Insurance at federally subsidized rates may be purchased from local property and casualty agents and brokers for all existing and new structures built prior to the identification of areas of special flood hazards in amounts up to \$17,500 for single family houses and up to \$30,000 for all other residential and nonresidential structures.

16 Diabetics Are Detected In Screening

Sixteen new cases of diabetes were detected in diabetes detection tests carried on at Holland City Hospital Nov. 13 through 17, 1972, sponsored by the Michigan Diabetes Detection Program of Detroit.

A total of 1,026 tests were taken resulting in 83 positive screenings. Of the 83, 16 were new cases, nine were known cases, nine were potential cases, four were undetermined and 45 were not diabetes.

A similar program Nov. 15 - 19, 1971, had 740 persons report for tests, with 66 positive screenings. Of the 66, 16 were new cases of diabetes, 11 were known cases, two were potential cases, four undetermined, 32 not diabetes, and one case hypo.

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Referendum on Aug. 7 Primary

Local Citizens Group Favoring One-Way Streets

A campaign to retain Holland's present one-way street system opened today with the official formation of a grass roots organization, Citizens for Progress, headed by John Tyse, local realtor.

Purpose of the group is to defeat a referendum on the Aug. 7 ballot recalling the one-way street system through the central business district.

Tyse heads a committee of some 80 persons who have indicated interest in retaining the present program. With him at a press conference this morning in Hotel Warm Friend were Norma Diekema, president of the Downtown Merchants Association; Floyd Folkert, president of the Chamber of Commerce; Charles Cooper, member of the Board of Public Works and local trucking executive; Morrie Tubergan and Cal Hulst, local merchants. Staff representatives of the city and the Chamber of Commerce also were present.

The campaign will focus on three main points: decreased accident rate despite increased traffic amount; loss of local control over truck traffic through

the central business district, and the loss of over \$700,000 of funds already spent and potential sums allocated for improvements.

Tyse spoke of efforts to get-out-the-vote for the Aug. 7 election in which the one-way street issue will be the sole proposition on the ballot outside the fifth ward which will have a contest to nominate two candidates for Councilman for the November election. There are three candidates.

Tyse spoke of possible cooperation in getting out the vote on the part of the Women's League of Voters, the Junior Welfare League, the Jaycees and other service organizations.

Should one-way streets be defeated, it was pointed out that the state Highway Department expects to remove all parking from Eighth St., setting a flow of traffic on five or six lanes with no midblock pedestrian crossings.

Tyse quoted police as estimating an 8 per cent increase in city traffic since the one-way system was put into effect in October, 1971, and a 30 per cent decrease in accidents in the central business district.

It was also pointed out that one-way traffic was proposed for Holland 12 years ago, and implementation almost two years ago has resulted in improving safety.

The intersection at Eighth St. and Pine Ave. was acknowledged as a trouble spot for west-bound traffic, and this intersection as well as other trouble spots are under study both by the city and by state engineers.

The committee also acknowledged that no program is perfect and that change always brings inconvenience to some while benefiting others. In view of safety factors, increased traffic and long-range plans, the committee fears chaotic results if the system is overturned.

It was emphasized that a no vote would not guarantee the "good old days," and that a changeover would be far greater than replacing signs and signal lights and removing barrels.

The Aug. 7 proposition is worded so that a yes vote means favoring one-way streets and a no vote opposes one-way streets.

CATV Plan For Holland Is Studied

City Council was informed Wednesday night of a meeting in Washington June 11 with two staff attorneys of the Federal Communications Commission regarding CATV in the city of Holland. Attending from Holland were Deputy City Attorney Donald Hann, City Manager William L. Bopf and Staff Assistant Brian Chase.

The report commented on the meeting, particularly with regard for thoroughness in the local contract and advised that within a few weeks local residents and interested groups will be invited to examine the proposed contract, ask questions and air concerns and comments. The Washington conference put emphasis on proper local control, but not as a censorship board.

