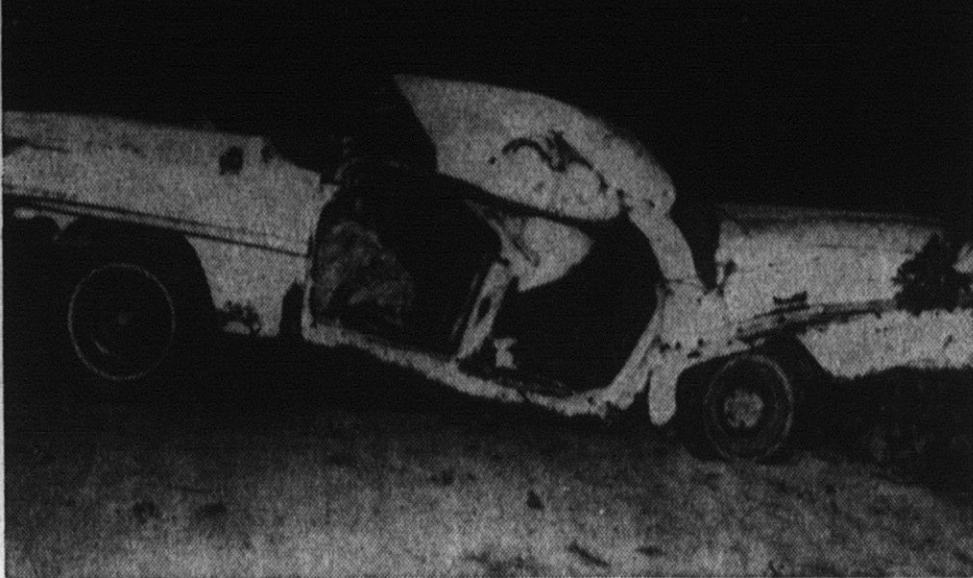

Involves As Many As 300 Persons

Police Units End Brawl at Park

Police from six departments helped disperse a melee at Holland State Park Monday night that involved as many as 300 persons, mostly young people, in the Lake Macatawa camping area.

At least three persons were arrested for possession of marijuana and about 60 others for trespassing.

State Park officials said the incident allegedly began after four motorcyclists from a Jackson gang known as "The Vagrants" entered the Lake Macatawa campsite at 9:48 p.m. while park guards were preparing for the 10 p.m. closing.

Assistant Park manager Douglas Carter said the cyclists rode through the park area and after a conservation officer stopped a cyclist, one of the officers was jumped by a girl cyclist. No injuries were reported.

Park Manager Don Ike said the cyclists went "right past the guard and a patrol car circulated telling non-campers to leave the park."

After leading the rangers on a chase through the Lake Macatawa camping area one of the rangers finally got out of his patrol car, chased a cyclist on foot and caught up with him. It was then the girl jumped on the ranger's back.

Carter said other campers began gathering and conservation officers called for police help.

Ottawa County sheriff's deputies responded as did Holland and Zeeland police and State Police from Grand Haven, South Haven and Rockford.

Carter said about 300 persons had gathered when police arrived and officers began dispersing the crowd. He said order was restored by about midnight.

Worst Crash Of Holiday In Michigan

ALLEGAN — Five persons, among 11 members of two families returning from a July 4th outing in Allegan County, were killed when their 1962 model car careened into trees along a dirt road seven miles west of here Tuesday at 6:44 p.m.

The crash was the worst in the state during the 102-hour holiday weekend and boosted the United Press International toll to 36. Michigan was tied with New York for the third highest in the nation's traffic toll.

Allegan county deputies said the accident occurred along 48th St. near 116th Ave. near the Ely Lake campgrounds in Clyde township. Killed in the crash were the driver, Ray Clemens, 34, of Grand Junction, and passengers, Douglas Wayne Clemens, 3; Angela Clemens, 3 months and Charles John Ebenstein, 9, and Kathy Lou Ebenstein, 8, both of rural Allegan.

