City Council Meets Only 18 Minutes

July 26 Set for Date
Of Public Hearing
On Zoning Ordinance

In one of the shortest meetings in recent years, City Council Wednesday night processed only a few items of business and adjourned exactly 18 minutes after Mayor Nelson Bosman called the meeting to order.

Council reopened discussion on parking on the east side of State St. from 19th to 21st St. and voted 4 to 3 to allow parking there, but the vote did not carry since City Attorney James E. Townsend ruled that changing previous action would require a minimum of five favorable votes.

Several weeks ago, Council voted to restrict parking in the two-block area in the vicinity of Holland Christian High school, and two weeks ago residents in the area protested the action in an hour-long discussion. Council was faced with two alternatives, one to allow parking and the other to restrict parking from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. on school days, when Councilman John Beltman moved it be tabled until the July 5 meeting.

Voting against lifting the restriction were Councilmen John Beltman, William De Haan and Bert Slag. Further action may be taken at subsequent meetings.

Council set July 26 as date for public hearing for the zoning ordinance which has been under study by Council and the Holland Planning Commission for more than seven years. The proposed zoning ordinance is on file at the City Clerk's office. Motion to schedule the public hearing passed unanimously.

Wednesday's regular meeting followed an informal meeting not attended by the press.

Oaths of office were filed for John Sternberg, board of appeals, and John J. Rooks, traffic and safety commission.

The following gifts were accepted with thanks for the Hospital Board: four overbed tables from the Margaret Hummer guild valued at \$242, and four overbed tables from the Junior Welfare League in memory of Mrs. W. K. Westrate, also valued at \$242.

The following gifts were accepted with thanks for the Library Board: a gift of \$240 for the Golden Book on Nature Crafts from the Happy Nine Bluebirds of Lakeview School; a one-year subscription to a magazine entitled "Grapevine" from William P. Roberts, and a one-year subscription to the magazine, "Living Trails for Girls" from Mrs. Milton Vandenberg.

Council allowed expenditures on the following affidavits in connection with recent purchases by the city: from Morris Peerbolt, one air filter, \$2.25; Bert H. Slag, two pictures framed and one frame, \$29.75. The city charter provides that office holders doing business with the city must file affidavits which must be approved by City Council.

A city manager's recommendation that 12 additional parking meters be provided on Central Ave. between 10th St. and Graves Pl. was tabled for study until next meeting. The city manager explained that requests for one and two-hour meters had come from employees at the post office, Telephone Co., Temple Building and Ottawa Savings and Loan Association.

Council set a hearing for Aug. 16 on vacating an alley between 14th and 15th Sts. running from Van Raalte to Harrison Ave. A sketch was presented showing the alley in relation to current owners of record and it indicated that 17 out of 26 or 70 per cent of the property owners signed the petition favoring vacating the alley.

The city manager also pointed out that the Planning Commission recommends all alleys in residential zones either be vacated or paved, and that the Board of Public Works will want to reserve a utility easement for an existing pole line. Councilman Donald Oosterbaan moved to reconsider action taken last meeting on the Lindeman contract, but Councilman Slag's substitute motion that such consideration be tabled until the full Council is present took precedent. Renewing the public information contract with the Lindeman agency at \$6,000 a year lost at the previous meeting 5-4.

Absent were Councilmen Henry Steffens and Richard Smith. Jr. The invocation was given by the Rev. J. T. Hoogstra.

Holland Guard Unit Set For Summer Camp

With preparations now all but completed, Holland's National Guard Company is ready to join some 8,000 Michigan National Guardsmen this weekend at Grayling for the annual two-week National Guard summer encampment.

The local unit, Company D, has most of its equipment set for the trip, and guardsmen will convene at the Civic Center parking lot between 6 and 7 p.m. Friday to load personal equipment on the trucks that will take the company to Grayling.

The Holland unit will be among the majority of companies going to the summer camp by military truck convoy. Some units from the Detroit and Grand Rapids areas will fly to camp on "Flying Box-cars."

Company D will leave Holland at 5:20 a.m. Saturday and is scheduled to arrive in Grayling at 12:45 p.m. Saturday afternoon will be spent by local guardsmen setting up camp which includes pitching tents, unloading equipment and getting the mess hall ready to serve the unit's 103 men and four officers.

Officers of Company D said they look forward to a good camp this year.

The first week of the camp will be spent preparing for the Army Test, which is a sort of final examination of the unit's training during the period from last year's camp to the present camp. The first week will serve the men of Company D as a review period.

Training during the year has been conducted on a platoon level. The weapons platoon of Company D will take its Army Test on Tuesday of the first week at camp, and rifle platoons will be tested on Friday.

The Army Test given to National Guard units is the same test of training that is given to Regular Army units.

After the first week of training, Company D will move into the field for a four-day-and-four-night bivouac which begins the unit's training at the company level. Last year's camp was conducted on a squad level.

The interim between the two weeks of training will see the traditional Impressive Memorial Services on Sunday morning. Saturday Gov. John B. Swainson is scheduled to review the entire Michigan 46th Infantry Division of which the Holland unit is a part.

After two weeks of what officers say will be a rugged summer camp, Co. D will begin preparations on Friday for their departure.

The unit is slated to leave Grayling Saturday morning, July 22, and is scheduled to return to Holland at 2:25 p.m.

The family will be at the funeral home tonight and Friday night from 7 to 9 p.m.

Allegan Court House Being Razed

ALLEGAN—Demolition of Allegan county's 72-year-old court house was begun Wednesday ... a month behind schedule.

Officials of the B & B Salvage Company, Battle Creek, said differences of opinion regarding federal regulations—which apply to the project since Hill-Burton funds were used for part of the construction of the new county building—had been ironed out.

The Salvage company arrived with the same six-man supervisory crew which Clerk of the Works Albert Horton had refused to allow to start razing the old structure a month ago, but officials of the firm indicated that no local help would be recruited, as planned originally.

Horton had objected to their original plans because the federal regulations required employment of trained men on all phases of the work.

A local contractor, Hult and Son, has nearly completed razing of the original Allegan county building, located on the northwest corner of the court house square. A new county jail is being planned for this site.

West Ottawa Gets Teacher

Miss Mary J. Kriger, 29, will teach women's physical education, including swimming, at West Ottawa High School next fall, Supt. Lloyd Van Raalte said today.

A native of Kent City, Miss Kriger taught for the past year at Evanston Township High School in Evanston, Ill. Prior to that she was women's physical education instructor at Grand Rapids Godwin Heights from 1954-60.