Council acknowledged with thanks the gift of Mrs. Cornelius (Buena) Blom of a number of pictures and plaques from her late husband's personal collection of the Holland fire department dating back to the early 1920s and 30s. Fire Chief Dick Brandt is mounting the pictures in a special scrapbook.

Council okayed a speed limit of 45 mph on Blue Star Highway from the south city limits north to the interchange. A stop sign was approved at the intersection of Waverly Rd. and 48th St. with Waverly stopping for 48th.

Purchase of a Harley-Davidson police motorcycle and radio equipment was approved, the sum not to exceed \$3,600 with funds authorized from the first entitlement period of the revenue sharing budget.

A city manager's report was presented on quotations for group life insurance, weekly accident and sickness benefit insurance and accidental death and dismemberment insurance for full time employees. All 24 proposals were evaluated by a personnel committee headed by Jack Leenhouts and council approved low bid of Time Insurance Co., Fritz Kliphuis local agent, in net amount of \$2.19 per month per employee.

Council approved a car wash addition for the Standard Oil station at Eighth St. and Columbia Ave. and a storage area addition and car wash in an existing bay for another Standard Oil station at 1162 South Washington Ave., subject to more specific plans.

Council tabled a request from Murphy Oil for constructing a new station on the southwest corner of 33rd St. and Washington in view of the fact that two stations have closed within a block. A survey on closed stations in Holland was suggested.

Clarence Dillman of Wisconsin, who handles real estate for Murphy Oil Co. which operates Spur stations, asked Council to bear in mind that many stations that are closing are inadequate in size or area. He said he is currently engaged in disposing of real estate instead of buying, but the Washington Ave. site was purchased about two years ago and is in a desirable location. He said the trend is away from busy intersections causing traffic problems and said enterprising real estate operators are promoting the use of vacant stations as drive-in beauty shops, barbershops and craft houses.

Another city manager report advised that two months ago the city proposed to the Ottawa County Board of Commissioners that the county allocate \$100,000 for reconstruction and widening the River Ave. bridge and that the Road Commission and the city of Holland each spend up to \$50,000 for approach improvements.

It was indicated the June 11 board meeting, the matter was referred to the county development committee for further study. Mayor Lamb later said now is the time to voice comment to the commission and to commissioners on bridge needs for this part of the county which carries the heaviest traffic.

Council approved transfer of funds totaling \$10,300 for the Library Board within its 1972-73 budget.

