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## More Court Space Set For County

GRAND HAVEN — Ottawa County Board of Supervisors Tuesday gave the go-ahead signal to proceed with plans and specifications for a new \$250,000 addition to the county building for additional court room space.

Need for additional room comes five years earlier than was expected when the building was dedicated in 1965 and Tuesday's action also alters plans for landscaping.

The new construction will be added to the Fourth St. wing joining with the west end of the county jail. Plans had called for a parking lot in this area and bids were to be taken July 10. The improvements committee is working on changes.

Architects estimate cost of the new addition at \$250,000 to \$275,000. It will have a second court room, jury room and offices for circuit court. It will be financed out of the county improvements fund, Gerrit Bottema, chairman of the ways and means committee, said the fund currently has about \$250,000.

The board transferred \$47,575 from the general fund to the improvement fund Tuesday, representing monies collected from fees, interest and the like. Earmarked in this fund is about \$60,000 for improvements to the county infirmary at Eastmanville and \$35,000 for landscaping and parking lots at the county building.

In the interim, it is expected circuit court will occasionally use the large court room of the probate judge for nonjury circuit court cases. Circuit court has been using the supervisors room. Additional facilities particularly are needed when both circuit judges, Raymond L. Smith and Chester Ray, are holding court.

In other business, the board voted 25 to 11 to engage Public Administration Service, a Chicago firm of specialists, to make a technical study of police services in the county, aimed toward greater efficiency and cooperation among county, city, township, village and state law agencies. Ottawa population currently exceeds 100,000.

The study will be based on proposals to improve services by possible jurisdictional consolidation, contractual arrangements, inter-municipal coordination or other proposals.

Some rural members and Robert Murray of Coopersville opposed spending up to \$10,000 for such a study. Murray said the contingent fund couldn't stand such an expenditure and Gerrit Bottema moved that the proposal be tabled until October, but this was defeated. Howard Fant of Grand Haven felt that a coordinated program could save taxpayers 10 to 20 per cent in future years. Urban board members claim that cities which have their own police departments are paying too much of the county program.

The board also approved a new training procedure for law enforcement officers as recommended by the sheriff's committee. A recommendation of Civil Defense Director Glenn Timmer for a county ordinance on developing disaster shelters in new public structures was referred to the Civil Defense committee with orders to report in October.

Mrs. Heerbert Van Klompenberg of Hudsonville was reappointed to the county library board.

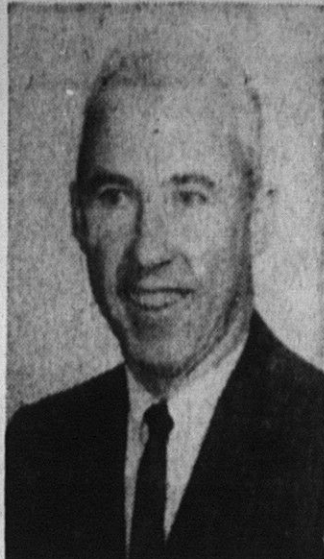
County Welfare Director Larry Hilldore explained the need of qualified nursing homes for county patients who receive Medicaid. He said after Jan. 1 these patients must be placed in approved facilities or federal aid will stop.

He said only two nursing homes in the county at present qualify for Medicaid standards and two more may meet qualifications by Jan. 1. The county must find places for 170 Medicaid patients and there are now only 60 approved beds. Main qualifications, he said, are adequate buildings and nursing staffs.

Tallmadge Supervisor Tom Koning of Marne was honored by the welfare department and was given a framed citation for his years of service on the county social welfare board.

Tuesday's meeting was the final meeting of the June session.

## 5 Injured In Boat Explosion

Five persons were injured Tuesday evening when the 28-foot cabin cruiser they were aboard exploded on Lake Macatawa.

The owner of the vessel, Howard Veneklasen, 45, of 1384 Linwood Ave., was thrown from the craft by the blast, which occurred when the boat was about 250 yards from shore.

He received second degree burns and was taken to Holland Hospital, where he is reported in good condition.

Also injured were his wife Gladys, 40, and Mrs. Lois DeVries, 35, 610 Butternut Dr., and her children, Debra, 13, and Douglas, 4.

The four were treated for burns and cuts at Holland Hospital and released. Four others escaped uninjured.

Fire broke out immediately after the explosion, forcing the passengers to jump into the lake. Seconds after their plunge, another explosion went off, sending bits of debris from the flaming craft in all directions, witnesses said.

