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Zeeland Tax Bills Are Mailed

ZEELAND — Some 2,200 Zeeland city tax statements were in the mail Wednesday, according to the Zeeland city treasurer's office.

The taxes include city and public school taxes, about 86 per cent of total 1975 taxes to be levied. County and intermediate school district taxes will be levied in December. The city tax rate has been reduced from 14 - 1/2 mills last year to 12 - 1/2 mills this year, a reduction of 2 mills. School taxes are 26 mills, the same as last year, and includes a 5.205 mill renewal approved by the voters on June 10.

Each mill is equal to \$1 in tax for each \$1,000 in state equalized valuation. Property is valued at 50 per cent of its market value. The average residential property owner in Zeeland will pay about \$20 to \$30 less tax this year than last year because of the reduction in the city tax rate.

Total taxes levied include \$520,589 in city taxes, \$1,082,826 in school taxes and \$79,909 in special assessments and miscellaneous charges, for a total tax levy of \$1,717,400. Total state equalized value of the city is \$4,647,068.

Taxes are due and payable no later than Aug. 1. Thereafter, a 2 per cent collection fee plus 1/2 per month interest is added.

Local Police Department Receives Grant

The City of Holland has been granted monies from the office of Criminal Justice programs for the prevention and reduction of crimes such as burglary, felonious larceny, auto theft, sex offenses and vandalism, according to Sen. Gary Byker.

The program hopes to achieve its goals through training, analyzing crime data and patterns and planning. The Holland Police department hopes to reduce burglary by 10 per cent, to utilize Operation Identification in 400 locations and present 100 crime prevention seminars in the schools and other service and youth groups.

The federal monies for the program which amount to about 90 per cent of the funding, are awaiting final approval from Congress. That amount totals \$39,285 with the state and city contributing \$2,182 and \$2,183 respectively.

Police Caution On Use of Fireworks

Holland Police Chief Charles Lindstrom today asked the cooperation of Holland residents in curtailing the illegal use of fireworks and emphasized that persons apprehended for violating laws and ordinances are subject to prosecution.

Chief Lindstrom noted that the illegal use of fireworks includes the sale, furnishing, giving or exploding of all fireworks including firecrackers. Flat caps and sparklers are permitted the police cautioned the safe use of sparklers by children.

Additional officers have been assigned this year to help control the illegal use of firecrackers at the American Legion fireworks display, Lindstrom said.

Four Receive Minor Injuries in Accident

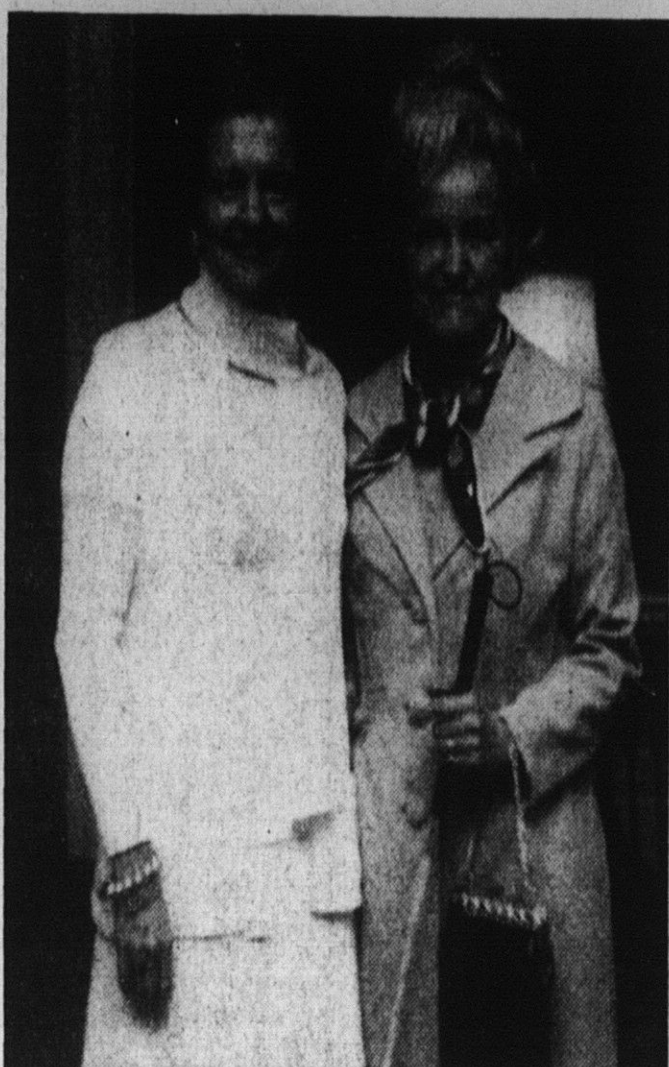
Four persons received minor injuries in a two car accident Saturday at 11:17 a.m. at 10th St. and Columbia Ave.

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Mrs. Swieringa Ponders The 'Why'

Marilyn's Trip Still Unfinished

The First Lady didn't shake Marilyn Swieringa's outstretched hand.

