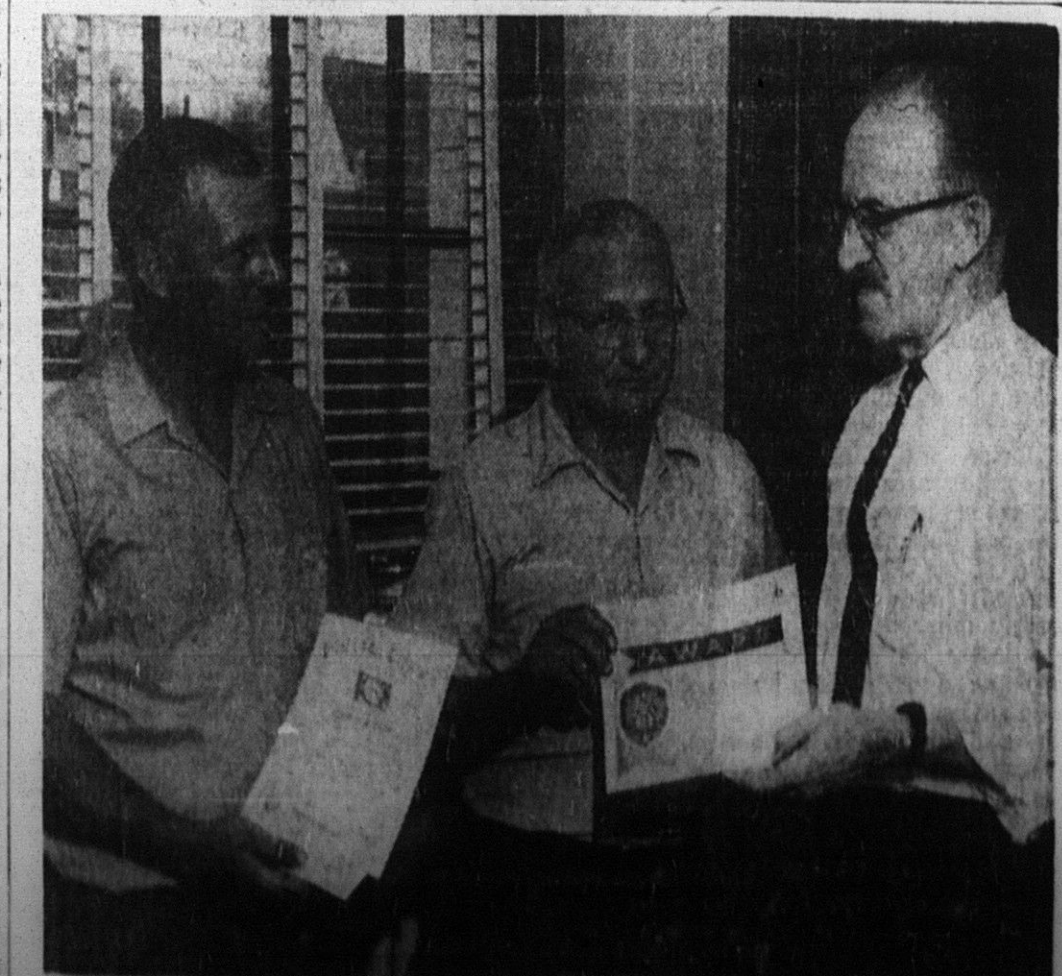

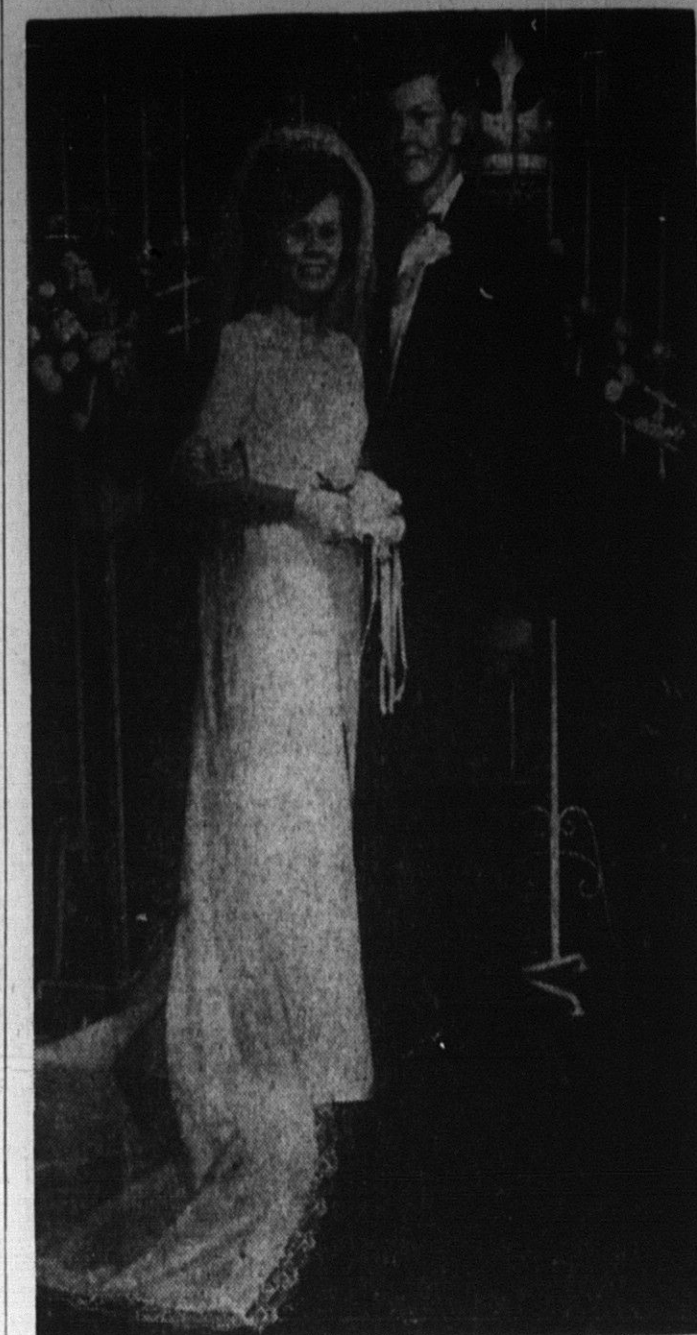

## Holland Maple Trees Infested

Maple trees in the Holland area have been suffering an attack by the spring cankerworm, commonly referred to as the inchworm. The cankerworm attacks in cycles which consist of attacks which last from two to three years followed by about a ten year period free from the worm.

According to Jacob De Graff, park superintendent, the cankerworm is common throughout the eastern United States and Canada. There is one annual generation and the winter is passed in the pupal stage. The adults appear as soon as the frost leaves the ground and the wingless females ascend the trees and deposit their eggs under bark flakes and in protected places. The eggs hatch just as the foliage appears. The young develop rapidly, reaching maturity early in June, when they enter the ground and change to pupae. They spend about nine months in the pupal stage.

The presence of cankerworms becomes apparent about the time trees come into full leaf in the spring. The larvae at first skeletonize the leaves and later may completely strip the tree of foliage. Trees infested with the cankerworm may have a fire-scorched appearance.

The mature caterpillars are slender and measure about an inch in length with a wide variation in color. The predominant color is dark with a mottled head, a distinct yellow stripe

below the spiracles and a yellowish-green line down the middle of the back. The larvae have the characteristic looping gait of all measuring worms and disturbed let themselves down to a silken thread. They are light and may drift a considerable distance in the wind which accounts for much of the spread of infestation.

A treatment of a large area is done with a spray of Malathion and DDT but the Park Department doesn't recommend the spray because it might harm nesting birds. A home recipe of powdered resin and castor oil is recommended.

It is mixed until of a sticky consistency and painted in the band about three inches wide and three feet from the ground around the trunk of the tree.

## Allegan Has New Mental Health Unit

ALLEGAN — New mental health services are now available to the people of Allegan county through a clinic operated by the Kalamazoo Child Guidance Clinic and the William Upjohn Delano Memorial Clinic. This psychiatric extension unit opened June 8.

