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Bakker Will Head Road Commission

GRAND HAVEN — At a regular meeting of the Ottawa County Road Commission Friday Ronald J. Bakker, 30, of Robinson township, formerly of Holland, was appointed engineer-manager, effective Oct. 1.

He succeeds William Osner of Robinson who had the position two years.

Bakker has been employed by the commission eight years and for two years has been assistant to Osner. He has also served as a design and construction engineer for roads and bridges and maintenance superintendent of the state trunklines in Ottawa county.

He is a graduate of Holland High School, attended Hope College and received his B.S. degree in civil engineering at Michigan State University in 1958.

After graduation, he worked as bridge design engineer for the State Highway Department. He is a registered professional engineer, a member of the Michigan Society of Professional Engineers, and the American Society of Civil Engineers.

Zeeland Tax Bills Mailed

ZEELAND — Summer tax bills have been mailed here calling for a total tax levy of \$534,893.

As is the case all over Michigan, taxes this year are based on state equalized valuations. In Zeeland, the equalized valuation totals \$20,907,000.

Tax rates list \$9.50 per \$1,000 for the city and \$17.02 for schools. The latter lists \$10.52 for school operations, \$2 for special voted operations and \$4.50 for debt retirement.

The city levy amounts to \$198,641.87 and the school district \$319,079.05. Special assessments total \$16,199.05.

Exemptions for senior citizens amount to \$13,684.40 and for veterans \$1,083.76. The city is reimbursed by the state for these amounts.

School taxes for that portion of the city lying in the New Grounigen district will appear on the winter tax bills.

Bills are payable at the city treasurer's office through Aug. 1 without penalty.

Bosch Reelected BPW President

Randall C. Bosch was elected president of the Board of Public Works at its annual reorganization meeting here Monday. He has been a member of the board since 1945 and has served as president since 1954, a total of 13 years.

Henry S. Maentz was reelected vice president. He was named vice president last fall when Dr. Adrian Klaasen resigned from the board for reasons of health.

Vande Water, manager of Holland's Tulip Time Festival Inc., judged the Independence Day Parade trophy classes.

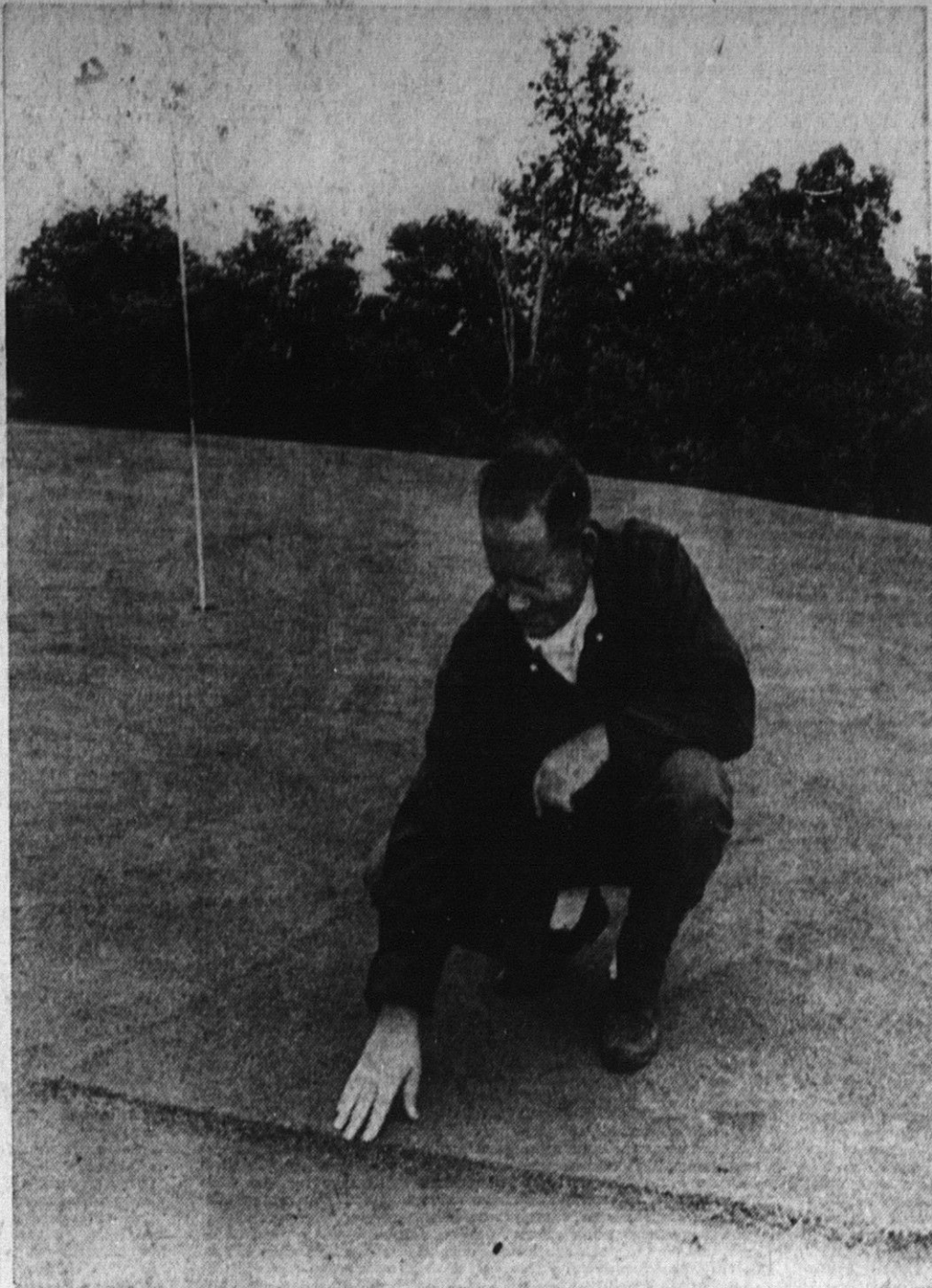

The festival activities will continue through Saturday with the kiddies' parade and a street dance for teens scheduled Thursday.

Residents in the eastern part of the city whose basements were flooded during recent heavy rains may have some relief when the next storm strikes. The section of the creek as it flows through Holland township north of Eighth St. has been cleaned.

The obstructions were many. Ottawa County Drain Commissioner Roscoe De Vries said his crews removed ironing boards, card tables, a washing machine, a beaten-up bedstead, a utility pole in good condition and at least two cords of firewood.

There also were about 100 old tires clogging up the stream. In fact, at the northern end, the creek bed was so clogged

Month of June Wet and Soggy

June was a wet, wet month. It rained on 17 of the 30 days for a total of 10.66 inches. This is believed to be an all-time monthly record for Holland.

For the first six months this year, precipitation was totaled 25.45 inches. Average precipitation for Holland is 33.04 inches per year.

Precipitation by months follows: January, 4.13 inches; February, .86 inch, March, 1.38 inches; April, 7.13 inches; May, 1.29 inches; June, 10.66 inches.

Heaviest rainfall June 7 and 8 totaling 5.4 inches. This was far greater than the April 22 rainstorm which dumped 2.04 inches on the area.

