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School Ordered To Enroll Blacks

GRAND RAPIDS — Before filled galleries at Calvin College's Knellerest Campus in an evening session that lasted until 11 p.m., the Christian Reformed Synod Tuesday ordered Chicago Classis North and the Timothy Christian School in Cicero, Ill., to proceed immediately with enrolling blacks in the school. The decisive vote was 120 to 20.

The controversial case dates back to 1965 when some members of Lawndale Christian Reformed Church in Chicago sought to enroll their children in Timothy School and the school board took the position that blacks may not be enrolled because racist sentiments in the community made the risk of violence too great. This policy has continued despite Synod's

declaration on racial equality in both 1968 and 1969 synods. Failure to comply will cause Chicago Classis North to be considered in contempt of Synod and in open disregard of the judgments of the Church of Jesus Christ.

Despite its controversial nature, the Lawndale case, as one delegate put it, "was discussed in a spirit of love and harmony."

Today's business dealt with balloting on candidates for the position of stated clerk, a post held by Dr. R. J. Danhof, formerly of Holland, who is retiring this year after 25 years. Synod voted to send a letter to the Christian Reformed Church in the Netherlands expressing concern for soundness of doctrine, asking specifically: "Are the Christian Reformed Churches in the Netherlands satisfied that theological positions which question the historicity of Adam and the historical reliability of the Gospel accounts are in harmony with the confessions and compatible with subscription to them?"

Synod will continue to maintain the second Wednesday in March as the Annual Day of Prayer, but allowed that churches believing observance would be more meaningful if keyed to the Rural Day of Prayer may do so.

Several home and foreign missionaries brought greetings Tuesday, among them representatives from Nigeria, Mexico, Brazil, Japan, Guam and Korea.

Also approved was a plan of tentative pre-appointment of synodical advisory committees for a period of two years, the appointments to be made by May 1 rather than waiting for Synod to convene in June.

Synod also approved participation in the National Evangelism Trust (Canada and the United States) by urging all congregations and agencies in the denomination to establishing priorities and specific evangelism goals.

Fire Guts Spring Lake Food Market

SPRING LAKE — Fire believed caused by lightning during the thunderstorm which hit the Tri-Cities area Wednesday night completely gutted and caused an excess of \$100,000 damage to the John Casemier Food Market at 120 West Savidge St.

A passing motorist noticed smoke coming from the basement of the building about 11:30 p.m. and notified village police who in turn called the fire department.

Four units including Spring Lake, Spring Lake township, Grand Haven and Ferrysburg fire departments were at the scene. Some remained and were still at the scene at 8 a.m. today.

Firemen worked in the pouring rain and lightning in attempts to extinguish the blaze which was eventually put out with foam; however, it flared up again at 5 a.m. today.

No one was in the building at the time of the fire. Employees had worked there until 11 p.m. filling the shelves.

The floors of the building caved in and everything was dumped into the basement, authorities said.

The owner of the market had formerly made plans to extend the store back onto Jackson St. but instead bought another on Beach Tree St. in Grand Haven. They also have a store in Coopersville.

The Spring Lake store is operated by two sons of John Casemier.

Driver Charged In Police Pursuit

Holland police charged Ernest J. Tummel, 21, of 497 Riley St., for reckless driving following a police pursuit along M-21 and the US-31 bypass Wednesday night at speeds in excess of 100 miles per hour.

Tummel was released from jail on \$100 bond to appear June 23 in Holland District court.

Police said Tummel was clocked at 120 miles per hour by a police radar unit along M-21 as he headed west near the eastern city limits. Officers said the 1968 model car turned right onto a northbound ramp of US-31, continued north for one-half mile, made a left turn and came down a ramp toward M-21 but continued across the highway and up a ramp to southbound US-31.

Police said the Tummel auto continued south along US-31 to where it stopped 1,000 feet south of 16th St., turned around and headed north in the southbound traffic lane until stopped by police cruiser at 10:48 p.m.

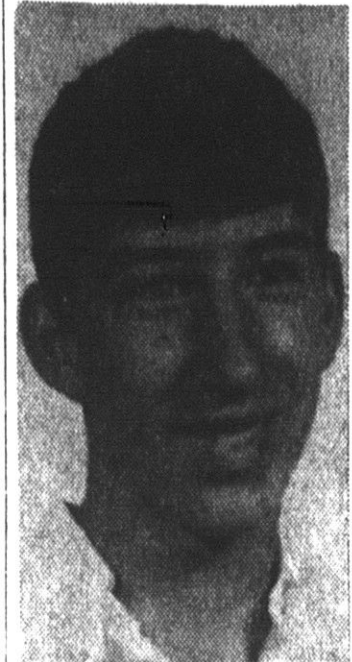
Local Youth Drowns In Stone Pit

Terry Regnerus, 16,
Friend Were Wading
In 120 Ave. Quarry

Terry Vaughn Regnerus, 16, son of Mr. and Mrs. La Verne Regnerus of 159 Reed Ave., drowned Friday afternoon while swimming in a stone quarry with a companion.

His death is the second drowning for Ottawa county this year.

Ottawa county sheriff's depu-

ties said Regnerus and a 14-year-old companion, Keith Vander Meer of 515 East Eighth St., were wading in the stone quarry on 120th Ave. in Holland township when they apparently stepped off a dropoff around 4:21 p.m.

Deputies reported Keith tried to rescue the youth but was unable to hold him and then ran to a nearby neighbor for help.

The neighbor, Louis Van Dyke, of 93 120th Ave., dove into the water in an attempt to rescue the boy at the same time Deputy Henry White arrived at the scene. Both made futile attempts to retrieve the youth.

The body was recovered by sheriff's department skin divers, Cpl. Lauren Wassink and William Kurth, both of Holland, who found it in between 20 and 25 feet of water at 5:45 p.m.

Dr. Warren Westrate was medical examiner.

Regnerus, who had just completed his sophomore year at Holland High School, attended Central Wesleyan Church. He was a member of the Tulip City Rod and Gun Club, the Holland Fish and Game Club and the National Rifle Association.

Besides his parents, the youth is survived by two sisters, Mrs. George (Barbara) Isham of Astoria, N.Y., and Mrs. Ronald (Valone) Richert of Fresno, Calif.; the maternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. S. C. Hill of Wayland and the paternal grandmother, Mrs. George Regnerus of Holland, and two nephews.

Dr. Calvin VanderWerf Resigns Post at College

President Has Year's Sabbatical

Trustees Recognize
Efforts to Upgrade,
Expand Programs

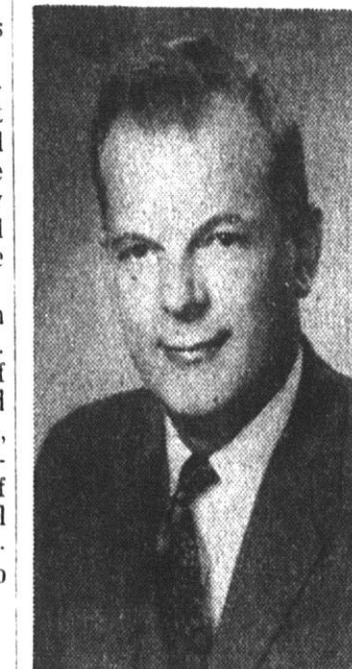
Dr. Calvin A. VanderWerf, 1963, Wednesday announced his resignation effective July 31.

Dr. VanderWerf, 53, the eighth president of Hope College since it was founded in 1851, cited personal reasons in announcing his resignation.

"The time since my arrival in Holland in 1963 to assume the presidency of Hope College has been so busy and happy that I find it hard to realize seven years have already passed. They have been fruitful, eventful and rewarding years. My family and I have enjoyed them."

"In looking back I am proud to have shared with many wonderful people in the ongoing life, the growth and meaningful development that have taken place on this campus. However, I now feel that I have made my major contributions and given my best new ideas to Hope College. I am eagerly looking forward to a new phase in my professional life and, from a personal standpoint, this move should not be delayed any longer."

"There is no way to thank adequately all the people who have made my career here such a pleasant, exciting and interesting one. I will treasure always the rewards of working with our fine Hope College students, faculty and administrators. Our family life among the good people of Holland has been most happy. The Board of Trustees, under the able leadership of Chairmen Ekdal Buys and Hugh De Pree, the alumni, Reformed church and community groups have sus-

tained and encouraged me. We leave knowing full well that we will miss each person we have known and with whom we have worked. Our good wishes stay with the College for continued progress and further significant achievement. We love Hope and expect always to be involved in her programs."

Board of Trustees chairman Hugh De Pree said Dr. VanderWerf's seven years on campus have been "pretty tumultuous" and De Pree felt with all the tensions VanderWerf "decided he has earned his letter and ought to go back to science or other fields."