Injured and admitted to Allegan General Hospital were Bruce Wayne Ebenstein, 13 and Janice Lynn Clemens, 22. Both were listed in "fair" condition. Treated in the Hospital and discharged today was Janis Ebenstein, 39.

Admitted to Borgess hospital in Kalamazoo where their conditions today were listed as "poor" were Judy Ann Ebenstein, 15, and Ray Clemens Jr., 6.

Listed in "fair" condition in Bronson Hospital in Kalamazoo was Wendy Lynn Ebenstein, 12.

Deputies said it appeared the car had been traveling at a high rate of speed and went out of control. The car hit a tree, ripping off the doors on the driver's side, and then rolled over, spilling some of the occupants out. The driver of the car was pinned beneath the overturned auto.

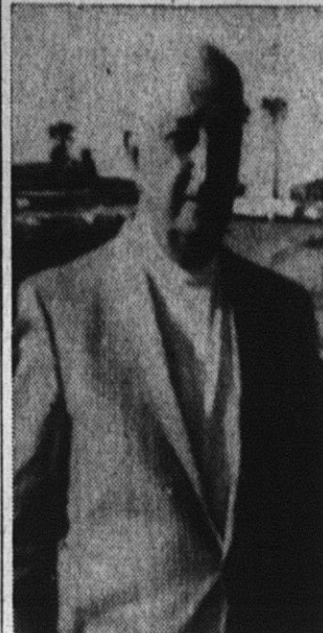

James DePree Rites Set Thursday

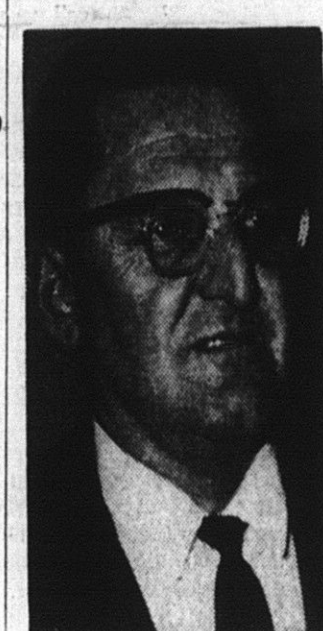

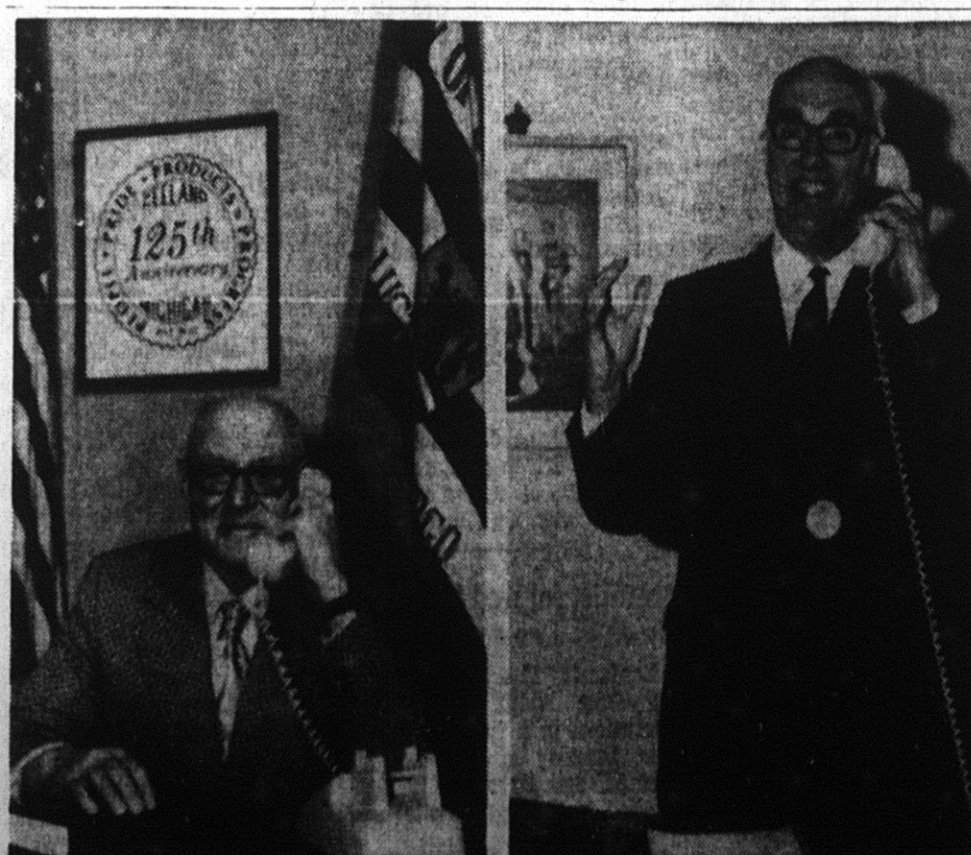

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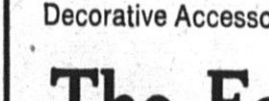

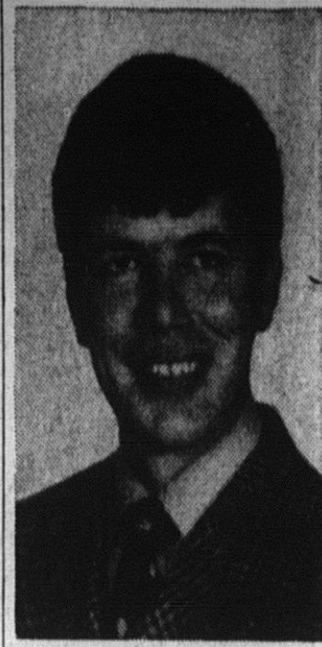
Scenery and lighting designed by Richard Guenther with 20 scene changes kept the stage crew busy.

Trickle Irrigation Shown At Area Blueberry Farms

More than 75 blueberry growers and industry commercial representatives participated in a tour of three blueberry farms in the Holland area to observe the installation and operation of trickle irrigation.

Trickle irrigation is a new concept of applying water. It features low investment and operation costs utilizing low volume of water, low labor requirements and is being adapted to most fruit crops.

Larry Stebbins, Ottawa County Extension Director chaired the tour with the assistance of Dick Thompson, Consumers Power Rural Service Consultant, and several equipment dealers who supply trickle irrigation equipment, plus the Michigan Blueberry Growers Association.