Another heavy storm Sunday, June 25, measured 1.2 inches but caused considerable flooding.

The 24-hour rainfall for June 7 was 4.16 inches, believed to be the greatest amount in history. Other heavy daily rainfalls were 3.55 inches on a single day in June, 1954, and 3.66 inches in October, 1954.

According to Sentinel records, other excessive monthly totals list 7.81 inches in October, 1963; 9.23 inches in September, 1961;

7.13 inches in April, 1967; 5.19 inches in December, 1963; 5.13 inches in August, 1965; 5.16 inches in December, 1965; 5.69 inches in September, 1965 and 5.33 inches in November, 1966.

Holland also experienced several severe weather warnings and tornado watches on three occasions. On June 11, the watch developed into a warning but little or no damage resulted locally although funnels were spotted in western Michigan.

The average June temperature was 67.6 degrees or 3.2 degrees above normal. A high of 87 was recorded on June 15 and 16 and a low of 41 on June 1 and 4. Average maximum was 78.5 and average minimum 56.9.

The June rainfall of 10.66 inches was 7.80 inches above normal.

Two Girls Injured As Car Rolls Over

ZEELAND — Two young women from Grand Rapids were injured when their car went out of control at 5 p.m. Tuesday on Washington Ave. near 84th St.

The driver, Linda E. Kuzma, 18, was thrown from the car after it veered across road, leaped back onto the pavement, and rolled an estimated three times, according to Zeeland police.

Her passenger, Rose Monterusso, 18, reportedly ran from the scene and was picked up by a passing motorist who reported the accident to police. She received severe cuts on the ear, bruises of the body, arms and legs.

The driver escaped with only minor injuries. Zeeland Hospital officials said. Both were treated and released.

The Kuzma driver was cited for violation of the basic speed law by Zeeland police.

City Tax Bills In Mail Friday

Summer tax bills will be in the mail Friday.

Main difference in bills this year is that assessments are based on state equalized valuation instead of assessed valuation, but City Assessor Alwin De Haan has designed the tax statements to show both figures. The new arrangement, required by state law, lists a higher assessment figure, but a lower tax rate.

Overall tax increases this year amount to 11 per cent, almost equally divided between city and school taxes.

Total levy this year is \$3,128,127.17 listing \$1,325,286.29 for city tax and \$1,802,820.88 for school tax.

This is an increase of \$455,857.75 over last year's total levy of \$2,672,268.42. That figure listed \$1,130,162.08 for city tax and \$1,542,106.34 for school tax.

The tax rate, based on equalized valuation follows: city debt service, \$2.97 per \$1,000; city general tax, \$11.23; school debt service, \$3.10; school general tax, \$10.52; special voted tax, \$5.75; total tax rate, \$33.57.

A typical tax bill based on \$4,000 assessed valuation would list the following information: assessed valuation, \$4,000; state equalized valuation, \$7,332; city tax, \$104.11; school tax, \$142.02; total tax, \$246.13.

Assessor De Haan said that residential appraisals which have been done the past two years are not reflected in the current tax bills. He said his staff is doing the reappraisals

on regular time and it might take another year or two before this work is completed. He said the work takes longer this way but proves less costly.

Total assessed valuation of the city this year is \$51,087,771, an increase of more than \$2½ million from last year's total of \$48,776,217.

Equalization factors for Holland are unchanged from last year. This runs approximately 1.83 for property in Ottawa County and 1.80 for property in Allegan County.

Sewage Lagoon Gets State Okay

ALLEGAN — Construction of a controversial sewage lagoon at Allegan County Park on Lake Michigan has passed state inspection and its operation will go ahead as planned, Allegan County Sanitarian Karl Zimmerman announced Wednesday.

The health department official said Michigan Water Resources Commission inspectors who visited the lagoon operation just prior to the July Fourth holiday appeared satisfied both the lagoon and connecting drainage system were well constructed and that no complaints were registered following a tour of the sanitary facility.

Summer residents had written Governor Romney requesting investigation of the lagoon in the light of health protection for park users and the surrounding neighborhood.

Resorters and Allegan County agencies were given an opportunity here last week to air their opinions concerning the sewage lagoon, with Water Resources officials sitting in on the session.

Steal Plates To Steal Car

ZEELAND — Police here reported that thieves stole the license plates Tuesday night from a parked car and used them on a car they stole later.

The plates, which were on a car parked at a gas station, were affixed to a car later identified as belonging to Marv's Car Lot, 2 West Washington St.

The car was then driven to a home north of Borculo, where the as yet unidentified parties drove across the lawn and tore up the sod, police said. They then fled from there, leaving the car behind, police said.

State Park Attracts 50,696 Over Weekend

Holland State Park attendance reached 50,696 persons over the four-day Fourth of July holiday weekend according to State Park Manager Donald Ike.

A breakdown shows 13,155 persons on Saturday, 11,865 on Sunday, 10,563 on Monday and 15,113 Tuesday.

Turnaways included 475 persons on Tuesday and 235 on Sunday. Trailer and tent sites were filled to capacity with permits issued only when vacancies occurred. There were 47 camp permits issued Saturday and 16 issued Sunday. Camp turnaways included 112 on Saturday and 22 on Sunday.

Routine Items Occupy Council for 50 Minutes

City Council disposed of several items of business at a 50-minute meeting Wednesday night in City Hall.

A request for shuffle board courts immediately south of Civic Center was referred to the city manager for study. The request came from Shuffle Board Club members and Golden Agers, who have been turning to this type of recreation in increasing numbers.

John Ver Schure and Gordon Streur, representing shuffle board enthusiasts, recommended the Civic Center location under the city recreational program. The office of city recreation director is in the Civic Center. The men said that there had been problems of vandalism of shuffle board equipment in Kollen Park.

City Manager Herb Holt also reported on conditions of shuffle board courts at Kollen Park. The report indicated that one court had three small indentations in the surface and that all courts show some evidence of crazing, which are minute cracks under the surface. A factory representative of the Upco Co. has examined the crazing, and has indicated it is not an unusual condition and is of little consequence with proper maintenance. A proper maintenance program will be followed.

Council approved construction of a water main in 33rd St. from a point 565 feet east of Pine Ave. to Central Ave. Action followed a report from the city manager which included a report of the city sanitarian concerning the quality of existing water supply in this street. Copies of these water reports on chlorides, hardness, detergent, nitrates and nitrites were distributed among councilmen.

Referred back to the planning commission was a proposed zoning ordinance amendment to rezone property on the north side of 37th St. at Maple Ave. to C-1 neighborhood commercial. This proposal had been tabled following a public hearing June 7. A petition signed by 16 persons objected to the change.

Requests from Ven Noord Development Co. and Holland Christian Schools for the immediate improvement of 40th St. from Ottawa Ave. to a point about 650 feet west, was referred to the city manager. The request includes paving, sewer and water services. Earlier in the evening council abandoned a previous recommendation for blacktopping a portion of this road. The city manager expressed the hope that the new improvements would be completed by Nov. 1.