## Court Backs Cheff in Horse Racing Case

GRAND HAVEN — The Michigan Court of Appeals Friday upheld a jury verdict of Ottawa Circuit Court in the case of P. T. Cheff versus Julia Terpstra, both of Holland, over ownership and earnings of the race horse Mike Pick.

Back in July, 1965, the jury found Cheff to be the owner of Mike Pick as well as owner of one-half interest in two other horses, Julia Wick and Cecil T., dating back over a period of several years.

The jury ruled gross earnings of Mike Pick to be \$60,340, less a credit for expenses of \$36,000 and a further credit for prior payment to Cheff of \$4,800. The jury also found gross earnings of Julia Wick to be \$6,061, less a credit for expenses for the mare and her colt Cecil T. of \$10,000.

During oral arguments in the Court of Appeals, the court was informed of the death of Mike Pick Feb. 2, 1967. The death, the court ruled, rendered most certain issues raised by Miss Terpstra of a right of termination of agreements.

The case dates back to October, 1956, when Miss Terpstra purchased and received a certificate of registration for a mare named Julia Wick. Cheff later paid Miss Terpstra half the purchase price and made an agreement to race Julia Wick and share equally the profits, if any, after deduction of expenses. The agreement also provided for breeding the mare on termination of her racing career, the offspring to be jointly owned. A colt Cecil T. was born in 1963.

In 1960, Cheff purchased a standard bred pacer named Mike Pick and this horse was taken to the Terpstra stables where James Helder trained it, aided on occasion by Miss Terpstra. On Helder's death in 1961, an agreement was reached between Cheff and Miss Terpstra to train and race Mike Pick, deduct costs and expenses and share net profits equally.

Mike Pick became unsound for racing purposes late in 1961 and Miss Terpstra contended in

December of that year Cheff gave the horse to her as a gift. Later after a great deal of attention and care to the horse, she raced Mike Pick, appearing as owner, signing race eligibility papers and paying stake fees. Earnings in 1962 were nominal but became substantial in 1963 and 1964.

After the Circuit Court verdict in 1965, Miss Terpstra who appealed the case to higher court retained possession of Mike Pick, filing a bond to protect Cheff's interests.

## Alewife Scourge Plagues Owners of Lake Property

A. C. Joldersma and Henry Land like to sit in the adjoining front yards of their Waukazoo homes and relax in the cool breezes blowing off Lake Macatawa.

For the past week, however, both men could think of places they would rather be.

Westerly winds of the last few days have piled up thousands of dead alewives along the shore of the lake in front of their homes. The stench of literally tons of the dead and decaying fish pervades the neighborhood. The problem of the dead ale-

wife is not a stranger to Western Michigan. But Joldersma and Land said they cannot remember when so many dead fish have been blown up on shore in their neighborhood on the eastern edge of Pine Creek Bay. Joldersma lives at 1734 Waukazoo Dr. and Land, who lives in Grandville, spends his summers at 1738 Waukazoo Dr.

Oddly, while Lake Macatawa is receiving more than its share of the dead alewife, few have washed up on the beach at Holland State Park.

The dead alewives washed up on shore within the past week or more represent the annual spring die-off among this partic-

ular species of fish. Bronson said the die-off probably represents about one per cent of the alewife population of the Great Lakes.

Michigan conservation officer for southern Ottawa County, Dallas Bronson, said the alewife is originally a salt water fish. The alewife has migrated through the St. Lawrence Seaway into the Great Lakes. Bronson said, and has adapted to fresh water.

The alewife's most important use is as a forage fish for coho salmon and steelhead populations in the Great Lakes.

Although the alewife makes up about 90 per cent by weight of the fish to be found in the Great Lakes, they have little commercial value. At present, Bronson said, alewives are caught commercially for cat and dog food and also for fertilizer.

tions in the Great Lakes.

Although more of the alewives may be found in Lake Macatawa this year, Bronson said the problem caused by dead alewives this year does not appear to be as great as it was last year.

Bronson said he worst part of the problem is probably over by this time. He said the dead fish may continue washing up on beaches for a couple more weeks, however.

Another conservation problem connected with the alewife is the fact that many seagulls, shore birds, ducks and other scavengers die off in the fall after feeding on dead alewives during the summer.

Bronson said the death of these birds is caused by type E botulism carried by the dead and partially decayed alewives.

