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Girl's Body Is Found In Locker

Tot, 3, Reported Dead
Of Unnatural Causes;
Foul Play Suspected

GRAND HAVEN — A little girl whose body was found in a bloody foot locker in a bedroom of her mother's home in Nunica Monday night was said to have died from "unnatural causes," an autopsy report revealed Tuesday.

State Police from the Grand Haven post said they expected foul play in the death of three-year-old Helen Marie Hunzinger, daughter of Mrs. Doris Hunzinger of Dickinson Road, Nunica, and Harry Hunzinger of California.

Medical examiner, Dr. Peter A. McArthur of Grand Haven, would say today only that death was due to "unnatural causes." The child's body was to be examined further by a Muskegon pathologist Dr. Eugene U. Lange to determine exact cause of death.

Mrs. Hunzinger told police her estranged husband had picked up their daughter about 1 p.m. last Friday. She told officers she had called her mother's house in Muskegon Monday afternoon and that her husband had answered the phone and said the child was dead and that her body was in the trunk in the home which Mrs. Hunzinger and her three children shared with Richard Traxler in Nunica.

State Police Cpl. Darl Dykert said the woman told officers she had not seen her husband since he drove away with Helen Friday. She offered no explanation as to how the body got into the Traxler home where she and her three children have lived for the past four months.

Dykert said there was blood "around the head area."

Detective Steve Cloonan of the Grand Haven post said the girl had apparently been in the trunk for several days. The trunk measured 17 inches wide by 31 inches long and 13 inches deep.

Mrs. Hunzinger and Traxler reported finding the body to State Police at about 8:30 p.m. Monday.

Hunzinger's whereabouts was not known.

Ottawa County prosecutor James Bussard said Tuesday that no warrant had been issued. He said he was awaiting the results of the autopsy report.

Bussard said the child's death was surrounded by "suspicious circumstances" but that his office was "not ready to do anything at all" at the present time. He said "our investigation is continuing."

Mrs. Hunzinger left her husband about nine months ago, Dykert said, and moved here from California where her husband still lives.

Dykert quoted Mrs. Hunzinger as saying she did not object to Hunzinger's seeing the child since she felt her husband had equal custody rights of their children.

Members of the State Police crime laboratory in Lansing were called in to aid the investigation of the child's death.

The girl's body was to be taken to the Lee Funeral Home in Muskegon Heights following the autopsy.

