Three-Year-Old Is Totally Blind

Marcia Visser was born to Mr. and Mrs. Harvey Visser of route 3, Hudsonville, three years ago with all the beauty and health any child could hope for; but, after Marcia's second birthday, it became obvious that something was wrong—she walked into objects and she stumbled and fell more often than her playmates. After close observation, it became apparent that she should be checked by her doctor. Unfortunately, this was only the beginning of what was to

come. Marcia was sent from one doctor to another and spent two months last year in Ann Arbor hospital. It seemed as though no one wanted to tell the two-year-old and her parents that she was totally blind in her right eye, and she underwent extensive tests and x-rays. Upon closer examination of

the eye, however, it became evident that the problem was caused by cancer and that it was necessary to remove the organ.

Shortly after removal of her right eye, Marcia began to have problems with her left eye. This time her parents took her to New York but, after four days there, she was sent back to Ann Arbor for three and one-half weeks. In spite of further tests and treatments, Marcia's left eye was removed at Holland Hospital June 21.

At three years of age, Marcia Visser is totally blind and her parents are faced with surgical and medical expenses which have already amounted to \$7,500. Although Marcia has one artificial eye, the tremendous costs are the result of treatment, medication, hospitalization and preliminary attempts to save her eyes.

Recently, some friends of the Vissers from North Blendon Christian Reformed Church, with the help of people at the Zeeland branch of First Michigan Bank and Trust Co., have established the Marcia Visser Cancer Fund. The fund is similar to one set up earlier this year for Dena Gladfelter, and all monies collected over the amount needed to pay Marcia's doctor and hospital bills will be kept in reserve for other cancer patients from the contributing area.

Contributions may be made to the First Michigan Bank and Trust Co., Marcia Visser Cancer Fund.

The Vissers also have a younger daughter, Barbara.

TV Recorder For Police In Federal Grant

A federal grant for the purchase of portable television recording equipment was received by the Holland police department, Chief Charles Lindstrom announced Wednesday.

The \$2,560 grant under Federal Crime Control Safety Act, administered in Michigan by the Office of Criminal Justice Program, is coupled with \$861.80 in local matching funds to allow the purchase of a television camera, recorder, monitors, tapes and accessories.

The unit is designed to be operated by batteries or with AC electricity.

Lindstrom said the recorder can be used in crime scene investigations, civil disturbances, line ups, suspected drunk drivers and in the study of traffic engineering problems.

Lindstrom said video tapes in drunk driver cases have been accepted as evidence in courts in Kalamazoo and Battle Creek.

Officer Marty Hardenberg will coordinate the program and be responsible for collection of data. He will also train other officers in the use of the equipment.

Officer Keith Houting will keep reports and records of the program.

Commission Defends Plan For Court

GRAND HAVEN — Chairman William Kennedy of the Ottawa County Board of Commissioners Monday chided the Grand Haven Committee for Economic Development for recent criticism of the board, one for proposing a new district court building in Holland and another regarding the county's financial statement and its improvement fund.

Kennedy read the statement at the monthly meeting of the county board Monday and the 21-member body voted approval.

The statement called attention to at least two letters published in The Grand Haven Tribune, and explained the improvement fund which carried a balance of \$265,374.39 as of Jan. 1, 1971. This fund is used for new county buildings.

On the CED's displeasure with a new district court building in Holland, Kennedy pointed out that any city within the county of more than 3,500 population is entitled to court facilities if desired.

"So it follows that the county must provide District Court facilities in the city of Holland and in the opinion of the majority of the members of the Ottawa County Board of Commissioners, a new building located adjacent to the new Holland City Police building could best serve the purpose it was intended for, and after considering all the costs involved is the most economical in the years ahead for the taxpayers of Ottawa county," the statement read.

Kennedy said all county books are audited by the Auditor General's department each fall, and the latest complete report available for the year 1969 is on file in the county clerk's office and may be viewed by the public. He also pointed out that all county commission meetings are public, and in the past the board meetings have had good news coverage by the Grand Haven Tribune and the Holland Evening Sentinel.

He added J. Nyhof Poel, R. V. Terrill, William Robinson, Karl Ball and Bernard J. Schultz have done a commendable job of representing the people of the tri-cities area and anybody feeling the need of more information about county government should contact their representatives. In other business, Engineer-Manager Ronald Bakker presented a petition involving proposed construction of a new bridge over Smith's bayou in Ferrysburg. The board set July 12 at 1:30 p.m. for a hearing as requested by the Coast Guard. The board already has approved a \$400,000 bridge to be built in 1972.