Mrs. Ford bypassed it and embraced the Holland woman. The warm greeting brought tears to the eyes of the State Rehabilitant of the year when she represented the Michigan Division of Services for the Blind at a Washington conference in early May.

With all of her unforgettable memories of the trip, one haunting thought continues to plague the vibrant woman who will turn 45 on Sunday... was there an underlying purpose to her trip?

Marilyn has been pondering the likelihood that the real significance of her presence in Washington has yet to be unwrapped. "Maybe by telling about the trip I'll know," she hopes.

As she groped for words to describe the First Lady ("Everyone uses 'warm' and 'gracious' about all First Ladies but she really was"), Marilyn explained that Mrs. Ford's concern for the Holland resident showed through in the face of her own physical difficulties.

Marilyn described her meeting with the First Lady who was dressed in an elegant and striking all white street length dress for her daughter's coronation as Apple Blossom queen at the Shenandoah Festival later in the day.

"I told her how proud we are of her, of doing a wonderful job under duress. We talked about ten minutes and I really can't express how gracious she was to my whole family."

Mrs. Ford posed for a picture taking session with Marilyn and her family and beautiful color photos were sent to Marilyn from the White House this week.

Mrs. Geraldine Reed of Holland, Marilyn's eyes and protector throughout the trip and ever conscious of the meaning the portraits would forever hold for the family, gently but firmly nudged aside the prominent secret servicemen who tended to clutter up the photos.

"Mrs. Ford explained that the White House staff was oriented to deal with the blind, a statement already evident to Marilyn who had been allowed to touch and examine many of the most historic and significant objects in the White House."

In her usual good humor, Marilyn described the zeal of their White House tour guide. He encouraged me to examine the legs of a grand piano which bore an engraving of the Presidential seal. "But one leg wasn't enough. He insisted I examine all four."

At the conclusion of the family's meeting with the First Lady, Todd, who has cerebral palsy moved to Mrs. Ford, extended his hand and expressed his thanks for a wonderful visit. "I could tell it meant a great deal to her," Marilyn said. It meant a great deal to the family.

A Presidential visit had to be schedule — the Communist

takeover of Vietnam which had occurred only two days before. During their stay Rep. Guy VanderJagt and his secretary, Margaret Trainer, arranged for Marilyn to meet with several congressmen including Sens. Robert Griffin and Edmund Muskie, and Rep. Richard Vander Veen.

A few days before her trip to Washington, Marilyn listened to the complete rebroadcast of the Presidential Prayer Breakfast in which Ford suggested that they pray "in the name of The Father and Jesus Christ." The statement so impressed Marilyn that upon returning from her trip she wrote to Ford acknowledging both that statement and expressing her appreciation to the White House staff for their cordiality.

"I'm glad we have a President on duty," Marilyn wrote expressing her understanding at not being able to meet with him. "It's good to have a President with spiritual guts (even if that's uncooth language). I covet the opportunity to pray with you, not just for you."

It had been Marilyn's intention to make just such a request had she been able to meet with Ford. "So many people say that they are praying for him but I've never heard anyone who wanted to pray with him," she said.

A few days later Marilyn received a Presidential reply. "Your thoughtful letter of May 9 was especially welcome. I was happy to learn that you thoroughly enjoyed your recent visit to the White House, and I too regret that I did not have the pleasure of meeting you personally at that time."

"Your words of hope and inspiration mean a great deal to me, as I know they would be to all our fellow citizens. You have, through your remarkable achievements, demonstrated that a physical handicap need not be an insurmountable obstacle to enjoying an active and productive life."

"I was deeply touched by your assurance that you are praying for me and with me. May the years ahead be filled with every happiness and blessing for you and your family."

"With warmest best wishes, Gerald R. Ford."

Since she has always considered herself God's instrument, Marilyn is still contemplating the "why" of her trip. Maybe the answer is quite simple.

Maybe for her 45th birthday... a plateau doctors concurred she would never reach due to diabetes and a weak heart... maybe once, just once God allowed her to rest, to enjoy, to reflect on a special time and recognition well earned.

Knowing Marilyn, it's a possibility she'll never consider.

Allendale Law Facility Gets Support

GRAND HAVEN—The Ottawa County Board of Commissioners is continuing study on revenue sharing, a new law enforcement facility and North Shore Park problems and expects several decisions will be made at its July 8 meeting.

Top priority on the revenue sharing funds appears to be the proposed new law enforcement facility near Allendale. At its meeting Monday, consideration was given to \$940,000 sought by Sheriff Bernard Gysen for the facility, down from the original \$1.6 projected cost. The commission has \$1.2 million left in its 1975 revenue account.

The \$940,000 would cover the building equipment, sewer, water, parking, architect's fees, landscaping and a minimum amount of office furniture. Another \$50,000 would be needed for renovation of the current jail.

Other proposals under consideration are a district court building at Port Sheldon Rd. and 28th Ave., additional space at the Holland branch, Social Services, Friend of the Court and Adult Probation, Mental Health, Health Department and the Treasurer's office.

Other requests are for bicycle paths, a women's resource center at Holland, Kandu Industries, skill center, Georgetown township drains and enlarging the present court facility in Holland.