The tour visited Allen DeVries Blueberry Farm, located on Barry St., where they observed the installation of the trickle irrigation system on three acres of young bearing blueberries. Also featured was the adaptation of the installation for orchard heating.

Dr. Al Kenworthy of M.S.U., Horticultural Specialist, and Frank Klackie, District Horticultural Agent for West Central Michigan, discussed techniques of installation and operation.

The tour proceeded to Don Van Lente's Farm, located on Quincy. Ten acres of mature bushes are irrigated here with the trickle irrigation system. The system was installed last fall but was utilized for the first time this spring. The system was in operation so the tour participants could observe the rate of water flow.

The tour proceeded on to the Boot Hoot Blueberry Farm man-

aged by Richard Boyd, located on the corner of 152nd and Ransom. Three different irrigation systems were featured on this farm. Dick Thompson, Consumers Power, pointed out the many adaptations of a new electric motor for general farm operations.

The final stop was three acres of young mature blueberry bushes where trickle irrigation has been installed in cooperation with Dr. Kenworthy, Horticulture Department. Here Dr. Kenworthy and his graduate assistants have established plots whereby various rate of water are applied all the way from two gallons per bush to one gallon to every other bush.

Various types of equipment are being utilized including twin wall, plus the dew system. Also unique is the fact that 1½ horse power pump will be able to supply water to ten acres of blueberries utilizing electric solenoid valves, time clocks and a good job of engineering.