Miss Kriger graduated from Western Michigan University and majored in physical education. She received her M.A. degree from the University of Michigan. She is a Kent City High School graduate.

Plans call for Miss Kriger to teach water ballet or synchronized swimming at West Ottawa. She directed water ballet in Evanston. Miss Kriger has been a camp counselor and swimming director.

With the addition of Miss Kriger, the West Ottawa High physical education staff is increased to four. Nancy Naring is the other women's physical education instructor while Herbert Matman and Ernest Maglischo, swimming coach, will instruct the boys. A total of 1,100 students in junior and senior high will receive physical education in the fall.

West Ottawa Goes to Polls On Monday

2 More Members Will
Be Added to Board;
Extra Millage on Ballot

Voters in West Ottawa district will go to the polls Monday to vote on three issues, one to elect four members to the board of education, the second to vote an additional 4.5 mills for operating schools, and the third, to vote a half mill off the proposed county program to aid handicapped children.

The West Ottawa board is being enlarged to seven members this year from five. Two members will be elected to four-year terms and two members to three-year terms.

Candidates for four-year terms are Louis Van Slooten of Robart area and Howard Davis, Jr., of Waukazoo area. Candidates for three-year terms are two incumbents, Harvey De Vree of Beechwood area and William Sanford of Lakewood area.

Polls will be maintained in the Holland township district fire station on North River Ave. They will be open from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m.

School tax this year will amount to 21.55 mills on state equalized valuation, compared with 22.04 mills last year. Supt. Lloyd Van Raalte said. This lists 8.35 mills for operating, 4.50 mills for special operating, 2 mills for retiring elementary school debt, and 6.70 mills for the new high school and pool.

The 2 mills for retiring elementary buildings debt is down from 4 mills last year and is the last payment to be made on that debt service. The 4.5 mills for special operating would replace the 2.75 mills voted last year for one year only.

State equalized valuation for West Ottawa district this year is \$33,142,457 or \$1,066,324 over last year's figure of \$32,076,133.

Van Raalte also said a \$976,135.09 budget for the 1961-62 school year has been adopted by the board, an increase of \$118,500.62 over last year. Of the increase \$115,900 is in the instruction budget which includes teacher's salaries.

Van Raalte said opening the new high school in September will more than double the number of regular classrooms in the school district. There are 61 existing regular classrooms in the district at present and there will be 64 teaching stations in the new high school.

The budget is figured on an expected enrollment of 2,745 which is about a 12 per cent increase over the past year.

Of the total budget, teachers' salaries account for \$388,575; principals, \$43,900; custodians, \$68,000; transportation, \$25,000; administrative salaries, \$25,184; clerical, \$10,956; school operations, \$135,121.28. The latter figure is about double from last year's \$76,950.

The instructional budget is up 21 per cent or \$119,000 of which \$115,000 went into salaries. Custodial salaries are increased 58 per cent which is in direct relation to the increase in classrooms.

Total operating budget is up 75 per cent which includes salaries. The maintenance budget is up 27 per cent largely due to renovation necessary for the Beechwood building which will be returned to elementary uses after serving three years as the high school, serving 458 high school students in quarters designed for 283 elementary students.

Fixed charges will be down 56 per cent, due mainly to the fact that no facilities will be rented. Recreation and transportation budgets are down about 25 per cent with no change in services anticipated. Van Raalte said the capital outlay budget will be down 74 per cent, mainly because seventh and eighth grades will be out of the elementary system and into the new high school.

Van Raalte also said a cash balance very similar to last year will be carried into the new year, to be used until state aid funds are received. School taxes are paid next January.

Dr. W. H. Pyle Dies at 64

NEW JERSEY — Dr. William H. Pyle, 64, of Wallkill, N. Y., died unexpectedly following a heart attack Wednesday afternoon in Midland Park, N. J., while taking part in funeral services there.

He was pastor of a Wallkill Reformed Church and formerly served as minister in several other Reformed Churches including the Overisel Reformed Church.

Arrangements are being made for funeral services and burial in Zeeland by the Yntema Funeral Home in Zeeland, Mich.

Albion Gets Municipal Court in City Charter

ALBION—The 1960 Albion city charter which was approved by the voters of the city last August became fully effective Wednesday with the inauguration of a municipal court.

The charter has been gradually going into effect since last September and the transition is now complete. Attorney Theodore Van Dellen has been appointed judge of the new court which is similar to those operated in most nearby cities of Albion's size.

The municipal court consolidates the two justice courts operated here in the past, installs an attorney as a nearly full-time judge and bestows upon the new court additional powers as permitted by state law.

Lee Rice, State Food and Standard Inspector for the Michigan Department of Agriculture, signed the complaint against the company, alleging both offenses as of June 29.

City Schools Budget Goes Up \$82,000

\$1.7 Million Outlay
Under Consideration;
Board Asks 10.85 Mills

The Board of Education has taken under consideration the proposed school budget for 1961-62 which calls for a total of \$1,745,464.42 or about \$82,000 more than was spent during the school year ending Friday.

The budget was introduced at a special meeting of the board Thursday night, and members approved a resolution requesting that 10.85 mills be spread on equalized valuation on summer taxes. The Ottawa County Allocations Commission on June 20 had approved 4.15 mills for county purposes despite protests from several school districts asking that the county millage be lowered.

The board also referred the budget to the finance committee for study and report at the next board meeting.

The \$82,000 increase this year is accounted for mainly in close to a \$50,000 boost in instruction and almost that much in school operations, taking into consideration the new high school which will be in operation the second semester.

A total of 80.6 per cent of the new budget or \$1,402,324.12 is for instruction, compared with \$1,352,531.52 last year. There are no general increases in teachers' salaries in the new budget other than the normal increments in the salary scale. The state average for instruction is 73.9 per cent although the latest figure available are for 1958-59. Administration accounts for \$70,130, compared with \$66,108.80 last year. Local percentage is 4 per cent, compared with 3.9 for state average three years ago.

Operation lists \$212,008.80 or 12.2 per cent, compared with \$162,385.07 last year. Maintenance lists \$22,000.60 compared with \$19,681.38 last year; fixed charges, \$18,200 and \$15,986; auxiliary services, \$14,195 and \$13,720.51; capital outlay, \$2,247.90 and \$5,872.27; Supplemental distribution, \$3,556 and none, although last year's expenditures also listed \$26,649.49 for revolving accounts and other expenses.