Council set Aug. 16 as date for public hearing on a petition of Holland school district to vacate a portion of College Ave. between 35th and 40th Sts. The proposal provides for cul de sacs in those areas where homes are located. Councilman Hollis Clark suggested council meet informally with school authorities on providing additional parking areas.

An ordinance on rezoning and one regulating lots for mobile homes were referred to the city attorney for drafting. The first calls for rezoning a 3.7-acre parcel of land at the southeast corner of Lincoln Ave. and 17th St. it extended to B-1 apartment. Plans call for erecting three apartment buildings with 72 units. The mobile home regulation would require blacktop roads and water and sanitary sewer services.

As required by city charter, the city auditor issued a report listing utility bills which had remained unpaid for three months or more as of June 30. If not paid by July 31 bills will be placed on city tax rolls. Unpaid

bills this year total \$6,600, approximately \$2,000 higher than last year.

Council authorized the city engineer to apply to the Michigan State Highway Department for a permit to construct a 16-inch cast iron sewer force main in the right of way on east Eighth St. in the vicinity between the C and O mainline and the C and O Allegan line.

A petition requesting that the west 200 feet of 37th St. between Washington and Pine Aves. be vacated was referred to the planning commission.

The city attorney was instructed to prepare an ordinance amendment to bring the city's curb requirement in line with those of the State Highway Department. In the interim, council granted approval for 50-foot curb cuts at the Kentucky Fried Chicken installation at 16th and River and the Shell Oil station at 15th and River.

Council approved a culvert agreement between Holland City and Mr. and Mrs. Phillip Michmerhuizen whereby the Michmerhuizens agree to pay half the cost up to an 18-inch pipe for tiling 100 feet of open storm sewer in Sunrise Terrace subdivision.

A public hearing is scheduled on paving 33rd St. 563 feet east of Pine Ave. to Central Ave.

Councilman Bertal Slagh asked whether anything could be done temporarily to improve the condition of Eighth St. between Fairbanks Ave. and Waverly Rd. City manager Holt will see what can be done.

Council approved for certifications for Councilman Dyk, Holland Litho Service, \$4.36 and Councilman Slagh \$35.20.

Oath of office of Charles J. Cooper as a member of the Board of Public Works was filed.

A letter from Mr. and Mrs. Joe Van Drunen, 46 Bellwood Dr., concerning a drainage problem in Bellwood subdivision was referred to the city manager.

Chapter 14, Disabled American Veterans was granted permission to solicit funds on the streets July 21 and 22.

Mayor Nelson Bosman presided. All councilmen were present. The invocation was given by the Rev. Henry Burggraaf, retired minister of the Reformed Church.

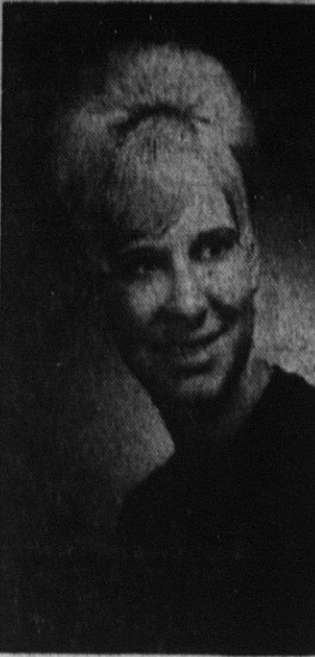

Vision Research May Yield Answers to Traffic Safety

Scientific research into human vision and hearing is providing answers to many questions on traffic safety, according to Dr. Pieter Walraven, director of the Institute for Perception at Soesterberg, the Netherlands.

Dr. Walraven was in Holland Friday as a guest of Donnelly Mirrors, discussing aspects of human visual performance in driving motor vehicles. The previous day, Donnelly representatives and Dr. Walraven were in Detroit consulting engineers at General Motors Technical Center and Ford Motor Co. on various aspects that might result in automotive improvements.

The local form's initial concern is the rear view mirror but it also is interested in the wide spectrum of visual performance and reflexes of the driver behind the wheel.

The Institute for Perception has been in operation for 15 years and Dr. Walraven has headed the staff for 10 years. The institute does considerable research for the armed forces and for the Netherlands Foundation for Traffic Safety Research. One of the newer projects at

the institute is an experimental car to measure eye movements, head movements, heart beats and other motions, all of which are electronically recorded.

For instance, in designing a rear view mirror, a manufacturer is concerned with how often a driver looks into such a mirror, how much time he looks at a certain time, how he reacts to glare, and many other aspects. Dr. Walraven's Institute evaluates such tests. On his staff are 15 physicians, psychologists, ophthalmologists, engineers, etc.

Dr. Walraven is a graduate of Technical University of Delft and received a Ph. D. degree from the University of Utrecht. He spent a year in vision research at Ohio State University. His current visit of three weeks was his second to this country and was spent mainly at conventions relating to vision research in Ohio, Washington and New York.

He was honored at a luncheon Friday noon at Point West and was presented with a pair of wooden shoes, traditional Holland symbol of welcome to distinguished guests, from John F. Donnelly. Mayor Nelson Bosman presented him with a windmill pin. Dr. Walraven, in turn presented the mayor with a letter of greeting from S. P. Baron Bentinck, burgomaster of Soest, the Netherlands, a city of some 32,000 which includes Soesterberg.

Earlier Friday, Dr. Walraven visited Windmill Island and climbed to the cap of Windmill De Zwaan to get the full story on Dutch engineering of an earlier day. Although familiar with windmills and their operation, he said this was one of the largest ones he had ever visited.