The board authorized District Judge John Galien of Holland to apply for \$26,800 in federal funds for a fulltime probation director and staff. The application must be filed by July 1. The judge explained that three parttime probation officers currently are operating in the county. A volunteer system similar to a successful program in the Royal Oak area is planned here.

Edward Green of the State Department of Natural Resources addressed the board on the condition of the deer herd in Ottawa county, and said the department has decided on a "bucks only" deer season this year. Green said the main problem in Ottawa county is the many deer killed by cars and the damage done to crops, mainly the tree nurseries. In seven years, the car kill has reached 823.

Kennedy And Dittlinger Win Nominations

SOUTH HAVEN — Republican Bela Kennedy of Bangor will face Democrat Michael Dittlinger of Grand Junction July 15 in a special election to choose a successor to the late state Rep. Edson V. Root Jr. Kennedy picked up 1,520 votes to win an 11-way Republican primary Thursday while Dittlinger polled 373 votes to capture the winning spot in a three-candidate Democratic primary.

In the tiny portion of Holland city which lies in the 34th district, nine persons cast votes, eight for Kennedy and one for Dittlinger. The polling place in Maplewood Christian School was in operation for 13 hours. Up to 5 p.m. only two votes had been cast. These two voters had visited the polls at 11 a.m. The area has 105 registered voters.

Root, whose 54th House district included Van Buren County and a portion of southwestern Allegan County, died May 7.

Trailing Kennedy in the GOP race were John Watts, Fennville, with 1,154 votes; Francis Finch, Mattawan, 1,472; Phillip Quade, Douglas, 875; James Stevens, Paw Paw, 260; Arnold Gordon, Bangor, 251; Robert Irwin, Allegan, 181; David Peterson, Lawton, 178; John Kingdon, Mattawan, 162; Erick Pifer, Covert, 148, and Robert Reese, Bloomingdale, 146.

Ted Lapekas of Decatur received 294 votes and Robert B. McLeese, also of Decatur, polled 262 to trail Dittlinger in the Democratic column.

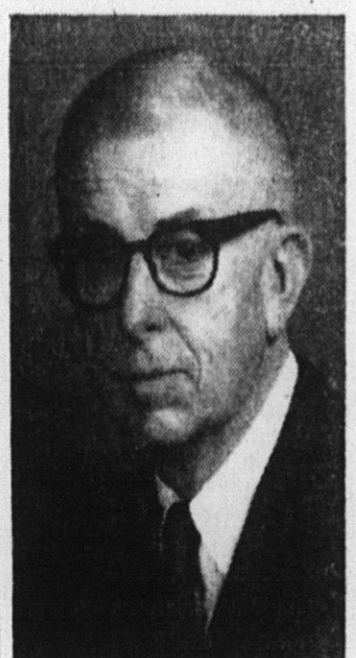

Twenty years of public service to the Board of Public Works was recognized for Henry S. Maentz at a retirement dinner in his honor Monday night at Point West attended by board members, top management and their wives.

Maentz who also served as president was presented with a framed resolution for his services over a span of 20 years which saw the city grow from 3.2 square miles to 13 square miles, with a corresponding rapid expansion in services provided by the Board of Public Works.

Win Roser, vice president of the board, presented the resolution during an informal program which also brought greetings from Mayor L. W. Lamb Jr. who expressed appreciation for cooperation and fine relations with City Council through the years.

In his response, Maentz spoke of his pleasure in serving the board and commended Supt.

Gay E. Bell and his assistant, Robert Riemersma, and others for the great strides in the two decades, and looking forward to even greater achievements in the future.

The resolution commended Maentz for wisdom in advance planning for public utilities and for obtaining the best possible consulting services in formulating long-range plans, recognizing his background of business management and his practical experience as a leading financier in the area.

It recognized his belief that public ownership of local utilities are desirable in providing needed competition for privately owned utilities functioning in monopoly positions.

In the last two decades, there were three expansions of the James De Young generating station increasing generating capacity from 20,000 to 82,500 kw. An interconnection with Consumers' Power increased emergency capacity for both power systems and a deep water channel to Lake Michigan enabled low cost shipping of coal.

