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130 Mobile Homes Are Damaged

Coopersville Woman Killed by Lightning In Earlier Storm

Strong winds and hail pushed into the Allegan-Ottawa County area Tuesday afternoon, scattering golfers from a golf course and damaging farms and barns and mobile homes from Saugatuck to the Jenison area.

Residents were urged to take cover when the storm front moved into the area shortly before 5 p.m. A tornado warning was issued.

Authorities in Allegan and Ottawa counties reported no serious injuries from the late afternoon storm but a Coopersville area woman was killed when struck by lightning earlier in the day.

Killed was Ethel Van Dyke, 72, of 5646 Wilson Rd., Crockery township, who was struck by lightning at 1:17 p.m. Ottawa County deputies said she was struck while walking in a field behind her house. She was pronounced dead at the scene.

The City of Holland was bypassed by the storm but a tree was blown down at 16th and College Ave. which blocked traffic for some time.

Heaviest damage in the Allegan-Ottawa county area was south of Holland and Zeeland. Allegan County deputies said 15 farms in the general area reported damage to barns and fields.

Some severe crop damage was reported but there was no loss to livestock.

Deputies said there were no confirmed tornado touchdowns in the county.

In Saugatuck, a pickup truck caught fire when a power line fell across it at Hoffman and Water Sts. Police chief Lyle Jones said the truck was owned by Kenneth Russell Skinner of Saugatuck and was burned out.

Trees, power lines and telephone lines were blown down.

Deputies said most damage appeared to be confined in an area from 146th Ave. on the north to 142nd Ave. on the south and east of M-40 to about 38th St.

At the Ottogan Mobile Home Estates south of Zeeland, manager Ron Brink said virtually all of the 130 mobile homes were damaged by golf-ball sized hail but none of the homes was overturned. Two storage sheds were blown down.

Residents of the mobile home park took cover in the two storm shelters and no serious injuries were reported.

Aluminum siding of the mobile homes was pock marked by hail, windows were broken and some entrances were blown off. Civil Defense personnel estimated damages at \$500 to \$600 per trailer.

Advisory Group Is Selected

Members of a hospital authority advisory committee were appointed at a meeting Tuesday of the Holland Hospital board shortened by severe weather warnings.

Hospital director Frederick S. Burd said the meeting was adjourned when tornado warnings were issued for the Holland area shortly before 5 p.m. Another meeting will be scheduled as soon as possible.

The steering committee for the hospital authority was named to prepare information for a proposed authority and a public vote August 3.

Named chairman of the committee was Charles Shidler, former president of the hospital board. Members include Terry Hofmeyer, City Manager; Leonard Vander Kolk, Fillmore Township; Maynard Van Lente, Holland Township; Roger Becksvort, Laketon Township; Jay Van Wieren, Park Township.

Peter J. Vanden Bosch, hospital board; Jerome Wassink, M.D., medical staff; Mrs. Richard Arthur, hospital auxiliary; Gerald Van Noord, West sub area advisory council; West Michigan Health Services Agency; Dorreen Rardin, hospital employee, and Burd.

The committee will be assisted by Dennis Mokma Associates, a public relations and advertising firm in preparation of materials and literature for the hospital authority election.

GRAND RAPIDS — The Rev. Henry Vander Kam of Kalamazoo was elected president of the General Synod of the Christian Reformed Church meeting last week on the Knollcrest campus of Calvin College.

Vice president is the Rev. William Vander Haak, pastor of Prospect Park Christian Reformed Church, Holland and another Holland resident, Elder Hero Bratt was named second clerk. The Rev. Louis Tamminga of Toronto, Ont. was elected first clerk.

The opening sessions were devoted to college and seminary matters, with 20 new appointments to the faculty, several to posts of members on sabbatical leave.

There was a testimonial dinner Tuesday, recognizing the retirement of five college faculty members with Dr. William Spoelhof, retired president of the college attending. Several professors with 25 years of service will be recognized, as will Dr. John Kdommenga, president of Calvin Seminary for 20 years.