Mrs. DeVries saved her four-year-old son's life by holding the boy's head above water until help came. He could not swim. The victims were rescued by a nearby Coast Guard cruiser, as some 50 small boats rushed to their aid.

Ottawa County sheriff's officers said the explosion may have been caused by fumes from the fuel tank, although the exact cause is not yet known, they said.

Estimated damage to the vessel was \$6,000, according to Coast Guard and sheriff's department officials. The craft was a total loss, they said.

Exhibits: Action exhibit, Notebook, product or poster and interview and exhibit of product, interview and exhibit of poster, or interview and exhibit of notebook; Club exhibit, no more than 5 members and it must tell a story.

Class four, outdoor meals No. one, properly packed picnic basket with menu (no food); Class five, outdoor meals No. two, one piece of home-made equipment for use on camp fire; class six, outdoor meals No. three and over, reflector oven or campfire in miniature. The section for baking has been omitted and will go into the above categories. The sections for food preservation (freezing and canning) will remain as printed in the fair books.

## Foundation Gets Bequest Of \$14,582

A check for \$14,582.35 from the estate of Sherman De Vries who was killed in a train accident in Holland more than a year ago was presented to the Greater Holland Community Foundation Monday.

In his will, De Vries stipulated the funds to be used to aid the blind, crippled or mentally retarded children of Holland area for such charitable purposes as the governing body of the foundation may determine.

The check was delivered by Clarence Klaasen, chairman of the board of People State Bank and executor of the De Vries estate.

De Vries was killed June 9, 1966, by a freight train near the Eighth St. crossing in Holland. At the time, city police said it was apparent the 78-year-old man did not see the train nor hear its whistle. He was reportedly hard of hearing. De Vries resided at 356 East Sixth St.

In other action, the board approved expenditure of approximately \$480 for the cement approach in front of the Salvation Army Citadel which directs Holland's program for senior citizens.

## Day Care Center Gets OEO Grant

A federal grant of \$27,417 for Holland Day Care Center Inc. has been approved by the Office of Economic Opportunity, according to a telegram received today from U. S. Sen. Philip A. Hart in Washington, D. C.

Mrs. James F. Brooks, president of the local center, said the federal grant is contingent on raising approximately \$5,000 in the community. The combined figure will finance operations of the center in Hope Reformed Church for the coming year starting July 1.

Plans call for enlarging the service to 45 children, compared with the present enrollment of 30 children. The program is for pre-school training for children of working mothers.

## New Survey On Traffic Starts Here

Work has started on a Holland-Zeeland area transportation study and local motorists and residents will be queried on a variety of subjects as the study continues through the summer.

The origin-destination study covers the two cities and nine townships in an area of 205 square miles. It is conducted by the Michigan Department of State Highways in cooperation with the U.S. Bureau of Public Roads, the Ottawa County Road Commission and the two cities.

Holland City Manager Herb Holt said the news release from the Highway Commission was premature in that approval is still pending by Holland and Zeeland City Councils and final contractual agreements have not been signed.

Before crews finish work, 2,000 householders will be interviewed the two cities and in the townships of Zeeland, Holland, Park, Port Sheldon, Olive and Blenden townships in Ottawa county and Laketown, Fillmore and Overisel townships in Allegan county.

Preliminary work is now under way to prepare for household interviews. Every block inside the area to be surveyed is being traveled and the address of every eighth household is noted. Letters will be sent these householders to notify them that an interviewer will call at a later date.

The interviewer will seek data concerning the trips made by every person in the household five years of age or older for a 24-hour period.

In addition, survey teams will take a 100 per cent sample of all taxi trips in a 24-hour period and will tally every trip made by one-fourth of the trucks registered with owners during such a period.

Fifty-five roads cross the area under study, and of these, 25 carry 95 per cent of the traffic. Teams at external roadside stations will interview all motorists using these 25 roads for details on origin and destination of trips being made. At five of the 25 stations, teams will work 24 hours and at 20 stations surveys will cover 16 hours.

From material gathered and from portable traffic recorders detailing turning movements at key intersections, a flow map will be made to illustrate the area's traffic patterns.

Data compiled will be used in appraising transportation deficiencies, and road, street and parking needs. The data also will be useful in locating and designing freeways, major bridges and intersections.

Field cost for the survey is \$74,650. The U.S. Bureau of Public Roads provides 75 per cent of the cost. Of the remaining 25 per cent, half is paid by the Department of State Highways, and the balance is shared by participating cities and the road commission.

