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Shootings At Two Homes Under Probe

Three shooting incidents, two at the same residence, were under investigation today by Holland Police and Ottawa County Sheriff's deputies. No injuries were reported.

Ottawa County deputies said shots were fired at the residence of Francisco Cuevas, 344 East Sixth St., early Sunday and again early today but no injuries were reported. Cuevas and his wife were asleep in the bedroom of their home when shots were fired at about 2:20 a.m. today.

Deputies said the shots, believed from a .22 caliber weapon, were fired from a passing car.

Holland police said the shots also believed fired from a passing car smashed the bedroom window of the Sue Jumper residence, 185 West 14th St. early today and damaged a car parked in front of the residence.

The Jumper woman was in the room at the time but was not reported injured. The incident was reported to police at 2:25 a.m. Monday.

Officers said they had a description of the car believed involved in the Jumper shooting. No one was reported in custody. Authorities declined to speculate on whether the shooting incidents were connected.

Former Hopkins Woman Held By Iowa Authorities

FORT MADISON, Iowa—Katherine Ann Young, 24, formerly of Hopkins, Mich. was held under \$50,000 bond in the Van Buren County jail at Keosauqua, Iowa in connection with the death of another woman.

Authorities said Miss Young stood mute to charges in the strangulation death of Patricia Talbert 26 of Fort Madison. The two women had worked together at a Fort Madison lounge where the saying was believed to have occurred May 25.

Police said Miss Young surrendered to police Monday and signed a statement. Police Chief William Hays said Miss Young led officers to a shallow grave five miles west of the city where the partially decomposed body was found.

Miss Young was said to have arrived in Iowa in January.

Recall Building Dedication in 1856

Marker Dedicated At Historic 'Pillar Church'

The dedication of the Michigan State Historical Marker on the lawn of Ninth Street Christian Reformed Church, Sunday fell only two days from the 119th anniversary of the dedication of the church by Dr. Albertus C. Van Raalte on June 25, 1856.

In his sermon at the 9:30 a.m. service at the church which preceded the ceremony on the church lawn, the Rev. Marvin Vander Werp used the text, Psalm 84:1 to 4, which included the two verses used by Dr. Van Raalte as the basis for his dedicatory sermon.

Rev. Vander Werp brought out three main points in his message on the theme, "How Lovely Is Thy Dwelling Place," stressing that in addition to the physical beauty of the historic old building it has an aura of loveliness which is evidence of the faith of the men and women who built it; its long service as a place of worship for these early settlers and for several generations of their descendants and because of the gospel which has been preached in it and which continues to be preached today.

In remarks made by Willard C. Wichers, for the Michigan Historical Commission, authorizing the marker, many incidents of the events of the original dedication and the circumstances surrounding the building of the church, were outlined.

Prior to this, Hero Bratt, chairman of the church's marker committee introduced Mayor Louis Hallacy who brought greetings, and Wichers, whose talk preceded the unveiling and presentation by Donald Por of the marker as a gift from the estate of Mr. and Mrs. Louis Por and the response by Bernard Velthouse, vice president of the consistory.

Wichers pointed out that the dedication was on a rainy day, but was still well attended and that the congregation included 30 students of Hope Academy.

He also told of Dr. Van Raalte's voicing the need for a new church at the first consistory of the new year in 1853 with a meeting to discuss how

it could be accomplished held that same month at J. Binnekan's house.

A year later, the plans became more concrete and Tunis Keppel, father of Miss Ruth Keppel began a canvass for funds, raising \$1,600 in subscriptions and \$150 in loans.

The amounts of money raised for the building 119 years ago, in a time of very little cash and much bartering of goods and labor seem so small in comparison to today's costs, but represented an amount of sacrifice hard to put into perspective. Work on the building was halted in the fall of 1854 while more cash was raised, as the contract for \$1,790, let to Herman Ver Beek, Jan Vennema, Piet Salsma and Gerrit Slenk covered only labor and material costs had risen to \$2,064. Piet De Vries spent weeks handplaning the floor boards and Ben Grotenhuis and his son, Johannes were given \$275 to paint the new building.