De Pree said, "We all know how hard the man has worked. The college is infinitely better off now than it was seven years ago. He can leave now with a great deal of pride and I think that is what he is doing."

The executive committee of the Hope College board of trustees will meet early in August to resolve details.

De Pree, in accepting the resignation said:

"A college president today serves in one of the most difficult positions in our nation. Since 1963 — a period of increasing college change and turmoil — Dr. VanderWerf has given his talents and life to all of us at Hope College. During these years Hope has grown; its measure of success has increased; our faculty has been continuously upgraded; we have an expanded educational program; important and effective changes in organization were made; and a 10 year building program has been started."

"We on the Board of Trustees feel that great progress has been made during Dr. VanderWerf's tenure as president. We recognize, too, the toll it has taken in his personal life. It is fitting that, after seven years of service, he plans now to take a year of sabbatical leave."

"Hope College will continue to be a great school because of the leadership of Dr. VanderWerf. We have a fine administrative organization, a superb faculty, an outstanding student body. Together now, we begin to search for a new president who will build on Dr. VanderWerf's work and will further expand our horizons at Hope College."

Hope College has enjoyed unprecedented growth during Dr. VanderWerf's term as President.

Since 1963 student enrollment has increased 31 per cent to a projected 2,060 for next September; fulltime faculty members have grown 79 per cent to 147; and the college's operating budget has more than doubled to a proposed \$5,638,555 for 1970-71.

The College entered into an energetic \$15 million Centennial decade building Master Plan in 1966 in celebrating Hope's 100th year.

Since 1963 the most ambitious building program in the history of the College has been undertaken with two new buildings completed, two more which are currently under construction and another that is on the drawing board.

The college has received more than \$6 million in special gifts, 77 acres of property for biological field station and conference-education center, and has converted a nearby commercial building into quarters for the art department.

Hope alumni were recognized by the U. S. Steel Foundation in 1967 for improvement in alumni financial support of the college.

Dr. VanderWerf was chairman of the Department of Chemistry at the University of Kansas prior to becoming Hope's President. Born Jan. 2, 1917 in Friesland, Wis., he completed his secondary education in Holland High School in 1933, and received an A. B. degree from Hope in 1937, graduating as the valedictorian of his class and serving as editor of the student newspaper and president of the student body.

He earned his Ph.D. degree from Ohio State University in 1941 and in the same year accepted a position as an instructor in Chemistry at the University of Kansas.

He succeeded Dr. Irwin J. Lubbers as president of Hope College.

In addition to his teaching and administrative work at Kansas University, he carried on an active research program in medicinals, organophosphorus compounds, and the nitrogen compounds of petroleum.

With his students he has published more than a hundred articles in national chemical journals. He is also the author or co-author of three general chemistry textbooks, an Organic Chemistry laboratory manual, and a definitive monograph on acid-base theory.

As consulting editor for Organic Chemistry and Biochemistry for the Reinhold Publishing Corporation, he pioneered in 1961 in publishing the first special-topic paperbacks in Chemistry, an idea that has since swept the publishing field. In addition to his teaching, writing and research, he has served as Secretary and Chairman of the Division of Chemical Education and research. Dr. VanderWerf served on the Industrial of the American Chemical Society. Later, as a Visiting Scientist for the National Science Foundation and a Lecturer at many National Science Foundation Summer Science Institutes, he appeared before many audiences of scientists and Science teachers, both in this country and abroad.

In 1961, he was awarded an unrestricted grant of \$50,000 by the Petroleum Research Fund for use in imaginative basic research.

Dr. VanderWerf has received honorary doctorates from three institutions including his alma mater.

Dr. VanderWerf is currently on the Board of Directors of the Research Corporation (New York City), is a consultant to the Educational Testing Service (Princeton), and serves on the National Science Foundation's Advisory Committee for Institutional Programs. He is a member of the 12-man national Committee on Chemistry and Public Affairs of the American Chemical Society and its Sub-committee on Education and Employment of the Disadvantaged.

Mrs. VanderWerf is the former Rachel Good, daughter of Professor and Mrs. Harry G. Good of Columbus, Ohio. Professor Good was a member of the faculty of the Department of Education at Ohio State University. Dr. and Mrs. Vander-

Four Sewer Projects Abandoned

At a meeting which lasted three hours and five minutes, one of the longest in years, City Council Wednesday night abandoned four sanitary sewer projects in the vicinity of Central Park and also voted not to schedule further public hearings on three more sewer projects in the same area tabled from the June 3 meeting since work could not begin until next year.

The decision to abandon the four sewer projects followed public hearings which took over one hour. Several of these projects in Bay View Dr., Shoshone Walk, Bertsch Dr., Lugers Rd. and surrounding areas had been approved more than a year ago but had not been installed because of priorities on other jobs.

Inflationary costs boosted estimates considerably over last year and several residents understandably were upset over increases in costs and engineering fees, and felt Council was morally obligated to do the work at the original estimates.

Atty. Donald Hann represented some 16 owners in the Wic-Naw-Bing (lagoon) area and Stan Van Lopik was sharply critical of a \$356 boost over the original \$986 figure. Also speaking on the first project were Gerrit Jongma and Abe Sybma. Close to an hour had elapsed before Council voted unanimously to abandon the project.

The other three projects were more rapidly disposed of with much the same sentiment expressed, although in the case of one Lugers Rd. project, City Manager William L. Bopf said two specific properties were in need of sewer services for health needs, and alternatives were being studied.

Another public hearing concerned vacating the remaining portion of an alley lying between 19th and 20th Sts. running from Michigan to Pine Aves. Don Greengood, 96 West 19th St., said he needed the alley for access and the vacating was approved with the exception of 50 feet on the west end.

Close to 70 persons were in the audience, some of them standing in the hall until others left the sweltering Council chambers. Most of the people were interested in the sewer hearings and only a few remained for the entire meeting. Toward the close, a welcome breeze brought a measure of relief to the warm council room.

It was an excellent time to discuss air conditioning for City Hall and Morris Peerbolt, chairman of the space study committee, said the committee had almost completed its work.

A study of various alternative air conditioning methods available for City Hall conducted by Air Engineering Inc., resulted in recommending combination heating and air conditioning units which are exhausted to the outside.

This firm also recommended retaining Bert Reimink Plumbing and Heating Co. to coordinate the total installation at a cost not to exceed \$25,897. Not included in the installation are council chambers, the court which will be vacated next year, the Board of Public Works which already is air cooled and the Environmental Health Department which will be undergoing renovation.

Also approved were plans for remodeling projects for City Hall as recommended by the space study committee. Third floor changes call for dividing the conference room approximately in half to provide for an engineering drafting room 30 by 15 feet and an office for the assistant to the city manager 12 by 15 feet. The latter room will be paneled and carpeted and an additional doorway provided in the city engineer's office. Estimated cost is \$2,900.

Second floor remodeling calls for lowering ceiling in the clerk's office, panel walls and carpet floors, also to place a movable partition with door and window between the offices of the clerk and deputy clerk, plus an additional doorway from the secretary area into the deputy clerk's office. Estimated cost is \$3,800.

Continue Heavy Beach Patrols

Ottawa County Sheriff's Department with strengthened patrols along Lake Michigan beaches made 24 arrests for liquor law violations and one arrest for malicious destruction of property Thursday night.

The arrests were made as the department continues to stage heavy lake beach patrols in order to halt the vandalism and total disrespect for private property in the area, according to Sheriff Bernard Grysen.

Grysen stated: "Any and all persons arrested for liquor violations or vandalism will be lodged in the county jail."

Deputies noted it's not only local youth involved but large numbers from the surrounding area including Grand Rapids, Muskegon, Wyoming, Kentwood, Battle Creek and Grand Haven as well.

Three persons were injured in an altercation at Holland State Park at 6:45 a.m. Friday that stemmed from an incident which started earlier at Tunnel Park.

Three boys apparently precipitated the fight in which Robert Vander Kolk, 19, of Kentwood, was allegedly hit over the head with a tire iron. He was taken to Holland Hospital and released after treatment of scalp lacerations, an abrasion of the chest and a finger injury.

Two others along with Vander Kolk, Don Gray, 17, and Keith Horvath, 15, both of Kentwood, were also injured, apparently with fists, deputies said. They did not require treatment at the hospital.

Detectives are continuing the investigation into the fight.

Five Battle Creek youths arrested Thursday and charged with the malicious destruction of property at Tunnel Park appeared in Holland District Court later the same afternoon and all pleaded guilty.

Robert M. Gault Jr., 18; James R. Whalen, 17; Peter F. Yantelli, 18; Patrick W. Hagerty, 17; and Rick L. Wertz, 18, are to return for sentencing on July 2. They were released. No bond was required.

The five youths were also ordered to clean and restore the concession building to its original condition at their own expense under the direction of the Ottawa County Road Commission.