Main concern of the board is that estimated expenses exceed estimated revenue by \$213,537.23, an item referred to as short term loan. This will be one of the main subjects of study by the finance committee, coupled with the possibility of trimming items.

State aid and primary money plus state aid for special education are expected to yield \$631,330.20 in revenue in the new budget and local taxes based on 10.85 mills on state equalized valuation of \$67,283,016 (on basis of 97 per cent collected) will yield \$708,120.10. Last year schools levied 9.664 mills on a state equalized valuation of \$67,470,179 yielding \$652,030.

The new budget is based on a membership allowance of \$50 in the high school, 1,100 in junior high and 2,050 in the grades for a total of 4,000, compared with 4,050 last year.

Other estimated revenues follow: tuition for 440 students at \$300, \$132,000; vocational education, \$12,000; driver education, \$11,250; library, \$5,500; city recreation, \$2,000; tuition for special education and orthopedic, \$10,000; Hope College student teacher agreement, \$300; delinquent taxes, \$9,000; rent, \$300; anticipated refund from National Defense Education Act, \$17,281.

The budget was explained by School Supt. Walter W. Scott who said this was the first year in his memory that there was no cash balance to transfer to the new budget. He said state aid probably will remain constant until after a constitutional convention.

He said state equalized valuations in Holland are about \$200,000 lower than last year, reflecting a drop in personal property assessments all over the state because of generally lower inventories.

A report on debt service revealed that 5.95 mills will be levied on assessed valuation this year or one cent less than the \$5.96 per \$1,000 last year. This amounts to 3.25 mills on state equalized valuation.

Adult Education Director Vern Schipper reported briefly on summer school, listing 435 in regular courses and about 450 in driver education, including Christian High students in the city.

Announcement was made that bids on the Lincoln school gymnasium will be opened July 7 at 3 p.m. place to be determined later.

President Harry Frissel presided. Members Wendell A. Miles and A. J. Cook were absent. The meeting adjourned at 9:20 p.m.

ZEELAND — An 18-year-old Holland youth drowned Saturday noon while he and four companions were swimming in a gravel pit pond near M-21 and 96th Ave., just south of the Zeeland city limits.

Rudolfo Ruiz, son of Mrs. Eliza Ruiz of 144 East 21st St., Holland, apparently tired and went down in 14 feet of water. The youth's body was recovered by Ottawa County Sheriff Department and state police skindivers at 3:30 p.m. Medical examiner was Dr. D. C. Bloemendaal of Zeeland.

Ruiz had been swimming with Junior and Louis Ramirez, both 16, Victor Valazquez, 17, and Santiago Ravello, 19, all of Holland. Sheriff's officers said the youths had been standing on a sand bar in the middle of the two-acre pond and started to swim to a small island about 150 feet away when Ruiz tired and sank.

The other youths told officers they attempted to hold Ruiz above water but were unable to keep him afloat. They ran to a nearby farm house and called Zeeland police.

Police and Zeeland firemen rushed to the scene with a resuscitator. Kenneth Karsten, a substitute fireman, dove into the water in an attempt to find the youth, but was unable to locate him.

Holland police and Ottawa County deputies were summoned. Holland police brought a boat and dragging equipment, police and deputies began dragging for the boy's body. Later, three Sheriff Department and two State Police skindivers entered the search. The youth's body was found near the spot where he went down.

Sheriff's officers said the land on which the pond is located is owned by the city of Zeeland.

Ruiz was the sixth drowning victim in the Holland area within the last month.

Ruiz was employed at Weller Nurseries. He was a member of St. Francis de Sales Church.

Surviving besides the mother are three brothers, Ernest, Hector and Florentino, all of Holland, and three sisters, Mrs. Benito Benavides, Mrs. Pedro Gomez and Miss Socorro Ruiz, also of Holland. Funeral services will be held at 10 a.m. Wednesday at St. Francis de Sales Church with the Rev. Fr. Julian A. Moleksi officiating. Burial will be in Pilgrim Home Cemetery.

Park Visitors Cause Parking Difficulties

Beautiful summer weather over the Fourth of July weekend brought thousands of people to Holland and Grand Haven State Parks, creating serious parking problems in the local park.

Park manager Lou Haney said during the afternoon people were parking as far down the road to a point parallel to where the hull of the Alabama is moored in Lake Macatawa and walking into the park. Ottawa County sheriff's officers had to aid park officials in removing cars because people had parked in such a way as to leave only one lane for traffic.

Hendrick Stafeth of the Ottawa County Road Commission said today that "no parking" signs are to be installed along the county road leading into the park as soon as they can be obtained. Stafeth said the signs have been approved and ordered but because they are a special variety which say "no parking, standing or stopping," the signs are more difficult to get than regular "no parking" signs.

A total of 14,400 persons visited the park Tuesday. This does not include those who parked outside the park and walked in. Haney said. Attendance for Monday was 9,700.

According to Haney the campsites in the park were completely filled for six straight days but there are now camp spaces available.

Clare Broad, manager of the Grand Haven Park said total attendance there for the four-day weekend was 48,400.

