Apollo 8 Stamp Will Go on Sale

The six-cent stamp commemorating the Apollo 8 mission will go on sale at Holland post office May 6.

The design on the vertical stamp is based on a photograph supplied by the National Aeronautics and Space Administration in which the moon in the foreground is approximately 730 kilometers from the spacecraft. To the top of the stamp is half an Earth, the rest in darkness, with the sunset terminator bisecting Africa.

The words "In the beginning God..." were spoken by a crew member when he read from the book of Genesis during the course of the historic flight orbiting the moon. This reading, while not a part of the flight plan, has become closely associated with the flight in the public mind. The words appear white on deep blue.

The moon is gray, outer space is deep blue and the world is blue and white.

Yield Signs Installed

"Yield Right of Way" traffic signs have been installed affecting traffic at the intersection of 26th St. and Lawndale Ct., according to Holland police. Under the setup, traffic on 26th St. must yield the right of way to vehicles on Lawndale Ct. The signs were put up Wednesday and the regulation is in order now.

Portable Marina Will Be Installed

City Council Monday night granted permission to ABC Marine Enterprises, Inc., of South Haven to place temporarily a portable floatable marina in Kollen Park waters for a month or so including the Tulip Time festival period.

Leonard Naab, executive vice president, described the new marina concept as a real engineering breakthrough, one that eliminates unsightly piling and allows easy expansion and flexible arrangements.

He said the floating docks are made of steel, fiberglass and foam and are held in place by underwater cable anchorage. Conventional type piers have the usual slips for boats, but the outer ends have "satellites" resembling a flower cluster for anchoring 16 boats. Bright colors further accent the installations.

Naab, who displayed a model showing docks slips and satellites (which can encompass a swimming pool) said the local temporary installation would be one "satellite" at the end of 12th St. at Kollen Park in co-

lors of blue and white. The local satellite will be installed 40 or 50 feet offshore and will not have a connecting dock to shore since the company will not have a full time man on the scene.

Naab said there will be many visitors to Holland during the period since boating interests in Florida, and even foreign countries are interested in the revolutionary new design.

The South Haven firm is arranging with state officials and the Corps of Engineers to use the Holland site for temporary installation. Plans also are being worked out on liability with the city. Should all plans be completed, work could start as early as Thursday of this week.

Naab said ABC Marine Enterprises stands for Atlas, Beckerman and Carroll, three Chicago businessmen who have been working on the concept for three years. A patent was obtained at that time but it has been only the past year that production plans were completed. The Holland installation will be the first for the company, Naab said.

Howard Miller Announces Expansion

ZEELAND — The Howard Miller Clock Co. today announced plans for the expansion of their manufacturing facilities here. The 100 foot by 200 foot addition will be constructed adjacent to the present plant, which was built just over three years ago and at that time more than doubled the firm's productive capacity.

Construction will begin immediately on the 20,000 - square-foot addition with the completion date scheduled for September. The expansion represents a 50 per cent increase in the size of the company's facilities, and will result in a substantial number of new employees. The additional space will be devoted primarily to clock manufacturing, warehousing and shipping. Plans include provisions for six shipping and receiving locations on the east side of the new addition.

Howard C. Miller, president, stated the expansion is necessitated by the rapid sales growth of the firm in recent years and that sales have been growing at the rate of 35 per cent yearly.

The firm was founded on the philosophy of quality and design innovation and through the years it has become known as the leader in innovative clock design and this philosophy has led the firm into such areas as lighting fixtures. Its designs have been counted among the classics in contemporary design and have become part of the permanent design collection of the New York Museum of Modern Art and other major museums.

In recent years, Howard Miller has expanded into a number of new areas including products as diverse as World Time Clocks and decorative light bulbs of architectural shape. The firm currently has four separate divisions reaching all areas of the clock and decorative accessory market.

Windmill Island with its towering imported Windmill De Zwaan rising 125 feet skyward will open this year on Saturday, May 3.

