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## Vandenberg Says His Record Speaks For Itself in Talk

Candidate Gives Talk  
To Holland Kiwanians;  
Urges Balanced Budget

"In all of the thirty odd years I have been in public life never once have I made a political deal, or never once have I made any kind of deal in a community project which would lead or tend to channel itself into a benefit for myself," was the emphatic assertion of Lt. Gov. William C. Vandenberg in a speech to the Holland Kiwanis club Monday night.

Vandenberg, who is a candidate for governor, stated, "If I make the top spot in Michigan, I just want you gentlemen to know that I will be no different than I have been and I am sure none of you have ever heard anything in Holland about me that would be to my dishonor or to my discredit as a public servant."

"You may have heard something," Vandenberg said, "but you won't find it because it isn't there. And so if I make the top spot I will get there without having made a single commitment of any kind to any individual or any group of individuals, and there will be no side door nor back door entrance to the capitol of Lansing. The front door will be open and open to all people."

Vandenberg pointed out that he was accused of being a candidate of the church people. "As though the time will ever be when anyone who is a church member and professing Christian is not eligible to hold public office because of his church affiliation," Vandenberg stated.

"In the next breath I was accused of being a candidate of bossism," Vandenberg said. "The two don't go together, but nevertheless they came out of the same camp. So be assured," Vandenberg emphasized, "no matter what you hear there will be no bossism peering over my shoulder giving me direction. Anyone who knows anything about my record at Lansing, and there it is an open book, can look and examine it and won't find anything of this sort. It just isn't there and that's all there is to it," Vandenberg asserted.

The Holland man said, "The one important thing we are going to have to talk about more and more before this thing is over is the subject of taxes. I would like to talk with all my opponents, if possible, and discuss government—not bossism or church people—but Michigan taxpayers and what it is all about."

On expressing his opinion on taxation Vandenberg stated, "I do not believe we need any more taxes in the state of Michigan and if I were governor I would prove that immediately by submitting to the legislature, and through the legislature the people of the state of Michigan, a budget in keeping with estimate of revenues, and as surely as I did that there wouldn't be any need for any more taxes at all."

Touching upon Gov. Williams' tax program Vandenberg stated, "The governor has a pet tax measure in which he wants to tax corporation profits and he is stating everywhere that a tax of that kind wouldn't be a tax on the consumer. Corporations do not pay taxes, they only collect them, and they pass on taxes imposed on them to the consumer, plus cost of collecting that tax."

Vandenberg pointed out, "The government cannot give or appropriate until it first takes from the people through taxation."

Vandenberg promised "If I should become the nominee come election time, there will be no dictation on my part as to who shall be on the state ticket. That will be up to the convention delegates."

In closing his talk Vandenberg stated the reason he entered the governor's race was "because it is high time we have a return to common sense and decency in government in the state of Michigan."

## Circuit Court Reduces Sentence In Barnes Case

Grand Haven (Special)—Howard Barnes, 25, of 75 East Ninth St., Holland, and more recently of 3739 Michael St., Grand Rapids was sentenced today in Circuit Court to serve 30 days in the county jail and pay \$50 costs or serve an additional 15 days on a liquor-to-minor count.

Barnes was found guilty by a Circuit Court jury June 17 on a charge of furnishing liquor to a 17-year-old Holland girl, whose husband is in Korea. The alleged offense occurred May 24. The case was an appeal from a Holland Municipal Court sentence May 31 when Judge Cornelius Vander Meulen sentenced Barnes to pay \$100 fine, \$4.70 costs and serve 90 days in the county jail.

Barnes at present has a divorce case pending in Circuit Court and admitted he is now interested in a girl other than the one involved in this case.

In announcing the reduced sentence, Circuit Judge Raymond L. Smith said he did not believe Barnes was instrumental in introducing the young lady involved to the use of alcoholic beverages, but opined that Barnes is a young man who takes his obligations "very lightly" and has "rather loose morals."

In other cases, James E. Merren, 26, of 458 West 16th St., Holland, waived the reading of the information and pleaded guilty to a charge of embezzlement of funds at Webb Coal Co. of Holland where he formerly was manager. The alleged offense involving about \$4,300 covered a period of 16 months up to last month, according to court records. His sentence has been deferred until the opening day of the next term of Circuit Court Oct. 13.

Gladys Vander Zwaag, 44, Ferysburg, who was found guilty by an Ottawa Circuit Court jury June 18 of a charge of aggravated assault, was placed on probation for a year. Conditions are that she pay \$2 a month oversight fees, leave intoxicating liquor alone and not frequent places where it is sold.

Mrs. Vander Zwaag is alleged to have stabbed her brother, Lawrence Van Etten, with a pair of scissors May 28 in her home. The brother was residing there at the time.

When asked by the court if she had anything to say, Mrs. Vander Zwaag replied, "I am very sorry for what I have done."

## Local Residents Invited To Visit 'Jail on Wheels'

A "Jail on Wheels" is on display in Holland today, across from the post office, at the corner of River Ave. and 10th St. The exhibit will be open until 10 p.m. tonight.

The portable jail, which has toured through 39 states, has been seen by more than 3 million people. It was designed by former Sheriff J. Edward Slavin of New Haven, Conn. G. J. Donahue and William Marler, are in charge of the jail.

Included in the display are the various types of equipment used by police, including weapons, a drunkometer, an electronic lie detector, a jail cell, an electric chair, a fingerprinting apparatus and a number of other exhibits.

## Allegan Schools Must File Transportation Costs

Allegan (Special)—Directors of 50 out of 134 school districts in the county have failed to file transportation reports with county superintendent of schools, G. Ray Sturgis, he said today.

