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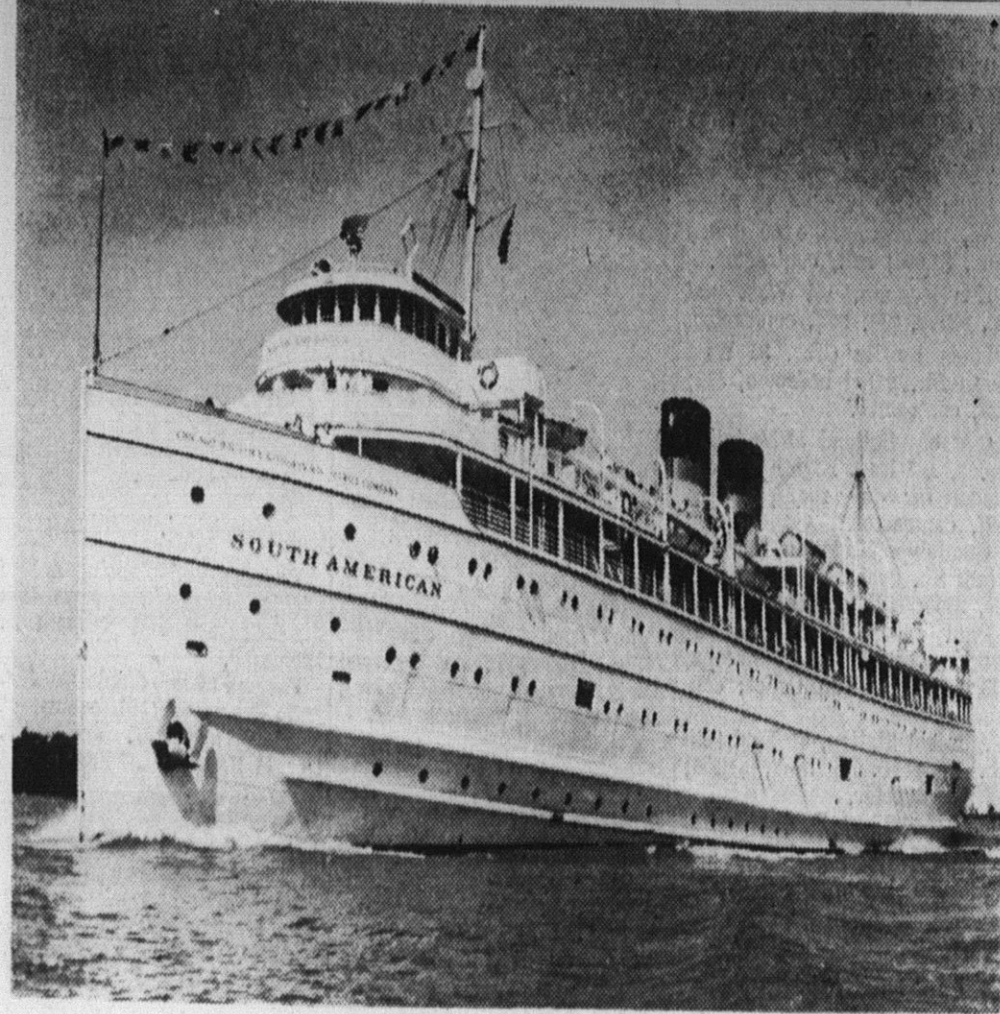


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SOUTH AMERICAN LOST TO SCRAP

Fund Drive Unsuccessful, Ship Faces Scrap Pile

Fight Lost for South American

Unless an eleventh-hour reprieve is obtained, word was expected to be given to a New Jersey shipyard to begin cutting up the former Great Lakes cruise ship South American.

Efforts by a committee in Holland to save the vessel were unsuccessful and representatives met with the shipyard owner in Detroit Saturday to say they were unable to raise the \$100,000 to save the ship by the Saturday deadline.

Donald Disselkoen, president of the Chicago, Duluth and Georgian Bay Transit Co. of Holland, Inc., the non profit corporation formed to preserve the South American, and the corporation secretary, Reed Brown, met with Louis Sarco, president of Ships, Inc., owner

of the vessel.

Brown said Sarco was to notify the Camden, N.J. shipyard today to begin arrangements for cutting up the South American for scrap.

Brown said a campaign to raise funds to save the ship netted \$5,000 in pledges "all of which came from outside the Holland community."

"Support for the project had come from the Midwest with well-wishing letters and others intervening with historical commissions, but support in Holland was negligible," said Brown.

The committee planned to purchase the vessel, have her towed back to Holland and restored for use as a museum, restaurant, theatre and shops and

meeting rooms.

A tentative purchase offer was made May 6 after it learned the vessel faced the cutting torch. Other meetings were held and the final vote to save the ship was postponed until Saturday.

Brown said the directors of the corporation were to meet this week to discuss future ideas, one of which could be to obtain some artifacts from the ship.

Brown said Saturday was the end of the formal phase to purchase the South American but added the corporation would continue pending the outcome of discussions this week by the board members.

