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## Dr. Diekema To Succeed Spoelhof

Appointment Made By  
Synod; New President  
1956 Calvin Graduate

GRAND RAPIDS—Dr. Anthony J. Diekema, 41, vice chancellor of the University of Illinois - Chicago Medical Center and a Holland Christian High School

graduate, was named president of Calvin College Tuesday by General Synod of the Christian Reformed Church.

Dr. Diekema will succeed President William Spoelhof who retires in February.

He is a 1952 graduate of Holland Christian High School and a 1956 graduate of Calvin College. He holds a Masters and Ph.D. degree in sociology from Michigan State University. He is a native of Zeeland.

Dr. Diekema was vice chancellor of the University of Illinois - Chicago Medical Center since 1970 and was director of admissions and records for four years prior to that.

He served as admissions counselor, assistant director of admissions and assistant registrar at Michigan State University before leaving for the University of Illinois in 1964 as assistant dean of admissions and records.

Dr. Diekema is serving on the Back to God Hour radio committee, and is a member of the synodical committee on race relations and Strategic Christian Ministry Foundation.

He is married and has seven children.

The Rev. Eugene Rubingh, Nigerian Field Secretary for the Board of Foreign Missions was appointed executive secretary of the board, in other action Tuesday. The board was also authorized to begin mission work in Liberia.


Ethical decisions on war, discussed earlier this week, was referred back to the churches for study and reflection.

Jan van der Vossen Transferred to Germany

## Consul General Is Reassigned

Consul General Jan van der Vossen, assigned to the Chicago office since April 1971, and who will be transferred to Frankfurt, Germany, beginning July 1, met Monday with local department heads in the mayor's office.

City Manager Terry Hofmeyer commended van der Vossen for his varied and frequent assistance in planning community functions.

Willard C. Wichers, Netherlands' Consul for Press and Cultural Affairs, noted van der Vossen's most recent contribution to the city, a letter written to the Rose Bowl Committee which was instrumental in Holland's invitation to participate in the parade.

In addition, Wichers acknowledged van der Vossen's help in planning for Princess Margriet's visit to Holland and his assistance in planning Holland's 125th anniversary celebration. Van der Vossen served as the grand marshal during the 1972 Tulip Time parade.

Following the informal coffee, van der Vossen was presented with a picture of Windmill De Zwaan and a commemorative tie tack. During the meeting city officials discovered the oversight of the gifts which are traditionally presented on a first visit. Van der Vossen has visited

Holland "at least 20 times." Hoffmeyer quipped that van der Vossen had become so much a part of the community that the oversight was easy to understand.

In addition to his Chicago assignment, van der Vossen has served in Ottawa, Canada; London, Pakistan, Mexico, The Congo, and Indonesia with intermittent ministries in The Hague.

## Seven Seek Two Council Posts

ZEELAND — Seven persons have filed petitions for two vacancies on the city council, assuring voters of their first primary council election in 15 years. The primary is scheduled for Aug. 5 with the general election following Nov. 4.

Filing for the two council vacancies are the incumbents, Ray Schaap and Ted Vanden Brink. Others are Howard Bouwens, Don Disselkoen, Mary Ann Kroll, Dan Suman and Harvey Wierda.

Two persons have filed for mayor and they are incumbent Edward Nagelkirk and Dick Timmer.

## Council Rejects All Street Bids

Bids for a street resurfacing program were rejected by City Council Wednesday and council agreed to change the resurfacing program and readvertise for bids.

Council decided to drop a portion of the program which included a section of Eighth St. and add some other projects since bids received were considerably lower than expected and council indicated other projects could be added with the funds allocated for resurfacing.

The matter was approved by council six to two with councilmen James Vande Poel and John Bloemendaal objecting. Mayor Louis Hallacy was absent.

Council appointed Gordon Heidenga of the city engineer's staff as acting city engineer until the position of city engineer is filled.

A two-year labor contract between the Board of Public Works and Local 586 Service Employees International Union AFL-CIO was approved by council. The contract, effective July, calls for a city-paid pension plan, additional vacation benefits, early retirement and increases in wages.