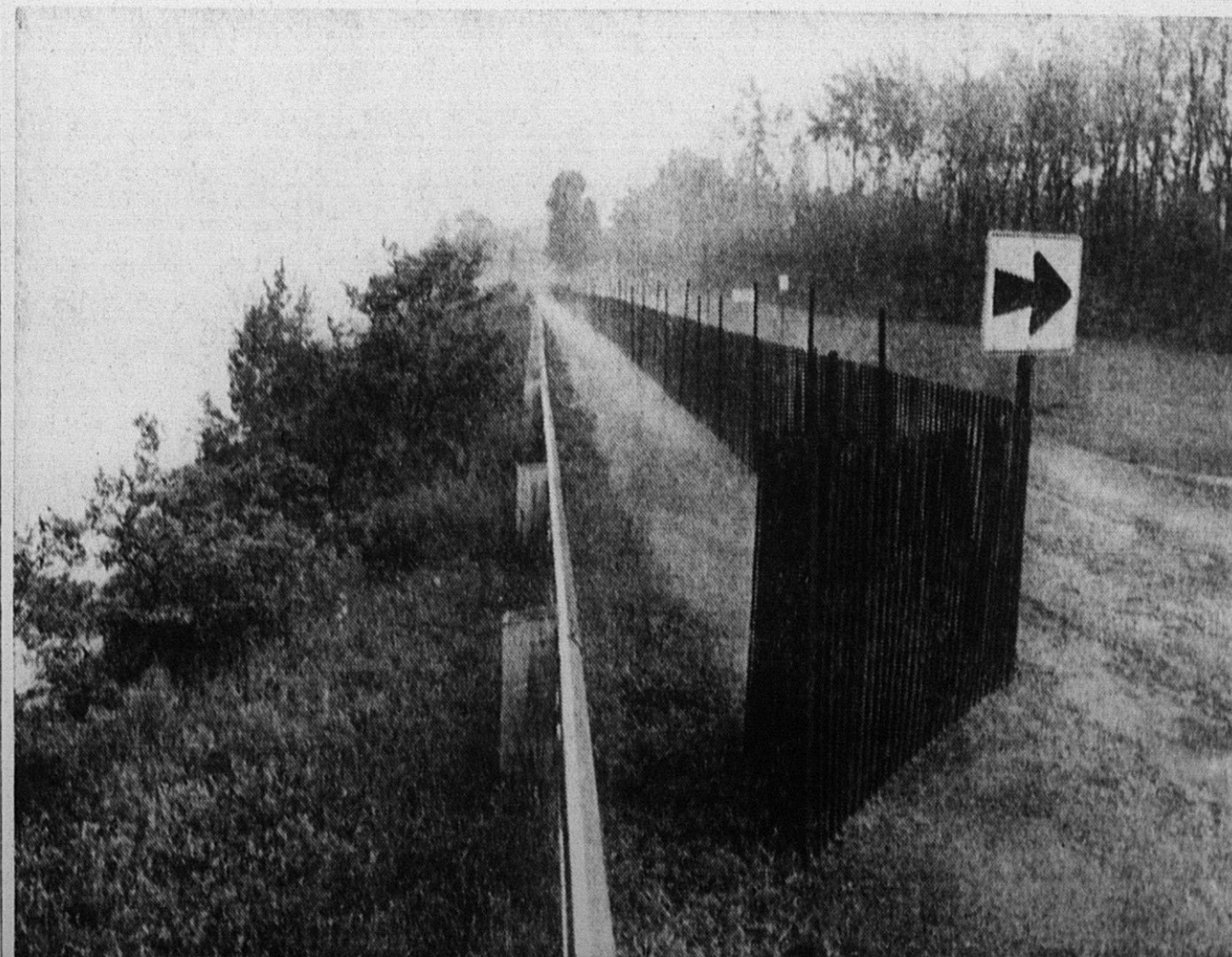

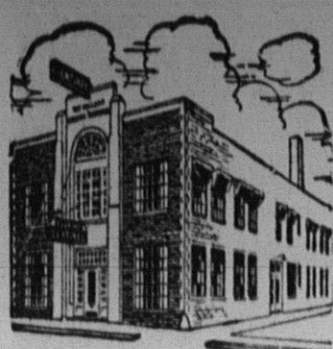

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AMERICANS TAKE TO THE WILDS

With summer well under way, there will be many people traveling around the country and the world. The National Geographic release has this to say in part:

"Thanks to vacationers, Mother Nature may be getting more civilization than she can stand — or withstand. So many travelers are going back to nature that many wilderness lovers worry that man is also taking his ways and wrongs with him.

"America still has an abundance of rugged canyons, cathedral-like forests, wide open spaces, sparkling clear lakes, and sprawling mountains.

"But — warns the National Geographic Society — it's not an unlimited abundance, and the hand of man, or his foot, may be forever. Painful proof:

"A veteran backpacker in the Adirondacks admits he now hikes only lowlands because the high country trails are worn down to huge gullies by the end of summer.

"This may be an ironic twist to the hiker's old rule: 'Take nothing but photographs, leave nothing but footprints.' However, at the same time, another litter collection is needed for the slopes of Mount McKinley, at 20,320 feet North America's tallest peak.

"Several years ago, hikers retrieved 380 pounds of discarded trash and equipment and helicoptered it out of the wilderness.

"The big voice of the tiny transistor radio disturbs many campers trying to get away from it all. Enough campers do get there to outlaw shouting — likely to disturb others within earshot.