Other achievements in 20 years include converting two boilers from stoker-fed coal to dual-fuel gas and oil units; a new water supply facility utilizing Lake Michigan as a source of supply; a contract to sell water to the city of Zeeland during offpeak hours, and the approval of a proposal to sell water to Holland and Park townships through the utility department of the Ottawa County Road Commission.

Also included is a new modern waste treatment plant together with improvements to the collection system and enlargement of the interceptor sewer system.

Other members of the Board of Public Works are Charles Cooper, Robert Wolbrink, Floyd Folkert and Winthrop Roser.

Water Plant Sets Pumping Record

Holland's water plant pumped a record 14,765,000 gallons Tuesday—the highest in the 14 years of the plant. The capacity of the water system is said about 14 million gallons.

Board of Public Works officials said heavy demand for sprinkling in the heat wave probably created the record water pumpage.

The generating plant set a record Tuesday also. It sent out 926,800 kilowatt hours of power, 144,000 kilowatt hours for the Michigan Power Pool.

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STRANGER ANTI-SMUT LAWS

Very quietly last month the Supreme Court handed down a couple of rulings that strengthen the hand of the law in dealing with pornography. In one instance it reversed the decision of a District Court which held that since a person may possess pornographic materials in the privacy of his own home with no intent to exhibit or sell it, he should also have the right to have the stuff sent to him through the mails.

The Court thus reaffirmed the position that the Post Office has the power to prohibit obscene materials from being sold through the mails and that obscenity does not enjoy the freedom of the press.

In a second instance the Court upheld the right of the customs officers to search for and seize any materials that violate the United States laws against obscenity. It stated that no one has the right to import from abroad any obscene materials either for publication or private use.

The result is that the two main deterrents to the smut trade have been reinforced: authority to seize material at customs and authority to bar the use of the mails in the distribution of it. In view of many liberalizing interpretations that have been made lately in regard to pornography, these two rulings represent something of a harder line, which we cannot help but approve.

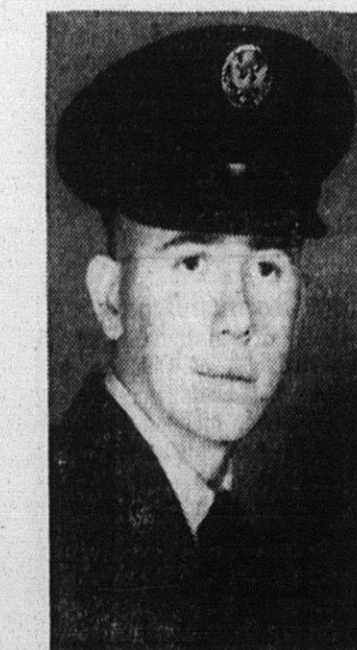
Park Attendance Higher Than 1970

Attendance at Holland State Park continues ahead of 1970 with the week's attendance through June 27 at 73,397 and a season total of 488,687. There were no camping turnaways this past week, the season's total remains 903.

Day use turnaways stand at 3,675 for the season so far, with 600 last week.

Purchases of daily and annual permits are also higher than last year. Resident annual permits purchased last week total 1,763 for a season's total of 17,819. Daily permits last week were 935 for a total for the season of 5,559.

Non-resident daily permits last week were 101, for a 495 season total with annual permits totaling 95 for the week and 653 for the season.

Sunday School Lesson

Sunday, July 4
Set Free to Serve
Galatians 5:13-26
By C. P. Dame

With this lesson we are beginning a new series of lessons.

It is worth observing that on Sunday, July 4, we are studying a lesson about freedom. In our consideration of this lesson keep to the fore the truth that sin enslaves but Christ frees.

I. The Lord Jesus gives freedom. Paul wrote the epistle to the Galatians because the people to whom he had preached the gospel of grace were forsaking this gospel for a heresy. False teachers had come and taught that in order to be saved it was necessary for Gentiles to be circumcised and keep the law. Paul had taught them that faith in Christ saves, it was mercy not merit.

"For brethren, ye have been called unto liberty," that is spiritual liberty. What is liberty? Some say to do as one pleases, every one can do his own thing. There is a freedom which is bondage, there is a bondage which is freedom. Paul called himself a slave of Jesus Christ and yet he was the freest man in the world. Some think they are free because they live as they please but in reality they are slaves of sin. Committed Christians are the freest people in the world.