The use of the church as a community center was also emphasized by Wichers. Public subscription paid for a bell in 1850 which was hung in the belfry and for years alerted

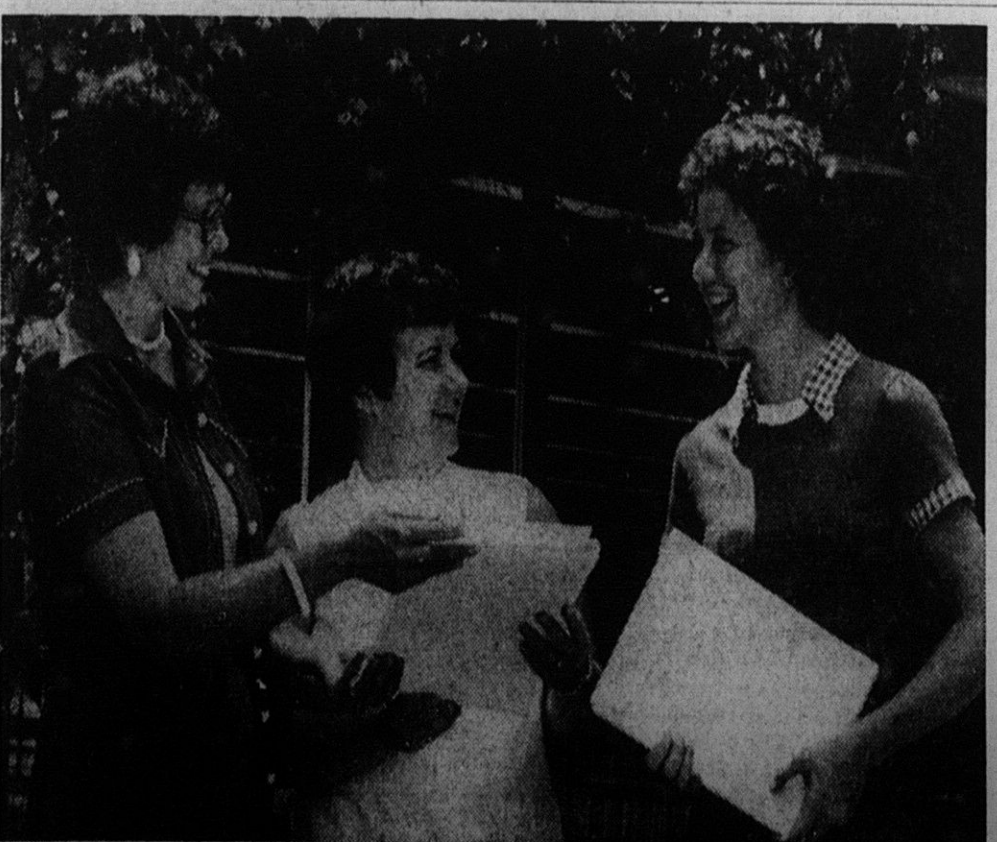

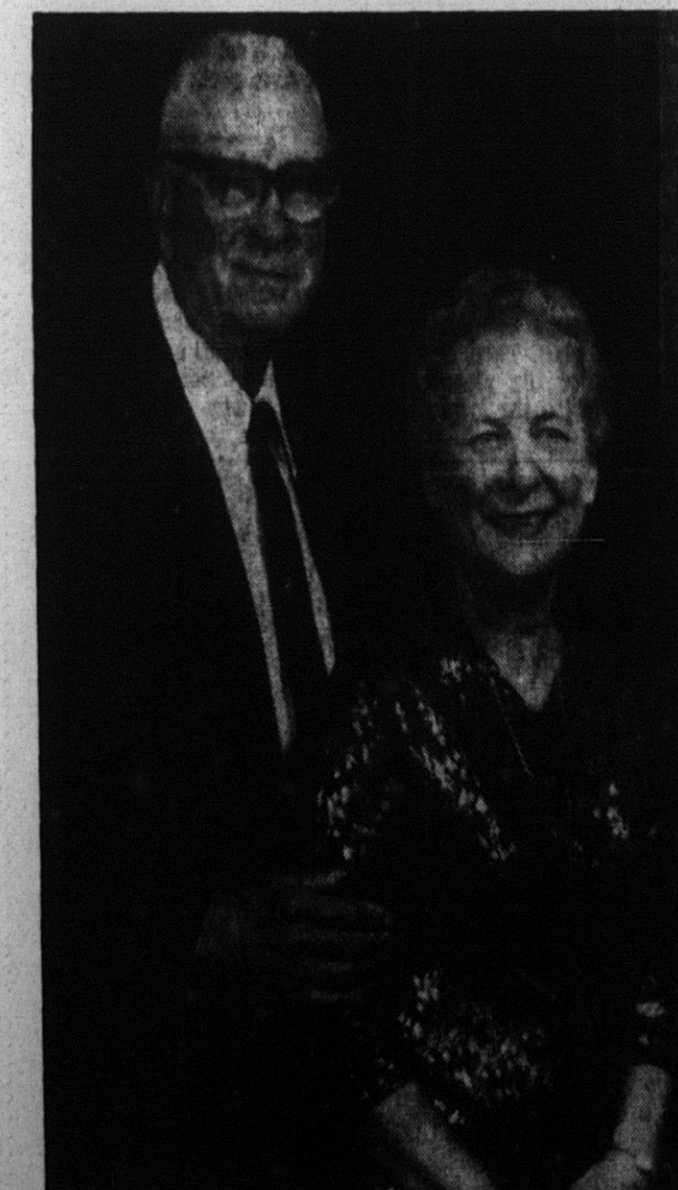

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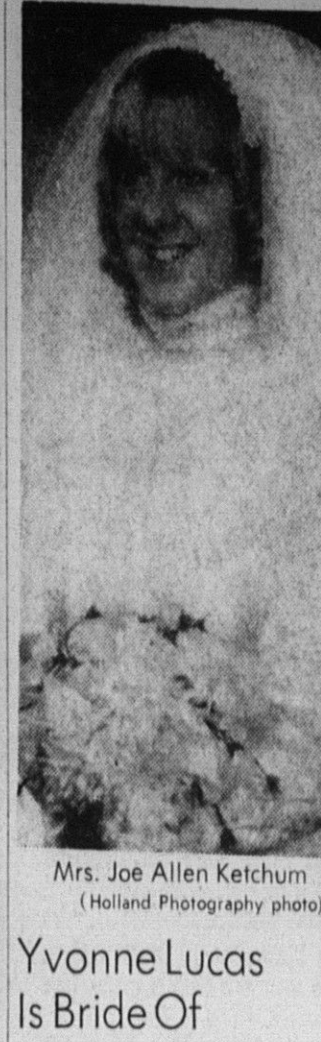

Onward Ozmopolitans: Not Really Oddities at All

Bill Eubank of Chicago illustrates all tools pictured in nationwide Sears advertisements. That's his profession. But his life is pure magic. Eubank devotes immeasurable time and innumerable talents to create projects which make children happy.

This year he created a series of carnival pictures with cutout heads depicting characters from the Wizard of Oz for children and adults attending the 15th annual International Wizard of Oz convention at Castle Park last weekend.

Several children were examining one of his optical gimmicks and Eubank's beamed: "Look at the children. That's the whole reason for

doing anything."

But it wasn't just the children who were enchanted with his many optical projects including three dimensional book covers of the 14 Oz books L. Frank Baum wrote.

Saturday Eubank was honored for his continuing contributions to the Oz Club which numbers almost 1,500 members internationally with its highest citation, the L. Frank Baum Memorial Award.

Last year Eubank designed and constructed costumes of the four major characters from the Wizard of Oz, costumes which have since been used in five Chicagoland area productions of the play.

"I design them to be used," says the man who one year

presented a magic show featuring — what else — tricks described in the Oz Books.

Ozmopolitans at Castle Park this year numbered larger than ever.

"Don't you live around here?" the question was directed at Eubank by a California delegate. "No, I live in Chicago," Eubank replied.

"That's around here." The Californians were joined by conventioners from New Jersey, Texas, Missouri and Canada. Other conventions are held in different parts of the United States but the Castle Park event is, traditionally the largest.