The commissioners also expect to act July 8 on problems at North Shore Park. Development Committee Chairman Herbert Wybenga submitted four solutions to parking congestion and private property infringements near the park. Increased patrols are scheduled for the July 4 holiday weekend.

Jenison Youth Killed in Crash

JENISON — Randall Scott Smith, 14, son of Mr. and Mrs. Glenn Deane Smith of 7645 Fairlawn, was fatally injured Friday at 1:48 p.m. when the bicycle he was riding and a car collided at 20th Ave. and Rosewood in Georgetown township.

Ottawa County deputies said Smith apparently crossed southbound on 20th into the path of a car westbound on Rosewood and driven by David F. Tiesma, 33, of 1561 Doug, Jenison.

Smith's death was the eighth traffic fatality reported in Ottawa County this year compared with the 11 a year ago.

Smith was reported dead on arrival at Butterworth Hospital in Grand Rapids of back injuries.

Port Sheldon Fire Damages Home

Post Sheldon Township Firemen were at the scene of a fire for 3 1/2 hours early Sunday morning and one fireman was treated for smoke inhalation at Holland Hospital and released.

The fire broke out shortly after midnight at the home of Edward Swartz of 6865 152nd St., in an upstairs bedroom, completely gutting the room and destroying all the clothing and personal possessions of the family's three boys who occupied the room and escaped in their night clothes. There was also considerable smoke and water damage to the rest of the house.

According to Fire Chief Paul Elenbaas, the fire began in a wall socket in the bedroom below the room involved, spreading up the studs to the room above and setting the curtains afire. He estimated damage at not less than \$10,000.

"To tell the whole story," LaBarge said, "we really have to go back a couple of years. The events that led up to the Hospital project are as important as the project itself."

Early in 1973, Holland City Hospital, with the approval of the Holland City Council, contracted with TriBrook Group, Inc., Oak Brook, Ill., a hospital management consulting firm, to develop a long range plan and organizational study of the projected needs and services of the local hospital.

Bocks taught school at Martin and served as principal at schools in Bloomingdale, Hamilton and North Muskegon and superintendent of schools at Menominee before coming to Grand Haven.

Presentation of Bibles along with diplomas has been a tradition in Zeeland for more than a half century.

48th St. Parcel Is Rezoned

A 21.5-acre parcel south of 48th St. between Lincoln Ave. and the C and O railroad was rezoned from agricultural to D-2 industrial by City Council following a public hearing at its regular meeting Wednesday night.

The rezoning had been under study by the Planning Commission for over a year, and the area had been considerably reduced from initial applications. Since objections were expressed, a petition bearing 10 signatures representing six addresses west of the area, passage required a three-quarter majority as ruled by the deputy city attorney.

The vote was unanimous, eight members voting aye. Mayor Lou Hallacy was absent and Mayor Pro Tem Donald D. Oosterbaan presided.

Also unanimously approved was a waterfront ordinance providing for no-wake zones at Central Park, Kollen Park and at the River Ave. bridge.

Following a public hearing, the east 100 feet of the remaining alley lying east of Lincoln Ave. between 14th and 15th Sts. was vacated. A letter of objection from William Schuitema, 261 East 15th St. was read.

The matter of speed limit revisions on River and Michigan Aves. again was tabled for two weeks.

A previous request for a no parking zone on the north side of 24th St. for a distance of 45 feet east of Bohn Aluminum and Brass Corp., tabled for two weeks, was approved.

Council granted permission to Washington Square Merchants Association to close Washington Ave. from 18th to 19th St. July 10 from 7:30 a.m. to 2 p.m. for a sidewalk sale.

Holland Downtown Merchants Association was granted permission to close Eighth St. from River to College Aves. July 25 and 26 for a sidewalk sale. Dial-A-Ride services will be available to downtown free on those days, with the merchants association reimbursing the City. The bus service will be from 6 a.m. to 9 p.m. July 25 and 9:30 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. July 26.

City Manager Terry Hofmeyer announced that Dial-A-Ride's lift-equipped bus will begin service Monday. Council set fares for handicapped persons at 25 cents, one-half the regular fare.