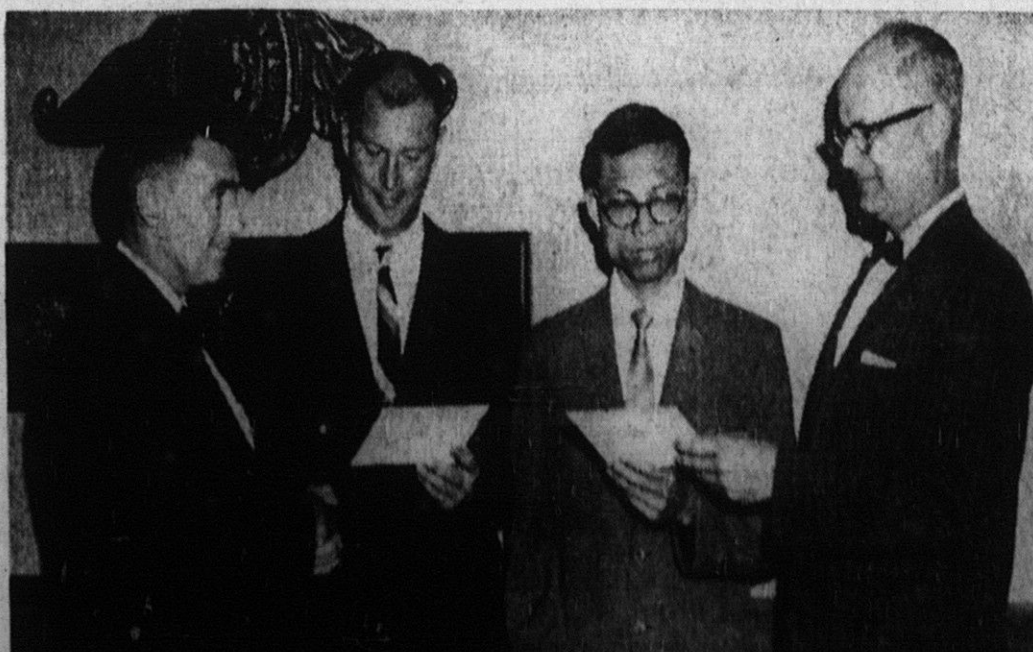

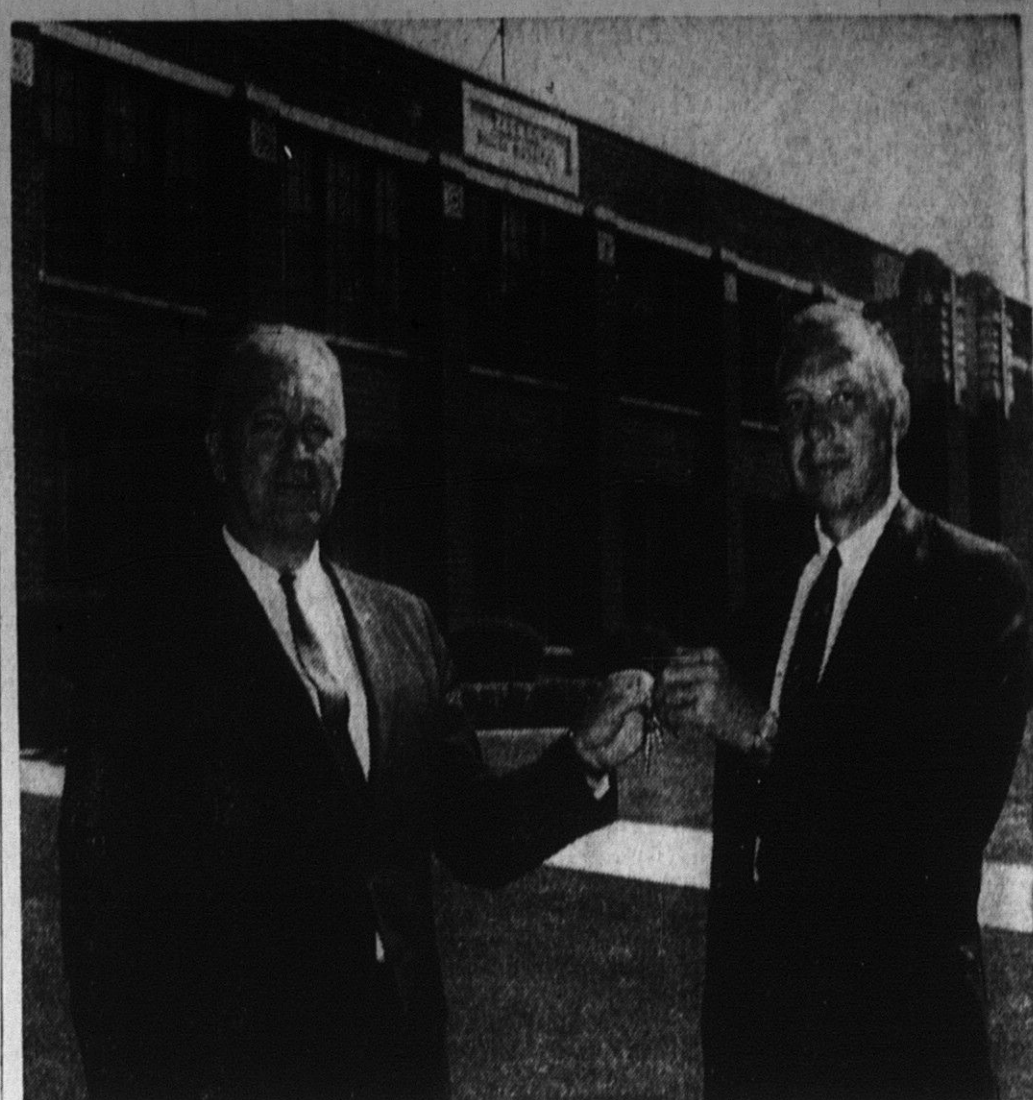

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Ray Lokers New Zeeland School Head

ZEELAND — A Zeeland native, Dr. Raymond J. Lokers, today took over as superintendent of Zeeland Public Schools. He succeeds Julius F. Schipper who retired Friday after 15 years in the post.

Lokers, who earned his Ph.D. degree in education administration at the University of Michigan, has been director of the Grand Rapids area office of Western Michigan University for the last two years.

A former teacher and high school principal at Zeeland for 12 years, Lokers was superintendent of Hamilton Schools for seven years before taking the position with Western Michigan University.

Both Schipper and Lokers are Hope College graduates, and both obtained their master's degrees from the University of Michigan.

Schipper's retirement climaxed a 39-year career in the field of education, 37 of those years spent in the administrative field. Schipper came to Zeeland 15 years ago from Middleville where he was school superintendent.

During Schipper's term as superintendent of Zeeland Schools, school enrollment more than doubled, rising from 820 students in 1952 to 1,660 enrolled this year.

Three new schools have been built during Schipper's administration—a new junior high school, Roosevelt Elementary School and the new Zeeland Middle School.

The Zeeland School District, under Schipper, has annexed seven outlying districts and parts of three others.

Schipper's retirement from the field of education will not be an inactive retirement. Schipper has accepted a position with Trans World Radio as an administrative assistant.

He will be stationed on the island of Bonaire in the Netherlands Antilles, off the coast of Venezuela, where he will serve as counselor for personnel and families of persons working for the Christian radio broadcast network.

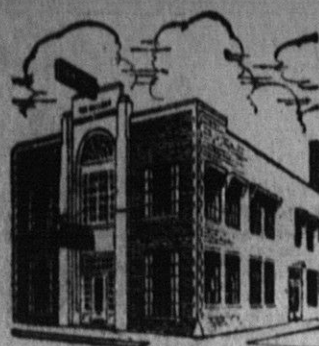

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JULY 4, 1967

On this day, by the adoption of the final draft of the Declaration of Independence by the Continental Congress, the United States is 191 years old. Recently we undertook the task of reading some of the innumerable speeches delivered on this day throughout the years. In past years, many were quite long as, for example, the one delivered by Edward Everett July 4, 1861, at the New York Academy of Music. It runs to 48 finely printed pages in a pamphlet but carries a footnote on the first page — "Large portions of this oration were, on account of its length, necessarily omitted in the delivery." Everett, it may be recalled, was the orator whose chief claim to fame appears to be that he delivered the main speech at Gettysburg and whose speech itself is forgotten where, as the shorter one of Lincoln has become immortalized.