The South made her final Great Lakes voyage in 1967, the same year the sister ship North American sank in the Atlantic Ocean while under tow. Both vessels were docked in Holland during the winter season while they operated on the Great Lakes.

Daily Room Rates Up \$2 to \$7.50

Hospital Rates Boosted July 1

At its regular meeting Thursday, the Hospital Board approved new rates effective July 1. Daily room charges will be increased an average of 7.8 per cent or about \$4.45 per day. This will vary with the type of accommodation anywhere from \$2 to \$7.50.

In addition to the adjustments in room rates the Hospital will adjust charges for other services accordingly.

At the time the Hospital budget was presented Administration had indicated that room rates would have to be increased \$3.25 to \$3.50 in order to compensate for the higher costs of operation. Since the budget was adopted, the Michigan Legislature has approved unemployment compensation for all municipal employees. This will become effective Jan. 1, 1975, which is halfway through the fiscal year of the Hospital.

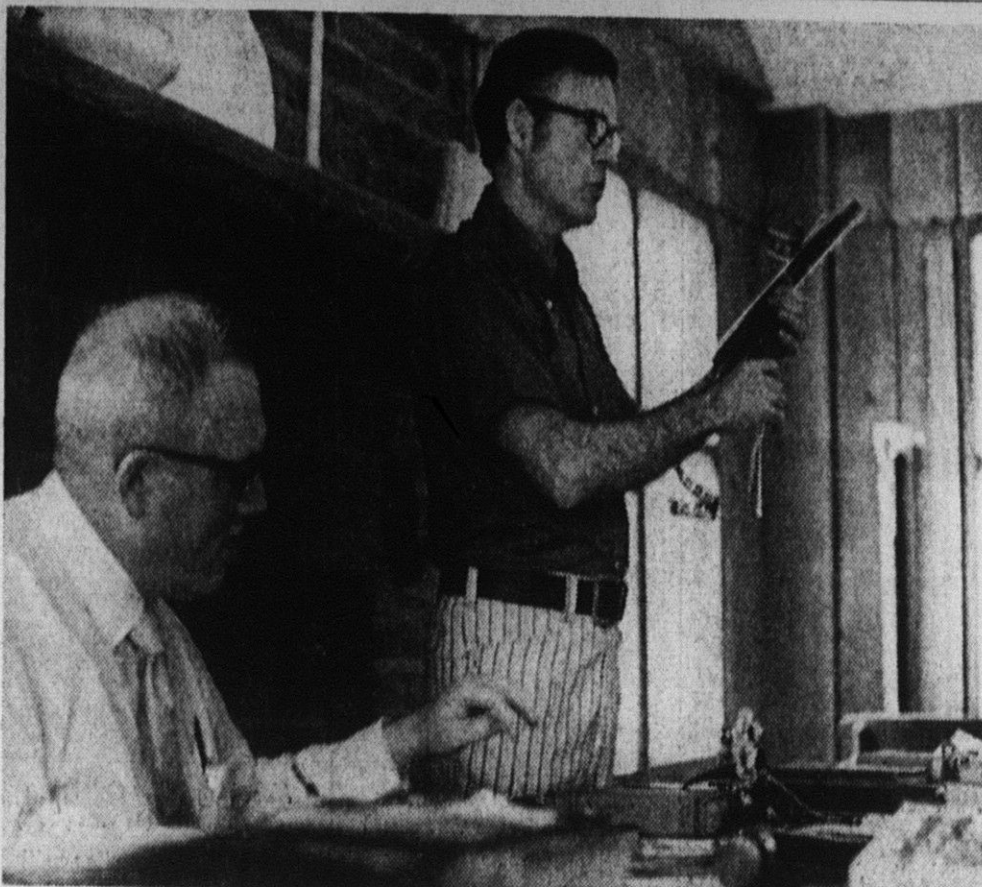
Best estimates at this time indicate an approximate cost for that six-month period for the hospital of \$50,000. This is roughly \$1 per patient day of increased costs over which the Hospital has no control.

Increased operating costs for

the hospital include a 7 per cent cost of living increase for all employees. Inflation has also affected every item which the Hospital purchases. Conservative estimates place this factor at between five and ten per cent with some items running considerably higher. Insurance and bonding alone account for an increase of \$20,000. Increases in Social Security added another \$25,000.

A survey of hospitals in Grand Haven, Muskegon, Grand Rapids and Zeeland indicate that Holland's rates are consistently below all but two of the seven hospitals surveyed.

Under the new price schedule wards which formerly ranged from \$53 to \$59.50 as of July 1 will range from \$55 to \$66. Semi-private rooms under the old schedule ranged from \$55.50 to \$59.50. Under the new schedule they will range between \$60 to \$66. Private rooms under the old schedule varied between \$61.50 and \$65.50. Under the new schedule they will range from \$65 to \$70. Intensive Care will be increased from \$136 to \$150. The Emergency Room will remain unchanged at \$16.25.

Ozmopolitans at Castle Park

It was phantasmagorical. There was talk of lemonade rain and popcorn snow.