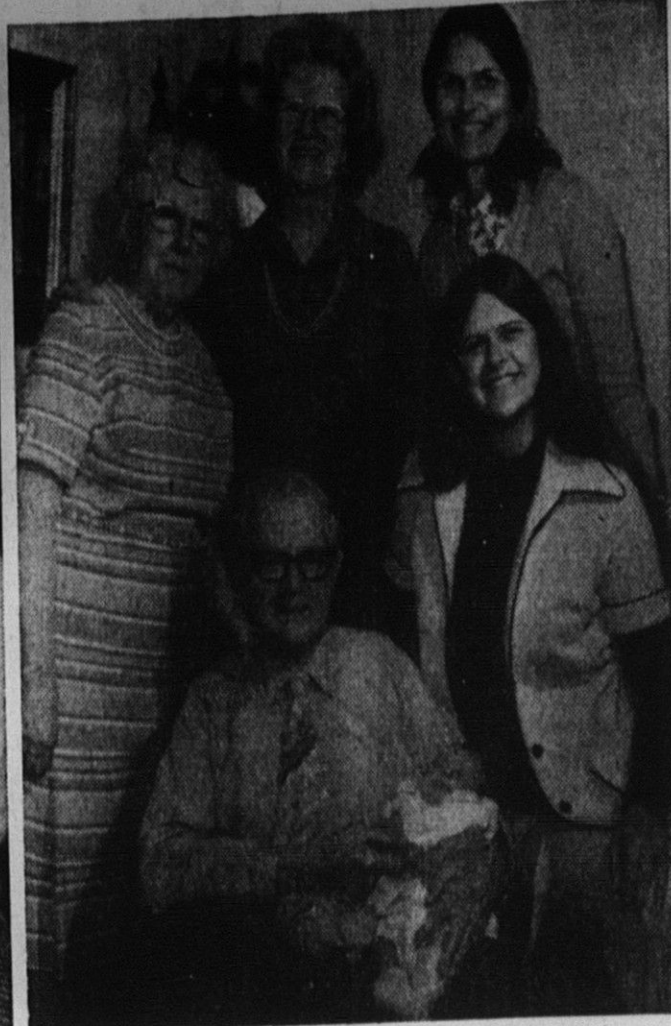

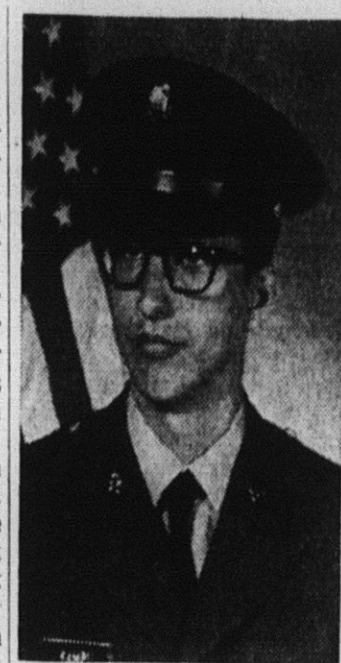

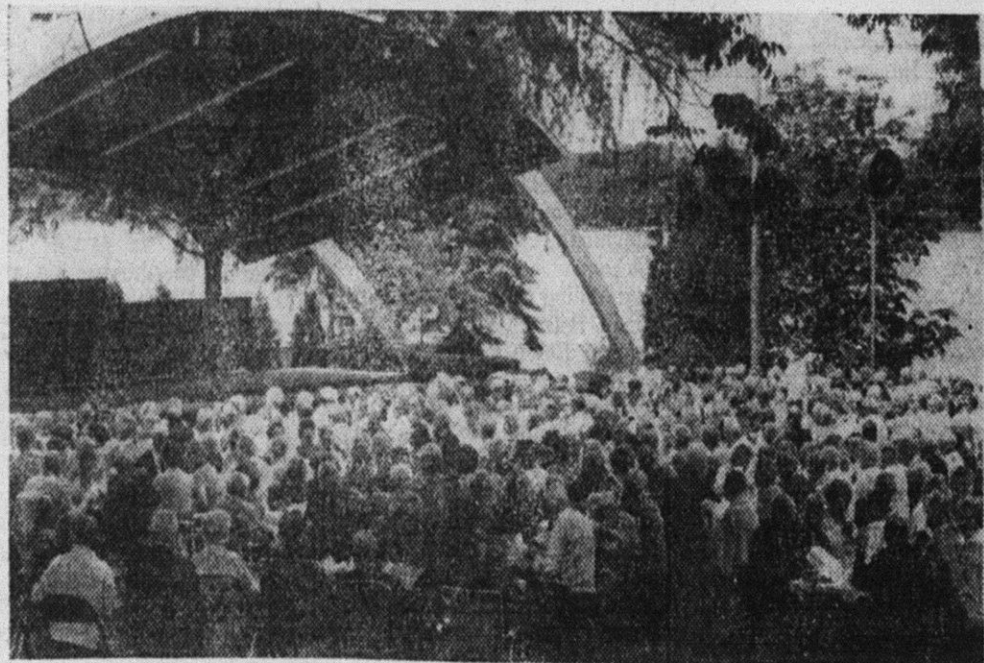
Fennville Schools To Seek Millage

The election will be held Aug. 11. Last day for voter registration is July 14. The 17 mill levy would replace a 14 mill operating levy.

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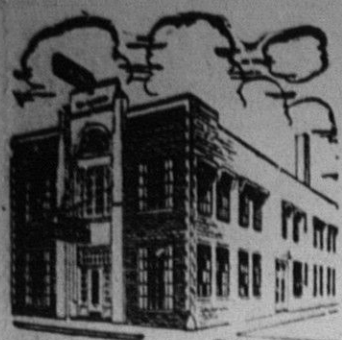
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EXPLODED MYTH

If we think back a bit we remember that the Bangladesh fracas with its tragic hardships was waged by the Indians under the leadership of Indira Gandhi, who at this moment, by the way, is in the same kind of trouble as the men who were involved in Watergate. We remember that the Israelis went to war under the ministerial guidance of Golda Meir, reluctantly, to be sure, but to war. And just as many people get killed in reluctant wars as in enthusiastic ones.