What to do with the thousands of dead alewives that wash up on shore is up to the property owner involved, Bronson said. Joldersma and Land said they used to bury the dead fish, but the number of fish washed ashore during the last week has made this method of disposing of them impractical.

Joldersma and Land, and other lakefront property owners, are holding their noses and waiting for someone to come up with an answer to their problem.

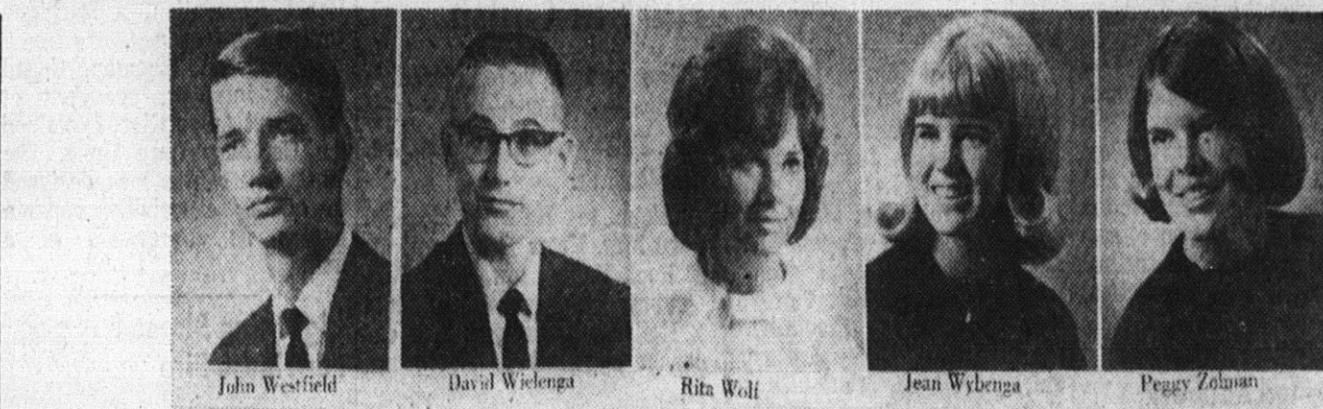

ALLENDALE — The research vessel Angus, newly fitted out for oceanographic study, will leave Grand Valley State College Friday morning to be carried to her Spring Lake berth.

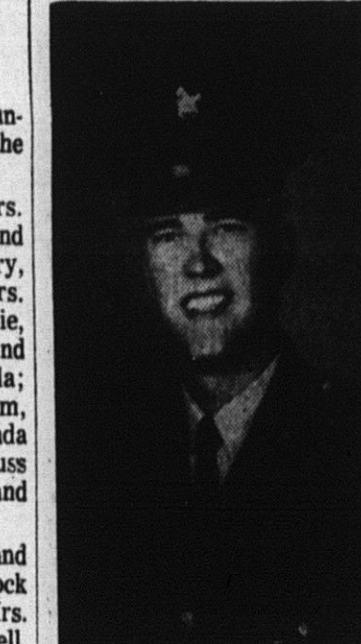

## West Ottawa Hires 6 New Teachers

Contracts for six new teachers for West Ottawa schools were approved by the Board of Education at its monthly meeting Monday night. New elementary teachers are Jeanne Kelly, Mary Schoon, Marvel Smith and Barbara Ditch. New secondary teachers are Roger Kooy and Birton Hilson.

The board established a 5.4 mill levy on debt retirement, down from 6.1 mills last year. Allocated millage is 8.52 down from 8.77 last year, and special voted millage is 9.5 mills, same as last year. This results in a total reduction of .95 mill from last year.

Supt. Lloyd Van Raalte said the district's state equalized valuation is up \$48 million from \$42 million, but applied against the current state aid formula brings less than \$1.70 per child or \$6,000 total increased income to the district for next year's operation.

The board is continuing its policy to accept such Harrington and Federal students desiring to attend West Ottawa High School. This decision could be made only after announcement was made of a reorganization election after Sept. 1, thereby assuring operation of Federal and Harrington boards for at least another year.

