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Skip's Hit Second Time

Pharmacy Hit By Lone Bandit

Skip's Pharmacy, 700 Michigan Ave., was robbed Friday for the second time in less than two years when a male subject shoved a shopping bag at a clerk with a written hold-up note. The bandit fled with an estimated \$55 to \$120 in cash. Holland police later stopped a small van-type vehicle with three subjects inside, one of whom matched a description of the bandit but said the three were being charged after a quantity of suspected marijuana was found in the vehicle.

RCA Synod Says Giving Increased

NEW YORK — Reports of an upswing in giving, both on the local level and to the national program, produced a mood of optimism and a commitment to "Advance in Mission" at the 168th General Synod of the Reformed Church in America, meeting the week of June 15 at Hofstra University, Hempstead, Long Island.

General Synod, which is the governing body of the 225,000 member denomination, heard the good news that contributions for all purposes totaled \$50,570,000 in 1973, an increase of some \$6 million over the previous year. In the same period, benevolence giving to the national program jumped 15 per cent, the first significant rise in seven years.

The denomination which will celebrate its 350th birthday in 1978, heard and applauded plans for an "Advance in Mission" program that will include such special projects as aid to Vietnamese war orphans and stepped-up leadership training and opportunities for members of Black, Hispanic and Indian congregations.

The role of women within the church which many had seen as an explosive issue failed to ignite strong reactions. The Church had always maintained the principle of an all-male clergy until last year when a woman, Ms. Joyce Stedje, was ordained by her local judicatory and installed as pastor of the Reformed Church in Accord, N. Y. This action prompted several overtures asking for her recall. However, the Synod refused to declare her ordination and installation "null and void."

The delegates approved a proposed amendment to the Church constitution that would provide for the ordination of women as ministers. The amendment must be ratified by 30 of the 44 "Classes," or local judicatories, before it can take effect. While awaiting final resolution of the matter, the Classes are being asked to suspend further licensure and ordination of women candidates.

In other actions affecting women, the Synod voted its agreement with several recommendations of its Christian Action Commission. Among them were: The elimination of existing discrimination against women within the church and of "sex stereotypes" in church school materials; greater representation by women at all levels of church leadership; stronger efforts to enroll women in Reformed Church seminaries, and examination of the liturgy for possible "sexist bias."

The delegates also called for reform in political campaign financing and for continuing study of homosexuality as it relates to the church, but deleted a recommendation to "provide compassionate acceptance of such persons within the church."

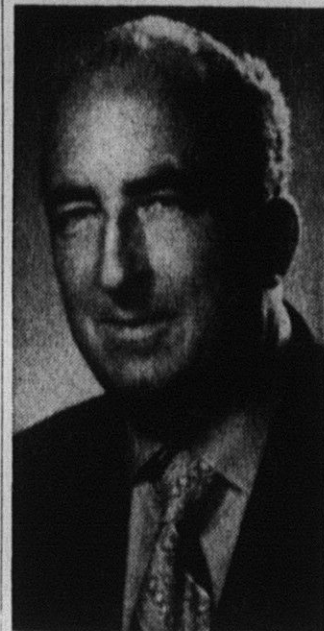
The question of the denomination's relationship to the National Council of Churches, frequently a stormy issue, was answered with a decisive 186-52 vote to "once again reaffirm our membership in the NCC."

Cash, Bank Bag Taken from Store

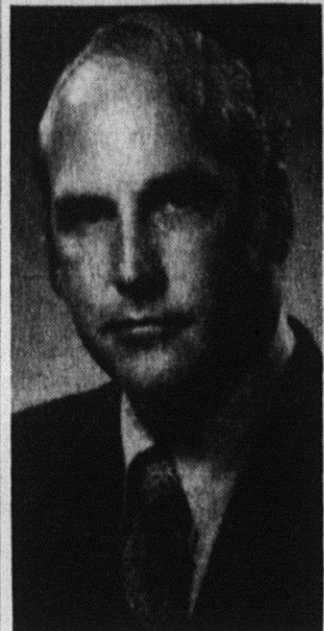

The Home Division, Lear Siegler, Inc., has appointed two sales managers as part of a realignment of distribution of the mobile home heating and air conditioning products.