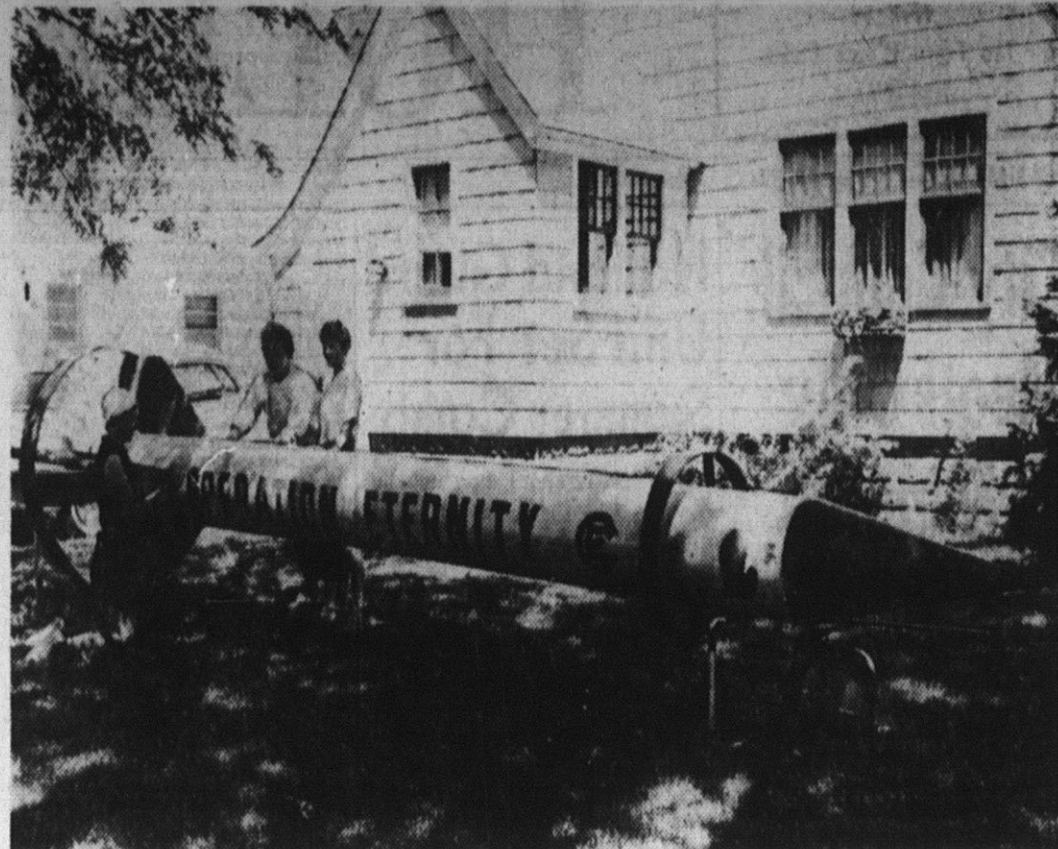

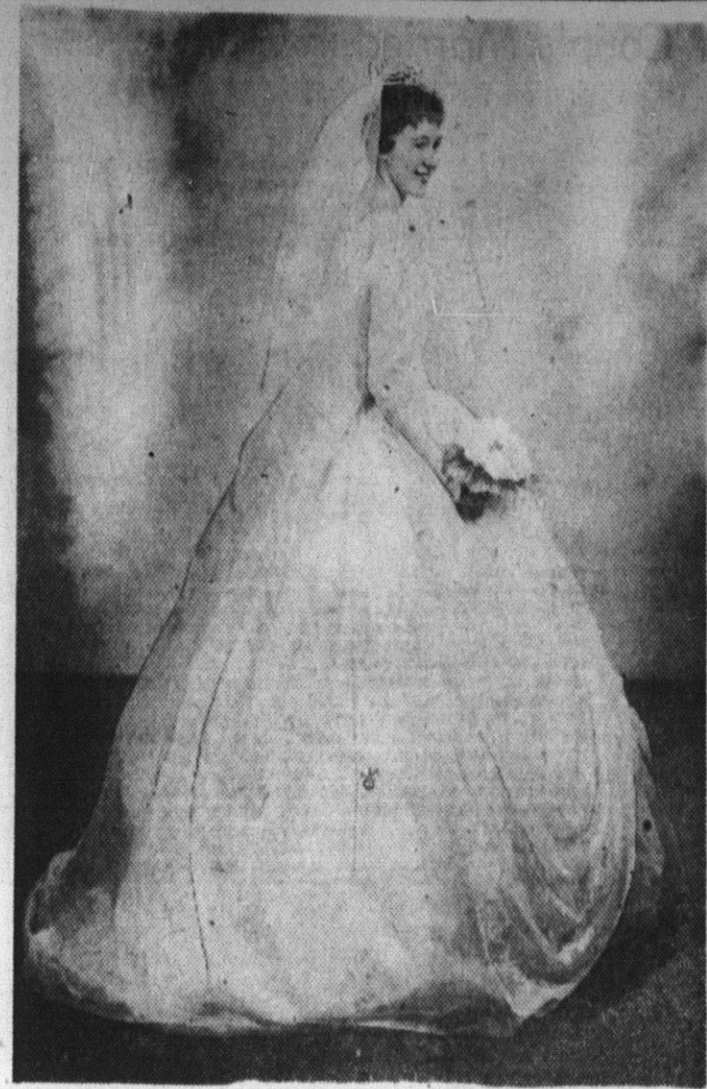

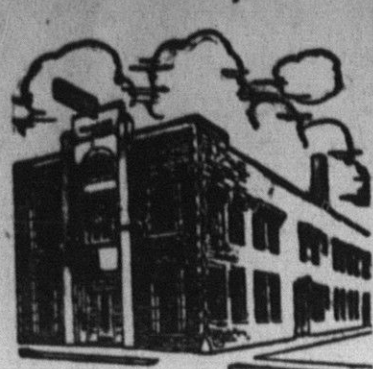

Sunday School Lesson

Sunday, July 9
Andrew, A Fisher of Men
John 1:35-42; Matthew 4:18-20;
John 6:8-9

By C. P. Dame

Every congregation needs more men of the type of Andrew. This good man makes us think of witnessing and too few Christians cultivate and practice that art.

May the study of this lesson induce a number of Christians to begin to witness for Jesus Christ.

1. An average Christian can do much. Andrew is an example of what a two-talented man can do. The apostles were divided into groups. Andrew belonged to the first group but he was the last of the four in that group which was composed of Peter, James, John and Andrew. The first three belonged to the inner three, but Andrew was left out. Jesus took the three with Him to the home of Jairus whose daughter He called back to life, they accompanied Him to the Mount of Transfiguration and into the garden of Gethsemane. We never read of Andrew being envious.

Before becoming a disciple of Jesus, Andrew had become a disciple of John the Baptist who called Jesus the Lamb of God. Andrew and John the son of Zebedee, followed Jesus one day and He turned to them and asked, "What seek ye?" They responded saying, "Rabbi, where dwellest Thou?" The Lord's words, "Come and see" were an invitation and they accepted it "and abode with Him that day."

That was an important meeting on an unforgettable day. On that day Andrew learned something which was too good to keep to himself—he learned that Jesus was the Promised Messiah whose coming was foretold in the Old Testament. Hurriedly Andrew sought and found his brother Simon and brought him to Jesus and said to him, "We have found the Messiah, which is being interpreted, the Christ." The title, Messiah, is Hebrew, the Greek is Christ. Andrew did not argue, he witnessed and won his brother—he began doing mission work in his family. Jesus saw possibilities in Simon and changed his name to Peter meaning a stone. Peter became a great worker and leader in the church. Andrew ministered through the brother he had led to Christ.