## South Haven Sets Hospital Rates

SOUTH HAVEN—Community Hospital is setting up a new set of rates here effective July 1 by breaking away from a traditional method of an inclusive room and board charge to patients.

Current charges of \$22 per day for a ward bed; \$25 for semi-private and \$28 for private rooms will be reduced to \$8, \$11, \$13 and \$14 respectively.

Also effective July 1, patients will be billed for nursing care services at the rate of 75 cents per hour.

Nursery and incubator rates will increase \$3 a day, and the admission deposit from \$100 to \$150 for cash-paying patients.

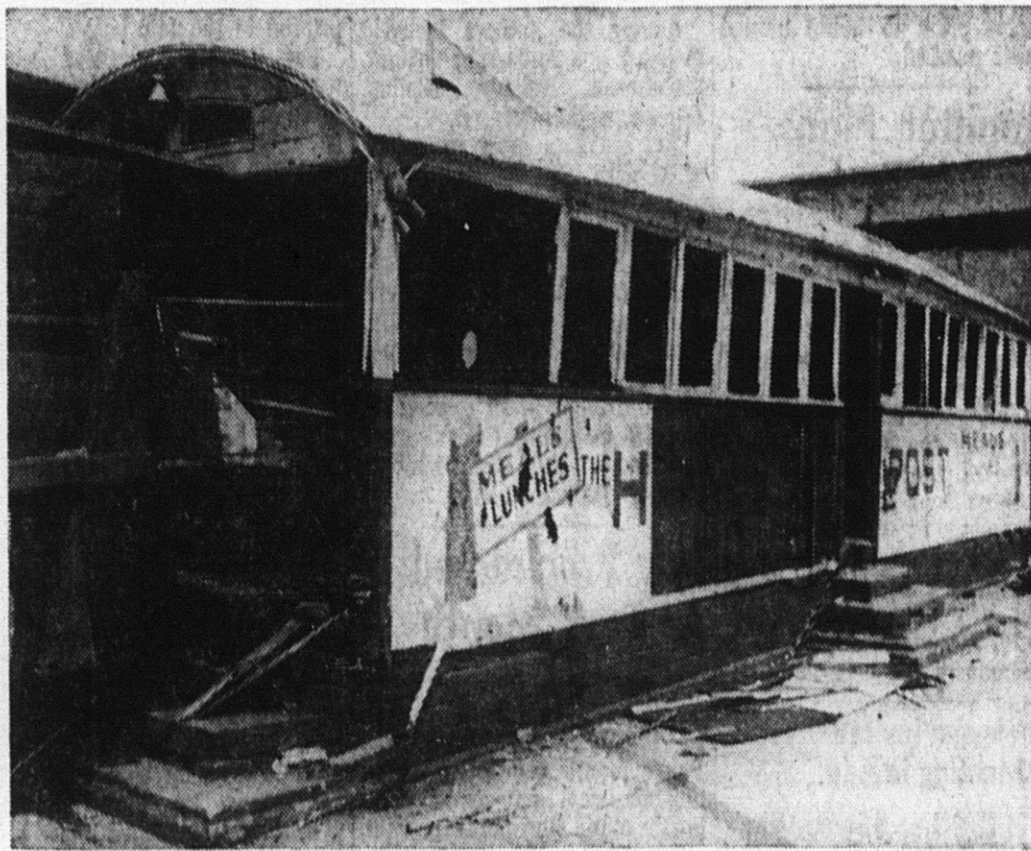

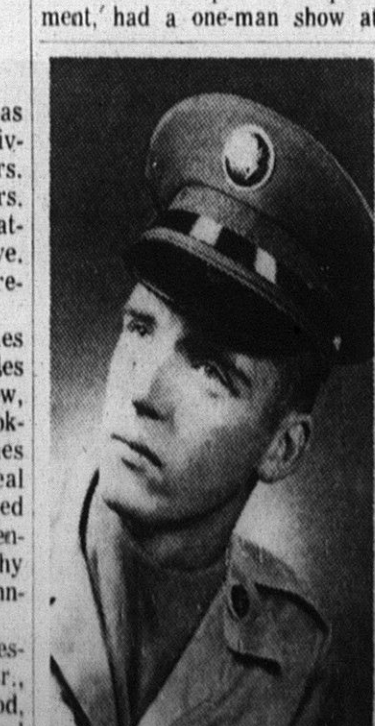

With a sum estimated at 90 million dollars a few days ago still on deposit in the name of about 600,000 people, we thought we should again remind the people who have not cashed their postal savings that June 30, 1967 is the final date.

