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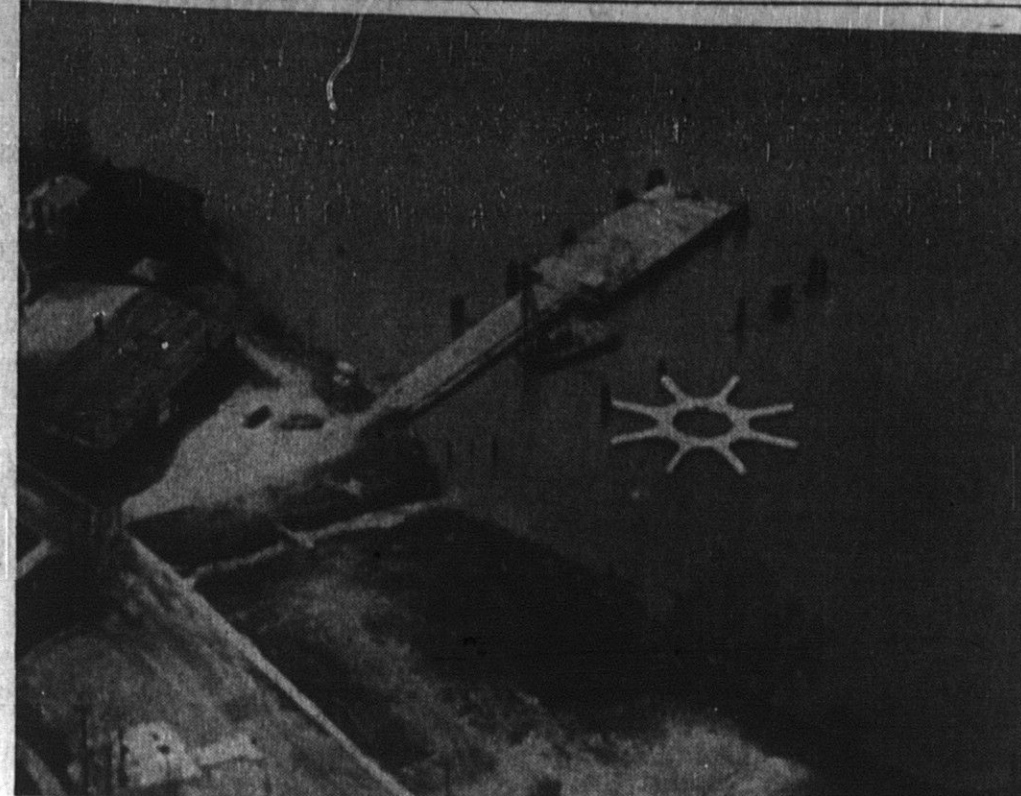

## Will Include Pool Millage In June Vote

Three Members Also to Be Named To School Board

A proposition to levy a half mill for three years for operating the Community Swimming Pool will appear on the June 9 school election ballot, the Board of Education decided at its monthly meeting Monday night.

Also on the ballot will be candidates for two members to the Board of Education for four-year terms and one member for a one-year term.

So far, Mrs. Kay MacKenzie who was appointed to the board last year to fill a vacancy and Rudy Fojtik of Federal district have filed as candidates for four-year terms. Applications are available from the superintendent's office and must be filed not later than May 10. A minimum of 40 signatures is needed.

The half mill operating millage would replace the quarter-mill levied the last three years for swimming pool operations. This millage was levied along with millage financing the swimming pool. Harvey Buter of the board explained that at the time it was known a quarter would be inadequate, but funds collected over the three-year span were sufficient to finance a full year of swimming pool operations plus having the instructor here the better part of a year to set up the program. This fund also financed a bus for transporting students to the swimming pool.

It is estimated that 112,000 persons have used the pool the past year in a program that provided instruction for all elementary pupils.

The proposed budget for 1969-70 calls for a total outlay of \$66,454.41 broken down as follows: salaries, \$45,854.41; supplies and expenses including utilities, \$15,000; capital outlay, \$2,500; bus expense, \$500; towel and suit laundry, \$2,600.

Estimated income for the year: local taxes based on 1/2 mill, \$50,000; interest on investments, \$500; towel fees and rentals, \$19,000; total \$69,500.

The proposed resolution setting up the election was presented by Atty. James E. Townsend.

President James O. Lamb made a special appeal to Holland citizens to encourage qualified persons to take an interest in membership on the Board of Education, pointing out that the school district has some \$10 million in property listing 10 elementary buildings, two junior high schools, a high school employing 300 teachers supported on a budget amounting to \$3 million a year.

In other business, the board approved transfer of \$8,000 from the 1966 Elementary Building and Site Fund to the Community Pool Building and Site Fund. The former fund has a balance in excess of \$60,000, more than sufficient to finance landscaping and parking lots in the elementary program. The \$8,000 for the pool fund is for finishing installations, not for operations.

### Dutch Canal Sailboat Given Windmill Island

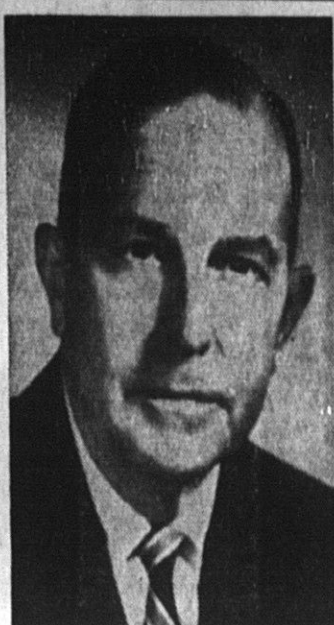
City Council Wednesday night accepted with thanks a gift to the city consisting of a Dutch canal sailboat from Dr. James A. Gunn of Grand Rapids.

In announcing the gift, City Manager Herb Holt said an appraisal from William A. Jesiek identified the craft and placed its value at \$3,000.

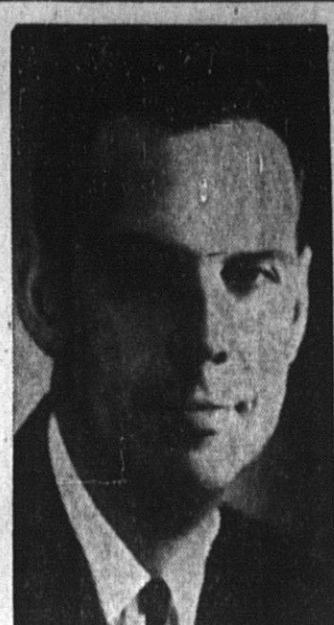
The boat will be kept at Windmill Island.