Island Manager Jaap de Biecourt said flour grinding already started earlier this week with Jan Heuvel again serving as miller this year. Both de Biecourt and Heuvel are natives of The Netherlands. As usual, flour will be merchandised in two-pound sacks. Until the mill opens, a supply of the whole wheat flour is available in the city treasurer's office.

Windmill Island in downtown Holland on the banks of Black River has its entrance at Seventh St. and Lincoln Ave.

Netherlands Museum located at 12th St. and Central Ave., will officially open for the season Monday, April 14. The museum operates the year around with admission charged only during the spring and summer season. Organized school groups or such groups as Boy Scouts with leaders are admitted free.

A new addition to the Zeeland Room on the second floor of the museum is the old desk of the Rev. Cornelius Vander Meulen, co-founder of Zeeland in 1847. It was on this desk that he wrote most of his Dutch sermons in the early years of the Zeeland colony.

The course which began at 1 p.m. Wednesday and concluded at 8 a.m. today was conducted by Ottawa County Civil Defense Shelter Manager Instructor Neal Hoeze, assisted by director, Glen Timmer; deputy director, Louis De Kraker, and Ronald Breuker.

The shelter managers training course outlines the shelter managers responsibilities and the problems they could encounter in a public shelter under fallout conditions.

The course also provides information for the police and medical personnel to enable them to assist the shelter managers and the public during a shelter stay.

Visitors in the shelter for the overnight stay were Mrs. Kay Rivera and children Cindy and Steve, and Mrs. Claribel Dorgelo, county Civil Defense Medical Self Help Coordinator.

The public fallout shelters are facilities stocked with federal survival rations by agreement with the building owners.

The terms of mayor and mayor pro-tem are one year and those of councilmen are three years.

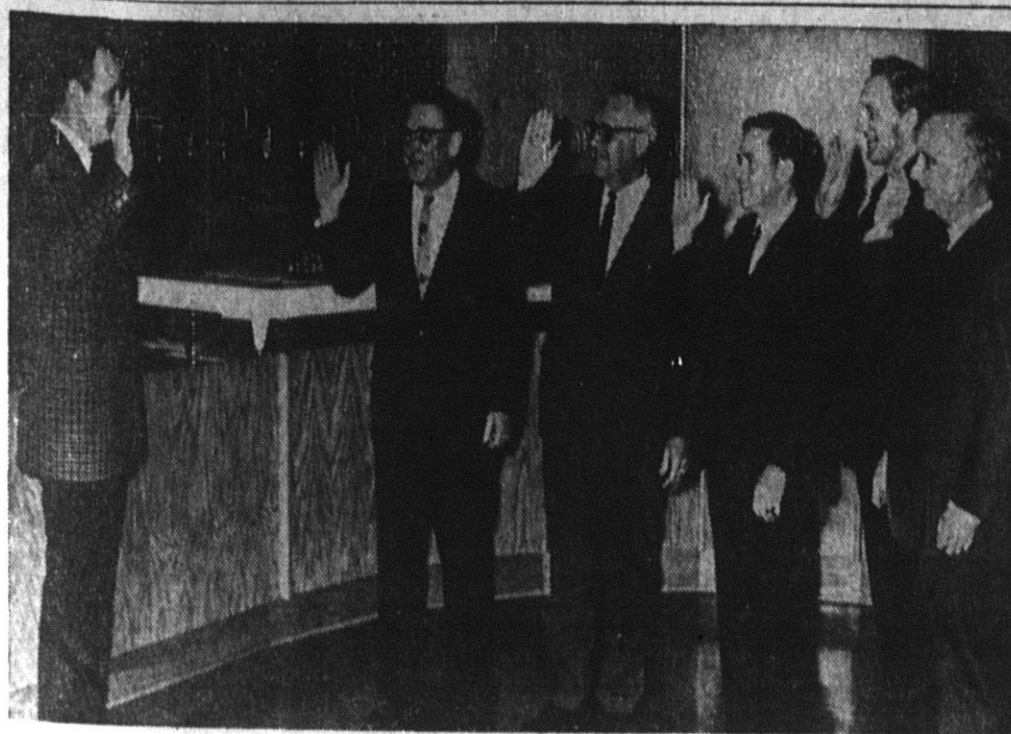
Stolen Car Found in Florida

Council All Set For New Term

Mayor Nelson Bosman, starting his fifth two - year term, and four councilmen elected in the April 7 election took their oaths of office at an organizational meeting of City Council Monday night. The meeting had been adjourned from one held last Wednesday.