Interest in the Bible course in the high school conducted by Al Sneller the past year is such that enrollment has jumped from 20 to 60 next term. Sneller explained that the course is conducted within the framework of the Supreme Court ruling, with emphasis on history and contents of the Bible, a study of other religions with an aim to understanding, not acceptance. The board approved a one-year option to the West Olive community to purchase the West Olive school building for \$10,000 for use of a post office.

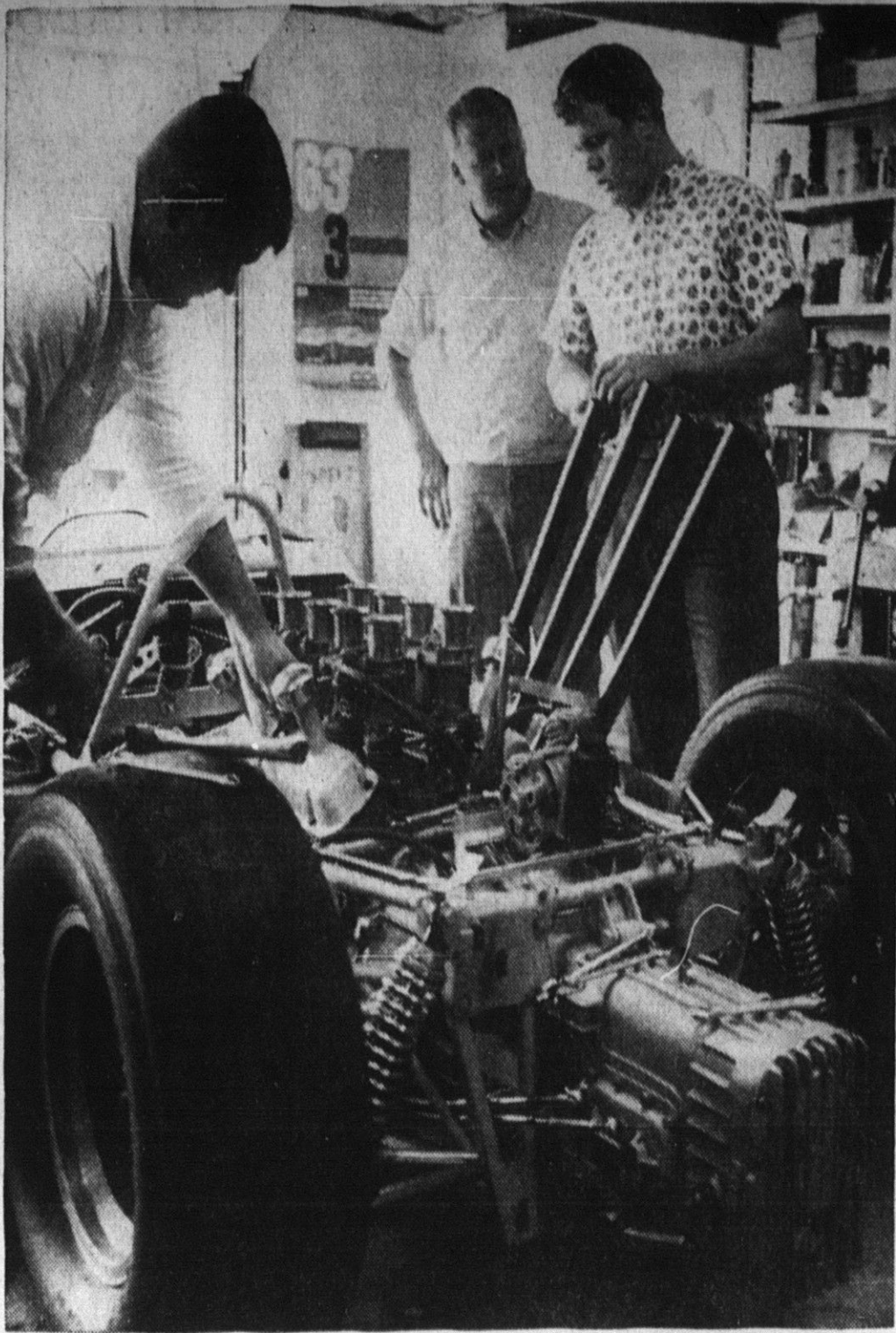

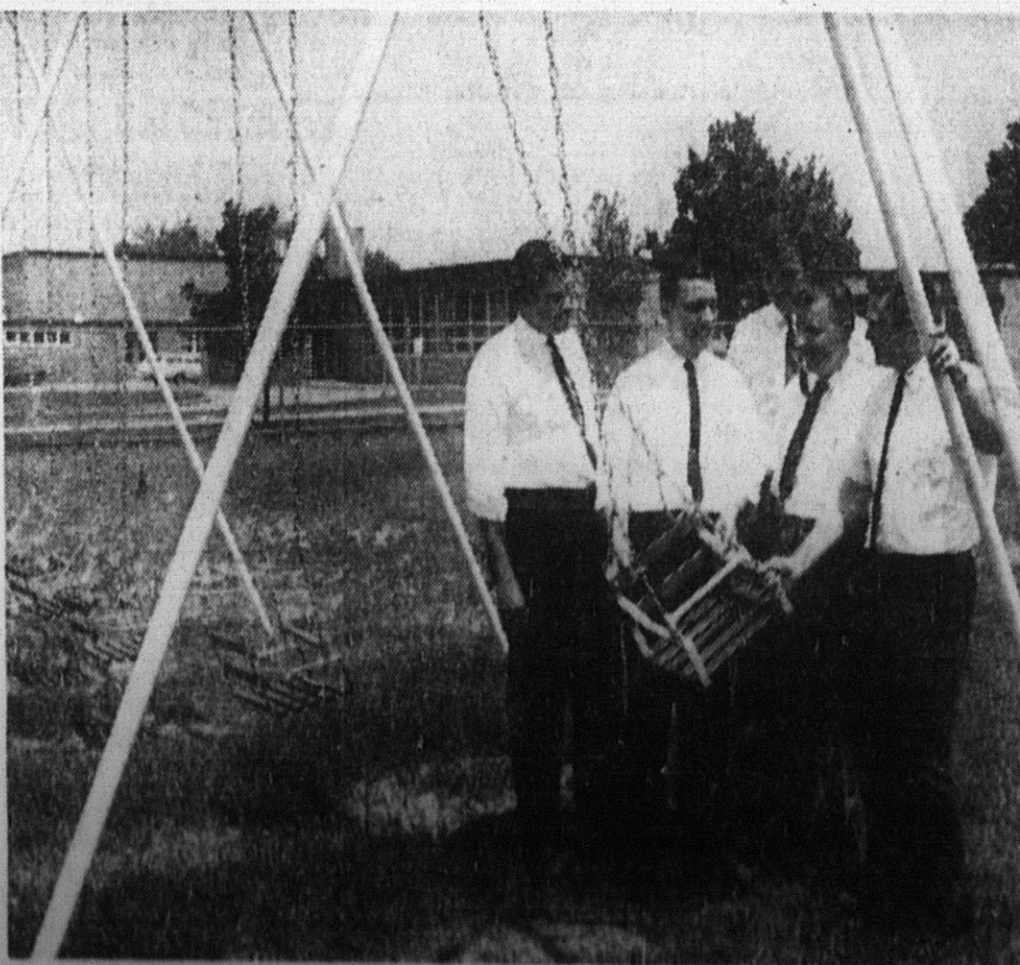
With two weeks until his next race at the State Fair Grounds in Milwaukee, Speet's crew will pull the engine and attempt to repair the trouble in time for the next outing.

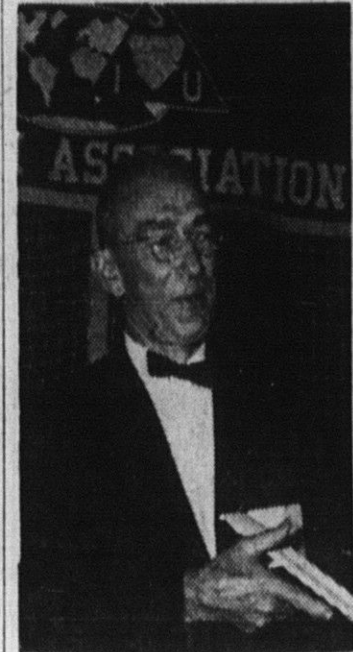