Just the other day we had further evidence that women respond pretty much like men when the heat is on. At the International Women's Year assembly Mrs. Leah Rabin was boycotted (the pun is unintentional) by other Near Eastern women because they have the same hatred for Israel as their masculine counterparts. They were so unreasonable as to leave the meeting being addressed by Mrs. Rabin even before they knew what she was going to say. This seems like less than sweet reasonableness and a pretty shaky foundation for a world of peace.

There are difficult problems in this world and very deep and age - old feelings about them. These cannot be ignored in the name of feminine mystique. It looks as though the women can be as disagreeable as the men. The romantic myth has been exploded.

Sunday School Lesson

"The Christian in a Changing World"

I Corinthians 3: 1-4,
II Peter 1: 3-11

At this season of the year nature speaks to us of growth. This lesson tells about the necessity of Christian growth. It is heartening to see a babe in Christ become a spiritual giant. God wants his children to grow up. This truth is stressed in this lesson.

I. Some Christians stay immature. Two passages from the New Testament comprise the text, one from Paul, the other from Peter. Paul established a church in wicked and prosperous Corinth. The members once had been pagans or Jews but had become Christians. Paul addressed them as "brethren." Some of the believers remained babes in Christ. They did not grow. This troubled Paul. He nurtured these immature believers as a mother treats a babe. He did not change the teaching but used a special method to meet their needs. A child in the first grade can't accept what is meant for the high school student.

These Christians revealed their immaturity by being jealous, acting like ordinary people. They also quarreled and showed the party spirit. They wanted to put love first. How do Christians show their immaturity today?

II. God gives generously. Peter wrote to Christians in general, not to a special congregation. These people had received faith, given them by God. The Bible calls faith, God's promises, and the blood of Christ precious. The believers had received "all things that pertain unto life and godliness" which kept them from the corruption of this world. Paul urges them to add one fine trait to another linking them all to faith. The word "add" note. If there is no addition there usually is subtraction.

Christians have the capacity to grow. A stone remains a stone, a child can become an adult and plant or a bush grows. The potential for growth is present. Faith must express itself in action. The fruits of faith are virtue, knowledge, self-control, steadfastness, godliness, and brotherly love. These fine qualities of character are needed today.

III. We are given a choice. Christians can grow in knowledge and in the reality of salvation and thus make their calling and election sure or they can lose what they have received and feel less and less certain about their faith and the hope they once had. When they were first converted they were joyful but by their failure to use the means of grace they got cold, forgetting the blessing of forgiveness.

Peter summoned the readers to use all diligence, ever remembering that knowing comes by doing. The practice of the Christian graces strengthens faith and gives assurance of an abundant entrance into God's eternal kingdom. Let's stop making excuses and make progress in the practice of Christian graces.

Rock Opera Superstar Opens Red Barn Season

It was a gala opening of the summer theatre season at the Red Barn Theatre Tuesday night when first nighters came to see and hear the rock opera "Jesus Christ Superstar."

Patrons, critics and theatre buffs all assembled to pass judgement on the musical portraying the seven last days of Jesus of Nazareth which has received mixed reviews wherever it has been performed.

Ted Kistler has made the theatre more comfortable for his audiences by removing some seats and placing the first section in a modified semi-circle. The aisles seem broader, somehow, and the stage is where the stage should be. The thrust stage used last season has been removed.

Playing the leading role of Jesus of Nazareth is one of the most demanding roles an actor can assume, with everyone having his or her own image of Jesus. Don Daniel did a remarkable job of his interpretation and sang the difficult role creditably. His gentle manner was all his viewers could ask.

Equally difficult is the role of Judas, handled well by another young actor-singer, David Cowles. Hopefully his voice and that of Don Daniel will hold up under a two-week run. Some of the music is really unsingable.

In one of the popular songs, one that is almost singable, Liz Dykhouse as Mary Magdalene sings "Everything's Alright" and makes the audience hear the words and even hum the tune. She makes a wonderful Mary Magdalene.

English actor Michael Page is a regal Pontius Pilate in voice and manner. Wisely, much of his role can be spoken. Don Bonevich in appearance makes a good Caiaphas, but his voice does not come through. Simon Frederick plays Annas, also carrying his role well.

In one of the lighter moments, John Scott as King Herod really brings applause from his audience. Hal William Vaughan appears as Peter.

Fully realizing that "rock" has to be loud, some of the voices in the cast would be more audible if there was a little less "noise."

Singing another one of the more popular numbers from the opera, Liz Dykhouse again proves she has a good singing voice when she sings "I Don't Know How To Love Him."

The second act is on a more

somber tone with The Last Supper and Gethsemane when Don Daniel does some of his best acting. Pilate, again, and Herod have some fine moments.

As the time for the trial and the crucifixion approach, the music, the lighting and the entire tone of the company becomes more somber. Expertly handled were the scene on Calvary and the tortuous way of the cross.

Staging was especially effective with a sturdy set to handle the running of the 30-member cast as it approached the stage from the rear of the theatre. In keeping with the new stage setup, the orchestra under the direction of Deborah Nelson was behind the stage. She was at the piano and conducted. Rebecca Deal was at the organ, Peter Fair on bass, Scott Minick on drums and Kristi Klug, technical execution.