Councilmen starting new terms are Elmer Wissink, newly elected councilman-at-large; Louis Hallacy II, councilman, first ward; Donald Oosterbaan, councilman, third ward, and Morris Peerbolt, councilman, fifth ward. Wissink is a newcomer to Council. Oosterbaan, formerly councilman-at-large, ran in the third ward, succeeding Dr. Hollis Clark Jr. who did not seek reelection. Councilmen's terms are four years.

Councilman Peerbolt was re-elected mayor pro tem by ballot. Mayor Bosman reappointed Guy E. Bell, superintendent of the Board of Public Works, as administrative official to the Planning Commission, and Gordon Cunningham as City attorney, the latter appointment approved by Council.

In other business, Council voted to accept the offer of the Junior Welfare League and proceed with a tot lot at Civic Center with League funds available, amounting to \$1,785. Initial estimate of \$2,000 for such a tot lot had been revised upward to \$4,460 and there had been a question whether to proceed with the project.

Council also approved a city manager's recommendation to make the adult recreational programs more self - supporting. At the close of the meeting, Mayor Bosman thanked Dr. Clark for his four years of service with Council, and Clark responding, quipping that in his return to normal citizen and a taxpayer he again will be able to make criticisms and decisions, unhampered by a lot of facts.

The 27-minute meeting was opened with an invocation by the Rev. John Van Wyke, retired Reformed Church minister living in Holland.

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The Hospital Service League of Zeeland Hospital held its governing board meeting at the Hospital Monday evening. Mrs. L. Van Kley, president, presided.

Mrs. Robert Den Herder discussed the plans for the May 9 coffee to be held at the City Hall in Zeeland. Another blood bank will be held on June 4.

Supervisors Question CD Program

GRAND HAVEN—What's the value of the extensive Civil Defense program in Ottawa county?

That is the question put to Glenn Timmer, Ottawa county Civil Defense director, Tuesday by Supervisor Robert Visscher of Holland, who opposed the annual increase in the cost of the department in the county.

Visscher said the expenses for the department have reached \$30,000 a year and he is seeking proof that this expenditure is necessary.

"The budget for CD activity has accelerated year after year," he said. "Where is it going to end?" Eight years ago, when he represented Holland on the board as its mayor, he said, the world conditions were just as serious as they are now, but the expenses are much higher.

Other board members also asked many questions and Timmer said a meeting of board members at the Holland CD center is planned. He said that to prove the worth of the program to the board members would be an "all day job" and he assured the group that after the substitution in the new wing at the county building is complete the requests for funds would be less.

Some board members defended the activity of the Civil Defense program and Chairman William Kennedy explained that this department is designed to coordinate the work of other departments should an attack or disaster hit the county. Timmer said that his office is carrying on a program of instruction and his position has developed into a full-time job because of the inventory work and other duties. He spends between 40 and 50 hours a week, he said.

He was asked by the chairman to gather information for the board, including the costs of operation of Civil Defense programs in other counties. Ottawa is "in the middle" in comparison to other counties, Timmer said.

The board adjourned until today's meeting and another meeting Thursday may be held.

Approval was given to amendment to a resolution previously approved by the old board in connection with the financing of the Rush Creek sanitary sewer system that will hook up Hudsonville city and Georgetown township, a fast-growing area, to the Grandville disposal plant.

Ronald Russett, director of the road commission's water and sanitation and public works department, explained the project and reported that the amendment will authorize his office to sell bonds at an increased interest rate. An extension of the original project, costing \$215,000, in Georgetown, was also approved.