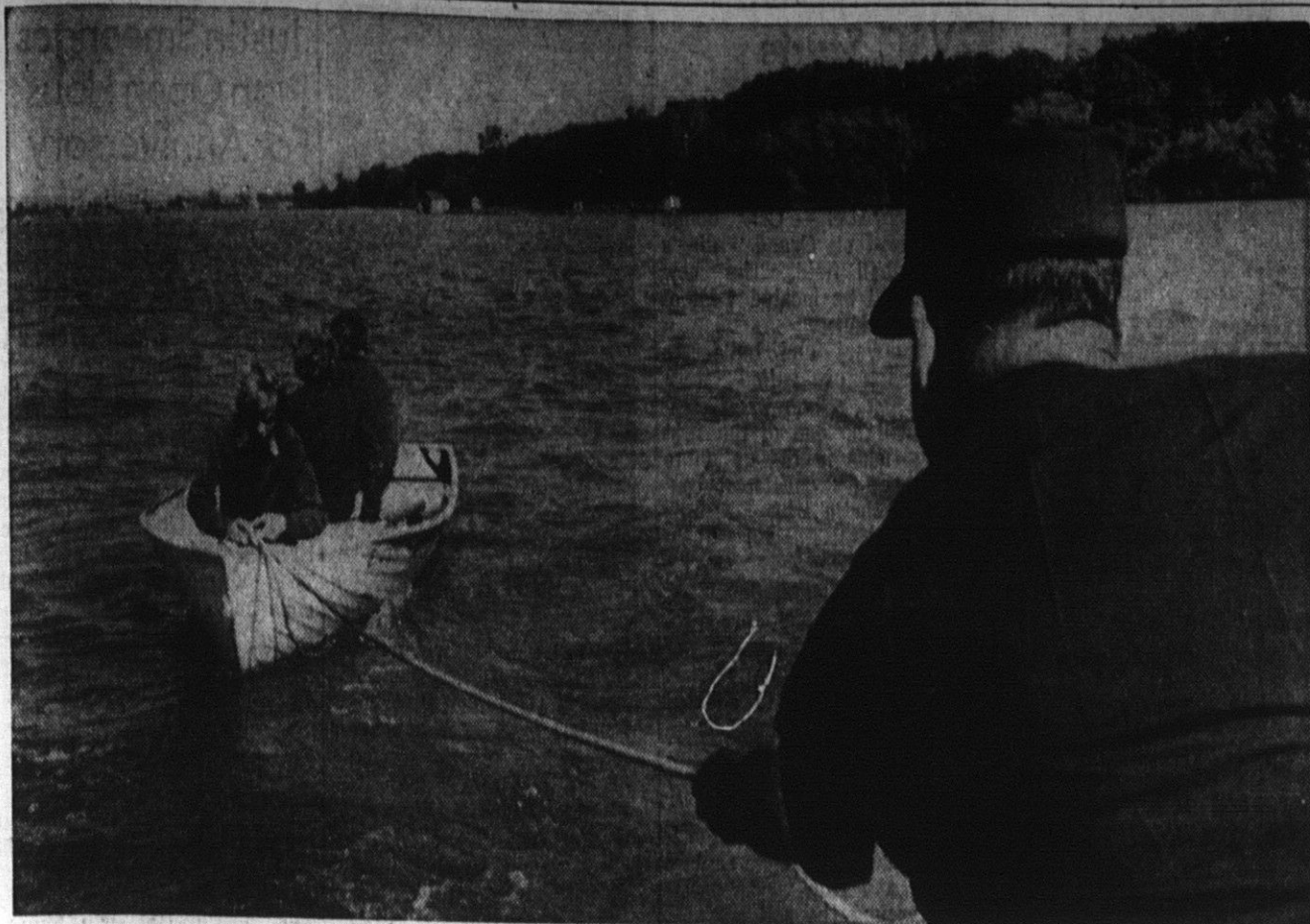

Deputies Keep Pace With Added Boating Activity

The popularity of boating has increased tremendously over the past few years and today there are an estimated 12,000 motorboats operating on Ottawa County waters.