II. Jesus calls men to follow Him. One day Jesus saw the two brothers, Andrew and Peter fishing and He called them to leave their nets and follow Him promising them that He would make them fishers of men. To this call they could either respond or refuse—they responded. These men made an important decision. If they had stuck to their nets they would have missed the office of apostleship and the association with Jesus. It may cost us something to follow Jesus but it is well worth the price.

One day Andrew brought a boy who had a lunch with him to Jesus when He was planning to feed a whole multitude of people. Jesus used the lunch of the lad and fed five thousand people. Leading one boy or girl to Jesus may have great results. There is another story about Andrew in John's gospel which is not mentioned in the lesson text which reveals the character of Andrew. Some Greeks had come to Jerusalem and they wanted to see Jesus and so they contacted Philip, most likely because of his Greek name. Philip hesitated to introduce them to Jesus and so he contacted Andrew and then the two approached Jesus.

Andrew will always be remembered because he who had only average ability used it for his Lord. If all church members would do as Andrew did the Christian Church would grow much faster than it is growing at the present time and the members would get much more real joy out of their Christian life. Do you invite non-church members to your church every week?

Saugatuck Sets August Festival Plans

SAUGATUCK — Talent line-ups have been completed for the third annual Saugatuck Music Festival's Aug. 11 and 12 concerts, according to Producer James Belcher.

Although the new group of festival sponsors — a corporation drawn largely from Saugatuck and the surrounding area—dropped the term "jazz" from the name of the event, Belcher has signed an impressive roster of jazz greats anyway.

But he hastens to point out that the festival's new name indicates that future programs will be broadened to include "the whole range of American music... from symphonic to folk singing."

Even this year's program indicates the festival has broken out of the strict confines of "jazz" to include attractions like the Kirby Stone Four, one of the nation's top popular vocal groups, and Ann Richards, fast rising, vocal star of the Stan Kenton band.

Friday night's (Aug. 11) concert will be aimed directly at progressive jazz buffs, however. Featured will be Dave Brubeck's quartet with Paul Desmond on the alto sax. The vocal-instrumental combination of Carmen McRae and her trio—also booked to appear with Brubeck at the Newport and Randall's Island festivals this year—will be teaming with the quartet in repeat performances of two new top recordings they made together.

Another featured spot on the Friday concert has been assigned to the Bob Pierson Quartet, University of Detroit group which has been winning honors in collegiate jazz competition throughout the United States this year.

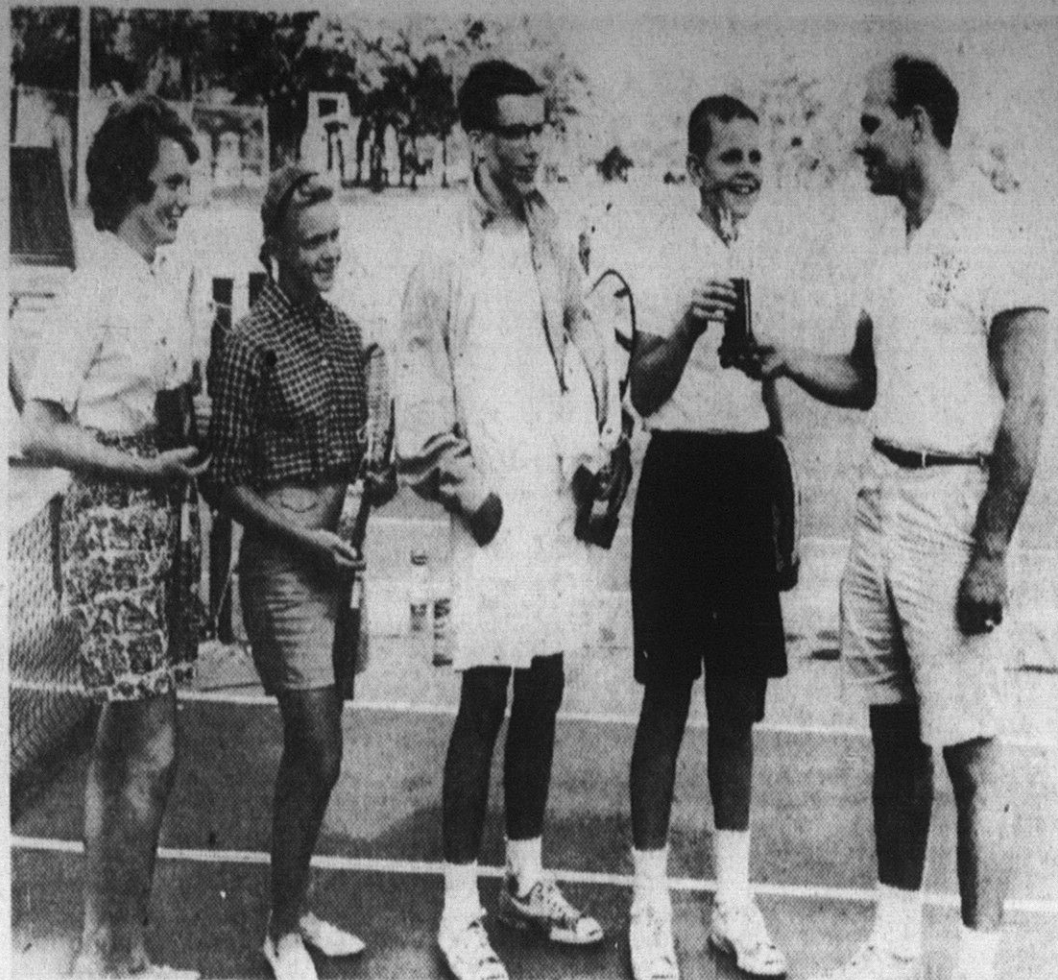

Official Figures Confirm June Was a Warm Month

June was a pleasant month in Holland but just a bit warmer and a bit dryer than usual, according to statistics compiled by Weather Observer William De Boer.

A high of 91 was registered June 30, the last day of the month. Together with a spurt of warm weather the last few days in the month, the average temperature was boosted to 66.1 degrees or 1.7 degrees above normal. Rainfall amounted to 1.19 inches or 1.67 inches below normal.

Thunder and lightning was noted on three or four occasions, but Holland generally escaped the cloudbursts which hit many areas in Michigan.

A minimum of 42 degrees was registered on four occasions, June 3, 16, 17 and 24.