The reports were due July 1 and are needed to determine state aid for transportation, Sturgis said.

Melvin Thompson, Muskegon county 4-H club member from Moorland, attended the national camp as a reward for his overall 4-H club achievement. He was selected at the 1951 state 4-H club show as one of four delegates to represent Michigan at the national camp.

He will appear on the Thursday evening programs each of the two weeks at camp as a closing event. He will use colored slides to illustrate his report. Also on Thursday evening programs will be Ethel Fairchild of Coopersville who will give a speech which she will use later in the 4-H public speaking contest. Other numbers will include acts and skits by the 4-H campers themselves.

Parents are invited to attend these programs along with campers.

## Zeeland Planning Farmers' Picnic

Zeeland (Special)—Zeeland Farmers' Day picnic plans are being aimed toward making the 1952 annual event the best in history. The picnic and accompanying events are scheduled Aug. 19 and 20.

K. J. Folkertsma, chairman of this year's picnic announced today that a bull calf has been purchased and all farmers in the Zeeland area are requested to register to be eligible for the calf drawing at the picnic.

Tickets have been given to Zeeland merchants and persons buying articles in stores will receive tickets with purchases. These tickets will be used for gifts which will be given away at the picnic. The gifts will be donated by merchants.

The picnic will open with an amateur program Tuesday evening in charge of radio station WHTC. Judges at the program will be Mayor Dr. D. C. Bloemendaal of Zeeland, Holland's Mayor Harry Harrington and possibly the mayor of Grand Rapids, Paul Goebel.

On Wednesday afternoon, professional entertainment will be provided by Reggie Cross and his trio from radio station WLS in Chicago.

Gerald Smith will be in charge of the horse-pulling contest which will be held Wednesday morning at Zeeland high school athletic field. The contest is open to anyone in Michigan. Teams of horses must weigh 3,000 pounds and under.

## Allegan Ends Up Its Fiscal Year With \$19,874.93

Council Members Study  
Last Quarter Report  
Before Taking Action

Allegan (Special)—The city of Allegan wound up its fiscal year, June 30, with a net balance of \$19,874.93 which, in the light of certain unforeseen expenditures, was considerably more than council members expected.

The last quarter financial report was presented but not acted on at Tuesday night's council meeting. Members requested time to study it before taking official action.

The report showed a cash balance of \$28,049.96 in the general fund, of as June 30, of which \$482.25 belonged to the city building fund and \$7,692.78 to the parking meter fund.

Most of the cash in the parking meter fund will be used to purchase government securities, according to City Manager P. H. Beauvais. This fund already has \$23,096.93 in government bonds, money which is earmarked for use in building off-street parking facilities in the business district.

More than 96 per cent of the 1951 city taxes have been paid, according to the report, leaving a balance receivable of \$2,485.63.

The city exceeded its budget for the fiscal year just closed by just 1.4 per cent, or \$2,559.51, the statement showed.

Council members set a \$1 hourly rate for poll workers during the Aug. 5 primary election.

They voted to authorize the city manager to advertise for bids on the Academy and Ely street paving projects, to be opened at the Aug. 4 meeting of the council.

Beauvais reported there is a strong possibility that the state highway department will expand its plans to repair Stanley Hill paving to include resurfacing of Western avenue from Davis to Sherman streets. He said that if such is the case, property owners along Western from Arbor to Sherman may petition the city to install curb and gutter at the same time.

Council members approved details of an agreement under which repairs would be made to business district sidewalks, unsatisfactorily resurfaced last summer. Several firms have withheld payment of a special assessment for the work, pending an adjustment. The firm which supplied material for the original job has already agreed on an adjustment on the work which proved unacceptable.

Beauvais reported that the state highway department, which originally had sought permission to use Ely street for a detour while its M-40 relocation project was in progress, has changed its mind. Highway department engineers did not feel that the street could stand up under detour traffic in its present condition, he said.

Reporting that the city's water pumping station had hit a new high Monday under the present water meter system, Beauvais said he had reached a satisfactory agreement with the manufacturers of the pump motor which has been giving some trouble. The firm will supply the city with a new motor in exchange for the present one, with the city paying freight and installation charges.

A new salaries schedule, representing an average five per cent increase for hourly rated city employees, was approved by the council.

Beauvais reported that the traffic bureau in the City Hall had ceased collecting fines for any moving violations. All such violations are now handled through municipal court, he said, at the request of Judge Irvin Andrews.

## Interlocutory Decree Awarded Holland Woman

Grand Haven (Special)—Elsie May Hyma of Holland was awarded a divorce decree in Ottawa Circuit Court Wednesday afternoon from Lawrence Robert Hyma of Holland township.

On Sept. 26, 1949 an interlocutory decree for divorce was awarded Mrs. Hyma and she was awarded custody of the minor child. The couple later resumed living together on Dec. 26, 1949 and continued to live together until Jan. 19, 1952, during which time two other children were born to the parties.