Two excerpts from our reading appear particularly to be worth sharing with our readers. The first was spoken by Senator F. Ryan Duffy of Wisconsin on July 5, 1937 at the White House Ellipse in the nation's Capitol. "It is well that we pause at least once a year to consider what a courageous undertaking it was for our forefathers to declare their independence from the strongest nation in existence at that time. There were many scoffers in those days, who loudly proclaimed that such an undertaking could not be successful. Of course, we have great difficulties and problems in this country which must be solved in order to bring a greater measure of justice to a greater number of our people, but no people on the face of the earth have shown greater moral courage and as much good sense as has been shown so many times by the American people in times of trouble and distress."

The second excerpt goes even further back in our history. Delivered by the statesman Daniel Webster July 4, 1851 at the laying of the cornerstone of the new wing of the Capitol, he said: "In other days of the year we may be party men, indulging in controversies more or less important to the public good. We may have likes and dislikes, and we may maintain our political differences, often with warm, and sometimes with angry feelings. But today we are Americans all; nothing but Americans." Although 116 years old, this advice on celebrating our birthday has a timely ring. For when there is an acknowledged difference of opinion in our undeclared Vietnam involvement, it would be most unfortunate if the assenters or dissenters used the day to promote their points of view rather than stressing our common devotion to our country.

Lesson

Sunday, July 9
By C. P. Dame
Paul and Barnabas at Lystra
Acts 14:8-18

In days gone by missionaries endured many more hardships than most of them do at the present time. We are grateful that physical difficulties have lessened but it still costs much effort and consecration to present the gospel to the pagans of our time.

I. The day of miracles is not over. This lesson tells us how Paul and Barnabas preached the gospel to the pagans at Lystra in Asia Minor. At Lystra there was no Jewish synagogue which means that there were not ten Jewish families in the city in which the missionaries could preach.

Paul preached in the market place. He got a hearing. One man, we do not know his name, a cripple gave special attention to what Paul said. Luke gives four facts about the man. He was not able to walk. He had been lame from birth. He had never walked a step in his life. He heard Paul speak and listened intently. Paul noted that he had the faith to be healed, and so he said to him, "Stand upright on thy feet" and he did, he "leaped and walked." Now this got a lot of attention. This was a miracle. And miracles still happen. Never say that the day of miracles is past. God still is omnipotent.

II. The gospel is for pagans. The people of Lystra thought that the gods had come down to them. They named Barnabas, Jupiter, and Paul Mercurius, because he was the chief speaker. There was a legend in Lystra that the gods had come into their region in disguise and they had been refused hospitality by all except one elderly couple who took them in and were rewarded for this deed. The people were bent on giving divine honors to the missionaries. When the missionaries saw this they stopped them and told them about the true God.

Paul told these religious people that God is the Creator and that His providence is ever at work, in giving rain and fruitful seasons. When Paul preached to Jews he talked about the Old Testament, when he spoke to pagans he talked first about natural religion. God makes Himself known through two books, the book of nature and the book of grace.

III. People of courage are always needed. A mob of Jews came from Iconium who stirred up the people and Paul was stoned. They dragged Paul out of the city, assuming that he was dead. The disciples stood around him. It may be that Timothy who lived in Lystra stood with the group. Note that Paul made converts in pagan Lystra. After being stoned he went right back to the city unafraid.

Some people are fickle by nature. The people at Lystra at one time wanted to give divine honors to the missionaries and a short time after that they threw stones. Unfortunately we have some fickle people in the churches. However there are also the courageous. God uses them to make the gospel known. The pagans of America need this gospel, yes they need it desperately whether they know it or not.