The dinner menu listed mixed mangaboos and scoodler soup. Ozmopolitans were all over the place.

The occasion was a gathering this weekend of members of the International Wizard of Oz Club.

Delegates included college professors, housewives and children from Texas, New York, Michigan, Illinois and other states.

Among them was a Canadian professor who had told his friends he was going to a writers' convention. Otherwise, said his wife, people wouldn't

understand.

The three-day affair at Castle Park, a resort near this western Michigan city, was the 14th annual international convention of the group which meets to exchange rare copies of L. Frank Baum's 40 children's books, show off memorabilia and present research papers on Oz characters.

"It's more like a social gathering than a convention," said Fred Meyer of Escanaba, Mich., a school teacher.

The approximately 70 delegates were guests of the Munchkins, Oz members in the eastern part of the country. Others in the 1,225-member organization are Winkies (west

or Quadlings (south). Each group is named for a region in the Land of Oz.

"We wait all year to be with people who understand," said Carrie Hedges, a 26-year-old proofreader from Chicago.

"We're all a little crazy, but we're crazy in the same way."

The Ozmopolitans dined on a menu which included scoodler soup, pigasus' pride, imperial pontentatoes, mixed mangaboos, Ozma salad, rollos, Oz cream and jackpot's choice. To normal folks, the feast simply would have been mushroom soup, pork, potatoes, mixed vegetables, peach salad, rolls, coffee and ice cream.

During a panel discussion, two doctors of philosophy and a professional artist warned delegates against using newspaper for bookmarks or laminating rare editions of the Oz books.

There was also an "Oz quiz," won by Noah Seaman, 17, who attended the convention with his father, Dr. Gideon Seaman, a New York City psychiatrist.

Jaehnig Named Friend of Court

GRAND HAVEN — A former Holland man is returning to this area from Pittsburgh, Pa., to assume duties as Ottawa County Friend of the Court.

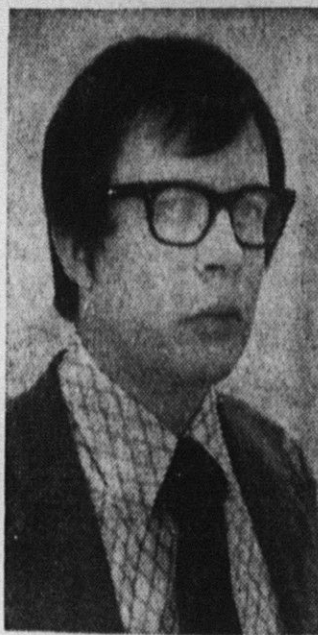
Gov. William G. Milliken has appointed Robert D. Jaehnig to the post. Jaehnig succeeds George Damson, who retired earlier this year after serving as Friend of the Court since 1955. He was sworn in at 3 p.m. Monday in the Circuit Court room in the county building here.

The appointment was made on the recommendation of Circuit Judge James E. Townsend and former Circuit Judge, now Federal District Judge Wendell A. Miles.

Jaehnig, 33, graduated in May from the Duquesne University School of Law in Pittsburgh. For the past five years he has served on the English faculty of Point Park College in Pittsburgh.

A 1958 graduate of Holland High School, Jaehnig graduated from Hope College in 1963 and holds a master's degree in English from Syracuse University, awarded in 1965.

He is a former reporter-photographer for The Holland Evening Sentinel, and also worked as an announcer for radio station WHTC in Holland. He also has worked on the editorial staffs of the Syracuse



Robert D. Jaehnig (N.Y.) Herald - Journal and Herald - American, the Butler (Pa.) Eagle, and the Cleveland edition of The Wall Street Journal, where he was awarded a Newspaper Fund scholarship internship in 1961.

In 1962, Jaehnig was selected as Holland's Community Ambassador, and traveled to Nigeria, West Africa, where he lived for the summer with a Nigerian family. He returned to Africa in 1965, serving as a Peace Corps Volunteer in Sierra Leone, West Africa, for two years.

Upon his return from Peace Corps service, Jaehnig served on the English faculties of Slippery Rock State College in Pennsylvania and the State University of New York at New Paltz, before becoming an assistant professor at Point Park College.

While in Pennsylvania, Jaehnig served as assistant editor of the Civil Liberties Record, statewide newsletter of the Pennsylvania American Civil Liberties Union. A member of Delta Theta Phi national law fraternity, he is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert D. Jaehnig Sr. of 333 West 17th, Holland.

The Friend of the Court assists the Circuit Court in overseeing the protection of children in divorce and paternity cases. The office collects support and alimony payments and advises the Court on matters of divorce custody and visitation rights.

Under Damson's direction, the operations of the Ottawa County Friend of the Court's office have expanded rapidly. Collections in support and paternity cases handled by the office have risen from \$166,000 in 1955 to an estimated \$2 million for the current year.

It is expected that the activities of the office will continue to expand under the Michigan no-fault divorce statute.

Elected vice president was the Rev. Bert Van Soest, pastor of Pompton Lakes Reformed Church, Pompton Lakes, N.J.