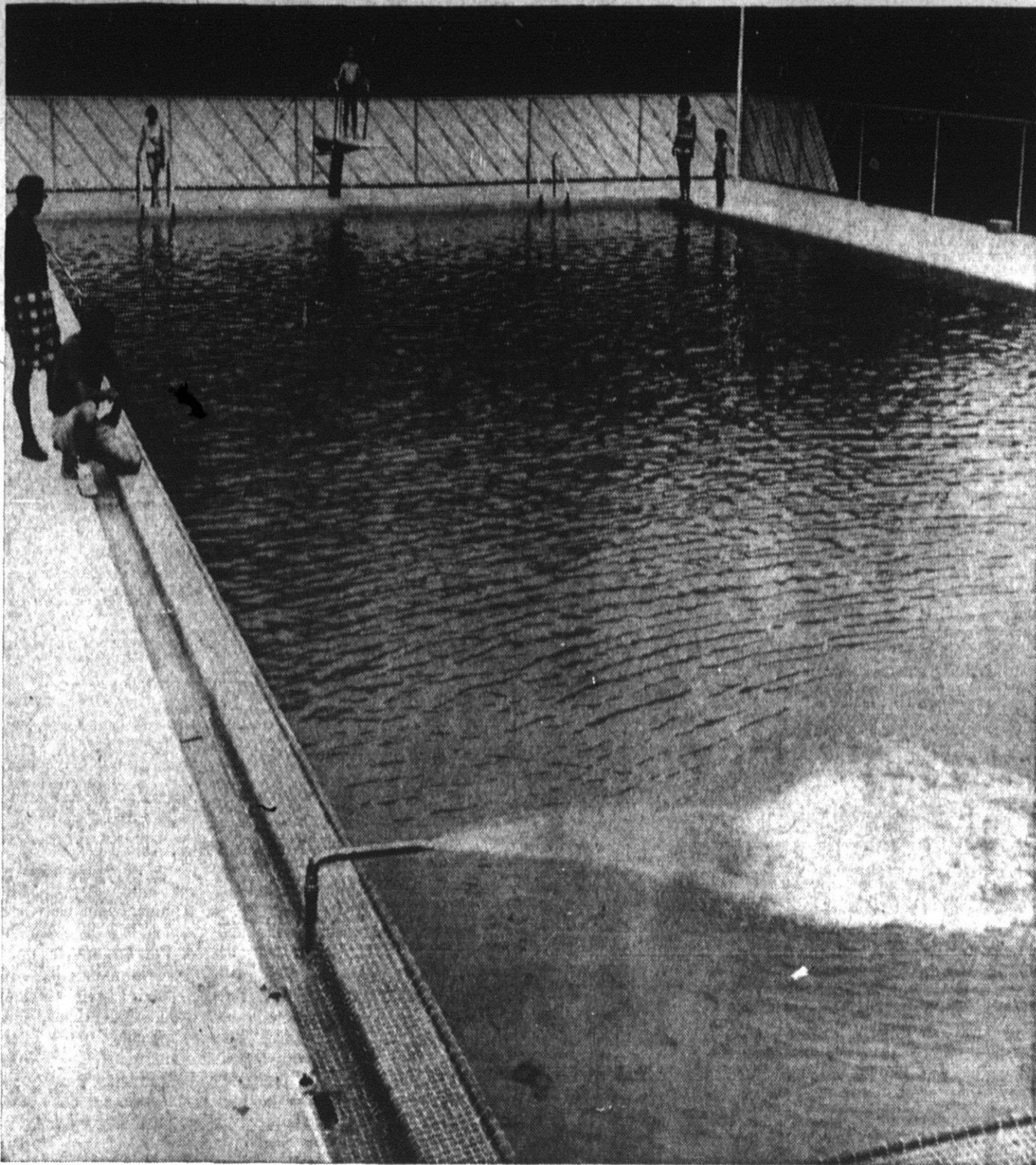

Camp Geneva Features New Olympic-Size Pool

Swimming in a new Olympic-size pool will highlight athletic activities at the Reformed Church in America's Camp Geneva this summer.

The new \$50,000 heated pool was begun Feb. 16 and had its first swimmers this week.

One diving board extends over the deepest area of the pool, 10.5 feet deep. The shallowest portion of the graduated depth pool is 3.5 feet deep. Inspected and approved by state officials, the pool will have three lifeguards on duty, Roger Rozeboom, Marsha Heins and Dennis Hendricks, all certified Water Safety Instructors. Swimming instruction will be given. The pool accommodates 150 persons. Campers can also swim in Lake Michigan.

The Rev. Leonard Weessies,

director of the Reformed Church Youth Synod, is director assisted by Ken Bauman, Holland High School athletic director and a staff of 29.

Camp Geneva, located off Lake Shore Dr. on the shore of Lake Michigan, has expanded its program this year to include a camping session for the handicapped including blind, deaf and orthopedic children; a post high retreat and a senior high retreat; as well as swimming instruction. The session for the handicapped youngsters, ages 10 to 18, was held last week Wednesday through Friday.

The camp offers many athletic activities such as swimming, archery, basketball, football, tennis, volleyball and ping pong as well as instruction and discussions on the principles of

Christian life. This year the camp expanded its arts and crafts program to include ceramics under the instruction of arts and crafts director Carolyn Olsen, teacher in the Hudsonville school system.

Included on Camp Geneva's grounds in addition to the new pool are a chapel, dining hall, directors quarters, recreation building, an outside amphitheatre which seats 400, a clinic with a full time nurse, tennis courts and eight cabins, each of which accommodates 32. Services at the chapel on Sunday morning at 10 are open to the public.