Deputies are continuing to work on the Tunnel Park case and more arrests are anticipated.

Many Items Processed By Council

Several matters of a routine nature were processed at a three-hour meeting of City Council Wednesday night.

An application from Marathon Oil Co. for a building permit to construct a gasoline service station at the southwest corner of 16th St. and Central Ave. was referred to the city manager for study and report. A similar request previously had been turned down by the board of appeals but received approval in an appeal to Circuit Court.

The city manager reported on an offer of Tom Elzinga to dedicate the south half of the last 330 feet of East 18th St. in the Hazel Ave. area. Council adopted his recommendation to reject the offer since Council is not in a position at this time to maintain an extended right of way. It was suggested the offer be made when the area is ready for full development through proper platting procedures. It also was recommended that this policy hold for all future proposed dedications.

Council approved low bid of \$21,935 from De Pree Electric for a new lighting system for Riverview Park. There was some discussion whether underground wiring should be installed although this was not a part of the specifications. The vote was 6 to 1 with Robert Dykstra dissenting. Costs will be financed through the Board of Public Works with the recreation department amortizing costs over a 10-year period.

Accepted as information was a city manager's report on a drainage problem on private property in the Euna Vista and Sorrento Ct. areas. The city engineer had drafted a plan at an estimated cost of \$2,252 and the report stated property owners could implement this program bearing their assessable shares. Later under audience communications Jack Dykstra, 145 Euna Vista Dr., discussed the problem.

There also was a discussion on a possible public address system for council chambers after visitors said they could not hear all councilmen.

Council delayed a vote on setting a bond sale date Aug. 5 for \$1,230,000 general obligation sewage disposal system bonds until 5 p.m. today. Councilman Morris Peerbolt left the meeting early leaving seven of the nine Council members present. Councilman Lou Hallacy said the report of the countywide study on the spray irrigation concept should be ready by July 15 and was hopeful Council would wait for this report.

A city manager's report revealed total bids of \$198,42 for the sale of surplus items removed from the fourth floor of City Hall. Council approved the sale and authorized the city manager to dispose of items not sold to a charity organization serving needy persons in Holland community and those items not acceptable to charitable organizations be deposited in the landfill. Hallacy suggested the Community Action House.

Council confirmed certification from Councilman Dyk, Holland Litho, planning commission, \$6.82; Councilman Lamb, Lamb Inc., fire, park and cemetery, \$42.81; Councilman Smith, Wad's Drug Co., police, fire, health and Windmill Island, \$64.43.

Council approved low bid of Ideal Cleaners for dry cleaning services for the police department at quoted bids.

A city manager's report on a sanitary sewer in 35th St. from Pine to Maple Aves., was set aside until such time as appropriate financing is available. This was accepted as information.

Approval was given a contract with the State Highway Department for maintenance for the coming year.

Placed on file was a petition of property owners and/or representatives opposing the proposed downtown mall.

Grand Haven Plans New Sewage Plant

GRAND HAVEN — Plans for a \$4.8 million joint Grand Haven - Spring Lake sewage treatment system with a treatment plant on Memorial Airpark property were revealed here Tuesday.

Plans call for the two units to form an authority to provide waste water treatment facilities meeting state requirements, thereby making the authority eligible for state funds available in the bond program approved by Michigan voters in November, 1968.

Under a timetable set up by the state, Oct. 1, 1970, is the deadline for projects to be under contract to qualify for a 55 per cent state grant.

The airport site was recommended as the result of an engineering survey by Williams and Works of Grand Rapids which studied six sites.

Eagle - Ottawa Leather Co. also joined the two governmental units in the study. Its waste water would be pumped into a 900,000 gallon tank presently on the plant's property and after being held 24 hours would be pumped into sewer mains leading to the treatment facility for aeration and other treatment. Additional mains eventually would return the treated water to Grand River.

New Program Adopted For Emergencies

A contract with Emergency Physicians of Holland, Inc., to provide a doctor on duty in the emergency room of Holland Hospital 24 hours a day was unanimously approved by City Council Wednesday night.

The measure was approved by the Hospital Board June 5 and in a subsequent mail ballot among staff members 25-6. Service starts July 1.

This service will boost the emergency room fee by \$2 making the fee \$12 for any person taken to the emergency room. A person reporting to the emergency room will have the option of requesting his own physician.

Emergency Physicians of Holland, Inc., a professional corporation, will handle its own billings. Doctors on duty on eight-hour shifts will be paid a fixed fee. The local organization will staff the emergency service with local doctors, supplemented by Grand Rapids physicians if needed.

The program will be on a trial basis for three months, with a full evaluation at the end of 60 days. The service was arranged following requests from many citizens and civic groups.

Previously the emergency room had been staffed by local physicians on call.

Youth Pleads Guilty To Simple Larceny

Michael T. Magill, 17, of Wheaton, Ill., was arraigned in Holland District Court today on a charge of simple larceny to which he pleaded guilty and was ordered to pay \$100 fine, \$20 costs and spend 10 days in jail.

Magill was picked up by Ottawa county sheriff's deputies at 3 p.m. Monday for taking a direction finder portable radio valued at \$60 from Bay Haven Marina on Ottawa Beach Rd. Deputies reported an employee in the store there noticed Magill was acting suspicious and confronted him when the radio was found wrapped in the jacket he was carrying under his arm. Magill was lodged in the county jail until his arraignment today.

Rock Festival Now Requires County Permit

ALLEGAN — County commissioners have approved an ordinance to regulate public assemblies, despite objections from the Attorney General and the Governor's office.

By a vote of 16:27 to 3:08 (commissioners' votes are "weighted" in proportion to the population of their districts) the board approved regulations designed to eliminate the sort of problems which resulted from last year's July 4 weekend rock festival near Saugatuck. Two commissioners were absent when the vote was taken.

The new ordinance established stiff sanitary, health and safety standards for all public assemblies. The county clerk and prosecuting attorney are empowered to grant permits when they are satisfied that the standards will be met.

The office of Attorney General Frank J. Kelley recommended that the ordinance be rejected by Governor Milliken. Milliken neither approved or rejected the ordinance, but attorneys in his office indicated their objections to it.

In other action, the board of commissioners approved plans calling for a centralized county information and accounting department built around a computer system. While approving the general concept, the board took no action on leasing specific data processing equipment. The matter is now being studied in committee.

No action was taken on a proposal from a Holland area scrap metal processor to provide for disposition of abandoned cars in Allegan county. It was referred to a committee for review. It is estimated that the county has more than 30,000 abandoned cars, contributing substantially to rural and urban blight.

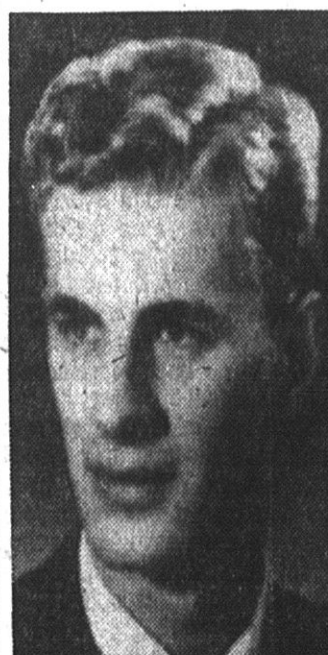

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A STAKE IN THE CITIES

A few years ago the cities' chief enemy was the state legislature, largely manned and controlled by rural residents who knew little about city problems and often cared less. Now that reapportionment has loosened the state legislators' grip, the cities are finding a new enemy — the suburbs.

These outlying areas that ring the urban cores are experiencing a great influx of people bent on escaping the many unpleasant aspects of big city life. As they go, the tax revenue they generate for the most part goes with them. This in turn seriously reduces cities' ability to cope with their problems.

And all this makes it not frivolous to ask: Will the cities survive? The inevitable accompaniment of that question is another: Where can they get the money they need for continued existence? Under present circumstances Uncle Sam's money passes through state hands, which may leave only a dribble for the cities.

Many rural and suburban residents seem to feel that, if nothing is done, city ills will somehow mysteriously disappear. This, as the fellow with the frayed rope said when told to "haul away," is misplaced confidence. No such magic is going to occur. The cities will remain viable only if all with a stake in their well-being join in providing what is necessary.

Anyone who figures he is not among those with a stake in city survival would do well to reflect on an important point. Poverty and the ills that attend it can no more be kept behind a barrier than infectious disease. If the cities' health is not fostered, suburbia, too, could suffer.

Sunday School Lesson

Sunday, June 21
The Christian in the World
Romans 12:1-2 14-21
By C. P. Dame

The words of the lesson text were written by Paul, in one city, Corinth, to Christians living in another city, Rome. Paganism dominated the world of that day and there is much paganism in our world. A reading of the text reveals that Christian conduct differs from pagan living. The Christian who seeks to do God's will in a wayward world learns that it is a challenging task.