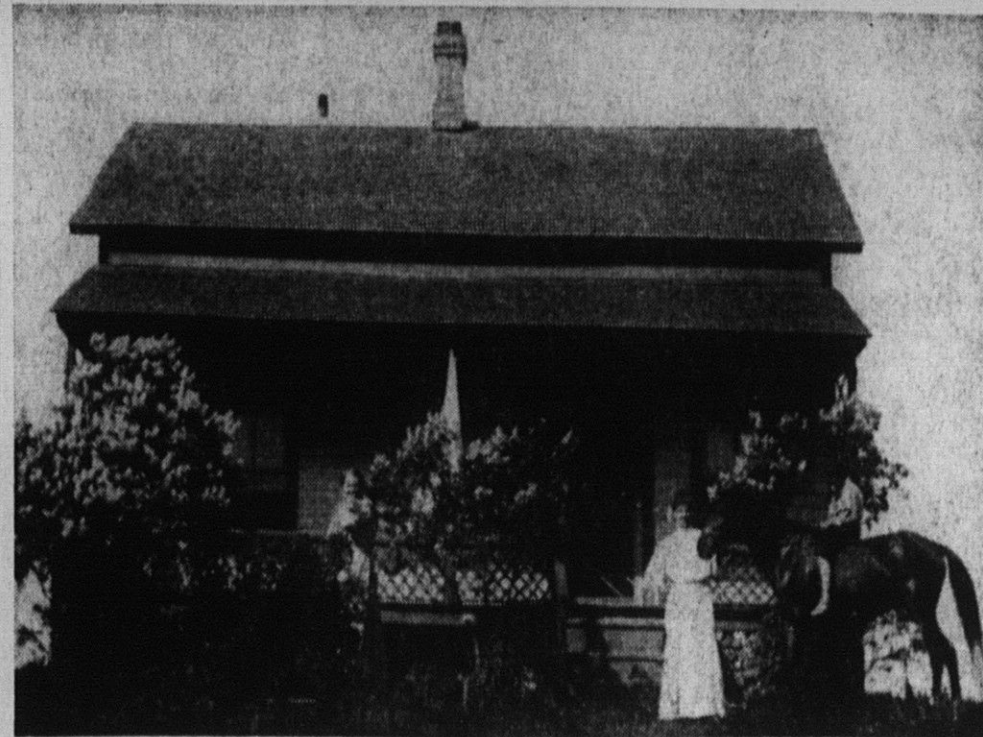

Remembers Hamilton In Early 1900s

The waning lumbering days of Allegan county are recalled by an 85-year-old Holland resident, Charles Hapeman of 36 South River Ave. who was born near Hamilton.

Hapeman was named Charles Benjamin Harrison by his father, George, who died in 1900 and his mother, the former Mary Elizabeth Goode, who struggled to raise the family after the father died. Hapeman was actually born in March, but since the cedar swamps of the area were impassable from the first thaw until late spring, his birth wasn't registered at the county seat until June by the family doctor, so he celebrates his birthday then.

Until the swamps were lumbered out, they sheltered four lakes, Sink, Portage, Terry's and Mud Lake, all long since dried up when sun and wind did its work on the light soil. Hapeman remembers his father and another man digging up peat in the swamp, which his mother used to bake a batch of bread in the old cook-stove.

The old Veneklasen brickyard, described in a Tulip Time edition story sparked Hapeman's reminiscences. The brickyards succeeded the lumber mills as employers of local labor, and were used for many buildings in the area, according to Hapeman: the auditorium of the Hamilton School, as foundations for the Methodist, Presbyterian and Dutch churches in Hamilton as well as for the Hamilton railroad depot.

Among the pictures brought to The Sentinel by the descendant of local pioneers was one of the family home, taken after George Hapeman's death in 1900 shown above, and the Hamilton Graded school, a brick structure, a picture of the Veneklasen work force in front of the brick building and huge kilns, as well as one of his mother.

The Hapeman home was lo-

cated on a road called Stump St. because of the cedar stumps used as fences on both sides. Nearby was a grist mill powered by water which ground the local farmers' grain. The mill, the brickyards and lumber mills which once made the area southeast of Holland a thriving community are all gone, but Hapeman remembers, with the vivid detail stamped on a child's memory.

Court Issues Injunction

BPW Workers End Days Strike

Striking employees of the Board of Public Works returned to work late Monday obeying a temporary restraining order issued by Allegan County Circuit Judge George Corsiglia and requested by the city.

The employees represented by Local 586 of the Service Employees International Union, AFL-CIO, struck midnight Sunday when the old contract expired and set up picket lines at the power plant, water treatment plant, the waste treatment plant and City Hall offices.

The union went on strike over a contract dispute claiming it had a valid agreement with the BPW and wanted it signed. City Council rejected the agreement and directed negotiations be continued.

In issuing the restraining order ending the strike, Judge Corsiglia set a hearing Friday morning at 10:30 into making the order permanent.

