Gort and Van Haisma were not reported injured. Deputies cited Van Haisma for failure to maintain an assured clear distance.

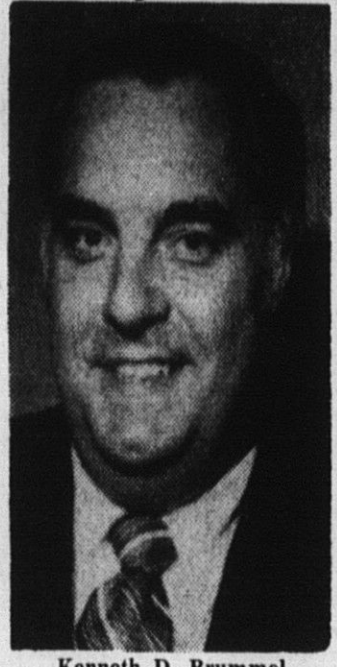
Brummel To Head Schools At Westport

Civic Liquor Ban Upheld By Council

Councilmen approved a resolution calling for stricter enforcement of the ban on liquor at the Civic Center at the regular council meeting Wednesday night in City Hall.

It was pointed out that liquor is illegal at the Civic Center by both city ordinance and state law and that prior attempts to control the problem have been largely ignored. Council members decided that notification of the law will be made explicit in booking contracts and that some kind of penalty, perhaps future denial of use of the premises, will be made to groups in violation of the ordinance. It was also pointed out that both the sponsoring group and any individuals causing damage to the building may be held responsible.

City Clerk D. W. Schipper announced the gift of an electric water cooler to Holland Hospital from the Housekeeping Guild, valued at \$261.60 and gifts to the library of a film, "Holland Tulip Festival," from the Automobile Club of Michigan; a book, "Europe with Pictures," from Mr. and Mrs. Floyd Hartsock in memory of Mrs. Johanna Lampen; and a book, "The Baker Book," from Ed Brolin of Baker Furniture. The gifts were accepted with thanks.

Certifications from Mayor L. W. Lamb, Lamb, Inc., for engineering and fire departments for \$274.11 and Councilman Morris Peerbolt, Peerbolts, Inc., for air conditioning in council chambers, \$3,381, were confirmed.

Oaths of office were filed for Kenneth Zuerink, Hospital Board; Ciro Cadena, Library Board; Anthony Bouman, Panel of Space Heating Examiners; and Donald Ithman, Mary Gaitan, F. Sheldon Wettack and Harvey M. Laman, Human Relations Commission.

Council also considered a petition regarding the clean up of property located at 94 East Ninth St. and owned by Charles Large of 26 James St., and announced that the property owner is being given time to make arrangements with the housing inspector and to remedy possible zoning violations before a city action is taken.

Among other petitions considered was one from Holland Community Theatre, Inc., seeking funds from the city so that the group will be able to receive the lower rental rate for use of municipal facilities for its plays. The request was referred to City Manager William Bopf.

Bopf was directed to submit necessary reports following a petition from citizens requesting water service in Dartmouth Ave., from Harvard Dr. to Paw Paw Dr. The resolution was adopted.

Councilmen considered several letters including one from Isabelle Hoving of Boulder, Colo., in regard to property owned by her which is being used for street purposes on 33rd St. east of Central Ave. and in the vicinity of 33rd St. and Maple Ave. City Manager Bopf pointed out that this property has been considered public road since 1958 and he will correspond with Mrs. Hoving as to the city's action on the question.

The question of removal of a wall encroaching on city property received in a letter from Robert and Anita De Nooyer was tabled for later consideration. The delay was suggested because of the need for further study to determine the adverse effects possible by erosion with the removal of the wall.

A letter from William Vogelzang, 879 Central Ave., requested the council to consider the possibility of entering into a culvert agreement with respect to the enclosing of an open drainage ditch 100 feet from the north lot line of the Vogelzang property was referred to the City Manager.

Vogelzang pointed out that the drainage ditch floods each spring.

City Manager Bopf will take under study a request from C. T. Vermuren, 1351 Bay View Ave., for permission to add a capped Y - sewer pipe to a proposed sanitary sewer to provide service to a home he intends to build on lots 33 and 34 on Shoshone Walk.

A letter from the Holland-Zeeland Family YMCA stating that, due to its present financial position, it will be unable to assume the cost of using the Civic Center facilities on a weekly basis as was planned earlier. The YMCA does not wish to be held responsible for the rental of the center which has been reserved on a weekly basis beginning July 1 and suggested that the city provide all or part of the facilities of the center without cost. The request was referred to Bopf who will discuss the question with the YMCA.

Jerry Phillips, 984 South

Shore Dr., expressed some dissatisfaction with the proposed extension of Grand Ridge Ct. with a cul de sac across the BPW right of way into private property owned by Harrison Gregg off Lugers Rd. on grounds that it could present a hardship for property owners in the area in that landscaping, etc., may be destroyed. He added that the area is not suitable for the erection of three houses allegedly proposed by the owner and pointed out that the ground's inability to absorb the increased effluent would present the need for more sanitary sewer.

On the same subject, Simon Sybesma, 980 South Shore Dr., raised the question of determination of grade level for the area and the control of run-off water onto neighborhood properties.