Council expressed concern about increased speed limits on River Ave. between Eighth and 19th Sts., and on Michigan Ave., between 11th and 32nd Sts., as proposed by the State Highway Department and tabled action for two weeks.

Speed limits are proposed to be increased from 25 to 30 miles per hour from Eighth St. to 21st St., and from 30 to 35 miles per hour from 21st St. to 32nd St., except on River Ave., from 14th to 17th Sts., where the limit will be 25 miles per hour during the school year.

Additional directional signs to aid merchants affected by street paving projects were approved by council. The signs directing motorists to the stores would be limited in size and installed at intersections designated by the city. South Shore Dr. and 16th St., paving projects were mentioned as those affecting merchants.

The transfer of \$365,000 in Board of Public Works funds to the water, sewer and electric accounts was approved by council.

Claims against the city were received from Ottagan Plumbing, Mrs. Nellie Schut and James A. Hallan and were referred to the city's insurance carrier.

A request from Bohn Aluminum & Brass Corp., 365 West 24th St., to prohibit parking on the north side of 24th St., for a distance of 45 feet east from their parking lot driveway was tabled for two weeks.

Council adopted a resolution opposing pending state legislation which would require the complete financial disclosure by local elected and appointed officials.

## Police Seek Four In Beating of Man

Holland police Friday sought four male subjects in connection with an unarmed robbery of a Benton Harbor man early today during which he was beaten about the head and robbed of about \$200.

Police said Ernest Napier, 49, met the subjects in a local tavern and apparently offered to give them a ride. Near the Meadow Lanes complex along South Washington Ave., Napier allegedly was beaten and robbed in the car.

The subjects fled and left Napier in his car.

The incident was reported to police at 2:26 a.m. Friday. Napier was treated in Holland Hospital for injuries to the head and released.

## Four Arraigned In Break-In Try

Four young men from the Holland area, arrested early Tuesday allegedly while breaking into the Ottawa Area Center at 96th Ave. off M - 45 in Allendale township, were arraigned in Grand Haven District Court Tuesday.

Arrested were Douglas Houtman, 18, of 2682 Williams St.; Daniel Murray, 19, of 3967 Butternut Dr.; Larry Bouwer, 21, of 14672 Valley View, and Rick Collins, 19, of 293 Felch St.

None was able to furnish \$1,000 bond and each was held in the Ottawa County jail.

Ottawa County deputies, responding to an alarm, observed four subjects at the Center Tuesday at 2:35 a.m. and took them into custody.

## Holland Hospital Hikes Room Rates

Room rates at Holland Hospital are scheduled to be increased by \$5 a day effective July 1 and other supportive service charges are to be increased by about the same amount, following approval Tuesday by the hospital board of trustees.

Hospital Director Frederick S. Burd, said the increases in room rates were necessary to cover increased costs and a four per cent cost of living increase for employees.

The new room rates will bring the cost of private rooms to \$70-\$75; semi-private rooms \$65-\$70 and wards, \$60-\$65 a day.

Burd said the average daily costs per patient in the hospital in May was \$91.44 and with the new rates and higher charges the average would be about \$98 a day.

The last room rate increases were effective July 1, 1974.

But Burd said room rates in Holland were still lower than the average in hospitals in Grand Haven, Grand Rapids and Muskegon where private rooms are between \$70 and \$80 a day, semi-private rooms \$65 to \$78 and wards \$65 to \$77.

There will be no increase in emergency room or laboratory rates.

In other action, the trustees approved a lease agreement for a nuclear radioisotope camera which would cost \$91,000, and for a Stat/ION apparatus for the laboratory, which would cost \$17,000 if purchased.

Trustees approved in principle a deferred compensation plan for hospital employees and a specific package would be submitted later. The plan is designed to allow employees to put aside a portion of their salary in a savings-type account for retirement.

Burd reported on cancellation of a shared housekeeping arrangement with North Ottawa Community Hospital in Grand Haven. The Grand

Haven hospital had been purchasing services of Holland's housekeeper but ended the agreement.