Despite what has become a popular but misinformed opinions, club members bear no

distinguishing characteristics with the exception of an occasional Wizard of Oz T-shirt. The members are for the most part exceedingly intelligent and creative and are serious book and memorabilia collectors.

At 2 p.m. the Ozians swarm into the main dining room at the Castle for the yearly auction, "what most of us come for." Even the members who were nowhere in sight for the luncheon shortly before have now appeared. They juggle tables and chairs, jostling ever so friendly for the best view.

They continue their patient vigilance for an hour until officers of the club enter the room carrying the precious volumes and other memorabilia to be auctioned off.

"Do you need any help," queries are heard amidst "oohs" and "aahs" on the quantity of merchandise.

"The Winkies convention (another held elsewhere in the country) doesn't have nearly this much," one veteran whispered.

All items for the auction are donated by members and friends and proceeds are used to finance the elaborate club magazine, "The Baum Bugle."

And still the auction was further delayed as the Osmopolitans just couldn't resist examining the precious editions. Others waited impatiently in their seats, anxious for the main event to begin.

Children from ages seven and up sat eagerly clutching their long saved money in anticipation of purchasing their own editions.

Earlier that morning the group had taken a quiz written by last year's winner, Noah Seaman, 18, of New York City who admitted he had "only taken a week" to prepare questions designed to formally designate the most knowledgeable munchkin.

Dan Cox, 17, of Detroit, took this year's quiz honors with his unsurpassed knowledge including which Oz characters sleep but do not eat.

Karen Taylor, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Kenneth Taylor, 800 West 24th St., was the local conventioneer. She presented and was highly commended for an Oz book she has written and illustrated, "Travelers in Oz." She will be a seventh grader at E. E. Fell in the fall.

Bill Van Kamp, 8, of Northville, Ill., one of the younger veterans of conventions — "It's only my second convention" —

is reading his second Oz book. What does he like best about the convention? Bill finished slurping up his hot fudge sundae. "The food."

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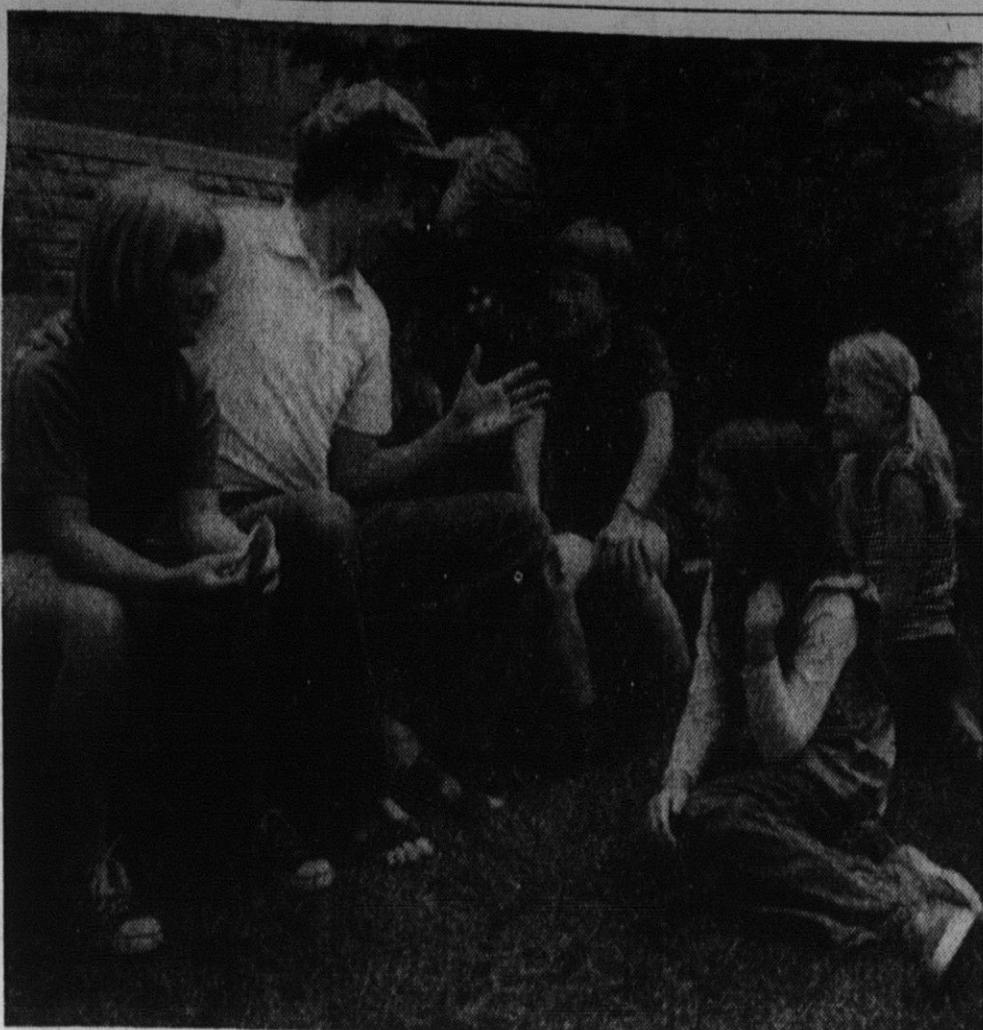

