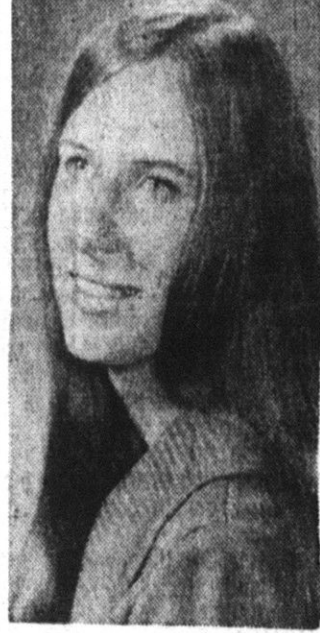

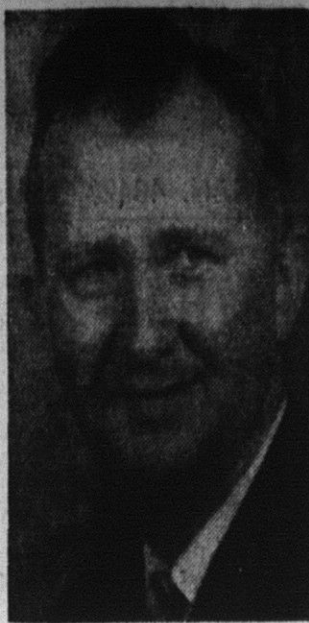

Synod Names D. De Young To Office

LOUDONVILLE, N. Y. — Rev. Donald De Young, pastor of the Elmendorf Reformed Church of New York City, was elected vice president of the Reformed Church in America's General Synod, here Thursday.

The election was held as part of the synod's week-long meeting on the campus of Siena College.

Rev. De Young, who is from Grand Rapids, originally, is a 1952 Hope College graduate and a member of the Western Theological Seminary Class of 1955. He has devoted his entire ministry to the Elmendorf Church in New York's Harlem.

In other action Thursday, the locations committee recommended that the two seminary locations in Holland and New Brunswick and the national headquarters at 475 Riverside Dr., New York City, be retained for the present time for expanded ministries and relationships.

The committee on theological education also recommended that education continue at both sites while engaging in wider consultation to ascertain a way in which theological education can be related to the new centers concept.

The general program council was instructed to develop and interpret plans for centers during the next year, and to implement them where possible.

Dr. Dan Beebe, an English Presbyterian missionary recently expelled from Taiwan, addressed the synod, pleading a strong case for self-determination on the part of the Taiwanese.

GRAND RAPIDS — Delegates to the Christian Reformed Church's General Synod meeting this week on the campus of Calvin College heard a report by the Christian Reformed World Relief Committee, Thursday.

CRWRC is participating with the Red Cross in the Rapid City, S. D., flood area, sending two couples to assist in disaster relief. One couple has already left, and the other, Mr. and Mrs. Carl Kammeraad of Holland will be leaving this weekend.

Synod approved an aid program for Palestinian refugees on the east bank of the Jordan River, in the Amman, Jordan, area. The project will include loans for rebuilding homes, medical assistance and rehabilitation of school buildings.

Most of Thursday was taken up in committee work in preparation for final sessions of the synod.