Free people keep the law of love—they love God and hence their neighbors. Paul, in the lesson text, quotes Leviticus 19:18. Obedience to that law frees us from our lowest instincts. This involves walking by or in the Spirit.

II. Freedom necessitates a struggle. "For the flesh lusteth against the Spirit and the Spirit against the flesh." Christians know that the old nature seeks to regain control and hence there is a struggle going on between the old nature and the new self. Yielding to the guidance of the Holy Spirit means victory over sin and the flesh, that is the lower nature.

The list of sins is plain enough. Newspapers tell about these sins, some are sins of the flesh, others of the spirit. The sexual sins which were common then and are now. Paul mentions first. All the sins enslave, and keep people from heaven, "they which do such things shall not inherit the kingdom of God." The Bible teaches that there are two ways, two rulers, two destinies and hence man can choose.

III. The Spirit brings blessings. "But the fruit of the Spirit is"—and then the list of virtues which bring real satisfaction. Great indeed is the contrast between the works of the flesh and the fruit of the Spirit! When the Holy Spirit is in control of a person, then there is the warfare against the works of the flesh, and the daily practice of the Christian graces. Fruit grows, it is not manufactured. Let the Holy Spirit run your life!

Youthful Drivers Of Powered Bikes Concern Deputies

Use of mini-bikes and other motor driven two - wheeled vehicles by youths as young as ten years of age is causing concern to Ottawa County sheriff's deputies.

Sheriff Bernard Grynsen, in an appeal to parents, said the use of mini-bikes on public streets and lands by under-aged operators is in violation of state laws.

He added that the owner of a motorcycle is forbidden to let any persons who is not licensed to operate a motorcycle, drive his machine on the public streets and highways.

Grynsen added that the owner or parent is responsible should the unlicensed operator become involved in an accident.

Deputies said one of their greatest concerns was that the youths operating the bikes might injure other youngsters playing in the area.

State law does not provide for the licensing of persons under 15 to operator mini - bikes or other motor driven vehicles on public streets and lands.

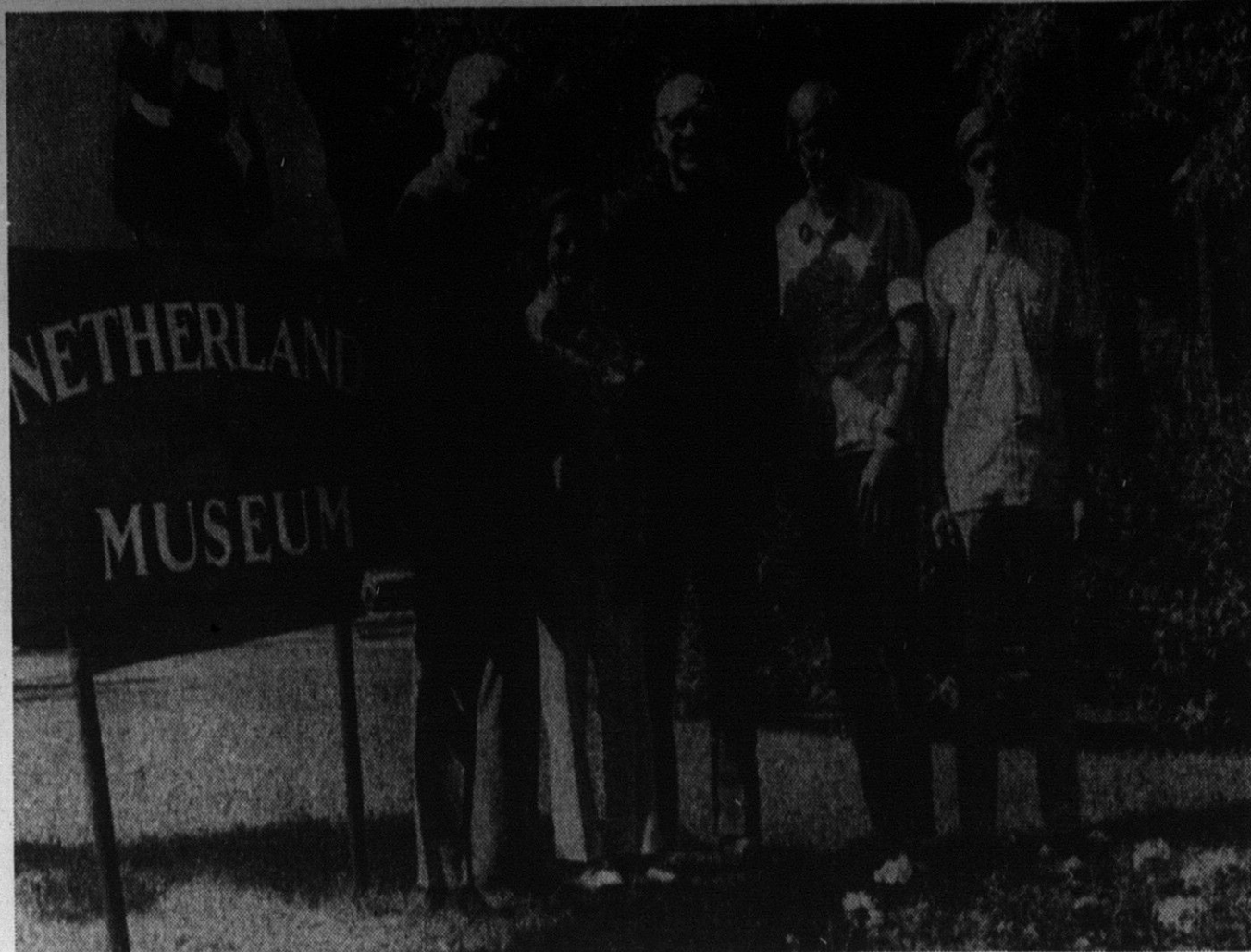
Special permission to operate such powered vehicles is obtainable if the vehicle and the applicant meet requirements of a license examiner.