Claims against the city from Mrs. Catherine Szafranski of Joliet, Ill., Fred Slikker, 685 Butternut Dr., and Jean De Jonge of Zealand were referred to the city's insurance carrier.

A recommendation for resurfacing three major streets, 24th St., Ottawa Ave. and 48th St., as well as 16 local streets within limitations of the current budget of \$112,000 set forth within the major and local streets fund budgets was approved, and Bopf recommended the acceptance of the low bid of \$73,290.84 of West Shore Construction Co. for the approximately five miles of resurfacing. The low bid of Segers Brothers of The Netherlands for \$7,042.50 on 135,000 tulips bulbs for the Park Department and 32,500 tulip bulbs, 2,000 hyacinths and 500 daffodils for Windmill Island was accepted.

City Engineer Harold Derks recommended acceptance of a bid of Miller Equipment Co. of \$2,344.21 for box spreader for the Street Department. The low bid of \$2,150 by Telford and Doolen, Inc., was rejected because it does not meet specifications in terms of engine location.

The second lowest bid from Owens Body Co. was also rejected because the city presently has a box spreader identical to that produced by the Miller company and parts inventory would be less to support two of the same model. The accepted model also has various features which are superior to those of the Owens company. The recommendation was accepted.

Council approved a request for funds to raise and remove rubble of two houses acquired by the city in the Ninth St. alley area. The expenditure will be taken from the Capital Improvement Fund.

Council concurred with a recommendation from City Manager Bopf as to more judicious use of warning signs bearing the legend Slow-Children Playing. Bopf recommended that such signs be restricted to official playground and school areas.

Following study of a request from J. G. Van Valkenburgh for sanitary sewer service to a laundrymat outside the city, it was recommended that the petitioner contact township authorities and request that immediate studies be initiated to investigate the extension of sanitary sewer to those desiring such service on North River Ave. and in a reasonable sanitary sewer district.

A recommendation that an insurance appraisal of the city's properties be made by E. C. Deyo Associates in the amount of \$1,350 was adopted and the council also approved retention of Dickinson, Wright, McKean and Cudlip to serve as bond counsel through the processing and sale of special assessment bonds for five sanitary sewer projects and paving project.

The fire Department was authorized to expend \$425 for the purchase of additional large, soft suction hose and funds will be transferred from the Contingency Fund to the Fire Department Fund.

The City Auditor's report listed utility bills which have remained unpaid for three months or more as of June 30 and it was resolved that notice should be given that such overdue bills not paid by July 31, 1971, will be assessed upon the city's tax roll against the premises to which the services were supplied or furnished. The auditor's report also listed approval by the Municipal Finance Commission of an application for the issuance of \$219,000 in Public Improvements Special Assessment Bonds. Aug. 4 was set as the bond sale date.

It was announced that the revised preliminary parking study is ready for public review and a discussion of the study was slated July 14 at 7 p.m. in the Hotel Warm Friend. The study should be of special interest to owners and tenants in the central business district in the area from Columbia to Pine Aves. between Seventh and Ninth Sts.

Council referred to City Manager Bopf the problem of individuals using the facilities at Kollen Park boat dock for docking of private crafts.

Mayor Lamb presided at a meeting which lasted 2½ hours. The invocation was by the Rev. David Maysick of the Berean Bible Church.

Council Decides Various Zoning, Traffic Questions

In action on various zoning questions Wednesday night, City Council adopted a motion to amend the zoning ordinance to establish minimum standards of access to public right-of-way for parcels of land within the city.

Following discussion and questions from Dr. Donald Endean, 109 West 37th St., council adopted an assessment roll on the paving of 37th St. from 504 feet west of Pine Ave. to 350 feet east of Washington Ave. terminating in a cul de sac.

Parking provisions recommended by City Manager William Bopf and tabled at the last regular meeting were accepted. They include the prohibition of parking on the south side of 16th St. between River and Central Aves.; prohibition of parking for a distance of 100 feet west of the C and O Railroad tracks on the north side of 11th St. and elimination of the first parking space east of 200 East 12th St.

Trucking Co. Builds New Terminal

An \$800,000 building permit for Holland Motor Express to erect an office building, 106 by 102 feet, plus a warehouse and terminal at 750 East 40th St. in Holland's south side industrial park, accounted for nearly all of the building activity in Holland last week.

The amendments will become effective upon publication of council proceedings and upon posting of the areas affected with appropriate signs.

Included are various parking limitations in front of Central Avenue Christian Reformed Church, moving back of the no parking area on 32nd St. west of Washington Ave., removal of four parking spaces on Sixth St. east of Central Ave., and installation of a yield sign on the northeast corner of Harrison Ave. and 14th St.

An application from T. G. Hudson for the rezoning of a parcel of 4.6 acres located near 1115 South Lincoln Ave. from agricultural to highway commercial was referred to the planning commission for a recommendation to the council.

A planning commission report was presented submitting an ordinance to rezone 96.2 acres of land south of 48th St. and east of the C and O Railroad tracks from agricultural to industrial was requested by the Holland Economic Development Corporation. A public hearing on the question is set for Aug. 4 at 7:30 p.m. in council chambers.

Jenison Firm Is Apparent Low Bidder

GRAND HAVEN — Eleven bids on the proposed Ottawa Area Center for Trainable and Severely Mentally Handicapped persons were opened by the Area Intermediate Board of Education at the Community Center here Thursday and the apparent low bidder was Lenger Construction of Jenison.