Two medical students will be working in Holland Hospital as part of their medical training program during the summer. They are Michael Subocz of Grand Rapids, a student at the University of Michigan, and Laura Zuidema of Jenison, a Wayne State student.

## Pagan Sentenced To Prison In Beating Death

GRAND HAVEN — Jose Pagan, 27, charged with manslaughter in the beating death Aug. 4, 1973 of Antonio Miranda, 47, of Detroit, was sentenced to 7½ to 15 years in prison Townsend Monday.

Pagan was arrested by sheriff's deputies after he allegedly attacked Miranda with a pipe while asleep in a dormitory at the Bil-Mar turkey farms at Borculo. Miranda died ten days later in a Grand Rapids hospital.

Allen Feeters, 23, and Karen Teeters, 20, both of 551 East 24th St., Holland, pleaded guilty to a charge of possession of a controlled substance and were to return July 14 for sentencing.

Dennis Brown, 26, of Jenison, charged with possession of marijuana, was released Monday after having his sentence reviewed.

John Topp, 23, of 771 Lillian, Holland, failed to appear for trial Monday to a charge of breaking into a motor vehicle and a bench warrant for his arrest was authorized.

Scott Rhoda, 17, of 566 Crescent, Holland, charged with breaking and entering, was placed on probation 18 months. A four-month jail term is to be reviewed in 45 days.

## Holland Hospital Sets Birth Record

The national birth rate may be declining but Holland Hospital reported a record birth rate in May.

Hospital Director Frederick S. Burd told trustees Tuesday that 110 deliveries were made in May, topping the previous record of 108 set in September, 1960.

RCA Synod Session Ends Tonight

## Women in Clergy Vote Is 'No Action'

ELMHURST, Ill. — General Synod of the Reformed Church in America took "no action" on the question of women's ordination to the ministry and referred to all classes of the denomination a new overture concerning the interpretation of whether "person" can refer to both men and women in the church hierarchy.

The question of ordination stems from the ordination Oct. 19, 1973, in Accord, N. Y., of Joyce Sedge as a Reformed Church minister. The ordination was approved by the Mid-Hudson Classis which had interpreted "persons" as referring to both men and women.

The overture before Synod was to declare the 1973 action "null and void" and the vote in this overture was "no action."

Should the church law be interpreted to mean both men and women in the clergy, it would require a two-thirds majority.

Synod also approved four recommendations supporting abortion as a person's right, protection of such rights, and supportive roles, but defeated a fifth proposal on abortion as every person's right, and "shall not be abridged because of financial difficulties or the imposed moral opinion of other persons."

The week-long annual session concluded with a communion service tonight.

Women's Day was observed Thursday with a luncheon, and an evening pageant dealing with a century of women's work.

## Primary Election Slated For Three Council Posts

Mayor Louis Hallacy will be running unopposed in the Nov. 4 general election but races shape up in three of the four councilman posts to be filled.

A primary election will be held Tuesday, Aug. 4 to determine candidates for councilman at large and fourth and sixth wards.

Deadline for filing petitions was Tuesday at 4 p.m. but no new petitions were recorded on the final day.

Seeking the councilman at large post are incumbent Albert Kleis Jr., 295 East 13th St.; Albert H. McGeehan, 5 Bellwood Dr. and John Weeber, 999 Washington Ave.

Running for second ward councilman are incumbent John R. Blomendaal, 192 West 12th St. and Beatrice Weststrate, 55 West 14th St.

In the fourth ward councilman Robert Dykstra is not seeking reelection. Filing petitions to fill the post were Bill Clay, 548 Hiawatha; Russell B. De Vette, 720 Lugers; William Lubbers, 701 West 26th St. and Cora Visscher, 696 Ruth Ave.

Three candidates filed in the sixth ward including incumbent Hazen L. Van Kampen, 133 East 22nd St.; Harry W. Jaarsma, 30 East 21st St. and Henry Vander Veen, 59 East 21st St.

In the primary Holland voters will all vote for councilman at large but fourth and sixth ward candidates will be nominated only by voters in their own district.

City Clerk D. W. Schipper reiterated that in the general election all voters vote for each office.