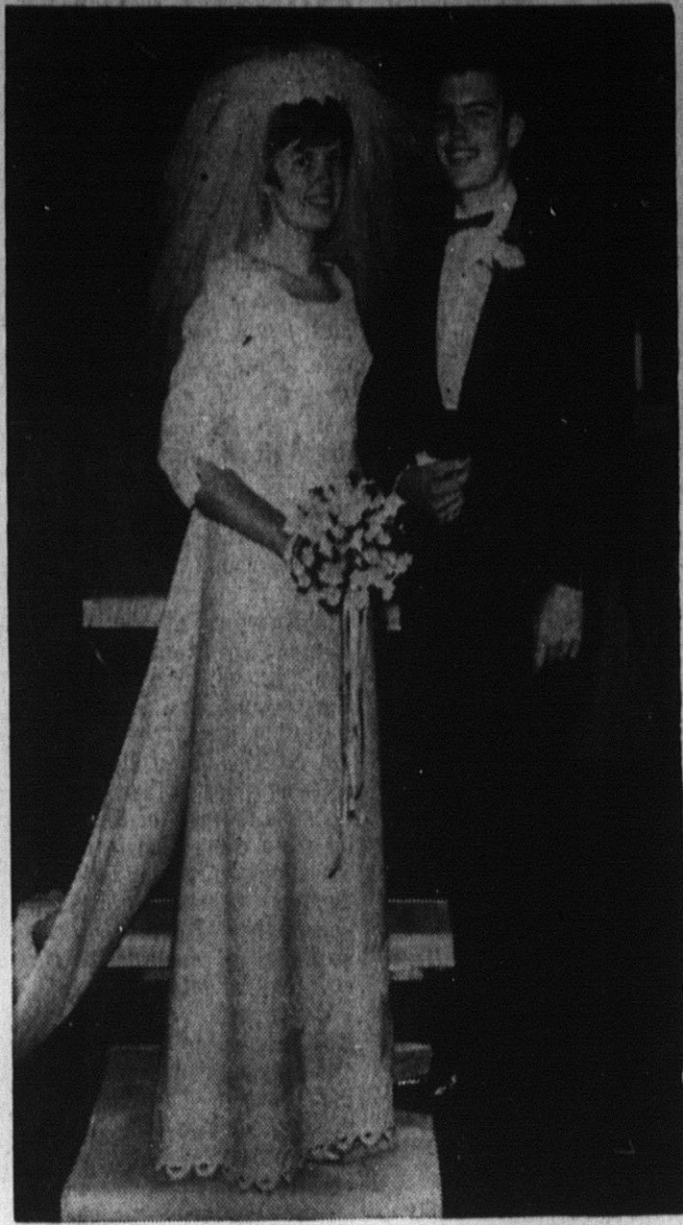

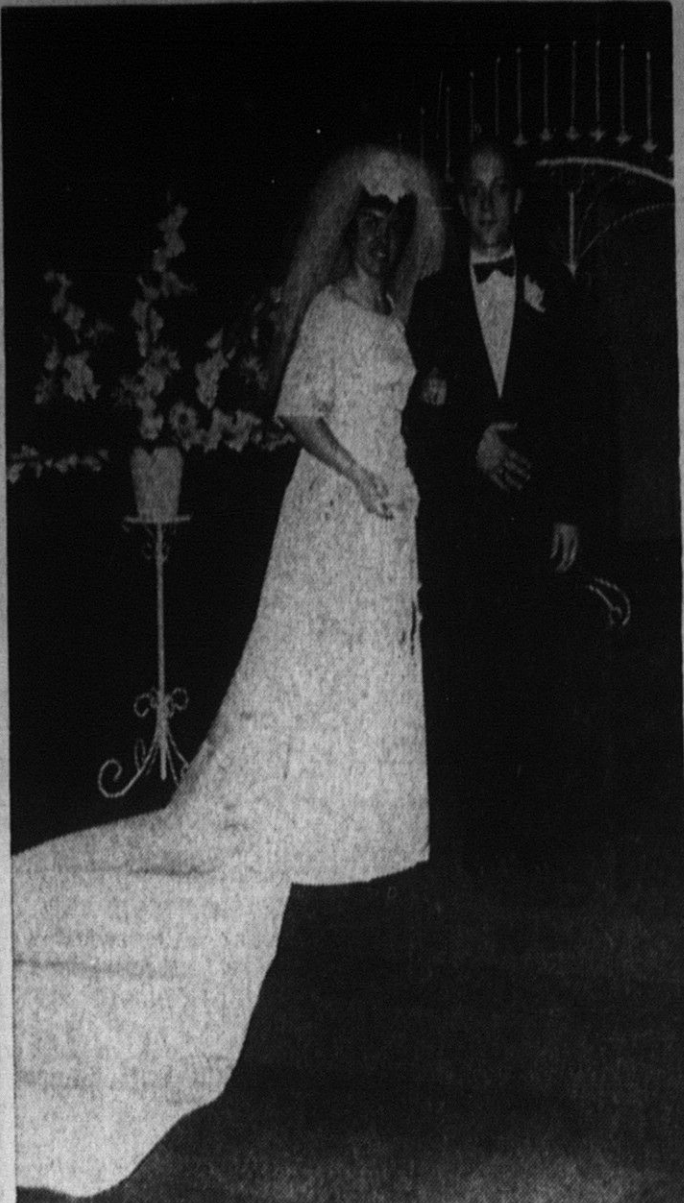

Been to Windmill Island lately?

It's almost as beautiful as during Tulip Time in the spring. Jaap de Blecourt, manager-gardener, has planted some 20,000 summer plants about the posthouse, windmill and parking lot. They run mostly to petunias and marigolds (many varieties of both), sweet alyssum, ageratum, cleome and other varieties difficult to pronounce and even harder to spell.

Adults regard the 200-year-old Windmill De Zwaan as the focal point of Windmill Island, and that is as it should be.

But the youngsters seem more impressed by the animals, birds and ducks about the place.

Not far from the windmill are two cows, one calf, three goats, three kids, three mother sheep, two lambs and two deer now one year old.

Recent heavy rains have produced more meadow grass than what the animals consume, and Manager de Blecourt arranged for a farmer to mow the tall grass which at times threatens to hide the smaller animals.

Elsewhere on the island are several pheasants, peacocks and peahens, smaller birds, 25 to 30 white and mallard ducks and

lots of thriving ducklings. Of course, there is the lone swan and soon there will be a goose, a tame one.

Newest gift to Windmill Island came from a Grand Rapids woman consisting of four sterling silver Dutch teaspoons over 150 years old, plus a Dutch cup and saucer and a little egg cup, also Dutch. The donor said she received the teaspoons many years ago from her grandfather. The spoons were well over 100 years old at the time.

Gifts previously received include a valuable antique Frisian clock which hangs in the posthouse, and a pewter coffee pot. The Dutch spoons will be mounted and framed to hang nearby.

He wrote, he chatted with the lovely guides in Dutch costume, visited to miniature village on the island, the Baker Furniture Museum, the little generating plant (he's an engineer working a shift in a small power plant in Ontario), took a ride on a city bus with the driver explaining points of interest including the price of real estate, visited Netherlands Museum with its glass churches and history of the first settlers, chatted with college students in the hotel, and then boarded a 9 p.m. train for Detroit.

"I'm telling everybody about your lovely city with miles of tulips along the streets, your park with the stone fountain with all the plants growing, and the friendly happy spirit all over town," he wrote.

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Waukazoo Gets Response To Alewife Plight Letters

Waukazoo Woods Association which has appealed to governmental leaders in the plight of dead alewives which have been polluting Lake Macatawa and shores of the Great Lakes has received acknowledgments from several persons to whom they have written.

While no immediate solution is presented, U.S. Rep. Guy Vander Jagt (R-9th district which includes Ottawa county) informed Wilhelmine Haberland, association secretary, that he and Sen. Robert P. Griffin of Michigan are exploring all appropriate government agencies for assistance in removal of the dead fish.

To solve the long term problem, Vander Jagt said the most logical solution would be to utilize the alewife as a forage fish for more desirable species such as salmon, and he has taken an active role in supporting the Michigan Conservation Department which has been planting Coho and King Salmon in western Michigan rivers.

He enclosed a bill which he introduced in the House April 4 which would authorize grants for anadromous fishery resources. At the time he said the alewife population has virtually exploded since their natural predators, the lake trout, were destroyed by the sea lamprey 10 to 15 years ago and while the alewife has limited commercial value (1 to 2 cents a pound) its value as food for Coho Salmon and King Salmon is much greater.

He figured the bill (HR-7947) would add a billion dollars to the economy of the Great Lakes region within 10 to 15 years. The bill calls for a federal appropriation of \$15 million to be matched by \$15 million of Michigan funds over a 10-year period.

Miss Haberland also received a reply from Jack D. Bails, fisheries biologist of the Michigan Department of Conservation, sympathizing with the plight but offering no quick or easy solution.

"We honestly feel," he wrote, "the best solution to the alewife problem is the restoration of the fish population balance in the Great Lakes. We are working diligently to stock the Great Lakes with lake trout, steelhead and salmon which all feed on and perhaps will control the overabundant alewife."