Dr. Richard De Ritter has a new appointment on the Calvin Seminary faculty, assistant professor of church polity and administration.

In other action, Synod approved a plan which will permit ministers and churches to exchange pastors, if mutually agreed upon by the ministers and churches involved.

Highway Crew Finds Body In Auto Wreckage

ALLEGAN — A state highway department forestry crew Wednesday found the body of a Plainwell woman pinned in the wreckage of a car that ran off M-89 east of Allegan and deputies said the accident could have occurred since Monday.

The dead woman was identified as Sandra Hronec, 21, of 133 Court St., Plainwell. She had been reported as missing to Plainwell police Monday evening.

An autopsy was scheduled today to determine cause of death.

Allegan County deputies said the car ran off M-89 east of 23rd St., became airborne 52 feet and rolled down an embankment off the south side of the road, coming to rest on top of her.

The embankment dropped 36 feet below the roadway and made visibility from road difficult, deputies said.

Deputies said there were no skid marks visible on the pavement and little evidence of an accident.

The highway department crew found the wreckage and the body Wednesday at 2:30 p.m. but deputies said the time of the accident was not known. The victim appeared to have been alone in the car at the time of the accident, deputies said.

To Put Holland in Ottawa County

Council Sets Vote On County Switch

Holland City Council, Wednesday, taking advantage of a recent state statute, called for an election Nov. 2 to decide whether the city of Holland should become entirely into Ottawa County.

On a unanimous vote, council adopted a resolution calling for a vote at the next general election to change the county boundary lines to put the city into Ottawa county.

The city lies partially in Allegan County. Everything south of 32nd St. is in Allegan County including the South Side industrial park area with its considerable tax base.

According to state statutes, the measure requires a favorable majority vote in each county.

Mayor Lou Hallacy, who first proposed the matter, said after the council meeting the county-split has been creating difficulties and hardships for residents living in the Allegan County portion because of a lack of social service facilities in the Holland area.

Persons are required to travel to Allegan for services.

For the city, Hallacy said, the two-county spread creates problems for government in having to deal with two equalization and valuation departments and figures, two coroners, two court systems, two county boards and two sheriff's departments.

Seek Funds For City Park Uses

Holland City Council Wednesday authorized the City Manager to apply for federal funds for improvements to De Graaf Nature Center and the development of city owned property between Bay and Blackbass Aves. in the area of Floral Ave.

The matching funds are administered by the Bureau of Outdoor Recreation through the Land and Water Conservation Fund for the development of park and outdoor recreational facilities.

The preapplications are to be submitted to the Department of Natural Resources for approval.

Council approved a City Manager recommendation to add security and fire alarm terminals in the communications room at the police department. The existing system is filled and council asked new subscribers to pay \$50 for installation charges to cover the cost of the equipment purchased by the city.

In addition the police department would begin to charge for answering false alarms on the system and subscribers would be allowed three false alarms a year with a \$25 charge per false alarm after that.

The alarm system is used by business and industry to monitor for fire and burglar protection and an automatic signal is received at the police department when the alarm is activated.

Municipal employees whose wages and benefits are not negotiated by other bargaining units are to receive an eight per cent increase in compensation beginning July 1.

A report indicated contract agreement was reached with the Teamsters Union and employees of the Park and Cemetery Department and the increase would be given city employees with the exception of the Board of Public Works, police and fire departments.

John R. Bloemendaal, 192 West 12th St., asked council whether any public funds would be used to promote a favorable vote for the proposed regional authority to operate the hospital. If so, Bloemendaal asked, would the same amount of funds be used to promote the opposite view.

Residents of the Holland area will be voting in August on creation of such an authority to assume responsibility of the hospital.

Jim Bridge, hospital finance director, said private fund contributions were being sought to pay for a promotional campaign and no public funds would be used in the campaign.