"Nevertheless, more Americans than ever, especially families with children, are searching for a different vacation this year and are planning wilderness adventures.

"Dude ranches, some wrangling guests for 100 years, let city folks turn cowboys as much as they hanker to. Farm vacations offer a retreat far from pavements and pollution, near growing animals and crops, but free of the hired hand's daily chores.

"Families may set off on float boat expeditions, down the meandering and sometimes white-water rivers of the West, exploring a canyon world known only to a few through the ages. Others dip paddles in rivers, lakes, and swamps where only the call of the loon and the splash of a jumping fish break the stillness.

"Horse trail trips, carrying campers or at least their supplies, trace mountain ridges and valleys. Backpackers — estimated at 6½ million from sea to sea — amble along shorelines or rope together along mountain slopes. At least one covered wagon train treks through the southwest.

"Outfitters equip groups with horses, boats, sleeping bags, and grub; guides provide ecological insights and knowledge of fishing holes; and doctor experts in treating blisters and sprains, accompany many trips. Costs range to several hundred dollars for a week or two.

"To save the wilderness for tomorrow's enjoyment, backpackers' advice surprises some one-time Boy Scouts: gasoline stoves are in, rubbing sticks together or building a chopped-log fire is out, and so is a drainage trench around a tent — 'Tents have rubber floors now, and anyway, the wilderness couldn't stand everybody's digging.'"

We think that everyone should remember to take care of their refuse when they are enjoying the great out-of-doors. If we all cut down on our litter this will be a great help for everyone.

Sunday School Lesson

Sunday, June 24
Work, Rest, Worship
Exodus 20:8-11; Mark 2:23-28; Luke 4:16 - 19

Every person who has a place in his life for the three things mentioned in the lesson title is bound to live a full life. Everyone needs time for the three things that are important for all.

I. God established the weekly rest day — read Exodus 20:8-11 and Deuteronomy 5:12-15. The fourth commandment begins with the word "remember" which is significant as millions do not do this. Keep the day holy! This is God's order. It is meant to be different and distinct from the other days of the week. Exodus speaks of God creating the world in six days and resting the seventh; Deuteronomy calls attention to Israel's deliverance from Egypt. Everyone must rest on this day and thus acknowledge the sovereignty of God by following His example.

The prophets, Isaiah, Jeremiah, Ezekiel and Amos, called for the observance of the day. We now observe the first day of the week. Christians do this to remember the resurrection of Jesus and the coming of the Holy Spirit upon the believers at Pentecost and the completion of the work of redemption.

Note the two items in the commandment, "Six days shalt thou work" — today these words are disobeyed and thus the welfare list is longer than it ought to be. More work is done on the weekly rest day due in part to the lust for pleasure and profit. More and more stores are opening on Sunday and sadly enough many people, including church members, patronize them.

II. Jesus set a fine example. The religious leaders of that day were legalistic and added a lot of man-made rules which Jesus disregarded. One day Jesus and the disciples were walking through the cornfield, the disciples, being hungry, plucked some corn and ate it, but the Pharisees criticized them for doing that on the Sabbath. Jesus knew the Old Testament and referred them to the story of David eating bread meant only for the priests (1 Sam. 21:1-5). The law of hunger is supreme, Jesus stressed essentials.

III. Jesus worshipped on the Sabbath. It was a habit and so when He came to Nazareth, He led the service. The gospels tell us that Jesus healed and served on that holy day. Today some people dislike the church and its worship services. Those who are concerned about following the example of Jesus will attend church services regularly as He did and honor the day and use it for God and man.

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Five Hope Students Given Grant

Five Hope College student-biologists have been afforded an opportunity to do independent biology research this summer under a \$7050 Undergraduate Research Participation grant from the National Science Foundation.

The grant, will be administered by Dr. Ralph Ockerse, professor of biology at Hope.