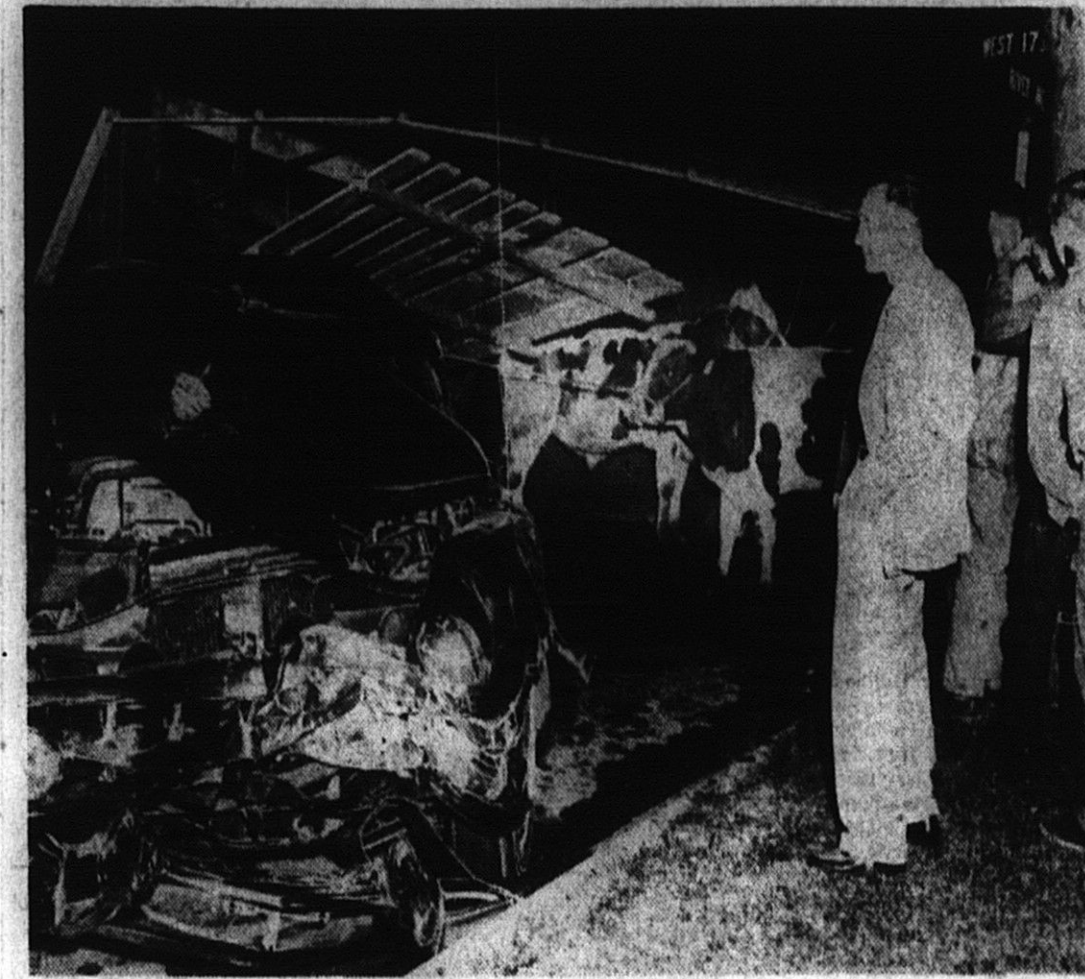
Custody of the three minor children was awarded to the mother.

## Pavement Patching

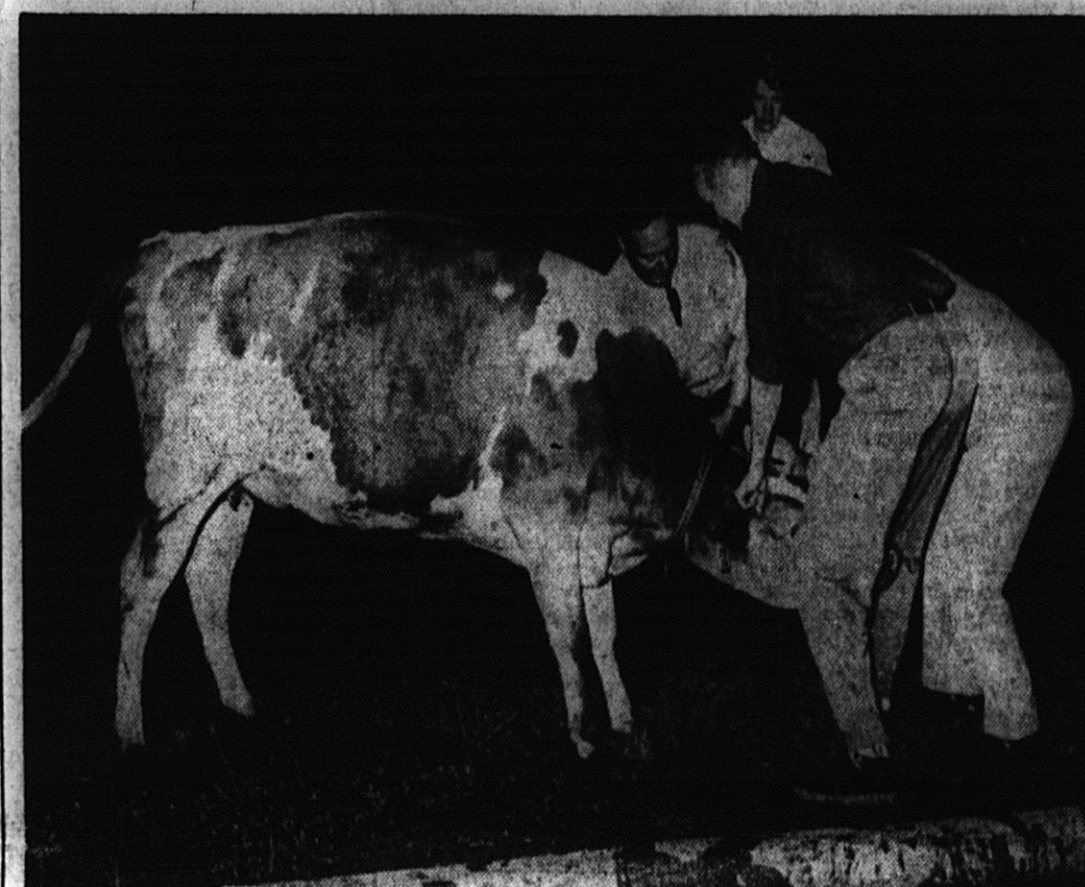

## Saga of Wild West Day Re-Enacted in Holland

A wide section of Holland's staid residential scene was turned into a roarin' tootin' ridin' and ropin' cattle arena after an accident at the corner of 17th St. and River Ave. shortly after midnight and into the wee hours this morning.