## 3 Honorary Degrees Slated

Hope College will confer three honorary doctoral degrees at the college's 104th Commencement exercises June 2, President Calvin A. VanderWerf announced today.

The college will confer an honorary Doctor of Humane Letters degree upon Dr. Franklin D. Murphy, chairman of the board of the Los Angeles Times Mirror Co.; an honorary Doctor of Science degree upon Dr. George D. Zuidema, director of the department of surgery at the Johns Hopkins University; and an honorary Doctor of Divinity degree upon the Rev. David H. C. Read, minister of the Madison Avenue Presbyterian Church, New York City.

Dr. Murphy will deliver the Commencement address while Rev. Read will preach the Baccalaureate sermon.

Dr. Murphy served as chancellor of the University of Kansas from 1951-60 and held the same role at the University of California in Los Angeles (UCLA) from 1960-68.

A native of Kansas City, Mo., Dr. Murphy holds an A.B. de-

gree from the University of Kansas and an M.D. degree from the University of Pennsylvania School of Medicine.

Dr. Murphy was Dean of the School of Medicine and Associate Professor of Internal Medicine at the University of Kansas prior to accepting the chancellorship of that institution.

He was selected one of the ten outstanding young men in the nation by the U.S. Junior Chamber of Commerce in 1949 and was presented the U.S. Army's outstanding civilian service award in 1967.

A fellow of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences, Dr. Murphy is president of the Samuel H. Kress Foundation and a member of the boards of trustees at the National Gallery of Art, the Los Angeles County Museum of Art and the California Museum of Science and Industry.

Rev. Read has been minister of the Madison Avenue Presbyterian Church since 1956. He was born and educated in Scotland.

He served as chaplain to the forces of the British Army from 1939-45 during which part of the time he was a prisoner of war.

Rev. Read served as the first chaplain to the University of Edinburgh from 1949-55 and in 1952 was chaplain to the Queen of Scotland.

The author of numerous publications, Rev. Read's most recent book is entitled "Virginia Woolf Meets Charlie Brown."

Dr. Zuidema is a native of Holland (Mich.) and a 1949 Hope graduate with summa cum Laude honors.

He has been director of the department of surgery at the Johns Hopkins University and surgeon-in-chief at the Johns Hopkins Hospital since 1964.

Dr. Zuidema serves as a consultant for several hospitals including Walter Reed Army General Hospital.

He has been active on the National Aeronautics and Space Administration's science and technology advisory committee for manned space flight since 1965.

## 11-Cent Decrease On \$1,000

Total Assessments Boosted \$7 Million; Public Hearing Set

A city budget for 1969-70 calling for a total tax levy of just over \$1.6 million was presented to City Council at its regular meeting Wednesday night.

This calls for a tax rate of \$16.69 per \$1,000 state equalized valuation, compared with the equivalent of \$16.80 last year, or a decrease of .11 mills overall.

However, due to the equalizing process being applied to valuations in both Ottawa and Allegan counties, property owners will experience some increase in their tax bills.

Proposed tax levy for the year starting July 1 is \$1,624,634.47, up \$108,725.84 from last year's levy of \$1,515,908.63.

City taxes will be figured on a total assessment this year of \$97,379,103, an increase of \$7,063,038 over last year's total of \$90,316,065.

The proposed budget will be on file in the city clerk's office for public inspection and the clerk was instructed to publish a summary not later than April 30. A public hearing will be held at the next meeting of City Council on May 7.

In explaining budget details at a press conference following the Council meeting, City Manager Herb Holt said city employees will be given an across-the-board one-step increase amounting to approximately 5 per cent in pay schedules.

In addition to the across-the-board increase, certain classifications in the hospital, Board of Public Works and general city will receive an additional adjustment.

An increase in employee retirement benefits and vacation adjustments are included in the budget, Holt explained. All city employees will be entitled to these benefits including pay adjustments, except those engaged in collective bargaining with the Board of Public Works and the city of Holland. The reduced BPW figure is brought about by additional depreciation and higher operating costs.

As for income other than taxes, the state shared income tax is estimated at \$80,000, BPW electrical share at \$175,000, compared with \$325,000 last year, and sales tax at \$265,000.

The Juvenile Affairs department is being transferred to the police department budget, a community relations officer for the police department, additional staff for the city manager and city auditor, air conditioning for City Hall, and an appropriation to the Motor Vehicle Highway Fund comprise the significant changes in this year's budget program.

Holt said the general fund is up \$114,560.88, a decrease in the library budget of \$5,807.54 and a decrease of \$27.50 in the debt retirement accounts for the final budget increase of \$108,725.84. The library budget is decreased because of increased revenues from penal fines in areas served outside the city.

Total debt service in the budget is \$233,347.50 covering the 1955 hospital addition and the 1960 and 1965 sewer bonds.

Council spent two weeks in budget study sessions before submitting the budget.

**Saugatuck Man Arraigned in Shooting Case**

ALLEGAN — David C. Arndt, 21, Saugatuck township, was arraigned in Allegan Circuit Court Monday before Judge Chester A. Ray on charges of assault with intent to commit the crime of murder.

His attorney, John Nahan, said Arndt's mental health is such that he has no recollection of the incident and is unable to assist in his own defense. Judge Ray entered a not guilty plea on his behalf and set bond at \$10,000.

Nahan said the next step would be to request a psychiatric exam.

Arndt was charged following a shooting Jan. 18 in a gravel pit in Saugatuck township in which he shot James Buswell, 24, also of Saugatuck township, five times in the legs and back. Buswell reportedly was released some time ago after spending many weeks in a Grand Rapids hospital.

**Two Cars Collide**

Cars driven by Wayne Allen Mokma, 16, of route 1, 656 Church St., and Mark Edward Copier, 16, of 22 Cherry St., collided at 7:39 p.m. Monday at 22nd St. and Maple Ave., according to Holland police who cited Mokma for making an improper left turn, failing to yield the right of way to oncoming traffic.