Approval was also given a request for \$20,000 for the purchase of 70 acres of federal land in the Manistee forest, which will be used for conservation purposes and the new system of waste land fill started in 1968.

Engineer - Manager Ronald Bakker of the road commission presented the proposed budget for his department for 1970, totaling \$3,315,000. The program includes \$1,005,000 in highway construction work, mostly resurfacing. The annual appropriation from the county requested by Bakker is \$300,000.

Included in the highway are improvements to Port Sheldon St. in Olive and Port Sheldon townships, Lakewood Blvd. in Park and Holland townships, and Douglas Ave. near Holland.

Three persons were injured in a two-car accident at 56th Ave. and Byron Rd. in Zeeland township at 7:52 p.m. Tuesday, according to Ottawa county sheriff's deputies who are investigating.

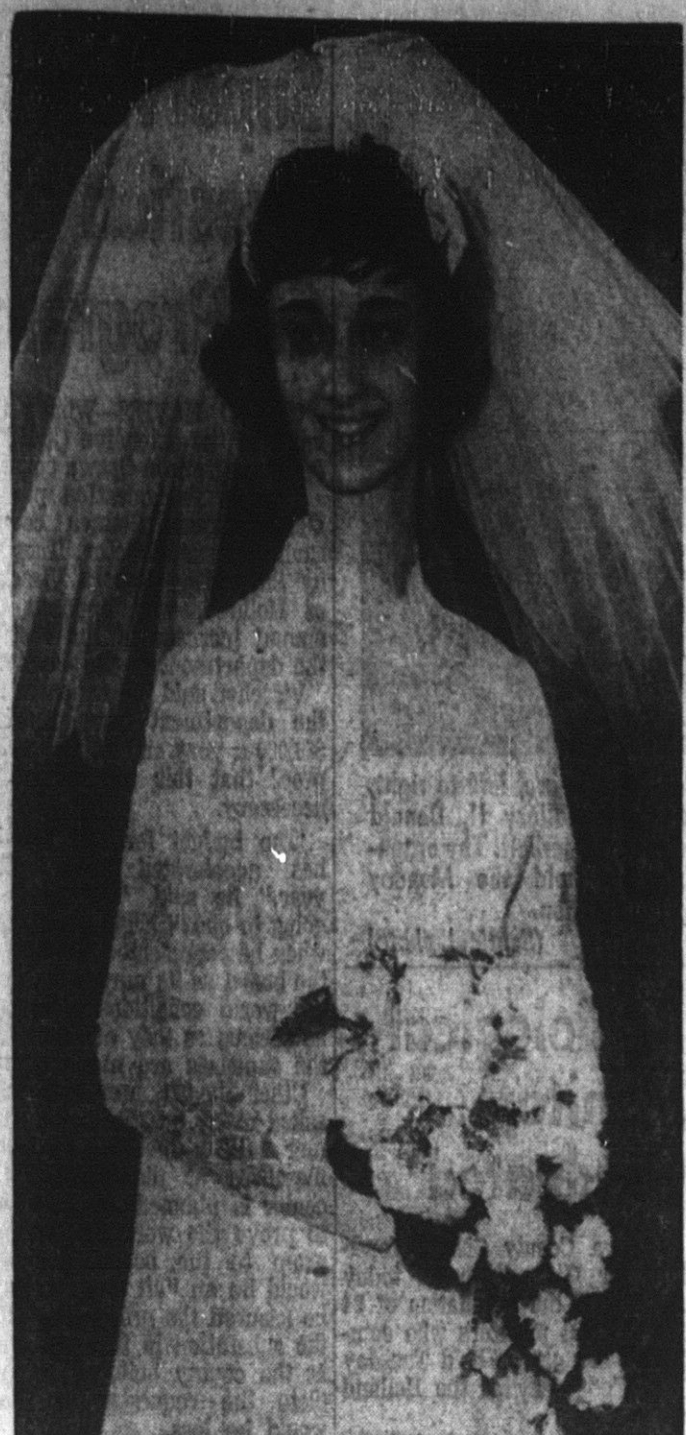

Elm Tree Spraying Starts Here

Park department employees are spraying elm trees in the city for Dutch Elm disease this week.