Maximum was 91, compared with 87 in 1960, 92 in 1959, 86 in 1958

and 93 in 1957. Minimum was 42, compared with 43 in 1960, 43 in 1959, 36 in 1958 and 42 in 1957.

Average temperature was 66.1, compared with 65.6 in 1960, 70 in 1959, 62.8 in 1958 and 68.4 in 1957. Average Maximum was 78.1, compared with 77 in 1960, 81.9 in 1959, 74.1 in 1958 and 78.3 in 1957. Average minimum was 54.1, compared with 54.1 in 1960, 58.1 in 1959, 51.4 in 1958 and 58.4 in 1957.

Precipitation amounted to 1.19 inches, compared with 2.40 inches in 1960, 1.29 inches in 1959, 2.68 inches in 1958 and 3.54 inches in 1957. Precipitation fell on 11 days, compared with 14 days in 1960, 8 days in 1959, 8 days in 1958 and 12 days in 1957.

Greatest precipitation in a 24-hour period was 4.0 inch, compared with .40 inch in 1960, .44 inch in 1959, 1.17 inches in 1958 and 1.01 inches in 1957.

Allegan Sets Mail Changes

ALLEGAN — Starting Saturday several changes will go into effect in Allegan's postal service.

Major change will be in the Sunday dispatch service. Mail will be collected from downtown boxes three hours earlier, at 4:00, instead of 7:15 as previously. Allegan Postmaster, Clair McOmber said this earlier pick-up will improve local service, guaranteeing that all mail will reach Michigan destinations on Monday mornings.

Single afternoon dispatches—at 5:30 p.m.—will reduce service to Hopkins, Dorr, and Byron Center by eliminating the present early afternoon mailings.

McOmber urged box-holders to

note changes in mail schedules. Because of changes in afternoon daily delivery, box mail will not be ready until 3:10 p.m., one half hour later than formerly. Morning mail, however, will be ready at 8:00, 45 minutes earlier than under the former system.

Holidays there will be only one dispatch—at 4:15 — and mail will not be in the boxes until 5:00 p.m.

McOmber is asking business firms to drop mail in downtown boxes at noon or at midmorning in addition to evening dispatches. He said that only two of Allegan's companies did this, and that, consequently, nearly all business mail is brought to the local post office between 5 and 5:30 p.m. causing a "last minute rush." If local businesses would mail more often during the day, this rush might be lightened.

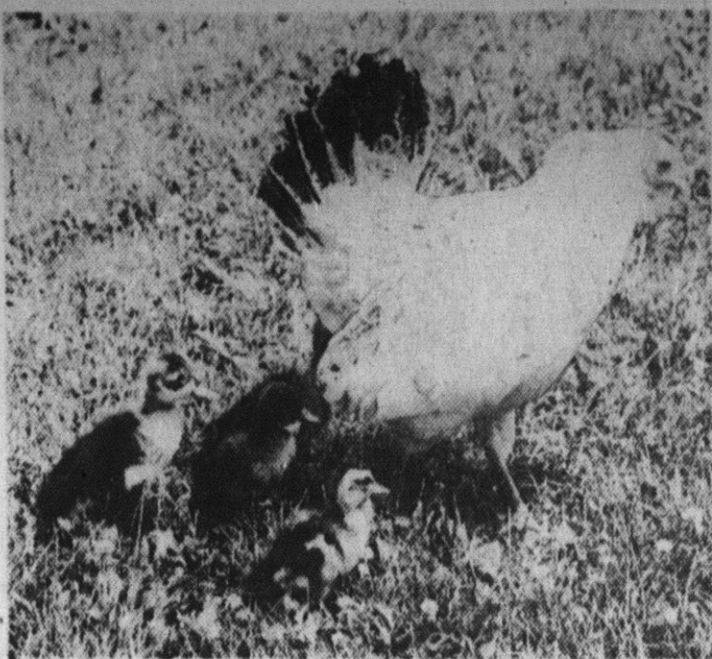

Ottawa County Farm News

European pine shoot moth development is at least seven days behind last summer. The 1959 and 1960 MSU research indicates that this pest can be controlled effectively with one summer spray. Growers should make this application between July 10 and 15. In hydraulic equipment, Sevin at 1.5 lbs. actual insecticide in 100 gallons of water has proved superior to DDT at 1 gallon of DDT emulsion to 100 gallon of water. Wet the plant thoroughly particularly the bark of leaders and laterals. To be effective the maximum amount of insecticide must be on the plant at the time the larvae hatch and migrate from the egg to the needles and to the bud area. Spraying before July 10 will result in loss of potency before the eggs hatch. If spraying is done after July 15 there is a good chance that the larvae will be in the buds and inaccessible to the spray.

Population of miles vary greatly among orchards. Dry weather during May encouraged build-up. Infestations in general are higher than is normally seen at this time of year. Most orchards where Tedi-on was used in Petal Fall or Guth-ion in first cover show excellent mite control. If specific miticide are needed in problem orchard, Tedi-on, 1 lb. per 100 gallon a a preferred material. Most apple orchards sprayed last year with four or more applications of Guth-ion required no additional materials for mite control in 1960.

Adults have been emerging from Berrien and Kent County observation areas since June 6. This means third cover will be a critical spray against codling moth larvae.

Adults will soon be emerging. Emergence will be spread over a considerable period because of variations in the present stage of insect development.

In addition to peaches, borers have become a major problem on cherries (especially sweets) and plums within recent years. Special consideration should be given each of these crops in 1961.

Flies present constant household insect control problem. Some of the annoying insects overwinter in homes. Their disease-carrying habits should be well known. Say Michigan State University entomologists, and every possibility of ridding premises and homes of the pests should be explored.

A new folders on fly control is now available in the Ottawa County agricultural extension offices or the Bulletin Office, Michigan State University, East Lansing.

The folder is "Houseflies and Their Relatives." It was written by Ray L. Jones and Arthur Wells, MSU entomologists.