Grynsen said his department has been receiving an increasing number of complaints from persons concerned about the use of the powered vehicles by persons under 15 years of age on the streets and roads.

Electric Service Cut

Electric customers in the western regions of the city were without power for about five minutes Saturday afternoon shortly after 3 p.m. when primary lines at Fourth St. and Pine Ave. became crossed and knocked out a circuit, Board of Public Works officials said today.

Consul General Visits Holland

Paying an informal visit to Holland last weekend is the new Consul General of the Netherlands government in Chicago, Jan W. M. van der Vossen, accompanied by his wife, his son Peter, 18, and Frank van Oortmerssen, a classmate in The Hague where both youths attend school.

The van der Vossens arrived in Chicago two months ago and are now in the process of getting settled in a new apartment with household effects coming from The Hague and from Indonesia where the diplomat was stationed for 1½ years.

The Chicago headquarters is a sort of sub-embassy serving the Dutch people and those in related work all over the mid-west. It deals mainly with Dutch citizens and their problems but also is closely geared to Netherlands trade in America.

Local residents who have associations with Indonesia will be happy to know that relations with the Dutch were "never better." The new consul general said Indonesian leaders are working with the Dutch more closely than ever before, a sharp contrast to the revolutionary period in the late 1940's when Indonesia became independent from the Dutch government after hundreds of years.

The Dutch envoy said he arrived in Jakarta in 1968 just after the Indonesians had signed a treaty with New Guinea through the United Nations. This led to renewed cooperation with the Dutch government and now serves as a model for treaties with other nations.

The Dutch language no longer

is the official language of Indonesia but all over 40 still speak it and after two decades of change, the Indonesian people seem to have complete confidence in the improved system, the diplomat commented.

Van der Vossen who turned 54 last week was born in Utrecht and studied at Leiden University. After military service, he started his diplomatic career serving in the United Kingdom, Canada, Pakistan, Congo (Kinshasa) and Indonesia. He has three sons, two of adult age.

Next to diplomatic functions as hostess, Mrs. van der Vossen is interested in volunteer hospital work. A registered nurse, she was active in such work in a large mental hospital in Jakarta, and after getting settled, a complicated task with household effects still coming from half - way around the world, she hopes to do some work in Chicago hospitals.

The van der Vossens are anxious to see more of America, particularly the midwest where a good share of Dutch citizens have settled.

The new consul general succeeds Johannes (Jan) C. van den Berg who has visited this city on several occasions and also served as marshal of the Tulip Time parade of bands in 1968. Van den Berg is now on assignment for the Dutch government in West Berlin.

In Holland, Willard C. Wichers of the Netherlands Information Service arranged for the van der Vossen party to visit the Netherlands Museum, Windmill Island, the beaches and other points of interest.

Construction Of Crime Lab Is Started

Construction of a State Police crime laboratory to serve Western Michigan law enforcement agencies has started in Holland Township.