Camp Director Weessies estimates that 3000 persons will use the camp's facilities throughout the summer. Besides the regular sessions and retreats being held this summer a training workshop will be held for church youth group sponsors and other adults of the church in late August.

Donald Van Ark is camp manager.

Camp Geneva also has a CIT (Counselor In Training) program in conjunction with the Hope College teaching department. Ten CITs receive six credit hours each in psychology for their work at the camp.

Camp opened June 14 with the first of five junior sessions which each run for five days, with campers of 6th and 7th grade age. Junior High sessions with mixed groups are for eighth, ninth and tenth grade students. Senior High retreats are for those entering 10th, 11th or 12th grades. There is also one post high retreat.

Supervisors Wind Up June Session

GRAND HAVEN—The Ottawa County board of supervisors held a long meeting Wednesday afternoon, concluding a heavy agenda to wind up its three-day June session.

The meeting was highlighted with several matters that pointed to financial problems which must be faced at the October budget session, which opens Oct. 10.

The regular board meeting followed a tour of the enlarged facilities and improvements recently completed at the county 4-H camp at Camp Pottawatomie near Grand Haven. The recreation committee entertained the board members and some county officers at a barbecue chicken dinner.

City Manager Herb Holt of Holland, substituting for Mayor Nelson Bosman, urged members to prepare for updating of salaries of all county employees next year. The action came after Sheriff Bernard Grysens appeared before the board and asked that salaries for his deputies be updated to conform with recent increases for patrolmen on the city police departments at Grand Haven and Holland.

Supervisor Lawrence Wade of Holland moved that the Michigan Municipal League be engaged to update the salary schedule for all county workers at a cost not to exceed \$1,500. The plan was approved by the board.

At the end of Tuesday's meeting, Holt also recommended an administrative procedure study be made in the county in connection with the operation of the various law enforcement departments, including the sheriff's departments, city police and state police. A review of the operations of all police forces should be made, he said, to determine whether there are any duplications of services. The board voted down, 18 to 15, the plan, which would cost \$7,000, with most of the city supervisors voting for the study.

The operation of the county community action committee under the Economic Opportunity act program was again discussed and the board again

decided not to give the program in Ottawa its official "blessing" until more information is obtained. A new EOA committee is now functioning in the county after the first committee, under Chairman William Kennedy of Allenale, resigned last January. The board again refused to name a representative on the new committee and voted to table any action until the October session.

Mrs. Marvin Verplank of Zeeland was named to the county library board, replacing Jack Taylor of Zeeland, who resigned. Holt reported that Holland city is meeting difficulty with its municipal land fill operation at the city dump because of reported pollution of waters and asked that the county board's water and sanitation committee investigate the feasibility of solving the problem on a county-wide basis for disposal of rubbish and garbage.

Engineer - Manager William Osmer of the road commission reviewed plans for the development of the Harger Hardwood park and arboretum near Hudsonville and outlined a proposal for its development, recommended by the donor of the property to the road commission. The plans were referred to the committee on roads and parks and to the road commission, who will confer with the donor and report back to the board.

The board voted to transfer \$29,000 in surplus funds derived from fees in county offices to the building and improvements fund. The improvements fund now has \$82,009 and some of the members suggested the surplus funds be retained in the general fund to ease the squeeze expected in October. The board voted to transfer the funds to the improvement fund by a vote of 23 to 10.

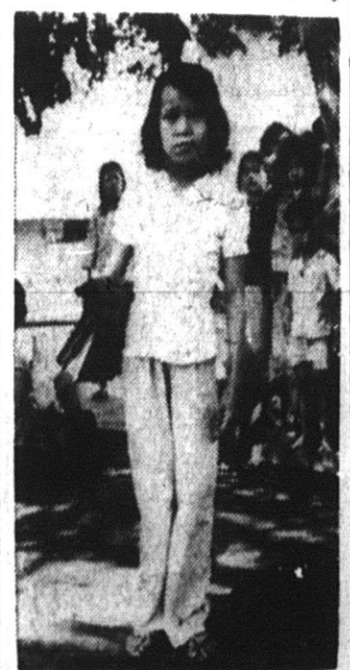

Horizon Club 'Adopts' Girl

Nhieu Tran Thi, a fourteen-year-old Vietnamese girl, has been financially adopted by all Horizon Club members of the Holland Council of Camp Fire Girls.