The rock opera will continue through July 12, Tuesdays through Saturdays with curtain time at 8:30 p.m. Following Tuesday night's opening, the audience was invited to meet the cast in the rehearsal hall.

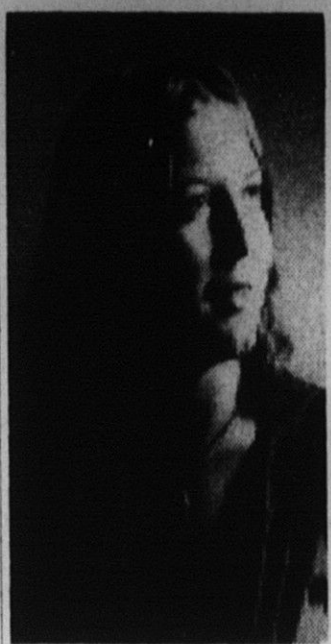

Resurfacing Bid Okayed By Council

Low bid of \$103,811.50 of West Shore Construction for Holland's summer resurfacing program was approved by City Council Wednesday night. It was the lowest of three bids submitted.

Two weeks ago, resurfacing bids came in lower than expected and Council rejected all bids to resubmit a larger program. Unit prices showed a slight increase in the new bids.

City Manager Terry Hofmeyer said the Central Ave., resurfacing program is not included in this program but is a part of the previous sewer program. Council granted a month's time extension in the resurfacing of Central Ave., and work is expected to get under way inside a week. It was made clear that delays were not caused by the contractors, Kamminga and Roodvoets Inc.

Council also granted an additional amount not to exceed \$3,000 to provide resurfacing on Central Ave., from curb to curb rather than gutter line to gutter line. Such an addition will allay problems arising from uneven areas causing puddles, it was said. The additional cost also will provide for a small amount of curb replacement and asphalt overlays.

A city manager recommendation to retain the firm of Moore and Bruggink for certain engineering services requiring a registered civil engineer was approved. The report pointed out that several months may be required for selection of a new city engineer.

In other business, Deputy City Attorney John Marquis advised that on June 14 Judge Calvin Bosman signed an order which in effect settled the Ottawa County Circuit Court suit titled Louis Padnos Iron and Metal Co. versus the city of Holland and the Zoning Board of Appeals. Marquis said settlement was based on a stipulation filed with the court, provisions of which were negotiated and agreed to by the Board of Appeals. The report was accepted as information.

The bid of Northern Equipment Co. of \$7,500 for a new portable air compressor for the Street Department was approved by Council. It was the low bid meeting specifications, including a trade-in of a 1960 Gardner - Denver 125 portable air compressor. Two other bids did not meet specifications.

A report of the Human Relations Commission expressed support and appreciation of goals and proposed activity of the Community Development Proposal, and commended City Council and the city manager's office for goals established and encouraged continued efforts in this direction.

A request of the De Pree Co. for permission to construct a control manhole within the city right of way was granted subjected to certain conditions. Water service for Terry Prins at 943 College Ave., also was approved as provided in a water main connection agreement.

Claims against the city from Nancy Rae Timmerman, Terry A. Marroquin, Jerry M. Wolters and Gladys Kuiper were referred to the city's insurance carrier and the city attorney.

Council confirmed a certification from Councilman Vander Poel for purchases by the Recreation Department from Superior Sport Store totaling \$154.90.

Low bid of Carleton Cleaners for dry cleaning services for the Police department was approved at unit prices quoted.

Council acknowledged a Hospital Board gift of 5 subscriptions to Gentlemen's Quarterly from Mister Guy. Gifts of books to Herrick Public Library also were acknowledged with thanks.

Holding Ponds and Sewer Hookups Occupy Council

Further opposition to mandatory sewer hookups and the holding pond concept, particularly in top-rated residential areas, was expressed at a regular meeting of City Council Wednesday night.

With faulty air conditioning, city fathers sweltered in warm Council chambers, with only slight relief an hour later after a visit by a service man.

Sue Brown, 364 East 24th St., protested sewer hookup costs for six homes in the area of Apple Ave. citing the need of a special rig for extra depth. Her home had been purchased about a year and a half ago when there had been no warning of such a hookup. She also spoke of layoffs in the current economy, and Mayor Pro Tem Don Oosterbaan referred her to the city manager.