The 100-by-50 foot cement block building will house facilities to aid law officers in criminal investigations, Capt. William Van Stratt, commander of the State Police Scientific Laboratory section said.

The laboratory is expected to be operational by Sept. 1 and will be manned by eight State Police personnel, he added.

The building is under construction on Garden Ave., north of East Lakewood Blvd. Between 120th and 112th Ave.

Van Stratt said the Holland lab is one of three such facilities located away from the East Lansing police headquarters. Two others are in operation at Plymouth and Warren near Detroit. The Holland lab will be the first of its type in Western Michigan, Van Stratt said.

The laboratory will provide examination of narcotics, fire arms identification, questioned document identification, latest print identification and trace evidence.

Included in the facilities will be a mobile crime lab for use by personnel in field examination. Van Stratt said the mobile lab will be used to gather and mark evidence obtained at the crime scene for examination and identification at the Holland laboratory.

Van Stratt said personnel are being assigned to the Holland facility from labs at East Lansing, Plymouth and Warren.

The building will contain about \$85,000 worth of scientific equipment.

New Trial For Dump Is Denied

GRAND HAVEN — The board of Olive township, which is fighting the establishment of a county-wide sanitary landfill and public dumping ground for Ottawa county in that township, met another setback in Circuit Court Monday.

Prosecutor Calvin Bosman informed the Board of Commissioners Monday, meeting in monthly session, that Judge Raymond L. Smith earlier in the day entered an order in the case, denying a motion for a new trial filed by the township attorney, former Prosecutor J. W. Bussard of Grand Haven.

The suit, started by the township last Sept. 25, after the County Road Commission started to prepare an area dump for the northwest part of the county, on Stanton St., was heard in Circuit Court and the complaint was dismissed by Judge Smith April 26. He ruled that, if properly managed and if borings are made to test water levels periodically, the project would not constitute a public or private nuisance.

Bosman said another delay may result if the township board appeals to the state appellate court. Bussard said today that he plans to appeal the decision.

Grand Haven and north Ottawa have been without a public dumping ground since Aug. 1, 1970, when the state health department closed the Harbor Island landfill on Grand River at Grand Haven. Residents now must use an area dump in Park township.