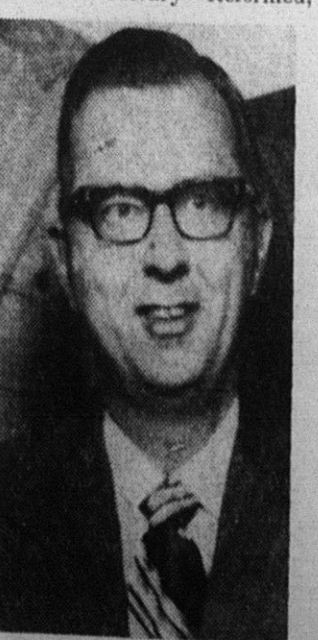
Both are graduates of Central College in Pella, Iowa, and Western Theological Seminary in Holland, Mich.

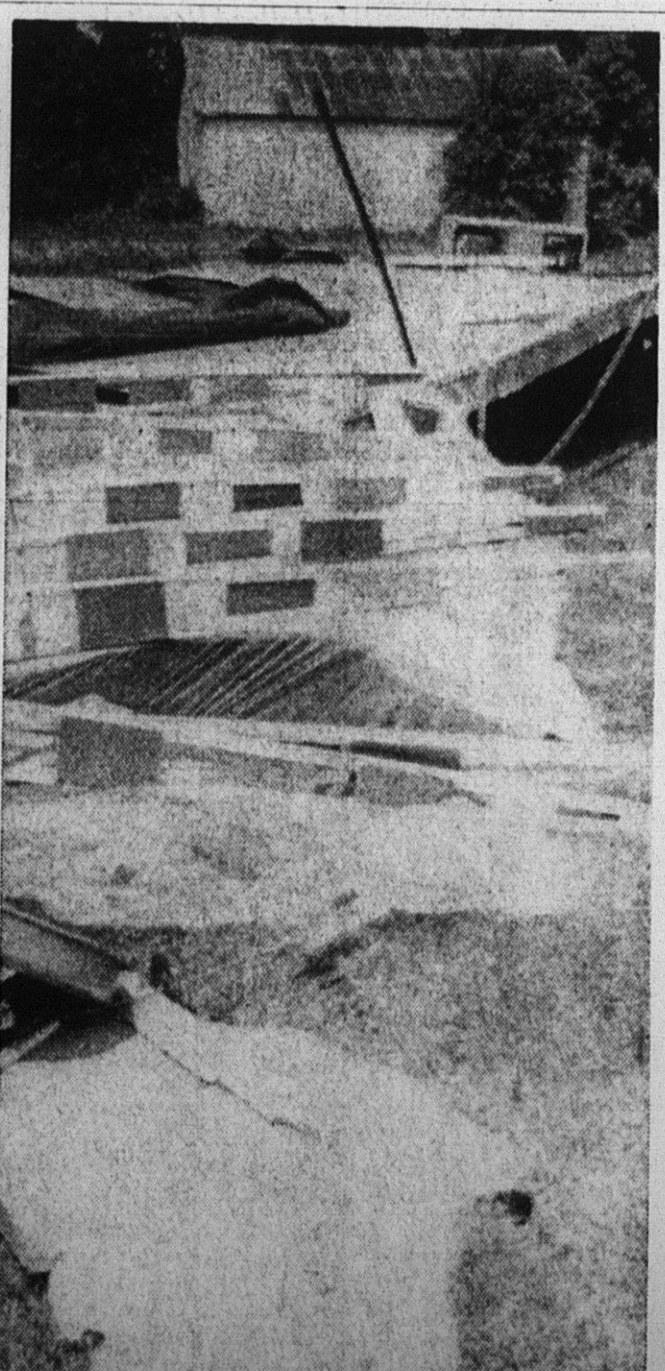

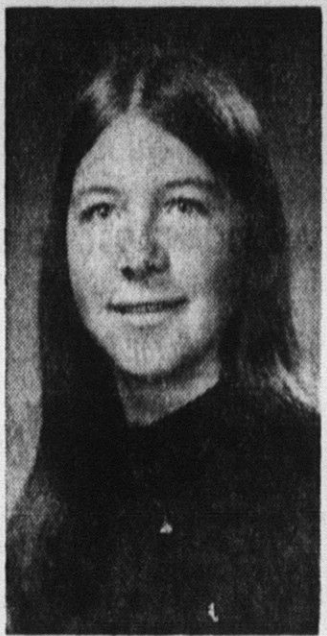

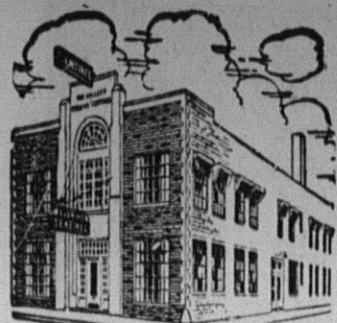

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THE NATIONAL BALLET DIES

Very soon after the 75-year-old Dallas Symphony's collapse the United States has experienced another severe cultural loss as the National Ballet in Washington, D.C., suspends operations for lack of funds to carry on. These events are of importance even to Americans in other places who have not attended a performance of either group and had no expectation of doing so.