Two students will conduct research with Dr. Eldon Greij, associate professor of biology. Ann Rypstra, a junior from Ada, will investigate the effects of the Black River on sediments and organic material entering Lake Macatawa. David Bruggers from Fukuoka, Japan, will study the breeding biology of the common Gallinule.

Jim Bosscher, a senior from Grand Rapids, will explore the adrenal regulation of a diurnal rhythm of testicular responsiveness to the hormone FSH in chickens. This research will be supervised by assistant professor, Dr. Jerry Dusseau.

The other two students will conduct research with Dr. Ockerse in the area of growth regulation. Fred Van Dahm, a senior from Elmhurst, Ill., will focus his efforts on the isolation and characterization of the peroxidase exymes from the pea. Kity Gustin, a senior from Indianapolis, Ind., will examine the nature and biological properties of the enzyme IAA oxidase in peas.

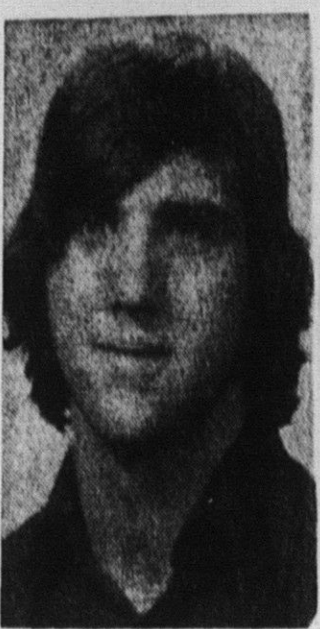

Burr Tillstrom Stars Here With Kuklapolitans

A one-man show by Burr Tillstrom, creator of the popular Kukla, Fran and Ollie television show which has had a popular following for close to a quarter of a century, opened Monday night to an enthusiastic audience in De Witt Center Theatre on Hope College campus, launching the college's second summer theatre season.

Billed as a "retrospective," the show runs five more nights through Saturday, with curtain at 8:30 p.m.

Tillstrom, who received an honorary Doctor of Letters degree from Hope College in 1972, planned an informal show with bits of programs edited from old kinescopes, plus slides and plenty of action on the Kuklapolitan Theatre stage.

It began with a short speech by Tillstrom who sketched the history of the 25-year retrospective, starting with his main puppet, Kukla, a warm-hearted, kind, clown-like figure who holds everything steady. Next in line is Oliver Dragon, a more mischievous type with one tooth, but a dragon who is thoroughly lovable and never scary.

Tillstrom spoke of one early program in which Oliver and Fran discussed Kukla... Oliver was a dragon, Fran was a girl, but what was Kukla? Kukla was simply Kukla and had always been that way, but a few days later a letter from a Chicago mother who watched Kukla, Fran and Ollie every night with her children, defined Kukla better. "Kukla," she said, "was a blessing, providing fine entertainment in her household every night."

Fran Allison, the girl up front who made all puppets believable, was not able to be present. Tillstrom said. Her husband is seriously ill.

Tillstrom described his Kuklapolitans as an electronic fairy tale highlighting the oblique view of Kukla and the others on all subjects, saying it much better than humans can. "We

didn't write it; we did it," Tillstrom said, and the films, slides and live on-stage acts made for a delightfully entertaining evening.

Kukla and Ollie were joined by Mme. Ophelia Oogelpuss in her operatic arias. Beulah Witch, Fletcher Rabbit with his views on Holland's Tulip Time festival, Wilmer Worm, Oliver's mother, and lots of action in playful fights, xylophone duets and Ollie's famed alma mater song, "Dragon Prep," in which the Kuklapolitans were joined by the Hope summer theatre company in a rousing rah-rah number, right in keeping with the next show, "Good News," a musical which opens June 27.

Two screens flanked the familiar Kuklapolitan Theatre, flashing slides and scenes edited by William de Graaf who worked several months on old kinescopes. Slides pictured a wide array of celebrities photographed with Tillstrom, Miss Allison and the Kuklapolitans. Mary Lou Smith of Grand Rapids served as accompanist for songs and at one point Robert Benchley III provided guitar accompaniment for a folk song by Kukla.