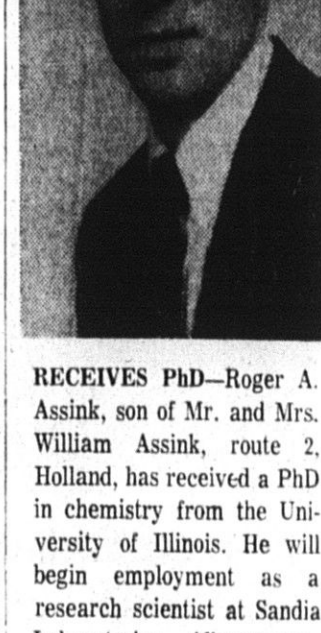

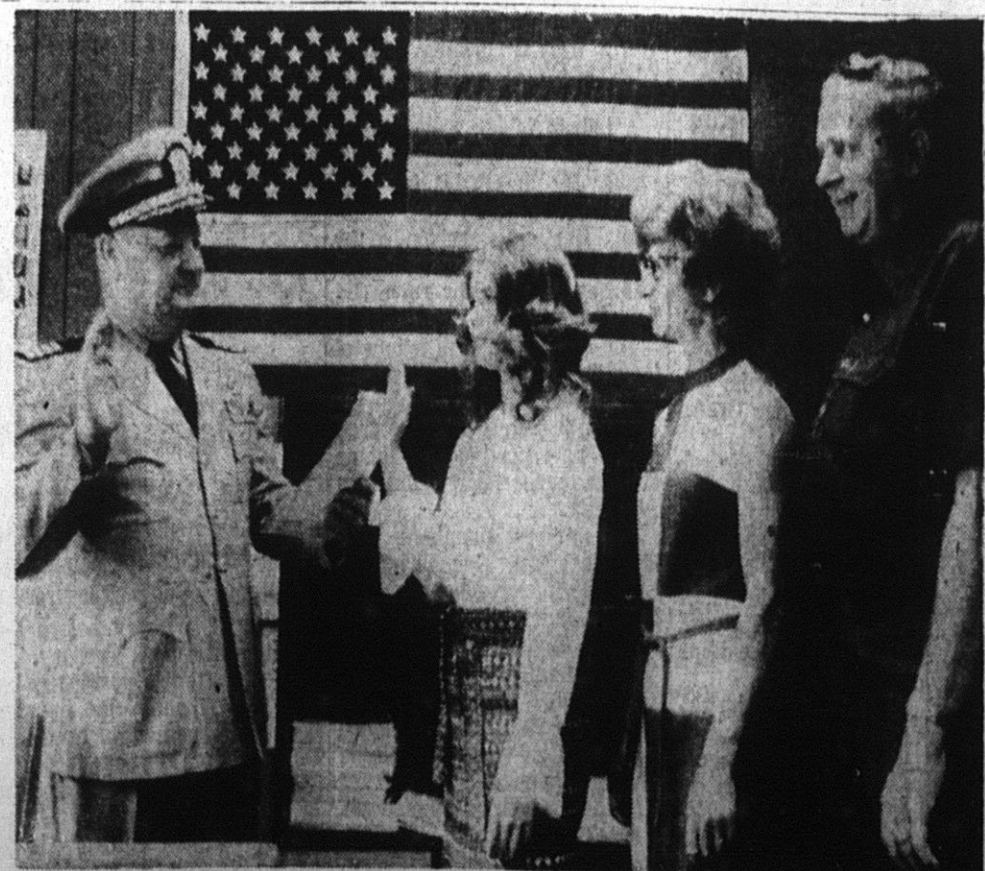
J.W. Vander Hill Dies at Age 51

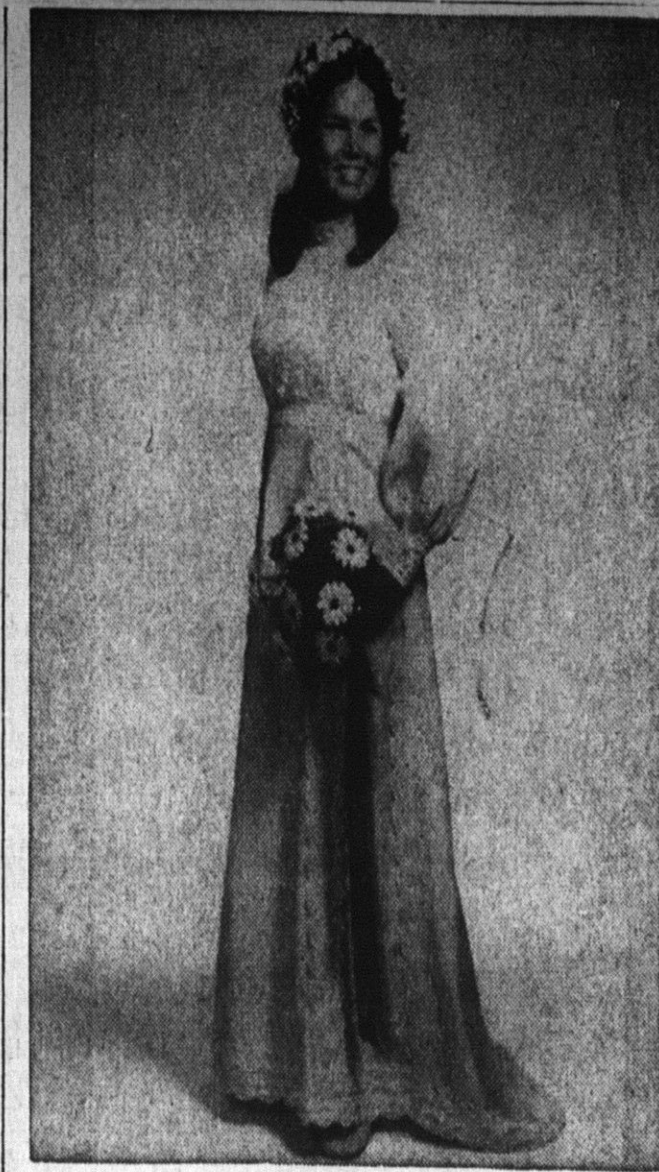

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NO-FAULT INSURANCE

The Michigan Senate has passed a bill providing for no-fault automobile insurance. The House has introduced a similar bill and will be considering it shortly. We suggest that the House take its cue from the Senate and approve this bill as rapidly as possible.