Council received a request from Donnelly Mirrors, Inc., 49 West Third St., to prohibit parking on Third St. from the railroad tracks east to River Ave. The matter was tabled.

Council was informed of public meetings July 20 in City Hall concerning a US-31 business route transportation corridor study by the Michigan Department of State Highways and Transportation.

The hearings are designed to hear citizen views and suggestions to improve capacity and safety along the business route through Holland to meet future needs. The hearings will be held from 1 to 4 p.m. and 7 to 9 p.m.



Historic Zeeland Trek Scheduled



Hamilton Rejects Increased Funds

Council Okays Four Movings

After a 40 - minute hearing Wednesday during which several objections were heard to proposed moving of homes into a neighborhood at Van Raalte Ave. and 25th St., Holland City Council approved four of the six requests.

One request scheduled for the hearing was withdrawn by the applicant, Richard Dietz, and another request was tabled.

A petition bearing the names of 15 persons living in the area was submitted, another petition with 12 names was presented to council and three persons appeared before council, all objecting to the requested house moving permits.

Speaking against the movings were Ronald Michmerhuizen Jr., 265 West 24th St., Ronald Essenburg, 276 West 25th St., and the Rev. Darwin Salisbury, 253 West 25th St.

Residents generally objected to having 1½ story homes moved into an area of single-story ranch - styled homes and to lot size requirements.

A letter from Carol Nash, 106 East 30th St., objected to the house movings because of potential damage to trees along the proposed moving routes.

Council voted to table action on a moving request for a residence at 181 West 25th St. to 271 West 24th St.

Approved were moving permits for 172 West 24th St. to 623 Van Raalte Ave.; 168 West 24th to 615 Van Raalte, 180 West 24th to 234 West 25th and 590 Maple to 449 West 32nd.

None of the votes was unanimous. Russell De Vette, Elmer Wissink and Beatrice Weststrate voted against three proposals and De Vette against a fourth.

In other land matters, council adopted a recommendation from the Holland Hospital board to declare property at 177 West 25th St. as surplus and to dispose of the structure for a parking lot.

Council directed the clerk to advertise for bids on city-owned property along the west side of Ottawa Ave. south from 32nd to 40th St.

The land is 38 feet wide and 297 feet long and a minimum bid of \$5,925 was established.

A letter from Russel Homkes and Mrs. Paul Vroom offering to sell property at 252 Fairbanks Ave. to the city for \$6,000 was referred to the City Manager.

Council accepted the low bid of Motorola, Inc. of \$12,613 for a HERN radio communications system for Holland City Hospital to provide communications between the hospital emergency room, other area hospitals and local ambulance services.

The local share is \$3,783.90 with the remainder coming from funds through the Michigan Office of Highway Safety Planning and the United States Department of Transportation.

Council accepted the low bid of Ottagan Plumbing to replace cold water mains in Civic Center. The bid was \$3,999. Other bids were Reimink Plumbing, \$4,700; Koster Plumbing, \$4,924, and Breuker & Den Bleyker, \$5,328.

West Ottawa Millage Wins by 87 Votes

School Carries By 64 Votes

West Ottawa voters narrowly approved by 87 votes a request for 20.4 mills for one year of operation Monday, 1,470 to 1,383. Voters had defeated a similar request in April.

Approximately 43 per cent of the district's 7,000 registered voters cast their ballots.

Ed Haltenhoff was returned to the Board of Education for a second term and Charles C. Ferrell was elected in a close contest.

Haltenhoff received 1,155 votes; Ferrell, 1,124; Carol Smith, 1,065; Corneal J. Israels, 1,003 and J. Bernard Vonk, 804.

West Ottawa Supt. Brad Henson expressed his appreciation to all district voters stating that "the outcome averted a step backwards in the educational program in West Ottawa. This was a very serious need for the district to continue the basic level of education it has become accustomed to since it was organized."