"This past season once again saw the girls out draw the boys in basketball in Iowa," offered Braaksma.

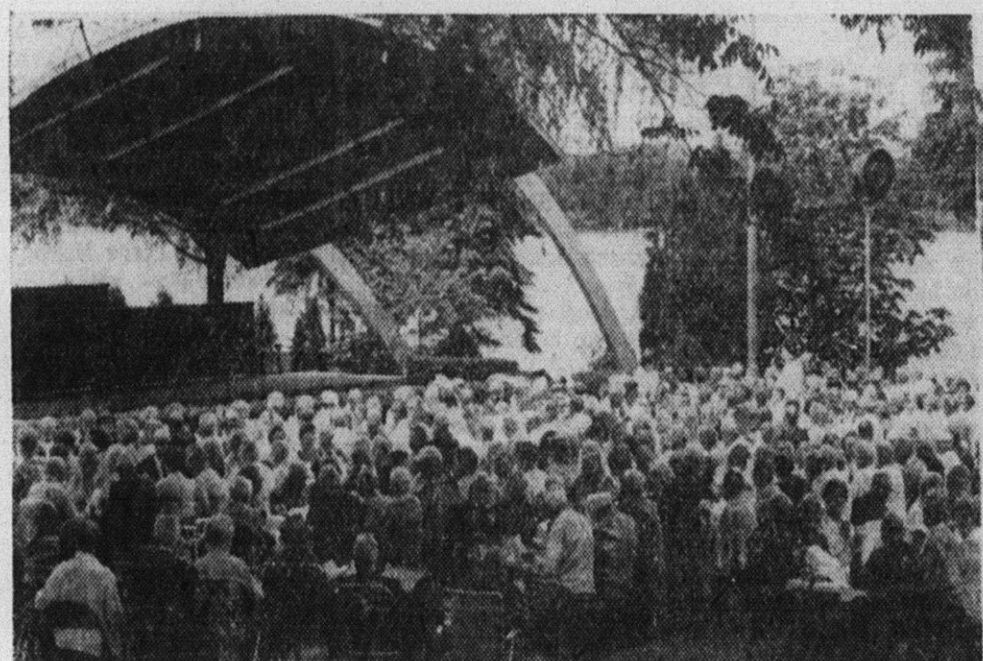
Mrs. Braaksma, a 1969 graduate of Cambria and Hope College in 1973 feels that you can specialize more at your game in Iowa.

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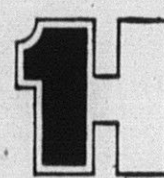


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SUMMER IS HERE AGAIN

Sunday School Lesson

A New Person in Christ

John 15:1-11

By C. P. Dame

The words of the lesson text were spoken by Jesus on the night before his crucifixion to his disciples who were troubled and apprehensive of the future. Jesus told them that they would be fruitful disciples if they abided in him, stuck closely to him always. The only way any one can bear fruit is to abide daily in Christ.