At one time there was a huge amount of money estimated to be about three and one half billion. This is a lot of money to our way of thinking.

This is a good time to check through all of your records and see if you have any postal savings certificates on hand. The report states that it will save a lot of time for everyone if you cash them before June 30, 1967. If you do not get them to the post office before the June 30 deadline, the unclaimed funds will be held in trust by the Treasury. It will then take a lot longer and involve a lot more paper work for you and also the postal department. So again we ask you to make a search and then make a trip to your post office.

## Sunday School Lesson

The Church Reaches Out  
Acts 13:1-3, 42-49  
By C. P. Dame

Today there seems to be much confusion about the work of the church. A lesson such as this one gives us an insight into the methods of the early church. If we would imitate her methods we would get some of the kind of results she got. The church is here to preach the gospel to people in all parts of the world.

I. The Holy Spirit calls workers. The church in Jerusalem was composed of Jews, while the church in Antioch was composed of Gentiles. The church in Antioch had some able leaders. Luke mentions several prophets. They were like our evangelists. Barnabas came from Cyprus; Symeon, perhaps Simon of Cyrene, who carried the Lord's cross, who was called Niger (literally black) was an African native; Lucius was also from Africa; Manaen was probably a Roman and Saul was a Jew. This group of workers was made up of a Roman, two Jews, and two Africans.

"And as they ministered to the Lord, and fasted, the Holy Spirit said, Separate me Barnabas and Saul for the work whereunto I have called them." Note that these men were called to a special work - mission work in another part of the world. Foreign mission work was inaugurated by the Holy Spirit.

II. The church set these men apart. "And when they had fasted and prayed, and laid hands on them, they sent them away." The Holy Spirit called but the church ordained, or consecrated them to the work in a special service.

The party left Seleucia, which is the port of Antioch, and sailed to Cyprus, the birthplace of Barnabas. Antioch was one of the largest cities in the empire and it was full of pagans. The church might have argued and said that there was plenty of work in Antioch, why then send men to Cyprus? Some church members say that we should do mission work here, and not in other parts of the church. Their attitude is not that of the early church.

III. The preaching of the gospel gets results. The missionaries preached in the synagogues. The Roman pro-consul Sergius Paulus was won. From Cyprus the party sailed to Perga. John Mark who was a helper, left the two missionaries. In Antioch of Pisidia the missionaries spoke in a synagogue. We have a full-length report of Paul's sermon which was on the subject of "justification by faith."

Paul had two kinds of hearers - Jews and the Gentile God-fearers. They were so pleased with the good news which the gospel brings that Paul was asked to preach again on the next Sabbath which he did. On the next sabbath almost the whole city came out to hear. This aroused the Jews to jealousy and they "contradicted what Paul and Barnabas said with violent abuse." The missionaries said that they would preach the gospel to the Gentiles since the Jews rejected it. To summarize - some accepted and others rejected the gospel.

Take note of the fact that these missionaries preached that through faith in Jesus sinners may obtain pardon and the forgiveness of their sins. This is the evangelical gospel which our sick, materialistic age urgently needs. Some reject it, others accept it. In spite of the rejection, let us preach it in season and out of season.