## New Zoning Code Wins Council Okay

ZEELAND — City Council Monday adopted a revised zoning code for the city with changes in basic zone requirements in several districts. Adoption followed several months of study.

Purchase of several pieces of park equipment for the Michigan St. Tot Lot and Lawrence Ave. park were approved. The cost was \$2,037. Council directed additional fencing be installed in Hoogland Park.

The City Superintendent was authorized to resurface Roosevelt Rd. east of Centennial Ave. for \$3,352.20 and specifications and estimates were requested for a sanitary sewer in the south-east heights area, a major trunkline sewer system in the industrial park area and extension of Roosevelt Rd. from Centennial St. to Fairview Rd.

Council was told by a representative of the Michigan Air Pollution Commission that the city's ordinance allowing burning by permit was not in conformance with state laws. Ural Gray advised the city that the state prohibits all burning in industrial and commercial areas except in approved incinerators.

Council declined to have local enforcement of the state plumbing code and directed that permits should be issued and inspections made by the Michigan State Construction Commission.

A contract with Tele - Rad Service, Inc. of Holland to maintain the city's communications system was approved with an annual cost of \$2,666.40.

## Fire Levels Resort Hotel

SOUTH HAVEN — A large family-type resort hotel, believed unused, was destroyed by flames that raged out of control four hours Friday night and early this morning north of the city limits.

The wooden structure was at the Barrons Resort in Allegan County's Casco township. Firemen from Casco were assisted by units from Covert, Glenn, Leen township and South Haven. The fire was reported at 11:30 p.m. and the cause may have been from lightning, authorities said.

State Police said two nearby buildings were damaged and patrons from a nightclub were evacuated. No injuries were reported.

Fire inspectors were probing the ruins today in an effort to determine the cause. Damage estimates were not immediately available.

Ottawa County deputies said the youngster apparently darted in the path of the car eastbound on Ottawa Beach Rd. and driven by Ralph Vander Kloek Jr., 19, of Comstock Park.

The death is the sixth fatal traffic accident in Ottawa County this year compared to the 11 deaths reported a year ago.

He had attended kindergarten at Glerum School.



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



## Netherlands Parliament Member Visits Holland

By Cornelia Van Voorst ... A woman member of the Netherlands Parliament has been spending four days in Holland, Mich., as part of a 32-day trip which is her first visit to America.

Ms. Annelien Kappeyne van de Coppel, a member of the Second Chamber of the Dutch Parliament, is finding America most interesting. Her trip started in Washington, D.C., and then New Orleans, Las Vegas, Nev., San Francisco, Denver and Holland. She left Saturday for Boston and then home.


Her Department of State sponsored visit included Holland, Mich., as an area settled by Dutch immigrants, and her visit here revealed not only the heritage of the past but the operations of a small American city, its educational systems, relationships in governments, social welfare — and problems not unlike those in The Netherlands.

The parliament member, who lives in Leiden where she obtained a law degree from Leiden University in 1966, has many special interests — electoral procedures; her work with interior affairs and the structures of government from state to provinces to municipalities; prisons and youthful delinquents; minorities and the rights of foreigners working in the Netherlands, classical music, plus an intense interest in culture, recreation, and women's rights.

For four years, Ms. Coppel has been a member of the Second Chamber (lower house) which has 150 members elected on the basis of proportional representation. The First Chamber (upper house) has 75 members elected by the 11 provincial legislatures. Ms. Coppel is a member of the Liberal Party which holds 22 seats. The Liberal Party has become popularly identified as the party of the urban upper and middle classes.

She is a member of the Kiesraad (voting council) which determines the outcome of national voting and advises the government accordingly. She is one of four women among the 22 seats of the Liberal Party which experienced a gain in the last election from 15 seats to 22 seats.

Accompanied by Mrs. Jeanine R. Pavillard of the U.S. Department of State, Ms. Coppel had a busy agenda during her Holland visit, hosted by Willard C. Wichers of the Netherlands Consulate. On arrival at the Grand Rapids airport Wednesday, she visited Vandenberg Plaza with its Calder stable downtown, then went to Spring Lake to attend a meeting of the Ottawa County



## Sunday School Lesson

Is the Bible Relevant?  
Psalm 19: 7-11, Matthew 4: 1-10

By C. P. Dame

Millions of people are ready to answer the topic of this lesson with a positive, "Yes." They use the Bible and learned from practicing its teachings, that they get help and happiness. This lesson says that the Bible offers salvation and a satisfied living to those who accept it as God's inspired Book.