The low bid was \$560,748 and the high bid was by Pioneer Construction of Grand Rapids at \$596,850. The bids will be tabulated and the contract may be awarded at the next board meeting July 15.

The county voted to erect the facility in June last year and the building, to be erected in Allendale township, will contain 26,000 square feet. Vander Meiden and Koteles of Grand Haven are the architects.

Part of the cost will be met by county taxes and part by federal funds under the facilities for mentally retarded act. A grant of \$75,000 from federal funds has been approved and Thursday it was learned that this amount may be increased, up to \$300,000.

Supt. Roger Troupe recently was instructed by the board to take steps to attempt to increase the size of the federal grant. Revised figures indicate an increase in costs over January of this year, due primarily to a wage determination scale set by the U. S. government on the trainable center.

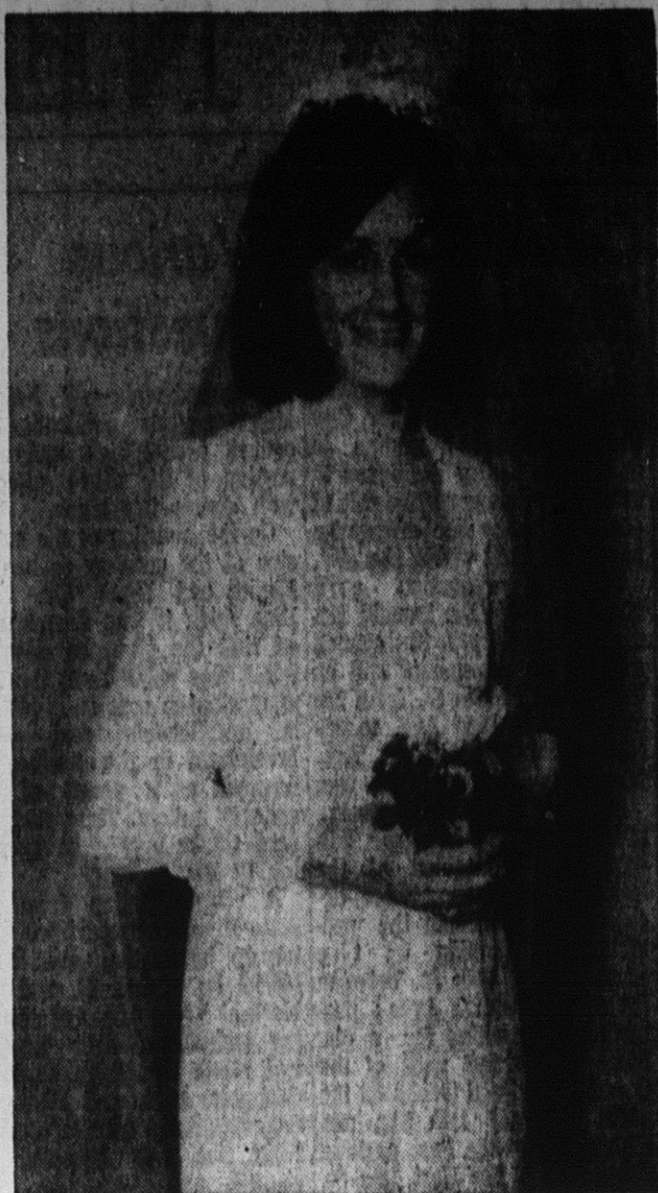

Coast Guard Seaman Raymond E. Lindemann, 20, of Cornwells Hts., Pa., assigned to the Holland unit, has been awarded the Coast Guard Unit Commendation Ribbon for exceptionally meritorious service in saving a disabled fishing vessel off the coast of Alaska.

Lindemann was a member of the crew of the USCG Confidence engaged in the rescue of the fishing vessel Sea Ermine and her four-man crew June 8, 1969 off the rocky coast of Marmot Island, Alaska. He handled towing lines.

Citations from C. R. Bender, Admiral of the U.S. Coast Guard, and W. A. Jenkins, Rear Admiral, U.S. Coast Guard, Ninth District at Cleveland, were presented to Lindemann by Chief Wilbur McVay of the Holland Coast Guard.

The citations said the Sea

Ermine was located in a small bight with 300 yards of navigable water inside surrounding shoal areas and was dragging an anchor farther into the bight.

Both vessels pitched heavily and produced a sweeping cold spray which broke against the bow and stern of the Confidence, aggravating already limited visibility to 1½ miles.

The Confidence lost 40 percent of her power from engineering casualties suffered during heavy rolling enroute to the scene.

The citation said the rescue operations required the "utmost in skill and teamwork on the part of all hands, both individually and collectively, to hold position through the use of anchor and engines and to successfully pass a towing line to the Sea Ermine and assist the disabled vessel and her crew to safety."