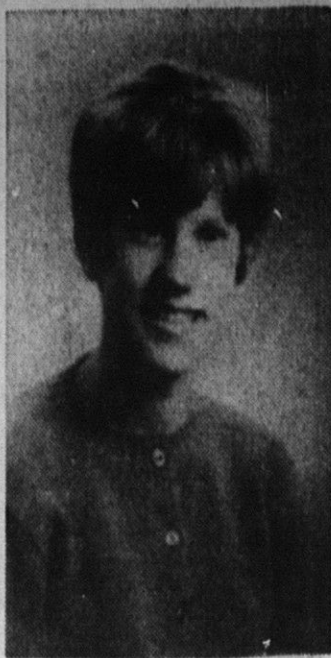

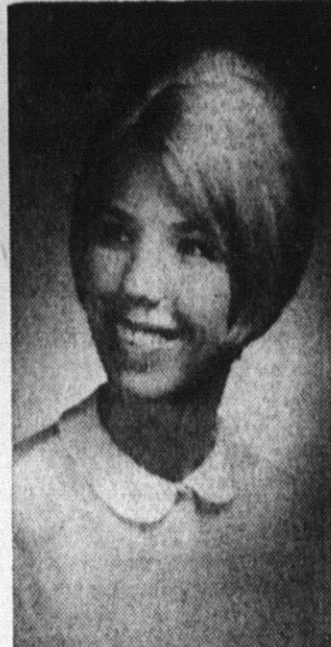

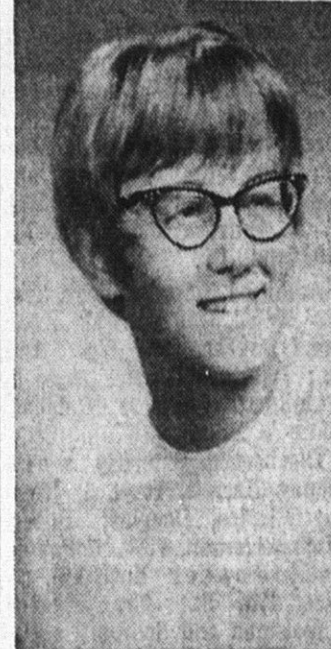

## Urge Area Watch For Solicitors

Area residents today were warned by Building Inspector Jack Langfeldt to be on the look-out for door-to-door solicitors, offering to do construction or repair work, such as roofing and black - topping.

Such persons often display below standard workmanship and deceive those who hire them into thinking they are doing work they never actually do, Langfeldt reported.

According to Langfeldt previous cases included roof repairs which said they would renew the life of shingles but merely covered them with a paint - like solution with no weathering capability, and black - toppers who used a black - top solvent which made the surface of the old black-top look nice, but which actually softened it.

While the Office of Environmental Health is aware that this is going on, there is little they can do, leaving the responsibility upon the person solicited. No permit is required by the city for routine maintenance, replacement, or repair work and according to city ordinance the office cannot interfere as long as the work is being done on private property, Langfeldt said.

If the work done does not exceed the cost of \$200, no state license is required, and even if it does exceed \$200, requiring a license, the state has no means of carrying out its enforcement, he reported.

The responsibility is therefore left up to the person being solicited. Langfeldt advised the avoidance of the hiring of door-to-door canvassers, especially if their vehicle license plates indicate they are from out of state. He recommended the hiring of reputable persons, most of whom will be local, since they do have a good market here and want to keep it.

Langfeldt said reputable construction workers usually will carry business cards, indicating who they are and where to contact them, and they should also be able to offer references for past work done.

Langfeldt urged that a written contract be signed, specifying the work to be done. Finally, he said if there is any question as to the reliability of the solicitor, the Office of Environmental Health will be glad to help, although it is hard for them to verify the legitimacy of a company that is not local.

## Five Female Employees Serve Local Post Office

If you happen to see a girl sitting at the wheel of a red, white and blue mail truck, or carrying a beaten mail bag over one shoulder, don't be surprised.

For the first time the Holland Post Office is hiring women for work as a result of the Equal Employment Opportunity Act, and there are five girls currently holding summer jobs with the mail service.

The five girls, all college age, got their jobs through Civil Service testing placement in February. Their scores were the highest of the test participants and they were hired on that basis.

According to postmaster Louis Haight, a whole deluge of girls applied for the part-time positions which opened June 12, but only five were needed. "As long as they can do the work, we're glad to hire them," Haight commented in reference to the unusual nature of the jobs for girls.

The women work on different shifts from 4 a.m. until late at night, and their work in-

volves sorting mail, getting it ready for delivery, and then distributing it by foot and truck.

Sometimes they use bicycles to cover the larger postal areas. Otherwise they drive to the areas, park nearby, and cover the ground on foot, swinging a canvas mail bag over one shoulder.

The walking sometimes involves up to five hours in the hot sun and odd looks from people passing by, but the girls all say the job is enjoyable and unusual. "It's a good way to get a tan," one remarked.

Part-time employees are not required to wear uniforms, Postmaster Haight said.

The girls, all from the Holland area, are Dawn Van Ark of Hope College; Karen Pelon, Michigan State; Cornelia DeBoer, Grand Valley State College; Sharon Kleinheksel, Wheaton; and Marcia Koster, Wheaton. They will be delivering the mail until college opens this fall.