City Manager William L. Bopf said the city argued for the restraining order claiming public necessity that the strike be ended. Bopf said irreparable damage could have resulted

should the strike continue. Supervisory personnel maintained utility services while the strike was under way. The union represents 77 employees of the BPW.

Bopf said no meetings have been scheduled between the union or city council but a hearing July 18 continues into an unfair labor practice suit filed by the city against the union.

BPW General Manager Ronald L. Rainsan said no difficulties developed Monday while supervisory personnel were operating the utilities and complemented the manner in which picketing employees conducted themselves.

Local School Boards Name Officers

Ed Haltenhoff was elected president of the West Ottawa Board of Education at an organizational meeting Monday in keeping with a policy of rotating the presidency. Haltenhoff succeeds Louis J. Van Slooten as president.

Other officers elected were Carl H. Schaftenaar as vice president and Wesley Waldron as secretary.

The board also confirmed Aug. 26 as the date for a second election on operating millage for the school district. The amount of the levy to be asked will be determined later, School Supt. Lloyd Van Raalte said. Voters June 10 rejected a 22 mill request 587 to 504.

The Holland Board of Education at its special organizational meeting Monday night reelected its current officers. They are James O. Lamb, president; Robert Gosselaar, vice president; Mrs. Katherine MacKenzie, secretary, and Charles Bradford, treasurer.

Lamb, who was elected to the board in 1963 has served as president since July, 1965.

Mercury Hits 90 First Time

The mercury rose to 90 degrees Monday afternoon, the first time it hit the 90s this year.

Rainfall, most of which fell during electrical storms, totaled .27 inch up to 11 a.m. Tuesday. Most residents were grateful, since lawns needed the moisture.

The piers at Holland State Park were closed today because of waves of six feet or more. The red flag was out and no swimming was allowed.

Industrial Plant Entered

Juveniles were believed responsible for a break-in reported Monday at 9:56 a.m. at Holland Hitch Forwarding, 1122 Industrial Ave. where two fire extinguishers were emptied on the floors. Entry was gained through an east side door. Nothing was reported missing.

Summer Tax Bills In Mail Saturday

Holland city summer tax bills were mailed Saturday, listing a total tax levy of \$6,679,728.43. Of this amount, \$2,380,537.42 is for city taxes and \$4,299,191.01 for schools.

The city tax rate is unchanged from last year except for recent voter approval of bonds for storm and sanitary sewers. The new rate is \$16.32, up from \$15.62 last year.

The school tax rate, reflecting added voted operating millage, is \$29.842, up from \$25.358.

Summer bills are sent only to city property owners. Areas outside this city but in the school district will be billed later by their townships.

City taxes are based on a state equalized valuation of Holland city of \$145,866,290.

Enclosed with tax bills is a brochure explaining the tax breakdown.

For the first time this year, senior citizens, veterans and blind exemptions will face larger tax bills. It is the first billing under the new state law in which exemptions are not on the bill. Instead, reimbursements will be made on application after the fall billing Dec. 1. The new program is under the Michigan Income Tax division.

Bills are payable at the city treasurer's office through Aug. 15 without penalty.

In South Shore Dr. Suit

Appellate Court Rules for City

An appellate court ruled Friday that the City of Holland has the right to levy special assessments on residents of South Shore Dr. for improvements to that street, overturning a Circuit Court decision last year. City officials doubted whether the street would be paved this year.

The Appeals Court held that a municipality may levy a special assessment for street improvements when the benefit conferred upon adjoining property owners is different from the general benefit to the community at large.

Visiting Circuit Court Judge Harold Van Domelen of Hart ruled against the City of Holland last August following a non-jury suit brought by residents of South Shore Dr.

In appealing Van Domelen's decision, deputy city attorney John R. Marquis said the city hoped the appeal would clarify the issues involved in establishing assessment districts for street improvements.

City officials, when informed of the Appellate Court decision Friday, said they would await the official opinion before making public comment. Officials said the ruling would be reviewed by the city attorney before it is submitted to city council. But officials said they doubted whether the paving would be completed this year.

The original suit brought in Circuit Court listed as plaintiffs residents Paul Wabeke, Cotter Tharin, James Van Putten, Samuel Loewy and Helen Brockmeier.