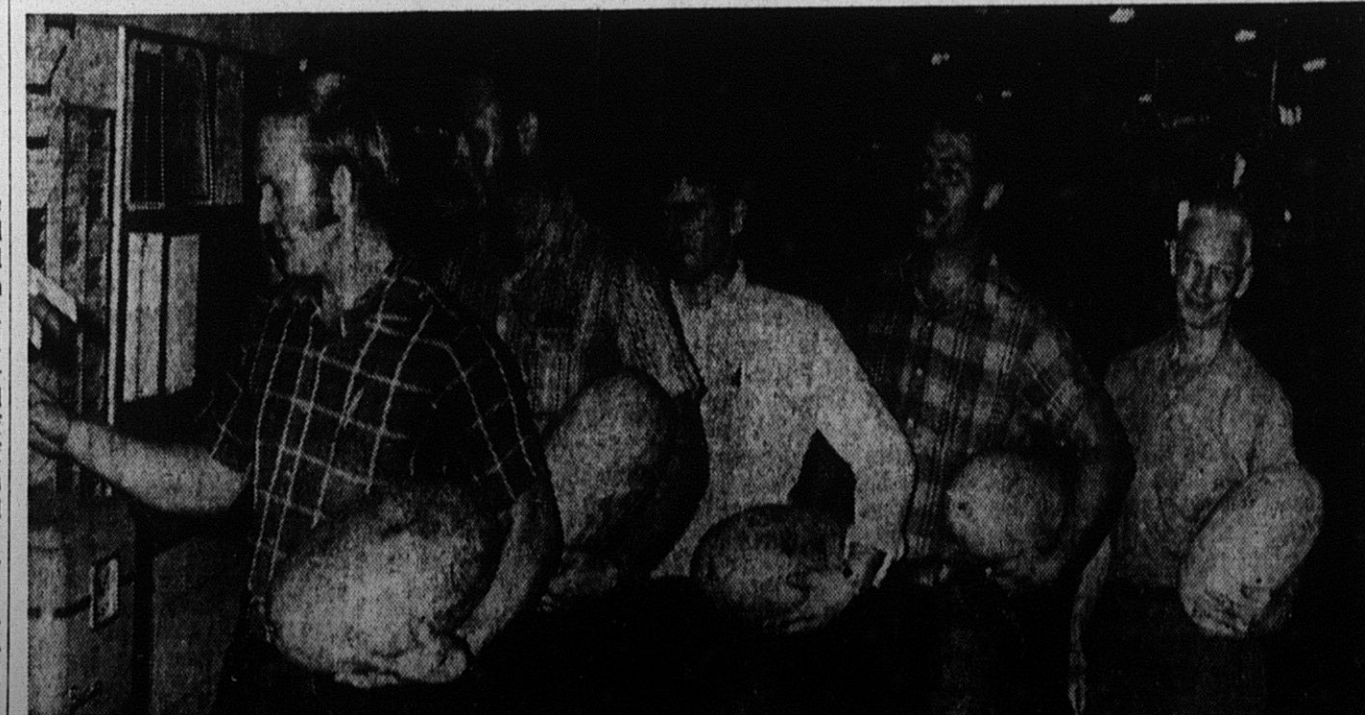

Population Growth Linked to Water

The growing need in Holland Township for a plentiful and safe water supply is a reflection of the growth of the township, particularly in the past 20 years.

Population growth figures tabulated in the Prein and Newhof engineering report submitted to township officials show that even in the depression years, the area has grown steadily. The township has followed the postwar population boom, also, going from 7,674 in 1950 to 10,919 in the latest census.

On that basis, Prein and Newhof projected future population growth to 14,000 in 1980 and 18,000 in 1990.

With the exception of a few customers served by the City of Holland, all of the water supplies in the township are private wells. While some of these private water supplies are satisfactory, many others have presented problems, both in quantity and quality of water produced.

Common problems with wells are related to high quantities of iron or chlorides and low capacities due to fine sand and clay, the report said.

A growing problem has been the contamination of private wells by detergents, particularly in the vicinity of Riley St. and 136th Ave. and in the Pine Creek area, on the west side of Butternut Dr., between Riley and James St. Bacteriological contamination has also been noted in some wells, according to the report.

These factors, plus the projected growth of the area, make a public water supply a growing necessity which may, because of health laws, become mandatory.

According to a brochure prepared by Holland Township Citizens for Water, (a group headed by J. H. Johnson, chairman which includes Nelson Dyke, Marion Hoeve, Ted Van Huis, Larry Cobble and Ronald Robinson) a substantial reduction in fire insurance rate would follow the installation of a public water system with fire hydrants necessary for adequate supplies in case of fire.

At the present time, according to the brochure, 11 industries in the township are buying water from the City of Holland at twice the proposed township rate.

Holland Township residents will vote on July 13 on a proposed water system to be financed by a two-mill levy on all township property. The millage would pay only for the building

of a water storage tank, a metering station and installation of eight miles of water mains from the City of Wyoming's Lake Michigan pipeline which runs along New Holland St. at the township's north border.

Cost of hookups to the mains would be charged directly to those choosing to use the pipeline, and water rates charged would cover the cost of purchase from the City of Wyoming, plus cost of operation and maintenance of the water system.

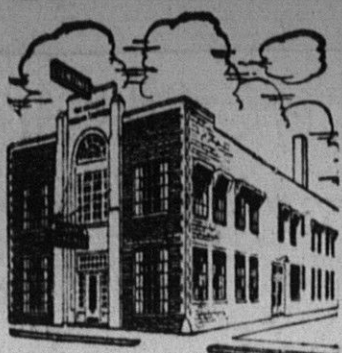
Two Men Injured At Accident Scene

Sunday School Lesson

God, the Christian, and Government
Romans 13:1-7; Judges 9:8-15
By C. P. Dame

We are living in times of dissent, demonstrations, marches and picketing, and civil disobedience. It is time to go to the Bible and learn what it teaches about the government, its authority and functions. All authority comes from God—this is a fact.