I. Dedicated Christian living costs. A high motive helps. Paul, a spiritual leader, appealed to his fellow Christians in Rome, whom he called brethren, to live a dedicated life — to present their bodies, their whole selves, to God as a "living sacrifice, holy, acceptable unto God, which is your reasonable service." The animal sacrifices were unwilling offerings. The Christian made a willing, living offering. Why? Because he had experienced the mercies of God in his salvation.

Living the Christian life involves the opposition of the world. We live in an age of conformity. Paul told the Christians in Rome not to be conformed to the Roman world. We should not conform to the world of our time which is in opposition to God's will. Instead of conforming we are to be transformed — be changed in our thinking which will show itself in our Christian conduct. Have the courage to be a good nonconformist.

II. Dedicated Christian living differs from the worldly mode of life. To bless those who persecute us, to rejoice with those who rejoice, to weep with the weepers, to agree with others, to be humble, to seek the fellowship of the lowly and to keep conceit out of our hearts — doing all of these things well is difficult.

By nature we are inclined to return injury for injury but it is Christian to do good and to practice the art of forbearance in a moment when you are provoked. It is hard to get along with some people but the Christian tries hard to "live peaceable with all men." Some people are much easier to love from a distance than from close by. "Blessed are the peacemakers," not the protesters.

Christians have one obligation to all — to love. He who loves his fellow man fulfills the whole law of God. The sins which troubled the world of Paul's day are still with us. Christlike living costs, but it brings satisfaction to him who lives that kind of a life. He makes and impact upon his generation for good. "But put ye on the Lord Jesus Christ."

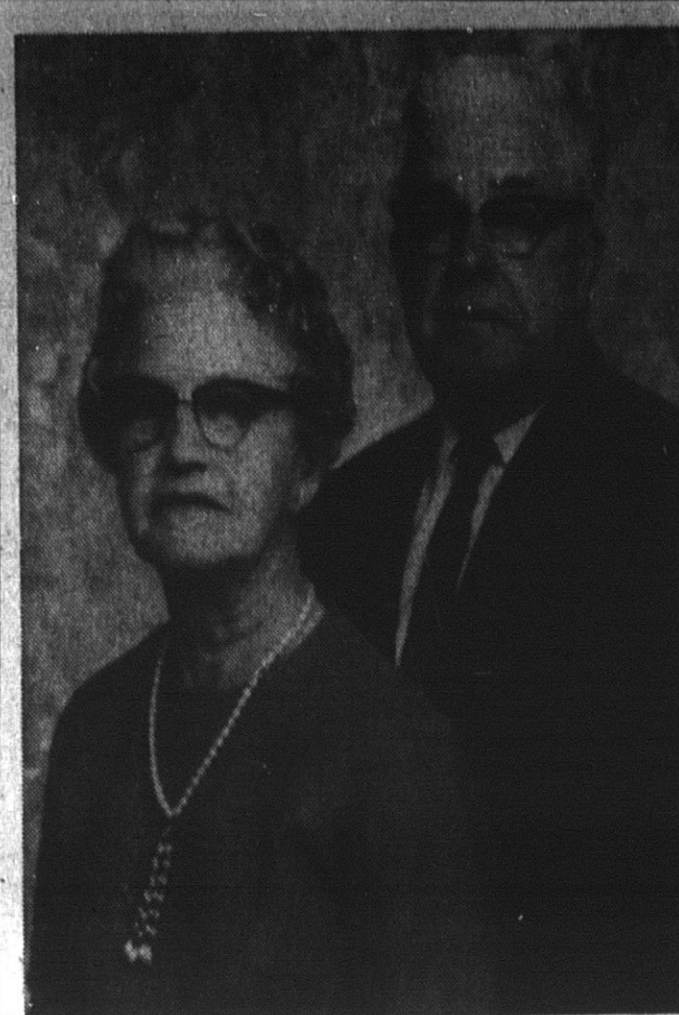

Fame, Money Not the Best Achievement

Fame and money are not a true measure of achievement, Holland High graduates were told by Lloyd A. Heneveld, Grand Rapids attorney and a distinguished alumnus of the local school, at commencement exercises Thursday night in Civic Center.

Speaking on "Your Mark in Life," Heneveld, a graduate of the class of 1943, recalled how he had agonized over making a two-minute speech as president of the senior class only to be called into military service the day before graduation. "Never was a boy so glad to go to war," he said, adding that his appearance this time was something he did not want to miss.

Heneveld said he envied graduates today in that they learn a great deal more than their counterparts a generation or two ago. With graduation regarded as commencement, not completion, he urged the young people to set their goals high, yet not to be discouraged when it is necessary to lower the sights. He said the extra bit of determination can result in achievement that transcends all odds.