This is so because the demise of the ballet in the nation's capital, like that of the Dallas orchestra, may be symptomatic of a more widespread ill. In each case the villain of the piece was lack of adequate community support. Many other arts organizations in cities of all sizes throughout the country — orchestras, operas, dance and theater groups — are similarly threatened.

Virtually all of them come up against the adamant fact that box office receipts alone do not meet their rising costs of production. They must turn to other sources of money to keep going: foundation grants, government assistance, individual contributions, various special fund-raising devices. Generally speaking, a broad base of community support is necessary for survival. When that is not forthcoming, as happened with the Dallas Symphony and the National Ballet, the end is not far off.

This is not a matter of academic interest. What it means, in practical terms, is that people who want to see the arts organizations in their communities thrive must work to assure their support.

Sunday School Lesson

God's Redeeming Grace
Ephesians 1:1-4
By C. P. Dame

This is the first lesson of a series of three lessons from Paul's deeply spiritual letter to the church at Ephesus. At the conclusion of our studies we will have a greater appreciation of this thought-provoking epistle. I. Seeing this is the first of a series let us take a look at the epistle. It is one of the four prison epistles which Paul wrote in 64 A.D. while a prisoner in Rome — the others are Philemon, Philippians, and Colossians. The latter is closely affiliated with Ephesians.

Colossians teaches "the all-sufficiency of Jesus Christ" while the theme of Ephesians is stated in 1:9,10 — namely the ultimate gathering of all things in the Lord Jesus Christ. Although Paul spent almost three years in Ephesus the letter contains no personal greetings. Some scholars think the letter was also meant for other churches in Asia Minor.

Take note of a few items. The phrase, "in the heavens" appears five times in the letter. These words teach that the blessings of believers are spiritual. The words, "in Christ" and "in him" and "in whom" refer to the believer's mystical union with Jesus Christ. The exuberant spirit, and the certainty Paul reveals regarding himself and God's people, note, He was an apostle due to God's call, and God has a people because of God's grace — his unmerited love to undeserving sinners. It warms the heart to read about forgiveness, redemption through the blood of the Redeemer.

II. God choose a people for himself. The changed people of Ephesus belonged to this select group. Before those believers had been born, in eternity, God planned for them and in the course of time Jesus Christ came into this world and the Holy Spirit called them so that they might be "holy and without blame," considered unblemished due to their connection with Jesus Christ and become God's adopted children. Note God's action prompted by his grace. It is particularly worth noting that God's word speaks of actions in eternity and in time to this now generation. God has a people not due to any human action but solely to what he did — his planning and purpose ushered us into God's redeemed family. Believers are what they are because of God's grace.

III. God's Spirit is at work now. Observe that Paul mentions God, the Father, and God the Son, and God, the Holy Spirit — the holy trinity. God elects, the Son makes the atonement for our sins and the Holy Spirit calls and comes to dwell in the believer's heart. His presence and activity assures believers they belong to him and will be kept by him forever. God's promises will be fulfilled. How fitting it is for believers to praise God daily for his manifold matchless grace!