I. The Bible makes great claims. Two passages comprise the lesson, one is from the Old Testament written by David, the other is from the New Testament written by Doctor Luke. The first part of Psalm 19 tells about God's general revelation in nature. This all can read if they wish. The second part deals with special revelation to God's people, with whom God made a covenant. In the first part God is spoken of as a God of power, in the second part as a covenant-keeping God.

The law of Jehovah is described variously by the terms, testimony, precepts, commandments, fear and judgments. They all refer to doctrine, God's teaching which set forth God's will — his moral law. The words, perfect, sure, right fear, clean, true and righteous give facts about the law, and the phrases, "converting the soul," "making wise the simple," "rejoicing the heart" and other phrases state what happens when the Lord's laws are obeyed.

II. Jesus used the Bible effectively. The Bible is a useful weapon. In war weapons are meant for use. A war is going on between evil and the good. Jesus became a man and was tempted as all humans are. "The secret of temptation is the temptability of man." After his baptism Jesus was led in the wilderness by the Spirit and there met the Devil who tried three times to make Jesus yield. The first was to make Jesus to yield to temptation to satisfy his hunger for bread. He had fasted for forty days. Jesus did not want to satisfy an appetite, which meant disregarding God's will. The second temptation was an appeal to the spectacular, to jump down from the top of the temple and test God's promise regarding protection by the angels. When a person "begins to tempt God, to prove trust he proves that he does not trust." The third temptation to bow down and worship Satan was a lure to take a short cut to power, avoid the cross.

Jesus refuted the false statement by quoting Scripture correctly. It is worth noting that Jesus knew the Bible although he had none. He learned it in the home, and in synagogue and by personal study. The gospels show that Jesus quoted from every book of the Bible, Isaiah, Deuteronomy and the Psalms were favorites. He used it for meditation, inspiration and defense. We should imitate Jesus and master this "sword of the Spirit, which is the Word of God."

## BARGAINING OVER DEAD

Most of our readers have at some time noticed bumper stickers calling our attention to men missing in action in North Vietnam. For some time the North Vietnamese have given the impression that they knew nothing about such matters as if these men were simply myths. Now the truth is coming out. But their identity, or the return of the bodies, or even the search has been tied to what might be called blackmail.

Americans again and again are lulled into the false hope that communistic governments have in some way reformed, become humane, and can be trusted to act in a spirit of kindness. This latest action is another example that human freedom, or even the dignity of the dead will not change the attitude of the communistic state.

The question is now whether the nation will be forced to spend millions and even billions to get back our men, dead or alive. And what real assurance do we have that any agreement will be carried out? Will certain men be kept in reserve so that later further monetary gains can be extracted?

## Take Emphasis Off Handicap, Put It On the Person

Time spent working with Denise Thompson on this article has turned out to be more, and better, than I had bargained for. My perspective on the handicapped has decidedly widened.

My sister has cerebral palsy, so I am well-acquainted with lack of compassion that the handicapped often encounter. Embarrassing incidents or simple cases of being ignored, occur often because sighted people have never had the opportunity to know a disabled person, and thus, couldn't develop the specific sensitivity needed.

The suggestion that follow are a compilation of Denise's hints, and my growing understanding of this unique situation. They relate specifically to the blind, but are offered in the hope that the principles behind the "dos and don'ts" will carry over into an awareness of handicapped persons in general.

— Don't pet leader dogs on the street. They're friendly when "off duty," but need to concentrate when on the job.

— When helping a blind person, choose words carefully. Rather than saying, "over there," offer clear verbal directions.

— Watch for the blind in stores. Denise quipped, "sighted people are so unobservant." When you notice someone with a cane or a dog, and they seem to need help, offer your assistance or locate a salesperson.