I. Disciples differ. A disciple is a learner. A person becomes a disciple by responding to the call of Jesus to follow him. A disciple should keep on learning. Jesus calls himself the true vine. Why Jesus spoke of the vine on that night is any person's guess. We do know that Israel is called God's vine which he had planted but the nation had failed and by contrast Jesus calls himself the true vine the real vine.

The Father, note the word "my" is the husbandman the vine dresser. He is actively engaged in pruning the branches which receive sap from the vine. Two kinds of branches get attention the fruitless and the fruitful, they represent two kinds of disciples. The fruitless are taken away, the fruitful are pruned so that they may bear more fruit. Note the word "more." They are disciplined by the word spoken by the Lord. The word had cleansed them but it disciplines. Paul speaks of reproof and of warning and of exhortation. Some church members want to be thrilled, never tested, complimented but not corrected. Circumstances, adversities, problems, discipline disciples and the result, more fruit told about in Galatians 5:22-23, Ephesians 3:9, Hebrews 12:11. Discipline involves the removing of all that hinders spiritual growth.

II. Abiding in Christ is beneficial. To abide or to remain in Jesus is to keep on believing in him. Note several benefits. One is our prayers will be answered. "Ask whatever you will and it shall be done for you."

Jesus refers to disciplined asking the kind that is in harmony with God's will. We want only what God wills. Another benefit is that the Father will be glorified. This was always the aim of Jesus when we aim to do this we will show to whom we belong. One more benefit note, abiding in Christ results in obeying the Lord. Jesus obeyed his Father to the limit. Love expresses itself in keeping the commandments. Observe another benefit we will experience the joy of Christ and show it daily in life.

Before ending the lesson note the contrast between the fruitless disciples and the fruitful. Verses two and five tell about the fruitless branches but the pruned branches bring forth much fruit and glorify the Father. The vine dresser, God, has invested much in us.