Nhieu's father was a simple, hard-working man, a coolie. He was devoted to his family and managed to provide for their needs although they were always poor. Then he developed an ailment of the spleen and was sent to the public hospital for treatment. His death left a widow and a family of nine children desolate and destitute.

She has five brothers, Sang, Tai, 13, Loi, 11, and Manh, 7; three sisters, Tot, 13, Em, 10, and Nga, 6. Sang helps whenever he can but his small salary

aids little. Mai and Tot have finished primary school and the first year of secondary school but now they both work. Mai sells newspapers along the streets to earn about 34 cents a day and Tot helps her maternal grandmother carry water for sale and earns another 55 cents a day.

Tai is in secondary school. Loi, Em, Nga and Nhieu are all studying. The mother has found a job as a maid servant and earns about \$9.62 a month plus her own meals. The maternal grandmother cares for the house and children.

Chris-Craft Strike Settled

Most of the 546 workers of the Holland Chris-Craft plant were back at work Tuesday following approval of a new three-year contract by members of three unions Monday night.

Workers at the plant had been on strike since March 17.

The workers voted 201 to 113 to accept a 38-cent an hour wage and fringe benefit package spread over a three year period at a meeting at the North Shore Community Hall Monday night.

The contract calls for a 15-cent per hour raise this year, 12 cents next year and 11 cents in 1968. The contract also has a section calling for full arbitration of all disputes which might arise during the life of the contract. The workers had a limited arbitration agreement in past contracts.

The three unions at the Chris-Craft plant are local 2391, United Carpenters and Joiners of America, local 1418, International Association of Machinists, and local 1481, Brotherhood of Painters, Decorators and Paperhangers of America. All are associated with the AFL-CIO.

The contract approved by Hol-

land workers is similar to one approved last week by workers at the Cadillac Chris-Craft plant, according to Russell J. Fredricks, vice-president of Chris-Craft Corp. The Cadillac workers had been on strike for 13 weeks.

Workers at the Algonac Chris-Craft plant remain on strike after rejecting a company offer last week.

Workers at the Holland plant rejected a previous company offer for a 38-cent package over three years earlier this month. The previous offer called for annual raises of 13 cents this year, 13 cents next year and 12 cents in 1968.

About 100 workers at the Holland plant are not in the three unions, but non-union members respected the picket lines and signed agreements to cooperate with the strike.

Some 220 workers of Holland plant of the Roamer Yacht Co., a division of Chris-Craft Corp., are also on strike. They are represented by Local 67 of the United Boat Builders, Christian Labor Association.

Program Is Tabled By Board

GRAND HAVEN — The Ottawa county board of supervisors tabled any action in giving its "blessing" to the controversial Economic Opportunity Act program in the county at the board's opening meeting of the June session here Monday afternoon.

William L. Kennedy, former supervisor from Allendale and former chairman of the county community action committee which resigned early in 1966, appeared before the board to explain the reason for his committee's action.

He reviewed the activity of his committee, starting in 1964, and explained that the group was unable to obtain federal approval and official recognition from the regional office at Chicago. He said that the regional office demanded that an administrator and a staff be named to administer the program in Ottawa, at a cost of \$20,000 a year. "I didn't think it necessary," he said, "to go to that expense and resigned." When he informed the committee of his decision the entire committee of 32 members resigned, he said.

Gerry Bosworth of Kalamazoo, recently named west Michigan director of the program, was also present at the meeting and reported a new committee, under Ralph Richman of Holland, has been formed, with 60 members involved. City Manager Herb Holt of Holland, substituting for Mayor Nelson Bosman, urged that the board recognize the new committee and name one of its members to the new group. Following a motion by Holt, Henry Slaughter, supervisor from Tallmadge township, who is opposed to the program, made a substitute motion "To drop the whole thing."