With such an increase in boating activity there arises an evergrowing problem of patrolling the county's lakes and rivers. The Marine Division of

the Ottawa County Sheriff's Department is answering this need, trying to insure each individual's rights whether it be swimming, boating, skiing or fishing.

Specially trained marine deputies operating in clearly marked patrol boats investigate boating complaints and accidents, patrol regattas, render assistance when necessary and inspect watercraft to insure that they are equipped in accordance with state laws.

Last year deputies inspected 1,574 boats, 1,189 boats passed the inspection but 385 boats failed to meet the requirements.

Upon inspection deputies carefully inspect life saving devices, fire extinguishers, registrations, state boat plates, lights and other equipment requirements. When inspection is complete and all requirements are satisfactory, the boat is presented a safety inspection sticker.

While on patrol deputies watch for boats without inspection stickers, careless boat operators, reckless skiing practices, littering, boats exceeding slow-no-wake zones and boats operating in restricted areas.

During 1971 the marine division investigated 183 complaints, 17 accidents, removed 67 obstructions from the water and assisted 416 boaters with fuel or mechanical problems while advising others on impending foul weather.

Sheriff Bernard Grysen has stated that if we are to prevent the needless loss of life and property the increasing traffic on our waterways must be accompanied by a selective enforcement program capable of

providing the necessary service.

The principle agent of boating accidents last year was a careless or unthinking boat operator. The most common error was improper loading of small boats and other mistakes that can easily be avoided by the boater who understands his boat and its operation.

Sergeant Edgar Hall heads the Marine Division which operates from both Holland and Grand Haven. The division consists of eight men and five boats.

June 1972 Tops In Avery Baker Family Memory

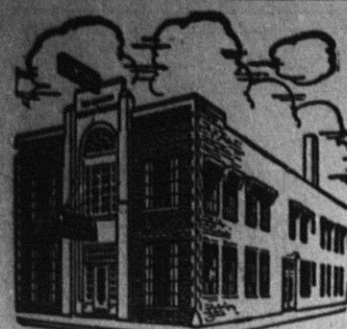
The month of June 1972 will be a memorable one for the Avery Bakers, of 36 West 18th St.

Sunday School Lesson

Sunday, July 9
Finding God's Guidance
1 Kings 19:9-18

It is reported that some Protestant preachers and Roman Catholic priests are frustrated and discouraged. In times past, spiritual leaders faced problems and became downhearted and wanted to quit. This lesson tells about a great preacher whom God redirected and put back to work. God still guides His workers.

I. Even the strong become discouraged. Elijah suddenly appeared upon the scene and told that no rain would come until he would say so. Then, by God's direction, he went to the brook Cherith, drank from its waters and was fed by the ravens. God then sent him to Zapharath where a widow took care of him. Then God told him to show himself to King Ahab.

The contest on Mt. Carmel followed and the people shouted, "The Lord, He is God; the Lord, He is God." The prophets of Baal were killed and it seemed that the battle for God was won. Wicked Jezebel, upon hearing what had happened to her prophets, threatened Elijah who ran off, finally reaching Mt. Horeb, that is Mt. Sinai, where he, despondent and emotionally weakened, was ready to give up.

In a cave at Mt. Sinai God asked the prophet, "What are you doing here Elijah?" Surely there was nothing for him to do in the wilderness. Elijah told God about his zeal, his loneliness and discouragement. Since the discouragement of Elijah, many Christian workers have felt as he did.

II. God teaches the discouraged. God told the prophet to stand upon the mount before the Lord. The Lord passed by. An earthquake followed, but the Lord was not in the earthquake, but in "a still small voice"—a fact which Elijah had to learn. Some noise-makers today need to learn that God is at work quietly, steadily, doing His will. It is the steady preaching of the gospel which eventually wins converts and builds churches.