## Local Group Briefed on Dredging

Representatives of local governments, industries, news media and others interested in Holland Harbor took a tour of the hopper dredge Hains Tuesday afternoon in connection with dredging operation of the federal navigation project at Holland, dredging the channel in Lake Macatawa to a depth of 21 feet.

Heavy winds Tuesday cancelled actual dredging operations and the dredge did not leave the docks at the James De Young light plant, but some 20 persons were shown operations of the vessel which is berthed in Grand Haven.

The Hains is a seagoing hopper dredge with a bin capacity of 885 cubic yards. It has two drag arms through which it pumps bottom material into hopper bins. It can dispose of dredged material either by bottom dump from its hoppers, pumpout ashore, or side-casting through a pipeline suspended horizontally off the starboard beam.

Earlier, representatives of the Detroit district, Corps of Engineers, explained dredging operations at a gathering in the conference room on the third floor of City Hall. District officials present were Major Elbert Welsh, Ross Kittleman, Michael Davinich and Robert Sonrel.

The men explained that each harbor is unique, that no single solution to dredge - disposal problems can be laid down for any one lake, let alone all lakes together. Consideration must be given to the amount and kind of pollutants, the practicality of controlling such sources, the environmental effects of open lake disposal, the availability and cost of sites for diked disposal areas, etc.

They emphasized that dumping dredged materials in deep water of lakes like Lake Michigan is under question and could well be curtailed by Congressional action. Should this occur, dredged materials would likely be dumped on land or in diked areas, probably involving increased costs which might have to be paid or shared by governmental units or private interests.

With many persons sharply concerned over water pollution in general, the Corps of Engineers representatives pointed out that dredging formed only a small part of the sediment and pollution problems of the lakes, approximately 8 per cent in the case of Lake Erie, and a smaller proportion in other lakes.

The Corps of Engineers report listed Holland as one of 35 harbors in the Detroit District of the Great Lakes where sediments contain pollutants. The local harbor calls for dredging 40,000 tons of silt and dredged materials annually, compared with 1,220,000 for Cleveland, Ohio, and 1,120,000 for Toledo, Ohio. Attention was called to public hearings in the future with one probably scheduled in Grand Haven.

The representatives said private dumping can be less expensive in some cases than transporting the dredge to deep waters, and in the past dredged materials have been deposited on the Padnos property off Pine Ave. The city of Holland has granted permission to dump dredged materials in the vicinity of Riverview Park, but this would involve several hundred feet of pipeline.

Representing Holland city among the 20 present were Mayor Nelson Bosman, Councilman Robert Dykstra and Jack Smith, City Engineer Harold Derks and assistant BPW Supt. Robert Riemersma. Herman Windemuller represented Park township.

## West Ottawa Concerned On Migrants

With an unexpected influx of migrant students (41 so far this spring,) the West Ottawa Board of Education Monday night decided to release Marian Kinderman, a multi-lingual teacher, from all classroom duties to work with the new students, many of whom cannot speak English and have never been enrolled in an American school, and to work with local and state agencies providing assistance in such cases.

Supt. Lloyd Van Raalte said 21 migrant students arrived after spring vacation without warning, waiting at bus stops with other students. He said they are part of an influx of migrants arriving to work in local nurseries and that one nursery alone expects to hire 350 migrants this year. He said some newcomers are housed in rooms without heat, plumbing or electricity.

He said the YMCA arranged an experimental program at Pine Creek school during spring vacation involving 210 children, assisted by three teachers and West Ottawa high school students on a volunteer basis. Further programs will be worked out this summer.

Contracts were approved for two teachers, Sheryl Laman, returning as an elementary teacher after a year's absence, and Judith Munroe, also elementary. A year's leave of absence was granted Kathy Doidge, elementary teacher.

West Ottawa will work with Holland and Zeeland districts in coordinating special education programs. The superintendents will work on developing policy guidelines and specific mechanics for employment, operation and financing costs above and beyond reimbursements received.

Purchase of four Chevrolet buses were approved, costing \$4,982.89 each chassis, and \$4,595 each body. Bids had been submitted at last month's meeting.

West Ottawa will continue taking its census as in the past although state law now is permissive rather than required. The administration considers the census vital in enrollments.

Permission was granted fifth and sixth graders of Woodside School for a camping trip at the 4-H camp in Allendale.

Tornado procedures are being developed for the school district.

## Salem Firemen Put Out Blaze in Salt Tank

Lightning had struck the tank setting it afire. It was noted immediately by the family which was at home.

The fire was out in 10 minutes and damage was kept to a minimum.

## One-Car Crash Knocks Out Power, Telephone Service

ZEELAND — A Grandville man escaped with minor injuries in a one-car accident on Washington Ave. between Centennial and Maple Sts. at 6:30 p.m. Wednesday. The car hit a utility pole cutting power and telephone service to some area residents.

Zeeland police reported Elwin G. Dohm, 64, of 3352 Woodbine Ave., was driving west on Washington when the car went off the road and snapped the utility pole, dragging down electricity and telephone lines.

Dohm was taken to Community Hospital here and released after treatment of abrasions and lacerations.

A secondary circuit on the pole was knocked out, leaving residents in a block-wide area without power for about three hours. It was restored around 10 p.m.

Other crews were out until 2 a.m. today repairing the downed telephone wires. Approximately 25 to 30 families were without telephone service for the duration. Also without phone service was the power plant.

The broken cables also affected the telemetering circuit from the water elevator storage tank to the pumping station on the opposite end of the town. It was operated manually until repairs were made, according to Martin Hietje, superintendent of public works.

Zeeland police are continuing their investigation.

## Den Herder Is Chairman of Tax Allocation Board

GRAND HAVEN — Fred Den Herder, Ottawa county treasurer, was elected chairman of the county tax allocation board at its first meeting for 1969-1970 at the county building Monday.

Miss Jennie M. Kaufman, superintendent of the county intermediate school district, was elected co-chairman.

The next meeting of the group will be held April 28 at 1 p.m. in the supervisors room of the county building and the meeting will be open to anyone who desires to appear.

Other members of the board are Franklin Schmidt of Coopersville, chairman of the ways and means committee of the board of education; Virgil H. Buter, a member of the Holland board of education; Virgil H. Quibben, a city councilman from Grand Haven; Henry Vermeer of Jamestown township, and County Clerk Harris Nieuwma, who is also clerk of the board.