The way car insurance has been of late years has caused as much trouble as it has given protection. The courts are blocked with all sorts of cases in which the fault of the accident is being determined. The greatest advantage in these cases goes to the lawyers. Meanwhile people who need the money that would be coming to them are left with bills unpaid and finances unsettled.

One of the great advantages of no-fault insurance is that it would free our courts for getting on with other business. We hope this results. Courts are slow in turning out their work. We can't believe that this is all due to the heavy load of insurance cases or any other cases, for that matter. Courts seem to take an extremely leisurely approach to their work despite the pressure of the work-load. No-fault insurance could at least remove one of the excuses for the deliberate pace of justice in this country.

Sunday School Lesson

Sunday, June 25
Hunger for Security
Psalm 57
By C. P. Dame

The word "security" is used a lot today. People think a lot about the need of security and that is why the word is heard again and again. The writer of Psalm 57 found security and he tells about it for our benefit—faith in God gives real security.

I. It is good to ask God for mercy. "Be merciful unto me, O God, be merciful unto me"—so wrote the psalmist years ago. Anyone who asks for mercy confesses his own unworthiness.

Psalm 56 and 57 belong together and both were written by David. Psalm 57 was written "when he fled from Saul in the cave" and his life was in danger. He felt the need of divine help and he found it. His faith in God sustained him. This same faith has kept many others standing in life's storms and they said what David said, "for my soul trusteth in Thee."

David had a steady relationship with God, so he could speak of past experiences. "I will cry unto God most high, unto God that performeth all things for me." Note the faith expressed. The God who created this universe and sustains it by His power notes individuals and has concern for his or her problems, big or little. A human being is of more value than a star which can't think, smile, make a decision or change. This personal faith gives a feeling of security.

II. Violence has a long history. Those who stand for something often meet opposition. David had enemies. He calls them lions and they had sharp teeth which are like "spears and arrows." These enemies slandered David and his God. David brought his problems to the Lord. One thought encouraged him—violence usually defeats itself; it did so in the past and does so at the present time.

III. God deserves our praise. With a heart that is fixed upon God, David calls upon himself to sing and give praise. "I will sing and give praise"—words like that fit upon our lips too. We who are members of this generation have a multitude of reasons why we should give praise to God. We ought to bear in mind that to whom much is given from them much is expected. So intense was the enthusiasm of David that he said, "I will awake the dawn." He planned to awake the dawn by his praises before daylight.

Many seem to be losing the missionary spirit today. Note the words, "I will sing unto Thee among the nations." Instead of "calling missionaries we should send out more and more to needy people, and tell them about God's great mercy and truth, revealed gloriously in Jesus Christ. The words, "Be thou exalted O God, above the heavens; thy glory be above all the earth," ought to come forth from our lips constantly.