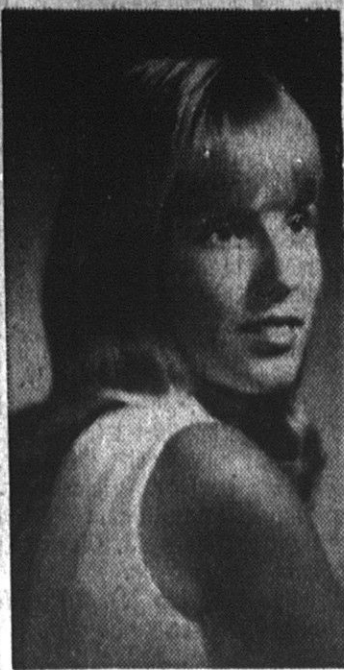

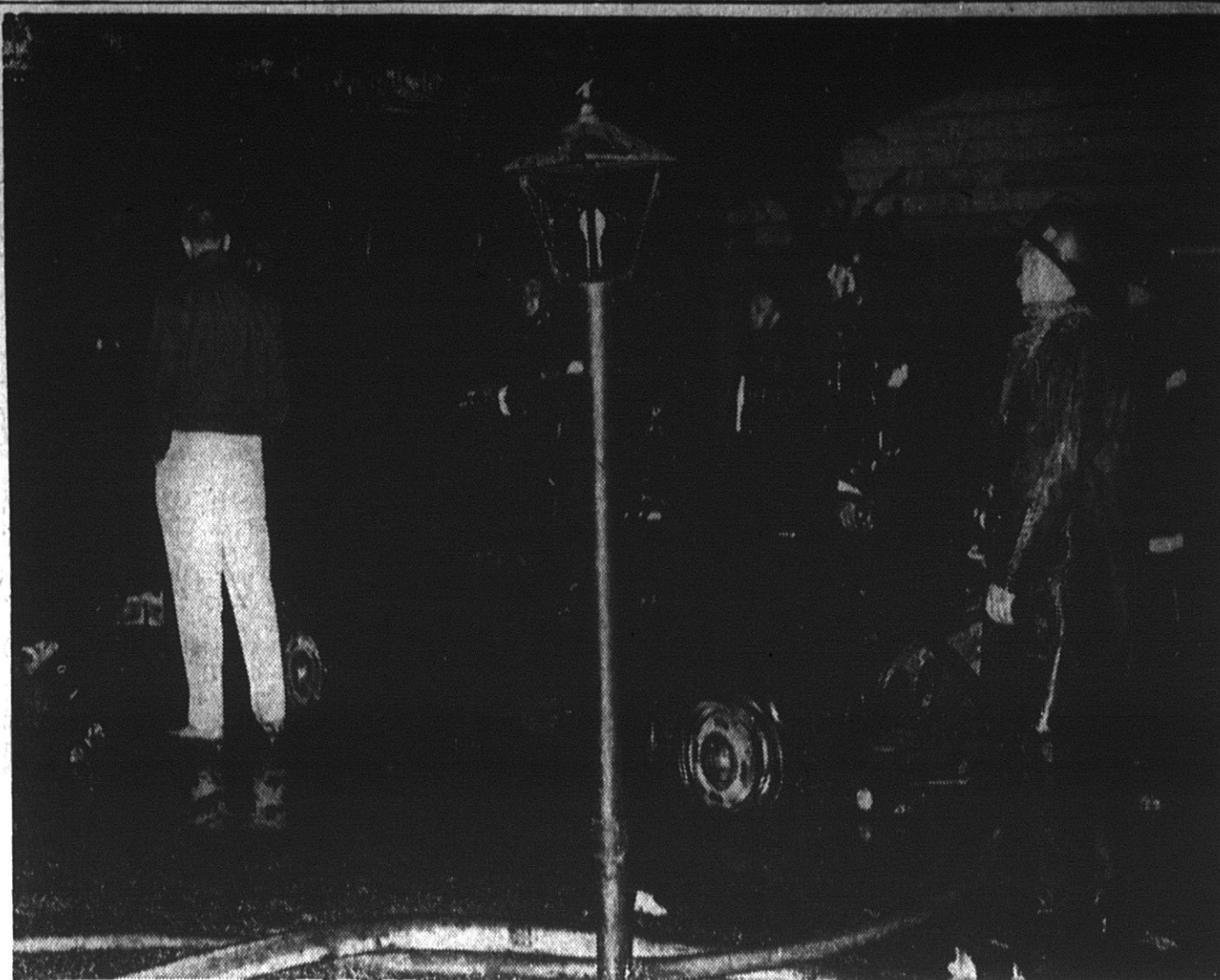

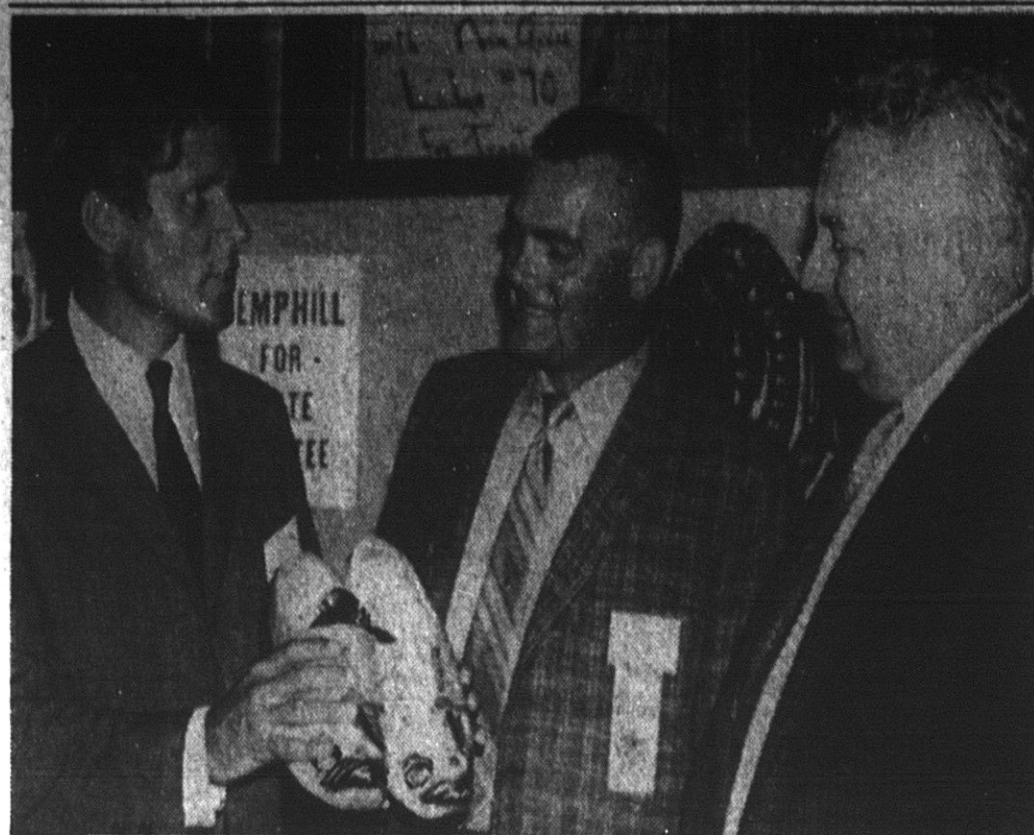

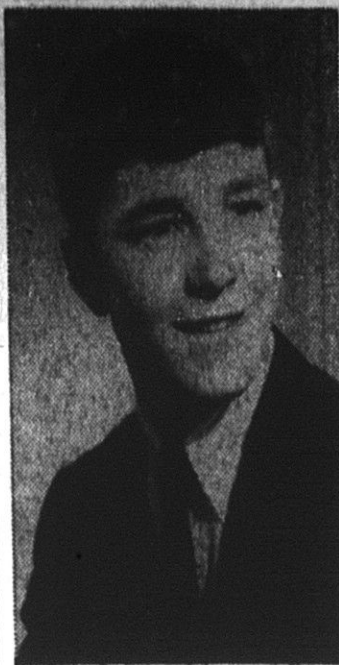

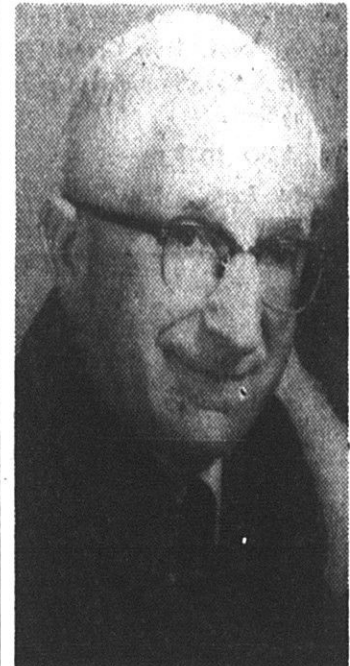
Retired Pastor Dies Here at 70

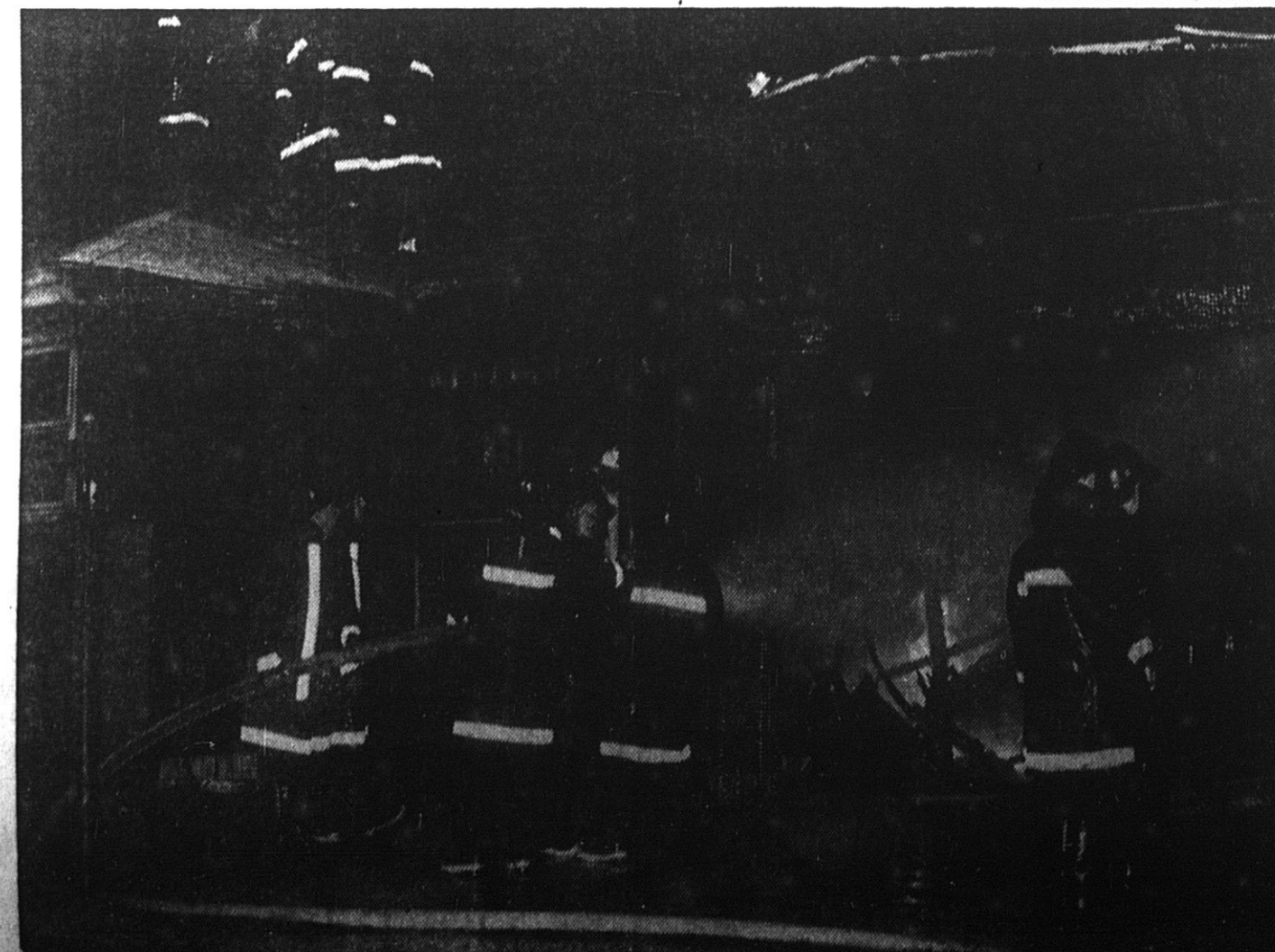

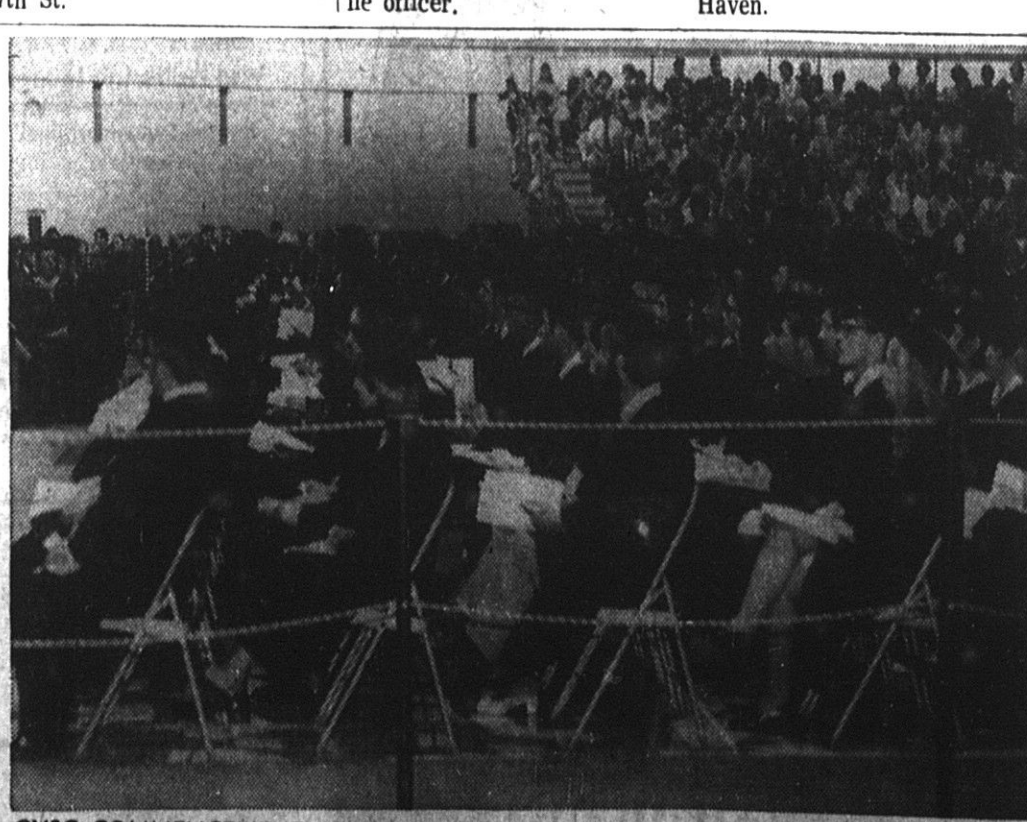

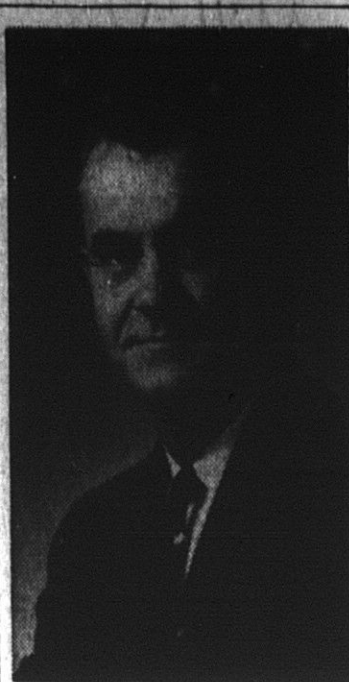

Synod Concludes Busy Week Here

General Synod delegates have left Holland Saturday after a week-long session of dealing with high level business of the 250,000-member Reformed Church in America.

This morning's closing meeting in Dimnent Memorial Chapel dealt mainly with tag-end business referred from earlier sessions. With a 25-degree drop in temperature overnight, a share of dignity returned with a good number of delegates wearing coats for the first time in five days of heat in the 80's.

Friday, synod voted to take no action on two overtures dealing with ecumenical involvement. The first had asked the body to take steps toward union with the United Presbyterian Church USA while the second called for the Reformed Church to become a full participant in the Consultation of Church Union (CCU). But Thursday night, synod voted to send a copy of CCU's Plan of Union to each Reformed Church.

Also approved was a recommendation by the Theological Commission that a committee be appointed to write a new and contemporary Confession

for the church.

Although synod had voted Wednesday 190-54 not to become a repository for draft cards for young men of the church opposed to selective service and Vietnam, it gave assurance Friday that it was concerned about helping them.

The body voted "in the light of the needs of young men who find themselves in good conscience unable to participate in the war or in selective service, to direct its General Program Council, in consultation with the Chaplain's Council, to maintain and deepen denominational fellowship with these young men and their families."