"We are happy the vote was successful at this time so we have the balance of the summer for planning a smooth school opening in the fall," Henson added.

The approval of 20.4 mills coupled with the county allocation of 8.445 exceeds the state minimum of 28 mills a district must levy to participate fully in state aid.

The approved millage will mean an increase to property owners of \$1.50 for each \$1,000 of assessed valuation.

The total tax levy is identical to the 1971-74 rates but 1.5 mills higher than the 1975 rate. The approved millage will be reflected in December tax bills. The board terms of Haltenhoff and Carl Schaaffenaar, who did not seek reelection, will expire on June 30. The new officers will be installed at the July 19 meeting.

Holland school district voters Monday approved a \$4.7 million bond issue for a new junior high school by 64 votes and school superintendent Donald Ihman said the board hoped the vote would "not be that close."

The bond issue was approved 2,593 to 2,529.

Voters rejected a proposal for twin junior high schools Dec. 17, 1973 when the board asked approval of a \$6.8 million bond issue.

Voters returned Charles L. Bradford to the board of Education with 4,099 votes. Bradford was the only candidate for the four-year term.

One-third of the registered voters in the school district went to the polls. City Clerk Donald Schipper said 15,675 persons were registered in the district. Of those, 5,220 cast ballots.

Ihman said it was hoped the new school on a 32-acre site at Plasman Ave. and 24th St., would be completed by January, 1978. Bonds probably would be sold in September or October.

The board and architects are

to meet to develop final plans for the new building which will house eighth and ninth grade students.

"We had a feeling the vote might be close," Ihman said today. "We hoped it would not be that close."

Ihman said plans for the disposal of the west unit of the Junior High School would be studied and added that no decision has to be made until the summer before the new building will be occupied.

Plans call for renovation of the east unit on River Ave. for use by the seventh grade. The older building on Pine Ave. has been suggested for use by community and adult education programs.

Construction and equipping of the new junior high will be paid for with a 30-year bond issue.

Roger Sparks Found Guilty Of Murder

ALLEGAN — Roger Sparks, 19, of South Haven, was found guilty of first degree murder Tuesday in the stabbing death of a Michigan State University coed who was visiting her parents during the Christmas holidays.


Sparks slammed his fist into a table and his wife ran sobbing from the courtroom when the verdict was announced by a jury in Allegan County Circuit Court.

The verdict capped three hours of jury deliberations in a five-day trial before Judge George Corsiglia.

Sparks was accused in the death of Deborah Knapp, 19, of South Haven, whose body was found Dec. 22 south of Saugatuck. Police said she had been stabbed 55 times and sexually assaulted.

Miss Knapp's car was found in the Black River in South Haven at about the same time her body was discovered. The young woman was home to be with her parents during the Christmas holidays at the time of the murder.

During the trial, Sparks admitted he was with Miss Knapp the night of the murder, but denied killing her.

GVSC Okays Tuition Hike

ALLENDALE — The board of control of Grand Valley State College, meeting in regular session Friday, ratified action by GVSC President Arend D. Lubbers, and confirmed a \$1 increase in tuition for summer term, 1976.

The increase will raise undergraduate tuition for Michigan residents from \$15 to \$16 per credit hour. Graduate rates will raise for Michigan residents from \$20 per credit hour to \$21.

The Board further resolved, "That if the state appropriation and other revenue are not sufficient to meet minimum operating expenditures, the President is authorized to increase tuition and fees further, up to the maximum authorized by the Board of Control in April 1976." That action set the level of increase at between \$1 and \$2 per credit hour.

The Board welcomed new member Paul Phillips, executive director of the Grand Rapids Urban League, named to the post last month by Governor William G. Milliken to succeed the late Kenneth W. Robinson.

In other action, the Board of Control approved a 6.9 per cent total compensation increase for faculty and staff. The Board also approved creation of a new Performing Arts Center which will concentrate efforts of the Colleges in music, dance and theatre. Arthur C. Hills, vice president of the colleges, will serve as director of the center for the time being.