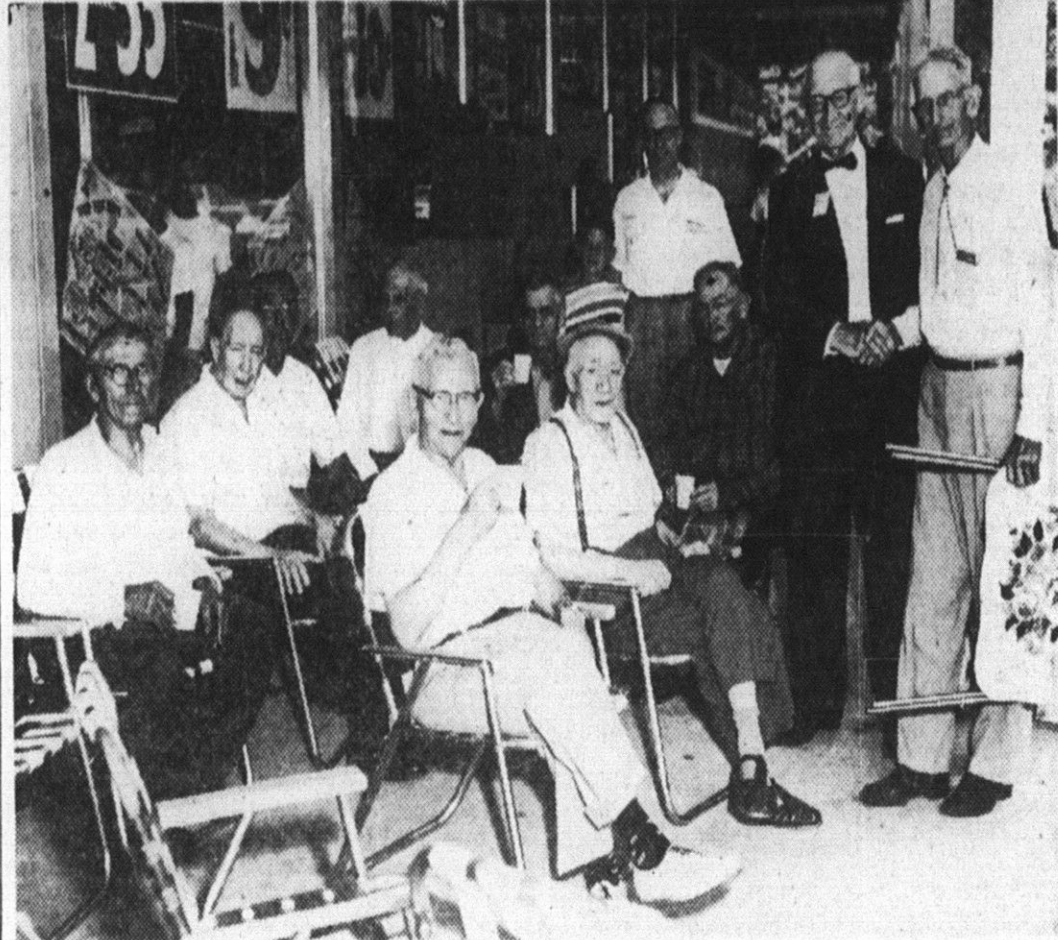
It contains control suggestion for house flies, bow flies, cluster or chamber flies, face flies, fruit, pomace or vinegar flies and wetwood flies. The use of insecticides is explained and instructions given for using various types of application equipment.

It may pay Michigan poultrymen to trim the comb and wattles from their baby chicks. Research has shown that dubbed birds will produce about one to two per cent more eggs than birds not dubbed. Figuring production at 240 eggs a year, an investment of one-half to one cent a bird for the trimming would bring an extra two to five eggs a year. On a 1,000 - pullet basis, a dubbing investment of \$5 to \$10 would return from \$50 to \$125 in eggs average 30 cents a dozen.

However, if maximum lay comes in warm weather, it might not be an advantage to trim the comb and wattles. Chicks can use this extra area for cooling in hot weather. Culling hens without combs is harder. But comb color is not the only indication of rate of lay, and the breeding of modern poultry strains makes culling less important. Hatcherymen can remove the comb and wattles of day-old chicks easily without apparent harm to the birds.

As area governor, Brunner handles liaison between the various district officers and committees and the officers of Toastmaster Clubs in Holland, Muskegon and Grand Haven.

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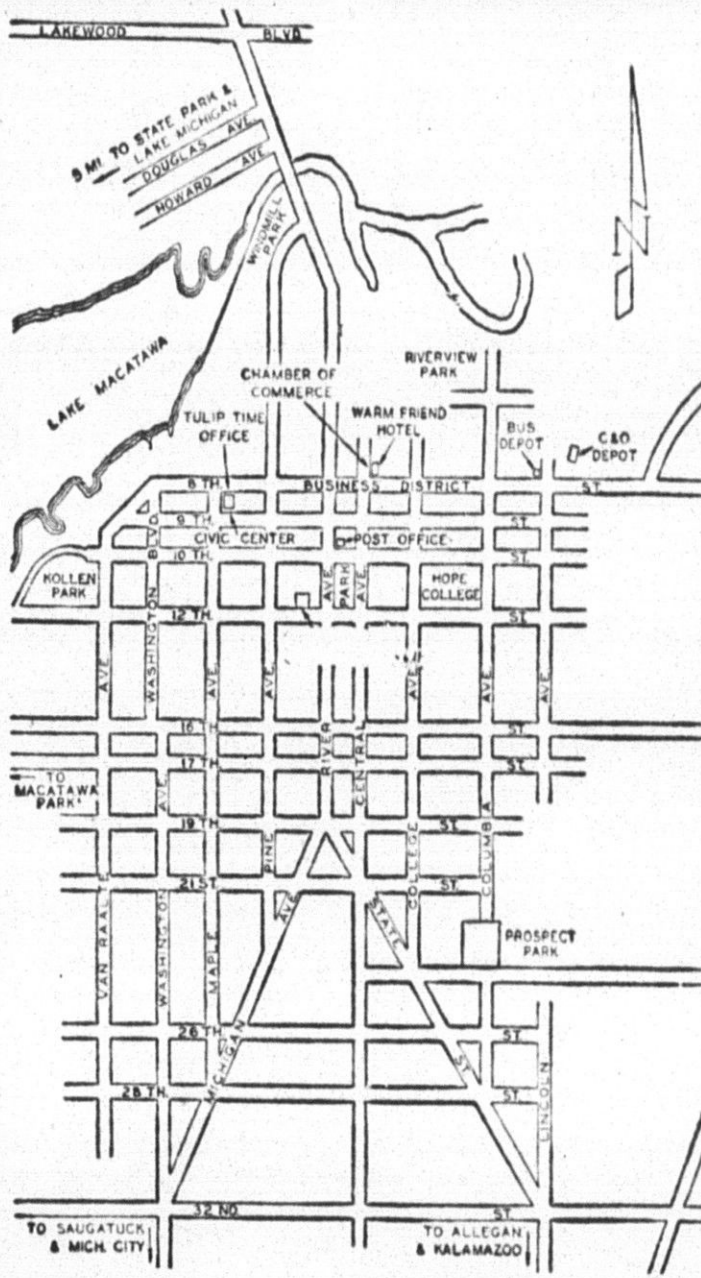
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Resurfacing Starts Here This Week

Starting Wednesday, Holland city began its program of prime sealing several streets in the east and west sections of the city.