It all started when a truck loaded with eight head of cattle was tipped over in the collision with the car at the intersection. Two head of cattle were left in the tipped truck rack, but the six others scrambled out and took off down a nearby alley.

The accident occurred at 12:23 a.m. and the last cow was rounded up and roped at 3 a.m. But between those times, it was a hectic chase that led through backyards, across lawns, between houses, across streets all the way east to Central Ave., West to 16th St. and Van Raalte Ave., and north to 10th St. and Pine Ave.

The rustlin' posse included a conglomeration of cars, many equipped with spotlights, police cars with red flashers, a pick-up truck, and a wide assortment of men, some fleet footed and others just a bit slower, but wise to the ways of cattle.

And it took a lot of help as the lumbering bulls and cows scrambled through darkened back yards and across streets.

As the last cow was cornered near Holland senior high school shortly before 3 a.m., Sgt. Isaac DeKraker threw a rope around the bovine's neck. The startled cow jerked and DeKraker was thrown about six feet into the air and twisted around, but he hung on.

"I'll stick to wild horses," DeKraker said. After one of the bulls was subdued, one bystander was heard to remark, "Now you got the bull by the horns."

At one time one cow was tied to a tree on Pine Ave., between 13th and 14th Sts., and another a couple of blocks down at between 10th and 11th Sts.

Among those in the posse were Officers Leonard Steketee, Charles Dulyea, Claire Van Langenevelde along with Sgt. DeKraker, Deputies Clayton Forry and Nelson Lucas, Fred Wise, Sid Teusink, and Pete Van Iwaarden. Capt. Neal Plagenhoef, night man at the police station, was at the switch-board to receive calls

## 3 Persons Hurt In Local Crash

Three persons were injured and six head of cattle turned loose as result of a collision between a cattle truck and passenger car at 12:23 a.m. today at the corner of 17th St. and River Ave.

Two of the injured were reported in good condition today at Holland hospital. Mrs. Hattie Battjes, 1421 South Shore Dr., received a fractured collarbone and chest injuries, and the Rev. John Van De Riet, 69, of 485 College Ave., received a broken knee cap. Mrs. Van De Riet was treated for facial lacerations and then released. Mr. Battjes was driver of the car and the Van De Riet was riding with her.

Driver of the truck was Minard Renkema, 53, of route 4, who was hauling four of the eight head of cattle from Coopersville to the Elmer Nienhuis slaughterhouse south of Holland.

Renkema was headed south on River Ave., and Mrs. Battjes was driving east on 17th St. at the time of the collision. Renkema said that he swerved to try to avoid the impact, thus causing his truck to tip over after the impact. The truck crossed the intersection with the rack coming to rest on top of the rear part of the car.

It was then that six of the eight cattle escaped to turn Holland into a frontier town of old. Damage to the right side of the truck was estimated at \$1,500, and to the front and rear of the 1952 model car almost a total loss.

Police said there were no witnesses to the collision, which occurred at an intersection marked with a flasher.

## Sprinkling Ban Lifted in Zeeland

Zeeland (Special)—The Zeeland Board of Public Works has lifted the ban on sprinkling in Zeeland. The board at a meeting Tuesday decided that Zeeland residents may sprinkle on a one hour basis, three times a week. This will be on trial basis, Eimer Hartgerink, board chairman emphasized, with the permanence of the regulation depending on how well the water pressure holds up.

The board set up the following schedule for Zeeland sprinkling: South and east side of the street residents may sprinkle from 6 p.m. to 7 p.m., Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays, while persons living on the north and west sides of the street can sprinkle from 6 p.m. to 7 p.m., on Tuesdays, Thursdays, and Saturdays.

Last week, a ban was placed on Zeeland sprinkling because the well level was low and the low pressure in the mains endangered the city's fire protection.

## Judge Denies Ater Petition

Allegan (Special)—County Clerk Esther Warner Hettlinger said she had been notified by telephone Wednesday that Judge Raymond L. Smith denied Samuel Ater's petition for a writ of mandamus ordering Mrs. Hettlinger to allow him to correct errors in his nominating petitions and certify him as a candidate for register of deeds in the Republican primary.

Judge Smith's written opinion on the matter probably will arrive by mail today, she said.

In ruling the petitions invalid, Smith concurred with the state's attorney general, and Prosecuting Attorney Dwight Cheever.

His ruling will allow printers to go ahead on printing ballots for the primary, for they had been awaiting a decision.

Mrs. Hettlinger had withheld certification of Ater as a candidate when three of his petitions were challenged by Howard C. Strand, incumbent register and a candidate to succeed himself.

Ater has indicated he may run as a sticker candidate.