Representative of many fine letters in the wake of Tulip Time is this one from Mr. and Mrs. W. Frank Simmers of New Holland, Pa., who regarded their three-day Tulip Time visit as one of the most thrilling experiences of recent years.

"The organization of your program, the friendliness of your people and the general atmosphere of the festivities were most outstanding. One need not be in town very long to detect the solid foundation of the people built on the Christian principles that has made our country great."

"This is the type of 'America' we need to preserve and I thank God for people with the moral fortitude to stand up for it like you have in Holland, Mich. . . . You have a great city made up of great people. Be certain you preserve your heritage," the letter read.




Christian Plans 75th Anniversary

Noted Artist, Nat Steinberg, Dies in Douglas

His long and distinguished career began at the Art Institute of Chicago where he lived until his retirement to Douglas in 1967. He had his first show at the age of 20 and has oils and etchings in the British Museum, the Smithsonian and the Vatican Galleries in Rome. His portrait of Pope Paul VI hangs in the Vatican.

Steinberg knew and worked with Ben Hecht and Charles MacArthur when they were all involved in newspaper work in the late twenties. In those days "Chicago Today" was known as the Chicago American.

On his 80th birthday in 1973, Steinberg was honored at a birthday party by many friends in Douglas. Among his many congratulations and good wishes were those from President and Mrs. Nixon, Mrs. Dwight Eisenhower, Mayor Richard Daley of Chicago and many U.S. and state political figures.

In 1938 he married Isabel Schuham who survives him. A brother, Dr. Ellis Steinberg of Park Forest, Ill., and a sister-in-law, Ambrosine Schuham, who lived with the Steinbergs, also survive.

Although retired officially, Steinberg did much charity work for the Community Hospital and the Attic Shop in Douglas. He designed the Douglas Centennial posters in 1970 and also the proposed Bicentennial bandstand for Saugatuck's Wicks Park on the waterfront.

GVSC Graduates Told To Renew Faith in Education

ALLEDALE — A representation of renewal of faith in the educational process that is the hope of our country as well as the hope of mankind, were the descriptions of this nation's college graduates, as presented by Dr. Hertha Hirnberg, Austrian Minister of Science and Research, and eminent U.S. scholar and historian, Dr. John Hope Franklin of Chicago University, to more than 575 graduates of Grand Valley State Colleges on Saturday.

Dr. Hirnberg, recipient of the Doctor of Laws honorary degree, and Dr. Franklin, recipient of the Doctor of Letters honorary degree, were presented at the GVSC Commencement by Arend D. Lubbers, president of Grand Valley State Colleges.

Dr. Franklin, who was honored as historian, educator, orchidologist, and humanitarian, has been a prolific writer about the United States, the history of the South and the Black experience, for more than 30 years. Franklin notes on the eve of the nation's Bicentennial that 200 years may not be a long time in the history of mankind, but it is quite a long time in the history of Western democracies.

He charged that although "we are the richest nation in the world, with resources to send men to the moon and to send troops halfway around the world, we are too poor to maintain a system of education that will assure the well-being of our own children."

"As the nation observes its founding," he told the commencement audience, "we are in desperate need of the kind of creativity that you (the graduates) can offer if we are to solve the nation's problems. It is no time to celebrate with

garish parades, hallow-sounding reaffirmations of the greatness of our Founding Fathers, empty phrases about all men being free and equal. Our slums are nothing of which to be proud, nor are our unemployment statistics, our polluted air, our woefully inadequate schools, our sex and racial discrimination."

"A sober look at ourselves at this time," Dr. Franklin advised, "should result in a blending of pride with humility, joy with compassion, and our sense of power with a sense of justice."

Dr. Hirnberg, the first woman to hold such a high ranking position in the Austrian government, was honored as scholar, political scientist, feminist, and political leader. After expressing her gratitude to Grand Valley for being invited to an