— Handicapped people are often hurt by children whose parents haven't explained that these people have feelings too. Take time at home to teach your children to be sensitive. Don't do it on the spot. A parent telling their child to hush is often more embarrassing for all concerned than the child's actions. Encouraged them not to stare, whisper, follow or mimic the handicapped.

— Offer your spare time if you live near, or know a blind person. Denise, and others, need volunteer readers during the summer as well as throughout the school year. Offer to pick up groceries, or help clean. It's a painless way to make a friend.

— Invite a blind friend to church, Bible study, or the neighborhood get-together. Meetings are often hard to find, so locate the person first, and introduce him or her to the group.



## West Ottawa Board Votes On Policies

Members of the West Ottawa Board of Education Monday night grappled with what has become one of their most vexing problems — the year-writing efficient procedures and regulations to be followed during tornado warnings and watches.

Concerned with the safety of both children and parents, the board approved regulations which allow parents to pick up children during warnings but strongly indicated that it was most probably not the safest course of action for parents to take.

During a tornado warning parents should remain in a place of safety and children would be retained in the safest designated locations in the school, but children would be released at a parent's insistence, the board agreed.

Supt. Brad Henson, reporting on his first week in the district, expressed his appreciation for all persons responsible for helping in the open house which allowed him and his wife to get acquainted.

Henson stated that he had taken the time to visit with administrators and learn about programs. "I understand why you are proud of your district," he said.

Later during the meeting Henson's first suggestion for the district was to preface posted notices on school buildings for all visitors to report to the school office with the greeting, "welcome." The suggestion was unanimously accepted.

Board president Ed Haltenhoff reported on storm damage to school property which totaled at most recent accounting, \$38,500. Only \$1,350 damage to the greenhouse was not covered by insurance. Approximately 80 vehicles were damaged, he said.

The board worked on a proposed policy for complaints about instructional materials

which states that "the board recognizes the right of an individual parent to request that his or her child not be required material... provided a written request is made to the child's building principal. However, no parent or group of parents has the right to determine the materials to be used with any students other than their own."

The policy will again be reviewed at the next board meeting on July 21. In connection with the book policy Haltenhoff said following the meeting that academic freedom could be an item on negotiations agenda.

Peg Schroeder, board member for negotiations, reported that they had met with the West Ottawa Education Association four times and no real progress had been made since this year the master contract was to be completely rewritten.

In other action the board endorsed the Area Vocational Center which is scheduled for another vote on Sept. 29 but with Haltenhoff reluctantly adding, in light of most recent bond issues in the state losing, "the time for passing millage isn't now."





The men and women between the ages of 17 and 29 were scheduled to tour cities in Michigan, Illinois, Wisconsin, Iowa and Colorado.




## Holland Is New Home for Denise

Denise Thompson is a student at Western Theological Seminary who wears MSU sweatshirts and tennis shoes. She is a baseball fan, likes to play guitar and experiment in the kitchen. She is a Sunday school teacher and she is blind.

The random order to that list is the remarkable thing. Blindness does not take top priority among her concerns.

The impression of Denise that stays with you is not that of a struggle against a cruel fate. She explains that "most experiences to me are just ordinary, while other people think they're special."

What sticks is the challenge she presents to our cautious, and often inadequate understanding of the blind. She isn't defensive or belligerent. On the contrary, she is so genuine that the handicap disappears behind the person.

Denise, 22, gained her confidence from a number of sources. Her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Richard Thompson of Hopkins, weren't overprotective of their youngest daughter. She also feels that attending the Michigan School for the Blind in Lansing offered a chance to "prove myself," and she "didn't find MSU impersonal at all."

She's involved in a number of groups that also encourage self-assurance. She travels home each weekend to attend and teach at Hopkins Community Reformed Church.

You may have seen her at Expo '72 in Dallas, or in Urbana, Ill., for the 1973 missionary conference.

The primary resources for Denise, however, is not background or activity. She's quick to say that she's "got confidence in God."

Her attitude best reflects her faith. She is studying for a Masters of Religious Education, and is willing to spotlight her handicap to help others.