## Rain, Gusty Wind Damage Reported

City streets were filled with water and some gutters overflowed as Holland weathered 30 to 40-mile-an-hour winds in the storm that dumped close to 1.5 inches rain Thursday.

The storm came with the severe thunderstorm watch which affected nine counties in Southwestern and Lower Michigan from 2:50 p.m. until 7 p.m. Gusty winds knocked over several trees throughout Allegan County area and completely demolished a mobile home at the Wagon Wheel Mobile Home Park, 1066 Miller Rd., Plainwell.

The home was blown off its lot and five persons inside it were taken to Kalamazoo Bronson Hospital. James Clark, 35, of Kalamazoo who was visiting at the home, was reported in fair condition today with a fractured back.

Jack Garrison, 25, owner of the home, his wife, Vickie, 20, their daughter, Teresa, 17 months, and their son, Jack Jr.,

three weeks were released after treatment.

High winds took the Oscar Dalrymple trailer on 108th Ave. east of 15th St. and tipped it over against a tree.

Part of the roof of a barn belonging to Andrew Edison, 3556 108th Ave., was blown off and his corn crib completely destroyed. Winds also tore off the barn door and overturned a fuel tank there.

Another roof was blown off the barn at the Peter Oswald farm at 1385 108th Ave.

Lightning started a fire at the Thomas Spriensma home at 1994 Quincy St. in Jamestown township, causing an undetermined amount of damage. According to Harry Boersen, Jamestown township fireman, a bolt of lightning hit some telephone wires and traveled along the line to the two-story wood-frame home. It knocked off some shingles and corner boards and set a closet in the

house afire.

Mr. and Mrs. Spriensma and some of their older children were in the barn milking cows when the lightning hit. Spriensma said some of the cows were knocked to the ground.

Ottawa county sheriff's deputies reported two cables were down at the entrance of Tunnel Park.

Winds ripped a wire at Bay Haven Marina Inc., 1862 Ottawa Beach Rd. starting a minor fire at 7:25 p.m., deputies said; however the fire was out before firemen arrived and no damage was reported.

Holland Coast Guardsmen reported retrieving a few row boats which were churned adrift on Lake Macatawa by the winds.

According to Civil Defense Director Glen Timmer, the tornado warning for five counties, Berrien, Van Buren, Allegan, Kalamazoo and Barry was issued at 4:19 p.m. Thursday

and extended to include Cass, St. Joseph, Calhoun and Branch counties at 4:30 p.m.

A total all-clear was issued at 7 p.m.

Timmer said the tornado warnings were issued on the basis of weather radar indicating possible tornado or funnel cloud activity in the St. Joseph-Benton Harbor area and the South Bend, Ind., area.

Subsequent reports indicated sightings of funnel clouds in those counties, Timmer said.

There were also numerous reports of marble to golf ball size hail. Timmer said there had been no official report of actual tornado touchdowns.

Nearly two inches of rain was dumped on Jackson during the 24 hours ending 6 a.m. today. One and one-third inches fell at Mount Clemens and one inch and a quarter at Detroit.

More than an inch of rain was measured at Saginaw, Grand Rapids and Oscoda.

Offerory prayer was led by Mrs. Harold Stephenson, Union president, and closing prayer by Rev. S. Cammenga, pastor of the Drenthe Church.

## Holland House Damaged by Fire

A fire which started in some grease in a vent over the stove did an estimated \$400-\$500 damage to the Glenn T. Bolton home, 485 West 23rd St. about noon Monday.

The blaze charred the wall and cupboards above the stove in the kitchen at the back of the one-story house. Smoke from the fire filtered through much of the house.

Holland firemen extinguished the blaze in about 15 minutes.

Mrs. Bolton was reportedly frying potatoes on the stove, and the fire started after she had stepped out of the house for a moment, firemen said.

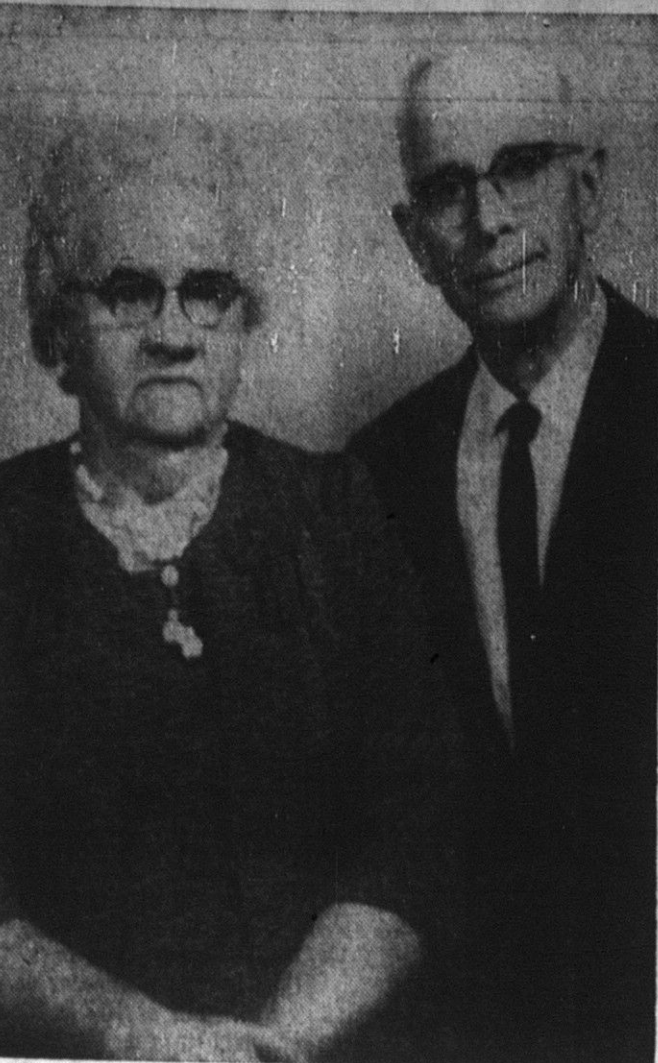
## Two Persons Injured In 2-Car Collision

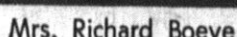

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## "POISON!"