A roll call was taken and the vote ended in a tie, after which the matter was tabled until another meeting.

Arthur Elmer, supervisor of parks of the Michigan department of conservation, and several other department officials, appeared before the board in connection with the use of Holland State Park. The conservation department has been granted use of former county park lands near the state park by the state supreme court and early this year purchased additional property on Lake Macatawa.

Planners have recommended that buildings be relocated at the park and that a new entrance be installed so that the park may operate more efficiently.

Under an agreement between the state and the county permission to erect the buildings must be obtained from the board of supervisors and Elmer was asked to submit a definite proposal to the board as soon as possible, after which time it will be referred to the parks and roads committee of the board.

A large group of citizens was present at the opening of the Monday meeting of the board to witness the opening of a large copper box taken from the cornerstone of the old courthouse, now being razed. Former Board Chairman Richard L. Cook of Grand Haven opened the box and was assisted by Williams Wilds of Grand Haven, a county clerk 24 years, and George Swart, a former board member from Grand Haven. In the box were the Holy Bible, several valuable historical documents and a history of the settlement, photos of the first courthouse on Second street and the foundation of the old courthouse as it

looked in 1893, copies of all the newspapers in the county, catalogues of Hope college at Holland and the Akeley Institute at Grand Haven, and several copies of the printed programs of the laying of the cornerstone.

Stuart Poei, finance officer of the city of Grand Haven, was seated as a supervisor from this city, succeeding his father, former City Clerk J. Nyhof Poei. The board donated an old flag pole, taken from the old building, to the American Legion, to be placed at the new James Lee memorial chapel at Lake Forest cemetery, now under construction.

Aid Funds Are Okayed By Board

GRAND HAVEN — The Ottawa county board of supervisors Tuesday voted unanimously to take advantage of state aid money in connection with a mental health program under the public act 54 of 1963. Ottawa thus follows Muskegon and Kent counties in coming under the program, through which the state will pay 75 per cent of the cost of a program, which will include the employment of a part-time or full-time psychiatrist. There are no full-time psychiatrists practicing in the county at this time.

The five recommendations adopted by the board include:

1. That the county board name a 12-member community health board, as prescribed under the act.

2. The board will plan and budget a program of mental health for county residents in accordance with the act.

3. The health board will make use of the existing mental health agencies in the county, using the agencies on a cooperative basis under rules of the state department of health.

4. A working arrangement will be made with the hospitals in the county at Zeeland, Holland and Grand Haven to provide temporary in-patient care for mentally ill patients with the use of swing units.

5. The county mental health board will appoint a qualified doctor to administer the mental health program either on a full-time or part-time basis, with an adequate salary.

The mental health planning committee of the county medical society, Dr. P. J. McArthur of Grand Haven, chairman, requested a study be made a year ago and the study committee made its recommendation to the supervisors Tuesday. Raymond Vander Laan, supervisor from Hudsonville, is chairman of the study group.

Dr. Wendell Rooks of the West Shore Mental Health Clinic at Muskegon explained the act to the board and said that Ottawa is "big enough" to have its own program, separate from adjoining counties. Vander Laan reported that \$29,000 was spent in Ottawa last year through the West Shore clinic. The funds were given by the board of supervisors and community chests. He suggested that with this amount of money raised locally matching funds from the state would make possible a budget of \$116,000.

On the committee with Vander Laan are Mayor Frank Hoogland of Zeeland, Maynard Van Lente of Muskegon, Dr. Ralph Ten Have, county health director, and Supervisors Henry Slaughter of Lamont and George Wessel and R. L. Cook of Grand Haven.

The board met for its final meeting of the June session at 1:30 p.m. today, after inspecting Camp Pottawatomie at Grand Haven and enjoying a chicken barbecue dinner at the camp, arranged by the recreation committee.