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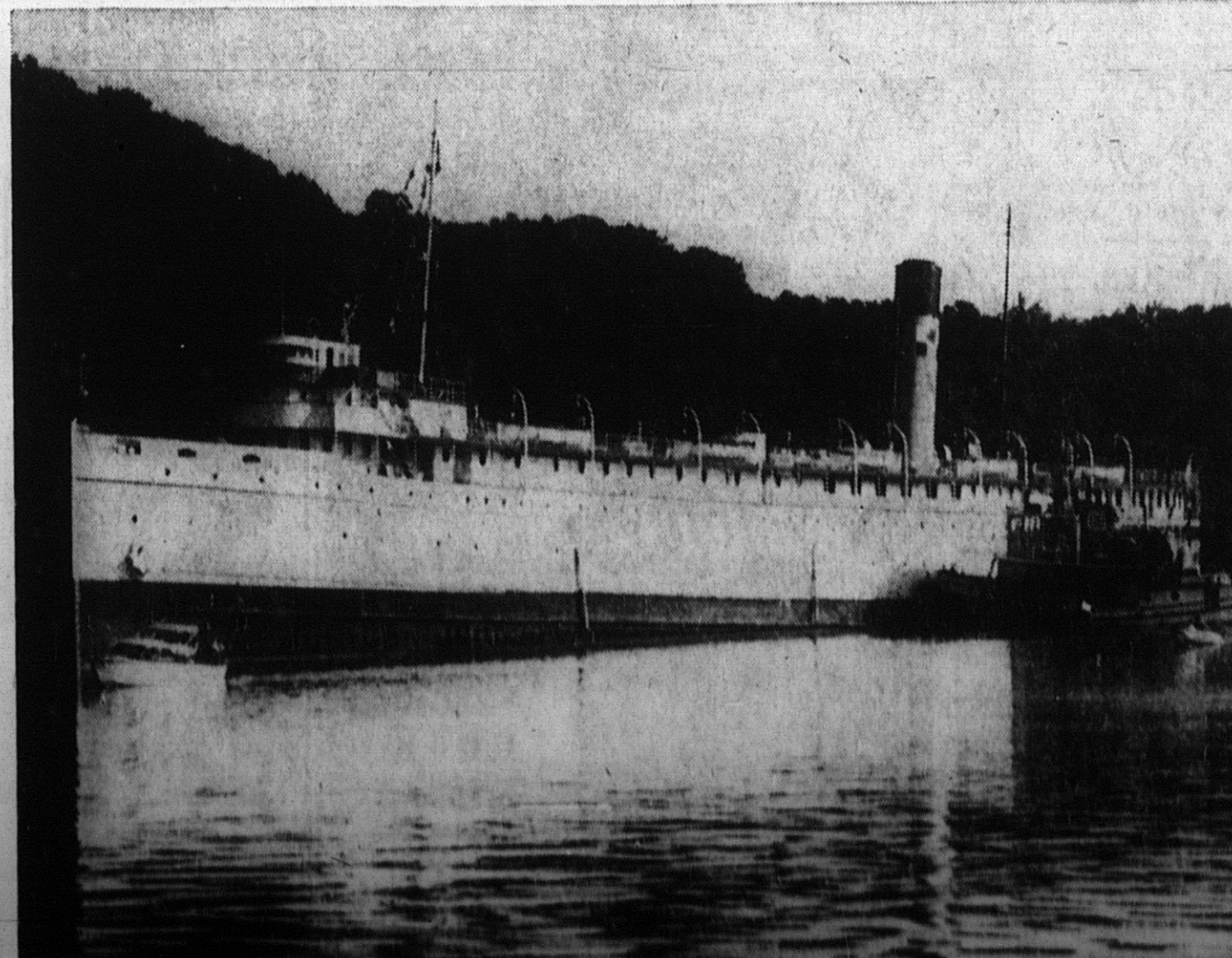