## Auto Crash Near City

Cars driven by Bernard Balder, 16, of 53 Roosevelt Rd., Zeeland, and John E. Williams, 39, of Grand Rapids, collided on M-21 about a quarter-mile east of the Waverly road at 4:55 p.m. Monday. Balder told officers he slowed down for traffic, and Williams apparently failed to follow suit. Damage to the rear of the 1949 model car was estimated at \$75 and to the front of the 1952 model Williams car at \$200. Investigating Ottawa Deputy Nelson Lucas cited Williams for failure to observe assured clear distance.



## Building Permits Issued in June Include 4 Houses

Four new houses were among the 49 building permits valued at \$100,428 issued during the month of June, according to the records of Building Inspector Joseph Shashagay and City Clerk Clarence Greengood.

A breakdown of the applications show that seven garage permits worth \$7,200 were written plus the permits for the new homes valued at \$38,800. Fourteen residential remodeling permits totaled \$9,535 and 14 roofing permits were listed at \$3,253.

An addition to an industrial plant was listed at \$30,000 and one application for a service station was valued at \$4,000.

Other commercial permits include one tool shed, \$200; two commercial additions, \$5,200; one industrial loading dock, \$1,000. One permit for a residential siding worth \$750 and applications to enlarge three garages totaling \$1,400 complete the list.

## Big Barn Saved By Taking Away Smoldering Hay

Borculo—It was a five-hour operation to remove smoldering hay from a big red barn, but volunteers of the Blendon-Olive fire department were jubilant today over saving a \$10,000 barn on the John Meeuwse farm, located five miles north of Borculo in Robinson township.

It was almost by chance around noon Tuesday that Meeuwse noticed heat in the barn. Recognizing it as spontaneous combustion in the newly filled hay mow, he called the Blendon-Olive department at Borculo and then proceeded to do what he could to alleviate the damage.

Fire Chief Gerrit Koop and his nine volunteers, aided by 30 to 35 farmers and friends in the locality worked about five hours removing the smoldering hay from the deep mow. Firemen effected this program by wetting down the hay, while farmers hauled it away. Only a part of the 10 to 12 loads of new hay which Meeuwse had just put into the mow was destroyed.

Fortunately, there was plenty of water. The farm has an extensive irrigation system providing enough water to keep several pumps operating.

The Zeeland fire department was called early in the afternoon for possible use of the "wet water" treatment. This involves a special attachment on fire fighting equipment whereby a chemical is added to the water for more effective quenching effects.

Chief Koop was high in his praise of the co-operation of neighboring farmers. "We firemen could concentrate on watering the hay, and the farmers hauled it away. It's a great satisfaction to save a fine farm building," he said.

He recalled a barn was saved through similar methods on an occasion about 12 years ago, before he was on the fire department. This was the Vander Zwaag barn in Crisp.

Had the fire occurred at night with all the cattle and farm equipment inside, loss might have been in the neighborhood of \$15,000 to \$18,000, the chief said. Meeuwse had only recently added a cement block addition for a chicken coop.

Between 2,000 and 3,000 persons gathered at Legion Memorial park Friday evening for a community Fourth of July celebration, climaxed by a display of fireworks.

On shore, no glass cuts were reported, but there were the usual number of sprains, bruises, bumped heads and a few cases of indigestion.

At Legion Memorial park, main events started with a concert by the American Legion band at 7:30 p.m., followed by a short address of welcome by Mayor Harry Harrington who spoke of the significance of the holiday and commended the two Legion posts for sponsoring the community program and keeping alive community spirit on the occasion. 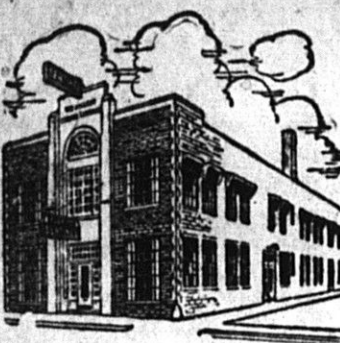
A splendid pitching job by curve-balling Carl Reimink, backed up with a solid 10-hit Dutch attack and some good fielding, earned the after-dark victory.

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## WHAT PUBLIC OPINION CAN DO

Only two of 69 United States senators dared vote for the so-called "living expenses" tax deal initiated in the house of representatives. The vote has not attracted much comment but it is one of the best examples in recent Washington history of the power of public opinion.

Some weeks ago, by a cowardly voice vote, the house handed itself a tax bonanza. The committee in charge of the little deal had cooked up a scheme whereby congressmen could charge their living expenses in Washington, like house rent and so on, to tax exemptions. The plan would have added several thousand dollars to the salary of every member of congress; at the same time it proved how cheap congressional talk is about economy. The members of the house did not even have the courage to go on record in their votes.

Inevitably public opinion was aroused. From every side, by all the means of communication at the disposal of the plain citizen, the congressional deal was exposed. Among others, the Sentinel demanded editorially that the voters of each congressional district force their own congressman to reveal how he had voted.

That method has now been made unnecessary by the vote of the senate. There were 69 senators present when a roll call was staged on the issue, and only two had the courage to vote for the house plan. Sixty-seven senators said "no" to the house plan, and as a result congressmen will have to continue to pay their fair share of income taxes.

The plain citizen sometimes thinks that his voice will not be heard in Washington. He is only one man against several hundred. But if enough plain citizens let themselves be heard from, Washington is sure to listen with a great deal of respect.

It is reasonable to suppose that a majority of the senators would have liked very much to have their salaries boosted by having their income taxes reduced. If the average voter had kept still about the income tax deal of the house, there can be little doubt that the senate would simply have endorsed the system. But public opinion still has some power to control the Washington officials, and in this case it decided an important issue. Be sure you get out and VOTE at the primaries Aug. 5.