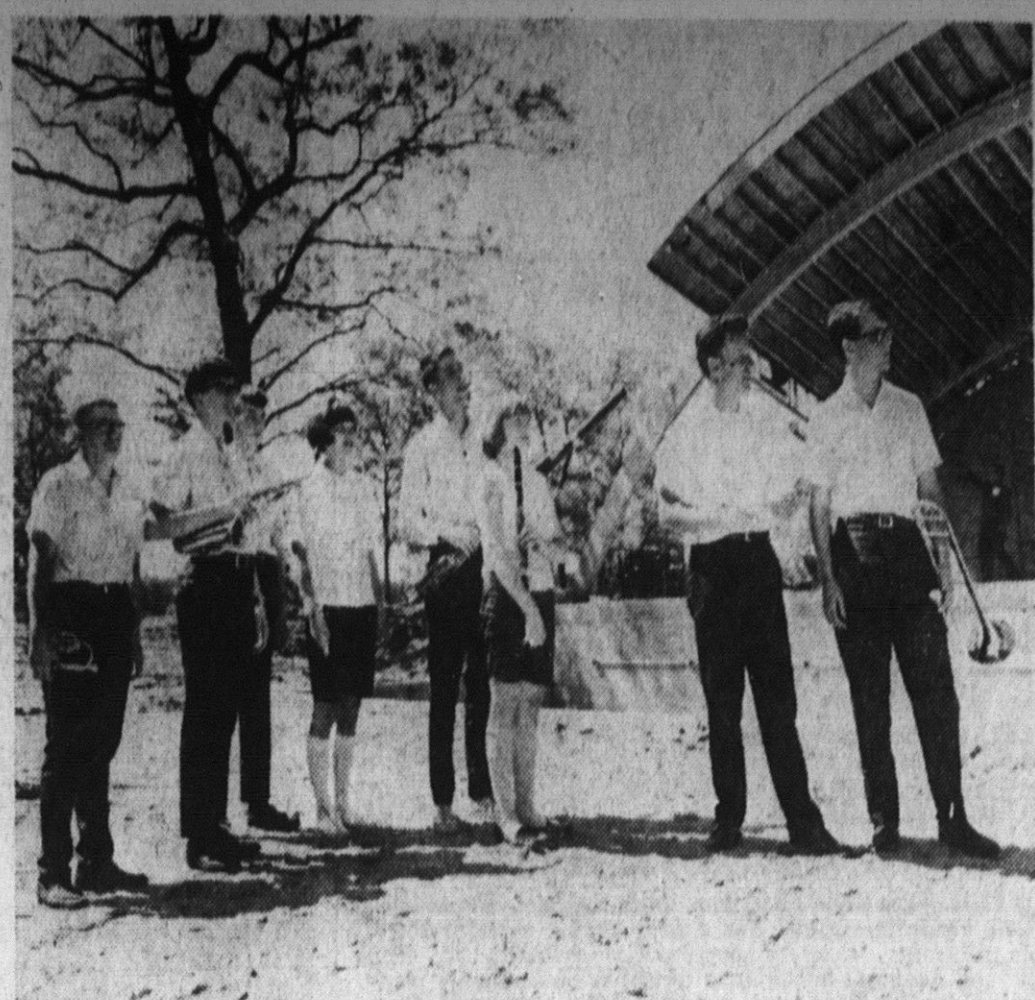

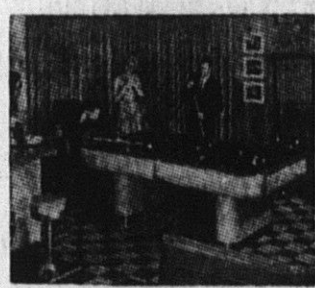
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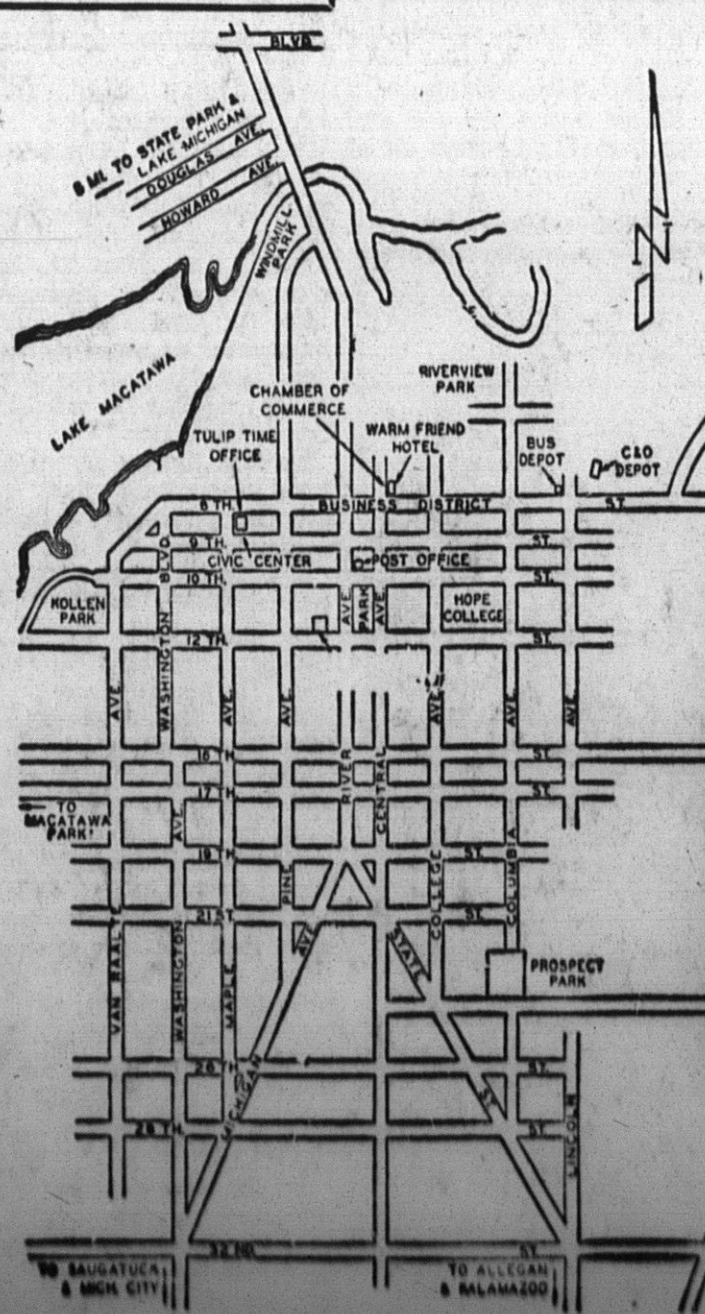
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Saugatuck Has Quiet Holiday

Red Cross Youth Adopts Vietnam Yule Projects

It may be the height of the summer vacation season, but Red Cross Youth are thinking about Christmas.

These bags for children 2 to 6 years old contain clothing, shoes and health, educational and recreational items. Similar gift bags for children 8 to 12 years old also are being filled. These will be distributed through military channels, many of them associated with the Green Berets.

Another project soon to be undertaken will be the "Red

Cross Shop Early — Vietnam 1967" providing layettes for distribution through maternity and other hospitals in Saigon and the provinces. All these items should be new. They consist of sleeveless shirts large enough to slip over head made of lightweight cotton or cotton knit; cotton flannelette blankets, 36 by 36 inches; diapers of Birdseye cotton, each a minimum of 27 inches square; safety pins (not diaper pins); towels, terry cloth or cotton knit; bars of mild white soap, and mosquito netting, 50 by 50 inches square.

Ten Iranians Visit Hope During United States Tour

A group of ten visitors from Iran arrived by bus on the campus of Hope College last Wednesday afternoon for a two-week stay.

The delegation is in Holland as part of a five-week tour of the United States sponsored by the Experiment in International Living Association which has its headquarters in Putney, Vt. The experiment is also in charge of the Community Ambassador Program.

The group is composed of seven women and three men who range in ages from 21 to 48. They are mainly English teachers but the group also includes a librarian and a secretary. The leader of the group, Mrs. Mehranoo Dehim Nasser, is from Teheran while the others are from the surrounding countryside.

Mrs. Nasser has made two previous trips to this country. She was in Ann Arbor in 1959 to 1960 for six months as a Fulbright scholar. In 1964 she made another visit to the United States. She says that she had a "wonderful experience both times and is always willing to come back to the U.S."

A number of activities has been planned for the group during its stay in Holland. In addition to observing some of Hope College's summer classes, tours have been planned to Holland High School and other area schools. The group will also make excursions to several

Thursday noon the visitors from Iran were the guests of the Rotary Club at a luncheon in the Hotel Warm Friend. One of the group's main objectives during its stay is to come into contact with the people of Holland.