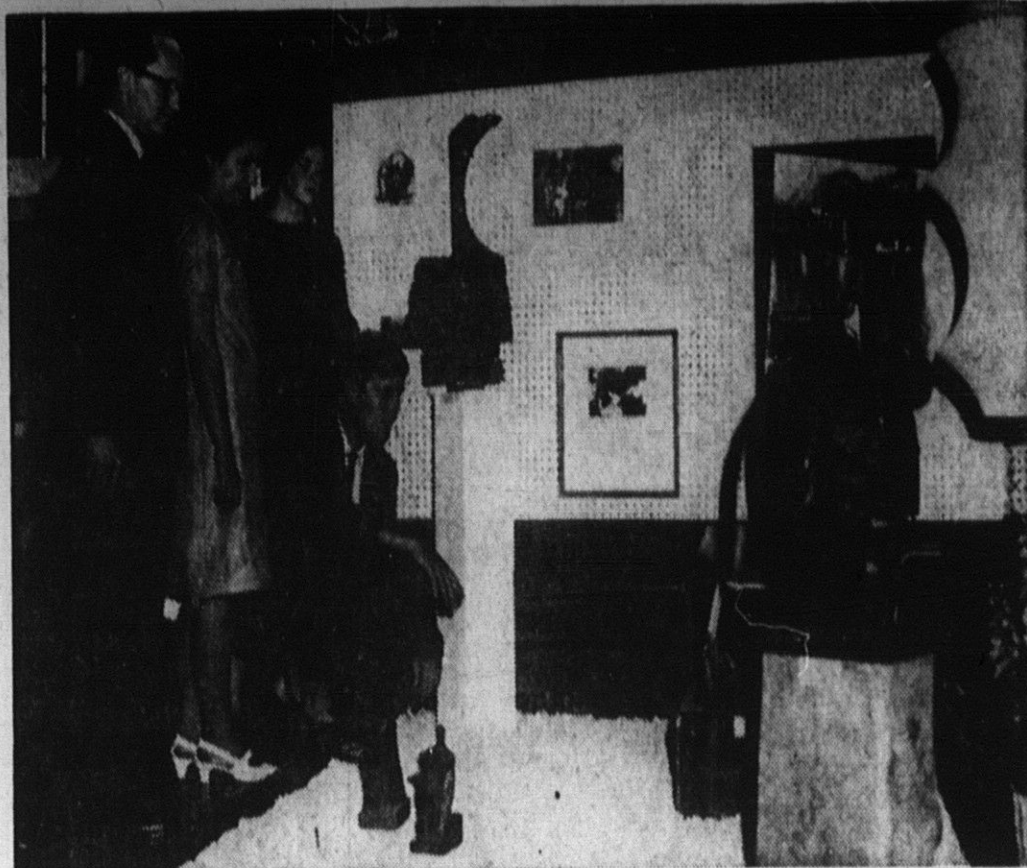

## Two Science, Math Seminars Set at Hope

High school teachers of advanced placement chemistry and mathematics courses from across the United States and two foreign countries, will be participating in two National Science Foundation summer institutes at Hope College starting Monday.

Forty high school mathematics teachers from 18 states will be attending the NSF institute until Aug. 11 while 46 chemistry instructors from 19 states as well as Canada and South Africa will be participating in an institute until Aug. 18.

The mathematics institute will be a single integrated course entitled "Topics in Real Analysis," according to Dr. Jay E. Folkert, chairman of the department of mathematics at Hope College and director of the institute.

Seven weeks will be devoted to the study of topics which are the basis for proper understanding of calculus.

Each of the topics at the mathematics institute will be presented by an eminent mathematician who has broad mastery of the field and the ability to communicate to teachers effectively.

The theme of the chemistry institute will be "The Basic Concepts of Chemistry" according to Dr. Eugene C. Jekel, associate professor of chemistry at Hope College and director of the institute.

Eight weeks will be devoted to the study of the nine basic concepts. Lectures and laboratory sessions will be carefully coordinated and integrated about the central theme of the basic concept under consideration.

The laboratory sessions will incorporate the use of special and novel experiments specifically designed for their effectiveness in bringing to life the basic concepts of chemistry as well as for the feasibility of their use or adaptation to the typical high school chemistry laboratory.