III. God puts people to work. The run-away prophet got three orders and God told him things were not as bad as he thought they were for there were still 7,000 faithful in the land. Note the work he was told to do—anooint Hazael king over Syria, and anooint Jehu king over Israel and anooint Elisha to be his successor. God was providing for the future of His kingdom.

God still guides, so let us listen, hear, obey, work hard and battle for the Lord.

Fennville Brothers Held in Breakin

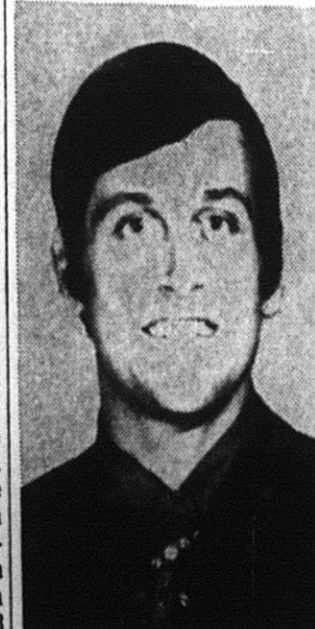

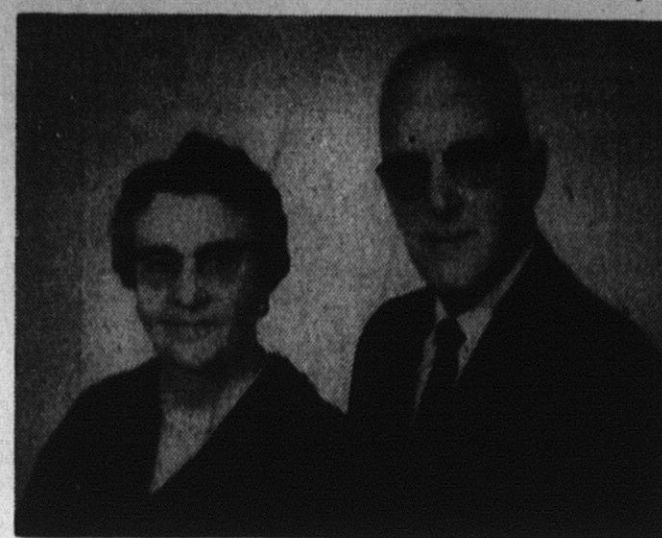
Deputies said they found a rear door of the store operated by David Anderson forced open and several items from the store were recovered outside the building.

GVSC Starts Construction For New Field

ALLEDALE — Construction has started on Grand Valley's new football field. The new facility will be located west of the Field House.

Earthmovers and bulldozers have begun excavation work for the field, which when completed will be one of the first playing fields in the nation to use a recently developed concept for athletic turf.

The concept, called "Prescription Athletic Turf" (PAT), was researched and developed by Dr. W. H. Daniel, turf specialist in the department of agronomy, Purdue University. PAT is designed to counter extreme weather conditions — wet, cold dry or hot. For example, rain is countered by the placement of suction pumps to the drainage system. The vacuum-producing pumps rapidly pull air and rain water downward through the soil surface. When not in use, a special vented field cover is placed over the playing surface. This reduces pumping, conserves heat and moisture, extends the growing season, and improves playability. The installation also includes heated cable for soil warming, which protects and extends the growth of the turf.

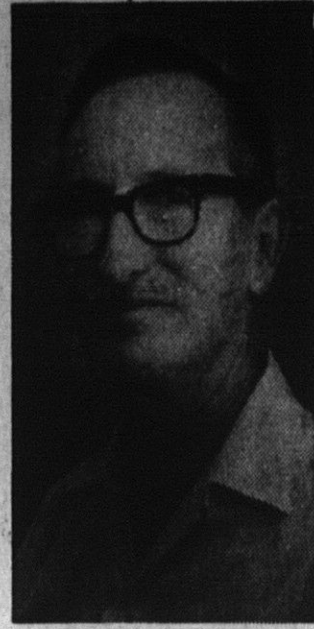
Former Resident Receives Degree, Admitted to Bar