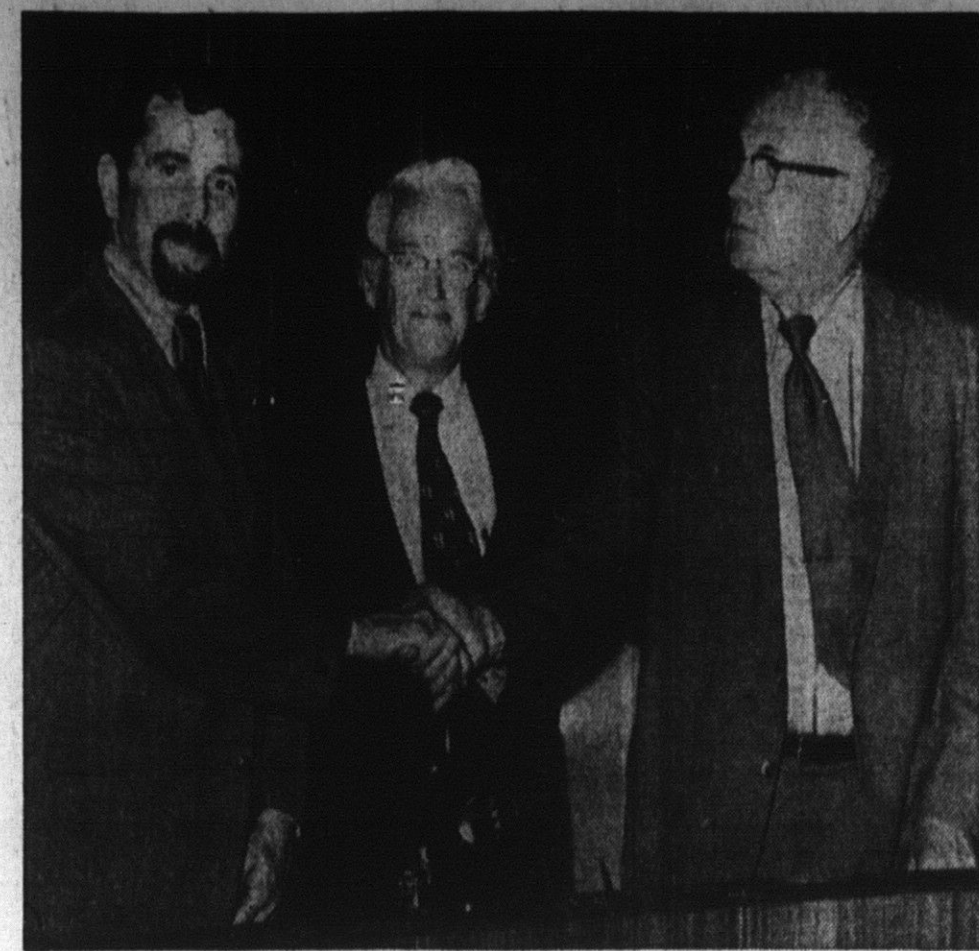

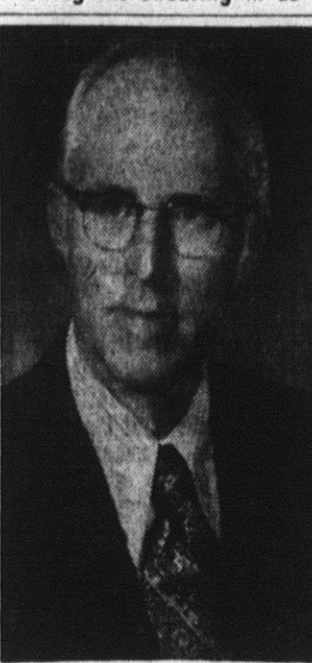

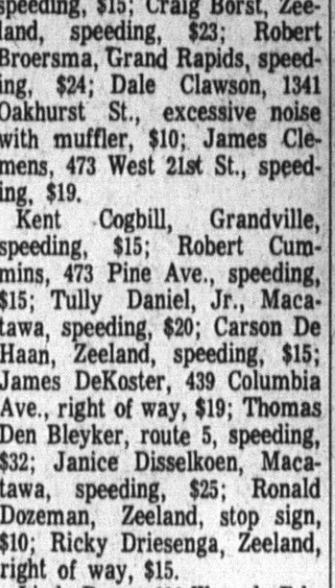

"It was just great to get this far in the tourney," said a pleased Cotts. "Sure it would have been great to win the whole show but how many teams can say they ever got this far."

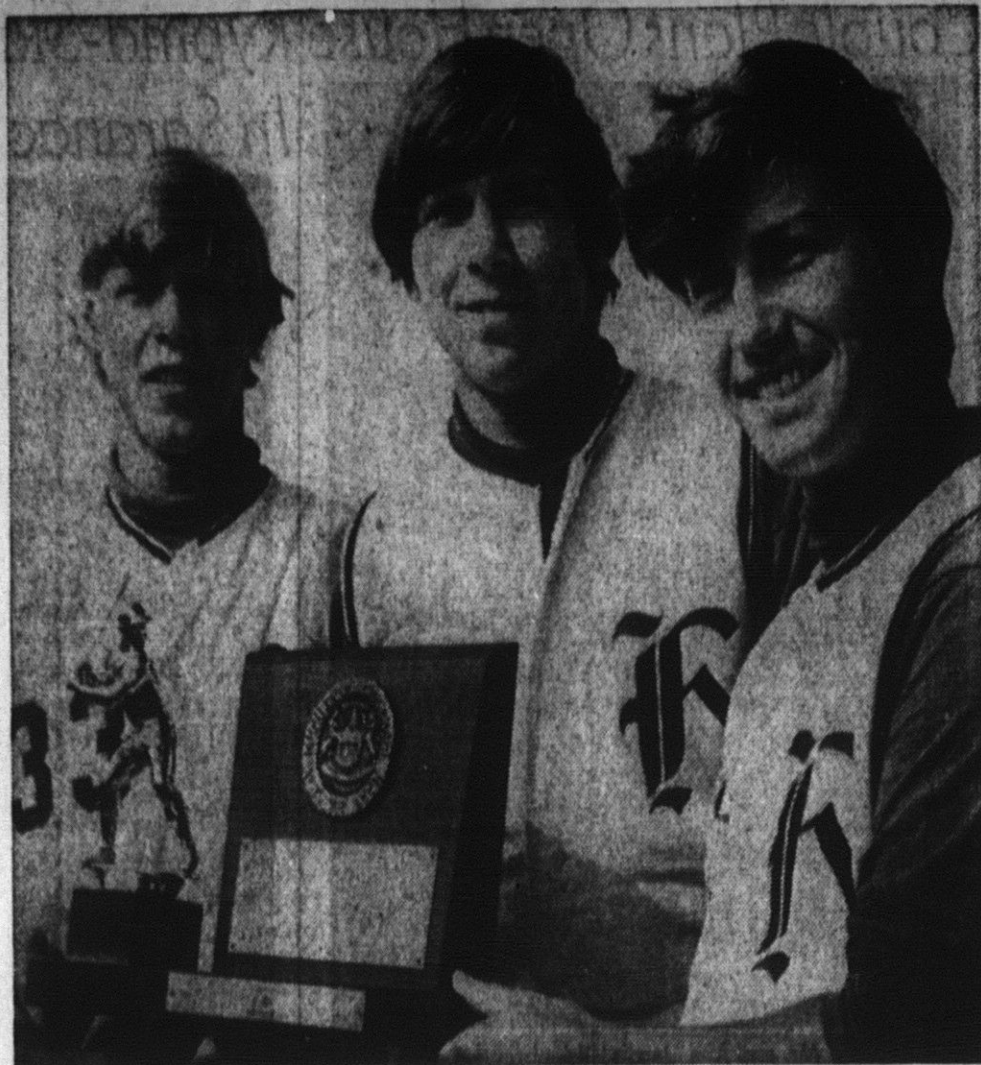
Centerline which finished runners-up in the tourney last year won the game on an error.