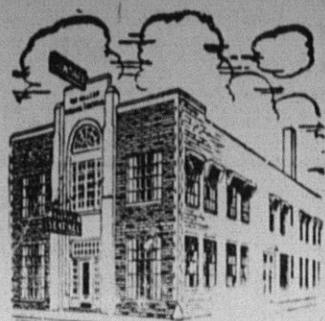

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SLOW DOWN, SAVE MONEY

The people who sell us auto insurance are more than pleased with the 55 mile per hour speed limit. In the first quarter of this year, 14 major auto insurers writing about 40 per cent of the business in Michigan, have shown a 13 per cent reduction in payouts from the period of the previous year. This has given them a healthy rise in profits.

All this brings home the harsh truth that the reason our insurance rates had been jumping in the last years was the rapidly rising number of accidents added to the inflationary spiral. If we had been able to control, and even decrease the accident rate, we would have been able to deal with the inflation. But with speed limits out of control we were pushing up payouts to the point of forcing insurance companies to raise rates.

It would be senseless to think that the insurance companies were unaware of this situation. They knew the problem. And it would be just as senseless to think that the general public was unaware of the problem. We were unwilling to face the facts of life, and the result was higher premiums. There is the possibility that if we can maintain our present record, insurance rates may drop.

What has happened to the insurance business is a good lesson about what happens in other areas. With few exceptions, inflation is caused by our unwillingness to stem our desires for things. It is a human problem, not an economic one. That makes it so complex.

Sunday School Lesson

Sunday, July 7
"God's Eternal Purpose"
Ephesians 3:1-13
By C. P. Dame

The Christians in Ephesus had once been out of God's family but through Christ had become with the Jews members of God's household. They had seen how God carried out His eternal purpose to break down the wall of partition between Jews and Gentiles and form one united family.

I. Being a prisoner can be an honor. Paul considered it so although often being imprisoned is a reproach. Paul was arrested and put in jail because he preached to Gentiles—see Acts 21:31. Paul belonged to Jesus Christ both when free and when bound. To suffer for Christ is something to be proud of—be it being ridiculed, the loss of friends, of money or of promotion, or business—He is worthy of all, everything! Do you agree?

II. God both hides and reveals. The Ephesian readers had heard before of the special revelation which had come to Paul and the apostles. The word "mystery" Paul uses refers to a truth made known, although hid before, recently to him and others, the truth that the gospel was for all and that God's family had been almost exclusively made up of Jews, would become a worldwide family composed of all manner of believers. This truth is in the Old Testament, was foretold by Old Testament prophets—the Messiah's kingdom would be worldwide—but how this would come about and when was not told. Acts tell how in the early church the universality of the gospel came to be realized and Jewish converted preachers like Peter and Paul won Gentile converts to their astonishment. God still surprises some preachers.

III. God gives special assignments. Paul was sure of his appointment to be an apostle to the Gentiles. God's grace was revealed in this choice. "I was made a minister," although I am "less than the least of all saints" he was called to preach the "unsearchable riches of Christ" to all men. This truth hid by God the creator of all things and marvelled at by angels reveals the wisdom of God. The Jews always thought that the proof of God's wisdom was the holy law which He gave to them. This new evidence of God's wisdom, the universal gospel, deserved praise, and should excite all workers to manifest a bold faith.

Paul always magnified Christ and the church. It is the function of the church to make known Jesus Christ whom God sent into this world to die for sinners from every country, clime, color and culture.

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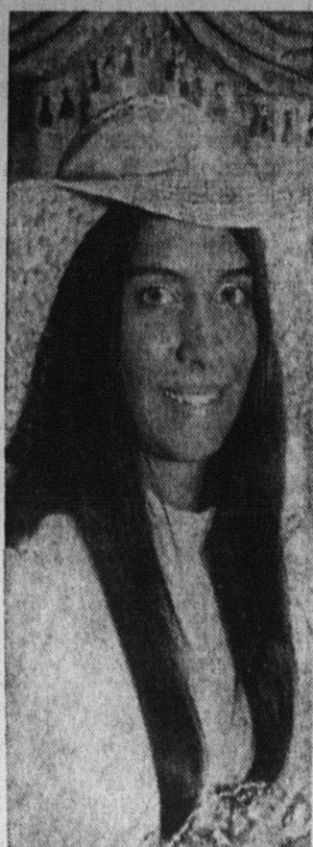