I. God established government. It is divine in origin. The new Christians in the early church wanted to know what their attitude should be to the pagan government. Paul commanded obedience. Those who disobeyed the government disobeyed God. Jesus taught this truth. The New Testament writings emphasize it. There is one exception—when the state makes demands contrary to God's will.

It is the duty of the government to curb and punish evildoers. Crime is common the world over. The courts and the government are too lenient with the criminals—this charge is often made. It is also the duty of the government to encourage good citizens who obey primarily not because of fear of punishment but on account of conscience. When the government punishes, God is at work, thus he expresses his wrath against evil-doers. Too little is said about the wrath of God in our day.

II. God holds citizens responsible. The government needs support. It serves, more so than ever, now. The list of services is getting longer and longer. Paul teaches that Christians should render to all their dues, every one meet his obligations, and to give tribute, if that is demanded, and custom, money, for the support of the government. Paul wrote in the days when Jews persecuted Christians and when the Roman government was getting suspicious of believers. Anarchy is un-Christian and rebellion except for a just cause is forbidden.

III. God wants honest and capable officials in government. The second part of the lesson text is from the Old Testament. Gideon had many sons. He refused to become a king but he had one illegitimate son, named Abimelech, who wanted to become king. He saw to it that Gideon's 70 sons were killed and he was crowned king. Jotham, one of Gideon's sons escaped. From the top of Mount Gerizim he told a parable to the people who had made Abimelech king.

The trees planned to choose a king. The olive tree and the fig tree refused the honor but the bramble bush consented. Gideon refused to become king, but the worthless Abimelech became king. The people got a useless bramble bush kind of a king. Someone said that the people get the kind of a leader they want. Do you agree? Christians should do all they can to elect honest and efficient officials in our government.

Don Bonevich brought Tevye, the dairyman, to life in the opening night performance of "Fiddler on the Roof" at the Red Barn Theatre Tuesday night. He looked the part, he acted the part and he sang the songs with true feeling.

A perfect foil for his talents was Loyse Anderson as Golde, his wife. The two made a delightful Jewish couple in the setting of the poor but religious home in Anatevka, the Russian village in the year 1906, on the eve of the revolutionary period.

The large cast used every inch of stage space for the dances which were energetically performed without making the small stage seem crowded. The original choreography by Rich Rahn added much to the rapport of the entire cast with the audience.

Norman Dean on the organ, assisted by Mary Lou Smith at the piano, seemed well blended with the soloists rather than a separate entity as so often happens in summer theatres. Dean gets all the music out of "Fiddler" that makes the songs so popular.

James Dyas molded the entire production into an evening of fine entertainment.

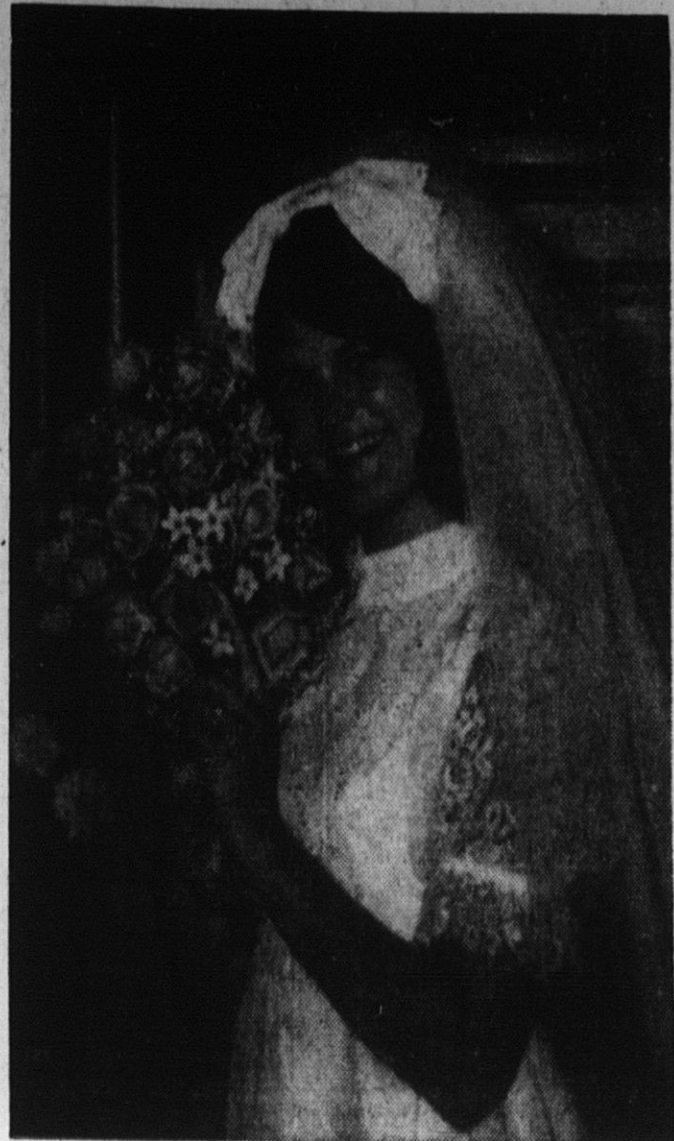

Boy Scouts Study Plan To Combine

Three Boy Scout Councils in the western side of Michigan are studying possibilities of combining. They are the Scenic Trails Council offices in Taverse City, the Timber Trails Councils whose offices are in Muskegon, and Grand Valley Council whose offices are in Grand Rapids.