## No Cause for Action Ruled In Circuit Court Case

Grand Haven (Special)—After 45 minutes deliberation Tuesday afternoon an Ottawa County Circuit Court jury rendered a verdict of no cause for action in a case brought by A. St. Clair Edison of Walker township, Kent County, against Gerald Neimeyer and Louis Neimeyer, 1303 16th St., Marne.

The plaintiff sought \$2,500 judgment for injuries received and damage to his car as the result of an accident April 8, 1951, on US-16 in Kent county, at the intersection of Mullins Rd. The other car, owned by Louis Neimeyer, was driven by his son, Gerald. Plaintiff alleges that in order to avoid an accident it was necessary for him to swerve his car. After he did it turned over in a ditch and he was injured.

Damage to the car was \$644.42 and he received head and body bruises and abrasions along with three fractured ribs.

## No Dumping Allowed

Residents of the area were reminded today that no dumping is allowed in Duntion's woods in the Beechwood district. The Beechwood Farm-to-Prosper committee, working for community betterment, said that although the Holland township board already has cooperated by placing "No Dumping" signs, persons still are turning the once-lovely wooded district into an unattractive dump. The committee pointed out that the regular dumping grounds, with a supervisor on duty, is only a few blocks away from the restricted area.

## Sunday School Lesson

July 13, 1952  
Deborah—A Woman of Courage  
Judges 4:4-10, 13-16  
By Henry Geerlings

We are rather accustomed to having women in high official positions in our country. They are in legislatures of state and nation. They enter the cabinet of the United States. They are governors of commonwealths. Women sway potent influence in educational, political and religious circles. So we are not as much surprised when we read of Deborah as a judge and prophetess, as we would have been before women were recognized as having the ability and the right to be leaders.

The situation in Israel was not the best after the death of Joshua and the separation of the tribes to the lands allotted to them. There was something lost by this separation—particularly in a spirit of common interest in the general welfare. The saddest effect was the breakdown of united worship of Jehovah. In fact idolatry sprang up here and there. Neighboring nations took advantage of Israel and ran over their lands and made them pay tribute. Thus afflicted Israel cried out to Jehovah for deliverance, believing that their misfortunes were punishments for their disloyalty to Jehovah. Their cries were heard and judges were raised up to lead them to freedom from oppression. Among the judges Deborah was the only woman.

The fame of Deborah as a just judge, wise in settling disputes and adjusting difficulties went out throughout all the land, so that from many places people came to her. She became interested in the oppression of the northern tribes and felt called to take a stand and make plans for delivering them from the cruelties they had suffered from the Canaanites for twenty years. But to throw off their yoke required military action. This was outside Deborah's sphere; so she called Barak of Naphtali and laid it upon him that he was the one who was to gather an army of ten thousand of his tribe and the tribe of Zebulun and deliver his people.

The army was to assemble on Mount Tabor, a strategic spot overlooking the valley. Barak refused unless Deborah would accompany him. Her presence would give morale to the men and her wisdom was needed to direct their movements. She agreed to this and had much to do with the victory. Deborah planned the battle. She knew that news of the army on Mount Tabor would arouse Sisera, captain of the army of Canaanites, to put down the apparent rebellion.

She also knew that rains would make the valley of the Kishon impassable for his 900 iron chariots. Without the help of these chariots the army of the invaders would be helpless. It was a farseeing piece of strategy that Deborah planned. True to her promise she stayed with the army Barak called to together and gave them the signal when they should rush down to make the attack.

Sisera reacted to the news about the army of Barak on Mount Tabor just as Deborah expected. With all his forces he came to suppress the rebels. From the heights Barak and his men watched the mighty host of the Canaanites all equipped for battle. At the proper time Deborah ordered the attack. Probably the chariots had begun to founder in soft ground. Of course what happened was attributed to the help which God gave His people. The well-drilled army of Sisera was thrown into confusion, and the death-dealing blows of Barak's men wrought havoc among them. Sisera left his chariot and tried to escape on foot but was pursued. He made his way to the place where Heber, the Kenite lived. His wife, Jael, saw the fleeing captain and invited him to come into her tent. He assumed that this would give him protection, since he regarded Heber as being friendly.

It seems that this group of Kenites were on good terms with the Canaanites. But Jael was against him. Her sympathy was with oppressed Israel. Defeated Sisera, weary with his long run, after a drink of milk which Jael gave him, soon fell into a deep sleep. Jael drove a sharp pin through his head and killed him. Barak, pursuing Sisera, was invited by Jael to see the dead man slain by her trickery. But Jael was praised for being the final agent to remove the power of the oppressing Canaanites.

The song of Deborah is a review of the goodness of Jehovah in caring for His people. To God she gave all the praise for the victory. Her part in it was not recorded to get praise for herself. She was satisfied to be regarded as a helper of Jehovah in delivering her people. Due credit was given to all who had co-operated in defeating Sisera, but the real credit went to Jehovah.

It is clear that the secret of Deborah's success was partly her own wisdom and skill but mostly her readiness to be guided by God. She believed herself divinely called to start the campaign against the Canaanites. She allowed Barak to have the honors so far as the military achievement was concerned. She, by her plans and successes, demonstrated what happens when sincere leaders put their trust in God. Now as then it is God-trusting leaders who can be safely trusted.