"I was a little scared about Seminary," she admitted. She wondered "why anyone would hire me when adaptations had to be made, and others could do the same job more easily?"

Thinking about her volunteer work in Hopkins helped her to realize that one of the aims in Christian work is to get others involved. "I have a built-in system to encourage involvement," she says, "If for no other reason than curiosity at first."

She can use her blindness to open up "interaction between myself and students that others wouldn't have at first."

She has a healthy attitude, as well, to sighted persons' reactions to her. She travels with her dog Marshall, and used to become upset when people talked to the dog, and about the dog, while ignoring the human being holding the leash.

Now she excuses the awkwardness of those of us who find it uncomfortable to initiate conversation with the handicapped. "Marshall is a beautiful dog, so naturally people see him as a conversation piece," she says.

Her observations of people are fascinating. Sighted people fit into one of three categories.

The largest group unfortunately, is composed of those who think that blindness and happiness can't mix. They assume that the blind can do little, and show it by talking to the person next to Denise, or to her dog.

A second group assumes the opposite. They think the blind have no limitations. "They don't understand when I get lost in

says. We need to keep in mind that for the blind, "being a little off is totally off."

Denise has found a lot of Holland folks who fit the third category. These are people who a friend's front yard because Marshall saw a cat," Denise doesn't "adjust" their actions when they meet a blind person.

They speak with ease, asking questions without beating around the bush. A hearty handshake, and a natural voice also count, as Denise points out that just as we form first impressions from appearance, "my kind of clues are handshakes and voices."

Seminary families have made Denise feel at home. She entered the school year in the third term, which made it difficult to get acquainted. Her graduating class will enter the Seminary next fall, so this term was a trial run. "I'm an in-betweenie," she jokes, "I'm not really here yet."

Humorous slants on a situation seem to delight Denise. She often speaks at schools and meetings, and her favorite question came from an unabashed first grader. "Can you cry?", the child asked innocently. "That makes sense," Denise says. "If your eyes don't work, then why not?"

She also likes to point out that the American "Vest Pocket" Dictionary in Braille comes in seven volumes.

As with other blind persons, Denise relies on Braille equipment, tapes and records for much of her school and leisure input. She enjoys "reading" westerns, mysteries and biographies of missionaries when she has time from schoolwork.

To work through the masses of reading that seminary demands, Denise has "readers" come in approximately 18 hours a week. Many of them are student wives, each of whom reads for up to two hours, once a week. That kind of schedule calls for the "retentive memory, and total concentration," that Dean Elton Erenburg of the seminary notes in Denise.

Denise has developed her learning abilities since her sight "faded out" between the ages of 11 and 15. She could read print with one eye prior to that time. Her blindness involves the optic nerve which is too close to the brain to allow an operation.

Denise Thompson's character shone through when questioned her on a quote seen recently. A woman, who had her sight restored, decided she'd rather be blind. The world was too distracting. Did Denise consider her blindness helpful?

She didn't hesitate. "I think you could call it an advantage, certainly," she said. She related how much easier it is to concentrate.

"Of course, I wish I could see the woods, and things at times," she went on. With a smile she added, "I guess it's not one of the advantages that people usually count."

She told of the customs and habits that have been passed down from one generation to another. The "Manners and Social Behavior" became a new way of living. From the beginning of the Northern and Southern colonies differed in many ways.

Customs and traditions were brought to this country by the English, French, Dutch, Scotch, Irish and Swedish. By 1800 there were three million people in this country and 80 per cent lived on family owned farms. In 200 years people have traveled by means of horse, to steamboat, to railroad, to automobile, to plane. We have spread from rural life, to city, to the world by means of transportation.

The story of the origin of the Stars and Stripes of the United States covers the early history of our country. At first the colonies used the English flag. The first real American flag was designed Dec. 3, 1775 and differed from the British flag, in having 13 alternate red and white stripes, typifying the 13 colonies. On June 14, 1777 — a day which is now celebrated as Flag Day, the Continental Congress created the Stars and Stripes by passing this resolution: "The flag of the 13 United States shall be 13 stripes, alternate red and white; that the union be 13 stars, white in a blue field representing a new constellation."

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