The 20th century is quite proud of its scientific attainments and points with pride to its ability to place nature under its control. But there are times when our attempts to control nature backfire and we find that the balance in nature can be easily upset, or brought into a position of danger for mankind. Reports indicate that this has happened to the coho salmon, and probably to other species as well.

We didn't get into this problem overnight. For some time citizens have pointed to the danger of DDT. There have been those who have said that the disappearance of a portion of our bird population has been due to DDT. But that protest has gone unheeded. Now it is the fish population.

We may get some action this time. The state of Michigan has a sizable stake in the poisoning of its streams, which in turn will continue to poison fish, especially the coho salmon. Other states are concerned about their own investments. It may be that with this kind of self-interest we may get some action that will be of value beyond the poisoning of our streams and lakes.

It isn't unusual for modern technological advances to solve some problems and raise a number of others. We hope Governor Milliken will exercise strong leadership to save what may well be a tremendous tourist prize. We are quite sure that the Governor can speak and act with strong backing from the citizens of the state. And we need exactly that kind of action.

## Sunday School Lesson

Sunday, April 27  
The Authority of the Bible  
Deut. 6:4-7; Romans 16:25-27;  
II Peter 1:16-19  
By C. P. Dame

Some people accept the Bible as the Word of God and some do not. It makes a big difference what we believe about the Bible. We who believe it is the Word of God accept it as being authoritative and obey its teaching.

I. The Bible is for every generation. It is for this present generation which dislikes authority. The first passage of the lesson text is from Deuteronomy. This passage teaches monotheism — there is but one God. This truth was taught in a time when people believed in many gods. It is man's duty to love God "with all thine heart, and with all thy soul, and with all thy might." We must take God's commandments seriously. God's words "shall be in thine heart."

God ordered the parents to teach His commandments to their children. They teach with authority because God gave it to them. Teaching must be continuous. One reason why there is much lawlessness today is due to the failure of parents to teach their children. When a person reads about lawlessness on the campuses and on the streets the question arises what kind of homes the trouble makers come from. God's laws are for every generation and therefore they must be taught.

II. The Bible is also for all nations and nationalities. The second part is from the last chapter of Romans. It is a doxology which sums up the great thoughts of the epistle. Note some words of Paul — words such as power, gospel, preaching, revelation, and others.

The word "mystery" refers to that which could only be known by God's revelation. The gospel is mentioned by the Old Testament prophets but it is revealed fully in the New Testament in the person of Jesus Christ. This gospel brings salvation to all who believe, whether Jew or Greek or Barbarian. Acceptance of the gospel leads to belief and obedience to God which is the proof of a change for by nature we are all disobedient to God. Obedience is the result of faith.

III. We can trust the Bible. The third part of the lesson text is from II Peter. In Peter's time some people said that Christians followed "cleverly devised myths" when they preached the power and the coming of Jesus Christ. Peter on the Mount of Transfiguration had seen the glory of Christ and heard God's voice. This had made a deep impression on his mind and so when he wrote he reported what he had seen and heard. His writings reveal the note of certainty.

**NEW SCHOOL IN LE LOI** — Here is a new elementary school in Le Loi hamlet east of Saigon in Vietnam, built from funds raised in the Hope-Holland Hamlet Drive (HHH) in

Holland in February, 1966. Over \$6,000 was collected but work on buildings was delayed when the hamlet fell into the hands of the Viet Cong. Other buildings are scheduled.

## Vietnam Hamlet School Built From Local Funds

Funds raised by students at Hope College and residents of Holland have been used for the construction of an elementary school building in the South Vietnamese village of Le Loi.

Hope students initiated the Hope-Holland Hamlet Drive (HHH) campaign to give a lending hand to help the Vietnamese people help themselves.

The HHH funds, totaling over \$6,000, were collected in February, 1966, but use of the money was postponed when Le Loi fell into the hands of the Viet Cong.

Now the hamlet is apparently securely in the hands of the Saigon government. Le Loi is located in the southeastern region of Long Khanh province, east of Saigon.

"The kindergarten building is 95 per cent completed and should begin operation very shortly," wrote the Agency for International Development Officer Antole Bilecky in a letter to Hope Student Senate President Ron Hood.

"There is good progress in Le Loi Hamlet. The Viet Cong have not bothered this part of

Long Khanh Province during the current offensive," he added.

Bilecky said that he was planning to call a "townhall" meeting with the people of Le Loi Hamlet and "discuss what other projects they would like to see accomplished" with the HHH funds.

Other American agencies are currently also working in Le Loi. Army engineers are rebuilding the highway through the village, and AID assistance has resulted in the construction of an irrigation system.

Le Loi has a population of 2,500, broken down into 350 family units with 375 school children. It is a new hamlet of bamboo thatched huts located in a cleared shallow valley. The inhabitants are refugees from two other villages which were overrun by the Viet Cong in March 1965.

The residents of Le Loi relocated themselves without any help from the province or the government of Vietnam.

Other funds from the HHH drive will soon be utilized in other projects in the hamlet.

## Russell Boeve Elected President At MPA Meeting

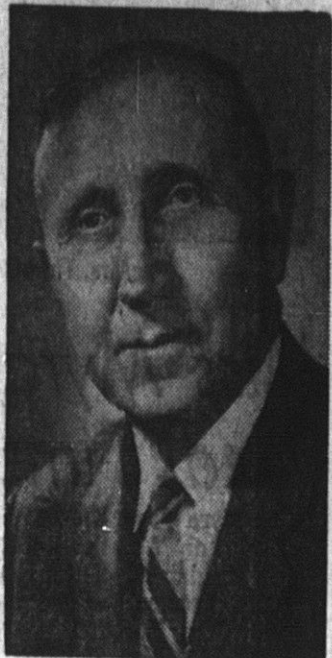

## '1969 Look at Welfare' Given to Women Voters

The Holland Area Provisional League of Women Voters met Tuesday afternoon in the First Presbyterian Church.

Mrs. Calvin Vander Werf, President of the Holland Area League, presided. She turned the meeting over to Mrs. Albert Timmer, a member of the Welfare committee, who introduced the speaker of the afternoon, Lawrence Hildore.

Mr. Hildore is director of Ottawa County Department of Social Services, and his topic was "The 1969 Look at Welfare." He said that the League of Women Voters organization was responsible some years ago for putting Social Service personnel on a Civil Service basis.