Activities began today in city parks and cemeteries. It is the second year the city is using Mothoxychlor instead of DDT. Mothoxychlor is recommended by the State Department of Agriculture and the Michigan Department of Natural Resources.

Spraying will continue through the week provided weather conditions are favorable. Such spraying must be done when there is little or no wind, well under 10 mph. Most of Holland's elm trees are in the core of the city.

Car owners are cautioned not to leave cars at curbs during spraying operations, although spray can easily be removed by washing the car with a light detergent.

Elm tree spraying done each year in an attempt to save the elm trees in the city. Park Supt. Jacob De Graaf estimates the city has lost about 50 per cent of its elm trees since the disease was first noted in 1954.

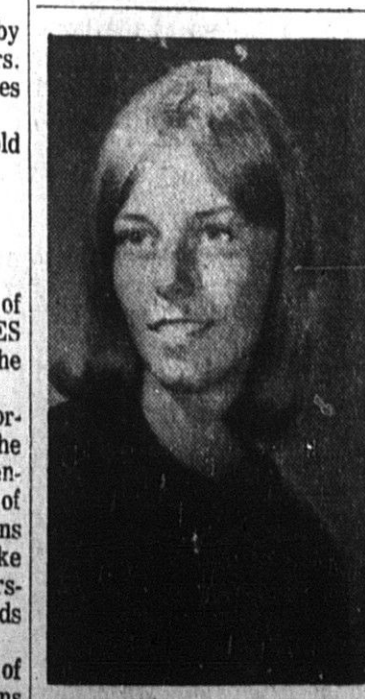

De Vries said groups may tour the Sentinel building at any time but should make appointments in advance.

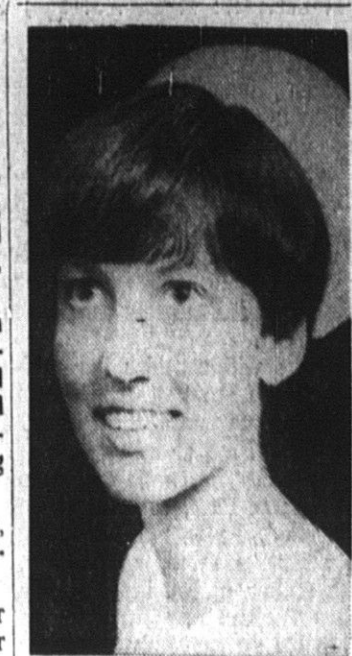

Recently the Michigan State Chamber of Commerce sponsored a day-long meeting in Lansing to deal with the problem of waste disposal and among the people participating were Robert Campbell, works engineer of Buick Motor Division of General Motors, Flint, concerning "The Genesee Story," the Kalamazoo County central sanitary fill by a county official, and Dow Chemical Co. tar incinerator, by Rudy Novak, superintendent of waste control.

Sunday School Lesson

Sunday, April 20
The Divine-Human Book
Luke 1:1-4; I Cor. 2:12-13;
II Cor. 4:7; II Tim. 3:14-16;
II Peter 1:20-21
By C. P. Dame

Many people consider the Bible a great book but not all people accept it as the Word of God. The writer of this brief exposition accepts it as the Word of God. This lesson teaches that the Holy Spirit used men to bring God's truth to people and interprets the truth for them.

I. We will consider the testimony of Luke first. The lesson text is composed of the writings of Luke, Paul and Peter. Luke was a Gentle, a physician, a convert of Paul, with whom he travelled, he was a man with a scientific mind, a historian, the author of two books of the New Testament.