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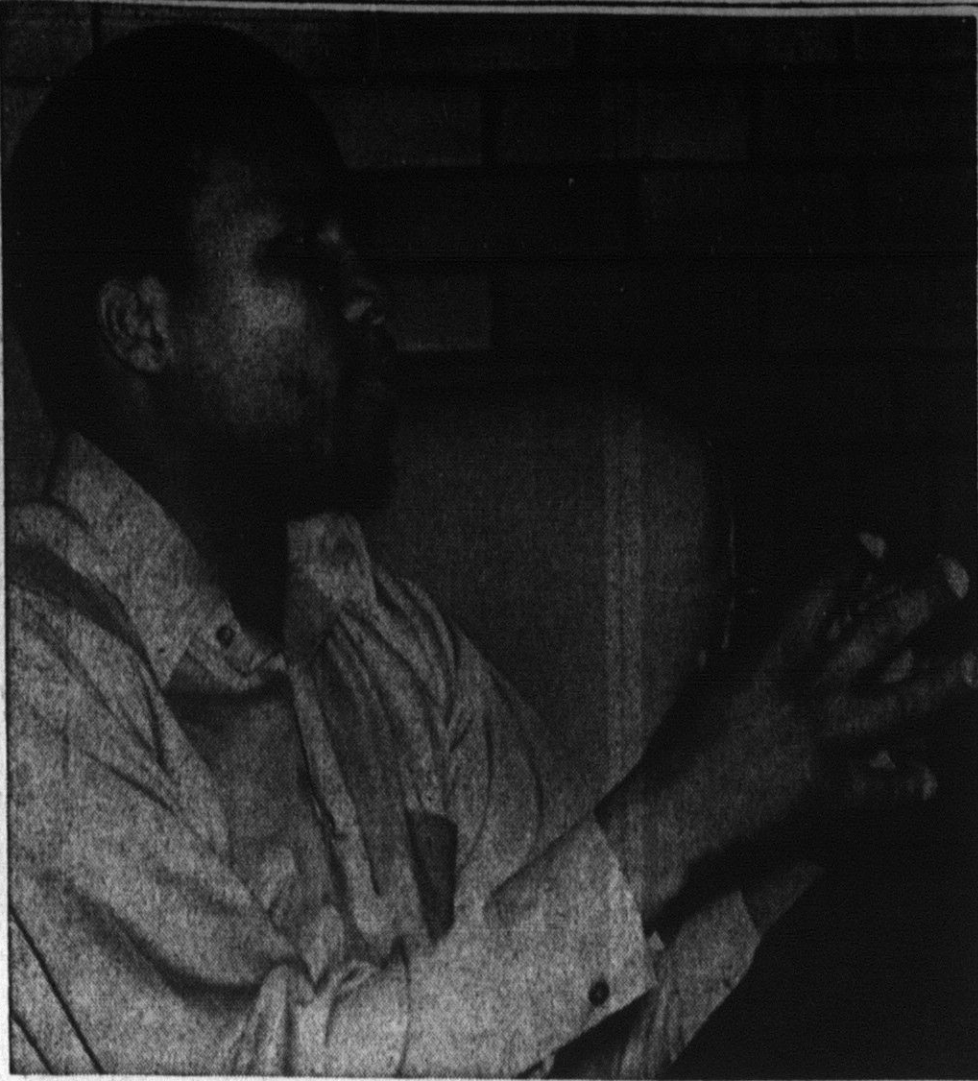

Winning its independence from Great Britain in 1966, Lesotho's million population is ruled by a figurehead king, King Motehoi Moshoeshoe II while Chief Leabu Jonathan has been prime minister since its independence.