In addition to these local tours, the delegation planned a trip to Dearborn to visit Greenfield Village and Ford Museum and an excursion to Chicago to see some of the museums and an urban renewal project. A one-day trip to Michigan State University will give the group a taste of life at a big university.

After the departure of the Iranians on July 10, Hope College will host a group of 35 Japanese students for five weeks.

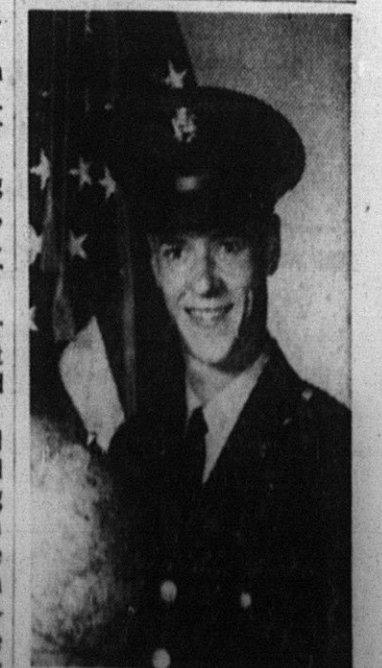

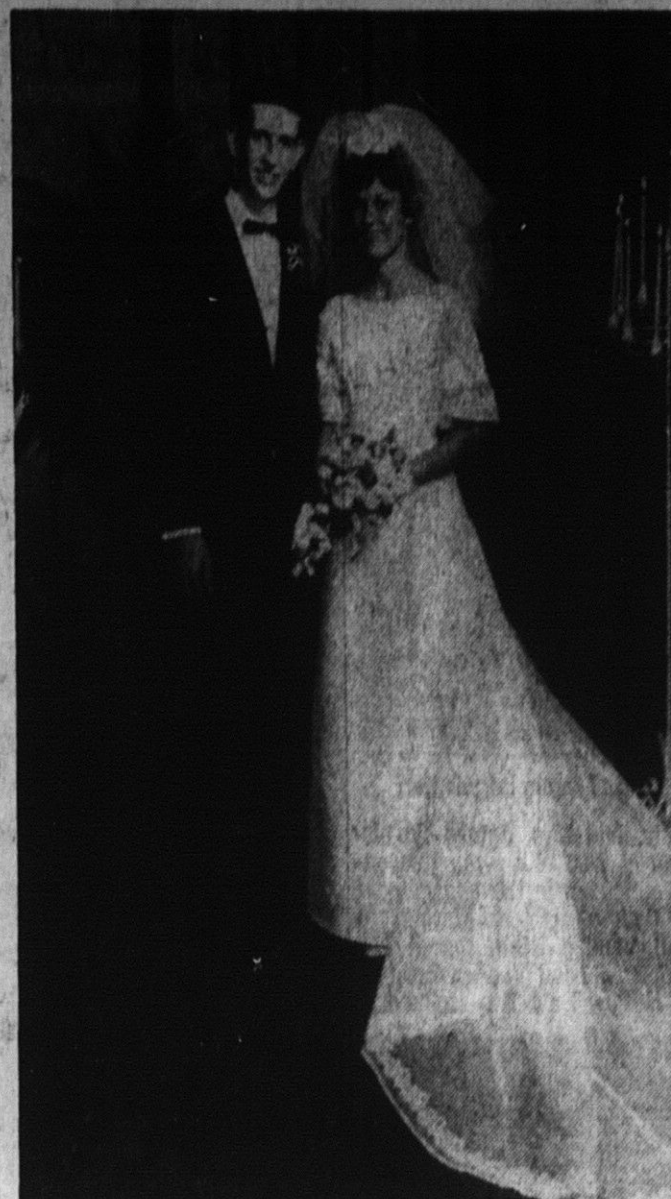

MILWAUKEE — Gypsy, a 52-foot sloop skippered by Charlie Kotovic of Milwaukee, emerged winner in the 30th annual Queen's Cup race across Lake Michigan over the weekend with a corrected time of 11 hours, 21 minutes, 45 seconds.

There were 38 yachts in the race started Friday night in Muskegon. The last boat reportedly crossed the finish line Saturday by 2:54 p.m. Milwaukee time.

In corrected time results, Gypsy was followed by Maria, a Cal 40 sailed by Joe Bonnes of Milwaukee and Scaramouche, skippered by Chuck Kirsch of Macatawa Bay Yacht Club, Holland. Maria's corrected time was 11 hours, 28 minutes, 37 seconds while Scaramouche's was 11 hours, 41 minutes, 55 seconds.

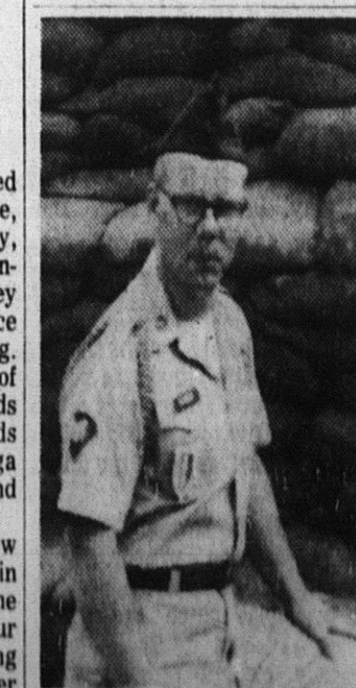
Gypsy's actual time was 12 hours, 32 minutes, 3 seconds, good enough for crossing the finish line third behind Norsaga also from Milwaukee and Mi-

lena from Macatawa.

The 12-meter Mitena, owned by a Grand Rapids syndicate, and her 12-meter archenemy, Norsaga, were the unquestionable "pair to watch" as they vied for the actual first place finish in the 79-mile crossing. Mitena's corrected time of 12 hours, 17 minutes, 6 seconds was one minute, 59 seconds slower than Norsaga. Norsaga wound up in 10th place and Mitena in 11th.

Norsaga, according to a crew member, had "no sweat" in leading all the way with the exception of about an hour when the Mitena, in luffing winds, overtook Norsaga on her leeward. After that the Mitena was a tailing albatross, the crew member said.

The win was nothing new for Gypsy or Kotovic. Kotovic won the Queen's Cup in 1964 with Gypsy and in 1956 with a former boat, Copperhead. It was also the third time Gypsy merited first place honors, having earned them in 1955 and 1958.

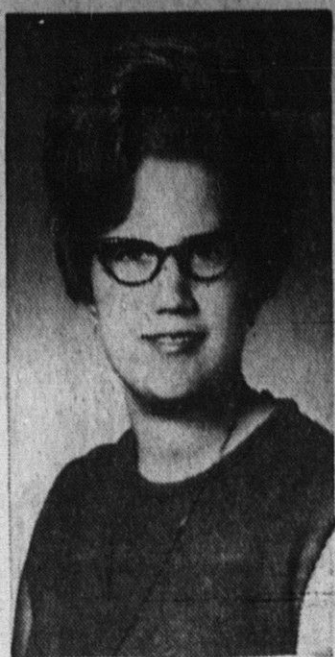