A highlight of the week was a public presentation Friday night built around the debut of the General Program Council's new brochure, "Mission on the Move." A multi-slide show on a giant screen served as a backdrop for missionaries, pastors and laity as they spoke from the rich experience of their Christian mission. Delegates became participants as they shared commitments with those around them and joined in intercessory prayer for others engaged in missions.

Synod Sidelights

Dimnent Memorial Chapel has an excellent public address setup for General Synod sessions. There are two microphones in each of the central and side aisles, and four on the platform. No delegates need go far to a mike.

There are people of all ages attending this session, the 164th annual meeting, but there is a tendency for elder delegates to be older and minister delegates to be younger.

One person said the average age of elders is 55 and ministers 35.

Mostly, delegates are neat and well trimmed, some with neat sideburns, and a very few beards.

With temperatures in the 80's, informality is the keynote and few delegates have been wearing coats.

To the novice, synod business is carried on in a sea of words. It has always been thus, since ministers are speakers by profession, and often too articulate for their own good. An amendment to add or delete a phrase from a resolution can bring on

a 5-minute debate before it is resolved.

On the other hand, many pieces of important business following constitutional procedures often end up sounding just like routine resolutions. A dedicated person who has "bled" over the report can be forgiven for wanting to make it just a bit more meaningful on the floor of synod.

An overture on the Role of Women in the Reformed Church has been referred to the Committee for Revision of the Constitution. Mrs. Christian Walvoord, an observer for the National Department of Women's Work, spoke about the inconsistencies in the Book of Church Order that permit women to serve as teachers of scripture in the church, yet will not ordain them to supervise the teaching.

Women may be ordained overseas, yet may not serve in their home church in this country.

Mrs. Walvoord, formerly of Holland, urged Synod not to sweep these inconsistencies under the rug.