Mr. Hildore spoke of the many categories of Social Services, including Old Age Assistance, Aid to the Blind, Aid to the Disabled and the Aid to Families with Dependent Children.

He particularly spoke of the services to children. All children up to the age of 19 who are declared delinquent, wayward or neglected are the responsibility of the Social Services Department, unless they are wards of the court. One of most recent and fastest growing programs in the Children's Protective Service. He told a number of pathetic and disturbing incidents of battered and beaten children.

Other duties of the department are the licensing of Day Care Centers, and the licensing of baby sitters, and providing foster homes for children. Social Services are also responsible for emotionally disturbed children. Mr. Hildore had many illustrations and stories from his own experience, some sad and some even humorous, but he said what bothered him most was the waste of human lives in so many instances.

It was announced that the next meeting of the "Know Your Town" committee would be May 19 at the home of Mrs. Joyce Hutter at 1 p.m. The League will hand out pamphlets at Tulip Time and volunteers were asked to help. It was also announced that the Voters Guide leaflet would be ready by the end of the month.

Copies of a letter addressed to Governor Milliken, dated April 7, 1969 and signed by the state League President, Mrs. Robert Forch, were distributed. The letter states that the Michigan League supports the Governor's proposal to grant cost of living increases to public welfare clients and supports the proposed work incentive program to provide job opportunities and training for ADC recipients. The League has been studying Public Welfare in Michigan since 1963.

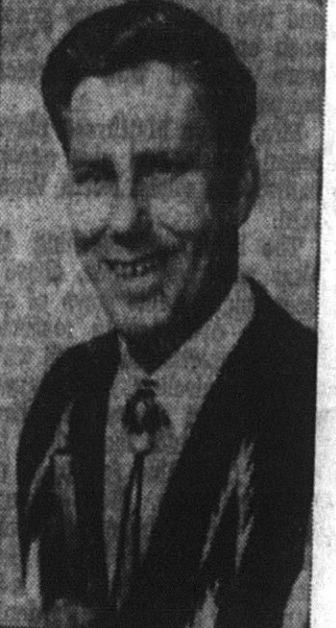

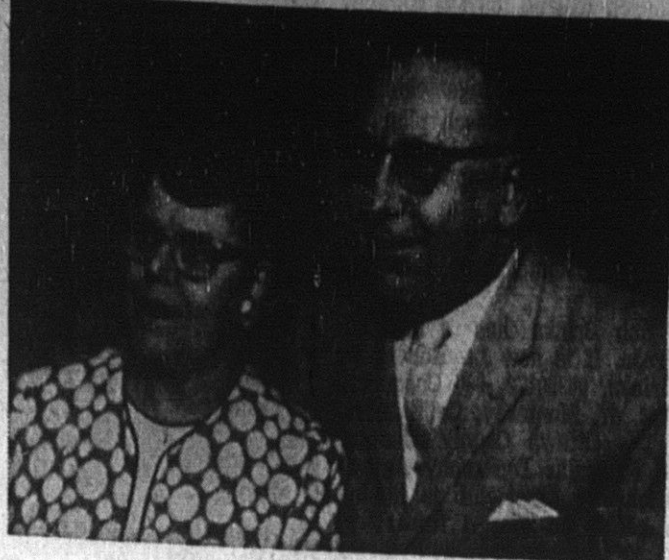

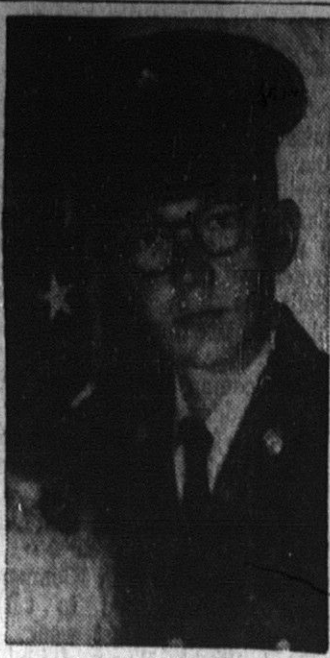

## Council Acts on 4 Hearings

Four public hearings occupied City Council for 50 minutes Wednesday night, and then Council completed all other business in less than 20 minutes, adjourning at 9:37 p.m.

Council Chambers were filled for the meeting, including a number of Boy Scouts from First Presbyterian Church. Most persons present were interested in the hearings, particularly two water main projects in Lincoln Ave.

A water main in Lincoln Ave. from 48th St. south 667 feet was approved as presented. A written objection came from Julius Lubbers and Melva Mulder regarding property at 228 East 48th St., the property of Maggie Lubbers, deceased. Speaking in favor of the construction were Cornie Versendaal and Harvey Scholten.

The other main in Lincoln Ave. north from 48th St., 1,975 feet brought writer: protests from Mrs. Myrtle Verburg, Mr. and Mrs. Henry Schaap and George Markvluer and verbal protest from Mrs. Alice Verburg.

Favoring the construction were Ken Schaap who has obtained a permit from a trailer park, Ed Wolbert, Don Lemmen and Robert Thomas who owns Willow Park property. After considerable discussion, Council approved laying the water line but terminating it 330 feet south of the proposed northerly point.

This presented a complication for Robert Thomas of Willow Park who would be assessed for the entire 475 feet frontage on his property although the water line would cover just a part, since his entire mobile court would be serviced. Thomas said he understood the situation but would have to check his property lines. He said he does not need city water at present but would be interested in fire protection and in improved water.

The letter from Mr. and Mrs. Henry Schaap was sharply critical of city practices, and on inquiry of Councilman Robert Dykstra, City Manager Herb Holt felt the Schaaps were referring to action by the Board of Appeals which had approved a mobile park license for Ken Schaap but earlier denied one for another person in another area nearby. The Schaap development would adjoin the existing mobile home park.

The third hearing concerned a sanitary sewer in Melbourne subdivision in the vicinity of Pioneer Ave. and 33rd St. One person, Hiram Wiegman, objected to the same assessment for a smaller lot he owned and City Manager Holt said the policy, while debatable, is used in subdivisions having uneven lots due to curved roads.

The fourth hearing was on a variance from fire district requirements on an application of Neal Bierling to enlarge his bakery at 200 River Ave.

All applications were passed unanimously.