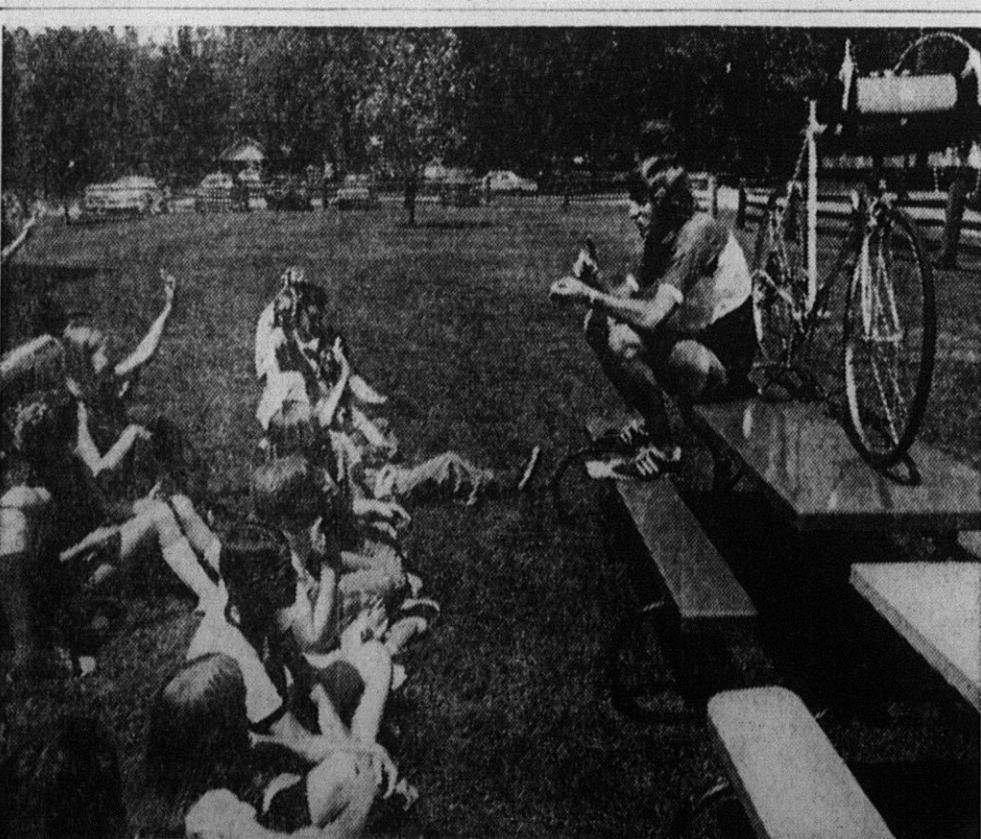

Cornie's Corner

Sunday, June 23, was a memorable day at Third Reformed Church, but the parishioners were generally unaware of it.

Holland figures prominently in a Chicago Tribune travel feature emphasizing vacation trips near home this summer.

Illustrated by a nice picture of our own Windmill De Zwaan, the trip advocated a motor tour from the Loop on I-94 east, and around the lower tip of Lake Michigan to Indiana Dunes State Park, then to Michigan City, Ind., for the International Friendship Gardens, past Three Oaks and then to the twin cities of St. Joseph and Benton Harbor, stopping at the large boulder at St. Joseph which marks the site where LaSalle and his band of French explorers built the Fort of the Miamis in 1679.

Then comes the Deer Forest at Coloma, Saugatuck with its quaint and arty shops, its paddle-wheel excursion boat, and the marine museum on the S.S. Keewatin, and onto Holland with its Dutch influence and 200-year-old Windmill, its Wooden Shoe factories, Dutch Museum and Hope College.

The tour continues to Grand Haven with its spectacular musical fountain and its Coast Guard festival early in August, Muskegon county and up to Ludington with its fine spots for coho fishing. A "sea" voyage is recommended here with car ferries taking the vacationers either to Manitowoc or Milwaukee, Wis., and then following I-94 from Milwaukee back to Chicago.

For those who seek to go further north in Michigan, there is the National Music Camp at Interlochen and many other attractions. Many summer theatres along the Lake Michigan shoreline offer fine entertainment of this type.

A new chapter covering southwestern Michigan has been

organized for the Michigan Nature Association, a statewide conservation group dedicated to the preservation of natural lands and public nature education areas. Kenneth Vanderkamp of Holland is acting director and he has started a membership drive in the local area.

He says the association is looking for potential nature sanctuaries in Allegan and Ottawa counties. The MNA owns and administers 28 such properties in the state including a 380-acre sanctuary in the Upper Peninsula which has frontage on Lake Superior of three-quarters of a mile. There also is a 200-acre tract of the famous Estivant Virgin Pines on the Keweenaw Peninsula.

The MNA sanctuary nearest Holland is a 110-acre prairie in Newaygo county featuring prickly pear cactus.

Memberships are \$10 for adults and families and \$2 for college students and those under 18. Further information may be obtained by calling Vanderkamp, 1761 Vans Boulevard.