A British euphemism creeps into Sixishe's speech as he talks softly to his listeners about his country. Deeply committed to its success and future, Sixishe speaks reverently of Lesotho's lack of racial problems that plague and torture their neighboring countries and the rest of the world as well. Lesotho is free of tribal language differences allowing them to become homogeneous. The racial ratio is one black to five whites. Boasting one of the highest literacy rates in all of Africa, the people of Lesotho want to be known to their neighbors and to the world as truly and uniquely void of racial prejudices.

However, this is far from the case in the Republic of South Africa surrounding Lesotho. Apartheid is strictly practiced and enforced with 3 million whites ruling the vast

African Official Visits Holland

Desmond T. Sixishe relaxed in a wing backed chair in the home of A. H. Loomis on Waukazoo Dr. and talked of his first visit to the United States, his

Sixishe, a native of Lesotho in the southeastern portion of the Republic of South Africa, took a brief respite from his tour to visit with Mr. and Mrs. Loomis whose daughter and

population of 16 million blacks. The numerous tribes are separated by law and black and white contacts are kept to a scant minimum but always formal and always on "strictly business" level.

After attending a seminar on Southern Africa at the United Nations, Sixishe began his tour of the country visiting broadcasting facilities and newspapers with particular interest on the public impact of the media. Equally as important is his views and impressions on the American racial posture. Judging from his exposure on both coasts, Sixishe said, "I have generally found blacks uniting in their common approach to achieving social status

and whites to be aware of the blacks' needs and aspirations." Aiming toward a career in politics, Sixishe wants to have his country become economically strong. Presently, the chief exports are wool and mohair and it is the government's aim to attract American investors and businesses. He believes it is only through such strength that his country can survive and conquer the racial pressure exercised by its neighbors.

Talking with disarming charm, Sixishe scolded Americans for "eating too much" and labeled the country the "United Steaks." He has found Americans willing to talk openly of the positive and negative

aspects of their country. He travels next to Georgia and a tour of the South before returning to New York and the trip back to Lesotho.

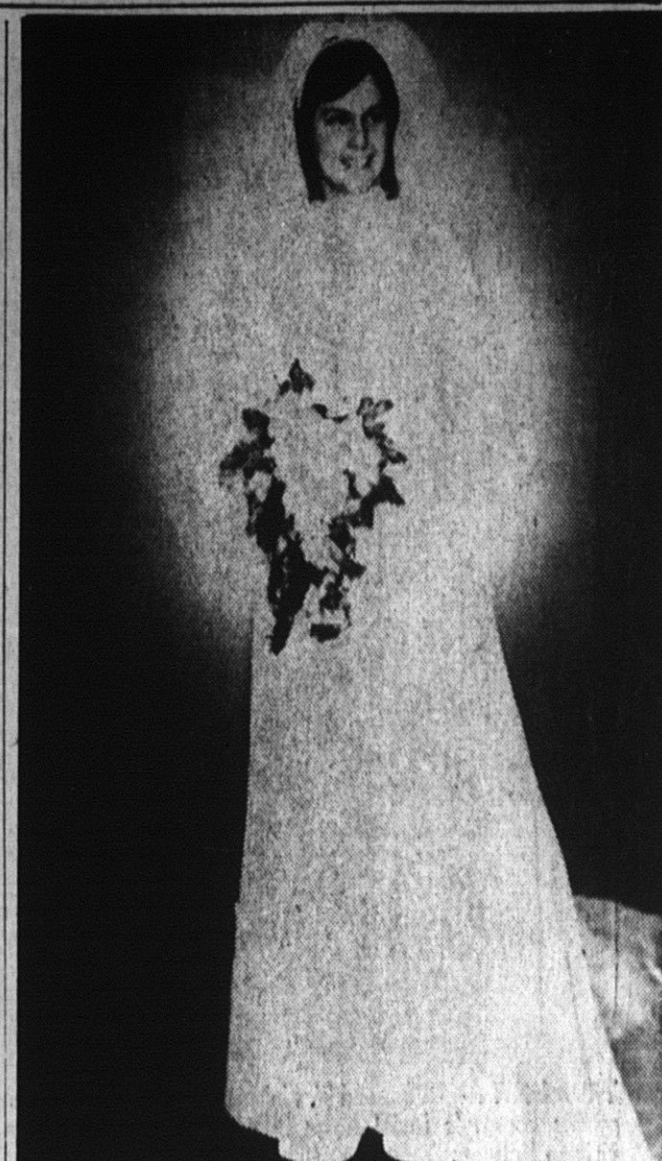

Holland Resident With Hope Group

Velma R. Van Ark, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. William J. Van Ark, 598 Graafschap Road, Holland, and a junior at Hope College, is enrolled in the 17th annual Hope College Vienna summer program.

Velma was among 30 college students who left for Europe Monday.

The participants were the guests at a pre-departure reception and briefing arranged in their honor at the Austrian Cultural Institute in New York.