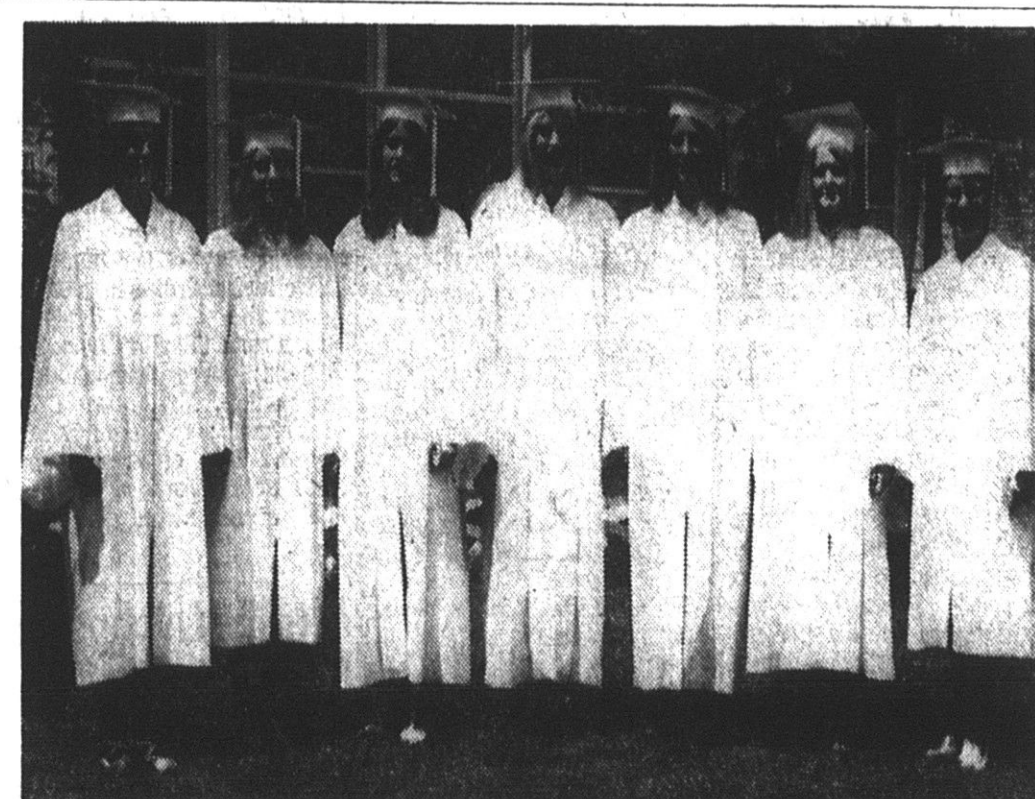

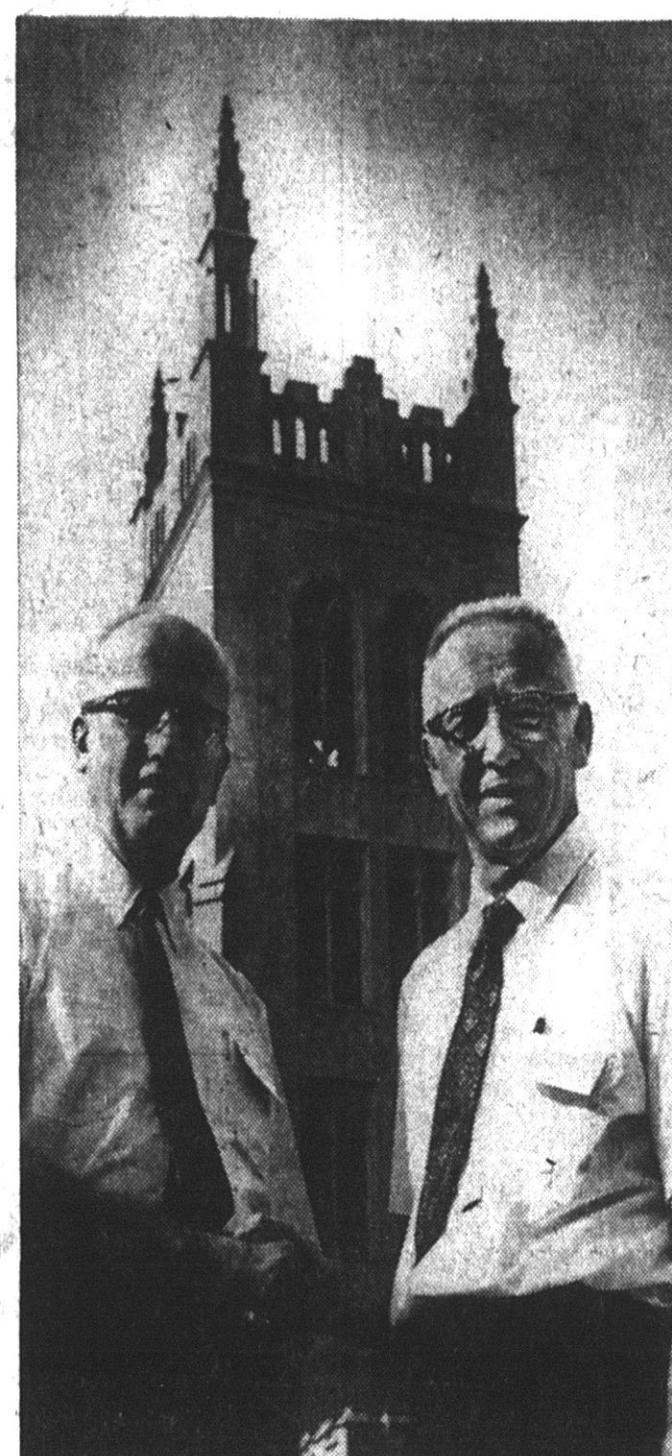

Legality Issue Occupies Synod

General Synod resumed business sessions today after struggling Thursday afternoon with one of the thorniest issues—the legality of a United (joint) Synod established in May by the Particular Synod of New Jersey and the United Presbyterian Synod of New Jersey.

A complaint brought by four members of the Particular Synod had challenged the right of the Particular Synod to take action. This had been referred to the judicial committee for report to General Synod, the ruling body of the Reformed Church in America.

The judicial committee concluded that the plan was constitutional and recommended to General Synod that the complaint be dismissed.

By a vote of 137-124, Synod rejected the recommendation but defeated a subsequent move to call the entire New Jersey Synod action null and void.

It finally passed a more conciliatory motion calling for the New Jersey Synod to enter into conversation with its churches and classes, and to further refine its plan for a United Synod and report it to General Synod of 1971 for approval.

Today's main subject was the report of the General Programs Council appointed a year ago to study the Reformed Church's role in the changing times of the 1970's, resulting in changes in traditional structures, con-

With little or no debate, Synod approved eight recommendations dealing mainly with a separate report on "Goals for Mission" on the role and resources of the Reformed Church. Recommendations branched into objectives in achieving goals, strengthening the link between the council and local congregations,

improving and unifying the content and channels of communication, advancing a new approach for the reviewing process, and the like.

The Rev. Calvin S. Malefyt served as chairman of the committee. Among the 35-member committee were Ties Pruis, Vernon Hoffs and Melvin B. Lubbers.