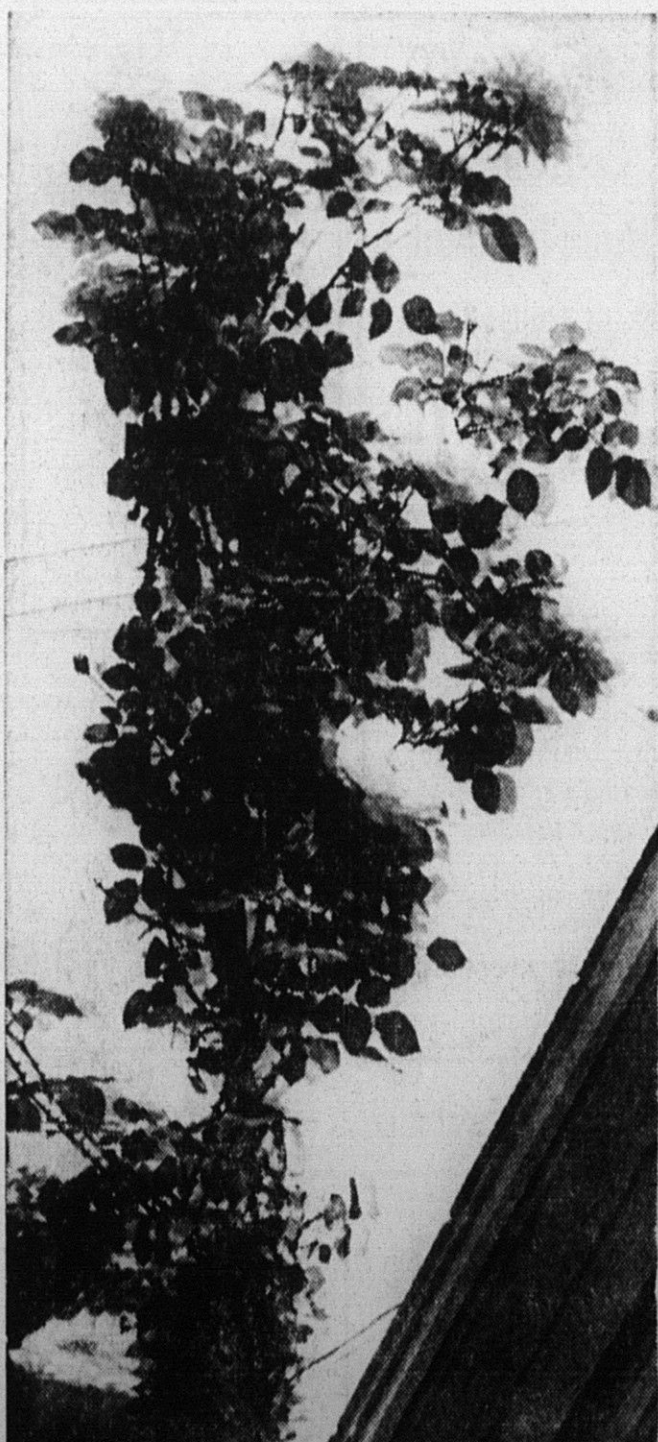

"If they take the trouble and are persistent enough to find our shop they are usually serious shoppers," Gladys says.

Not that she and her family discourage casual browsers, it's just that they get so few at their location, 11520 East Lakewood Blvd. The shop is named for Mrs. Veneklasen's great grandmother who came to Michigan in 1868.

But despite their slightly out of the way location, business, which began six years ago, has been exceptionally good, and the former body shop which houses the antiques has been doubled.

Mrs. Veneklasen describes

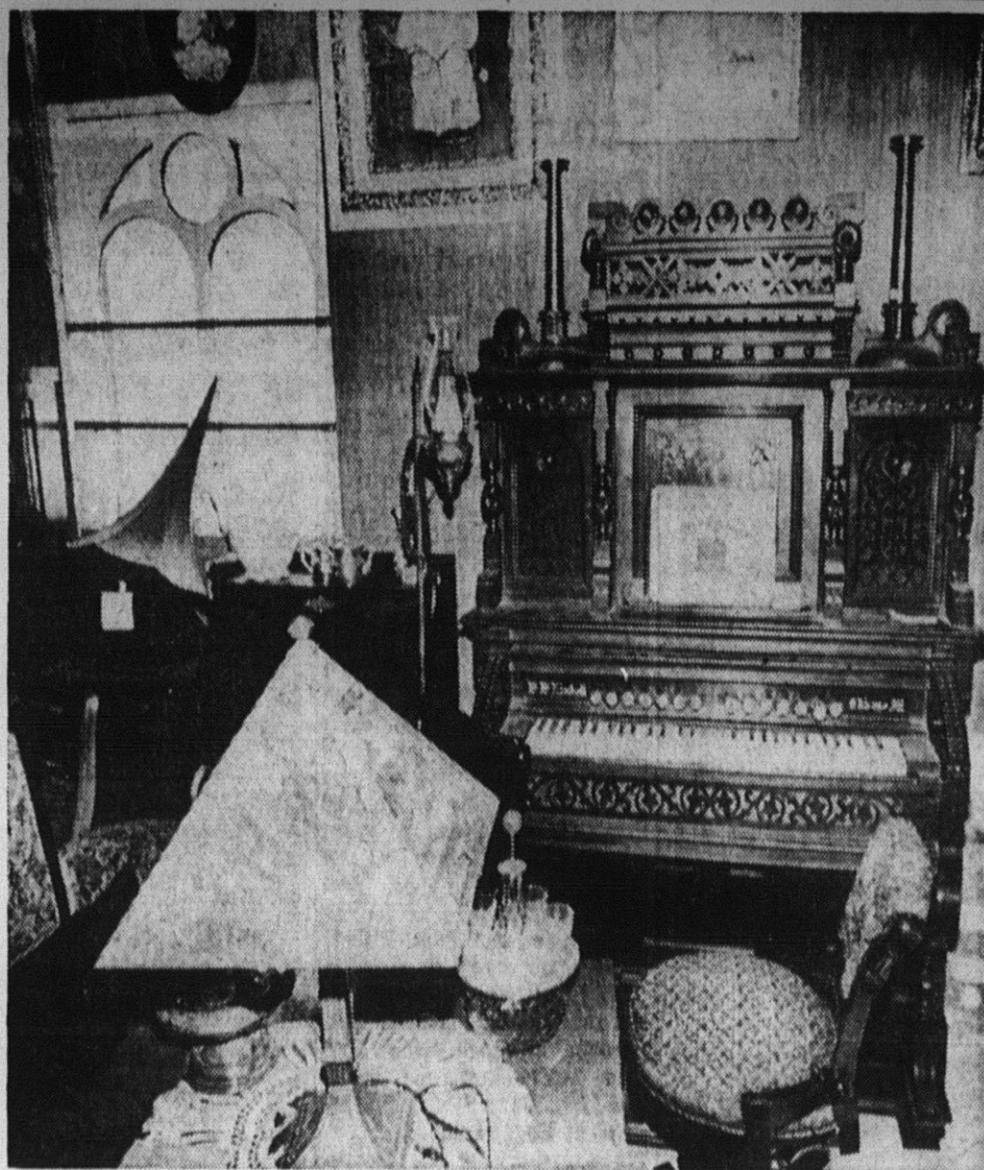
the venture as a family affair but grimaces ever so slightly when asked if her husband is a valuable helper.