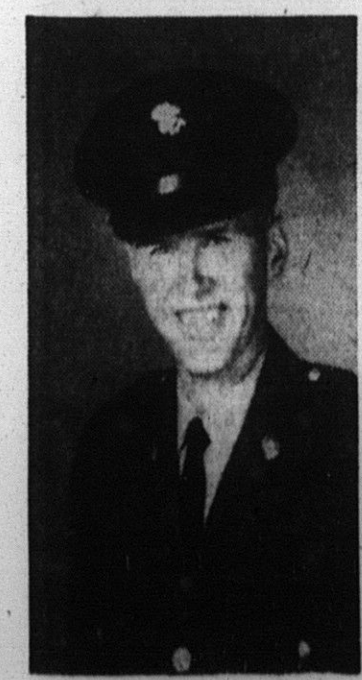

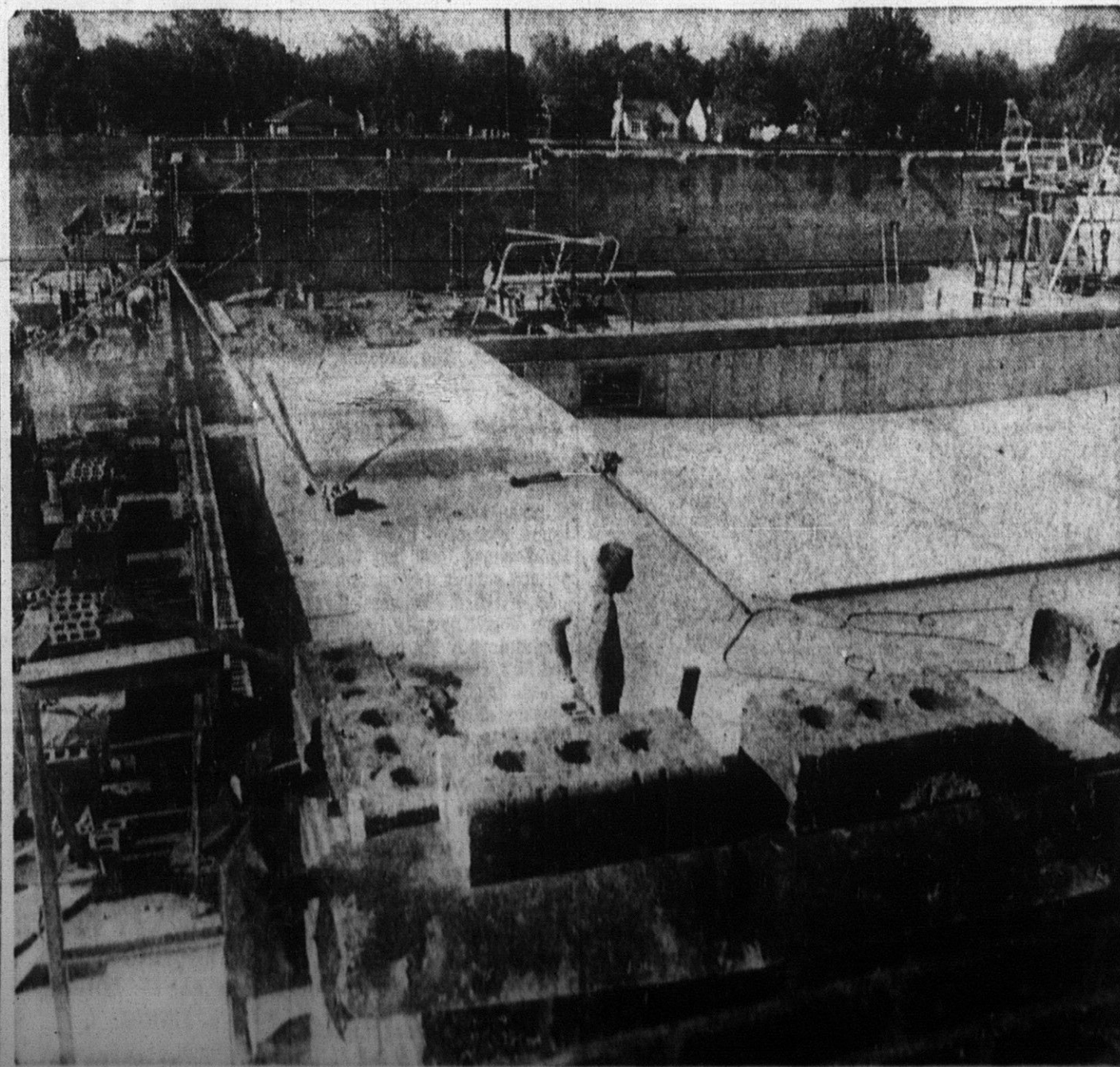

DETROIT — Chris-Craft Corp. of Holland has been ordered to pay \$74,976 in damages to the 28-year-old widow of a Coast Guardsman killed on duty in the St. Clair River four years ago.

Federal Judge Thomas P. Thornton Friday made the award to Mrs. Sandra Yoes of Warren, ruling Chris-Craft was negligent.

The complaint charged that Mrs. Yoes' husband, Gerald, had attached a line to a stricken Chris-Craft vessel while attempting to pull it off a sandbar. The cleat the line was tied to reportedly pulled loose and struck Yoes in the head, killing him.

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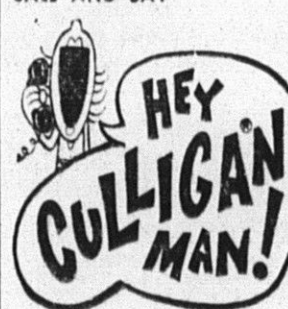
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