Nov. 8 was set as the date for a special election in Georgetown township on the proposed annexation of a small tract of land in the township to the city of Hudsonville. The annual county picnic for county employees and board members will be held at Pottawatomie Aug. 24.

Village Manager William Blasik informed the board the Spring Lake village council has voted down a proposal to transfer the point property near the new M104 bridge to the county for park purposes.

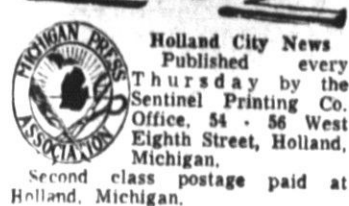
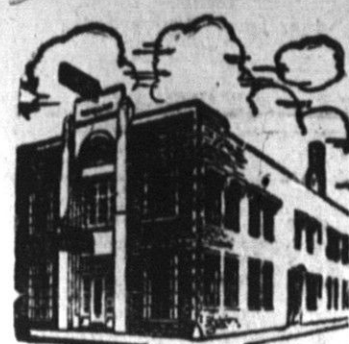
She was a member of Bethel Reformed Church, the Ladies Aid and Guild, and the Adult Bible Class.

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AN OBJECT LESSON

There was a time when Kwame Nkrumah of Ghana seemed destined to become the leader of all African nations. A good many Westerners flirted with him in spite of the fact that he seemed most footsy with communism. A coup, carried out while Nkrumah was visiting Peking, threw him out of power, but also uncovered the whole story of his ambitions.

Nkrumah insisted that African nations follow his leadership, and that they meet with him for discussions. Now the Ghanaian government has released its top secret information on his activities. With the aid of both Chinese and Russian communists, he was busy preparing Red agents to carry on their work all over Africa. Equipment for his undercover army, not the regular Ghanaian army, was of such proportions that a well-planned war might have been mounted. His secret schools, manned by Russians and Chinese, were preparing for the day when he would take over any country ripe for revolution.

Some of the most sophisticated spying equipment was in use by Nkrumah agents, and the rooms of those who came to discuss policy with him were thoroughly bugged.

The story as presented by the Ghanaian government ought to be another object lesson, more so for those Western nations who thought they might use Nkrumah as a good image of democracy. Again and again we have been taken in by those who claimed for themselves the name of democracy, only to find their actions peculiarly Marxist. Castro kept us in suspense until he was ready to strike out with the full and open aid of Russia. Nkrumah would certainly have done so. Those who insisted that Juan Bosch had the overwhelming support of the Dominican people have been proved wrong.

There is little doubt that we ought always to be open to change, and that includes changes in attitudes. But we ought also to be careful about whose stripes have merely been painted over.

Sunday School Lesson

Sunday, July 3
God's Right to Command
Exodus 20:1-2; Leviticus 18:1-5;
Hosea 11:1, 3, 4a; John 14:10, 15

During the third quarter we will study the Ten Commandments recorded in Exodus 20 and Deuteronomy 5 as they are interpreted by Jesus. The thirteen lessons are divided in two units, the first dealing with "Man's Relationship to God" and the other one is on "Man's Relationship to Man." The first lesson teaches the forgotten fact that God has the right to give orders to His creatures—a timely truth to study on the Sunday before July 4.

I. God gives orders. He has authority. "And God spake all these words," so reads Scripture. Israel remained around Mt. Sinai about a year. There God made a covenant with Israel.

At Sinai God gave the Ten Commandments, called the Moral Law and the Decalogue, to the nation. In the preface to the Decalogue God revealed Himself as a Person and a Lawgiver, and a Deliverer. God has authority—therefore He gave us His Law. He has power, therefore He delivered Israel from Egypt's bondage. The New Testament tells us that God delivers from sin.

After the revelation of the Person comes the revelation of the Law. If we honor the Person we will also honor His Law. God revealed Himself in order that we may know and love Him—show love by obedience, and thus reveal distinctiveness. Israel's conduct should differ from that of Egypt and of Canaan. Today many people who claim to be God's people, fail to show by their lives that they differ from the godless.