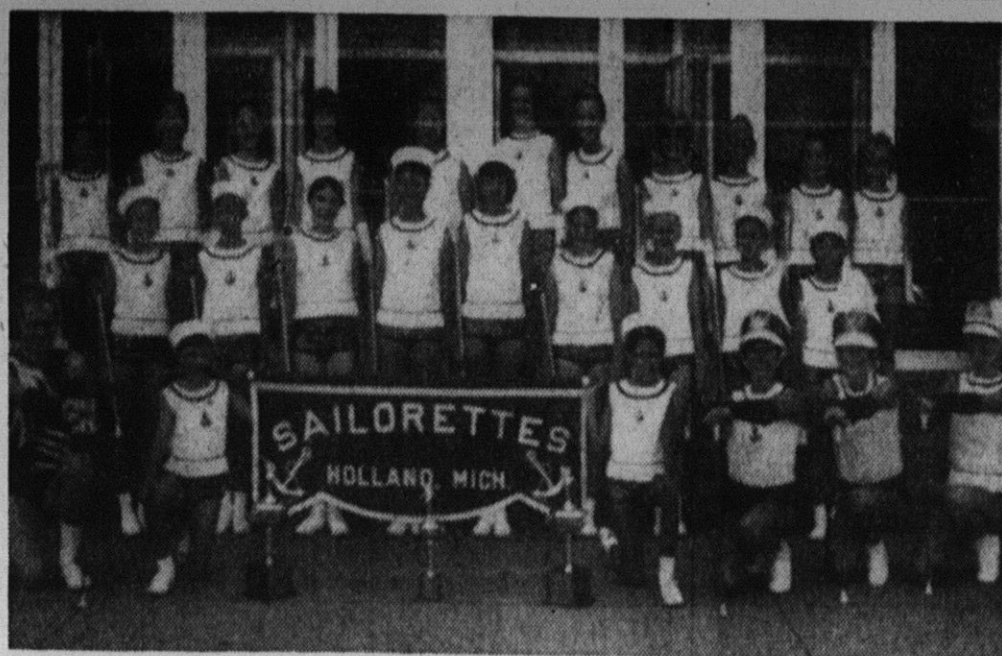

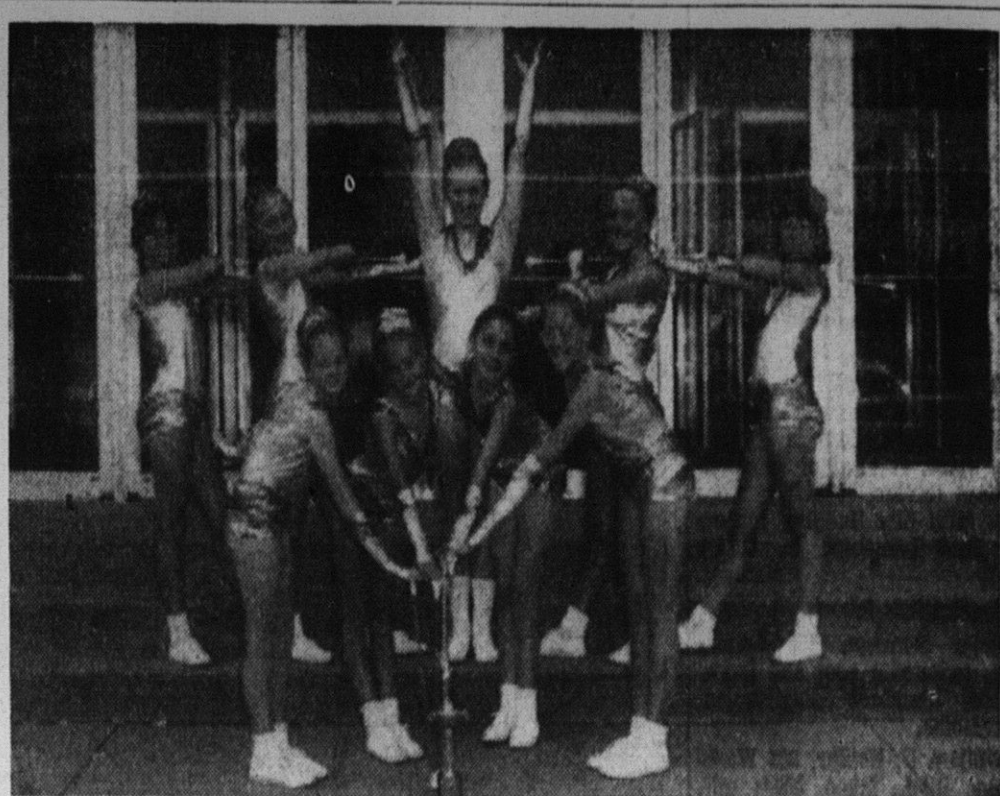