"He's gone along with it very well and he knows what he likes," she admits, "and he has picked up several pieces for me."

They maintain regular 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. Monday through Saturday hours with no evening hours because it interferes with their family lives. Despite the success and obvious hard work at maintaining a large quality stock of merchandise Mrs. Veneklasen still prefers to consider the shop as her hobby.

Sparked by a desire to furnish one room of their home in antiques, Gladys purchased several antiques from friends who were holding a back yard sale.

"Many people wanted to purchase what I had already

purchased," Mrs. Veneklasen said, "so I took names of interested buyers and sold some of the items."

With the encouragement of family and friends she started the shop on a part-time basis in the body shop which she and her husband owned.

The Veneklasens have four children who have or do periodically assist in the shop, two sons, Howard and Brian, who graduated from Hope College, Gail, a West Ottawa graduate and Marsha who will enter the 11th grade in the fall.

Encouraging young people to invest in good antiques has been of prime concern to Mrs. Veneklasen who enjoys talking with and helping them. Everything in the shop has been hand picked and the Veneklasens strive to find useful antiques.

Since the shop is open only during the day most of the first time customers are women who later return with their husbands before making a purchase.

Over the years the shop's most interesting visitor has been a frightened woodchuck who lodged in the shop for two days before being removed by the sheriff's deputies. Mrs. Veneklasen discovered him sitting

under her desk next to her one morning. Before concluding his visit the woodchuck damaged numerous items in the shop.

Antiquing has also enabled her to expand her own collection of miniature (six or seven inches) hurricane lamps which she treasures.

One of her most remembered customers came into the shop, stayed one-half hour, made numerous purchases, didn't quibble over prices, paid for the antiques and announced a semi-truck would arrive in a few days to pick up the merchandiser. It did.

But since Mrs. Veneklasen always considers her shop as a hobby, she still enthusiastically greets browsers.

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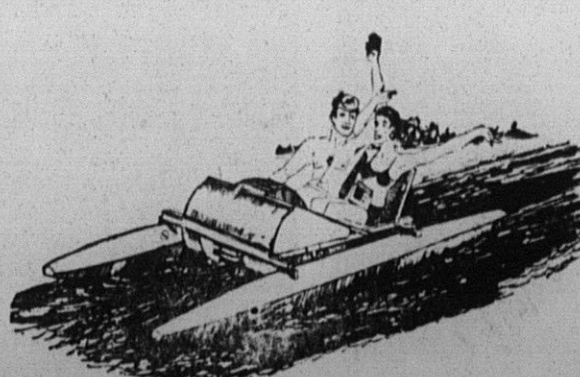
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Kandu Gets Okay For Expansion

At the regular monthly meeting of the Board of Directors of Kandu Industries at the Grand Haven Facility Thursday night President Clifford Crocoll announced that he had just received word from the Michigan Department of Vocational Rehabilitation Services that they had approved the preliminary plans for refurbishing and renovating the uncompleted part of the Holland facility at an estimated cost of \$87,000., and that a check for 80 per cent of this amount or \$70,000 would be available within two weeks upon notification that the balance in matching funds of \$17,000 had been raised locally.

He then appointed O. W. Lowry of Holland as Chairman of the Building Fund, together with Mrs. Charles Van Duren, to proceed to endeavor to raise this amount as expeditiously as possible so that Kandu could avail itself of these State funds.

Mr. Lowry stated that there would not be any general drive, and although contributions in any amount are most acceptable he expected to ask those who were able to do so to become Life Patrons of Kandu by pledging \$1,000 or more. Payments may be spread over the next 12 months.

Life Patrons will be recognized by having their name inscribed on a permanent plaque to be erected at the facility.

There are now 29 Original Life Patrons, Mr. Lowry said, who have contributed \$1,000 or more for the purchase of the present plant in Holland and the renovation of the front part, where 65 handicapped clients are now earning their own livelihood by working full time on contracts with various local industries.

Renovation of the balance of the plant will make possible the accommodation of up to 65 additional handicapped people who are greatly in need of rehabilitation under this Sheltered Workshop Program.

Mr. Lowry stated that several of the original patrons had already indicated their desire to make additional substantial contributions for the completion of the project. "This is the best bargain in the donation field I have ever seen," said Lowry. A person making a contribution of \$1,000 is effectively contributing \$5,000 to this worthy cause through 4 to 1 matching funds from the State.