As in previous years the formal academic session in Vienna will be preceded by a carefully planned study tour. This year, for the first time, the Hope group flew directly from New York to Helsinki. Following a three day stay in Finland students will travel by train to Leningrad, Moscow and Kiev, spending the major portion of the three week tour in the Soviet Union. The final stop on the tour will include a two day visit to Budapest, Hungary. From there students will travel by hydrofoil up the Danube to Vienna, where they will settle down for six weeks of resident study.

Dr. Paul Fried, director of International Education at Hope College, who has planned and directed the program of the Hope College Vienna Summer School for all except two years since it began in 1956 indicated that even before President Nixon's visit to Russia there had been great student interest in shifting the emphasis of the study tour from Western Europe to Eastern Europe and particularly to the Soviet Union. "While travel in Russia is still considerably more difficult and less comfortable than in West European countries living under conditions very different from their previous experience will in itself be of great value to American students participating in the program, said Dr. Fried.

Included among the plans for the two week long stay in the Soviet Union are visits to most of the major cultural and political sites in and around Leningrad, Moscow and Kiev as well as meetings with students, attendance at ballet or opera performances and side trips to the summer palace of Peter the Great on the Neva and the Russian Orthodox monastery at Zagorsk.

The Hope group is scheduled to arrive in Vienna, Austria on July 1. The academic program this year will reflect the greater emphasis on the study of Eastern Europe. Courses in "The History of Russia and

Eastern Europe since the Death of Stalin" and "Soviet and Russian Literature" have been included in the curriculum for the first time. These new courses will be offered in addition to the well established and popular art and music programs which, as always, will focus on the Viennese tradition in both areas. Students will also be enrolled in German conversation classes geared to their level of comprehension an emphasizing the practical day to day use of the language.

Members of the Hope group will be housed with Austrian families and will thus have opportunity of living in a cultural environment significantly different from their own. From their base in Vienna students will take a number of field trips and weekend excursions. As in previous years Dr. Fried has reserved a substantial number of tickets for the world famous Salzburg Festival and there will be two optional weekend visits to the city which President Nixon selected for his first stop on his recent trip to Russia.

Following the conclusion of the academic program in Vienna on August 11 students will have a period of two weeks of free time for independent travel to various parts of Europe. The Hope group will reassemble in Amsterdam for the return flight to New York on August 25.

Van Wylen Approved In Synod Action

LOUDONVILLE, N.Y. — Dr. Gordon Van Wylen was approved as president of Hope College Friday by the General Synod of the Reformed Church in America meeting at Siena College in this Albany suburb.

Approval of the president of the college was a formality under the bylaws of the college. His acceptance as president was in a report from the committee on higher education.

In an address to the synod, Van Wylen said 106 years of Christian commitment is "more important to a college than its brick and mortar . . . that Hope College as a Christian college offers the opportunity of integration of faith and knowledge . . . that Hope has an opportunity to pave the way in Christian higher education in America."

Action was taken on two items concerning the war in Vietnam. Synod voted to express a deep concern for misuse of millions of dollars for Vietnam fighting while neglecting other massive needs.

John Hains of Zeeland, Mich., pastor of the Faith Reformed Church, calling for a message to President Nixon assuring him of "our recognition of the awesome and agonizing responsibility" in making decisions in terminating the part of the United States in the Vietnam war.