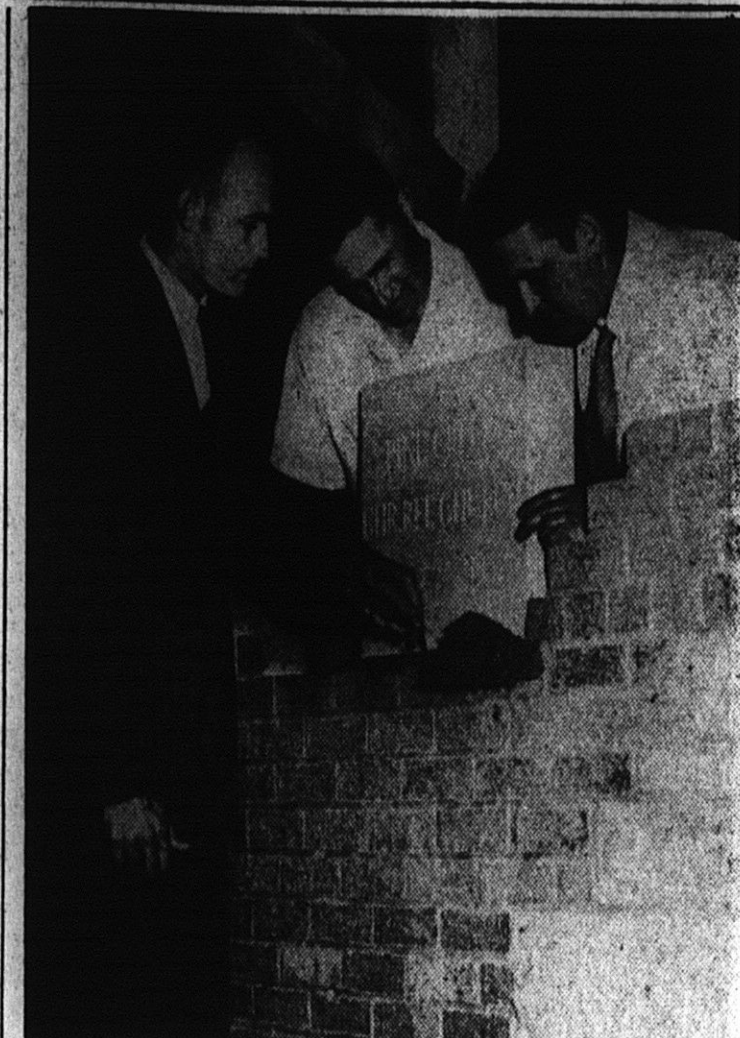

## Cornerstone Ceremony Is Held at Pine Creek

A total of 296 registrations and 135 changes of addresses and reinstatements swamped the clerk's office all day Monday and Monday night forcing the office to remain open past the 8 p.m. closing hour to take care of all those waiting in line. The total filing Monday almost exceeded registrations for the entire week.

City Clerk Clarence Greengood said that under state law no further registrations, change of addresses or reinstatements can be made for the primary. The state law calls for registration books to close 30 days prior to an election. Greengood said his office will accept registrations for the November election after the Aug. 5 primary.

Holland township Clerk Walter Vander Haar said 590 new registrations were filed in his office during the past week with 235 of the total registering Monday. No complete totals were available.

Grand Haven (Special) — A total of 142 new registrations were filed Monday with City Clerk J. N. Poel bringing the total of registered voters to a new high of 5,554. The previous record high was 5,200. Since June 30, there have been 266 new registrations and 122 changes of address.

The League of Women Voters were at the City Hall all day Monday demonstrating the use of voting machines to each person as they completed registration. Poel said, that despite all the advance publicity to get out and register, the last person in line at the

clerk's office Monday night lived closest to the City Hall. The clerk's office was open until 8 p.m. to take care of late comers.

## Canada Family Traveled 2,600 Miles To Attend Week-Long Convention

J. L. Butler, his wife and two sons are en route back to St. Johns, Newfoundland — a 2,600-mile trip — after attending the week-long Bible Students Unity convention that concluded at Hotel Macatawa Saturday evening.

The Butler family traveled the longest distance of any of the 250 delegates to the convention and to travel the 2,600 miles. The family flew from St. Johns June 29 and arrived at Hotel Macatawa just seven days later.

Butler, owner of radio station WOCM in St. Johns, has been attending the Unity conferences since 1944. He founded his 1,000-watt radio station in 1936.

St. Johns, a city of 60,000 persons, has two other radio stations. One is an independent station, as is Butler's, and the other is government owned.

Butler explained that Canada does not have independent networks such as CBS, NBC, ABC, and Mutual in this country. The only network is that owned and operated by the government through government stations. However, Butler said, his independent station does not have difficulties because of the lack of a network.

His station, he said, is primarily a community station and many programs are available on transcriptions.

Butler is also a private pilot as is one of his sons. He owns a four-seat amphibian which he decided against flying up to Macatawa because of bad weather in St. Johns.

The Butler family enjoyed the stay at Macatawa and liked the warm weather which is a "pleasant change" from Newfoundland weather. The weather in St. Johns is cooler during the day and the nights are chilly.

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## Allegan Sheriff Urges No License For Big, New Douglas Pavilion

Allegan (Special)—Sheriff L. A. Johnson said he has recommended that no beer and wine license be issued to the Rendezvous Pavilion, huge new dance hall in Douglas, "solely on the dictates of my own conscience."

He said he "realized there is bound to be talk" about his recommendation to the state liquor control commission, but denied that it was the result of any pressures, political or otherwise.

Johnson said his recommendation was based on two factors, one of which was the location of the new dance hall. The pavilion is located about 600 feet west of Douglas Community hospital. He said he felt that drinking would add to the noise, to the discomfort of hospital patients. He pointed out that the dance hall is only a few hundred yards from an intersection with US-31 which has been the scene of several bad accidents in recent years. Two have been killed at the corner in the last two years, he added.