A study committee consisting of officers and representatives of all three are evaluating advantages of the combination and preparing a complete factual study of the move.

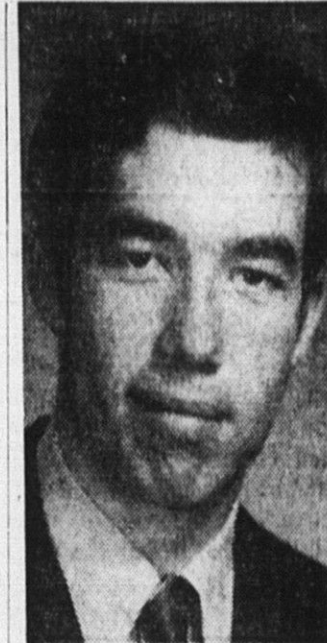
The committee met last week in Cadillac and agreed unanimously to recommend to the Executive Boards of all Councils to proceed with the consolidation through meetings of the entire Council membership to be held this fall.

Members of the committee are: Charles Jolitz, Detroit Member of Region VII Executive Committee; Ted Johnson, Fremont, President of the Timber Trails Council; Joe Horness, Muskegon; James Brian, Frankfort, President of the Scenic Trails Council; Robert Umbarger, Cheboygan; Frank Purvis, Traverse City; Gerald Faloan, Cadillac; Jack Courtney, Manistee; David Hoogerhyde, Grand Rapids, President of the Grand Valley Council; Spencer Cornell, Belding; James Townsend, Holland. They are being assisted by Scout executives, Joe Groszek, Traverse City; Charles Foreman, Muskegon; William Kephart, Grand Rapids; Frank Dix, Assistant Regional Scout executive; Arnold R. Schenk, Deputy Regional Scout executive, both of Oak Brook, Illinois.

The new Council would have 127,000 boys of Scout age available and 30,000 boy members. There would be a total of 14 council-owned campsites, including three major summer camps offering a variety of summer camping experiences to Scout Troops in each Council. The total staff of 27 men would continue to serve their present districts, but specialists in finance, camping, activities, and Exploring could supplement the present work of staffs of the three Councils.

The new Council will cover 25 counties and extend from Allegan to the Straits of Mackinac. One central office will be planned and there is provision for field offices in at least two locations.

The slick moving Etterbeek won the 14-and-under crown the past two seasons and won the 12-and-under title in 1968.