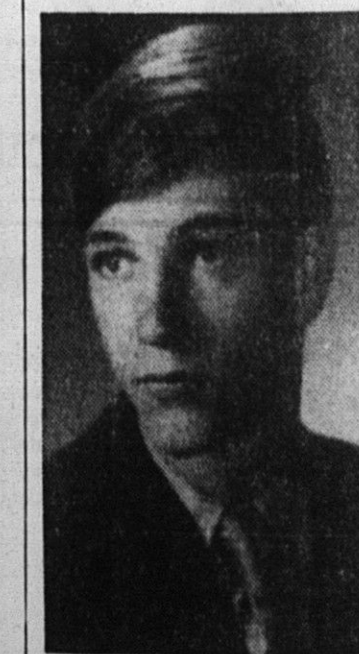

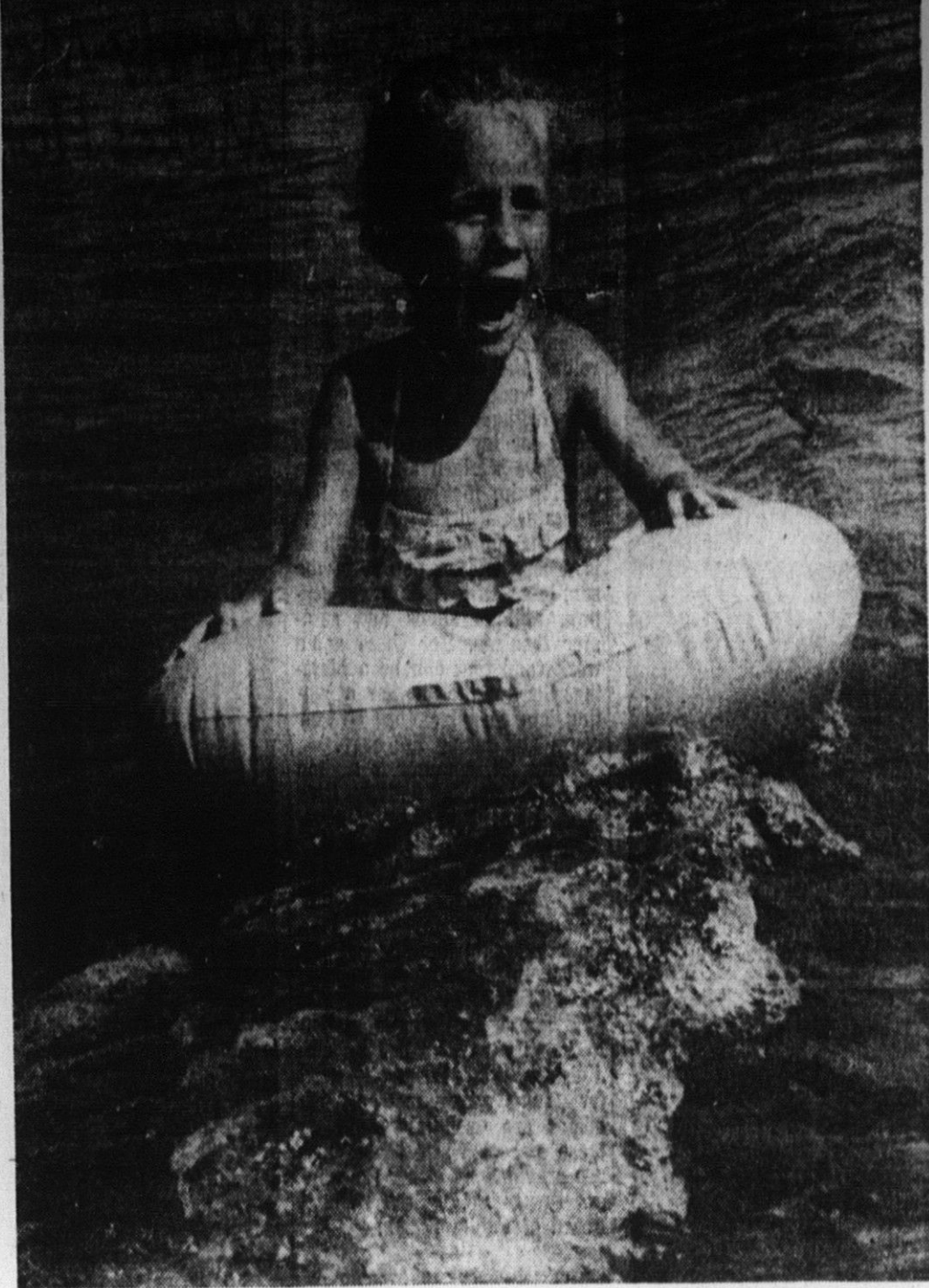

Critic's Letter Changes Symbol On Certificates

Robert Cecil's letter protesting a company symbol indicating smoke pollution is the subject of a special box in the July 5 issue of Time Magazine.

Cecil, a member of the music faculty of Hope College, had purchased a share of stock (about \$600) in Michigan General Corp., a diversified manufacturer which employs his brother. He was upset over the symbol on the stock certificate of the Roman god Vulcan and a series of smokestacks spewing clouds of black smoke.

He told the company it was an insensitive symbol and Michigan General, a maker of abrasives among other things, changed the image. Vulcan was dethroned, the stacks were scrapped, and the stock certificates now show three men — a scientist, an industrialist and a workman.

With the new certificate, Michigan General says it now is fighting air pollution in spirit as well as in substance.

Cecil said it was the first stock he had purchased outside of some mutual funds. The story originally appeared in the company's trade paper and in the Wall Street Journal.

Ruptured Fire Main Cuts Water Supply

A 10-inch underground water main supplying water to a fire protection sprinkler system at Roamer Yachts, 222 Lakewood Blvd., ruptured Monday afternoon, sending a geyser of water 30 feet into the air.

Holland Board of Public Works officials said the loss of 100,000 gallons prompted a cutoff of the Zeeland transmission line. Zeeland officials imposed a sprinkling ban in the face of dwindling water supplies.

BPW officials said the Roamer main, which connects to the Holland water transmission line, was shut off and the water loss had little effect on water supplies to Holland residents.

By Tuesday morning water reserves in Zeeland were back to normal, Zeeland BPW officials said.

Officials at Roamer said the water main had been installed about 15 years ago and that it appeared one of the welded seams in the pipe had let loose. The pipe ruptured near the southwest corner of the plant. No damage to the interior of the plant was reported.

Repairs to the ruptured water main were made Tuesday.

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