The sheriff said he regretted the owners of the pavilion, George Harding and Ben Klaynik, had not checked with the liquor control commission before going ahead with their plans for building. He said this was the customary procedure.

The dance hall is reportedly the largest in the Midwest. It is 100 feet wide and 304 feet long and boasts "the longest bar in Michigan"—running the full length of the building. It has seating capacity for 4,200 people.

It would take "a small army" to properly police an establishment of this size if beer and wine were served, Johnson said.

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## Justices Plan Drastic Action

Grand Haven (Special)—Justices George V. Hoffer and Truman A. Husted of Grand Haven along with Frederick J. Workman of Spring Lake are going to take drastic action from now on against speeders and drunk drivers by imposing jail sentences and license suspensions.

They have agreed that where speeding is charged at twice the speed allowed the license will be suspended for at least 30 days and in drunk driving cases a minimum jail sentence of five days will be imposed.

The three justices announced their decisions after attending the Justices of the Peace association's convention at Houghton Lake last week Thursday, Friday and Saturday.

Judge John Watts of the Detroit traffic court, pointed out at the convention that during the last four years, such action has greatly curtailed accidents. In 1948 he said traffic accidents totaled 1,764 which was reduced to 114 in 1951, and during the same period traffic deaths were reduced from 47 to 3. In 1951, 1,650 persons were killed in auto accidents and local justices feel more severe penalties are justified.

## Holland Area Folks Return to Routine Following Holiday

### Cooler Weather Seen; Local Scene Escapes Any Serious Accident

Holland folks returned to work Monday after the long Fourth of July holiday week-end, with little or no tragic excitement to mar the local picture.

Perfect weather was the order of the day, with hot temperatures and sunny skies prevailing until Monday.

One person was injured in the two major mishaps recorded in Holland during the week-end. Dave Welton, 16, of 1991 Lakeway Ave., was treated at Holland hospital for shock after a collision at the corner of 12th St. and Pine Ave. at 1:25 p.m. Sunday. Drivers involved were Welton, headed east on 12th St., and Donald M. Birkhold, 23, of 73 West 30th St., headed north on Pine Ave. A passenger in each car escaped injury, as did Birkhold.

Only other mishap involved three cars on River Ave., near Ninth St., at 1:15 p.m. Saturday. Drivers involved were Mrs. Jessie Roman, 68, of 246 West 19th St., and Robert W. Walker, 28, of Chiff, Ind. All were headed south on River Ave., and McKim had just pulled from a parking place when the collision occurred. No body was injured.

Ottawa county sheriff's officers, working in the surrounding rural areas, reported only five or six minor collisions during the week-end.

What could have been a serious mishap occurred Sunday afternoon at Holland State park when a young boy ran into the side of a car along the trailer parking area. Park Manager Clare Broad credited the slow speed of the driver with averting tragedy. The boy was unhurt but frightened.

That was the only mishap reported at Ottawa beach for the week-end, although almost 30,000 persons crowded the beach for the two days. According to traffic meter figures, slightly more than 13,000 persons visited the beach on Saturday with a like number on Sunday. A total of 260 camps were set up on Friday and most stayed until Sunday night. Twenty trailers were in line Saturday morning and 18 were placed by Saturday evening.

Grand Haven state park, without benefit of a traffic meter, estimated week-end attendance for the three days at 104,000 persons. Estimates included 44,000 on Friday, 26,000 on Saturday and 34,000 on Sunday. A total of 258 camp permits were issued for the week.

The Holland Coast Guard station also had a relatively quiet week-end. In addition to patrolling the Lake Michigan Yachting association races, the Coast Guard had only one distress call, hauling in a speed boat that broke down Saturday.

## Man Hangs Self At Holland Jail

A 59-year-old Fennville man hanged himself in his cell at Holland city jail early Monday morning after he was picked up by city police.

Victim was Joe S. Repta, of route 1, Fennville. He was picked up at 2 a.m. while driving on River Ave., and given tests to determine if he was intoxicated. Then he was lodged in a cell and was found hanging from the bars at 4:18 a.m.

His body was taken to the Chappell funeral home in Fennville. Only one known relative, Mrs. Anna Ledl of Chicago, a niece, survives. Repta was unmarried. Coroner Gilbert Vandewater's report listed "suicide by hanging."

Night officers checked on Repta repeatedly because he appeared despondent about losing his job if he didn't report for work today. When Van Langevelde investigated a noise at 4:18 a.m., he found Repta hanging with his belt around his neck. Officers Charles Dulyea and Van Langevelde applied artificial respiration and took Repta to Holland hospital, but he was dead upon arrival.

Repta was driving a 1930 model coupe when picked up by police. He had worked in a Holland factory until about two weeks ago, and was thought to have been employed on a farm near Fennville since then.

Lakes Michigan and Huron went up .14 of a foot during June, according to monthly averages. Lake Superior went up .2 of a foot while St. Clair went up .08 of a foot.

Lake Ontario was down .06 of a foot and Erie down .04 of a foot. The average level of Lakes Michigan and Huron was 582.5 during June.

## Lake Michigan Rises 15 Foot During June

Lake Michigan continued to rise another 15 foot the past month for an official reading of 582.45 feet, according to the U.S. Lake Survey which reports mean stages determined from daily readings of staff gauges.

The 15-foot rise, however, is under the average increase from May to June which registers a positive .24 foot for a 10-year average. The June reading of 582.45 feet was 1.27 feet over last year's reading at the same time and 1.93 feet above the 10-year mean. It