In other business, Council approved a recommendation of the Board of Public Works on an agreement with H. J. Heinz Co. whereby the company will reimburse the city for the cost of a study not to exceed \$9,200 in connection with treatment of Heinz' industrial waste water.

Council acknowledged with thanks a gift for Holland Hospital of a Bennett Intermittent Positive Pressure Breathing Apparatus valued at \$495 from the Christian Reformed Unit.

On recommendation of City Attorney Gordon Cunningham, Council adopted a resolution opposing House Bill 2326 in the Michigan Legislature which would grant an exemption from personal property taxes for raw, in-process or processed fruit or vegetables for human diet while owned by and on the premises of the canner, freezer or packer of the raw product. Cunningham said such taxes in the state amount from \$1.7 million to \$2 million, and in Holland approximately \$20,000 a year.

The oath of office of Cunningham as city attorney was presented and placed on file earlier in the meeting.

Purchases were confirmed for Councilman Lamb, Lamb, Inc., fire, park and cemetery departments, \$29.86, and Councilman Smith, Wade Drug Co., police and health departments, \$50.10.

Council scheduled a public hearing May 7 at 7:30 p.m. on a petition requesting sanitary sewer service in Sunrise Terrace subdivision at an estimated cost of \$35,362.

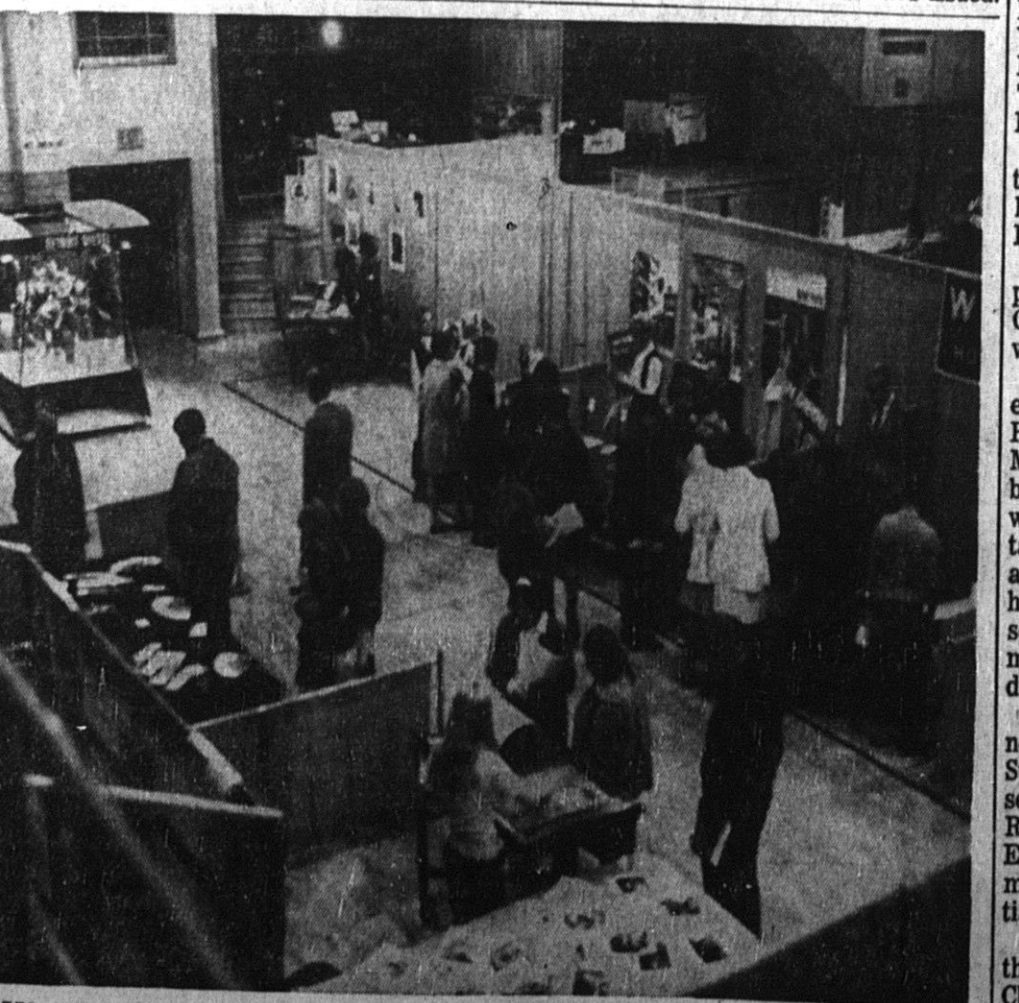
An estimated surplus for budget purposes as of June 30 is estimated at \$67,583.38.

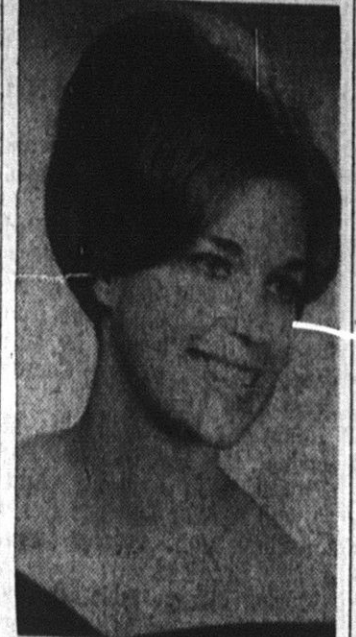

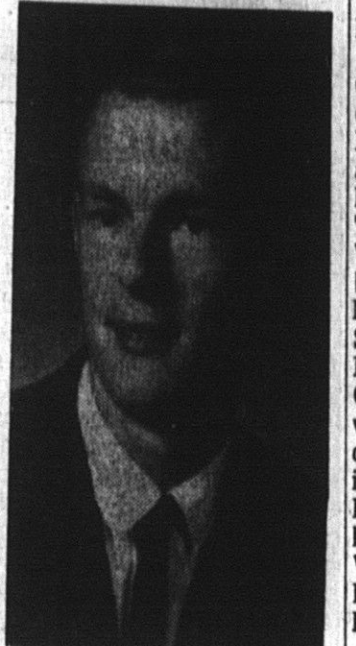

The costume committee was under the chairmanship of Nancy Witteveen and Debbie Johnson. The set was designed by chairman Judi Boonstra and her committee.