City Engineer Vern Serne is asking the cooperation of residents in that there be a minimum of traffic on streets being resurfaced. He said for full effect streets should be blocked 24 to 48 hours and is asking motorists to use other streets while the streets are undergoing improvement.

Serne also warned mothers to keep their children from walking on the fresh asphalt since tracking on floors and carpets presents real problems. He said kerosene or fuel oil are about the most effective in removing the tar substance from bare feet.

The surfacing program is part of a \$75,000 road improvement program in Holland this year. Serne hopes to inform residents in advance just which streets will be closed the following day.

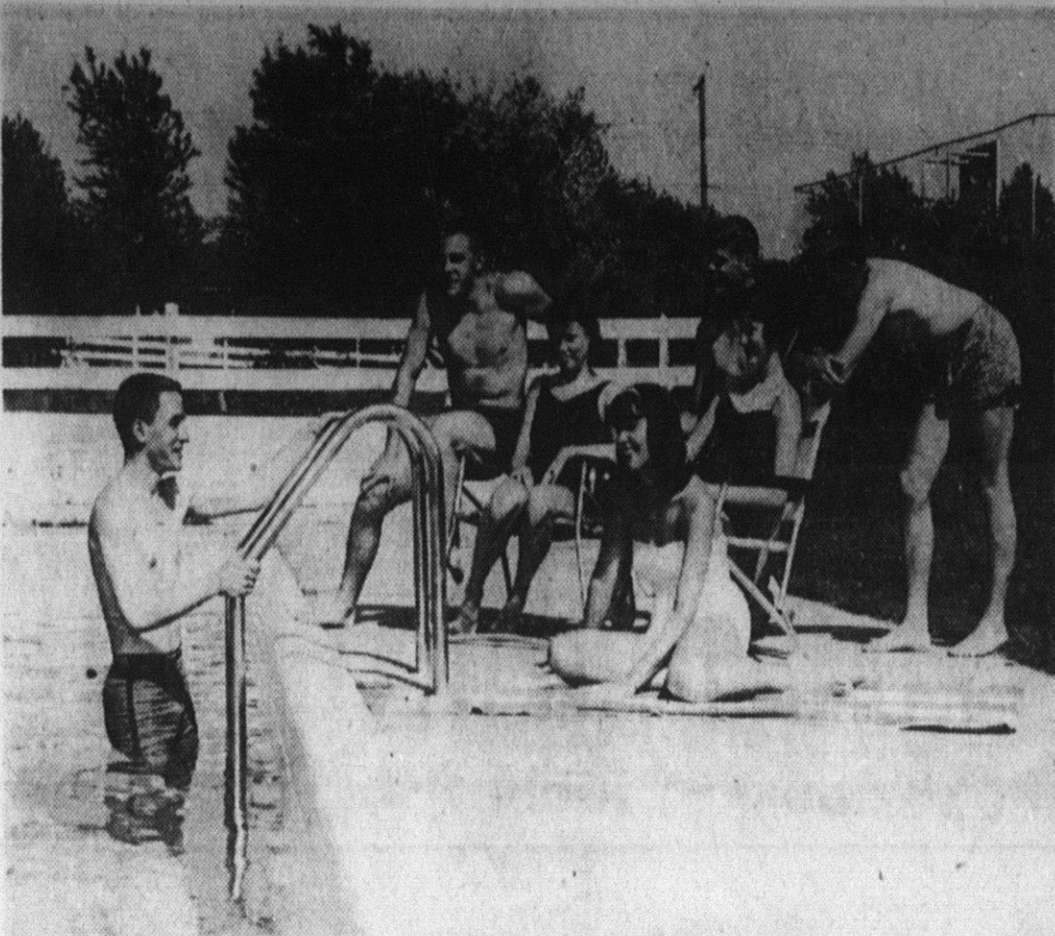

Public Has Basic Right to Know What Goes on at City Informal Meetings

Representatives from news media should be admitted to informal council meetings, not because they have a right to be there but because the people have a right to know what goes on in their government, Dick Cheverton of Grand Rapids, vice president of the Radio and Television News Directors Association said Saturday.

Cheverton made the statement in a letter to Mayor Nelson Bosman acknowledging City Council's letter which dealt with barring the press from informal Council meetings.

"In our system of government," Cheverton wrote, "the accepted and recognized method of transmitting information to the people is through independent, non-subsidized, private enterprise news gathering organizations."

Cheverton referred to Bosman's explanation that Council desires to have an initial period of orientation without the presence of the press restraining them from free and exploratory discussion. Cheverton wrote, "I think it is proper

to remind Council that the press is simply a vehicle to transmit information to the public. Therefore, I must assume, whether correct or not, that the Council did not want the public to know, or have factual reports of what they discussed and what decisions they reached. This may be a 'free' discussion by Council but it is hardly a 'free' return of information to the people who put the Council in office and who must make the decisions that will result in the best government for Holland."

Cheverton also referred to Bosman's expression that Council is not subservient to the press, but is responsible to the people of Holland, and posed this question, "How can the people of Holland know that their Council is responsible to them if the people's knowledge is limited? I don't believe the press would want or is trying to make the Council subservient to them. If Council considers this to be true, then they should resist and should use other means of communication to inform the people."

Cheverton agreed that there are exceptional circumstances which may result in a closed meeting, but he suggested it is dangerous for a Council to operate in an atmosphere of secrecy, to hammer out its decisions behind closed doors and to rubber stamp these decisions in an open meeting.

The letter also read: "You state in your letter that the meetings are informal and that no business can be officially transacted. Legally this is correct but I suggest that it is naive to believe that any legislative group meeting in a closed session does not come to decisions which are later formalized in an official session."

Cheverton's reply was in answer to a letter from Mayor Bosman which was read at the June 21 meeting of City Council. Two weeks previously Cheverton had protested closing informal meetings to news media after an invited Sentinel newsmen was asked to leave a May 14 informal session.