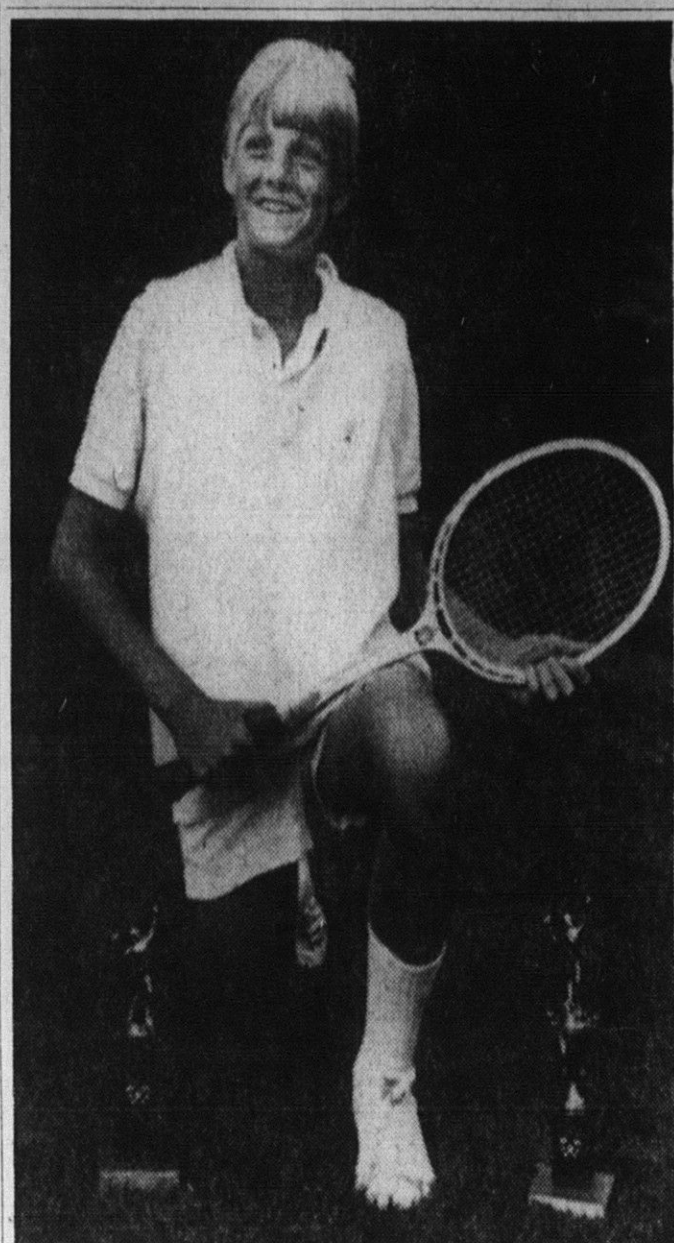

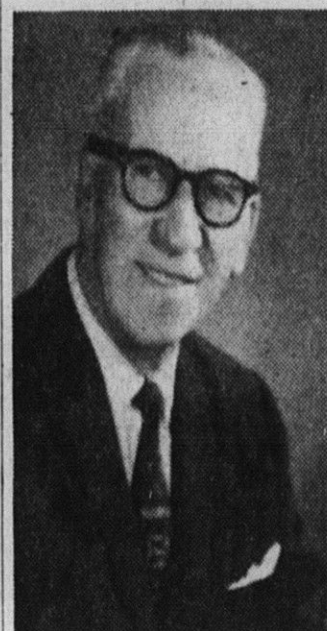

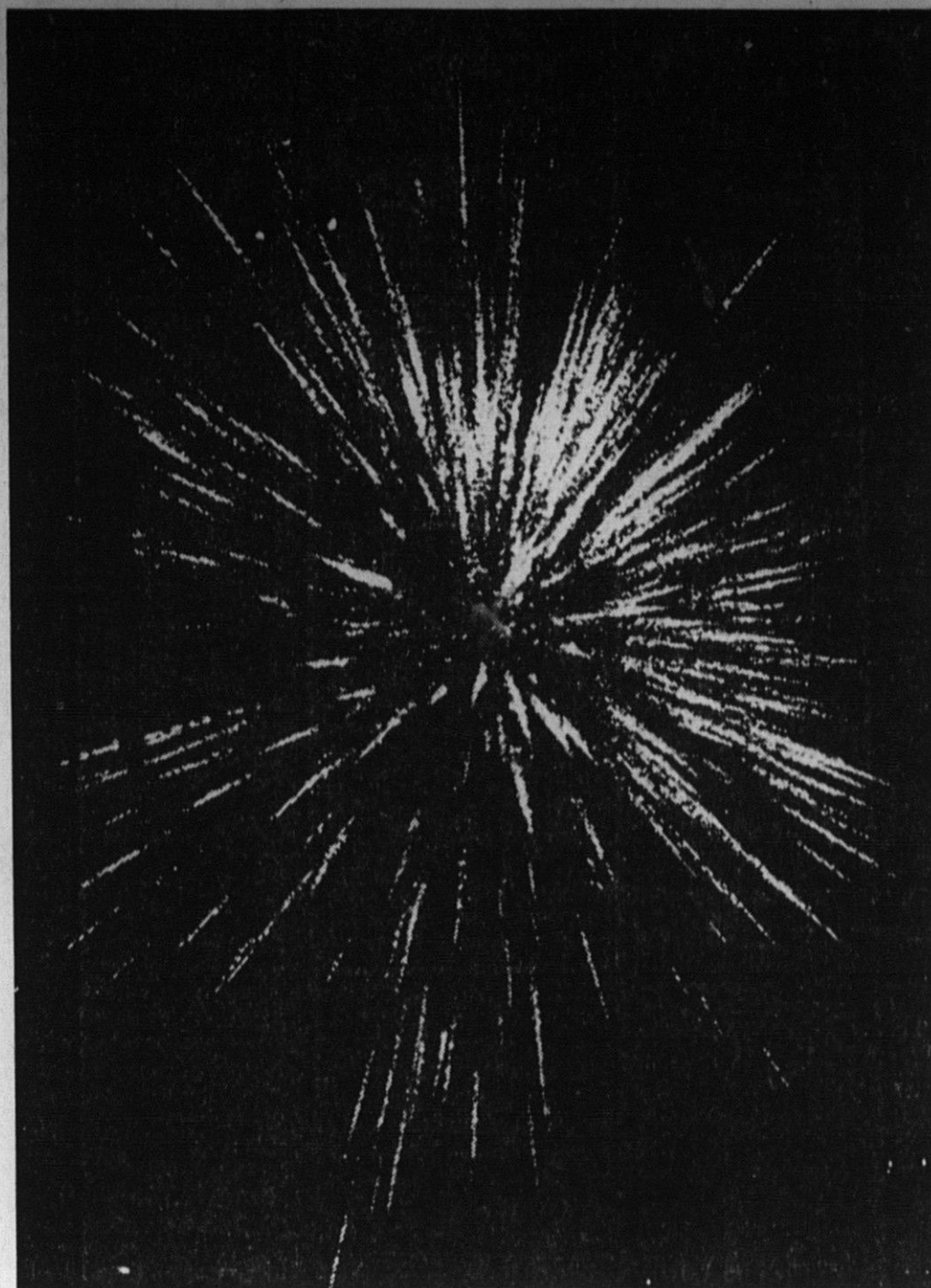