II. God loves—this the prophet Hosea teaches. Hosea's wife had been faithless to him. The prophet learned from this sad experience. As his wife's faithlessness grieved him, so the faithlessness of Israel grieved God. The prophet portrays God as the Father and Israel the son whom He had called out of Egypt, led and trained in the wilderness. "I taught Ephraim also to go," as an earthly father guides his children and teaches them to walk, so God taught Israel.

The prophet also compares God to a good ox-driver who instead of whipping oxen draws them, encourages them and touches their tired heads with his hands. How patient God was with Israel. And how patient God is with us! God does not use harsh methods until it is absolutely necessary. That is love's way. Eventually God ceased to be patient with Israel—and He will not always be patient with us.

III. God wants obedience. The last portion of the lesson text is from John 14. Philip, the apostle, asked Jesus, "Lord show us the Father," and Jesus said in reply that He was in God and God was in Him and that His words had the authority of God behind them. And therefore Jesus expected obedience. "If ye love Me, keep my commandments." Love moves us to obedience.

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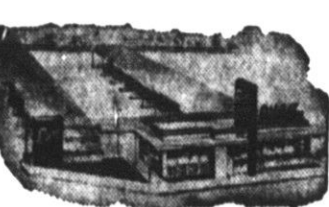

Allegan City Council Okays Plan

ALLEGAN — Allegan's city council wound up a 4½ hour session Monday night by taking decisive action on several important matters.

Culminating a two-year study, final approval was given to a pension plan for all eligible city employees — to go into effect Friday.

The plan provides a lifetime income—at normal retirement age 65—based on a combination of earned income and number of years service to the city. The monthly benefit will be equal to 1 per cent of monthly earnings multiplied by total years service.

To be eligible to participate in the plan, an employee must be 30 years old and have been employed by the city for three years. No employee will have a vested interest in the fund until after 10 years of continuous service. At age 30 he may pick up a maximum five years past service toward his 10-year requirement.

Funds for the trust type plan will be held and invested by the Old Kent Bank, Grand Rapids. Actuarial consultants are Watkins, Neuman and Ross, Inc. also of Grand Rapids.

In the same action, council also approved Mayor C. J. Smith's appointment of a pension administrative committee made up of councilman Robert Bergstrom, city employee C. R. Brower and city treasurer T. R. Ware.

Smith, Bergstrom and Ware served on the pension study committee and presented the pension plan in the form of a new city ordinance.

In other significant action, council approved taking the initial step toward application for federal assistance in urban renewal which would be to fill out the workable program form and file it with federal officials.

"In view of the strong recommendation by the Allegan Area Chamber of Commerce" council members resolved to seek federal certification of the program for community improvement.

No actual request for urban renewal funds is involved in this initial phase. Upon certification of their plan, the city's next step would be to submit a survey and planning application and estimate of execution costs, along with a request for advancement of planning funds.

The workable program as defined by HUD official Madeleine Hastings, present at Monday's meeting, would include analysis of the city's zoning and building codes and ordinances, development of a comprehensive plan, analysis of liabilities and assets of the project area, evidence of co-operation between city planning organizations, statement of local funds already budgeted for the project and evidence of city-wide participation.

Allegan's projected \$150,000 down-town parking program—for which an assessment district has been set up—would not be eligible for federal funds unless it became part of overall urban renewal. In this latter event, the city might be credited with amounts spent in excess of 25 per cent of total urban renewal costs. The government would bear the remaining 75 per cent.

In further business, the council took the following action:

—Set Thursday, July 28, as the date for a special meeting to discuss Consumers Power Company's proposal to purchase Allegan's municipal power plant, with the public to be invited to come and express their opinions concerning the proposal.