In his preface Luke mentions four things. His subject is, "The Word"—Jesus. Next, he mentions the source of his information—"eye witnesses and ministers of the Word." Following this he states the method of his work,—"traced the course of these happenings carefully from the beginning to set them down for myself in their proper order." (Phillips). Lastly he states the purpose, "That thou mightest know the certainty concerning the things wherein thou wast instructed." The Holy Spirit led Luke to record what he learned by diligent search.

II. We will also consider the testimony of Paul. In I Corinthians 2:12 Paul states that "we have received, not the spirit of the world." But we, that is Paul and his associates, had received the Spirit of God and guided by Him had taught doctrines received from Him. Only the spiritually minded understand God's truths.

"But we have this treasure in earthen vessels" so wrote Paul. The word "we" refers to him and his fellow workers; the treasure is the gospel and the earthen vessels are the apostles and all believers who are the custodians of the gospel, who all are frail, but God is the source of all strength. Paul claims inspiration. He wrote the truths God taught him.

Timothy was a spiritual son of Paul. In a famous passage Paul teaches that the inspired Bible is profitable in four ways. First it is profitable for teaching. Today doctrinal instruction is slighted in many churches. It is tragic that catechetical instruction is neglected in so many Protestant churches.

The Bible is also profitable for reproof, that is for pointing out the errors of people. The Bible is also useful for correction since it reveals our errors. In addition, the Bible teaches us what is right and wrong. Only by using this inspired Bible will it do us any good.

III. Let us also consider the testimony of Peter. The lesson text contains two verses from II Peter 1. Already in Peter's time some people interpreted the Bible to suit themselves. Peter taught that prophecy came not from human origin but from the Holy Spirit and therefore needed His guidance.

The prophets of the Old Testament and the apostles of the New Testament were inspired by God's Spirit.

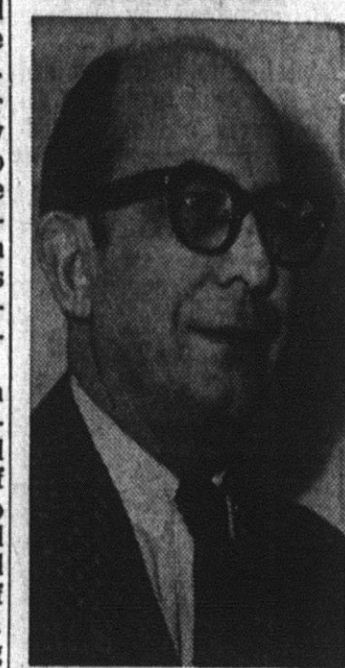

The Delegate Board of the Holland Young Calvinist League met Thursday evening in the Pine Creek Christian Reformed Church.

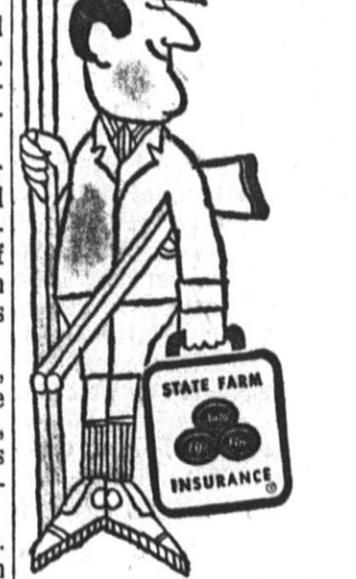
Gus Vanden Berge opened the meeting with prayer.

Summer School Program Announced at Hope College

Hope College will offer a record number of undergraduate and graduate credit courses during its 1969 summer school program director Dr. Henry ten Hoor announced today.

The summer school program, scheduled to begin June 23 will offer more than 40 courses in 16 different fields.

The regular six week summer school session will end Aug. 1 while an extended program, which carries a year's credit for foreign languages, will run through Aug. 15.

Numerous other summer programs will be sponsored by the college during June, July and August.

A six-week invitational course will give high school graduates an opportunity to explore their abilities in doing collegework. The course will be directed by Dr. Leslie Beach, associate professor of psychology.