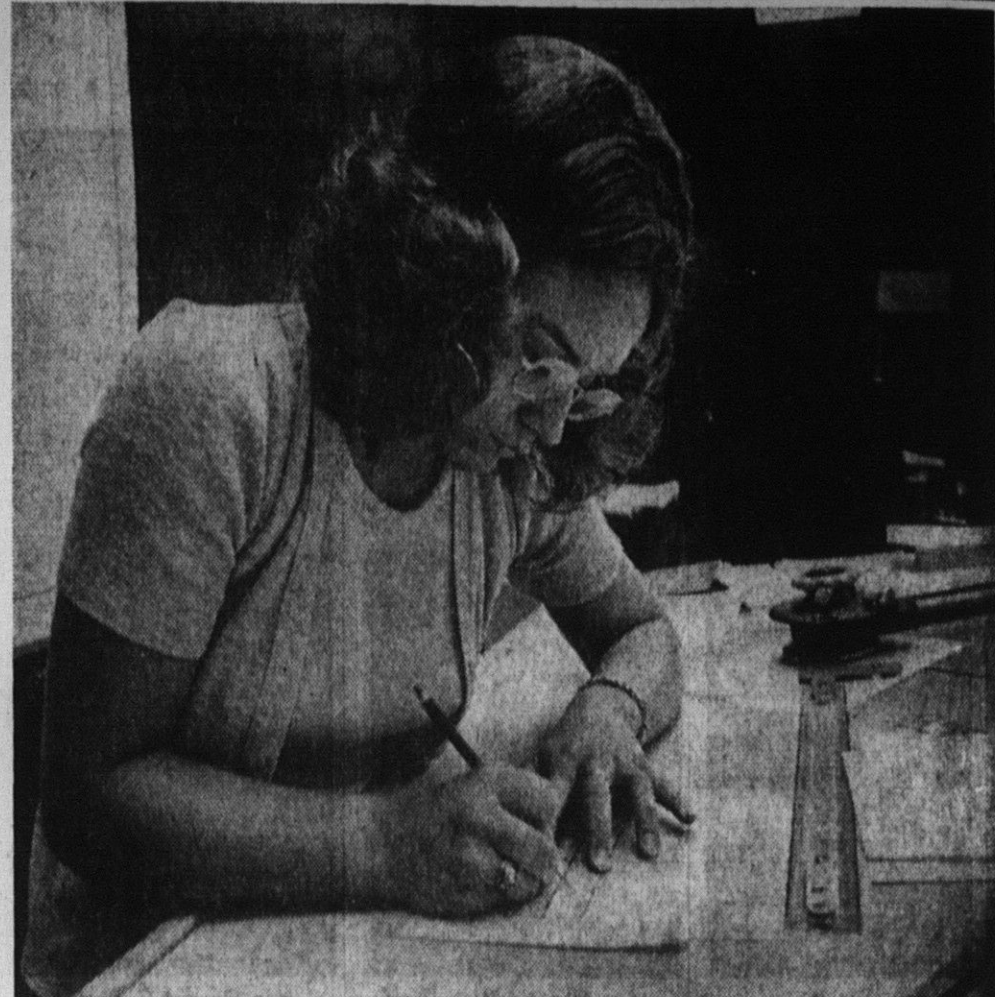

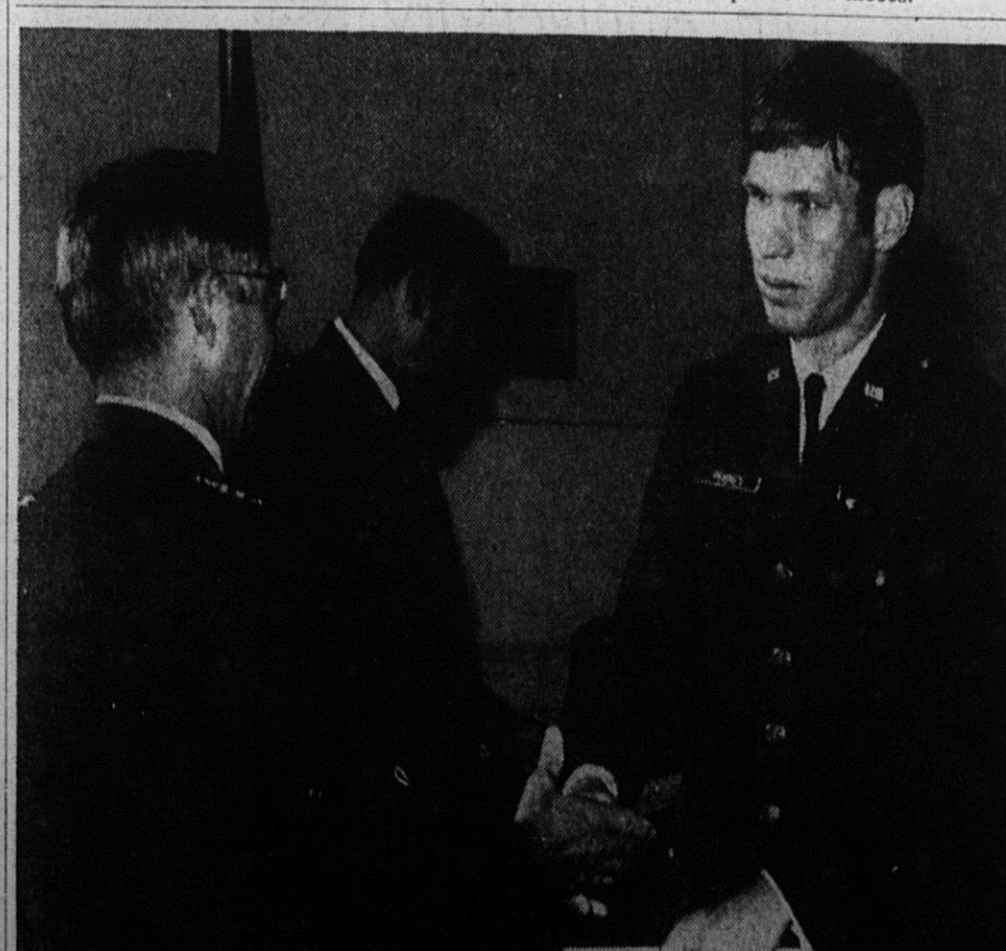