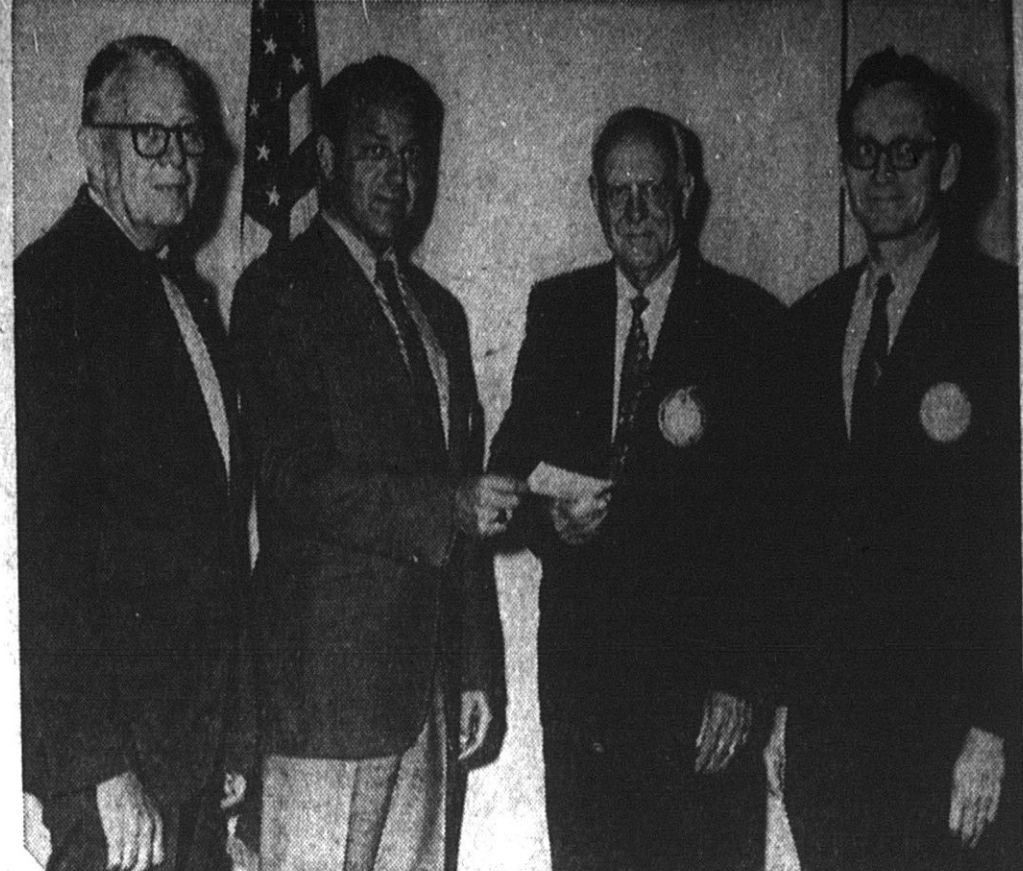

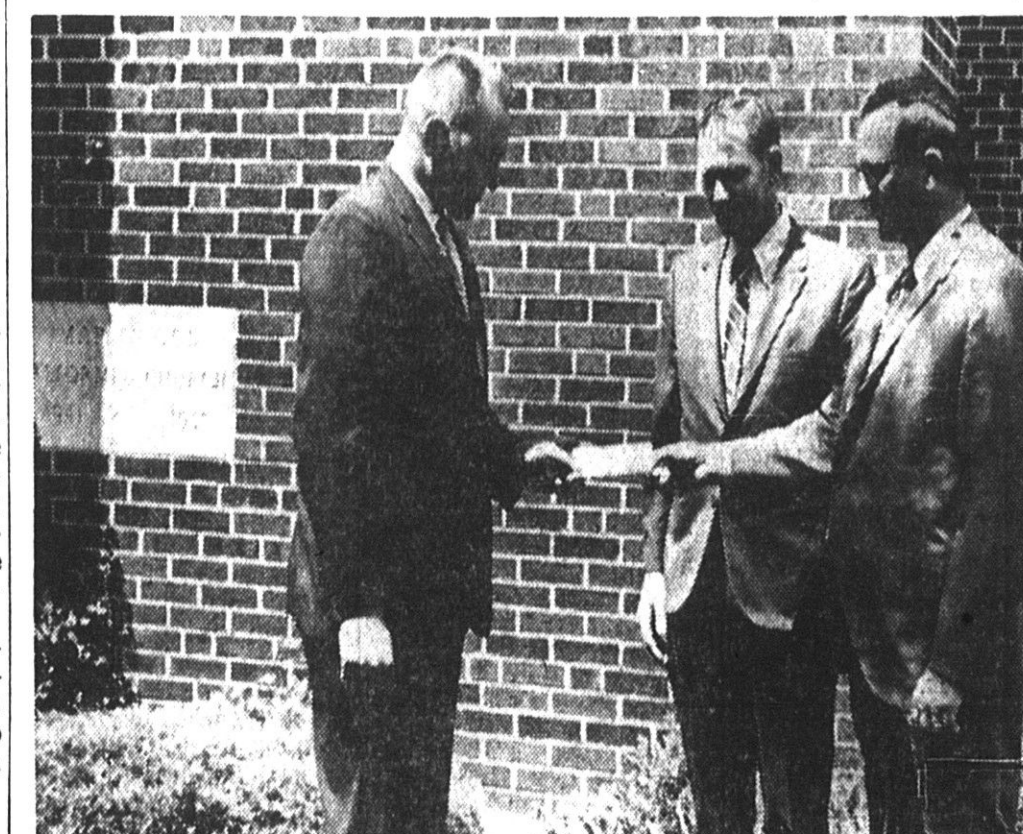

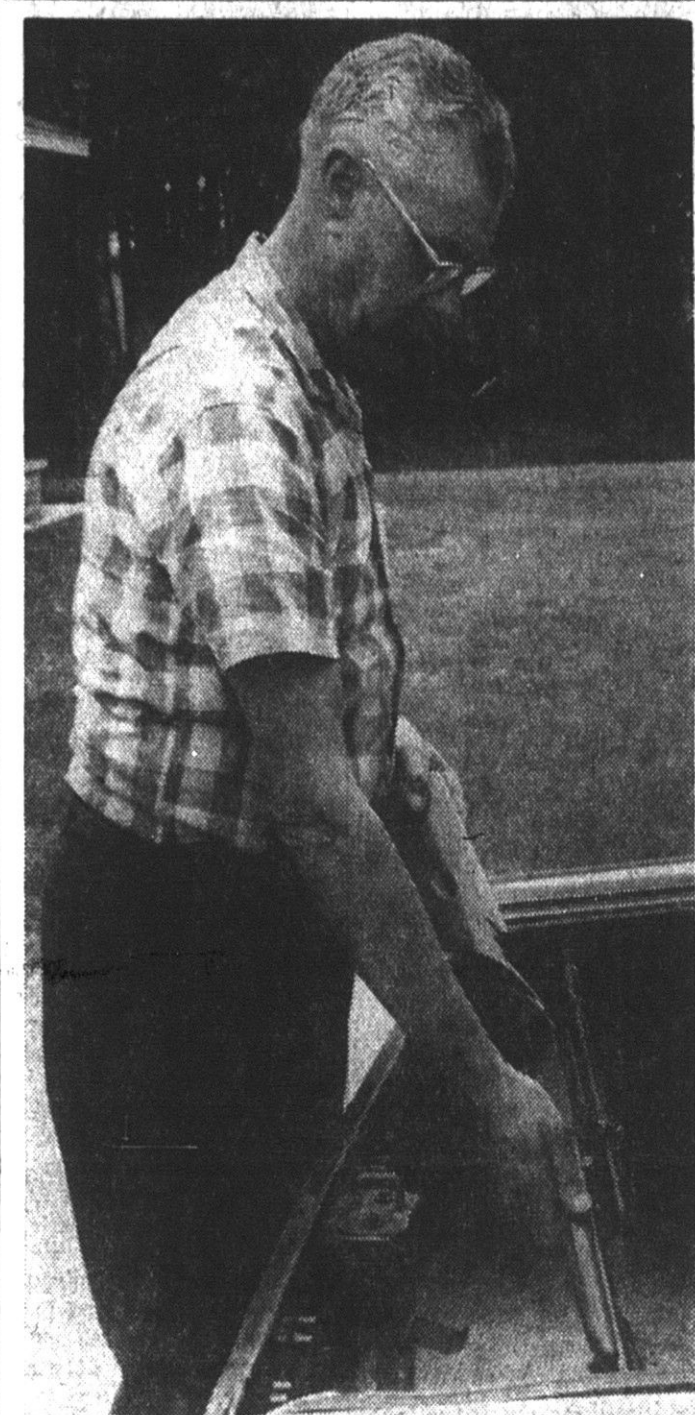

One of the best known area conservation officers in the state, Harold Bowditch of Grand Haven, recently announced his retirement after 33 illustrious years.

Bowditch's retirement goes into effect on July 4 and during the month of July he and his wife Flora expect to take a four-month vacation to Alaska where he expected to do a lot of hunting and fishing. "There is no better place for outdoors sports activity than Alaska," Bowditch said.

After attending Western Michigan University one year, Bowditch decided to switch from his mathematics major and took a job with Fisheries Research which office was located in Ann Arbor.

Bowditch did research on Bear Lake and Houghton Lake during his first three years of his career with the conservation department.

He has been a Grand Haven resident for 24 years. They have one child, Duane, 36, who is expected to go out to Alaska sometime in the upcoming months for a brief vacation with his mother and father.

Bowditch, now 62, will rent out his house for a year and doesn't expect to be living in his home at 15016 Pine Creek until July of 1971. He expects to live in a mobile home this winter in Florida.

Now involved as the area law enforcement officer for Ottawa County, Bowditch said, most violators in small game are from the age of 18 to 30. While deer violators could be in any age group but usually nothing over 45. "Deer violators give us the most trouble, however, of all violators."

We asked Bowditch where the best hunting is located at in Ottawa County and he said, "Robison, Olive and Crocker Townships are above all the rest."

"Fishing is now good in the Grand River for blue gills, bass and pike while brown trout have been hitting in the Big Pigeon,"

Bowditch stated.

We asked Bowditch about his thought on doe season and if he agreed with it and he said, "Doe season is necessary." "Without it we would be in big trouble because of two proven factors, property damage and traffic damage. Some people don't realize how much damage is done throughout the year by deer herds."

Bowditch also mentioned that deer do not starve in Ottawa County and that the reproduction rate is real high with the food situation excellent.

Some 800 to 1,200 deer were killed in Ottawa County last winter and Bowditch expects deer season to be as good or better this year.

Although the deer season is reported good in the southern part of Michigan, Bowditch said, "the deer season in the Upper Peninsula may never be the same. They may be in deep trouble if they don't straighten out their problems."

The forecast for pheasant and rabbit hunting in Ottawa County is reported good by Bowditch. "The Borculo area is said to be the best in the state for

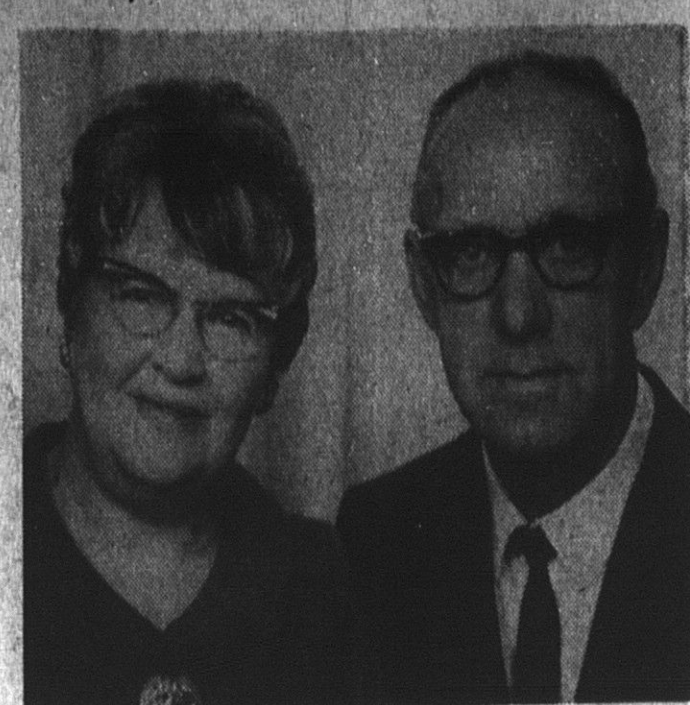