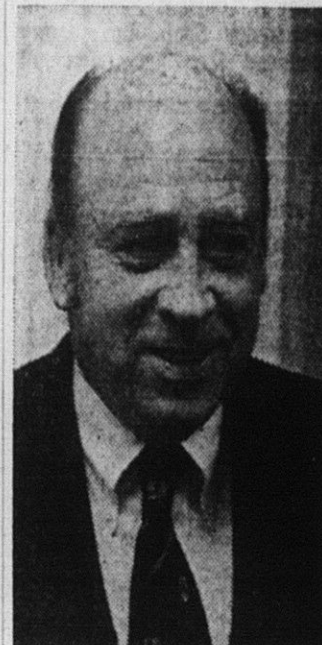

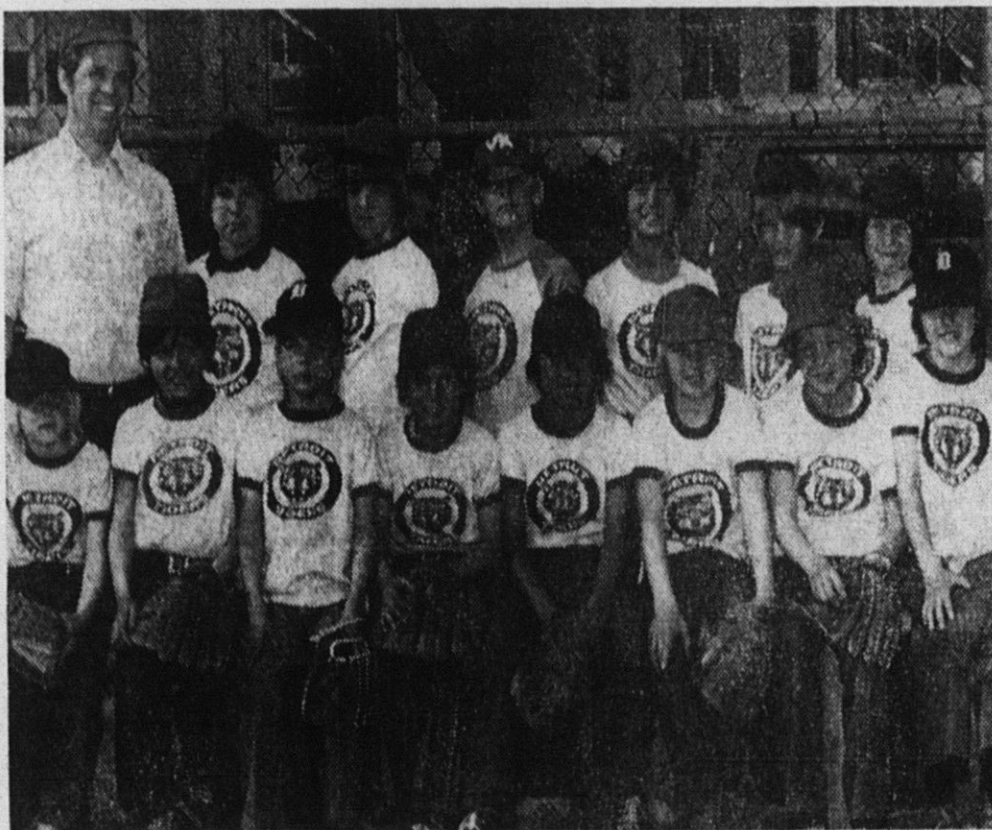

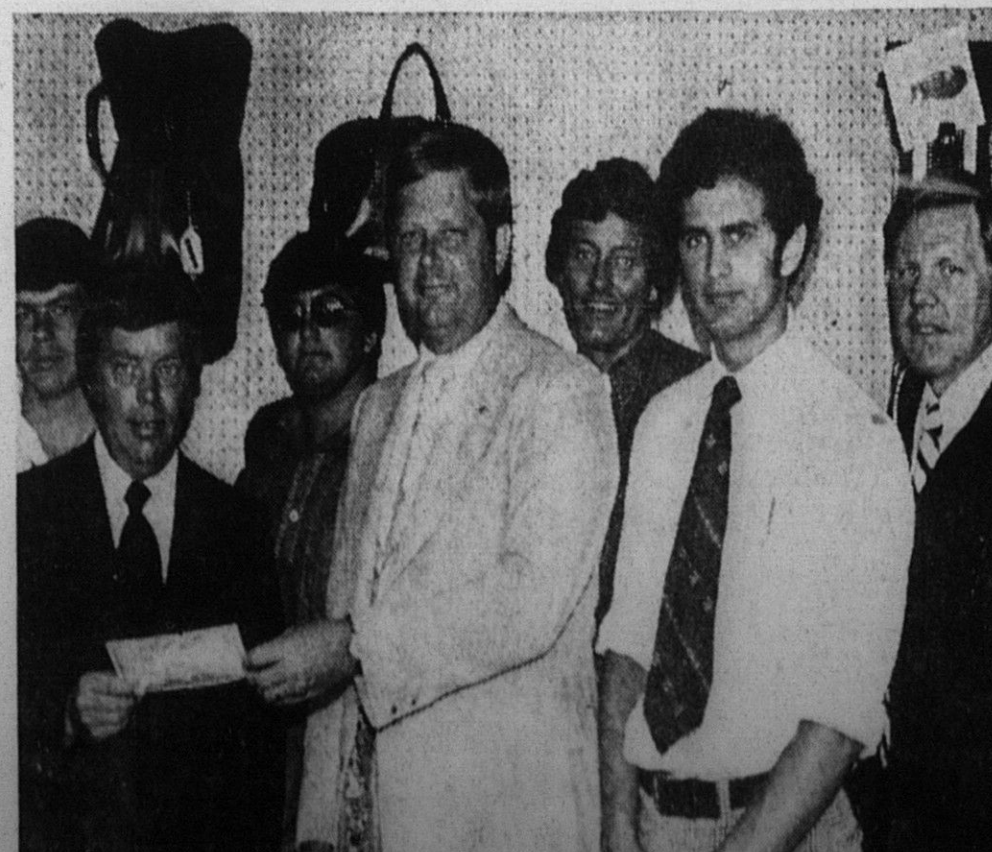