—Accepted the low bid of \$17,945 submitted by Yerington & Harris, Benton Harbor and Al-

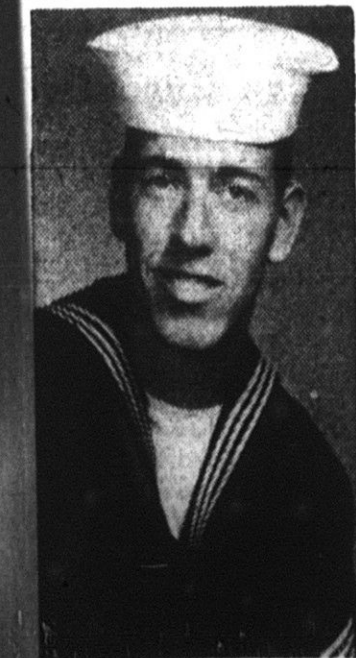

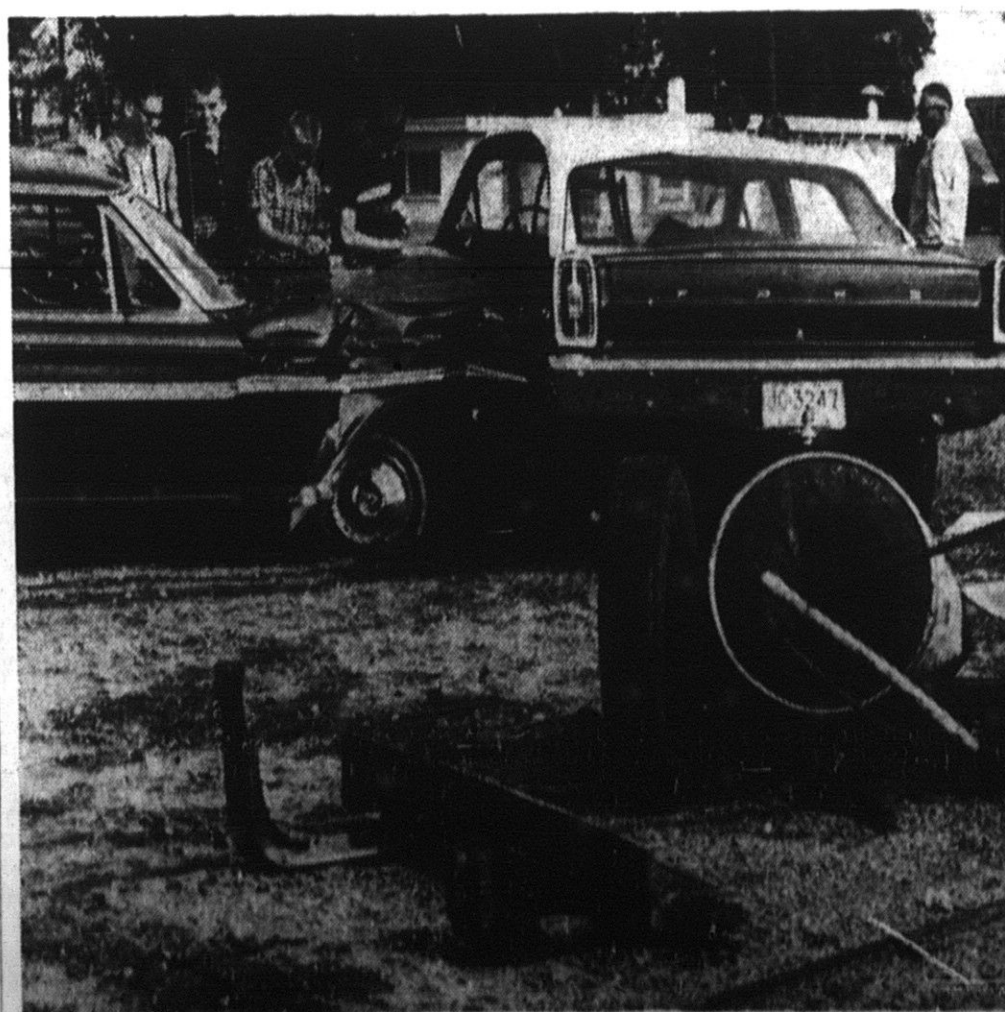