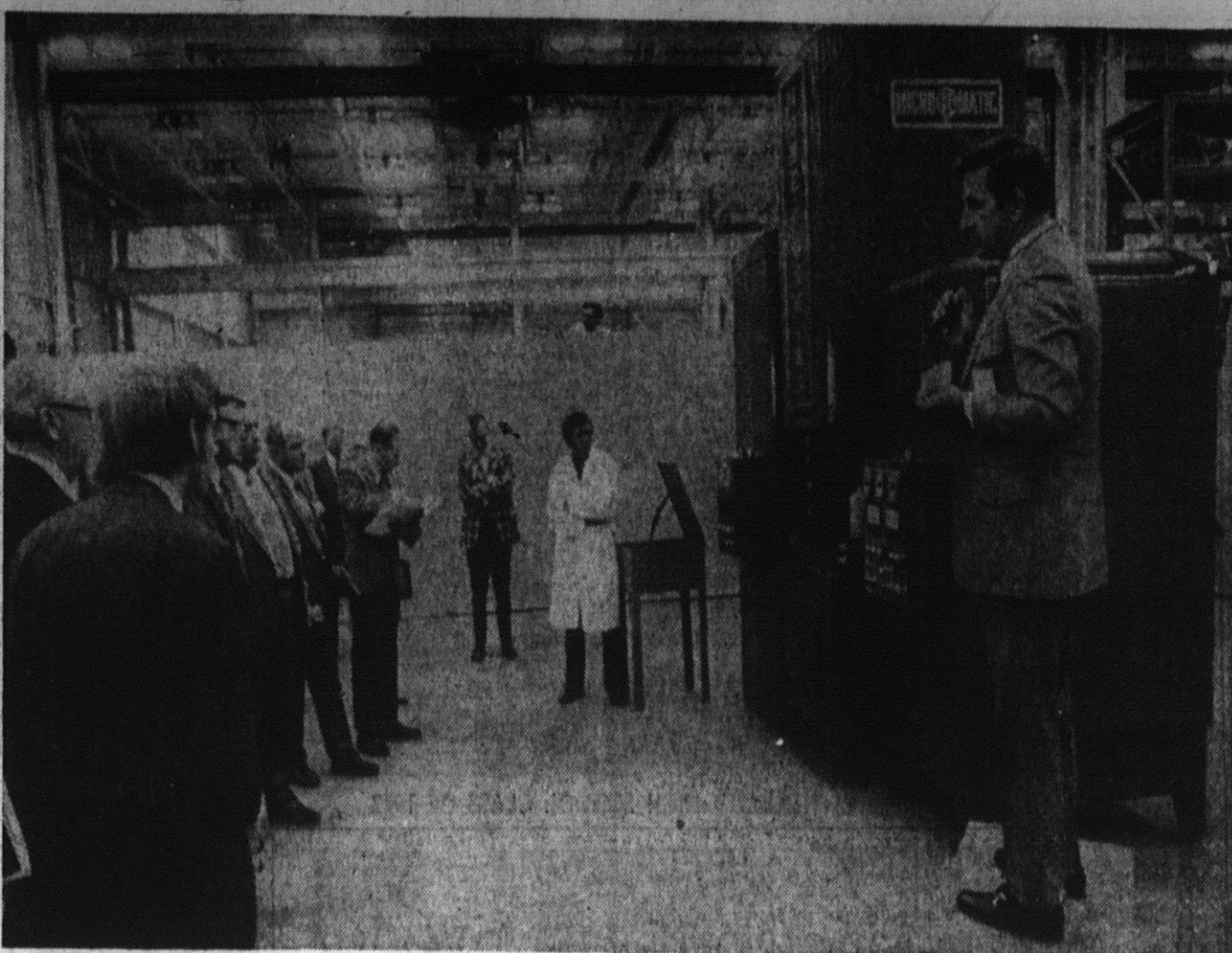

The residential park will be landscaped with lawns and plantings and there will be sidewalks, paved streets, street lighting, a swimming pool and a community center in addition to five play lots.

The \$2,230,000 Meadow Lanes

complex was built with a government loan and rents have been established by the government to assure that the costs of the project will be paid off within a definite period of time. Some allowance is made in the form of subsidies and rent support for certain families and individuals.

A sliding scale of rents has been established that provides special consideration for the individual or family that has a modest income.

The townhouses, with rough cedar exterior siding, come complete with range, refrigerator, garbage disposal and oak flooring. A model apartment is open for inspection six days a week.

The complex is under the direction of HAZAH (Holland and Zeeland Area Non-Profit Housing Corporation), a group of citizens who have volunteered their time and work.

Synod Acts On Controversial Church Issues

GRAND RAPIDS — The Timothy Christian School controversy was acted upon Monday by the General Synod of the Christian Reformed Church, meeting this week on the campus of Calvin College.

The Synodical Committee on Race Relations made a three-point statement as follows: "The committee declares its sorrow that a situation developed in which the unity of the church was strained and the church's Christian witness against racism was impaired. It regrets the deplorable situation and the division within the church which occasioned a suit in a civil court. It is thankful that the parties involved agreed to settle internally the litigation and that God has given another opportunity to heal and bind wounds to work with dedication at a common task."

The synod declared that a synodical committee or deacons shall not initiate or support a law suit against brothers of the common faith without the expressed prior approval of the synod.

Synod refused to retire the Committee on Race Relations. Synod also refused to consider

a change in church control of Calvin College.

The evening session was taken up with the question of abortion with the synod affirming the unique value of all human life and the special relationship of man to God.

Approved was a statement on abortion which "condemns the wanton or arbitrary destruction of any human being at any stage of development from the point of conception to the point of death."

WASHINGTON — Secretary of Agriculture Earl Butz has given assurances that Western Michigan blueberry growers whose crops were severely damaged by cold weather will receive emergency loans.

U.S. Sen. Robert P. Griffin, R-Mich., said Monday that Butz will act promptly on loan requests from blueberry farmers whose crops were damaged by a disastrous freeze June 11.

"An estimated 75 to 90 per cent of the blueberry crop was

lost as a result," Griffin said. "Blueberry growers and their families face financial ruin unless the federal government provides emergency loans."

The freeze badly damaged the blueberry crop in at least 10 counties, including Oceana, Newaygo, Muskegon, Kent, Montcalm, Ottawa, Allegan, Van Buren, Cass and Berrien.

Griffin said blueberry growers can file emergency loan applications by contacting the nearest Farmers Home Administration agent.