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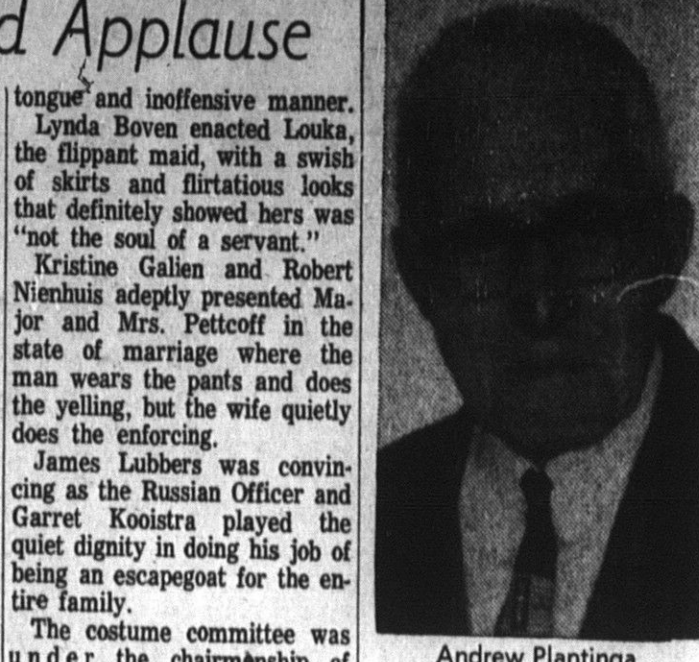

Rotarians Hear Of 'Ham' Radio Operations

A brief review of "ham" radio operations in the United States was presented for Holland Rotary Club members Thursday noon by K. C. "Casey" Retzlaff, president of Grand Transformers Inc. in Grand Haven.

"There are some 360,000 'ham' operators throughout the world," Retzlaff said, "and 270,000 of them are in the United States." They constitute a vast reservoir of important communications help in the normal affairs of life as well as in times of emergency.

A "ham" himself since 1922, Retzlaff said one of the most helpful services performed by amateur radio operators today is in uniting Americans abroad, including service men, with relatives here via telephone.

Through an electronic device known as a "phone patch," the radio operator can connect a radio transmission from outside the U. S. to our domestic telephone lines.

Amateur radio operators tend to specialize in certain types of activity, he said. There's the DX, or distance, operator who prowls the air for foreign contacts. One group exchanges millions of messages yearly, most of them meaningless, just to stay in practice for service in times of flood and other disasters.

Another group, including many physicians, deals primarily in information concerning eye banks and the people who need help of this kind. A hurricane-watch group maintains a 24-hour vigil on these tropical storms and the conditions that spawn them.

Four satellites now circling the globe are used by "hams." U. S. amateurs are responsible for two of them which were boosted into space as a piggy-back load on government rockets fired from Cape Kennedy.

Contracts for 11 new teachers were approved by the Board of Education at a monthly meeting Monday night in the library of Holland High School, postponed from last week when Supt. Donald Ihrman was absent from the city.

Hired as specialists in Holland's special education department are Mrs. Janet Goodwin, who will receive a B. S. degree from Western Michigan University in 1969 (no experience); Shirley Doerschner, holding B. S. and M. S. degrees from Northern Illinois State University with 20 years of experience in Chicago public schools, and Mrs. Patricia Knapp, with a B. S. from Spring Arbor College and an M. A. from Western Michigan University and 1½ years experience.

Listed as elementary teachers are Mrs. Cheryl Hulst who will receive a B. A. degree from Hope College in 1969 (no experience); Mrs. Judy Lake who will receive a B. A. from Western Michigan University in 1969 (one year's experience); Jack Lowe with a B. S. degree from Lincoln Memorial University and M. A. degrees from George Peabody College and the University of Detroit, 11 years classroom teaching and three years as elementary principal in Detroit area.

Other elementary teachers will be Mrs. Esther McFarland, B. A. from Marion College and M. A. from Ball State University, four years' experience; Gwendolyn Noteboom, B.S. Northwestern College in 1969 (no experience), and Mrs. Elizabeth Perkins, B. S. from Queens University with six years' experience.

Mrs. Deanna Hensley, with a B. S. degree from Western Michigan University, no experience, will teach home economics in Junior High School.

The only new position will be one for the linguistically handicapped to be taught by Frederick Schutmaat who will receive a B. A. degree from Hope College in 1969 (no experience). Schutmaat is a son of South American missionaries, and will teach the linguistically handicapped on the junior high level since several are unable to speak or write English. He may teach some children on the elementary level.

In other business, Supt. Ihrman presented a letter, a report on a study on adult evening courses in Ottawa, Allegan and Barry, aimed at an overall plan to avoid duplication in offerings.

He also submitted a letter from the Grandville High School stating it plans to leave the Valley Coast Conference after present commitments are fulfilled. There was some comment that East Grand Rapids also expects to leave the conference.

The board approved two changes in history texts on recommendation of the curriculum committee headed by Charles Bradford. The eighth grade history will take the student to 1865 and the 11th grade class will follow American history after 1865. Another change eliminates commercial art as a course in the art department and adding in-depth study in sculpture, graphics (print making) and photography. No firm course of study is being proposed and the calibre of the class will determine whether instruction will begin with pota- to prints or lino prints.

Presented as information, John Keuning of the personnel committee stated Carl E. Todd has accepted a position with the new West Shore Community College of Mason and Manistee counties as a machine tool technician and requested a year's leave of absence. Keuning said the board expresses appreciation for Todd's 15 years of service and should he desire to return after a year he will be reemployed if a vacancy for which he qualifies exists.

President James O. Lamb said representatives of the board and the Holland Education Association have held one meeting on negotiations for the 1969-70 contracts and have set up a series of further meetings starting April 28.

The board approved reorganization of the present Holland Heights and Apple Ave. elementary schools into one attendance area and approved a nongraded program for the first three grades. The Apple Ave. school has three teachers and the Heights school eight teachers. Bus service will be provided to those students sent to the school outside their area. The program is proposed to provide better education for the children in the area, it was emphasized.

Results of a special study on special education in Holland, Zeeland and West Ottawa districts as conducted by Dr. Heidema, formerly with the University of Michigan. Although no specific recommendations were considered, the board authorized Supt. Ihrman to work with other superintendents to implement improved services as developments may indicate.