Institutes for the professional development of teachers of advanced high school mathematics, and chemistry and junior high science will be held on the Hope campus beginning June 23. The institutes are supported by the National Science Foundation.

Institute directors in their respective fields will be Dr. Eugene Jekel, chairman of the department of chemistry; Dr. Elliot Tanis, associate professor of mathematics; and Dr. William J. Oostenink of the department of biology at Colgate University and a former member of the Hope faculty.

A five week program offering international students the opportunity to study American culture, language, education and society in an intimate manner will be sponsored by the college from July 9 to

Aug. 11. Werner W. Heine, assistant professor of German will direct the program.

Hope will host a seven week experimental educational project for 40 disadvantaged high school students from the Greater Muskegon and Ottawa County area from June 16 to Aug. 4. The Upward Bound program is funded by the Federal Office of Economic Opportunity and the college. The Rev. Samuel Williams, associate chaplain at Hope, will serve as director.

The college will host a six week Sloan Foundation program designed for high school graduates who wish to qualify in mathematics before entering the science program during the fall semester. The course, which begins June 23, is directed by Charles Steketee, associate professor of mathematics.

Hope will host a National School Orchestra Association youth orchestra and choir conference from Aug. 3-9 and during the same period the national NSOA convention for high school string teachers. Robert Ritsema, assistant professor of music, will coordinate the two conferences.

Not all of the summer programs will be held on the Holland campus. Students from Hope and other colleges and universities will participate in the 14th annual Vienna Summer School from June 11 to Sept. 9. Dr. Ezra Gearhart, chairman of the department of foreign languages, will head the Vienna program.

A brochure explaining summer school programs, courses and fees is available at the summer school office in Van Raalte Hall on the Hope campus.

In Thursday's opening of Tennessee Williams' "Cat on a Hot Tin Roof" at Holland High School, Marilyn Perry and Alan Wilson played with insight one of the major conflicts of a man and wife living together in toleration and not love.

The play was a new departure for Holland Community Theatre and Mrs. Barbara Greenwood, director, was able to bring a fine balance of characterizations into the Pulitzer Prize winning drama.

As the wife, Maggie, Mrs. Perry displayed the frustration of a woman trapped in an agreement with her alcoholic husband. Frantically trying to save the man she loves, Mrs. Perry acted with all the tense and hot emotions of Maggie.

Alan Wilson portrayed Brick the alcoholic, waiting for a "mechanical click in his mind" to ease his guilt, with a quality that showed the inner struggle of the man with himself.

The desire for life is strongly portrayed by Edwin Raphael as Big Daddy who, faced with death, wanted to live more than he'd ever wanted to before in his life. Upon learning he is dying, Raphael gave vent to the utter hopelessness and outrage of the doomed.

Sandy Hemple played the flutery Big Mama with the appropriate mannerisms. At first appearing materialistic, she later gives Big Mama a

rather ironic taste of devotion to the husband who says, "I can't stand that old woman!"

Mae and Gooper played by Mariou Van Dam and E. Dale Conklin, came through with the true color of "greediness" in their acting. By the final curtain it's obvious that they are a perfectly matched pair.

Dick O'Connor, although saying little, did a fine job of acting the timid little old Reverend Tooker. Dr. Baugh was played by Jim Dykstra with the matter of fact manner of the physician.

Also in the cast were Carol Torbeck as Sookee with Marilyn Cunningham as Daisy, Gordon H. Cunningham as Lacey, Kathy Cunningham as Dixie, Jeff Hemwall as Buster, Tom Perry as Sonny and Doug Cunningham as Doodle. The children came through as Maggie called them "no necked brats."

Don Battjes, Jr., did a fine job in designing the set and lighting of the plantation bed-sitting room. Mrs. Greenwood assisted by Gordon Cunningham directed the entire play and there was only an occasional slip in the players' Mississippi accents. Among the unusual sound effects were a cricket that croaked briefly and an unidentified bird that squeaked. In charge of sound was Tom Speet assisted by Sue Van Koe-vering.

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