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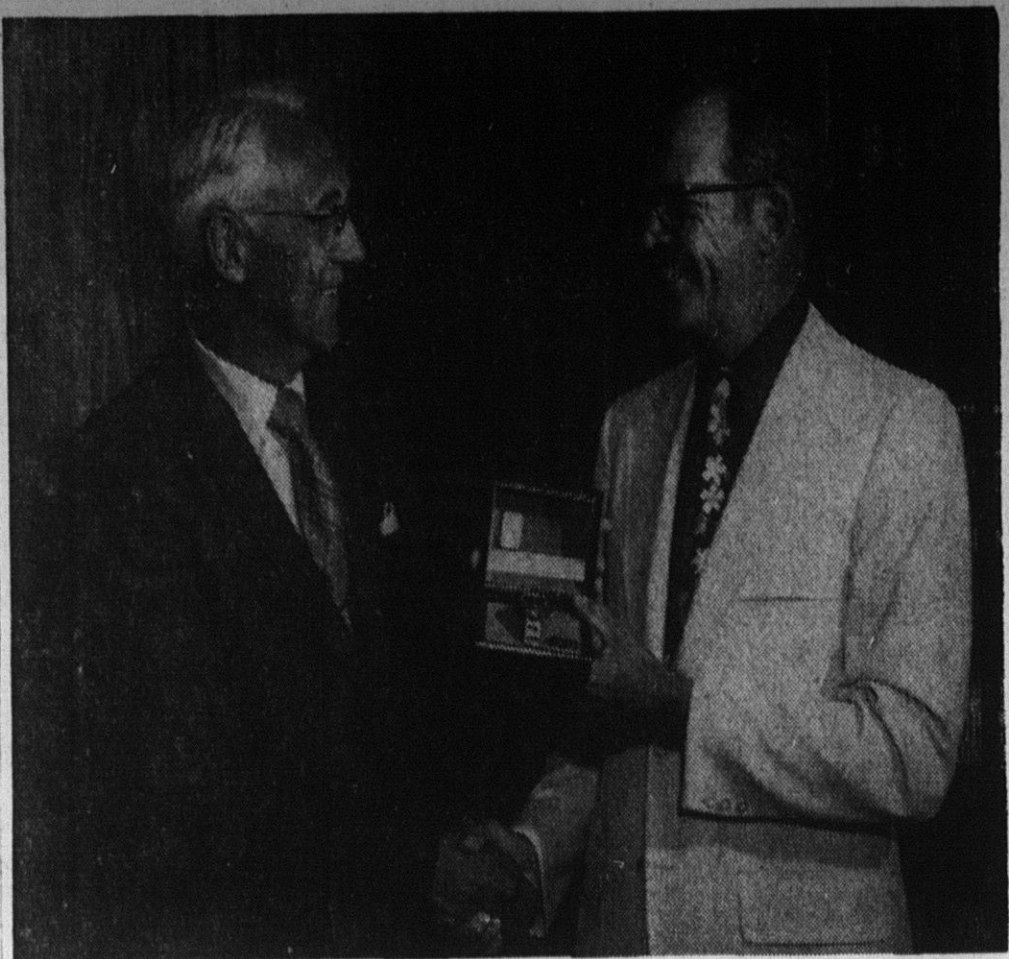

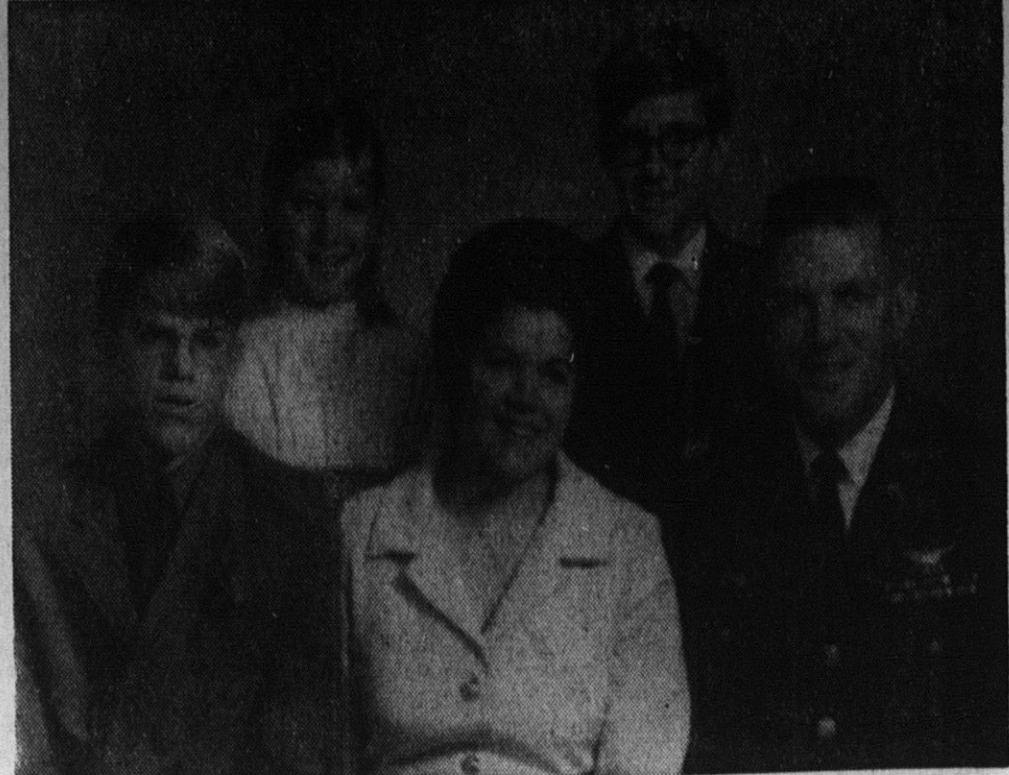