All interested persons are invited to visit the facility and see the activity at the Holland facility at 276 West 13th St. any day from 8:30 a.m. to 4 p.m.

Mr. Lowry announced the

names of the 29 original Patrons who subscribed a total of \$80,000 which made possible the purchase of the building free and clear of debt, including the matching funds, for refurbishing the front part, including offices, heating plant, toilet facilities, etc. Several of these patrons have already indicated their desire to help out with additional funds to complete the refurbishing.

Tower Club Has Roaring 20's Party Saturday

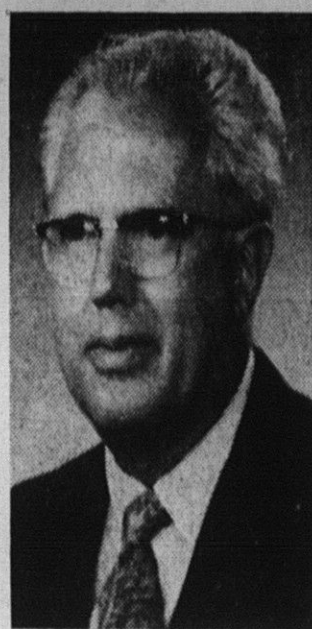

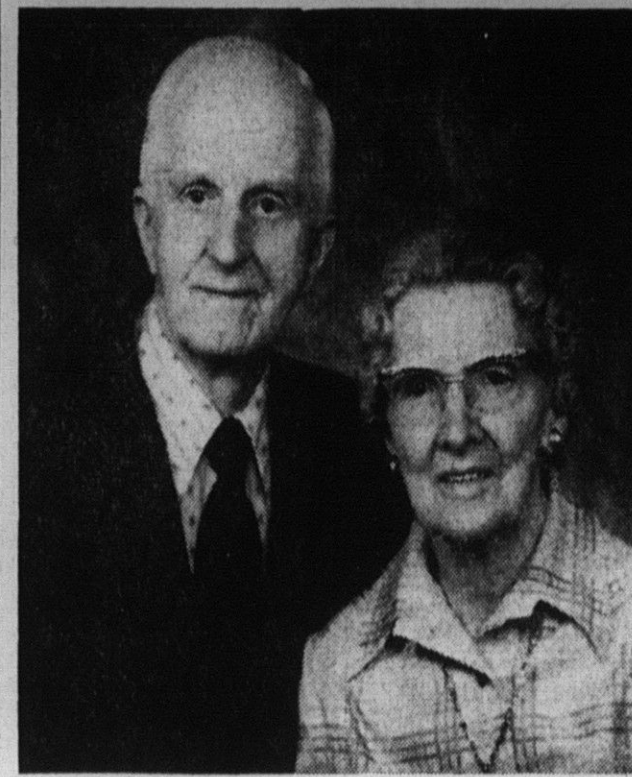

Excellent voices contributed immeasurably.

As leads, Kirk Swenk as the brash young climber in business and Paula Dewey as the girl friend-secretary displayed a talent far beyond their years. Gayland Spaulding threatened at times to steal the show as the horrid nephew of the big boss, played by Simon Frederick with an at-home conviction that never was in doubt.

Julie Bellisle as the sexy girl friend had the face, figure and other accouterments to make her stand out in a plum role.

The only familiar face was Don Bonevich, a member of the old Red Barn company since 1958, who seemed right at home with the new company which boasts many Kalamazoo residents, Don's home town.

Others in the cast, mostly business executives and secretaries, were David C. King, Tim Lane, Bob Mulvihill, T. Botsford Davidson, Gary Van Der Wege, Linda Starkweather, Joy Pylman, Deborah Nelson, Cheryl Perez, Karen Kalensky, Rita Gillespie, Jill Ongley and James Kroll.

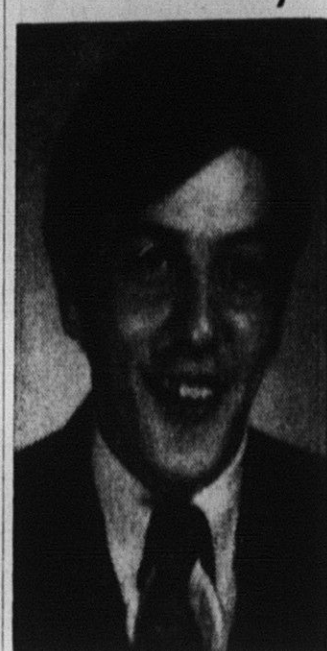
Simplicity and a generous sprinkling of "less rather than more" made Kistler's set particularly effective. The background was a semi-circle of four "shadow box" offices and back lighting provided silhouettes for each new segment. A minimum of simple props carried without wasted motion onto the stage provided new settings. Other props provided everything from desks with typewriters, to elevators and executive washrooms.

The Frank Loesser score provided plenty of highlights, with the Finch-Bigley rendition of "Grand Old Ivy" bringing down the house. The closing "Brotherhood of Man" was a hand-clapping rouser that had the audience joining in.