Tillstrom will take the entire show to East Lansing June 27 for the International Puppetry Festival at Michigan State College. It will be presented in Wells Hall.

Christian Reformed Synod Meets

GRAND RAPIDS — A study report regarding the church and homosexuality was adopted Monday by the General Synod of the Christian Reformed Church which continues to meet this week on the campus of Calvin College.

The study was recommended by the Synod for a background study of the problem by local churches and gave several statements of pastoral advice and defined terms. A homosexual was defined as a person with an erotic attraction for persons of the same sex; homosexuality, as an orientation toward members of the same sex and homosexuality as explicit or overt homosexual activity.

Synod stated: 1. Homosexuality, male or female, is a condition of disordered sexuality which reflects the brokenness of this sinful world and for which the homosexual may bear only a minimal responsibility.

2. A homosexual may not, on the sole ground of his disorder, be denied community accept-

ance, and if he is a Christian, he is to be wholeheartedly accepted as a person for whom Christ died.

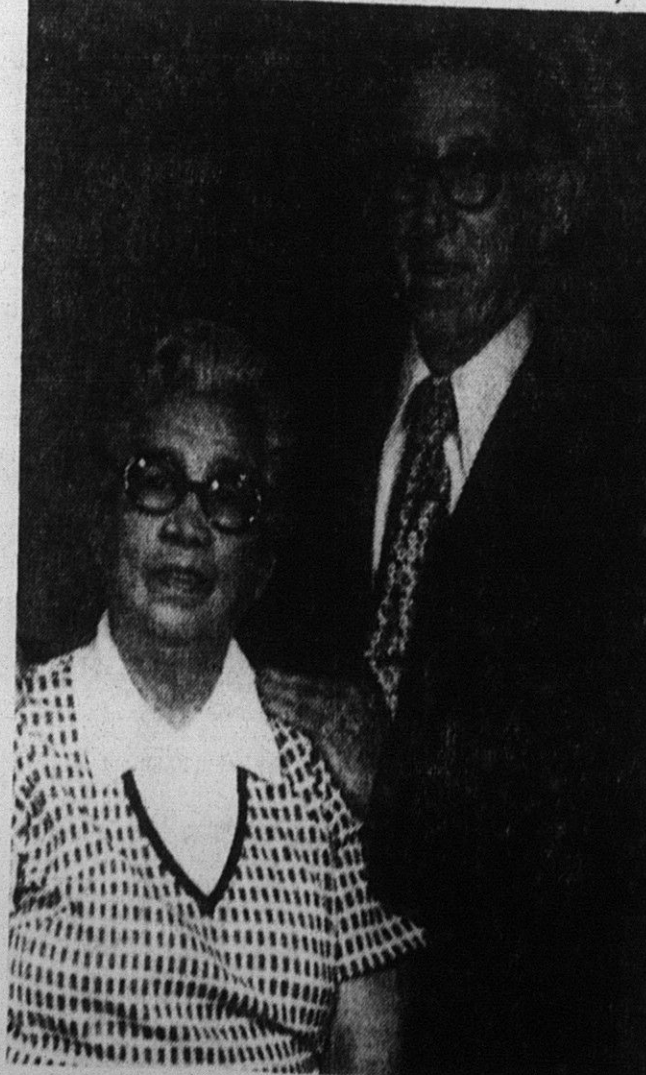
3. Homosexuality as explicit practice must be condemned as incompatible with obedience to the will of God as revealed in the Scriptures.

In other action Monday, Synod approved appointment of a committee to study the method of examining candidates for the ministry, an outgrowth of dissatisfaction with the method now in use.

A Classis Zeeland communication asking for recognition again of the catechism instruction, known as "Our Reformed Heritage" in view of recent moves toward a unified study for catechism classes was answered by a statement by the Synod that adoption of a unified study not imply that "Our Reformed Heritage" would no longer be recognized.
